Thursday, October 9

PIUS XII, for 19 troubled years the "Pope of Peace." died early Thursday in the papal summer castle alongside Lake Albano, at the age of 82. Death occurred at 9:52 p.m. Wednesday, Detroit time following a second stroke in his three-day illness, which he was unable to survive.

The death of the Pope signaled the beginning of a nineday period of mourning for Roman Catholics. His body will be borne back to Vatican City, a distance of 18 miles, for the funeral rites.

The new Pope will be designated by the College of Cardinals in an election expected to be held at the Vatican within the next two or three weeks.

Friday, October 10

AN AIR FORCE C-123 plane crashed into a sagebrush field on a ranch about 10 miles east of the Southwest Idaho town of Payette, Thursday night State Police reported no survivors among the 19 aboard.

The plane burned after hitting the ground but all 19 bodies were reported to have been recovered. One witness reported that the twin-engined plane appeared to run into a flock of geese—and this was had seen the crash.

Sunday, October 12

THE MOON ROCKET, Pioneer, streaked through space Saturday, alive with instruments, on a course that will lead wide of its target but will return rich dividends in cosmic data.

The 85-pound space craft launched at 3:42 a.m. Saturday, from Cape Canaveral Fla., was the first in history aimed for a lunar orbit. According to the Air Force, it is "the first man-made object known to escape the earth's gravitation field."

Monday, October 13

AMERICA'S SHOOT - FORthe-moon missile plummeted back toward earth and almost certain destruction Sunday after a record-shattering 79,-212-mile surge into space.

The Air Force expected the missile, named Pioneer, to reenter Earth's atmosphere about midnight Sunday(Detroit time) and burn up in the vicinity of the Indian Ocean.

Scientists also announced that the rocket was sending back valuable data which proved encouraging to future space travelers. They said there were indications that the band of radiation circling the Earth diminishes as the Earth is left behind.

Population Now 15,800

The report disclosed that the present population of the Park is 15,800, or 6,100 household units, of which 2,800 units do not have grinders, therefore, collections for those who do not have grinders, is done at a cost of \$9.72 a year for each unit requiring this service. Four men and one piece of equipment are required.

Installation of a grinder in an average Park home will cost an estimated \$130, with another \$15 added if the grinder is put in an old type sink, since the drain hole must be enlarged.

It is estimated that the average life of a grinder is 10 years, and that the annual cost to each householder will be slightly more than \$24, the city manager stated in his report. The figures are based on a canvass of local plumbers and the average cost of plumb-

ing installations. City Is Fortunate

Mr. Slone said that the city is fortunate in having a combined sewer system which is more adaptable to the acceptance of garbage, and that most of these sewers are of adequate size.

At a regular meeting of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education on Monday, Oct. ed specifying that a school election would be held December 2. The issue to be voted upon will be the request of the board for a continuation of its authority to levy nine mills with which to operate the school system.

Superintendent James W. Bushong addressed the Board of Education, reviewed the matter thoroughly, and recommended that they act promptly to put the matter before the voters in order that planning for succeeding school years could be carried on efficiently

After an intermission, she will play Sonate I by Paul Hindemith and several works by the contemporary French composers, Langlais,

Its low wind pressure, functional pipe scalings, and sensitive voicing of the registers all produce a sound which is clear, bright, and almost liquid

Five Divisions

The new organ consists of five complete divisions: Great, Swell, Positiv, Gallery, and Pedal. The Great Organ is the main division. It contains the foundational tones upon which the other divisions are built. The Swell, being enclosed, may be changed dynamically by the manipulation of shutters which are part of the enclosure of this division. The Positiv Organ adds brilliance to the total ensemble Swell, Positiv, Gallery, and Pedal. The Great Organ is the

The Gallery Organ is a separate organ but may be used with the Chancel Organ to help congregational singing or for special antiphonal effects.
The Pedal Organ serves as the bass for the instrument but still contains many stops of brilliance and high registers.





To own or carry a gun legally, a person must be 21 years of age, and a citizen of the United States.

Since children are attracted to guns, the following safety tips are advised: Insert and close an ordinary lock in the swing-out cylinder of a revolver, thereby making it ineffective for action. In the case of automatics, remove and hide the loaded clips. This

may save your child's life. Legal disposal of a gun requires that the firearm be turned over to the Commissioner of State Police, through the local police departments.

Rifles and shotguns are not required to be registered, but it is important that a record of the serial numbers of these weapons be kept.

City of Grosse Pointe Woods lure the unanalytical mind, we never saw one. The average taxpayer who reads this is left with the impression that the tax is going to cost him \$45 per year for each \$10,000 of assessed valuation. But this figure is not reached until the year 1983, when many of the present taxpayers will be long dead.

