the abdomen. Wounded, the policeman fell to the ground, and while on his back, drew his revolver and emptied it at his assailant.

Director Andrews said that Schmalz's shots missed. Four bullets struck the house, and two went astray. Schmalz is an excellent marksman, the director said, but apparently the shock of being hit caused the policeman's aim to be faulty.

Marone said that as he sped to the police cruiser, he heard a series of shots, those fired by his partner, and the blasts from the shotgun, one of which

was fired at him, after Schmalz was wounded. As he turned and aimed to fire, Marone said, Mathews had already disappeared into the house.

House Surrounded

Within minutes after a call was dispatched for help, police officers swarmed into the area and surrounded the house. Schmalz, who managed to crawl to the scout car unaided, was placed on a stretcher by his colleagues and rushed to the hospital, and immediately taken to the emergency operating room.

When Mathews ran into the house after the shooting, his father attempted to wrest the shotgun from him, and in the struggle, Dr. Mathews was battered about the face by the raging son, suffering bruises and cuts.

As the policemen were waiting for further incidents, Mathews' mother, Bertha, came to the door, and motioned for the officers to enter, but she was told to tell her son to come out, with his hands in the air.

Gun Confiscated

Mathews emerged from the house, his hands high, and as he approached, it was said, he shouted "I want a lawyer." Six policemen surrounded and grabbed the man and searched him. The shotgun was found in the house and confiscated and held as evidence.

Dr. Mathews told police that he had had words with his son, and that his son had threatened to kill someone. He had a shotgun in his hand, the father said.

The doctor, a psychologist, said he tried to talk his son into putting down the weapon, and his son kept repeating, "Why don't you call the police."

The father said he finally decided to phone the authorities, and said that he could not explain too much because his son was close by, and after he hung up the phone, he began to edge toward his son.

Blast Hits Cupboard

The doctor told police that he did not know whether it was by accident, or intent, but his son spun around, and the shotgun went off, and the charge struck a kitchen cupboard.

Early Monday morning, several hours after the shooting incident, Director Andrews and Det. Lt. Henry Marchand obtained two warrants approved by Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Joseph Murphy, one, charging Mathews with assault with intent to commit murder, and the second accusing the man with intent to inflict great bodily harm less than the crime of murder.

A short time later, Mathews was arraigned before Woods Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow on the charges, and stood mute on both counts. The judge entered pleas of not guilty and set bond at \$10,000 on each count, and set examination for Wednesday, January 17.

Mathews was remanded to the Wayne County Jail in default of bond to await the examination date.

of my parishioners and their response to this project. I am especially proud of Dr. Sargent and the imagination that motivated him. It was a dramatic and symbolic gesture.

Why Mississippi?

"Some people may ask, why go to Mississippi when Detroit has a need? The answer is that although the need is here, our facilities for meeting the need are a great deal better than Mississippi's."

The church served as a collection depot. Many people, both members of the church and non-members helped. Among the many were Willard Sollenberger and his daughter, Sue; Mr. and Mrs. William Kessler, Max Osos of Sam's stores, who gave 2,000 pounds of clothing and cash; Msgr. Clement Kern, of Holy Trinity Church; Leonard Kaskle, who gave 500 pounds of flour; Mrs. Susan Smith (a former Army nurse who purchased staple items from Selridge's post exchange with some of the money collected); Drs. Richard and Editha Sterba and Donald Hines.

Under the direction of David Meserve, Dr. Meserve's son, the truck was loaded with 8,200 pounds over and above the weight of the truck. The loading was completed on Wednesday and on Thursday, Harrop Miller, a Wayne State medical student, and Dr. Sargent left for Mississippi.

Drove Straight Through

"We left about 1:30 and drove straight through," Dr. Sargent reports, "arriving in Jackson at 1 o'clock on Friday afternoon. We left one-third of our load at the NAACP headquarters there then drove to Yazoo City and left the rest of the load with Father John M. Kist, SVD, head of the St. Francis Divine Word Missionaries."

Father Kist then took us around Brickyard Hill, a shabby collection of houses in Yazoo City where the poorest lived. One family of 14 subsisted on 48 cents a day per person, which had to cover food, rent and clothing."

Dr. Sargent said that the poverty and sickness among the people there were unbelievable. Most of the Negroes are poor and suffer constantly from segregation, indifference and neglect by state and county agencies.

"It's not fair to say that the men of the household don't try. They do, but they can't get jobs and usually are too malnourished and demoralized by a system of peonage to have much initiative."

Dr. Sargent, who is a member of the Grosse Pointe Human Relations Council, adds, "When a public policy of segregation in housing and education is allowed to stand unchallenged the end result is misery of the kind we saw in Yazoo City. The ultimate solution to this misery is through law and government to correct the wrongs done against these people. This will probably have to include federal aid on a large scale."

Dr. Sargent says that the poor in Yazoo City could use a truckload of food and clothing a day, and that anyone interested in helping them could do so by sending food and clothing to Father John M. Kist, SVD, c/o St. Francis Rectory Divine Word Missionaries, Yazoo City, Miss.

Dr. Sargent has made the gesture. Can we make it a continuing one?

Lawrence F. Kennedy, Assistant Superintendent-Professional Personnel, presented a proposal for the modification of the system's policy of maternity leave. The Board members agreed to the temporary suspension of the current requirement of two years' absence. The trustees empowered the administration to deal with individual requests for an earlier return to duty. The revised policy is subject to approval by the Grosse Pointe Educational Association.

