#### Thursday, March 3

THE UNITED STATES confirmed Wednesday after weeks of secrecy that radioactive materials were scattered over a relatively small area in southeastern Spain in the January 17 crash of a B-52 bomber. The four bombs on board the B-52 are protected from detonating by a series of "safety locks!" however, some of the radioactive components were scattered when the casing was damaged on two of the bombs. Although the United States government insists no hazard has been created, and radiological surveys show no evidence, the Atomic Energy Commission is shipping about 1,500 tons of contaminated earth and vegetation back to an underground burial near Aiken, S.C. One bomb is still missing and the search is being continued.

#### Friday, March 4

THE WORST TORNADO to hit the state in 12 years killed at least 42 persons and injured 400 others in central Mississippi late Thursday afternoon. The winds leveled a shopping center in Jackson erected only five years ago, leaving at least 17 dead. Twenty persons were reported killed in rural Scott County; a minister, his wife. three children, and visiting mother-in-law were killed when winds wrecked their house at Leesburg. RECORDER'S COURT Judge Arthur J. Koscinski, 51, under investigation by the Internal Revenue Service since August, 1964, was charged on Friday with failure to file Federal income tax returns from 1959 to 1963. Actually Koscinski has not cinski owes the Government \$38,000 in delinquent taxes and penalties, according to Chief Assistant U. S. Attorney William Merrill. The only dealer from Detroit, Charles Heenstra, 52. was accompanied by his bride, the former Beverly West, 32, on a combination honey moon and business trip. No explanation for the disaster has been around Mt. Fuji.

Last August . . . we took our first peek at one of Louise Hoyt's decoupage classes, a special summer session for teenagers, and we were mightily impressed so much so that we promised ourselves a return visit some time during the winter months, to see one of her advanced classes in action.
