Thursday, July 3

FIVE OF THE 49 North Americans kidnapped by Cuban rebels—and a United States consul who went to their rescue—were airlifted to the Guantanamo naval base Wednesday.

A helicopter made two trips to bring the freed captives and the consul out of the jungles. It then stopped operating for the night, at which point 44 captives were still to be returned. Indications were that their release may be imminent.

Friday, July 4

BOSTON MILLIONAIRE Bernard Goldfine acknowledged Thursday that he lavished Christmas money gifts on the secretary of Presidential Aide Sherman Adams and 32 other Federal employees.

Investigators for the House Subcommittee investigating the Adams-Goldfine links said many of the checks were for \$100, with some ranging up to \$150.

Saturday, July 5

A HUGE AIR FORCE Globemaster went down in mid-Pacific early Friday and about 12 hours later three members of the nine-man crew were rescued by a Navy helicopter.

The C-124 double-deck Air Force cargo plane crashed into the sea about 200 miles north-east of Johnston Island, while on a flight from Honolulu to Wake Island.

The \$1,700,000 Globemaster, as high as a four-story building, was based at Travis Air Force Base, near San Francisco. With a crew of seven, and two military couriers, it was on a cargo run to Tokyo.

Sunday, July 6

THREE AMERICANS employed by the United Fruit Co. were released by Cuban rebels Saturday, leaving 42 Americans and Canadians still in the insurgents' hands.

The three were flown by helicopter from rebel headquarters to the U. S. naval station at Guantanamo Bay. The helicopter then returned to bring out two other American prisoners and U. S. Consul Park Wollam, who has been negotiating the release of the 50 men seized by Fidel Castro, rebel leader, to protect what he called unfair U. S. aid to his Cuban government opponents.

Monday, July 7

ANOTHER CORNICE came crashing down Sunday, this one narrowly missing State Senator Charles S. Blundy, who was about to enter the Stafford Restaurant, 8335 Linwood. Blundy said he felt a pebble strike his shoulder and leaped away. Immediately, he heard a crash behind him and turned to find that a two-foot long piece of cement had fallen from the roof of the two-story building.

Tuesday, July 8

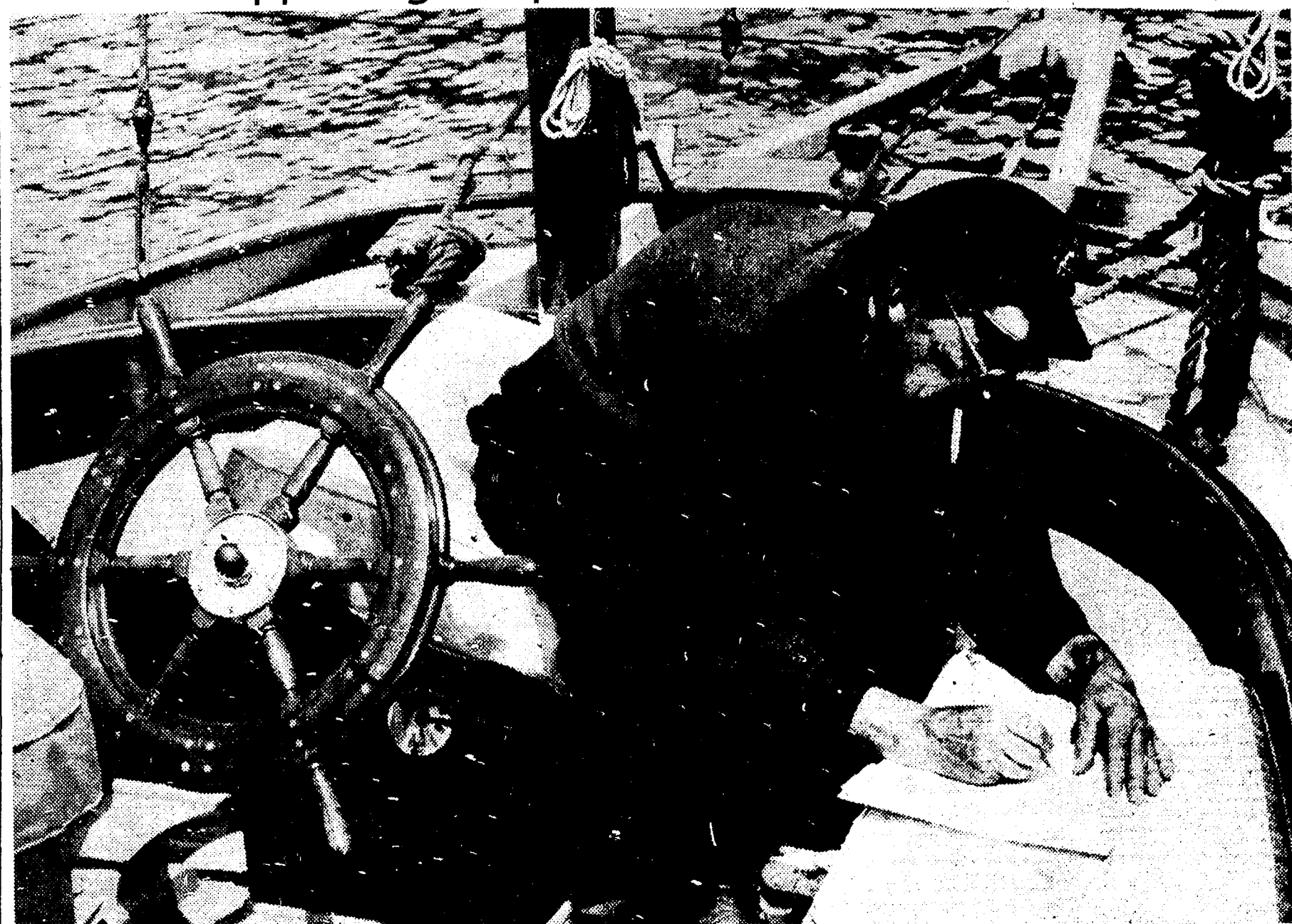
THE TOP INVESTIGATOR of the House committee investigating Bernard Goldfine lost his job late Monday after a whirlwind of developments which all but obscured the probe of the Boston industrialist.

