SPECULATION WAS HIGH in Vatican City that Pope Paul VI would soon send a peace mission to North Vietnam. Although the Vatican would not confirm the rumors, The Turin daily La Stampa, first printed the story. La Stampa is usually well-informed on Vatican matters.

IN THE FIRST major battle after the 24-hour Christmas truce proclaimed by the South Vietnamese, American helicopters armed with rockets aided South Vietnamese troops who had pushed a guerrilla battalion of about 500 men onto the coastal flats just below the demilitarized zone.

Friday, December 29
EASTERN DEVELOPERS are protesting a decision by the City Plan Commission and the Department of Housing to award the multi-million-dollar urban renewal plan to M. E. Arden Co., a Detroit firm. They indicated Thursday they would file a suit in federal court.

Saturday, December 30
PRESIDENT JOHNSON provided an insight into Democratic campaign strategy Thursday as he signed a crime control bill, saying he considered the "growing menace of crime in our streets" the most urgent problem facing Congress. The issue of crime appears to be overtaking Vietnam as the top presidential issue of 1968.

Sunday, December 31
EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1 motorists will pay an extra penny a gallon for gasoline. That's when the new state gasoline tax goes into effect. The increase comes at a time when gasoline prices in the area have remained remarkably stable. There has been only one cost increase initiated by the oil companies since 1965.

THE CAMBODIAN government confirmed Saturday that Prince Norodom Sihanouk had opened the way for United States military attacks on communist troops that use the nation for sanctuary. In the Texas White House and Washington, U.S. officials, though restrained in their comments, obviously were elated with the news.

Monday, January 1
CONSERVATIVES in the Legislature in Lansing generally opposed to open housing indicated their support might be available if a number of so-called anti-riot bills are included in the administration's recommendations. One of the bills may be stop-and-frisk legislation.

THE RECENTLY-QUELLED Cyprus crisis threatened to erupt again with the island president, Archbishop Makarios, assailing the Turks, and Turkey responding with war-like moves, which included the canceling of all military leaves. The renewal of the dispute was touched off when Turkish Cypriots formally set up their own "transitional administration" to rule over the parts of Cyprus they dominate.

Tuesday, January 2
IN WASHINGTON a survey of Republican leaders in the 50 states reveals that, if the presidential election were held Tuesday, Governor Romney would be defeated by President Johnson in a runaway victory as staggering as the President's defeat of Barry Goldwater in 1964. The survey was conducted by the New York Times.

MICHIGAN TRAFFIC DEATHS established an all-time New Year's weekend high late Monday with 27 deaths logged and more reported unofficially. The 27 fatalities exceeded by one the number at the same time last year, when the previous record was set.

THE ADMINISTRATION is reported to be putting pressure on U.S. officials in Vietnam to come up with encouraging evidence before the 1968 elections. This action is said to have put officials on the spot according to the New York Times.

Educational Administrators To Present Information On Public School System

Lawrence Kennedy And Joe Spagnoli To Speak At
Luncheon In War Memorial Sponsored
By League Of Women Voters

The Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters will present two well-known Grosse Pointers, Lawrence F. Kennedy and Joe Spagnoli, at a luncheon to be held at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial January 10 at 12:30 o'clock.

This program, to which the public is cordially invited, is an effort to present factual information to Grosse Pointers about their school system, its goals and its finances.

It is with this purpose that Mr. Spagnoli will direct his talk on the Grosse Pointe Public School System's financial needs, while Mr. Kennedy will present the remarks and also present pertinent background on teachers' salaries.

Study School Finance

One of the most interesting of the Grosse Pointe League is its study on school finance, which is "to support and encourage the public school to (1) continue efforts toward keeping maximum classroom size of about 25 pupils, (2) reduce the size of the physical education classes to a more manageable number and (3) obtain funds to meet future building needs." Also to "encourage the establishment of a publicly-supported Community College System in cooperation with other school districts."

The luncheon guests will be fortunate to hear directly from two active educational administrators on the programs of the Grosse Pointe School System.

Both speakers hold the title of Assistant Superintendent. Mr. Kennedy's position deals with Professional Personnel. Mr. Spagnoli's with Administrative Services.

