Thursday, November 21

TREASURY AND CENTRAL BANK officials of the world's 10 richest nations met in emergency session in Bonn early Thursday, but adjourned in deadlock over how to ease the crisis menacing the French franc and perhaps other Western currencies. A West German spokesman said the only substantive discussion had been on Germany's offer to use the leverage of its current economic superiority to help France. Germany proposed limiting its exports to France by raising duties and encouraging imports by lowering them. Sources said the planned German move would cut West Germany's export surplus by about \$1.25 billion over 15 months.

Friday, November 22

GREECE'S ARMY backed regime decided Thursday night to spare the life of Alexandros Panagoulis, who tried to kill the Greek Premier George Papadopoulos on August 13, a government official in Athens said. Panagoulis, a 30-year-old Army deserter, was sentenced to death on Sunday for desertion and sedition by a special court martial. He also received a 15-year prison term for attempted homicide. He refused to appeal for a reprieve. The regime decided to reprieve him after a special cabinet meeting at the residence of regent Lt. General Zoritsis.

SECRETARY OF STATE James H. Hare announced Friday that he expects a request for a recount on the daylight savings time issue which was first reported to have passed in the recent election but later found to have been defeated by 413 votes. Any citizen of the state can request a recount, but must pay \$5 a precinct, or more than \$30,000 for the state's 5,576 precincts.

Saturday, November 23

THE BRITISH were angered with Friday's announcement of the new tax increases slapped on consumer goods in Britain. This was a government move to save the pound sterling from a second devaluation in just over a year. Financial experts say the move will fail to solve ties.

Sunday, November 24

CHARLES DE GAULLE declared Saturday that he will not devalue the currency he has tried in his presidency to make one of the world's strongest. France's allies were stunned. Last week the 78-year-old general dismissed devaluation as "the worst of absurdities." He decided to fall back on France's \$3.9 billion gold reserves and \$2 billion of international support pledged to defend the franc.

PRESIDENT-ELECT and Mrs. Richard Nixon announced Saturday from New York that their daughter Julie, 20, will marry David Eisenhower, 20, grandson of former President Eisenhower, three days before Christmas, December 22, in Marble Collegiate Church, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale will officiate.

Monday, November 25

PRESIDENT JOHNSON sent a telegram to French president Charles de Gaulle Sunday pledging that the United States would cooperate in efforts to prevent devaluation of the franc. De Gaulle, immediately wired back his appreciation. However, most Western bankers and financial experts believe de Gaulle's refusal to devalue the franc has plunged the world in another all-out money crisis.

Tuesday, November 26

HERBERT G. KLEIN, long-time aide of President-elect Richard Nixon, was named Monday by Nixon, to be in charge of all information originating from the White House and all cabinet departments. He will be "director of communications" for the entire executive branch.

Family Life Education Council Committee Lays Plans to Fight Problem

More Than 80 Attend Session to Discuss Ever-Increasing Use of Drugs and Alcohol by Teenagers; Four Groups Set Up

The Family Life Education Council's Committee on Drugs and Alcohol held a meeting on Tuesday, November 12, in the continuing effort to combat the ever-increasing problem of the usage of drugs and alcohol by Pointe teenagers. Over 80 persons attended the session.

The session was divided into four Attack Committees. The first of these, was chaired by Erik Pierce, board member of FLEC, and manager of information services for American Motors. The group discussed four thrust areas.

To Contact Dealers
1. To obtain the cooperation of liquor dealers in the Grosse Pointe area and ask them to enclose with each sale a pamphlet reminding the purchaser of the problems of teenage drinking.

2. Consider contacting law enforcement agencies in an effort to learn of unsupervised parties and incidents of drunkenness. Ask local news media's support in printing these incidents without names.

3. Advertise in the newspapers, especially during the holiday season, reminding parents not to let their teenagers drink.

4. Arrange for a series of in-depth articles by professionals on drinking and drug problems which analyze the causes and possible remedies.

Discuss Services
Attack Committee Two, chaired by Dr. Eli Rubin, director of the Northeast Child Guidance Clinic, discussed providing back-up services such as counseling and parent education programs to police and courts for offenders and their families.

Thrust areas being considered are developing a central referral service for parents, informing them where to go for professional help. Also to provide professional information centers for the police and courts as aids in helping them assess the psychological aspects of the individual in order to help him learn of the most suitable source to which to refer individuals and families.

Attack Committee Three is dealing with intensifying and beefing up alcohol and drug education programs in the schools by utilizing the various local, state and federal resources for building effective curriculums. In this area emphasis will be placed on involvement of school personnel in planning the curriculum, with FLEC assuming the responsibility for mobilizing School Board and community support. Roger McCraig, curriculum assistant-Grosse Pointe Board of Education chaired this sub-committee.

Total Commitment
His group found that the problems of alcohol and drug usage must be a total community commitment and must include the schools, churches, police, and community representatives.

They found that one of the roles the schools should play in this campaign is to provide information. That drug and alcohol information should be presented earlier than it is presented in the current curriculum, that the schools need to develop criteria for selection of materials, that they must provide required rather than elective experiences to the students and that the program must be a total sequence rather than a few isolated courses.