Baron I. Shacklette, 48, quit under fire after the committee strongly and unanimously condemned his tactics of eavesdropping—"a most regrettable act that the committee does not condone."

Wednesday, July 9

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD of Local 212, UAW, Tuesday ordered an immediate end to a wildcat strike of trim department workers which has paralyzed operations at Chrysler's Plymouth body and assembly plants. Employees at the Mack body plant were ordered to report for work on their regular shift Tuesday afternoon and to remain on the job. Action by local officers came after 2,700 workers at the two plants were sent home again Tuesday because of refusal of a few trim department employees to work.

City, Farms Win Awards For Safety

Each Has Record of No Pedestrian Deaths For Two Years; Fine Programs Cited

Grosse Pointe Farms and Grosse Pointe City's individual two-year records of no pedestrian traffic deaths and their outstanding walkers' safety programs were highlighted this week with presentations of national Pedestrian Protection awards from the American Automobile Association to police officials of the two cities.

The awards, captured in the 19th annual pedestrian protection contest, were presented to City Superintendent of Police Thomas V. Trombly and Farms Chief of Police Walter R. Hoyt by George Measel, Automobile Club of Michigan, Grosse Pointe division manager, on Monday, July 7, and Wednesday, July 9, respectively.

"The residents of your communities deserve much of the credit for making this award possible," said John Trellay, Auto Club safety education consultant for the Pointe area, who was also present at the ceremonies. "Despite increased traffic volume, they again avoided any pedestrian fatalities in the cities in 1957 and held the line on injuries to walkers."

A Special Citation, won by Grosse Pointe Woods, will be presented at a later date.

Traffic Supervision Wins Plaque for Park Police

The Park Police Department's splendid traffic supervision in 1957, was cited by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

In letters to Mayor Kenneth Cunningham and Police Chief Arthur Louwers, received on Thursday, July 3, John D. Holstrom of Berkeley, Calif., president of the Association, congratulated the Park on its outstanding achievement in police traffic supervision last year.

"We can fully appreciate the efforts expended to merit this recognition by the International Association of Chiefs of Police," Holstrom said in his letter to the two Park officials. "Please convey my best wishes to your entire organization."

Farms to Spend \$86,528 For Paving Improvements On Kerby and Kercheval

Also Approves Joining With City to Recap Fisher From Kercheval to Boulevard at Estimated Cost Of \$7,000 Each

The Farms will expend \$86,528 for street improvements, it was brought out at a council meeting on Monday, July 7. Three contracts worth the total expenditure were awarded to low bidders at the meeting.

The biggest cost, \$38,892, is for the single sealing of bituminous prime and stone chips on major city streets and local streets.

