**Thursday, November 25**  
**PONTIAC OSTEOPATHIC** hospital authorities Wednesday blamed a staff doctor for pouring ether into an anesthetic bottle, creating the mixture that killed two children and a 24-year-old mother of two. Harry Whitlow, hospital administrator, refused to name the doctor. He said the hospital has completed its investigation and any further action will have to come from the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office. According to Whitlow, pouring ether into a bottle is strictly against hospital regulations. Oakland County Prosecutor Jerome Bronson said Wednesday that his investigation is still continuing.

**VIETNAM ACTION** took the lives of 240 American servicemen last week, a U.S. military spokesman disclosed Wednesday. The death toll was the highest for any week of the war and topped the weekly average for the Korean War. The number of dead almost reached the total for the first four years of American fighting in Vietnam. South Vietnamese forces are still carrying the burden of fighting, however. They lost 357 killed and 807 wounded last week, more than double their casualties of the week before.

**Friday, November 26**  
**HAROLD WILSON** announced his foreign Secretary, Michael Stewart, will fly to Moscow Monday in an effort to persuade the Soviets to join Britain in reviving the 1954 Geneva Conference on Indochina as a forum for Viet Nam peace talks. Wilson said he was preparing new talks on Viet Nam to try to avoid a "major land war in Asia, or worse." Wilson made clear in his statement to the House of Commons that he feels it is North Vietnamese Communists and not the Americans who are blocking peace efforts. British sources said the Wilson government also plans to probe Soviet terms for a world pact to stop the spread of nuclear arms. The Prime Minister will bare his findings when he meets with President Johnson December 17 to discuss Viet Nam and other key issues.

**ARMY CHIEF** Gen. Joseph Mobutu overthrew the government of President Joseph Kasavubu Thursday and seized near-dictatorial powers over the turbulent Congo. Many Congolese danced in the streets with joy at the bloodless coup. Mobutu announced that "the race for the top is finished," referring to the power struggle that began when the nation won independence from Belgium in 1960. He stated he will rule as president for five years, later told parliament that he had suspended parts of the constitution and declared a state of emergency for five years. Kasavubu's whereabouts were unknown, but Mobutu said he would be provided with security guards if he feared for his life.

**Saturday, November 27**  
**MAYOR CAVANAGH** Friday slated a "national significant conference on crime in Detroit for January, and formed a committee of lawyers to pass on the constitutionality of his proposed "stop and frisk" law. Cavanagh said he will abide by the committee's decision. He requested guidance in preparing the conference program from Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the Johnson Administration's liaison executive with cities, and asked U. S. Attorney General Nicholas Katzenbach to give the main address. Topics to be dealt with include juvenile delinquency, use of technological advances to stop crime, and social and economic causes of crime.

**FRANCE ORBITED** its first space satellite Friday. A rocket launching from the Algerian desert at 2:47 p.m. Detroit time put France into the space age along with the United States and Russia. The Diamond rocket used to lift the 83.7 pound capsule was constructed by French scientists to carry newly-developed atomic and hydrogen bombs. Britain has developed atomic and hydrogen bombs but

## Youth Dies in Park Traffic; Is Second Pointe Fatality In 1965; Runs Into Truck

John Thompson, 20, Formerly of Park, Crashes Head-On With Large Moving Van Friday Evening

John J. Thompson, 20, of 19389 Beaconsfield, Harper Woods, became the first to die in Park traffic in 1965, and the second in the Pointe, on Friday, November 26, when his car crashed head-on with a large moving van, which was dead on arrival at Bon Secours Hospital.

Park police said that Thompson was driving a 1965 Corvair convertible west on Mack avenue, and about 80 feet east of Three Mile, went over the center line and headed directly toward the van, a semi-trailer driven by Claude Edmondson, 44, of 3402 Joy road, who was headed east on the avenue. The time was 6:30 p.m.

According to Edmondson, and his brother, Evans, same address, who was in the van cab, and two other witnesses, Thompson appeared to have frozen at the wheel, and his car seemed to gather speed as it approached the huge semi-trailer.

