The growing recurrence of the name of Senator Arthur
Vandenberg as a possible Republican nominee for the Presidency is pleasing to the people of Michigan. The Senator has declined to permit his name to appear as a candidate and in this he has probably been several steps ahead of the more active candidates in political acumen.

The present close rivalry of Dewey and Taft makes more imminent the selection of some compromise candidate. It would scarcely be appropriate to label Senator Vandenburg as a dark horse candidate as his prominence in the Senate, particularly in the field of foreign relations, precludes this appellation. It has been his clear expressions in this field of national affairs that has brought him into possible presidential view at this time and the growing complexity of our interests abroad has given stature to his presidential measurements. There is a feeling in this country growing more prominent daily that there is no sense in sending good money after bad. This expression comes of course from persons who do not, or cannot, think deeply on the almost hopelessly involved problems connected with our aid to Europe plans. Nevertheless the feeling exists.

If, after the nations in Europe had agreed to settle their ten billion dollar debt to us on an agreed upon basis they had faithfully carried through, the problem of aid to them now would have been infinitely easier.

Britain's annual payments ran from \$140,000,000 to \$190,-000,000. When the hurricane of the early thirties began to which gave Hitler the green light for his attack on Poland blow she decided she could not continue these payments and stopped them. The other nations, pleased with the prospect, stopped payments also, with the exception of little Finland, | tions. which has made a great gesture of paying her \$167,000 annually on the barrel head.

They have all learned since then that the payments on which they reneged were a mere bagatelle compared with the astronomical sums they have had to spend in the mere hope of preservation, which is still an unanswered question.

In a measure we were ourselves responsible for this outcome. When the depression began to reach alarming depths President Hoover himself announced a year's moratorium on these payments and naturally there was not a dissenting voice from the other side. With this encouragement they

The Stalin-Hitler Pact

The publication of a batch of 260 secret documents unearthed by our occupying forces in Germany, showing conclusively the understanding that existed between Hitler and Stalin prior to Hitler's attack on Russia in June 1941 should convince the most skeptical of the sympathy that existed between these two dictators and of the fraud that permeates all of Stalin's so-called enmity against the fascist principle of government.

They were, after all, only a couple of plunderers pledged to each other's aid. This treaty executed in August 1939, which started the war and which at the time was widely announced as only a trade agreement, had far wider implica-

Neither of these worthies was deeply concerned with the ideologies of Fascism or Communism under which they coasted into power. Each simply wanted to be the big boss in his part of the world and both agreed to expel Britain and the United States from any voice in Europe.

The agreement got along famously until the two fell apart on the matter of military bases in the Bosporus and Dardanelles area and the oil lands in Persia, which both

coveted. The exposure of these secret pacts should set a large segment of world opinion right in its appraisal of current events, and expose the insincerity and hypocracy of both

When and if the city structure is adopted by the four remaining villages in the township, it will be necessary for all of them to make definite arrangements for some common central health agency to take over the work heretofore performed by the Township Board.
There is much talk going about that the Board of Education

should make provision for the supervision of the health of the school children. It is said that this department represents much the larger part of all the Health Board's functions.

With this work assumed by the schools, the municipal authorities seem to believe the arrange ment for the rest of the health work would be a simple matter, Commissioner Dr. Thomas Davies or some other physician might be employed by all of the new cities to attend to it, or if this setup was too loose and lacked the overlying authority, it might be accomplished by creating a Grosse Pointe Health authority, with jurisdiction throughout the Pointe. This latter step might require a special act of the state legislature.



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