Schools Should Help
They concluded that the schools should help form attitudes.

Home Ransacked Nothing Missing

Mrs. Rose Mocerri of 207 Chalfont called Farms police on Sunday, November 24, to disclose that her residence had been broken into and ransacked by burglars.

Officers dispatched to the house said that evidence showed that the home was entered by forcing the sliding door at the rear of the house. The burglar used either a large screwdriver, or a pry bar. About 12 inches of the door frame had been broken off, it was said.

The thief ransacked two upstairs bedrooms, and a bedroom on the first floor, but as far as could be determined by Mrs. Mocerri, nothing appeared to have been taken.

The intruder left the house by pulling out the screen and then opening a Fenestra window on the north side of the building, police said.

Council in Farms to Hear Argument For School Guard

Parents Seeking Discussion on Better Safety Measures at Moross-Kercheval Crossing Get on Agenda for Monday's Meeting

Parents of children in the Kerby School district, who have been attempting to get on the Farms Council's agenda to discuss the matter of an adult crossing guard at the Moross-Kercheval intersection, will have an opportunity to be heard, according to City Clerk Peter Caputo, next Monday, December 2, at 8 o'clock, in the Council Chambers.

Dr. Custer Homier, principal of Kerby School, in an effort to better analyze the problems at this crossing, has actually "taken patrol duty" to see just what a fifth grade patrol boy is confronted with.

Dr. Homier told the NEWS "This is an extremely dangerous crossing, with the traffic coming in four directions." He added that he will not remove the patrol boy until a better solution is found because it is too dangerous a crossing to leave unguarded but that he was anxious to do so.

Dr. Homier said police officials have been most co-operative.

Last Friday, November 22, Sg. Arnold Parsons, Farms School and Safety Traffic Officer, Police Chief Jack F. Roh, and A. C. Gibson, manager of Highway and Traffic Engineering of the AAA, met to review the situation. The results of their findings were not ready at this writing but should be forthcoming within the next week.

Restaurant Out \$125 to Burglar

Park police disclosed on Monday, November 25, that they are still investigating the burglary of the Potpourri Restaurant, 16624 Mack avenue, which took place sometime between 10:20 p.m. on Sunday, November 17, and 8 a.m. Monday, November 18.

Edward Hookanson, owner of the eatery, discovered the breaking when he opened for business on the Monday date, and called police. The burglar got approximately \$125 in currency and change, it was disclosed.

Police said the entry into the building was gained by the thief, who climbed to the roof at the rear, and removed a pane of glass from the skylight, and dropping to the floor.

The robber ransacked a cash register and broke open two concession machines, getting a total of \$110 from all three, and then went into the basement office, where he pried open a 10-by-17-inch gray metal strong box, from which he took \$15, including two rolls of pennies. The box was pried open with a meat cleaver taken from the kitchen, it was said.

The thief left the building by the rear door, which was self-locking, investigating officers said.

Mrs. Edsel B. Ford's Gift Sparks Symphony Drive

A gift of \$750,000 from Mrs. Edsel B. Ford to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra was announced last November 19 at a gathering of some 60 Symphony supporters and friends.

The occasion was a party in the Birmingham home of Mr. and Mrs. Semon E. Knudsen, during which it was disclosed that the Symphony has established a goal of \$10.8 million for an endowment fund being created to help secure the Orchestra's future.

Mrs. Knudsen and Detroit Symphony President Robert B. Semple are co-chairmen for obtaining gifts from individuals in the campaign.

Mrs. Ford's gift is her second to the Symphony endowment fund and matches the amount of her first gift given in 1964. They are the largest any individual has given the Symphony.

Yule Stage Set Earlier Every Year

Park, City and Farms Set for Lighting of Decorations; Woods and Shores Preparing Program

Two of the Pointers have begun their Christmas decorating, and three have decided to do theirs after Thanksgiving, according to information received from each of the communities.

Decorating of the Park Municipal Building should be completed by today, Thanksgiving, but the gay, multi-colored lights and illumination of other fixtures will not be turned on until the day after the national holiday, according to City Manager Robert Stone.

Merchants in the Park, too, have already put up lights and Christmas symbols, which they purchased themselves, but the installation was done by the city. These decorations will also be lighted up tomorrow. The cherry blossom trees in Kercheval are filled with miniature lights.

Grosse Pointe City Manager Thomas Kressbach said that the symbols of Christmas will not be placed on or around the Municipal Building until nearer Christmas. However, the merchants in the Village have installed their lights and fixtures, which will be lit after Thanksgiving.

While the Park and City, more or less, are jumping the gun, the Farms also had its first yule lights on in the Kercheval-on-the-hill area on November 25. The Woods and Shores have no plans to follow in the footsteps of the first three, that is, not until after the Thanksgiving holiday.

Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., said that his community will decorate either tomorrow, or beginning Monday, December 2.

The same message was released by Woods City Administrator Chester Peterson. Shores Superintendent Thomas Jefferson said that the Village will start its Christmas decorating program as soon as possible after Thanksgiving holiday.