## No Moving Traffic

The van driver told police that there was no moving traffic, but because of the hugeness of the truck, he could not maneuver out of the way and was forced to stop in the east-bound lane. He was completely stopped when the youth's car crashed head-on with the van, Edmondson said.

Edmondson said that he was traveling at a slow speed, looking for a street in the area to which he was taking the semi-trailer, to get to a house where residents had contracted for a moving job, when Thompson crashed into the truck.

Paul Brusseau of 19460 Hilton, Southfield, was parking his truck on the Detroit side of Mack, and witnessed the full incident. He told police that Thompson appeared to be driving about 50 miles or more before the impact.

## Pedestrian Saw Crash

Timothy P. Gormel of 3628 Courville, Detroit, a pedestrian, said he saw the accident, and it appeared that the youth was going approximately the speed disclosed by Brusseau.

The force of the impact smashed the engine of Thompson's car up against the front seat. The steering wheel crushed the youth's chest, police said. He was alive when taken out of his car and rushed to the hospital by Park police ambulance, but died en route.

After Edmondson, his brother, and the two other witnesses made statements to Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor John Mazer and to police, Edmondson was exonerated of blame and released.

Had Thompson in Park

Young Livingston formerly lived in the Park. The Thompson family resided at 1432 Bedford, and moved to Harper Woods six months ago.

Grosse Pointe Lions Club Will Be Given Assistance By Policemen and Firemen of The Park, City, Farms and Shores

The Grosse Pointe Lions Club Goodfellows have again set a goal of \$7,500, same as last year, and hope to raise this sum during its 36th annual newspaper sale on Monday, December 13.

The entire proceeds realized by the organization to help the Pointe needy at Christmas time, and to carry on its welfare program for numerous agencies.

This policy was adopted to prevent another traffic fatality such as occurred at 6:20 a.m. on December 14, 1964, when Walter Zentgrebe, 75, of 829 Westchester, a retired Park fireman, was killed at the intersection of Jefferson and Bedford. The driver of the death car was exonerated of any blame.

## Burglars Fail to Crack Safe in GP Post Office

Burglars made an unsuccessful attempt to force open a safe in the Pointe branch of the United States Post Office, 18640 Mack avenue, during the dark hours of Saturday morning, November 27.

Farms Det. Sgt. George Van Tiem, who is assigned to work with postal inspectors in the case, said the breaking and entering of the government building was discovered by Barlo Parisi, 45, of 5772 Woodhall, Detroit, building custodian, when he arrived for work early Saturday.

The burglars, possibly two or three, were unable to open the safe, the sergeant said, and nothing appeared to have been taken from the vault area. However, one or more of the thieves did break open a coke machine and a cigaret machine, taking

## Woods Police Arrest Teen Beer Thieves

Apprehend 10 Youths Responsible For More Than 40 Garage Breakins Since April 1964

Teen teenagers, who held drinking sprees after stealing beer from garages in the Woods area, were arrested by Woods police on Wednesday, November 24.

Woods Det. Sgt. Jack Mast said that the arrest of the 10 boys, cleared more than 40 breakings and entries into garages in the Woods, Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores. Fourteen of the breakings were reported by Woods residents, since April 1964, the detective said.

He said that the youths have confessed to many more than the 40 recorded complaints in the three communities, but they do not recall where or when they broke into the garages. Many property owners have made no complaints of breakins and stolen beer at some of the places the boys admitted entering, the sergeant added.

Firemen Praised

Credit for the arrest of the boys is given to Woods Patrolmen Robert Setchell and Robert Lorenz, who received a radio run to check the area of South Brys and Rivers road, and to be on the lookout for several teenagers reported to be stealing beer from garages.

An unknown caller to the Woods station, was unable to give police a description of the boys involved, or the cars the boys were riding in, according to Mast.

Setchell and Lorenz observed two cars parked at Rivers road and South Brys, and saw two boys running from between houses in South Brys. The boys dropped two full bottles of beer to the pavement, smashing them, when they noticed the police officers.

