# WOODS INCINERATOR PLAN RAPPED

#### Thursday, February 25

A SCHEDULED SHOWDOWN hearing between Senator Mc-Carthy and Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens, was cancelled when the secretary suddenly agreed to release a list of all persons involved in promoting and honorably discharging Major Irving Peress of New York, accused as a Communist.

The action was so abrupt that it left little doubt that the "about face" reflected high Administration policy decisions. Stevens also agreed to quit telling Army officers to ignore summons from the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigation of which McCarthy is the head.

#### Friday, February 26

GOV. WILLIAMS, entering the growing investigation of alleged frauds in right-of-way purchases on roads throughout the State, demanded information on appraisals made and prices that were paid in the last 10 years. He also demanded that Highway Commissioner Charles M. Zeigler prepare a record of all transactions since 1944.

Williams wrote Zeigler that his objective is to bring all facts to light to restore confidence in the highway operations.

Minutes of Council meetings held January 18th and February 1st, and of the Zoning Board of Appeals meeting held on January 18th, were approved.

Residents of Country Club Drive protesting the installation of new type street lights on the street were heard.

Financial reports were approved. The application of Lester and Samuel Gruber for a

new SDM license to be operated in conjunction with the Class "C" license at 123 Kercheval Avenue was denied. The Clerk announced his resignation as a member of

the Board of Supervisors and the Council appointed Councilman Kirby to succeed him. A communication requesting wage considerations in the 1954-55 budget was referred to the Council as a Committee of the Whole.

Permits to hold a fireworks display on July 4th next were granted to the Country Club of Detroit and the Grosse Pointe Club.

The Council received a communication from the Board of Education advising that it could not advance its plan for the parking lot development in conection with the gymnasium-auditorium and building.

A petition concerning parking in the vicinity of the Cottage Hospital was reported by the Police to have been settled to the satisfaction of the petitioners. The survey requested from Gunderson & Dobelek on

the parking needs in the business district was reported completed, and copies were distributed to the members of

The Council indicated its desire to improve the local business district parking lot this coming spring.

A proposal to allow the settlement of parking meter violations at a lesser amount than that imposed by ordinance, provided payment be made within one hour, was defeated.



Section 7.15 The presentation to the Council by the Clerk of a valid and sufficient referendary petition, containing a number of signatures equal to twenty-five percent of the registered electors of the City shall automatically suspend the operation of the ordinance in question pending repeal by the Council or final determination by the electors.

An ordinance adopted by the electorate through initiatory or referendary proceedings shall not be amended or repealed, nor shall an ordinance repealed by the electorate, be reenacted, unless and until the electorate shall have approved any such action. Any ordinance may be adopted, amended or repealed by appropriate referendary or initiatory proceedings instituted in accordance with the provisions of this chapter or upon submission to the electorate by the Council, upon its own motion.

If two or more ordinances adopted at the same election shall have conflicting provisions, the provisions in the ordinance receiving the highest number of affirmative votes

"CHAPTER 7, SECTION 7.15 OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS AT THE PRESENT TIME READS AS FOLLOWS:

Ordinance suspended: Miscellaneous provisions on initiatory and referendary ordinances.

Section 7.15. The presentation to the Council by the Clerk of a valid and sufficient referendary petition containing a number of signatures equal to twenty-five per taining a number of signatures. cent of the registered electors of the city shall automatically suspend the operation of the ordinance in question pending repeal by the Court or final determination by the electors.

An ordinance adopted by the electorate through initia-tory proceedings may not be amended or repealed for a period of six months after the date of the election at which it was adopted, and an ordinance repealed by the electorate may not be reenacted for a period of six months after the date of the election at which it was repealed. It is provided, however, that any ordinance may be adopted, amened or repealed at any time by appropriate referendum or initiatory procedure in accordance with the provisions of this chapter or if submitted to the electorate by the Council on its own motion.