Farms Police Chief Replies To Charges

Writes Open Letter to Explain to Citizens How Department Seeks to Solve Problems

One week ago, the City of Grosse Pointe Farms was fortunate enough to receive the front page headlines in the Grosse Pointe News, suggesting a lack of interest on our part in the safety of our school children. We are fortunate to have a matter so vital to all of us given the proper attention it so rightly deserves. It is a matter that cannot be taken lightly.

We sincerely hope that the citizens who share the mutual read the article and are concerned about it. Therefore, as a public service, we respectfully submit this open letter. It is directed to the parents and citizens who share the mutual concern of all of us, the welfare and safety of our children. We hope it will serve the constructive purpose for which it is intended, in short, to explain about our Traffic Safety Program, and how it operates.

Has Safety Officer

Grosse Pointe Farms, like the surrounding communities, has under the direction of the chief of police, an experienced police officer assigned to its Traffic Safety Department. His duties include traffic studies and engineering, consulting with school officials and parents, counselling and instructing school children in all matters pertaining to their safety. Helping to co-ordinate the School Safety Patrol units is another important part of this job.

The School Safety Officer in Grosse Pointe Farms is Sgt. Arnold E. Parsons. During the course of a school year he will have visited with children from 10 different schools. Five of these schools are nursery schools. Hopefully, he will try to visit each classroom at least once during each school year, and the lower grades where he is needed most, as many times as possible.

Gets Many Requests

He will receive many requests for parking signs, stop signs, traffic signals and various other traffic controls. Most of these requests are reasonable; many are not. All are given careful consideration. Traffic controls now in force in the area are studied to determine if they are adequate. When it is found that additional controls are needed, the changes are made.

When a decision has been reached, all interested parties are then informed and recommendations are made. One of two things will happen next. The requesting party is satisfied with the decision or a demand is made for further traffic studies.

When additional attention is requested, meetings with school officials, the concerned parties, and the police department take place. When a satisfactory solution to the problem cannot be obtained, the Automobile Association of America is then asked to make a separate survey and submit its findings. The police department conducts a second survey at this time.

Another Check Made

The location of existing traffic signs, signals or other warning devices are again checked to determine their effectiveness. Statistics are gathered to record the volume of traffic; the speed that traffic is moving is registered along with the gaps in traffic that are needed for a pedestrian to cross safely.

The road width is measured and the time required to cross the street at a child's pace is then figured in. At intersecting streets, the number of turning vehicles becomes a factor. The length of time a traffic light remains on green, amber, or red is also important. The distance between existing traffic signals or similar stopping devices that may be requested is carefully considered to insure a smooth and regulated flow of traffic.

phony board chairman John B. Ford in 1964.

The announcement of the new gift from Mrs. Edsel Ford was made by Wendell W. Anderson, president of the Bundy Corporation, who is general chairman of the Symphony endowment fund campaign.

Guests at the Knudsen home included prominent citizens interested in the preservation of the Symphony as a cultural asset for Detroit, as well as John B. Ford, Robert B. Semple, and several other Symphony board members.

The party was the second of two keyed to the Symphony's new plans for increasing its endowment fund. A similar gathering, attended by 50 persons, was held on November 11 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell W. Anderson, Jr. in Grosse Pointe Farms. On each occasion a portion of the evening was devoted to a presentation on how the Symphony can be funded in the years ahead.

In her words of welcome, Mrs. Knudsen commented that she had accepted a role in the endowment fund campaign because of her belief that a major city must maintain a first-rate orchestra.

Semple outlined the orchestra's financial history and prospects for the future. He pointed out that the orchestra had twice ceased operations for lack of funds since its founding in 1914. Following the last lapse, John B. Ford introduced in 1951 the now famous "Detroit Plan" to place the orchestra on a sound financial basis—enlisting major support from business, foundations, and the city, with representation for sponsors on the Symphony board.

Symphony finances remained essentially in balance until 1963, Semple said, and even today contributions from the business sector remain the keystone of the Symphony's maintenance fund support.

However, over the past five or six years, Semple explained, a "new age" has descended on orchestras across the nation, characterized by the emergence of the orchestral musician as a virtual full-time professional with a commensurate salary. The Detroit Symphony's annual budget has risen from less than \$1-million six years ago to \$2.2-million for the current year, he said, while three orchestras have moved up to an annual budget of \$4-million or more.

Even if the Symphony can meet its ambitious annual maintenance and endowment fund goals between now and 1972, Semple said, current projections indicate that the Symphony will face a deficit of \$12-million for that year unless other sources of income are found. Hopefully, a continuing bequest program and new support from several levels of government will help fill this gap.

Semple said that The Ford Foundation foresaw the economic plight confronting American orchestras and established an \$80.2-million "challenge" grant program two years ago. The program is designed to en-

courage the development of endowment funds as a major income supplement to help U.S. orchestras cope with the ever-increasing costs threatening their existence.

