

Victories Over Indiana and Ohio Championships Would Send Pointe Team to World Series in Williamsport, Penn.

The Grosse Pointe Woods-Shores American All-Stars attained the highest pinnacle in Little League Basebali in the State of Michigan by winning the Michigan State Championship last weekend in Southfield by defeating Birmingham Federals 6-4. This is the first time any Grosse Pointe team has won the State Championship.

Birmingham was defending the State title they won last year, but this time they ran into a determined Grosse Pointe Woods team who were not to be denied and proved they could come from behind to win.

Census figures released by The Grosse Pointe Public School System reveal that the population of the school district reached 69,989 in May, a gain of 6,399 since 1960. This is an increase of 26,225 since 1950.

The school census, the number of 5 through 19 years old, stands at 21,257, an increase of 3.017 in the past six years, and 11,384 more than in 1950.

Figures in public school membership for May show an increase of 1,647 since 1960 and 6,391 since 1950.

These and other data were contained in the monthly report of J. Harold Husband, Acting Superintendent of Schools, to the Grosse Pointe Board of Education. 

We approach the matter of having two pools, one at the Waterfront Park and one at the Three Mile Drive Park.

At the Waterfront Park, we explored the feasibility of using the present recreation building as a bathhouse and placing the swimming pool south of the structure in filled land. Seemingly, this would offer cost saving possibilities. However, the test borings indicated the undesirability of this location for a swimming pool. A survey of the existing recreation building as compared with latest bathhouse standards, and similar buildings recently completed in the Pointes and Shores area indicated to the Commission that is was not suitable, costwise and otherwise for this purpose. We believe it should be continued as a recreation was placed on a \$5,000 bond, building and be maintained out then taken back to the Wayne of the City's general fund.







Detroit. An investigation showed that he had two previous convictions for burglary and is presently subject to a parole violation.

Patterson's older brother Charles, is presently in the County Jail being processed by the 15th Precinct in Detroit after admitting many burgiaries n the eastside area, including 11 in Grosse Pointe.

Found on the younger Patterson at the time of his arrest were some stamps, silver dol-lars and Greek coins taken from an apartment at 1010 Beacons. field avenue, and a silver steak knife from the same address was found in his back pocket.

In addition, Lieutenants Hough and Stanley Enders and Detective James LaPratt, investigating relatives and friends, recovered a stereo rec ord player and transistor radio taken from an apartment a 1092 Braconsfield.

On the recommendation of Lisutenant Hough, the Wayne County Prosecutor is sued a warrant for attempted burglary of an occupied dwelling, and Patterson was arraigned before Municipal Judge C. Joseph Belanger on the charge the same day. He planted not guilty and bond was set at \$2,500 with double sureties. The examination is set for August 17.