In another project, contractors will use approximately 1,935 tons of bituminous concrete to recap Kerby road, between Chalfonte and Ridge, and on Kercheval, between

Fisher and Muir, together with other construction items such as curb repairs and adjusting of drainage structures. This job was awarded in the amount of \$26,579.50.

The widening of Kerby road, from Chalfonte to Ridge, will cost \$21,056.80, including the construction of 18-inch curb and gutter sections on each side of the road. Also the replacement of private driveways and the rebuilding of drainage structures.

Farms City Engineer Murray Smith said that no starting date has yet been decided upon, since the time is up to the contractors who must prepare plans and line up equipment. However, the city official said, the first two projects are scheduled for completion by August 30; the latter, by August 15.

To Seal Off Kerby Mr. Smith said that it will be necessary to seal off Kerby by "blocks, as the work progresses."

At Monday night's meeting, the council authorized City Manager Sidney DeBoer to employ the firm of Mason L. Brown and Son, to prepare plans and specifications for the recapping of Fisher road, between Grosse Pointe boulevard and Kercheval. This project will be a joint venture with the City. The cost of this work is estimated at \$14,495.50, with both communities paying an equal share.

Captain Allen entered the Army in August, 1957. The 27-year-old captain received his bachelor of science degree from Wayne University in 1952 and his doctor of medicine degree from the university's College of Medicine in 1956. He was an intern at Southern Pacific Hospital, San Francisco, Calif., before entering the Army. His wife, Patricia, is with him at Fort Stewart.

Certificates of achievement are given on the basis of 85 to 90 percent performance of evaluations for states, and 80 to 85 percent for cities.

"I should like to extend my heartfelt congratulations and best wishes to you and your Police Department," Holstrom wrote, "for the splendid effort."

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers said that \$30,000 belongs to Mrs. Peter Corrado of 701 Middlesex, and \$20,000 belongs to Mrs. Cavataio.

Park authorities are still seeking a man identified as Joseph Savato, who is implicated in the burglary of the Park home.

Dougherty Again Heads School Bd.

Elections Held at Annual Meeting; Pongracz Named To New V-P's Post

At the annual meeting of the Board of Education, held traditionally the first Monday of July, officers of the board were elected for the coming school year.

Franklin D. Dougherty was elected by his fellow members to serve as the board's president. He had previously served as president. Mrs. Ruth H. Goebel succeeded Chet Sampson as secretary, and former president Bert H. Wicking was made treasurer.

Status Changed For the first time a vice-president of the Board of Education was elected. Prior to this year the Grosse Pointe School District has been considered an agricultural school area but the State legislature recently passed a new law which redesignates Grosse Pointe listing it now as a third-class school district. This enables the board to vote in a vice-president and Edward Pongracz will fill the newly-created position.

Wicking Re-elected The rest of the seven-man board is comprised of James W. Lee, II, Robert F. Weber, and Chet Sampson. Mr. Wicking was re-elected to another four-year term in the June 9 School Board elections. He, in effect, succeeded himself for the position as there was no opposition.

Also in the July 7 meeting, the board voted to change its regular date of meeting from the first Wednesday in every month to the third Monday of each month. The next board meeting will be held Monday, August 18.

City Police Arrest Trio In Village

Young Boys and Girls From Pointe Families Have Been Thieving For Months

A recent rash of shoplifting complaints, primarily from merchants in "The Village" shopping area, has been cracked wide open by the Grosse Pointe City police department and—contrary to common theory, that the thefts were "outside" jobs—the crimes proved to be committed by LOCAL citizenry.

The most shocking fact of the matter is the petty larcenies were all pulled by 12 and 13-year-olds who seem to be associated with one another, forming a miniature-type "gang."

Police Nab Three

Village business concerns have complained for the past couple months that they have suffered from an apparent wave of shoplifting. Only Monday afternoon, July 7, did the police discover that the work—seemingly professional—was that of young teenagers. It was at that time they caught three of the youthful bandits, red-handed, lifting an item from one of the Village stores.

The trio were taken to the City police station and subsequent questioning revealed the names of other teen-age thieves who have become nearly professional in their techniques—(most used was the familiar shopbag-method). City Police Captain Andrew Teetaert, who is conducting the investigation, maintains that all the dozen-odd delinquents are from Grosse Pointe families—many of them prominent in business and social spheres.

Girls Are Involved

The kids—and there are girls as well as boys involved—all admit that their crimes were, thoroughly premeditated. Their loot includes everything from silk stockings, to cosmetics, to clothing garments, to playing records.