Kennedy's Background
Lawrence F. Kennedy holds AB and MA degrees from the University of Michigan and has also studied at Wayne State and Michigan State Universities as well as at a number of Armed Forces institutes, including the University of Paris.

Stray Bullet Hits Window of Home

A bullet fired into the home of William Fisher, 36 Elm court, from an unknown source, made an inch size hole in the window of the house, but was stopped by a partially drawn curtain, and fell to the floor.

Fisher called police on Monday, January 1, and reported the incident. Officers dispatched to the house, said that the bullet was either a .25 or .32 caliber. It went through a 12x12-inch pane, and then it hit the curtain and fell to the floor. The curtain was not damaged, it was said.

The bullet was tagged and placed in the property room in the station. It is believed it came from a gun fired by a New Year's reveler at the stroke of midnight.

Police issued a reminder, although too late for New Year's Eve, that even though it is a holiday, it is illegal to fire guns within the city limits. If the person who had fired the bullet had been apprehended, he would have been dealt with to the full extent of the law.

It was lucky, it was said, that the bullet did not strike Fisher, or any member of his household.

Such indiscriminate and illegal use of firearms can be fatal to innocent persons, it was pointed out.

All of the Pointes have ordinances banning the firing of regular guns, such as rifles, revolvers, etc., and any type of pellet guns, except at legitimate rifle and pistol ranges, within the city limits. The use of sling shots is also prohibited.

Three Killed In Accident After Skiing

Kevin Fossee, 18, of Shoreham Road, Among Victims of Crash in White Lake Township

An evening of skiing with friends turned into a nightmare on Saturday, December 30, at 11:40 p.m., when a head-on collision on M 59, Highland road, near the intersection of Porter road in White Lake Township, took the lives of three youths, one of them Pointer, Kevin Fossee, 18, of Shoreham road.

Kevin was in a car driven by Grosse Pointe High School graduate, Rick Gonzalez. Also in the car were Fred F. Hite, of Dearborn and Jeffery Jones of Norwood avenue. Rick is in serious condition in Pontiac General Hospital, the other two youths also sustained injuries.

Also killed were the driver of the other car, Roger Stogner, of Highland, Mich., and Doyle Mitchell, a passenger in the Stogner car. A third passenger, John Hawk sustained injuries.

Friends See Crash

Witnessing the accident and swerving to avoid one themselves, were Russell Knowles, of University place, Gary Haberman of Audubon road, and Gerry Hodges of South Oxford road, friends of Kevin, who were following the Gonzalez car at the time of the accident.

Kevin had just completed his first semester at the University of Michigan where he was studying on a scholarship. He was graduated from Grosse Pointe High School in '67. He was president of the Youth Council, manager of a group called "The Jacques" and a member of the drama club.

Three Other Children

Kevin was the son of Mrs. Rita Fossee of Shoreham road, and Burke Fossee of Detroit. There are three other children; Burke 24, Brian 19, and Mark 16.

Funeral services were held at the Verheyden Funeral Home and Our Lady Star of the Sea Church on Wednesday, January 3.

Interment was in Mount Olivet Cemetery.

FIREMEN ANSWER CALL

City firemen responded to a call from 538 University place at 2:47 a.m. on Monday, January 1. Upon arrival firefighters found that the oil furnace had delayed ignition, causing oil to leak on wires, and the motor to short out. The basement, which was filled with smoke, was ventilated.

Yule Tree Burning Festival Planned At Pier in Farms

Old German Custom Revived Last Year Expected to
Draw Many Residents to Park On Friday
starting at 7 p.m.

The Farms will hold its second annual "Soltice Festival" at the Municipal Pier-Park tomorrow, January 5, starting at 7 p.m., for a "Tannenbaum Geburnen" (Christmas tree burning). The Festival is patterned after an old German custom during which on the "Twelfth Night" of Christmas discarded Christmas trees are placed in a pile and burned.

Farms residents are asked to take their trees to the park, any time prior to Friday, or on the day of the burning.

City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., who introduced the custom to the Pointe last year, said that it is hoped that there will be a bigger pile of trees, and more people attending the "Tannenbaum Geburnen" than last year.

400 Attended Last Year

He said that last January, approximately 400 persons were on hand to watch the trees, piled 15 feet high, go up in flames. The flames shot high into the air for about three-quarters of an hour, and the embers glowed far into the night.

