Spectacular Fire Leaves Al Green's Restaurant a Ruin

The Al Green Restaurant at Beaconsfield and E. Jefferson avenue, one of the best known eating places in Michigan, was gutted by a fire that broke out at 10:26 p.m. on Friday, December 16. The loss on the contents and furnishings, which were owned by Green, is total. The blaze burned away part of the ceiling of the shop and water and smoke took heavy tolls. Proprietor Hoyt estimates the total damage at about \$6,000.

The store was just started recently but business had increased rapidly up to the time of the fire. Coming at this particular time of the year it was a cruel blow to the owners.

The Hoyts say they may have to close up for awhile while repairs are made to their building, but they hope to keep going through the holidays.