Semple reported that many orchestras are well along in their endowment campaigns and introduced John Myers, who stressed that the leadership in the Twin Cities areas determined that maintenance of an orchestra in their community was mandatory. They set for themselves an ambitious goal of \$10-million Myers said. Approximately \$9-million has already been pledged against this goal, adding significantly to the Minnesota Orchestra's (formerly the Minneapolis Symphony) expanded program covering the upper midwest.

Anderson, as a preface to his own comments on The Detroit Symphony's goal, pointed out that the Symphony's current annual budget and its endowment fund goal both rank seventh among the major orchestras, whereas the adjusted gross income of individuals living in the metropolitan area ranks fourth in the nation. To reach the \$10.8-million goal, he said, approximately \$5.5-million is being sought from individuals and foundations, \$2.25-million from corporations, and the remaining \$3-million in the form of matching funds from The Ford Foundation.

The Symphony plans to begin its general solicitation of corporations next spring, Anderson said.

In reviewing how The Ford Foundation will assist the Symphony in its endowment campaign, Anderson explained that the Orchestra has been favored with two Foundation "challenge" grants. The first, in 1964, was for \$2-million. Half the sum was an outright gift while the other million was made available to the Symphony on a one-for-three "matching" basis until April, 1968. In 1966, The Foundation promised another \$1-million if the Symphony could raise an additional \$2-million on its own by mid-1971.

The combination of Ford Foundation gifts and the Symphony's fulfillment of the "challenge" grant opportunities will result in \$8-million for the Symphony endowment fund, Anderson said. He added that the Symphony has set its sights higher, however, feeling a minimum endowment fund of \$10.8-million will be needed by 1972.

The interior designers made this gift to enable the public libraries to purchase outstanding books in their field, and Mr. Orr reports the books will soon be available. Similar gifts have been made to the Detroit Public Library and to the Baldwin Public Library in Birmingham.

Local members of the AIID are William Austin, Mrs. Elea-

nor Schneider, William Denler, Robert Calloway and associate member, Julie Wade. Mr. Orr welcomes this type of gift in order to strengthen books available in the various fields.



might use the crossing is obtained from the school. A further study is made to count the number of children who actually use the crossing. The children's ages and their safety habits are observed.

Police department accident files are reviewed to determine the past history of the area. These records provide accurate information which will clearly indicate if we have a traffic safety problem in the area or if we have had one in the past.

Often the intersection is one that is heavily travelled during the summer months when Safety Patrol boys are not present. The accident record for the summer months is compared with the record for the months when school is in session.

Only after incorporating the information obtained from the Automobile Association's survey, and then consulting the guidelines set forth by the National Safety Council, such as the shortest route to and from school, do we finally conclude our studies.

Only then are we satisfied that our recommendation will best serve the interests of the entire community, and it is made available to all concerned parties.

May Petition Council

Occasionally the interested party petition the city council for a hearing. The arguments supporting their reasoning are submitted, along with the traffic survey recommendation from the police department.

Regardless of the decision reached by the city council, there have to be losers. These are the people who are seldom heard from. These are people who have children in nursery schools, kindergarten, and the lower grades in our elementary schools. These children are entitled to have a traffic safety officer visit their individual classrooms, to ask him questions, receive counsel and even receive individual instruction when necessary. They should have the opportunity to know that they can depend on a police officer and have enough personal contact to know that he is a friend and is not to be feared.

Just Isn't Possible

Regrettably, this cannot be possible when the traffic safety officer in a community is forced to spend the bulk of his time compiling statistics and submitting sophisticated reports that only back up his earlier recommendations.

The net result is that he eventually winds up with a few very well-informed adults and many, many classrooms filled with very badly neglected children.

It would help to better serve all segments of the community if requests for school traffic safety studies were submitted at the spring of the school year. This would allow many of the studies to be completed during the summer months. AND, if changes are warranted they could be put into effect prior to the start of the next school year.

Basically it should be remembered that traffic safety is much more complicated than "I want," or "We should have."

It should also be realized that motorists and pedestrians alike do not always abide by the laws enacted to provide for their safety.

We, in Grosse Pointe Farms have a good record. We are proud of our traffic safety program. The Pedestrian Safety Citations we receive annually from the Automobile Association of America indicate we have a safety-wise community where people do care.

We feel it is the concerned citizen or group that takes the time to offer their criticisms that will make and keep Grosse Pointe Farms a safe place for the most important people in our world—Our Children.







tion of the hall leading to her bedroom, Goldfarb came out of the hallway, one hand in his jacket pocket, and pushed her aside with his free arm, stating "I'm sorry lady. I didn't mean it. I'm sorry," and fled from the house.

Mrs. Garbarino promptly called police, giving them a description of the accused man and the car she saw him enter and drive away in. A general alert was broadcast over the police radio.

Wooten, on patrol on Lake Shore, saw the described vehicle, just as the radio message was given. The policeman saw the driver turn north onto Moross road, and followed, waiting for further word.

As Wooten was trailing Goldfarb, a more detailed description of the car and driver, and the license plate number of the vehicle was received, and the officer knew he had the suspect under observation, and called all stations for help. Patrolman Newton arrived just as Goldfarb and Wooten approached the freeway, Moross and Harper. The policemen hemmed in Goldfarb's car, forcing him to stop.