The custom was started in Germany so that the people could have an opportunity to get together and renew old acquaintances and make new friends and have a good time.

The festival is open to all Farms residents, whether they have a tree to burn or not. Refreshments will be served at the burning. This is an opportunity for the people to enjoy good fellowship and to meet their fellow citizens and city officials.

Would Appreciate Help

For the citizens who will be unable to attend the "Tannenbaum Geburnen," trees should be placed at the curb, and they will be picked up by the city, and taken to the park to be added to the pile. However, it is hoped that the people will be good enough to take the trees to the park themselves.

Driver Crashes Provençal Gate

Arthur H. Getz, 18, of 1119 Buckhorn, lost control of his automobile while traveling south on Provençal road on Thursday, December 21, and crashed into a huge stone pillar at Kercheval avenue, demolishing it and knocking down an iron gate.

Getz was not injured, but his passenger, Wallace J. Gambor, Jr., 18, of 5965 Woodhall, Detroit, suffered cuts about the face and hands. He was treated at Bon Secours Hospital.

A Farms police report disclosed that Getz stated that as he was driving on Provençal, he attempted to pass another vehicle, when he lost control of his car. He admitted that he had had two drinks, and that he had felt drowsy.

Damage to the pillar and gate is believed to be an estimated \$1,300. Getz's car was a total loss.

Police said no violations were issued because there were no witnesses to the accident.

February

Devastating fire takes lives of three Woods children. Attempts by father and fire department to save them proves futile.

State blacklists Park swimming pool.

Robert B. Semple named general chairman of Torch Drive. First Church of Christ Scientists on Chalfonte near Kerby holds its first service.

March

Shores property owners approve \$290,000 bond issue to finance major renovation and improvement of the Village harbor at special election.

Woods Council adopts ordinance to require all employees of beauty salons to obtain city licenses, after heated debate with hairdressers.

Dr. William L. Craig's appointment as principal of Grosse Pointe High School North approved by trustees.

Woods-Shores Home Owners Association attend Woods Council meeting regarding use of I-gate School playground facilities.

War Memorial Association sets \$75,000 goal for 1967 Family Participation Campaign.

Grosse Pointe University School's coach and teacher Francis McCann announces June retirement plans.

April

Farms holds General Election. All incumbents returned to office except Municipal Judge William F. Connolly Jr., who was defeated by Robert H. Pytell.

Farms electors pass proposition one and two which will increase retirement allowances for general employees and increase retirement and pensions for fire and policemen.

Park elects Mayor Mathew Patterson and returns three incumbent councilmen to council seats.

Woods City assessor, Warren J. DeCook resigns.

Capacity crowd attends School Board meeting to ask question on intent to participate in South-eastern Council of Governments.

Death claims one of Grosse Pointe's leading citizens, James S. Holden, of Washington road.

City of Grosse Pointe council approves increase in water and sewage disposal rates.

May

THE NEWS wins the School Bell Award for the fifth time in the last six years.

Department of health officials in Lansing grant conditional permit to Park for summer use of pool.

Heart attack during Council meeting in Park proves fatal to Charles F. Ives.

John Doelle, Park councilman, resigns from Council.

The Board of Trustees of the Roland Gray Fund voted to give \$5,000 to furnish a room in the new Neighborhood Club.

June

Over 500 Pointers attend Farms Police's Open House. 20-year-old Pointer, Kurt Wilhams, dies of head injuries received during Class B baseball game.

Pointe teachers among the first in state to ratify salary agreement.

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Vandals Visit Parcels

second floor library, where they pulled open the door, damaging the lock in the process. Then they went to work, pulling down about 50 percent of the books from shelves and scattering them on the floor. After leaving the reading rooms, they went to the west end of the library, where they pulled out file cabinet drawers, strewn files and cards over the floor.

Not satisfied with this, the inane destroyers then went into the teachers' office, and began ransacking desks and files, and smashed two plate glass windows with a hammer, believed to be the same one used to break the basement window.

The policemen said it appeared that at this point, one of the boys standing near the broken windows had received a severe cut, believed at first to be on the arm. There was a large blood stain near the window.

Followed Bloody Trail
The officers followed the blood drops to the boys' restroom, where a large pool of blood in front of the door indicated that an attempt was made to get in, but the door was locked. The trail of blood led to the girls room, where an attempt to enter was also unsuccessful because of a locked door.

