HOUSE REPUBLICANS junked a county home-rule bill Wednesday, in spite of a last minute appeal by Gov. Romney. House Speaker Allison Green said the GOP caucas agreed that the bill needed another year of study. The proposal which was approved by the Senate last month would have enabled Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb Counties to establish charter governments.

PRESIDENT JOHNSON denied any conflict of interest in his family's ownership of vast television properties in Texas. It is held in trust now wit the Johnsons receiving the income but eventually the property will revert to its original status.

THE STRIKE by doctors in Belgium ended today after 18 days of dispute between the government and the strikers over a controversiay socialized medicine law. The doctors agreed to resume house calls today and open their offices later in the day. The government pledged to withdraw an army reserve. However, no understanding was reached concerning the new legislation.

What Goes On at **Your Library**

we note that exactly 400 years ago today, April 23, 1964, William Shakespeare was born. It is a long time ago, April, 1564 -the scene, Stratford-on-Avon. Young William, son of a substantial burgher and glovemaker-who would have guessed his illustrious lot four centuries later?

Even when he reached London and the theater as a young man. no one would have predicted his genius. There he PEARE: A BIOGRAPHICAL met with stiff competition men with a university education and ready wit had already PEARE, WITH AN ANTHOLinvaded the Elizabethan stage and were pouring out their knowledge of Renaissance learning. His contemporaries were such men as Kyd, Lyly and Peele. Also, he was a late starter at the playwriting pro-30. what with poverty, plague and violence ready to combat longevity.

So why is it that Shakesothers were also trying, were talented? For sheer genius there are no ready answers. dition to giving us the basic Was it imagery? Was it his understanding of human nature, his capacity to love his fellow man, his dramatic skill both in comedy and tragedy, his knowledge of the Elizabethan play house? Was he just lucky?

Many writers have speculated; no one has come up with all the answers. In Shakespeare, as in Balzac, we have the "comedie humaine"-a cross section of humanity; we have such pertinent questions as anti-Semitism (in THE MERCHANT OF VENICE)—the race issue (in OTHELLO). Shakespeare's problems and types portrayed are timeless and know the boundaries of no country; he shows us humanity, and a date is not needed.

And so the world is prepared to celebrate this quatercentenary of the birth of William Shakespeare. In Great Britain it will be known as Shakespeare Year, and may be your chief reason for visiting Europe in 1964. Theaters literally everywhere will be performing plays of the Bard. Articles will be written, tours will be taken, the three Stratfords will gain added importance, and more and more books will be written about this famous Englishman.

And speaking of books (in a Library Column we do whenever we can!) it might interest you to see just how many recent volumes we have on Shakespeare. Two very recent biographies are SHAKES-PEARE by P. C. Quennell and WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE by A. L. Rowse. The first, in addition to being a biography, is an analysis of Shakespeare's torical works on the Elizabethan | for all time.'

THE WORLDS OF SHAKES-PEARE by M. G.