The crime wave is reminiscent of another, just a year ago, in Harper Woods, when another group of young people, (which included some Grosse Pointers) went on a shoplifting-spree. As in that case, the delinquents will be turned over to the Juvenile authorities for proper punishment.

In the meantime, Captain Teetaert issues a word of warning to all parents, to keep an extra-watchful eye on their children. He stresses, this current crop has no social or pecuniary boundaries.

'Maid' Loots Farms Home

Farms police are looking for a woman who victimized a Farms family into hiring her as a maid and then absconded with more than \$1,700 in cash, jewels and clothing.

Det. Sgt. Jack Paisley said the family, name withheld, hired the woman on Thursday, July 3, and the "maid" left the following day, taking everything she could get her hands on. A small child left in the woman's charge, was found to be alone when the parents came home after an absence of several hours.

It is believed the wanted woman makes a practice of being hired as a domestic, and then, when the opportunity arises, steals what she can and leaves her employers, Sgt. Paisley said.

Taken from the Farms home was \$50 in cash, a mink stole valued at \$500, a lady's small platinum ring with two pearls in the center of a cluster of small diamonds, worth \$300; a jeweled gold pendant on a gold chain, valued at \$300, and an assortment of clothing, worth a total of \$675.

The woman, who came in answer to an ad in a paper, is described as being colored, five feet, four inches, weight, 115 pounds about 30 or 35 years old, black hair and dark eyes, and was dressed in a white uniform, the last time she was seen.

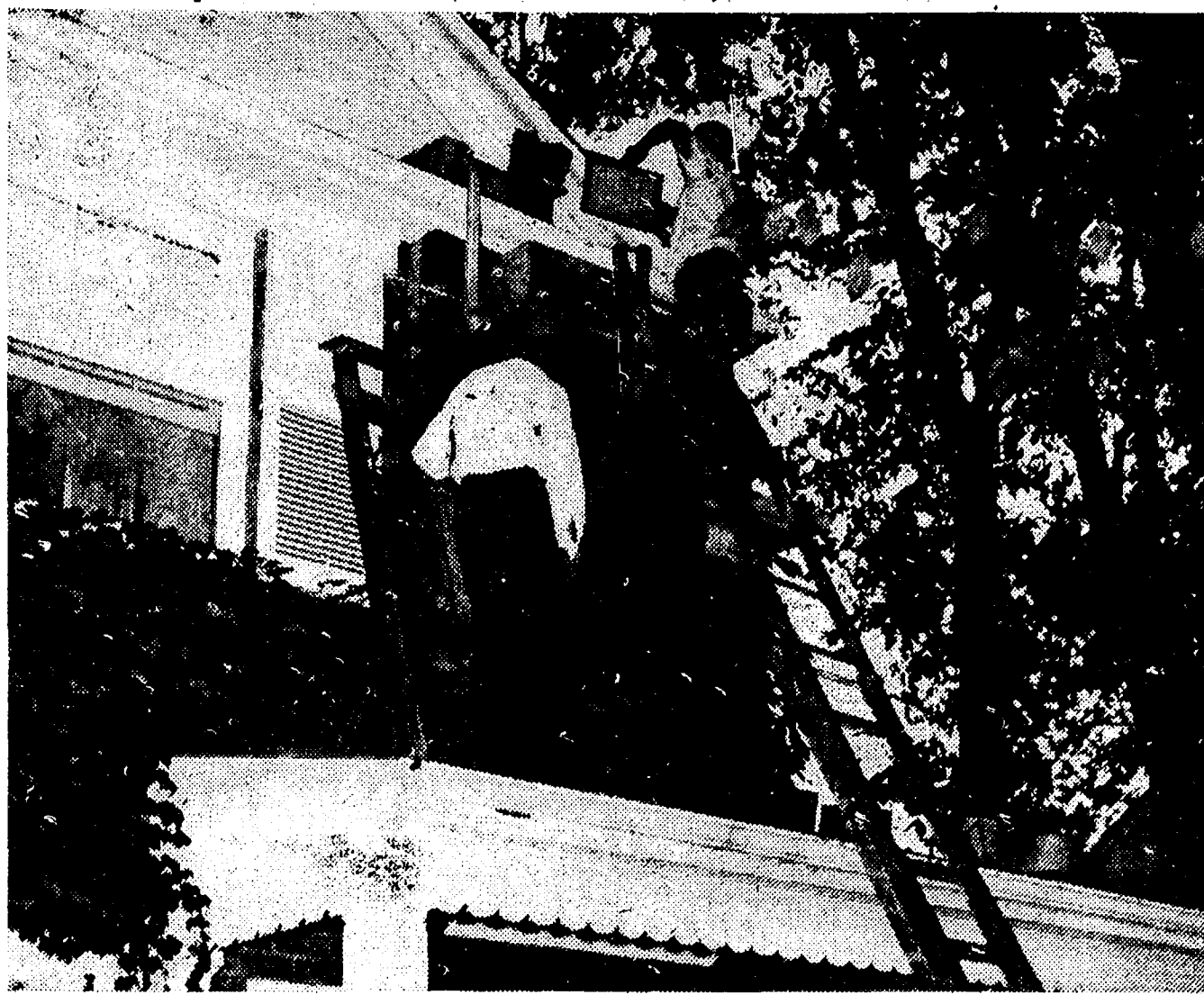
The burglary was reported to Park police by Mrs. Ross, who told the authorities that the family returned home about 10:45 p.m. Sunday, to find their house had been broken into.