At about this time, Shores Patrolmen Robert Besinger and Donald Lupre arrived. In a search of Goldfarb's person, the officers found a large number of coins and watches, including a watch inscribed with the name "Robert Garbarino."

Under intensive questioning by Jacobs and Mustazza, the accused man disclosed that he had tossed a number of jewelry pieces over the viaduct of the freeway. The pieces, all costume jewelry, were recovered by Mustazza, who went to the scene to search after Goldfarb's statement.

On Wednesday, Jacobs and Mustazza obtained a warrant approved by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, charging Goldfarb with the burglary of the Garbarino residence, and the man was arraigned.

Goldfarb entered by prying open a sliding door at the rear of the building, Jacobs said. Two bedrooms were completely ransacked, before Mrs. Garbarino surprised the man.

The woman identified several pieces of expensive jewelry found in Goldfarb's possession when he was searched. She said a large number of assorted coins and two rolls of pennies had been taken from her bedroom dresser drawer. Coins and two rolls of pennies were also in the arrested man's possession, it was said.

Shores Police Chief Thomas Cochill praised all the officers involved for their part in the case, stating that each should be commended for doing excellent police work.

Neither Vyse, nor Heenan, both men of professional standing, are employees of the city.







Farms Police Nab Woman Using Phony Prescription

A 21-year-old Park woman was arraigned before Farms Municipal Judge Robert Pytell on Saturday, November 23, on a warrant accusing her of attempting to obtain a drug with a fraudulent prescription. The judge set tentative examination for yesterday, November 27, and ordered the woman confined in jail in lieu of \$1,000 bond.

Miss Leslie Anne Geisse of 15220 East Jefferson, was arrested Friday evening, November 22, on complaint of Michael Randazzo, owner of Rand Drugs, 18404 Mack avenue, who called Farms police, after Miss Geisse phoned in a prescription.

Randazzo said that a young woman had called in a prescription for Desudal Gradumet, a highly stimulant drug, at 8:30 p.m. claiming that the prescription had been approved by her physician whose office was in West Grand boulevard in Detroit. The caller gave her name as Mrs. A. McDonald of 276 McMillan, and that she will pick up the drug later.

The druggist called the physician who denied issuing such a prescription. A further check by Randazzo revealed that there was no such address in McMillan road and that the name given was phony. He promptly called police.

Patrolman Otto Glanert, assigned to the Plainclothes Detail of the Detective Bureau, arrived at the drug store and stationed himself behind a partition, to await the arrival of the woman.

At approximately 9:30 p.m., Miss Geisse entered the place and went to the prescription window, and asked for the drug, which she said she was picking up for her mother. Randazzo asked the girl why her mother was not able to pick it up herself, and Miss Geisse gave a lame excuse.

At this moment, Glanert emerged from behind the partition, and identified himself as a police officer, and asked the girl for identification, after which he told her she was under arrest for fraudulently trying to obtain narcotics. The girl refused to answer questions.

Glanert called his station and asked for assistance, and Patrolman Robert Kraiza and John Farley were sent to help. Kraiza came into the store carrying the operator's license and other identification belonging to David Whitney McGregor, 23, of 15220 East Jefferson. It was disclosed that the address is that of an apartment building in the Park.

Kraiza said that he and Farley, en route to the store, saw a car parked on Moran and Mack, with McGregor, the lone occupant, and stopped to question him. McGregor was arrested when the girl identified him as being with her.

At the station, the wife of a Farms police officer was called and asked to act as police matron to search Miss Geisse and to assist in taking her to the Wayne County Jail. The matron said that in searching the girl, she found a number of needle marks on the girl's arms.

The girl admitted that she had been taking drugs, and that she had started about a year ago, but denied that she was an addict. En route to jail, she said that she had left her parents and home, in Columbus, O., about four years ago, to come to the Detroit area. She said she had lived at the Jefferson address on and off for about nine months.

McGregor confessed that he knew Miss Geisse and that he had known that she was attempting to obtain the drug with a false prescription.

A teletype to Michigan State Police for a possible record on McGregor, brought out that he was wanted on a traffic warrant by the Erie State Police Post, Monroe County, for a traffic violation.

Farms authorities were instructed to have McGregor post a bond of \$100 on the traffic warrant, before he is released.

Glanert said there was no evidence that McGregor was actually involved in the false prescription matter, and the man was released after posting the traffic bond.



Pointer on Pioneering Trans-Polar World Trip

Thomas K. Fisher, of Lothrop road had reached the half-way point on a pioneering trans-polar flight around the world, on November 21.

Mr. Fisher is a member of an expedition that left Boston November 8 to open up the first commercial route around the earth longitudinally, crossing both the North and South Poles. His plane is a chartered Convair 990 jet, named "Polar Byrd I."

The 26-day journey covers 10 countries and all seven continents, including Antarctica. It is sponsored by the Admiral Richard E. Byrd Polar Center, Boston, of which Mr. Fisher is a trustee.

As of November 21, Mr. Fisher and 59 other U.S. business and professional leaders were in Wellington, New Zealand, taking part in a civic ceremony honoring Admiral Byrd.