In other business the trustees accepted the low bid of Clarrington, Incorporated, for cabinetry for Grosse Pointe North High School. J. Edward Snell, purchasing agent for the schools, presented the information on the bids as well as on the acquisition of furniture, equipment and materials for Grosse Pointe North High School.

An exhaustive progress report on Grosse Pointe North High School was made by Robert J. Domke, architectural Project Administrator, William Ashley, Director of Production, and Arthur Lewis, Construction Superintendent. It appears now that the entire project, with the exception of the auditorium-instructional center, will be substantially completed by late February or early March.

The trustees acted upon a variety of routine appointments of professional staff, full-time substitutes, leaves of absence, and resignations.

The members of the Board of Education approved several change orders in the construction of Grosse Pointe North High School. The trustees accepted the report of Ray MacArthur, Director of Business and Finance.

Prior to adjournment Trustee Fuchs moved that the members of the Board rescind their action to allow the Grosse Pointe Human Relations Council to use the gymnasium for the March 14 address by the Reverend Martin Luther King.

President Hykes said that the

local Human Relations Council had been granted permission to use the high school's gymnasium consistent with the Board of Education's long-standing policy to make facilities available to community organizations. She added that the Board of Education is not a participating sponsor of the March 14 gathering.

Mrs. Joseph P. Thompson, Secretary of the Board of Education, read the written policy of the Board of Education on the use of public buildings by community groups.

Following extensive discussion, in which members of the Board and the members of the audience discussed the matter, the motion to rescind permission was defeated.

pital for treatment and released.

A section of the ceiling of the house fell on Cpl. Jack Patterson, who suffered a sprained neck and shoulder, and Patrolman Lee Cochill suffered a sprained knee while chopping a hole in the roof. The officers were also treated at the hospital.

Patrolman Peter Thomas received a slight left shoulder sprain, but did not require medical attention.

Smoke Engulfs House
Director Andrews said that two fire trucks, including the Snorkel, from the Woods, manned by eight men, answered the initial alarm, called in by the owner of the house. When the firefighters arrived, the house was completely engulfed by smoke, and the second alarm was given.

Harper Woods dispatched an engine and five men, 10 off-duty Woods public safety officers and volunteers were summoned, and the reserve engine dispatched from the Woods station.

According to information given to the public safety officials by Wood, nothing appeared to be amiss in the den where he was engaged in some business work. He was home alone. He left the den to let in the three pet dogs from outside, and was wiping off their paws when he smelled smoke.

Wood said he checked the kitchen and dining room, and saw the fire in the den. The blaze had started on the floor near the north wall, and he tried to stomp it out with his feet. The blaze ignited his left shoe and trousers, which he quickly put out.

Falls To Douse Flames
The home owner said he tried to beat out the flames with small rugs, and when this failed, he attempted to put it out with a bucket of water. He was forced to leave the den when the fire spread to his desk, drawing board, and the wooden sheet paneling in the den.

Wood said he managed to get two of the family pets out of the house, and when he went back into the house for the third, the Dachshund, the intense heat and smoke made the rescue attempt impossible. He said he had to kick open the rear door to escape, suffering minor lacerations on both feet.

Public safety officers found the Dachshund under a piece of furniture, dead, Director Andrews said.

Held at Bay by Dog
When firefighters tried to enter the house, through the front door, they were driven back by the intense heat and heavy smoke. They went to the rear of the house, where one of the rescued pets, a Doberman Pinscher, momentarily kept them at bay. When they finally entered the house, the firemen found that the fire had penetrated into the attic.

Director Andrews said that firemen put out the fire in the den and family room several times, but the blaze would start afresh, due to the heat from the attic, which was still blazing.

Cochill climbed to the roof and chopped two holes in it, to vent the attic, and water was poured through the openings. This failed to douse the fire. At this point, the roof began to sag, and Cochill leaped to safety, injuring his knee. The roof section collapsed, hitting Patterson on the neck and shoulder.