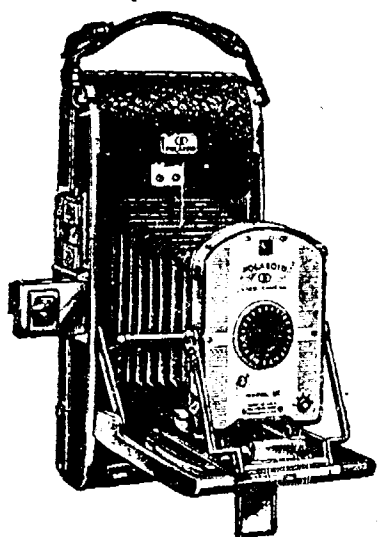
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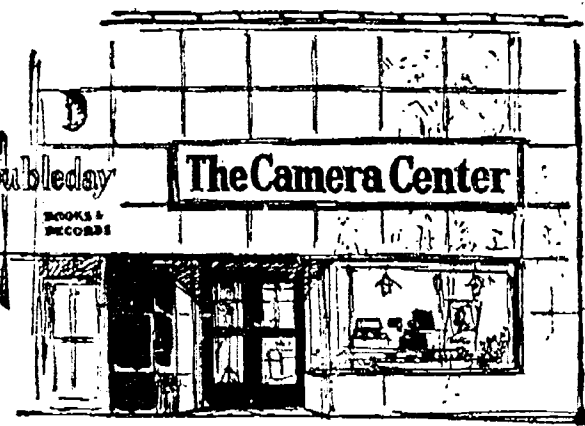
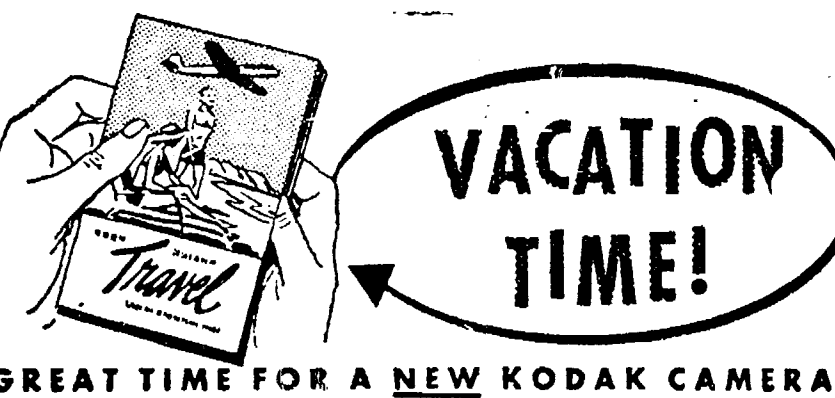


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Acoustical Shell Donated To Auditorium by Fords

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Inc., has announced that Mrs. Edsel B. Ford and other members of the Ford family have made a personal gift to the Symphony of an acoustical shell for the Henry and Edsel Ford Auditorium.

The shell, which will be turned over to the City of Detroit by the Symphony, will bring the auditorium close to acoustical perfection.

Allen G. Barry, president of the Symphony board, said preliminary plans call for construction to be completed by January 1, 1959. Estimated cost of the orchestra enclosure is between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

Ford Auditorium was originally planned as a multipurpose hall with no special acoustical treatment for symphony orchestra performance. Sound problems were pointed up in the fall of 1957 by various music critics.

Mr. Barry, speaking in behalf of John B. Ford, chairman of the Symphony board who is presently out of the city, said, "With the addition of the new shell, the Ford Auditorium will be on a par with the best symphony halls in the country."