From there the group traveled to the United States Naval base on McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, and on November 22, flew over the South Pole.

The route of the flight is from Boston to Greenland, over the North Pole to Anchorage, Tokyo, Manila, Darwin and Sydney (Australia), Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch (New Zealand), McMurdo Sound (Antarctica), and over the South Pole to Rio Gallegos (Argentina). From there they fly to Rio de Janeiro, Dakar (Senegal), Rome and London, returning to Boston on December 3.

The Admiral Richard E. Byrd Polar Center was established to conduct Antarctic research studies and maintain a central

library of information. It will furnish technical assistance to government, universities and business organizations, and serve as headquarters for future investigation into the scientific and commercial development of the polar regions.

The case was referred to officers of the Detective Bureau for further investigation.



Alleged Mafia Leader in Jail

Alleged Mafia leader Vito

imminent danger."

Giacalone faces a number of
charges. On January 2, he will

be on trial in Wayne County
Circuit court on a charge of
conspiracy to commit extortion,
also a felony. He is awaiting
trial in federal court on seven
charges involving extortion in a
loan shark racket and a charge
of tax evasion.

John Lesinski, chief judge of
appeals panel refused to sub-
stitute the panel's judgment for
Baum's who he indicated was
closer to the situation.





For This We Are Thankful

It is customary at this time of year for one to cogitate upon the many things for which one should be thankful. After giving the matter considerable thought, we have come to the conclusion that as this Thanksgiving observance approaches, we are most grateful for having been granted the privilege of being born and raised in a period far less hectic, disturbed, complex and loaded with frustrations than are these days through which a generation far removed from ours, is seeking the answers which can lead to years of healthy, happy, useful living.

Unlike so many of the youngsters we know today, we enjoyed a childhood filled to the brim with the joyousness of constant contact with fundamentally joyful people which afforded infinite opportunities for discovering what life is all about. We speak of the very young years of this century, when things were relatively simple and such distractions as radio and television were hidden in an undreamed-of future. Entertainment was largely a matter of self-providing, and self-reliance was a greatly cherished, though often misunderstood attribute.

Those first years of awareness and education were spent in a neighborhood that could be nothing but sheer delight to a child of that time. The house in which we were born and lived through this precious early period, was small but adequate, and blessed with an unusually large L-shaped yard. There were fruit trees and grape arbors, an ample vegetable garden, a separate detached structure for the storage of coal, and garden and lawn equipment . . . and a beautiful barn complete with hay-loft, some moldering deerhides tacked on the wall, and empty stalls and a broken-down buggy.

The yard afforded plenty of room to play kids' baseball, football, or "Kick-the-Ricket," which pleased both us and all the parents involved. They were much happier when we were on the property, and they could see us having fun and fights . . . both important parts of growing up.

It was definitely what we later came to call a "commercial neighborhood," though we were not aware of it at the time. All the business activity so close at hand contributed tremendously to the excitement and contentment and education which can only come to children thus endowed by environment. Vivid recollections disclose, among the business establishments contained within that one block in which we lived: — a German butcher store, (now called a meat market); a tailoring shop, whose beloved proprietor called us in to share matzo with him every Passover. (We also broke windows in his shop practically every time we played baseball, but father seemed to consider that an expected expense connected with having us in our own yard, and made weekly settlements for damages without rancor or question.)

On the other side of our house was a German bakery which produced everything from bread, (which we used to help extract, on long, wooden paddles, from the huge brick ovens), to fantastic French pastries, ice cream cones which cost from one cent to two-for-a-nickel, and a wide assortment of penny candy. Next to the bakery two double houses punctuated the landscape up to the location of a marvelous grocery store, with the owner's home next door completing the block on that side.

The other side of the street contained a few more double houses, a tiny church of forgotten faith, a coal and ice dealer, complete with stables, horses we helped curry, ice and coal wagons which we frequently rode with their friendly drivers; a barber shop with shelves of monogrammed shaving mugs; a drug store with marble-topped tables with stout wire legs, and chairs similarly supported, beautiful big apothecary jars in various colors, phosphate bottles and enhancing racks of drawers which held all the mysterious ingredients of which prescriptions are compounded; a notion store which dispensed everything from needles and thread to dust coats for intrepid motorists; and a shoe repair shop presided over by a lovingly indulgent Italian.

Our family doctor, who delivered all four of us children at home, lived in the next block, which also boasted an undertaking establishment whose stables contained magnificent patent leather funeral carriages and coal black horses.

That was the setting for the most glorious childhood one could imagine. We hooked our sleds to the bakery, grocery and butcher wagons when snow covered the unpaved streets. We fought to see who would be allowed to pay the monthly bills to the storekeepers. It meant a heaping bag of penny candy and cookies as a token of thanks to children whose parents honored their bills by paying promptly. We spent many a Saturday morning emptying sugar barrels, (after careful weighing), into one, two and five-pound bags. Our pay for this, too, was in penny candy and bananas and oranges.