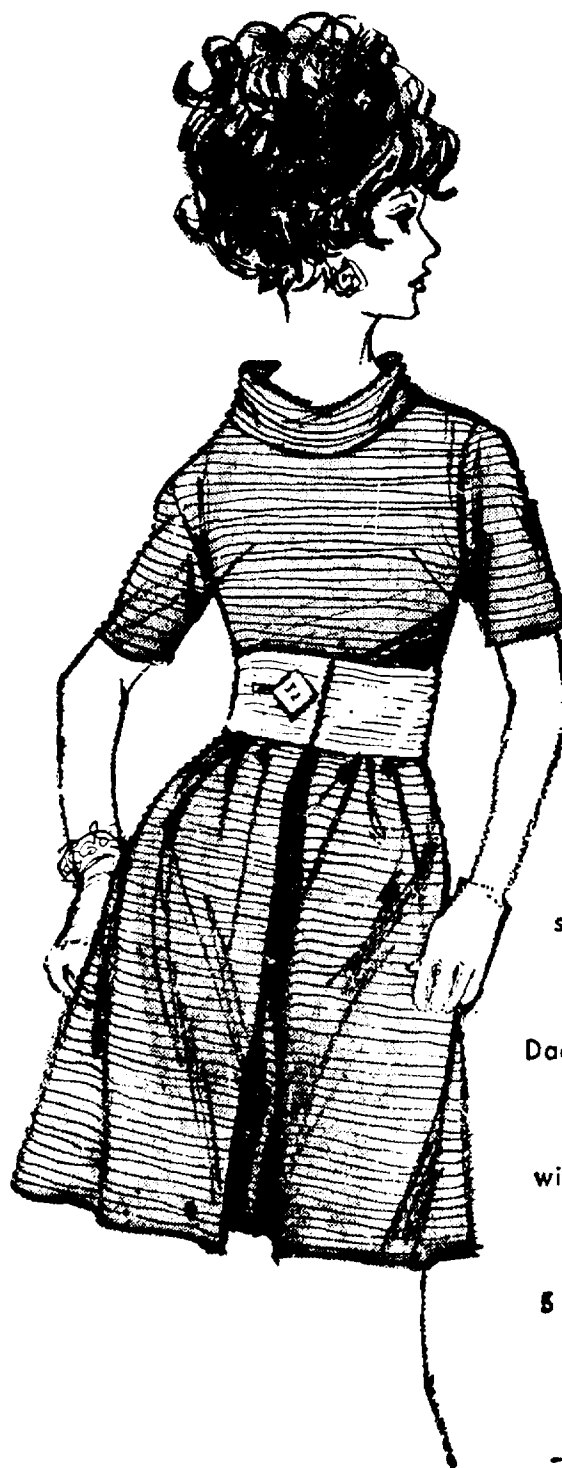

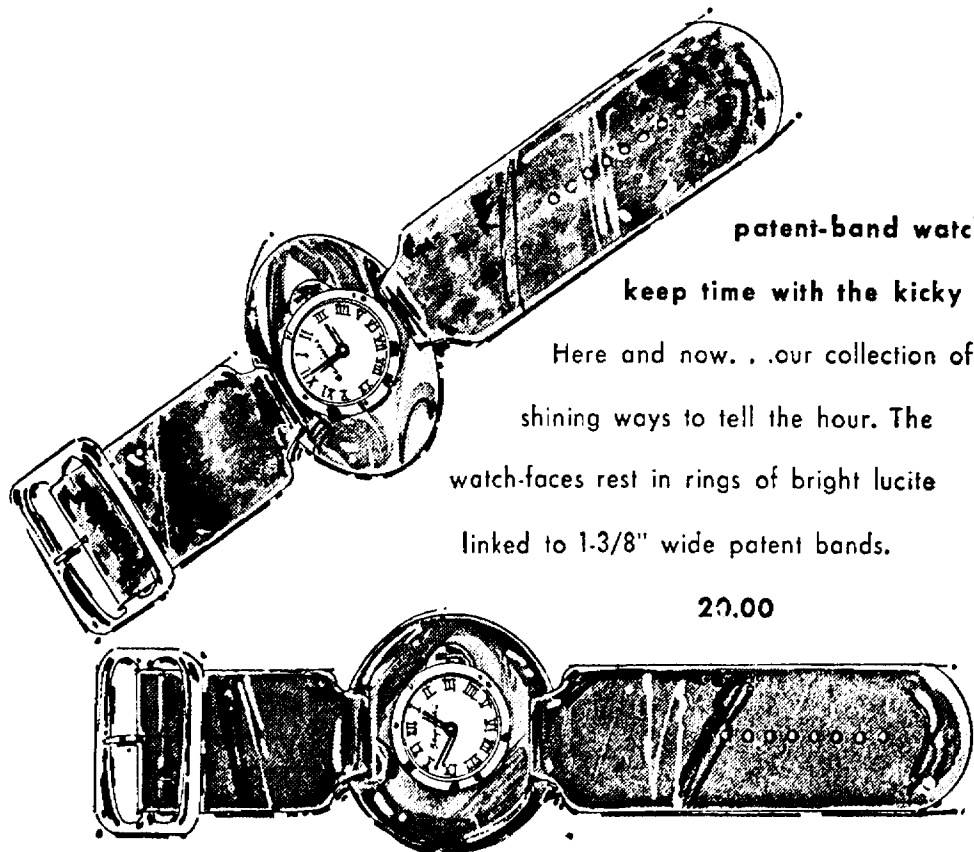

University School News

This year for the first time the school is teaching to sixth and tenth graders courses in sex education. At the tenth grade the course is called "Life Planning" and the instructor is the Rev. Gary Gruber of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, Presbyterian.

It is not just a course in sex education but is rather an attempt to help the students see their lives wholly and interdependently. The first term has largely been about "sexuality" and "personality." Attention has also been given to the relationships one enjoys with family, friends and each other.

Various articles and books have been used as reference materials in the library and written assignments have been completed by the students—all on a voluntary basis. During the second term a textbook, "Love and Sex in Plain Language" by Eric Johnson, will be used. The school also hopes to employ competent professionals in medicine, psychiatry, religion, and sociology to complement the course.

In a report to the Board of Trustees Mr. Gruber raised several questions which adults might justifiably ask.

1. Doesn't giving young people information and education in human sexuality make them want to experiment? The opposite seems to be true, according to Mr. Gruber, because those

students who are equipped with sound and correct information seem less apt to experiment.

2. How can the instructor avoid being "moralistic" or taking a stand? Mr. Gruber feels that one cannot avoid it and that that is precisely where part of the strength in such a course lies. Any school hiring a teacher expresses confidence in his known viewpoints.

The Life Planning class in the sixth grade is not simply to attempt to provide sex education for pre-teens. The course has been divided into two main divisions, human relations and human reproduction. The initial segment of the class will be spent discussing such topics as personality development, home and family relationships, friendship and social behavior, and the development of attitudes, values, and goals. The remaining portion of the course will be devoted to a study of human reproduction and growth. Richard Erksen, Principal of the Middle School, will be the instructor for most of the sessions.