One of the nation's top acoustical firms, Bolt, Beranek and Newman, of Cambridge, Mass., has been engaged to design the shell. The firm has served as acoustical advisor on the Tanglewood Shed where the Boston Symphony plays summer concerts, the West Point Auditorium, and the new Frederick Mann Auditorium in Tel Aviv, Israel.

According to preliminary designs, the shell will extend the width of the stage, have a height of 30 to 35 feet, and will weigh approximately 75 tons. Hydraulic operation for

storing the enclosure in the stage loft will provide easy and quick removal to make the auditorium readily available for events other than symphony concerts.

The shell will be built in Detroit under the direct supervision of Crane, Kiehler and Kellogg, the architectural firm that designed the auditorium.

Symphony officials have been working closely with the Civic Center Commission and with the Mayor's office in developing plans for the proposed shell.

Mayor Louis C. Miriani, who officially accepted the gift for the city, said, "The Detroit Symphony Orchestra is such an important part of the life of Detroit that it should make its home in the Ford Auditorium. I am delighted that this splendid gift will make the hall a perfect setting for one of our city's finest institutions. Once again we may all be grateful to the members of the Ford family for their civic responsibility."

University and Jefferson Susceptible to Accidents

The corner of University and Jefferson is a place where accidents and mentalities noted that the cause was no doubt due to the ice and snow. But now, with the pavements dry and no plausible excuse readily available, there appears a new rash of rear-end crack-ups—three alone in the past week. One happy note, in the midst of all the bumps and bruises—no one was ticketed and all the accidents were minor ones.

office where a bottle of ink had been tossed against a wall, spilling on furniture and on the asphalt floor tile. A phone in the office was damaged.

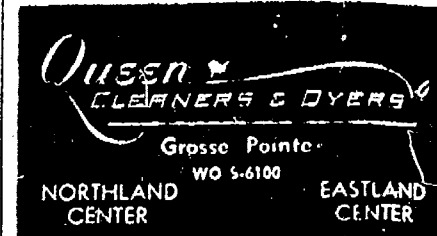
A chrome hook was found missing from the swimming pool, and the skylight latch was broken. Police found bicycle tracks in the school gym.