When the fourth baby was soon to be introduced into the family, it was time to move . . . but not very far. No change of schools or friends was required. We were still within easy walking distance of everything encompassed in our young lives. Upon graduation from grade school, it was a much longer walk to high school, (a mile and a half each way,) but this didn't bother anyone. No more did it concern any of us that the twice-weekly trips to the YMCA gym classes were the same distance. Some of our friends had bicycles, but walking was considered both acceptable and fun, affording a much better chance to see what was going on about us.

One thing that stands out indelibly clear in our reminiscences of this era is the complete absence of van-

Dear Mr. Edgar:

It was with a great deal of interest that I read the letter from Mr. Jack Smith responding to your editorial of two weeks ago on leaf-burning in Grosse Pointe Farms.

I, too, have very strong opinions on the subject and, like Mr. Smith, wrote to Councilman Mark C. Stevens two years ago stating that I felt it was a hazard to the safety and health of our community and that an ordinance should be passed outlawing the burning of all leaves. His reply, in essence, was that leaf-removal by the City of Grosse Pointe Farms would be prohibitively expensive and that the idea simply was not economically feasible. Three weeks ago I spoke with Councilman Henry Bodman and he stated that while the Council was well aware of the problem and sympathetic with our position, the passage of any ordinance would, in all probability, be two to three years in the future. The budget does not have sufficient funds to cover the cost of leaf-removal equipment and manpower at this time.

My interest in the matter is urgent and personal. I am the mother of an asthmatic three-year-old child, and the agony of her suffering during the fall months is indescribable. She has had sustained attacks almost continually during the past nine weeks and all of them have been the direct result of the smoke and air-borne spores from burning leaves. She is virtually a prisoner in her own home during the beautiful autumn weather—a house that, I might add, has a specially-designed filtering system to purify the air.

Leaf-burning is not only injurious to the health of asthmatics and those individuals who are allergy-sensitive; the air-pollution problem in general is one with which we are all familiar. The record bears out the number of traffic accidents that have been caused by decreased visibility due to leaf-burning, and the damage done to newly asphalted streets is an additional burden to all tax-payers. Last, but certainly not least, is the fact that countless gorgeous autumn days are spoiled by the filthy haze hovering over our area—a haze that the sun literally cannot penetrate for hours at a time.

The communities of Grosse Pointe Woods, Grosse Pointe Shores, Grosse Pointe Park, and Grosse Pointe City all prohibit leaf-burning and provide for leaf-removal while we continue to drag our heels. The financially-hamstrung City of Detroit has been sufficiently aware of the problem to block out a test area on the East Side, and I understand the findings from this are so impressive that they, too, will outlaw leaf-burning before too long.

I submit that the Farms Council must, in good conscience, find a way to pass an ordinance before the fall of 1970, even if it means cutting back expenditures in other areas. Other residents in the Farms feel strongly enough on this issue to have joined us in drawing up petitions to be circulated throughout the community and submitted to the Council. If any of your readers share our convictions and would be interested in either circulating or signing one of these petitions, they may call me at TU 1-1749. Since it would appear that our Council acts only when it is politically expedient to do so, a strong indication of the sentiments of the electorate is our first step in the solution to this problem.

It's turkey hash time of year: Those right-after-Thanksgiving days when the snow doesn't stay, and neither does the sun; when our wool clothes, worn two months now, seem a little limp; when we're convinced we'll NEVER get our Christmas shopping done, our Christmas decorations up; when we've all got too much to do, and too little time to do it in, and the sneaking suspicion that nobody much cares whether we do it anyway, and we really don't care either...

Take a few minutes' respite, readers; stop thinking of everything - I should be doing - today - and am - not, and come with us for a visit with Dorothea Bush. You think you're coping with a heavy December schedule? Consider Dorothea.

Has Three Names

Less than a month ago, November 6, Dorothea (or "Dotie," as she's known in her sorority, or "Do," which is what her family calls her) conducted her first meeting as chairman of the Detroit Boat Club 1968-69 Women's Committee.

This is the Committee under whose aegis all activities involving the Boat Club women, plus activities for children and teenagers, are planned and produced.

Which means that Dorothea, right now, is facing not only personal holiday planning but holiday planning for an ENTIRE CLUB!

"December," she admits, "is one of the biggest months of the DBC year." Naturally, she didn't assume office at the beginning of November and then begin work on her Committee's December calendar.

She was vice-chairman of the Committee last year. The vice-chairman almost invariably succeeds to the chairmanship (both are one-year offices), and the vice-chairman generally spends several months planning the calendar for the year ahead, when she will be chairman, setting up and clearing dates with the manager, lining up individual party chairmen.

Her Calendar Is Full

This Dorothea did. But even so, she remains a very busy lady.

"I'm busy every day," she allows, glancing at her personal engagement calendar. Fortunately, Mrs. Bush can "write small;" if her script were any larger, she'd have to resort to a Giant Calendar—as things stand, her present Medium-Sized Calendar is crammed so full of entries she couldn't squeeze another item on it.

"Mostly, it's DBC Women's Committee engagements," she says. "Other things I more or less work in."