The sergeant and patrolmen said they followed the blood trail down the hall, down the stairs to the main floor, and out the door facing Vernier road.

The three followed the trail to the home of one of the 15 broken windows had received a Avenue in Harper Woods. They said they found a key in the side door of the house, and then radioed for Det. Kensora, and for Harper Woods Police assistance.

When the Harper Woods policemen arrived, Kensora explained the situation and suggested that they enter the house because it appeared that the blood near the door showed that

the injured boy might be in danger of bleeding to death. The Harper Woods officers agreed, and all the men entered. They were met by the juvenile living in the house.

Implicated Companion
When asked about the whereabouts of the injured lad, the teenager said that the boy lived in Lancaster in Harper Woods. On questioning by Kensora, the youth admitted breaking into the school and causing the damage, and implicated his wounded friend. He said two other boys were also with them at the time.

At the wounded juvenile's home, the officers were met by the boy's mother, and when she was informed of what had taken place, she called her son. She told the policemen that her son had been injured, that he had been accidentally struck in the forehead by a stapler thrown by one of his friends, and that he had been taken to the hospital where 14 stitches were required to close the wound.

When the son entered the room, he refused to talk to the officers, whereupon the mother called the boy's father, who was at work, and after speaking to his father, the boy agreed to cooperate. He confessed his involvement in the school vandalism, that the three other lads were with him. The other two boys were picked up at their homes. The streets in which they lived was not named.

Deny Previous Visit
The four youths readily confessed to their part in the Saturday's destruction, but denied taking part, or being involved in any way with the December 10 damage in Parcels School.

After causing considerable damage to the first and second floor, amounting to an estimated \$500, the December 10 vandals added insult to injury by scrawling obscene words on a black board in Classroom 104, where a telephone had been ripped from the wall and furniture overturned.

He came to this community as a curriculum coordinator and later was assigned the task of coordinating and preparing the educational specifications for Grosse Pointe North High School. A continuation of this assignment was acting as liaison between the architects, the contractors and the Board of Education.

With the appointment of J. Harold Husband as Acting Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Spagnoli was named Assistant Superintendent - Administrative Services, the position he holds today.

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Library Offers Family Movies

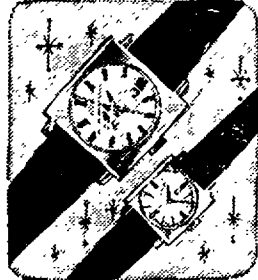

Baby sitters will be provided for the very young and young men and women from the Center's Youth Council will act as guides, servers and hosts.

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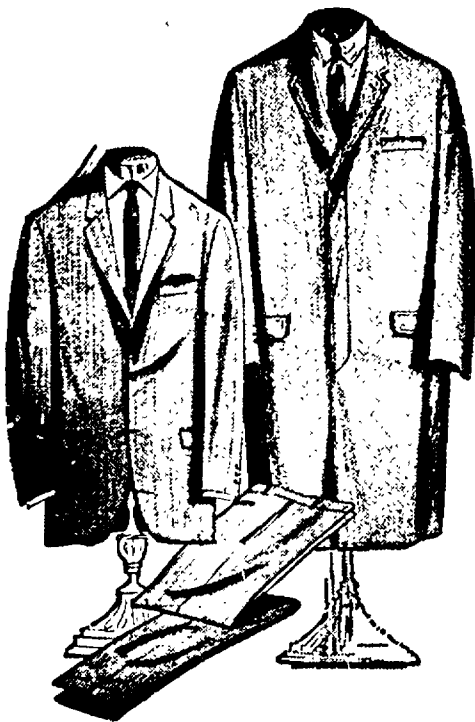