As the program continues during the year, various professional personnel will be invited to participate and share their professional competence with the students. It should be pointed out that the Life Planning Committee consisted of teachers, clergymen, physicians, parents and psychologists.

Classes meet once each week. There are approximately 22 students in each section. During the initial stages of the course, boys and girls participate in the discussions together. The youngsters will be separated for some segments as the discussions become involved in more sensitive topics. It is a goal of the course to avoid the usual lecture-recitation format found in many classes. The sixth graders are encouraged to ask questions and contribute to the activities of each class. A vigorous dialogue is developing very nicely in the classes.

It is the goal of the Life Planning course in the sixth grade to help students develop a more complete understanding of human relationships and reproduction. It is hoped that they will grow to see themselves as complicated and involved individuals operating in a rapidly moving, fast changing society, and that their experience in these classes will better prepare them to make decisions and formulate the necessary as they grow to maturity.

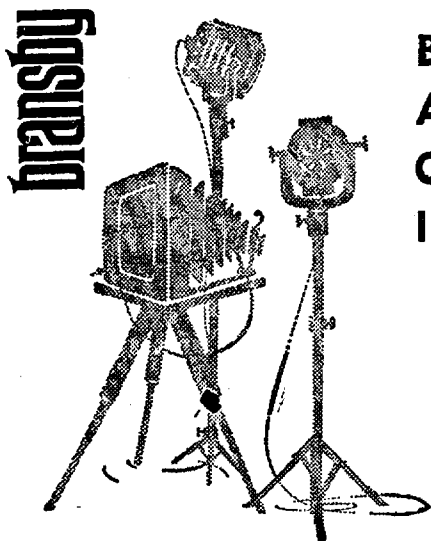

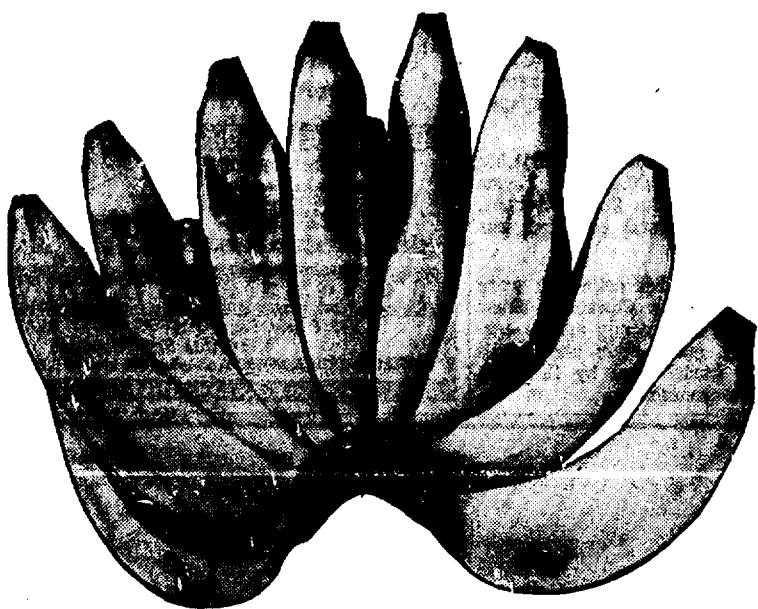

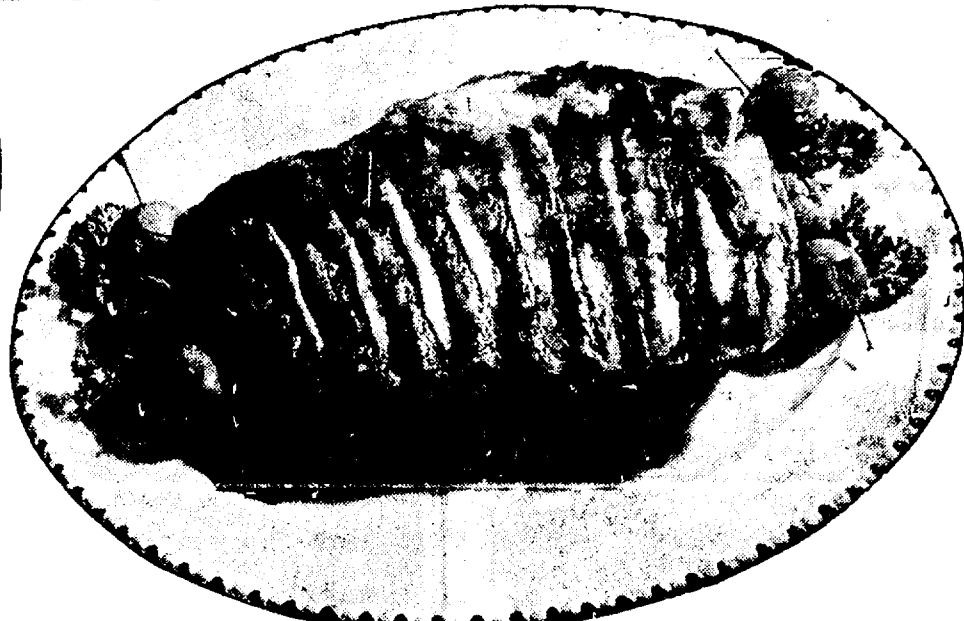

The five-block-long Street of Early American Shops in Henry Ford Museum forms the background for this three-dimensional look at the evolution of sports vehicles in this country. The theme of the 1968 Sports Car Show is "Great American Sports and Racing Cars." Among the great American sports cars on hand will be such glamorous and memorable machines as the Kissel Gold Bug, Mercer Raceabout, Stutz Bearcat and Auburn Speedster. The Auburn will be matched by its contemporary counterpart, the 1958 Auburn Speedster 886, to be on view for the first time in the Detroit area. The great racing cars primarily will be autos that took part in cross-country or international events such as the Thomas Flyer. With that car will stand the famed Packard "Old Pacific," 1903 winner of a dash from New York to San Francisco, and the Ford No. 2 Racer that captured the Guggenheim Trophy in 1909 in a rush from New York to Seattle. New York was also the starting point for another winner that will appear in the show, the Oldsmobile "Old Scout" that led the pack into Portland, Oregon in 1905. On the first three Friday nights of the sports car show, a guest speaker will present an illustrated talk in the Henry Ford Museum theater. The last Friday night of the show will be devoted to a sports car fashion show. The son of the man who won the "longest auto race," George Schuster, Jr., of Springville, N.Y., will tell of his father's accomplishment on January 12. He will be followed on January 19 by Richard A. Teague, American Motors Corporation vice-president for automotive design. His topic will be "Horseless Carriages: Then, Now and Tomorrow," in which he will tell of interesting design experiments by car makers of the past, current activities in his company's AMS program, and what may come in the future. Advanced concepts manager for Ford Motor's product development group, Roy C. Lunn, will describe the "Evolution of the Ford GT and its Racing History" on January 26. He will incorporate both slides and motion pictures in his talk. Each speaker will begin at 8:30 p.m. At several times daily during the 24-day run of "Sports Cars in Review" a movie about the history of racing entitled "The Titans" will be shown in the Museum theater. Elsewhere there will be a photo art exhibit depicting racing action. Some 50 cars from seven nations will be included in the 1968 sports car show in Henry Ford Museum at Greenfield Village.

City Is Winner Of Lions Trophy



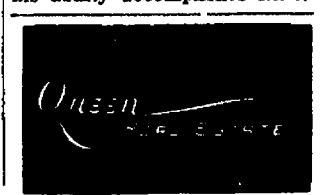

Or Multiple Listing?

When a homeowner is confronted for the first time with the necessity of selling his property, he seldom is familiar with the customary procedure of marketing real estate. "Why should I list it exclusively with one broker," he asks, "when I can list it with a multiple listing system and all the members will offer it to their clients?"

