STRONG NEW EARTH-QUAKE shook western Sicily today, burying rescue workers still digging for bodies from the island's worst quake disaster in 60 years. The tremor killed at least four persons and injured about 50, police reported. The epicenter of the new tremors was in the same poverty-stricken countryside where about 500 were killed on January 15.

PIECES OF ONE or more hydrogen bombs aboard an Air Force B52 that crashed off Greenland Sunday have been located according to information released by the Pentagon. It added however, it still wasn't known if parts of the plane or of the four nuclear weapons aboard went in or through the ice. The Pentagon did not specify where the pieces were found and whether significant amounts were located.

(Continued from Page 4) and the records kept at the pumping station will be fed into

pumping station will be fed into a computer to reconstruct the events of a storm. As each storm is added to the computer, Dow expects a generalized pattern to emerge which will allow the effects of future storms to be predicted so that personnel at the pumping station can be ready with the right chemicals at the right time.

Plan Scale Model
A working scale model of the
Milk River pumping station will
be built to examine in miniature
the behavior of stormwater at
the station. The model will be
used to test any changes in the
structure of the station which
could increase the effectiveness

of the chemical treatment. The primary chemicals to be used are various organic flocculants, or poly-electrolytes which represent a new approach to water pollution control being spearheaded by Dow. Added to waste water in very small quantities on the order of one or two parts per million, the very long and extremely heavy polyelectrolyte molecules attract and hold solid particles suspended in the water. Within the space of a few minutes, the polyelectrolytes settle to the bottom, taking with them almost all of the suspended solids. Under laboratory conditions, Polyelectrolytes can remove between 50 percent and 75 percent of the solids and up to 50 percent of the organic pollutants. Conditions at the Milk River pumping station will be far from ideal, but Dow engineers believe that the polyelectrolytes can remove a sub stantial portion of the solids and the organic waste now being discharged into Lake St. Clair.

Waste Flows Complex

Combined waste flows, i.e., stormwater and domestic sewage, are chemically very comlex, and there is no way to control volume, rate of flow, temperature, or pollutional content. Any attempt to treat combined waste depends greatly on the accuracy and completeness of the analytical work that accompanies it. Since the project began in July, Dow has been designing, building, and installing complex instrumentation devices and laboratory equipment.

Several automatic machines have already been installed to provide samples of the stormwater overflow at regular intervals. Instruments are being installed that will continuously analyze the waste flow for temperature, amount of solids, dissolved oxygen content and the degree of acidity. Other tests. to be performed as needed, will provide data on four categories of solids, the amount of organic carbon, nitrogen, and phosporus, the amount of oil and grease, the degree of hardness, and the presence of three varieties of

Building Laboratory

The "as needed" tests will be performed at the pumping station in a complete waste-water laboratory mounted on a 40' trailer. The trailer has been designed by Dow and is currently being built and equipped. It should be delivered about the first of the year.

Between now and July, Dow will test and standardize the equipment and instrumentation, determine the most efficien polyelectrolyte, and find the best place to add the polyelectrolyte. Beginning in July and continuing until the end of the project a vear later, stormwater over flow will be treated to the limit of current technology. The data from that year of continued treatment will provide much needed information about stormwater overflows from combined sewers. Overall, the Project is expected to be a significant step in the fight to clean up the nation's rivers and lakes.

Winnipeg Ballet Here on Feb. 3

Arnold Spohr, world-recognized and only native-born Di-rector of a Canadian ballet company, will be in the wings when comes to Masonic Auditorium Saturday, February 3.

In 1958, when Spohr became Artistic Director of the Royal Winnipeg, most Canadians doubted the young man would have the fortitude to develop a ballet company on firm classical lines in a remote region like Western Canada. For most choreographers-turned-director, heading an internationally-acclaimed ballet company would be enough. For Arnold Spohr. it had not been enough.

Far from being satisfied that the company he directs should be accepted by audiences in New York, London and Caracas, he intends it should yet grow more bold. It would seem entirely natural that he confine his ambitions to classical ballet —his Company is now rich in relationships with the Bolshoi and the Royal Ballet. This is as much as most ballet companies dream of.

But the great traditions of hallet do not confine Spohr. For years in his free month or two between seasons he has searched the world for all the known kinds of dancing-from Bushman to Balinese to Ballet.

It is Spohr's unusually broad understanding of ballet that makes him intensely interested in its connection with the larger world of movement. All forms of dance have something to say about how a dancer communicates with his audience and how he finds it possible to express himself. Spohr has become the consumate communicator in ballet.



"Why Are There So Few Houses For Sale?"

The number of Grosse Pointe houses available for sale is by no means constant. Like other commodities, it fluc-tuates with the supply and de-

During the 1950's the num-ber of homes we could offer customers at any given time varied from 250 to 350. A reduced rote of sales during the business recession which began in 1957 increased the accumulation of properties to over 400 by 1961. That was a real "buyer's market," but many people failed to realize it

many people failed to realize it and waited for prices to go lower. Some are still waiting. Beginning in 1962, an increase in the rate of sales resulted in a steady decline in the supply of listings until two years ago. Since then it has ranged from 100 to 150. When a customer narrows these houses down to his size and price range, there aren't many left to choose from. If one of these doesn't satisfy his requirements, he is usually most quirements, he is usually most discouraged. He need nt be. Although the number of houses currently available is unusually low, the steady flow of new listings is not much below normal. They just don't remain on the market as long as they once did. By keeping in close touch with the market, a buyer will find his future home omong these new listings.