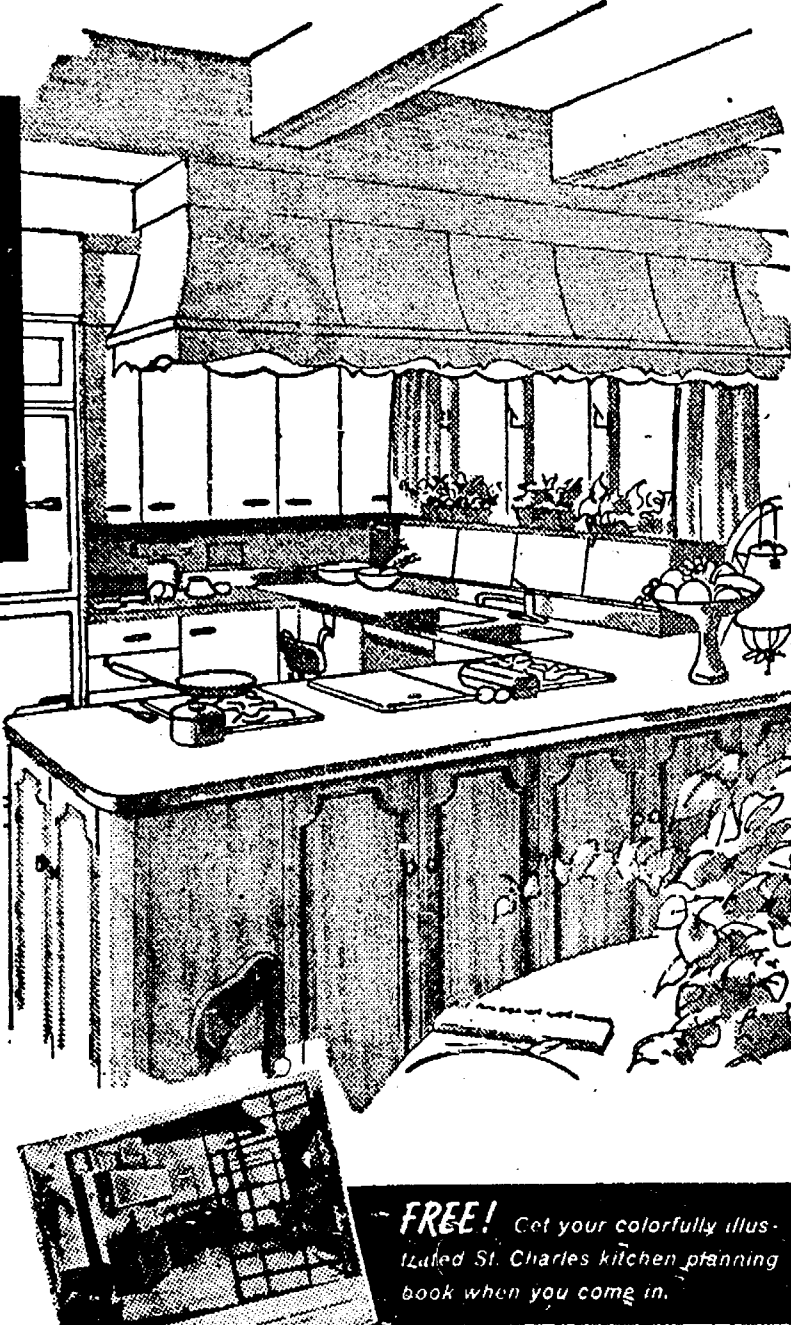

Ford Executive Drowns Following Fall from Boat

The U.S. Coast Guard recovered the body of F. Jordan Schanbeck, 43, of 878 Hampton road, near the Miller Marina in St. Clair Shores on Friday, July 4.

Jordan, a Ford executive, was drowned in Lake St. Clair on Wednesday, July 2, when he fell from the deck of a 42-foot cabin cruiser, owned by a friend, Thomas J. Burke, 36, of 514 Hollywood.

Jordan's brother Edward, 35, of 22805 Gary lane, St. Clair Shores, nearly lost his life trying to rescue the drowning man. Edward was taken to Bon Secours Hospital by St. Clair

Shores police, suffering from exhaustion and shock.

The two Schanbecks, Burke and Jordan's 10-year-old son, Jordan, Jr., were on a cruise to escape the heat. The accident happened a mile out in the lake, opposite Masonic boulevard in St. Clair Shores.

Authorities said that Jordan crawled along a 'lower railing on the port side of the bow of the boat, to throw out the anchor. He lost his balance and fell into the water.

Edward leaped overboard when he heard his brother's cry for help. He got hold of him, but could not hang on.

When Jordan sank Edward blindly fought the choppy waters in his persistent effort to save his brother.

Burke pulled Edward aboard when Edward's rescue efforts proved futile.

The three men and the boy left the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club, where the cruiser is berthed, about 45 minutes before the accident. Police said Jordan could not swim.

Mr. Schanbeck was a native of Detroit and a Grosse Pointe High School graduate. He joined Ford in 1936, and in 1946 was made superintendent of transportation.

In 1955, he became manager of marine services for the company. He was active in local marine affairs; was a member of the Propeller Club and chairman of the annual tug boat race committee.

Besides his son, Jordan, Jr., he is survived by his wife, Ethel; and two other sons, John and Jerome; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schanbeck; brother, Edward; and a sister, Mrs. Eli J. Igna.

Funeral services were held on Monday, July 7. Burial was in Woodlawn cemetery.

Spreading out from the lakeshore in the hundred years since the founding Detroit families arrived here, the Pointe has steadily grown, but old timers remember that it was from "the gold coast" or the avenue that it all began.

By the early 1900's the residents living beyond Seven Mile road felt the need of their own city government. By 1911 interested city fathers such as George Osius, H. M. Jewett, B. S. Warren, W. E. Roney and Abner E. Larned were meeting in each others homes trying to devise a charter.

A few of the residents took a dim view of this exclusive action but the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores was duly incorporated April 3, 1911 by a vote of 39, to 15 which gives some indication of the population.

Mr. Osius was named president under the charter which had been approved by Governor Osburn. Right away there was agitation for a municipal building. The council was meeting in an old roadhouse at the foot of Vernier road.

Lakefront property was voted for \$8,000 and the purchase submitted to the voters who turned it down. Rumor has it that unfavorable reports had been circulated about the purchased site and the founding fathers were incensed.

An anonymous friend of the new Village came to the rescue. His name is clouded in mystery but he didn't live near the new community. He offered to assume the individual liabilities of the trustees and turn the property over to the Village at cost when the voters were ready to accept it.

The first job of the new Village was to lay eight-inch water mains to replace the hand pumps and wind mills. Fire hydrants came next. The Wayne County Road Commission was prevailed upon to pave an 18 foot pavement on Lakeshore and electric lighting was on the avenue by 1912. The first street lighting produced quite a celebration with songs and skits by the school children, speeches by prominent citizens and what are reported as "general amusements."