The answer is that he can do both simultaneously. A broker with no such affiliation may, if he wishes, discourage cooperation from other firms as long as he has hopes of finding a buyer himself. However, a listing given to any member of a multiple listing organization such as the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Board is automatically listed with all its members. Thus a property owner may put his house in the care of a single Realtor of his choice who handles the advertising and promotion, but the owner also benefits from the tremendous sales potential of the entire organization.

If the listing Realtor sells the property, he receives the entire commission. If the buyer is obtained by a second broker, either a member or non-member of the organization, the same commission is shared. The mechanics of these systems may differ in various communities but the principle is the same. Many years were required to perfect the well-organized multiple listing system of today, but it has resulted in great benefits to the buyer as well as the seller of real estate.

Increased Mail Rates In Effect

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail went into effect January 7. Postmaster Edward L. Baker reminded postal customers today.

The new rate for first-class letters will be 6 cents, and for air mail letters 10 cents. Ordinary post cards will be 5 cents and air mail post cards 8 cents.

Baker said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on mail weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

Postmaster Baker said that the new rate structure will mean

a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, he said.

He emphasized that the new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until January 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

The Postmaster also noted that effective January 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1952, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand," Baker said, "for those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates also went into effect January 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local Post Office.

What Goes On at Your Library

What is a library? It is a building — sometimes large, sometimes small — filled with shelves, books, magazines, pamphlets, chairs, tables, carrels, desks, typewriters, audio-visual equipment, art prints, aquariums — even sometimes a tool collection!

What is a library? It is a collection of people, old and young, who are seeking the materials the library provides — seeking answers to questions, specific books, sometimes by particular authors or on special subjects.

What is a library? It is a haven of refuge for weary feet, for those who have passed the day amid much din and commotion, and enter this building at a quiet hour to have time for reflection and meditation.

What is a library? It is a cacophony of teen-agers, when school is out, seeking school assignments, help for outside reading, or perhaps just meeting a friend or two.

What is a library? It is a group of brightly-dressed preschoolers, standing in line for story hour, and then later seated around the children's librarian, drinking in her every word as she tells them stories, old and new — but all absorbing.

What is a library? It is the quiet pleasure of ordering new books, or added copies of old titles, unpacking them in their new and shining dust jackets, and later, after they are processed, having the satisfaction of seeing them brighten up the shelves, and brighten the faces of patrons who are looking for something new to read.

What is a library? It is the slush of boots on a rainy or snowy day, the rustle of umbrellas and rain hats. It is the crackle of newspapers being unwrapped from books being returned. It is the moist, damp smell that results from such a day.

What is a library? It is the shrill of a telephone — a patron calling to ask a reference question; it is the muted rumble of book trucks as student assistants shelve the books; it is the ring of the cash register as patrons pay fines for overdue books.

What is a library? At Christmas time, it is the brightly lit Christmas tree — possibly in the children's room; it is the smell of pine from the green and red wreaths; it is the Yuletide excitement in the air, possibly even some background carols.

What is a library? It is the satisfied young man exiting from the library with a power sander under his arm, dreaming of all his do-it-yourself projects ahead of him for the weekend.

