Thursday, January 4 IN PARIS THE first secretary of the North Vietnamese mission called in an American newsman and pointed out that a statement made Monday by North Vietnam's foreign minister changed the conditions under which Hanoi would agree to talks. Minister Nguyen Van Trinh said his nation would hold talks with the United States after the U.S. unconditionally stops the bombing and other acts of war against North Viet-nam. Previously North Vietnamese spokesmen had said only that talks could start under those circumstances.

DR. PHILIP BLAIBERG, the world's third heart transplant patient, is said to be doing "very well." Dr. Christian Barnard, who led a 30-man team which performed the operation said he was "optimistic" that Blaiberg would survive. Blaiberg, a dentist, was reportedly "fully conscious and in good condition" following the five hour operation performed Tues-day. He was given the heart of Clive Haupt, 24-year-old mu-latto, who had died of a stroke early Tuesday.

THE OAKLAND COUNTY Health Department Wednesday urged persons who purchased corned beef from the Bottle and Basket restaurant, 190 N. Hunter, Birmingham, to destroy it. The beef is believed to be contaminated and to have caused 100 cases of a non-fatal type of food poisoning, known as staphylococcal food poisoning. This is a mild disease that is usually accompanied by stomach cramps and vomiting.



Woods Policeman School Board Out to Sell Voting Public By Irate Resident

Patrolman Donald Schmaltz Hit By Shotgun Blast Fired By Youth Who Had Been Quarreling With His Parents

A Woods public safety officer was shot in the abdomen by a 12-gauge shotgun fired by a 24-year-old Woods resident, who, police said, had been quarreling with his parents, and who had threatened to "kill someone". The shooting occurred shortly after midnight on Monday, January 8.

Reported in fair condition following an emergency operation at St. John Hospital is Patrolman Donaid Schmaltz, who was Demolished hit by the blast fired by Frederick Mason Mathews, of 1708 Lochmoor boulevard.

Mrs. Paul G. Hykes, president of the Grosse ointe Board of Education, has announced that the trustees of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education will conduct an exhaustive campaign to inform all members of the community of the issues of the February 26 bond and millage election for the schools and public libraries.

On December 18 the trustees took official action to set February 26 as the date when registered voters will be asked to give approval to three pro-

Proposition #1 is a request for 7½ mills for operation for a two-year period. The funds are needed to keep Grosse Pointe competitive with salary schedules of other nearby school systems. The money will be used to help operate Grosse Pointe North High School, slated to open in September, as well as to meet increased costs of operating all schools and public

Looking To Future

If it is passed, Proposition #2 will levy one mill for building and site purposes over a 10-year period to finance needed additions to elementary buildings, to modernize portions of Grosse Pointe South High School, and to improve middle school fa-cilities.

Exclusive Listing Or Multiple Listing?

When a homeowner is confronted for the first time with the necessity of selling his property, he seldom is familiar with the customary procedure of marketing real estate. "Why should I list it exclusively with one broker," he asks, "when I can list it with a multiple listing system and all the members." will offer it to their clients?"

The answer is that he can do

both simultaneously. A broker with ro such affiliation may, if he wishes, discourage coopera-tion from other firms as long as he has hopes of finding a buyer himself. However, a listing given to any member of a multiple listing organization such as the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Board is automatically listed with all its members. Thus a property owner may put his house in the care of a single Realtor of his choice who handles the advertising and promo tion, but the owner also benefits from the tremendous sales potential of the entire organiza-

If the listing Realtor sells the property, he receives the entire commission. If the buyer is obtained by a second broker, either a member or non-member of the organization, the same commission is shared. The mechanics of these systems may differ in various communities but the principle is the same.