The policemen approached the car moving near the intersection with a stop. They then apprehended the boys who dropped the bottles.

Second Car Spotted

While questioning the youths, the officers saw another car with five boys going east on Brys, and the first Setchell detained the five, Lorenz took after the second group and stopped them in front of number 935.

All 10 boys were taken to Mast.

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## Seek Permit To Construct Apartment

Brandts Want Ordinance Voided So They Can Build 16-Family Terrace In St. Clair

A legal suit to void a Grosse Pointe City zoning ordinance and allow construction of a 16-family terrace-type apartment on their property has been brought against the City by August F. and Catherine Brandt, of 363 St. Clair.

The complaint was filed November 22 in Wayne County Circuit Court. It states that Brandt wants to tear down two houses now located on his property and construct a "modern, multiple apartment residential dwelling" on the adjoining lots. The City has 20 days to reply to the summons.

The property, located on St. Clair just south of the Board of Education buildings, is now zoned for one and two-family residences by an ordinance approved in 1927. Brandt owns two lots, which hold a three-family and a two-family flat.

Pre-Dates Ordinance

The three-family home is exempt from the ordinance because it pre-dates it. Any new structure, however, must conform to the code.

In August, 1965, Brandt petitioned the City Council to rezone his land to permit its use for erection of a multiple residential building. A survey undertaken at that time by an urban planning firm, at the request of City Manager John M. Cantwell, found that low-density multiple dwellings would be desirable on the property. Despite these findings, the City Council, sitting as a Zoning Board of Appeals, denied Brandt's petition and refused to grant any public hearing on rezoning the property.

City Exceptions

Brandt has accused the City of spot zoning and said officials have allowed exceptions to the code based on special advantage. He charged the code was arbitrarily administered when Bon Secours Hospital and the Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church were given permission to build in conflict with previous zoning regulations. Brandt also noted that there is one multiple unit residence in the same block as his property and two other lots so zoned, as well as many other multiple residences on Cadieux, Notre Dame, St. Clair and other surrounding streets.

City Manager John Cantwell said the City will reply to the summons through regular channels.

## Mrs. Dodge Buys Late Son's Home

Mrs. Anna Thompson Dodge, 97, has bought the 28-room East Jefferson avenue home and grounds that she gave to her son, the late Horace E. Dodge, Jr., as a gift in 1923. Horace's famed yacht Delphine was included in a \$600,300 package purchase signed by Attorney Douglas Leo Paterson, executor of the Dodge estate, and attorneys for Mrs. Dodge.

Dodge died Dec. 22, 1963, in Jennings Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Dodge of 12 Lake Shore road, will pay \$325,000 for the home, known as "Gray House," at 17840 East Jefferson. In addition, she has agreed to pay \$200,000 for the Delphine, once valued at \$2,250,000; \$64,000 for her son's stock in the Horace E. Dodge Boat and Plane Corp., and \$11,300 for the Horace E. Dodge Memorial Trophy, 1926 Dodge touring car, a 1920 Dodge, a Dodge run-about boat and a yacht tender.

The Delphine yacht, a 257-foot, 1,255-ton vessel, is the biggest steam yacht in the country and one of the biggest yachts in the world. It carried a crew of 48 and has facilities for 18 passengers. Mrs. Dodge, who had a lifetime lease on the ship, said she wanted to buy it "for sentimental reasons."

### Contractor Repays Woman For Uncompleted Contract

A charge of larceny by conversion, made against Clarence Hucul, who has two addresses listed as his place of residence, was dismissed on Wednesday, November 24, by Woods Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow, when Hucul agreed to make restitution to the woman he was accused of bilking.

Hucul agreed to repay Mrs. Stella Woodhouse of 2120 Vernier road, a down payment of \$600 the woman gave him for contracting work on two houses owned by her, and which he did not do. However Hucul did not escape punishment; Judge Goodrow assessed the man court costs of \$50.

According to court records, Hucul, through his attorney, offered to make restitution, which was acceptable to Mrs. Woodhouse, the judge and Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Dale Devlin. Restitution was made in open court, and the court costs paid, before Judge Goodrow dismissed the case.