What is a library? It is the toddler's look of wonder and happiness, as he stares, with pudgy fingers pressed against the glass wall of the aquarium, at the fish flashing by.

What is a library? It is a steady stream of men and women marching upstairs to the meeting room to listen to book reviews or possibly join a discussion group of some sort — and this ascent (and later descent) can take place morning, noon or night.

What is a library? It is the college student in the Adult Room, pipe in mouth and eyes focused on books and papers, as he writes a term paper.

What is a library? It is the contented look on a little girl's face as she emerges from the library with a pile of books, including several she's been looking for for months, plus one the children's librarian asked her to try.

What is a library? It is a gaggle of students gathered around the card catalog, seeking what? Subjects, new and old authors, materials on a certain topic for a history assignment. They are also, we hope, learning how to use the material contained on the catalog card, the meaning of the Dewey decimal number, and the location of these books in their particular library.

What is a library? It is a group of visitors being proudly shown through the building. They may be visiting librarians or touring patrons from another city — they are always welcome.

What is a library? It is the sharp, keening cry of a toddler, standing in the middle of a large room, completely abandoned by his mother, who is probably not more than two feet away — but in his own mind he is lost, and he intends to tell the whole world about it!

What is a library? It is all these things — and more. Make no mistake, it is far more than a silent collection of lifeless books sitting limply on shelves and guarded by sexless crones. It can be a quiet place — it can also be raucous, lively, exhilarating, exciting. It all depends on your staff and your public. We like to think that the Grosse Pointe Public Library meets the last four adjectives.

Motorists Take Big Tax Jumps

Michigan motorists' state gasoline taxes increased 17 percent January 1 when the state gas tax was raised from six to seven cents a gallon. Automobile Club of Michigan reports.

This brings total state gas and weight taxes paid by Michigan motorists each year to almost \$325,000,000, adding \$34 million. Price of 1969 auto license plates (called the weight tax) will increase 57 percent also, adding another \$28 million in revenue for highway-building in 1969.

"Michigan motorists paid over \$700 million in state and federal taxes for owning and operating their cars before these increases," Auto Club General Manager Fred N. Rehm said. "The \$28,866,000 they paid in Michigan gas and weight taxes in 1966 equalled 19.4 percent of the state's total tax revenue that year," he added.

"Before the current increase, it already cost a Michigan motorist over \$600 in state and federal taxes to buy and operate a low-price car for one year, assuming he drove 10,000 miles per year," Rehm said. The two new taxes will add from \$16 to \$20 to the average motorist's driving bill per year.

Michigan ranks seventh in the nation in total gasoline consumption (3 billion gallons) with California (7 billion) in first place and Alaska (73 million) in the fifth spot.

The U.S. Bureau of Public Roads estimates that nearly 78 billion gallons of fuel have been consumed by the nation's motor vehicles in 1967, an increase of 4.3 percent over 1966. This year, upwards of 80 billion gallons of fuel will be used.

The Bureau estimates that in 1968, state and highway user tax revenues in the United States will surpass the \$8 billion mark. Federal revenues on motor vehicles are expected to reach \$3 billion and state taxes \$5 billion.

Sunday, January 7

GOVERNOR GEORGE ROMNEY, who only last Wednesday returned from a tour abroad, will head for New Hampshire Thursday night to woo voters in the nation's first presidential primary which will be held on March 12. He will visit villages and cities through New Hampshire for five days then stop at the state capitol in Concord to file as a Republican candidate.

THE PRODUCERS of the movie "Bonnie and Clyde" are facing a damage suit brought against them by the widow and the son of the late Captain Frank Hamer of the Texas Rangers. The \$1,750,000 damage suit charges defamation of character and invasion of privacy. The petition charged that the movie depicted Hamer as "an incompetent and a malicious officer when in fact, he was a dedicated and heroic man."

FOUR HIGHLAND PARK policemen were charged Saturday with possession and concealment of stolen goods. The officers, including two brothers, were charged after a tip to Highland Park Police Chief William E. Stephens. Search warrants were obtained Friday and the arrests made that evening. Police found television sets, tape recorders, cameras, musical instruments and other goods in the homes. The materials reportedly came from the burglaries of three Highland Park businesses on January 1, December 25 and December 14. The accused officers are: Thomas Pitton, 26; his brother, Michael Pitton, 24; John Vaughn, 30; and Norman Bledsoe, 24. Conviction on the felony charges carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison.

Monday, January 8

THE FIRST UNITED STATES' human heart transplant between adults was performed by a team of American doctors who finally got "the right combination." The technique used was developed by the team's leader, Dr. Norman D. Shumway over a 17-year period. The same method was used by South African surgeon Dr. Christian Barnard when he became the first man in history to perform a heart transplant.

The patient was 54-year-old Mike Kasperk. He was operated on Saturday night, the operation took 4½ hours. He received the heart of 43-year-old housewife, Virginia Mae White, who died of a massive brain hemorrhage.

KERCHEL SCHWARTZ, president of the Amalgamated Transit Union, Division 26 (AFL-CIO), representing DSR bus drivers said Sunday he would back drivers who refuse to take night runs unless the city acts to prevent holdups.

He said he would take his appeal to this month's meeting of the DSR commission.

THE PENNIMAN BUILDING, on a side street less than a block from the heart of downtown Plymouth was burned out Sunday after a devastating fire which began at 1 p.m., raged on into the night. Firefighters from Plymouth and five nearby communities fought the fire in zero cold and bitter winds. Near midnight the fire was reported contained within the building. Nearby structures were unscathed.