The figures with which the taxpayers are immediately concerned are the 6.75 mills which are effective this December, or \$67.50 per \$10,000 valuation, rather

This means that practically every mortgage payment, (most banks collect taxes and insurance money in escrow), will be increased by approximately \$5.50 per month for every \$10,000.

It always seemed to us that it is better to hit someone with bad news as quickly as possible and get it over with. It certainly isn't conducive to good relationships to attempt to fool the victim with a twisted interpretation of the facts. If many of the taxpayers squawk when their bills come in, the Woods council will have a lot more explaining to do than would have been necessary if they had left this subterfuge out of their explanation of the costs of the project.

Hunters, Take Warning

With many Pointe hunters owning dogs, an announcement by the Southeastern Michigan Veterinary Medical Association doubtless has unusual local interest.

The veterinarians have pointed out that at the present time there is an outbreak of rabies in wild animals in three counties of the Eastern Upper Peninsula. Public health officials find the disease spreading westward and fear it will spread to the Lower Peninsula.

This wild life rabies reservoir is a potential danger to any unprotected dogs taken into that area. There have been cases of house cats getting the disease after tangling with skunks and other small animals infected.

It is suggested that with bird hunting season at hand, hunters taking their dogs into the area be certain their animals are immunized against the disease. If many unprotected dogs were taken into the area they could be responsible for spreading the disease into the Lower Peninsula.

The Caine Mutiny by Herman Wouk, published in 1951 was another. For over two years the latter was on best-seller lists constantly, and in 1952 was awarded the Pulitzer Prize. It was a Literary Guild alternate selection, a Book-of-the-Month dividend, a selection of the Reader's Digest Book Club, and was serialized in thirty-nine newspapers. Yes, everybody read The Caine Mutiny.

Then a year after its publication, the author, with some cushion for the reader's emoprodding from Charles Laughton and Paul Gregory, wrote the powerful and equally successful play, Caine Mutiny Court Martiai.

As with novels, so with plays. Every decade, countless plays are viewed, many of which provide entertainment for the nonce, but drop into limbo shortly after. A few remain in our memory years later. It is some time since we saw Caine Mutiny Court Martial, but it is still etched indelibly in our mind. Perhaps that is the acid test of a good play. It is remembered and yet it can be seen with interest a second time.

Few suburbs in the nation can claim the distinction which Grosse Pointe has, a rare hamlet which grew up under three flags, French, British and American.

One of the Pointe's most frequent, though often unwelcome visitors in the 1760's, was the wily Indian chief. Pontiac, whose fame spread to European courts.

Pontiac allied himself with the French settlers and after the French and Indian war when English garrisons were thrown into the Great Lake forts he determined to capture them.

French Pioneers, descendants of the early woodsmen, who came with Cadillac, were already settle'd on the shores of Lake St. Clair, where our lovely lakeshore road winds today. Pontiac treated his French allies with consideration. At the time of his planned attack on Detroit he would bring from 600 to 3,000 Indians to camp near the ribbon farms along the lake.

In the summer of 1763 he moved in a huge force of Hurons, Ottawas and Pottawattomies, seeking refuge in the Pointe after a massacre of the Fisher family on Hog Island (Belle Isle). During the week before his ambush of the British garrison the lake road was crowded with painted savages, their feathered war bonnets waving, their tomahawks, guns and knives ready for action.

Pontiac's plan to Major Gladwyn, the British officer in charge of the fort at Detroit, and the Indian chief set up a state of seige. A relief party under the command of Capt. Dalzell, aide de camp to Gen. Amherst, was sent to Junior High School and 2,000 to Brownell for the clinic the fort's rescue, to surprise Pontiac in his camp on Parent's Creek, (the only remains of this stream are in the Mt. Elliott Cemetery). The Indians, (probably from a French settler), knew of the attack and lay in ambush behind the French log cabins as the troops marched, flags flying, band playing up the avenue. Col. Henry Bouquet subsequently led an expedition into Ohio which quelled Pontiac's allies and the great Ottawa chief sued for peace in August, 1765. He was killed in Cahokia, Ill. four years later by an Illinois Indian said to have been bribed by an English trader.

When excavation was begun on the Grosse Pointe High School many arrow heads, and other Indian relics, to 8:30 o'clock at the Parcells over bowling, horseback riding were discovered, supposedly abandoned after the fight Junior High School. at Bloody Run.

As late as 1926 Indian relics were unearthed in the Pointe. Out on Gaulker Point, where the Edsel Fords built their estate, a silver bracelet and other remnants of a chief's regalia were discovered.

Pontiac was the greatest of the Indian chiefs to figure in Pointe history, but Tecumseh was entertained by the English Commodore Grant in his castle here before fighting the Americans and as late as the War of 1812 painted savages would spring from the wilderness to attack the British and American pioneers beginning to farm in this section.