Mrs. Woodhouse, in a complaint against Hucul, disclosed that she answered an ad in one of the daily newspapers, inserted by Hucul, in which it was claimed that he installed aluminum siding, roofing, tinning, etc., with the wording indicating that Hucul had excellent references and did the work himself.

On October 19, Hucul arrived at Mrs. Woodhouse's residence, and presented contracts for work on the house in which the woman lived, another at 2065 Vernier, which she also owned. Under terms of the agreements, the work on both houses was to have been completed on October 24.

The woman contracted to have aluminum siding, baked enamel gutters and downspouts installed on both houses for a total of \$824, for labor and materials. Hucul was given a check in the amount of \$600 as a down payment.

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## Medical Center Hospital To Honor Webber Family

A Grosse Pointe family name long associated with business, civic, and philanthropic interests in Detroit will be honored when a new adult medical and surgical teaching hospital is constructed in the growing Detroit Medical Center.

It was announced that a new, 425-bed teaching hospital planned for completion in 1970 will be called the "Webber Medical Center Hospital", in honor of the several members of that family who have been long identified with the hospital and nursing interests of Detroit.

In making the announcement, Ray R. Eppert, president of Harper Hospital's Board of Trustees, and president of the Medical Center Development Corporation, said "I know of no name in Detroit which has been longer or more influentially associated with good hospital care for this community. Public acknowledgement of their leadership and generosity through the use of their name in this project is most fitting."

At one time or another, the family has been actively associated with Harper, Woman's and Children's Hospitals, as well as many allied organizations such as United Community Services, United Foundation, and the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund.

Woodford Mason in "Harper of Detroit" — published by Wayne State University Press at the time of Harper Hospital's centennial in 1963 — said "Had it not been for the influence, the leadership, and the generosity of J. L. Hudson and members of his family, particularly his nephews, Richard H. and Oscar Webber, Harper Hospital would undoubtedly be an institution of decidedly different character and lesser importance that it is . . . For more than seventy-five years, it is fair to say, Hudsons and Webbers exerted a dominant and guiding influence over the affairs of the Hospital . . . their association has been responsible for Harper's identity as a civic institution."

It was Joseph L. Hudson, founder of the J. L. Hudson Company, who "introduced" the first "hospital" Webber to Detroit when he brought his

nephew, Richard H. Webber, to work as a stock helper in his uncle's store in 1898. Hudson had been elected to Harper's Board in 1897, and was president from 1901 until his death in July of 1912. Richard Webber was elected to the Harper Board in February of 1912 and was appointed a member of the executive committee at the same time.

On February 16, 1918, he was elected President of the Board and continued in that position without interruption until he requested that he not be re-nominated in 1961, whereupon he was elected Honorary Chairman of the Board — a position he still holds. He has the longest tenure of any trustee and president in the history of the hospital.

Oscar Webber became a member of the Harper Board and its executive committee more than 40 years ago, and served as chairman of the executive committee. He chaired, also, the building committee during the time of construction in 1928-9 of the present Brush street building of the hospital. He also was a member of the Board of the Children's Hospital of Michigan from 1922 to 1935, and is currently an honorary trustee.

Of the same family and generation, the late Mrs. John J. O'Brien (Louise Webber, the only sister of the family) was a member and officer of Woman's Hospital, from 1938 until her death in 1960. Joseph L. Webber and the late James B. Webber, Sr., while not actively associated with an individual hospital, maintained the family interest through their participation in fiscal affairs.

James B. Webber, Jr. was elected to the Harper Board in 1948, and served on its executive committee until his untimely death in 1956. He served also as president of the Greater Detroit Hospital Fund, which was founded in 1949 as the first community-wide fund-raising effort for capital expansion of hospital facilities. It formed the pattern for orderly capital giving which has been followed at five-year intervals since then, and Webber's efforts in helping formulate the principles to be followed are credited in great part for the success of the first and succeeding drives.

