A CUT IN RATES that will save telephone users \$9.7 milhon was announced by Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Wednesday. About 500,000 monthly subscribers will benefit from monthly rate changes - mostly from 15 to 30 cents each. However, the change did not affect one million one-party residences. The result of negotiations with State utility company regulators, most of the 10 revisions will go into effect September 1. William L. Day, Bell's Detroit president, speculated that increased usage will set off higher costs.

Friday, July 23

A BILL AUTHORIZING \$1.9 billion for the fiscal year just begun, aimed to expand the war on poverty, was passed in the House Thursday by a vote of 245 to 158. This raises the administration's request by onefourth. The bill extends the anti-poverty work for two years, though it allows for no funds for the second year. The matter will thus have to be reviewed at the end of the year by the Education and Labor Committee If passed by the Senate as is, the bill will also reduce the veto power of governors over some programs.

Bids will be received and one will be immediately accepted, for the removal of the additional 20 trees, provided the cost is not higher than the \$85 per tree accepted at Monday night's meeting.

These trees include a few old, dead trees being removed, but the majority are those which

In May 1963, a public hearing was held in the City council chambers, on the hospital's petition for a permit for expanding its present facilities, and in November 1963, the matter was submitted to the voters for an advisory vote.

A majority of the ballots cast were not in favor of the expansion, and the council denied the hospital's petition on November 18, 1963.

Bon Secours Hospital officials decided to take the matter to court, and asked the court to declare the zoning law amendment unconstitutional.

Amendment to City Manager **Ordinance**

Ordinance No. 163

AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 4(a) and Sections 4(c) of the City Manager Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms being: An Ordinance Creating the Office of City Manager in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms and Providing for his Power and Duties and to Repeal Ordinance

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS OR-DAINS:

Section 1. Sections 4(a) and 4(c) of the City Manager Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 115 enacted May 2, 1955, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4(a) Appoint and suspend or remove all employees of the city except administrative officers, and except as he may authorize the head of a department or office to appoint, suspend, or remove subordinates in such department or office. He shal! have the power subject to confirmation by the council to appoint all administrative officers of the city and shall have the power to discharge such administrative officers without confirmation by the council. All such appointments, suspensions, or removals shall be based upon merit and upon the qualifications or disqualifications of such officer, or employee.

Section 4(c) Purchase all materials, supplies, or

equipment, for which funds are provided in the budget, but he may not purchase any item which exceeds any budget appropriation until the council has increased the appropriation; provided that for purchases of more than \$1,000.00 the manager shall be required to receive sealed bids and shall present such bids to the council for approval or rejection. He may let contracts not in excess of \$1,000.00 necessary in the operation or maintenance of city services when sufficient funds for such purposes have been appropriated in the budget, but the city council shall let all contracts for more than \$1.000.00, all contracts for new construction and all contracts which cannot be consummated with funds provided in the current budget. The manager shall advise the council as to whether or not any contract offered is desirable, or which of several contracts offered is most desirable for the city. The manager may issue such rules and regulations governing requisitions and the transaction of the business of purchasing between himself as purchasing agent and the heads of the departments, officers, and employees of the city as the governing body may approve. He shall be required to:

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect. Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective 20 days after enactment or upon publication, whichever time is