Tuesday, January 9

Pressure is being brought to bear against President Johnson to challenge North Vietnam on its policy toward peace talks. Senator Charles Percy, R-Ill., and Senator Eugene McCarthy, D-Minn., said that the United States should cut back on its

bombing to test Hanoi's recent indications that such a move would lead to peace talks. William P. Bundy, assistant secretary of far eastern affairs, said he remained skeptical that North Vietnam was actually ready for peace talks.

Wednesday, January 10

Chester Bowles, U.S. ambassador to India and President Johnson's special envoy, arrived Monday in Phnompenh, Cambodia, to seek Prince Norodom Sihanouk's help in keeping North Vietnamese and Vietcong forces from using Cambodia as a sanctuary. However, Cambodian chief of state, Sihanouk, had already told a news conference that Bowles' mission was doomed.

Eight Detroit area businessmen have been charged with evading Michigan taxes on millions of cigarettes brought into the state from North Carolina. The men face payment of \$245,586 in taxes and penalties. The case was broken after more than six months of investigation by state revenue agent, State Police and the F.B.I. Jesse B. Eggleston, chief of the out-county office of the Wayne County prosecutor, issued the warrants for the arrests. The eight were released on bond. They are scheduled to appear January 15 before Judge Anthony Nacita.

GP Park Dog Licenses Due

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers disclosed that he has issued department to issue violation tickets to dog owners who have failed to purchase 1968 tags for their pets.

The chief pointed out that under a city ordinance, January 1 of each year is the dog license due date, and urges all owners who have not yet done so, to comply with the law. Compliance would save police manpower for far more important problems, he added.

He also pointed out that the dog license fee is now three dollars, and in order to buy such a license, owners must have in their possession at the time of application, a certificate of proof that their animals have been vaccinated.

He said that a license tag may be obtained this month, January, on a valid certificate that expires in March.

The License Bureau is located on the second floor of the Municipal Building, 15115 East Jefferson. The hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays; and from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Wednesdays. The bureau is closed on Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays.

Chief Louwers reminds dog owners that their pets must be on a leash when taken for a walk, and when kept at home, must be in a closed, fenced-in area when allowed outdoors. If in an automobile, then the animal must be kept in such a manner that it cannot escape. Owners of dogs running-at-large will be given violation tickets, the chief added.

The pupils in Mrs. Jennie Dombrowski's fourth grade class at Richard School considered themselves very fortunate when in learning about Louis Braille they were able to have an expert explain the highly complex process of the braille system of reading and writing for the blind.

Mrs. Donald Webster, a former patron of the school and a member of the Grosse Pointe Braille Club which transcribes

books for the blind, fascinated the children by her demonstration seeing a stylus and guide, and feeling with their finger

Veterans Homestead Tax Exemptions

The following persons may qualify for this tax exemption, provided they do not own taxable property in excess of \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation and meet the state residence requirements:

- Persons currently serving in the Armed Forces
- Unmarried widows of former servicemen who served in World War I, World War II, or the Korean Conflict
- Disabled veterans currently drawing disability compensation
- Blind persons meeting the statutory definition for blindness.

Disabled veterans occupying specially adapted housing may qualify for total tax exemption without meeting the valuation limitation or residency limitations.

Senior Citizens Tax Exemptions

Certain persons may qualify for this tax exemption provided the following qualifications are met:

- Own and occupy property as a homestead on December 31, 1967
- Be of the age of 65 or over
- Have been a resident of Michigan for at least five out of the last ten years immediately preceding application
- Have a gross income, combined with the income of a spouse, for the immediate preceding calendar year of not more than \$5,000
- Do not own taxable property in excess of \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation.

A person shall be allowed to file one exemption, either Veterans Homestead Tax Exemption or Senior Citizens Tax Exemption. Senior Citizens are allowed a \$2,500 reduction in their assessment at State Equalized Valuation whereas Veterans or Widows are allowed a \$2,000 reduction under the Veterans Homestead Tax Exemption.

Annual Veterans Homestead Tax Exemptions and Senior Citizens Tax Exemption Affidavits for 1968 must be filed on or before March 26, 1968 at the office of the City Assessor, 20025 Mack Avenue, Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan.

Pointer of Interest

"I wouldn't have done it if it hadn't been for my husband . . . he sort of trapped me into applying," smiles Peg Durkin. Peg is referring to the application she submitted to the American Association of University Women for a Mature Woman's Scholarship, (although Peg smarts a bit at the "mature woman" title).

The scholarships are awarded yearly by the AAUW to women over 35 who have graduated from college with at least a bachelor's degree, BUT who have been out of touch with school or work for a few years. The scholarships are intended to encourage women to obtain masters degrees and return to full-time academic work and to prepare for faculty careers in administration, research or teaching on the college level.

Saw It In The News
Peg read about the scholarship in The News and casually mentioned it to her husband, Jim, who thought it was a great program. Daily he asked Peg if she had sent her application in and daily Peg hedged, (after all, it had been 13 years since she'd been in school and she did have three small children at home!).

Then one bright day Jim took Peg to his office, sat her down at a typewriter and said, "All right, fill out these forms." Out of his pocket came the AAUW scholarship blanks.

So fill them out she did, and it wasn't long before she heard that she had been selected for an interview.

Don't Have To Be Genius
"You don't have to be a genius to get the scholarship," protests Peg, "just a good average student." The AAUW requires a transcription from the applicant's college. In Peg's case, this was the University of Illinois. (Prior to attending Illinois, Peg went to Mount St. Clare Junior College in Iowa.)