Webber Medical Center Hospital is to be built between The Grace and Harper Hospitals on Brush Street. Both The Grace and Harper buildings will connect with the new hospital and it, in turn, will be physically connected with a new, central Out-Patient Building to be constructed by Wayne State University on its new medical cam-

pus. Although Harper Hospital will build the new unit, it is to be used as the primary outlet for teaching adult general medicine and surgery in the Medical Center.

H. Glenn Bixby, president of The Grace Hospital's Board of Trustees, commenting on the project, said "Our trustees are pleased with naming the new facility the 'Webber Medical Center Hospital', since we know that the Webber family has done a great deal for medical care in our city and in promoting the new Medical Center. We are looking forward to cooperating with Harper in making the new teaching hospital and the entire Medical Center a great success."

In making the announcement, Eppert pointed out that the construction of this hospital is part of an orderly progression of events in the creation of the Detroit Medical Center. Originally outlined in two important studies by a nationally recognized hospital consultant, the plan calls for centralization of

mutually needed facilities by the hospitals, rearrangement of services to prevent costly duplication wherever possible, and operation of hospital facilities by private boards so the University may use its budget to expand its medical school as rapidly as possible to bring it up to the potential of the metropolitan area.

"Symbolic of the dedication of the Webbers to the welfare of this community," said Eppert, "is the fact that it was

Mr. Richard Webber who first invited the presidents of the other hospitals involved in the Detroit Medical Center area to sit down and talk about the whole concept back in 1955. In the decade since, we have witnessed massive and purposeful urban renewal. The University backs the project wholeheartedly. The hospital we build will be available at the precise time it is needed for the Medical School's expanded enrollment."

He added, "Webber Medical Center Hospital will stand in honor of a family dedicated to betterment of life and health in Metropolitan Detroit."

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
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### Young Driver Repeats Offense

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
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
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### Driver, Cyclist Fined in Court

Grosse Pointe students as a group will have fewer difficulties in college than those from less affluent communities, according to Dr. Charles Wilson, Superintendent of Grosse Pointe Public Schools.

Dr. Wilson made the remark when he spoke to Grosse Pointe High School juniors and seniors November 12. His topic was the effect of a Grosse Pointe background on students' education.

"People are very much alike wherever you go," Dr. Wilson noted, and Grosse Pointe is similar to most other suburban communities. Most suburbanites, he said, talk, dress, and think alike. Grosse Pointe does, however, have an extremely high percentage of high income families and well-educated people.

Dr. Wilson also feels that the outlooks and attitudes of students are quite similar everywhere. While I.Q.'s here may be higher, the students' basic characters are very much alike.

Student Council officers also asked the Superintendent to discuss the effect of the "sheltered life" and the effect it has on students who attend college. Grosse Pointe students will be as scared and confused as everyone, he said, but they will be better able to meet the demands of college life. Our "sheltered" life isn't sheltered at all, Dr. Wilson feels.

Finally, the Superintendent affirmed that the schools in this community are among the best in the state and nation. Well educated and intelligent parents produce children who are more intelligent than average. In turn, intelligent students and exceptional vocational opportunities attract some of the best teachers in the nation to the Grosse Pointe community. With excellent teachers, students' I.Q.'s rise a few more notches.



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
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# Blue Devils Beat Dearborn In First Basketball Game

Grosse Pointe High School opened its 1965-66 basketball season last Wednesday with an impressive 67-51 win over a tough Dearborn team. The Devils nabbed 51

rebounds — 40 by Bob Miller, Jim O'Donnel and Bob Czarnicki — and got the ball on 9 out of 10 tipoffs. Grosse Pointe's shooting was well below average as the Devils were accurate on only 24 of 88 field goal attempts.

The Devils' all-senior starting lineup consisted of guards Tom Anderson and Tom Schildhammer, forwards Mike Conti and Bob Miller, and Bob Czarnicki at center. Anderson started the scoring on a 20-foot shot to establish a permanent Devil lead. With a fast start Grosse Pointe soon had an 11-4 lead and the quarter ended with the Devils on top 18-15.