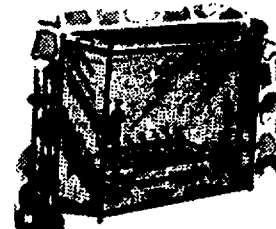

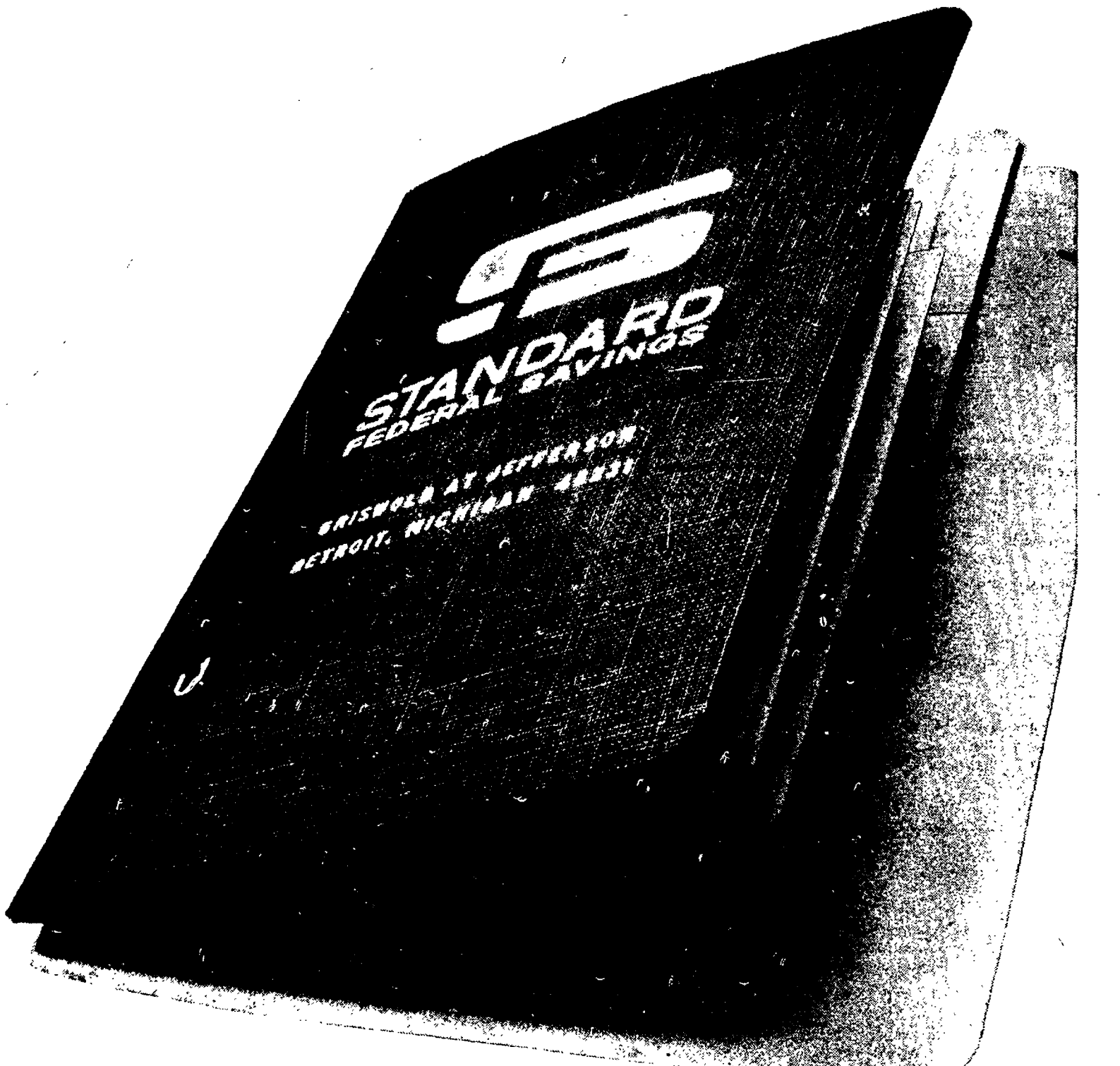

Students Offered Course By Pointe Power Squadron

The Grosse Pointe Power Squadron, in cooperation with the Grosse Pointe Public Schools Department of Community Services, will be offering free instruction to students interested in becoming qualified to operate a power boat this coming summer.

Under the Marine Safety Act of 1967, children 12, 13, 14 and 15 years old will be required to have a safety certificate in their possession when operating a power boat of six horsepower or more if not accompanied by a person 16 years of age or older.