Because she's a wife, and a mother, Dorothea does most of her "outside work" during the day, even though she describes her husband as "very tolerant" of her outside-the-home involvements.

"I suppose," she adds, "it's because I've been on committees most of our married life."

Holds Other Offices

She's a member of the Grand Marais Garden Club and of the Grosse Pointe Garden Center. She's recording secretary of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church's Friday Book Review. She's past-president of the Detroit Chapter of Alpha Delta Pi Alumnae, a Grosse Pointe

Memorial Church Women's Association Circle leader and during the last holiday season served as co-chairman, with Mrs. F. C. Hurley, of the Women's Association's annual Christmas Tea.

She's worked for the United Foundation Torch Drive about as long as she can remember, serving as door-to-door campaigner, district area and Grosse Pointe Park division chairman. (UF work, incidentally, is a tradition in Mrs. Bush's family: Her father was one of the first campaigners for the UF, when it was called the Detroit Community Fund, and she still has his original Community Fund campaign button.)

Also in School Service

Her "parent" involvements have included service as a Den Mother and as secretary of the Trembly Parent-Teacher Association. She's campaigned for school millage elections.

The Bushes' son, Wesley, is 14 now, a ninth grader at Grosse Pointe South High School. Dorothea is—naturally!—a member of the GPSHS Mothers' Club.

School-related activities have a special interest for Dorothea. A former teacher, she's married to a teacher: Mr. Bush is a high school French and English instructor in the Inner City's Murray-Wright (formerly known as Wilbur Wright) School, a man who, several years ago, was chosen "Teacher of the Month" by the Detroit Historical Society and the Detroit Education Association and whose collection of former students' graduation pictures, inscribed with such hand-written sentiments as "To My Favorite Teacher," is large and treasured.

"I'm so proud of him," says Mrs. Bush.

Was Directing Teacher

Dorothea worked as a Directing Teacher at the Poe School, a Wayne State University School Training School. She stopped teaching a year before her son was born and intends to go back "some day."

"But I'm not able to now," she says, "and I don't particularly want to now... I like what I'm doing—and I think that, if it's at all possible, a mother should 'be there' when her son or daughter comes home from school."

Dorothea earned her Bachelor's degree at the University of Michigan. She and her husband both earned their Masters degrees at Wayne.

They've taught Sunday School at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church. Their favorite "together" activity has GOT to be dancing: They've taken lessons in Latin American dancing and, at one point, belonged to EIGHT Square and Round dancing clubs in the Grosse Pointe area.

"But we're down to one now,"

Has Many Hobbies

Dorothea's personal hobbies include decoupage, gardening, flower arranging and sewing (she made the family room draperies). Her son, like so many young men today, is interested in music: He plays in the "Sons of Eve," a guitar group.

He's a pretty good swimmer, too; he won the loving cup (Dorothea's holding it in the picture), in the adult male swimming competition aboard the "France" at the start of the Bush family's European odyssey last summer.

They were gone nine-and-a-half wonderful weeks. It was Dorothea's second visit to Europe—she went once while she was still teaching—but a "first" for the two Bush men.

"Being a French teacher, my husband wanted to concentrate on France," Dorothea explains, "so we decided to go over on the France."

"I'd heard people say, 'I couldn't STAND five days in Paris; I'd be so BORED!'—but we found there wasn't time to do all the things we wanted to do, all the things a ship offers: Dance lessons, lending libraries, scuba lessons (Wes' favorite)..."

Really "Did" France

"We spent five days in Paris, rented a car and drove through the Chateau Country, then to the Riviera, Cannes and Nice... We left our car and traveled by Eurail Pass, to Rome, Naples, Sorrento, up to Florence, where we stayed in an old chateau—we dearly loved that city!"

"We visited Venice, Vienna, Salzburg and Innsbruck. In Switzerland, we took cable cars to the top of Mount Pilatus, came down via the cog railway, the steepest in the world... We went to Lucerne, Berne, Basel, took the Rhine Steamer for three days: That was delightful!"

"There are picture windows instead of portholes, a swimming pool aboard, and the boat stops every night so you can get off and tour the cities."

"We got off for good at Cologne, took the train to Brussels, went to Amsterdam, then to Copenhagen—I visited an old friend I'd known at the University of Michigan who's living now in Malmo—to Stockholm, to Oslo, flew to London, traveled up to the Shakespeare Country... And then flew home."

Fine People Everywhere

"And everywhere we went, in every country, we were very much impressed by the extreme friendliness of the people."

Fortunately, the Bushes' language problems were minimal. French is, of course, their strong point: Wes has been taking it formally since the fifth grade and his father has spoken only French to him since he was a baby.

"I think," smiles Dorothea, "Wes and the dog (Rennie, a six-year-old Brittany Spaniel) understand French as well as English!"

But even the best times end... there's always a new time coming.

Dorothea Bush expects her "new time" to be busy—but she also expects to enjoy her year as DBC Women's Committee chairman.

She's not "coming cold" to the job; she and Mr. Bush have served on the Club's entertainment committee, planning special events, and have chaired DBC's WAN (Wednesday Adult Night) summer parties.