Young girls of the Shores Village banded together in "The Good Cheer" Club and presented their municipal grounds with a public drinking fountain.

Two patrolmen made up that early police force and a small cart and hose, was the fire department (the Farms promised an assist with its equipment and so did Detroit).

The years from 1914 to 1916 were the big ones in municipal growth. The building offered all types of services, chief among which was a motion picture showing weekly.

But most important, all the Council was determined to preserve the exclusive atmosphere of the Shores and a zoning ordinance was adopted (still in force). The Shores, with its rows of diminishing palaces, was the first Village in Michigan to adopt residential zoning laws, "those protective and beneficial measures."

An imposing statue of Our Lady of the Saguenay stands atop the rocky cliff, higher than the Empire State and Penobscot buildings combined. Each tour features two nights at the famed Chateau Frontenac, castlelike hotel in the quaint city of Quebec, and sightseeing to

Montmorency Falls and the Shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre follow from that point.

The Rev. Andrew F. Rauth is one pastor who likes to preach. Pastoral visitation, counseling, administrative church duties, he enjoys all these aspects of his job as minister of the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, but giving the weekly sermon is his chief pride.

Mr. Rauth has been head pastor at this growing Woods church for 15 years. He came here from Dansville, N. Y., to lead his flock when there was no building and worshippers met in Mason School. Since May, 1948, there have been five additions to the church in the trees off Mack avenue. And the end is not in sight. The present membership of 1,664 will soon need more room and a recreation hall is in the planning stage.

His Fourth Parish

The experienced and serious Mr. Rauth boasts that he's an Indiana Hoosier who married a minister's daughter. He held three pastorships before coming to the Pointe. On graduating from McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago he studied at Rochester University, winning his master's degree in philosophy while preaching. He shepherded in Lodi, Wis., Rochester and Dansville before accepting the call here.

With his wide knowledge of people in many aspects of life Mr. Rauth has found that in general ministries share much in common. He likes to share his parishioners' joys and sorrows and help them in living. His young suburban congregation has some particular problems, brought on by the tensions induced in Detroit's

highly industrial, competitive society. Most of his flock are young couples on their way up life's ladder and need help in keeping their faith strong and vibrant.

Today They Need the Church

In the 1920's when he graduated from the Seminary it seemed that life stretched out in peace and prosperity. There have been two wars and a depression. More people need their faith and their church today in a world which brings many problems to disturb them.

Mr. Rauth is fearful of the great church revival for he is afraid that people are satisfied too cheaply. He wants his parishioners to have a sane and searching faith, not an emotional, shallow experience.

His words of praise include his laymen who take such responsibility in his Presbyterian Church. Humbly, too, he voices gratitude for his wife, who has aided him with many church problems.

Mr. Rauth is gregarious, a Mason, and Rotarian. He cherishes the L-shaped desk in his book-lined study, a gift from grateful fellow Rotarians, and an heirloom revolving book case, once in an old minister's study in New York.

Traveled to Oxford

He is interested in the World Council of Churches and hails as a milestone his trip to Oxford in 1937 as a delegate to this conference.

A great reader, Mr. Rauth derives much from the writings of Reinhold Niebuhr and Harry Emerson Fosdick, great Protestant preachers.

Another inspiration to this former Indiana boy is Lincoln. He has made quite a study of the Civil War president's spiritual beliefs. Another hobby of his is collecting autographs.

The Rauths, who have a married daughter, Mrs. Arthur D. Rohl, and two grandchildren in Chicago, and a son, Mike, just graduated from Brown University, are about

to take off on their annual vacation. Perhaps New England will be the spot this summer.

Two Assistants

While he's away the congregation will be in the able hands of his two assistants, the Rev. Charles Kennedy and the Rev. Victor G. Novander, Jr. During the year Mr. Rauth happily assumes the chief burden of the preaching and leaves the bulk of the pastoral visiting and direction of the Sunday School to his assistants.

The Sunday School shows the youth of the parish. There are 1285 enrolled and the parent Church, Grosse Pointe Memorial, has about the same with a membership twice the size of the Woods Church it founded.

Mr. Rauth enjoys the respect and confidence of his parishioners to whom his door is always open. His calm, warm manner hides a wealth of experience in dealing with problems, both spiritual and practical. He is proud of his Church and feels a real kinship with this, his fourth parish, which