Devils Stretch Lead Grosse Pointe stretched their lead to 26-15 on baskets by Czarnicki, Miller, and Schildhammer. Dearborn came back with six points in a row, but Miller tipped in two shots and added another to cancel them out. The Pioneers from Dearborn again came up with six straight points and narrowed the gap to five. Dean Jacobs

scored on four foul shots and Czarnicki added two more baskets to increase the difference to 10 at the half.

The Pioneers sank a basket at the outset of the final quarter and were still in the game, just eight points back. Jim O'Donnell sank two free throws, but Bob Czarnicki fouled out with 5:14 left. At this point the Devils started moving. A steal by Anderson set up Phil Connor's field goal. Bob Miller added a bucket from the corner and a foul shot. Connor added another basket from underneath and Dean Jacobs threw in two foul shots to swell the Grosse Pointe margin to 16 points with two minutes left in the game. Terry Allen entered the game at this point and sank two baskets to boost the Devils' point total to 67.

Bob Miller and Bob Czarnicki led all scorers with 18 points each.

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



Whether you're ready or not, Christmas is coming closer and closer, and with it the delightful, but sometimes perplexing problem of what to give Cousin Henry, Aunt Martha, or your next door neighbor. Books! That's the answer! Would you like to have some suggestions? Fine—we thought you would. And so two of our Woods Branch Librarians, Mrs. Betty Seifert and Miss Barbara Harrison have put their heads together and compiled a list of adult books for Yuletide giving. These are available at all three of our Agencies for distribution. To publicize even further this fine brochure we list a few of the entries with annotations, hoping that they may give you an inspiration for a Christmas gift.

In the fiction category there is Nora Lofts' HOW FAR TO BETHLEHEM?—a sensitive portrayal of the Christmas pilgrimage to Jerusalem by the Three Wise Men. Another new one is Irving Stone's THOSE WHO LOVE—a fictionalized biography, portraying the mind, character, and times of John and Abigail Adams.

In the non-fiction area, Richard Armour's rollicking GOING AROUND IN ACADEMIC CIRCLES should please those with a good sense of humor. Armour has done it again—this time, deans, housemothers, dormitory roommates and library regulations are all targets of his attack. A best-seller by Eric Berne is GAMES PEOPLE PLAY—exposing the foibles and follies of the human mind as they interact in this entertaining book of social psychology.

If you are seeking a domestic-oriented volume for the housewife, you may choose Avenelle Day's THE SPICE COOKBOOK—a well-illustrated book presenting a history of the spice trade along with 1400 recipes. Dorothy Draper, in 365 SHORTCUTS TO HOME DECORATING offers many practical and delightful suggestions for changes and improvements in your home. And with the great popularity that creative stitching is enjoying, we must mention Jacqueline Enothoven's STITCHES OF CREATIVE EMBROIDERY—a comprehensive book which includes basic as well as more difficult stitches.

How about caroling? Walter E. Hret's INTERNATIONAL BOOK OF CHRISTMAS CAROLS is a fine collection covering music from England, France, Germany, Italy and Spain, and provides the original text as well as English translations, piano accompaniments, and chords for fretted instruments. A Michigander should enjoy Edmund Love's SITUATION IN FLUSHING—a wonderful account of a boy growing up a half century ago in a small Michigan town. A hobbyist would be pleased to receive THE COMPLETE BOOK OF MODEL RAILROADING by David Sutton, a book including 500 photographs, charts and layouts. Another might prefer THE COMPLETE BOOK OF SMALL ANTIQUE COLLECTING by Katharine McClinton—which includes tips on identification, selection and purchase of everything from snuffboxes to stirrup cups. The historian will be happy to find Samuel E. Morison's OXFORD HISTORY OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE in his Christmas stocking. Here is a personal interpretation of the history of the United States as a nation and of the land and its people, from Indian to present times. The poet may want to curl up by the fire with a volume of Lawrence Thompson's SELECTED LETTERS OF ROBERT FROST in his hand. He would find revealed the personality of Frost in this book of correspondence and chronology. And almost anyone would be happy to receive Albert Schweitzer's THE TEACHING OF REVERENCE FOR LIFE, which sets for the central themes of this great man's humanitarian philosophy of life.