After the AAUW committee has seen the transcript, a personal interview is arranged. Peg reports: "The interview was just a pleasant chat over coffee with Mrs. Howard B. Green, College Faculty Program chairman. After the interview I filled out more information forms, gave three references and waited."

"In March of '67 I was told that I had been selected as one of the nine Michigan women who had won the grant . . . I was thrilled and scared all at the same time."

Children Considered
"You know, the best thing about this kind of a grant is that it is geared for women with children. A stipend is provided which covers expenses incurred while the woman is taking classes. In my case it covered a baby sitter and household help."

The Association recognizes that a woman's first obligation is to her family and unless provisions are made for them during the time mother is in class, a woman just can't leave her home."

Peg attended classes three afternoons a week . . . on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:30 (two- and three-hour classes) and on Fridays from 1:30 to 5:30. Because of this schedule Peg came up with a delightful idea about Friday night meals.

Party Every Friday
"Friday night has become party night at our house," she smiles mischievously. "That night the children fix a party. They set the table, arrange the centerpiece and select just exactly what they like to eat . . . provided it is something that can be picked up or made quickly, like pancakes."

"If anyone stopped by on one of our party nights they'd be a bit surprised seeing the five of us drinking orangeade out of wine glasses," she giggles.

Only as creative a woman as Peg Durkin could come up with this kind of positive idea. She

claims it was out of sheer necessity because he was usually exhausted on Friday evenings and yet she wanted to be pleasant and enjoy her family.

Very Young Hosts

Peg's children are still very young so the party night is even more incredible. Tommy is six, Erin Kathleen is five and Carey Kennedy, (she was born on the day President Kennedy was killed), is four.

Peg started classes under the grant in September of '67 at Wayne State University and Merrill-Palmer Institute. She is working in the Home Economics Department for her MA in Child Development. Her courses include one in Child Development at Wayne and one called New Perspectives in Child Development at Merrill Palmer.

"You know, at first I thought the other students would wonder what this funny housewife was doing in college, but I soon learned that the trend toward the mature woman returning to campus is on the upswing."

Study Habits Change

"I did find that my study habits had changed since my undergraduate days. No longer can I stay up until 2 a.m. cramming for that exam . . . now if I haven't learned it by 10 p.m. I'm just not going to."

Peg grins sheepishly as she recalls her first day back in school, "I was absolutely giddy. I didn't stop talking for a minute . . . funny, I didn't realize 'til class was over just what I had done . . . after that day I kept quiet and learned."

"With more and more mature women returning to campus maybe some day there will be a tea room at Wayne . . . I frankly admit that the student union is a bit much for a "mature woman" to take as a steady diet . . . it rattles the nerves a bit. I got so I'd pack my lunch . . . in a "Rat Patrol" lunchbox."

They Share Lunch Box

There's a story behind the lunchbox: "Tommy and I share it," says Peg. "He wanted one and I needed one, so we pooled our resources and came up with one lunchbox. I must admit I was a wee bit embarrassed at first about carrying it, but now it's just part of my back-to-school uniform."

"Speaking of back-to-school uniforms I soon learned that a little afternoon tea dress just doesn't fit in the college classroom. I'm back in skirts and sweaters and loving it," she adds. (No wonder: Peg is petite and regardless of all her talk about the mature woman, she doesn't look any older than most college students herself.)

Incidentally, Peg reminds prospective college returnees that it is once again time for women to apply for these grants. Deadline date is January 15. Further information can be obtained by calling Mrs. David Howell, TU 1-5027.

Sponsored by AAUW

The program is called The College Faculty Program and is sponsored by the Michigan Division of the American Association of University Women in cooperation with the Education Foundation of the Association. Women 35 years of age or older with at least a Bachelor's degree are encouraged to apply.

As for Peg, she started her second quarter on January 8, and she's filled with enthusiasm and optimism. "The second

quarter just can't be as filled with calamities as the first one was," she smiles.

During the first quarter Peg was bitten by a spider, moved into a new home — and a distant relative from Ireland paid her an unexpected visit. Somehow Peg made it through all these minor catastrophes without scarring herself or her family and had a successful, rewarding quarter to boot. "Of course, the professors were very understanding," she says.

Plan to Redecorate

Peg and Jim still have a lot of redecorating plans for their house, but they are approaching them gradually, so that ultimately they will be happy with the results.

Peg's husband is an attorney on the legal staff at General Motors. During the Kennedy Administration he was with "Organized Crime." Peg can't say enough about how much Jim has helped her with her back-to-school plans.

"A must for any woman who goes back to school is an enthusiastic husband — not just agreeable, enthusiastic," she insists.

Collects Old Silver

When Peg isn't taking care of her family, cooking or attending classes, she spends her spare time collecting Victorian silver.

Her favorite piece is an as-yet-undiscovered tiered server complete with tiny pans. She picked it up for a song and wasn't sure just what it was used for. So, when the antique show came to Liggett School she hurried down to show it to the experts. Although they, too, couldn't identify it they wanted to buy it from her . . . which only made Peg hang on to it for dear life. She is still investigating!

Peg frankly admits that her collecting has to take a back seat to her family and her classes right now. But then, something has to.

In the meantime, Peg will use her knowledge acquired at Wayne and Merrill-Palmer in her role as a mother . . . after all she IS studying Child Development. And, from what we could see of her very well adjusted children, she's putting her knowledge to good use!