Therefore it becomes important to all those affected by this change in the law to qualify before the summer season arrives. Classes will be conducted by volunteer instructors from the Grosse Pointe Power Squadron at the locations and dates listed below. The course includes six hours of instruction (including a final examination)

held once a week for two hour periods for three consecutive weeks. Perfect attendance is required.

Grosse Pointe High School: January 15, 22 and 29, (Monday), 3:30-5:30 p.m. — For students from Austin, St. Paul, Sacred Heart Convent and Grosse Pointe High School.

Brownell Junior High School: January 23, 30 and February 6, (Tuesday), 3:30-5:30 p.m. — For students from Austin and Brownell.

Grosse Pointe University School: February 7, 14 and 21, (Wednesday), 3:45-5:45 p.m. — For students from G.P.U.S.,

Liggett, Our Lady Star of the Sea and Sacred Heart Convent. Parcels Junior High School: February 13, 20 and 27, (Tuesday), 3:30-5:30 p.m. — For students from Parcels, Bishop-Gallagher and St. Peter.

Pierce Junior High School: March 5, 12 and 19, (Tuesday), 3:30-5:30 p.m. — For students from Pierce, St. Ambrose and St. Clare.

Students who are presently 11 years old and will reach their twelfth birthday before or during the summer are eligible to enter these classes. Students attending an elementary school should plan to register for the

classes offered nearest to their home.

Tentative plans are being considered for either evening or Saturday classes sometime in May for those students unable to attend one of the winter sessions. It is not recommended, however, to depend upon the May classes as a convenient alternative.

What Goes On at Your Library

It is a privilege to be invited to write our special New Year's column.

Nineteen hundred and sixty-seven was an exciting year for the Public Library, and as we prepare to meet another new year, it seems worthwhile to look back over the past 12 months.

The Grosse Pointe Public Library faces an opportunity and a challenge that is almost unique, serving a community which has been termed by experts as the most ideal library-use community in America; receiving solid support from the Grosse Pointe Public School System, as one of its Divisions; having a Friends of the Library group which is looked upon as one of the finest, and among the biggest, such organizations in the entire country; and a well-trained, dedicated staff.

As Director, it is my responsibility to see to it that every effort is made to translate these blessings into a high quality of library service. I am confident that our staff is working very hard to reach this ideal.

Statistics cannot be used to measure the quality of library use. It is impossible to over-estimate the profound influence a single book may have, and this is never lost sight of by the professional staff who work with our library patrons.

Along with public libraries all over the country, GPPL had a slight loss in book circulation.

However, use of non-book materials continues to show an increase. During 1967, 498,000 materials were circulated by the three Public Libraries; 469,000 books were circulated, 16,000 records, 6000 films, 200 art prints, 1700 tapes, 2500 tools, and 455 film strips. Over 10,000 telephone reference calls were handled, as well as 51,000 reference and readers' advisory questions. 15,000 residents attended 600 meetings at the Central Library. And a figure the Staff is extremely proud of, 31,484 residents were registered as library users, representing

an unusually high figure of 44 percent of all School District residents.

The most noteworthy event of the year was the decision of the Board of Education to present a program of Public Library expansion to the voters on February 26, along with a ballot on School expansion, and a third proposal for additional operating millage. Public Library facilities have actually been reduced since dedication of the Central Library in January, 1953. Since present facilities were planned in 1951, the School District population has increased 50 percent, registered users have increased 150 percent, and circulation has increased 150 percent.

The Board of Education's decision to present the Public Library Expansion Program to the voters was based on urgent recommendation of the Friends of the Library who a year ago paid a nationally-known Public Library expert to prepare an objective study of Public Library facilities. It is the sincere hope of the Staff that School District voters will give careful consideration to the need for providing Public Library facilities which will enable the Public Library to once again give Grosse Pointe the high quality of Library service it deserves. Every staff member is available to provide information on the February 26th Election which is so vital to the Public Library and Public Schools.

Your Public Library Staff faces the new year with the deepest gratitude to all of the Grosse Pointers who have done so much for the Public Library. As Director, I would like to give a special vote of thanks to the Board of Education, our official board; to the Friends Board of Directors, our advisory board, and to the 1200+ members; to Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools; and to the many residents whose interest in and support of the Public Library has meant so much. Here's wishing to all of you a New Year full of happiness and progress.

Fine Pointes of Real Estate

"How Long Will It Take To Sell My House?"