Another fascinating book on the best seller list is Ruth Montgomery's A GIFT OF PROPHECY, relating Jeane Dixon's unusual powers of extrasensory perception. This is not the complete list; merely a sampling. We suggest you come in our Libraries for a copy; it might very well simplify your Yuletide shopping.

REPORTS REACHED the U.S. that thieves climbed up a 30-foot pipe Thursday night, broke into the Vatican Library, and escaped with two valuable ancient collections of poetry.

The robbers took manuscripts partly handwritten by Petrarch and Torquato Tasso, and a copy of the Crown of St. Stephen, but ignored other valuable documents in the same case, leading police to suspect an unknown mad collector. Observers called it the most spectacular theft in Vatican history. All of the stolen articles were found about 18 hours later in a field, where they had apparently been tossed by the thieves. They have been returned to their case in the Vatican.

Monday, November 29 STATE DEMOCRATIC leaders Sunday asked the Democratic-controlled Legislature to enact a tax reform program, including an income tax, during its 1966 session. Few observers expected action on the demand, however, since next year is an election year and there is a \$135 million State Treasury surplus. Several legislators said polls they have taken indicate wide-spread opposition among their constituents to an income tax, which is generally regarded as the base needed for any genuine tax reform. Legislators side-stepped the 1965 Democratic platform demands for tax reforms as both parties blamed each other for failing to act.

A TOP-LEVEL citizens' committee Sunday proposed to the White House that the United States spend \$100 million a year for three years to help other nations implement birth control. Calling the freedom to choose family size "a basic human right," an advisory committee to the White House Conference on International Co-operation said food production must increase three-fold by the end of the century to feed the seven billion people expected to be on earth by then. The committee said the right to limit families does not exist, or cannot yet be implemented, in many parts of the United States and the world. About 5,000 persons are expected to participate in the three-day White House conference, which begins Monday.

Tuesday, November 30 The UN General Assembly Monday approved the convening of a world disarmament conference to be held not later than 1967, and agreed to invite Red China. The proposal was approved without a dissenting vote. Secretary General U Thant immediately called the ballot a milestone on the way toward universality of the world organization. Acting for the Austrian government, Ambassador Kurt Waldheim offered Vienna as a site for the conference. The 117-nation assembly approved the conference proposal 112-0, with three nations absent and only France abstaining. Nationalist China cast no ballot.

The third former mental patient in three months leaped to her death Sunday from the Roberts Hotel, 5725 Woodward. Ruth Ensign, 55, was living at the hotel following her release from Ypsilanti on October 18. The other two women who died by jumping from the hotel windows or roof were also former Ypsilanti patients. Miss Ensign was on convalescent status but had not been given supportive help because of an overload of cases at the Detroit Consultation Center.

Common Council Tuesday will approve formally the leasing of property for a \$3 million cable car ride over the Detroit River from downtown Detroit to Windsor. The 7 1/2 to 12 minute TeleFerry ride will be ready for tourists by the time of the 1967 Freedom Festival, held in July. A 75-cent charge will buy a one-way trip from Cobo Hall in Detroit to Cleary Auditorium in Windsor. The AmericanCanada TeleFerry Co. will pay a minimum \$25,000 a year site rental, and a gradually increasing percentage of gross revenue, up to 50 percent.

Sunday, November 28 SOUTH VIETNAMESE TROOPS suffered their worst defeat since early summer Saturday when they battled Viet Cong guerrillas on an abandoned French rubber plantation. The Reds withdrew before Vietnamese reinforcements arrived. More than 100 bodies littered the field, and a U.S. spokesman said the two battalions and a regimental headquarters unit were no longer in any condition to fight. Several U.S. advisers serving with the government force also died. A U.S. news photographer, who watched the battle, said the force, the Seventh Regiment, was nearly wiped out, and U.S. officers considered it a major setback.