This is one of the first questions that occur to a homeowner when he lists his house for sale with a broker. A look at the record will provide part of the answer.

Of 51 Grosse Pointe houses put on the market during the month of June, 1967, 30 were sold by the end of July, several of them within a week. Another 12 sold during August, and five more since then. Two are still for sale and two were taken off the market.

However, this is a very active market. In a period when fewer people are buying, a longer time might be expected. Also real estate activity often, but not always, diminishes in certain seasons such as December or the middle of summer.

On the other hand, statistics don't necessarily apply to a specific home. Several other factors help to determine the time necessary to sell a particular house, especially price. If a property is overpriced, it usually remains on the market for months, eventually selling for less than it would have if priced properly in the beginning. Competition, too, is important. A house will sell to better advantage if there are no other competitive homes on the market at the same time.

A few houses possess certain unusual features which limit their appeal to so few people that they may have to remain on the market longer than usual to be exposed to a sufficient number of eligible buyers.

There are other important factors, but we have mentioned enough to demonstrate that there can be no all-inclusive answer, other than to say that the average house usually sells within a few weeks if priced properly.

Harriet McEntee never lied about her age. Oh, she never shouted it out to the rooftops, either; she figured a lady's as old as she looks and feels, (a man, too, for that matter), and the age she calendars SAY a person is isn't really very important . . . But last August, when she turned 70, Harriet decided to tell a few friends exactly how long she HAD been around . . .

Trouble was, they wouldn't believe her. Harriet simply COULDN'T be 70—Seventy-year-old ladies just don't climb on their six-speed English bicycles and take off on 30-mile trips. They don't hike and canoe and climb mountains and camp their way across the country.

They don't chaperone American Youth Hostel groups in Northern Michigan. They don't say, six months AFTER their 70th birthday, "I've gained a little weight. I suppose I'll have to get busy and skip some ropes; that's the best slimmer-downer I know."

Well, when you come right down to it, why in the world don't they? . . . Listen to Harriet:

"It's Inside That Counts. There's lots to life, I think. If you want to slow down, you slow down. People give up, even at 40, but the years don't mean a thing. It's what you are inside, if you feel young, that counts . . ."

"You've got to get out and meet people . . . I like to go downtown on a bus; I've never sat beside a person on a bus whom I haven't talked to . . ."

"If you ask me, the secret of staying young is 'Getting Out.' Get out in the woods, and move! And, above all, get acquainted with younger people. I love the young people today; I think they're a marvelous group . . . The only thing I object to is the way they bring their record players with them everywhere and play that AWFUL music ALL the time!"

Not that Harriet doesn't like music: Her own record player is a prized and much-used personal possession. And her bookshelves bulge.

Omnivorous Reader "I can't remember when I couldn't read," she says, "and my children and grandchildren are the same way."

"I read everything: Books, magazines, newspapers—I like to keep up with current events. I never sit down to eat—alone, that is—unless I have a book or newspaper right beside me."

Some of the things Harriet's been reading lately, and seeing on television, almost literally make her blood boil. She has very strong convictions, especially on Civil Rights:

"We're all human beings. I think we should all have the right to live where we want to live, send our children to the schools we want to send them to . . ."

"And I can't see how ANY adult person, for ANY reason whatsoever, can throw bricks and stones at anyone else's house . . . I just couldn't do it!"

Three Crown Children Harriet and her late husband, Norman, moved to Grosse Pointe some 16 years ago. Harriet's been a widow for 14½ years. Her three children are all grown, with families of their own.

Son Edward and his wife have two sons, Jimmy, currently serving in the Air Force, and Tom, a student at Marquette University. Son Norman J. McEntee, Jr., always known as "Joe," and his wife have two daughters, Maureen and Kathy—"Chatty Kathy, we call her," says Grandma, "because she's always talking."

Always Outdoor Girl

Some of her favorite trips have been American Youth Hostel excursions. Harriet was always on Outdoor Girl. When her children were small, she used to bicycle regularly around Belle Isle with three other young matrons.

She also used to swim three times a week, ("I don't do so much of that any more," she admits—it's the only thing she seems NOT to do so much of any more!), and taught American Red Cross Swimming Classes at various Community Centers in the Metropolitan area.
