TREASURY AND CENTRAL BANK officials of the world's 10 richest nations met in emergency session in Bonn early Thursday, but adjourned in deadlock over how to ease the crisis menacing the French franc and perhaps other Western currencies. A West German spokesman said the only substantive discussion had been on Germany's offer to use the leverage of its current economic superiority to help France. Germany proposed limiting its exports to France by raising duties and encouraging imports by lowering them. Sources said the planned German move would cut West Germany's export surplus by about \$1.25 billion over

Friday, November 22

GREECE'S ARMY backed regime decided Thursday night to spare the life of Alexandros Panagoulis, who tried to kill the Greek Premier George Papadopoulos on August 13, a govern-ment official in Athens said. Panagoulis, a 30-year-old Army deserter, was sentenced to death on Sunday for desertion and sedition by a special court martial. He also received a 15year prison term for attempted homicide. He refused to appeal for a reprieve. The regime decided to reprieve him after a special cabinet meeting at the residence of regent Lt. General Zoitakis.

James H. Hare announced Friday that he expects a request for a recount on the daylight savings time issue which was first reported to have passed in the recent election but later found to have been defeated by 413 votes. Sunday, November 24

CHARLES DE GAULLE declared Saturday that he will not devalue the currency he has tried in his presidency to make one of the world's strongest. France's allies were stunned. Last week the 78-year-old general dismissed devaluation as "the worst of absurdities." He decided to fall back on France's \$3.9 billion gold reserves and \$2 billion of international support pledged to defend the franc.

PRESIDENT-ELECT and Mrs. Richard Nixon announced Saturday from New York that their daughter Julie, 20, will marry David Eisenhower, 20, grandson of former President Eisenhower, three days before Christmas, Vincent Peale will officiate.

Monday, November 25

PRESIDENT JOHNSON sent a telegram to French president Charles de Gaulle Sunday pledging that the United States would cooperate in efforts to prevent devaluation of the franc. De Gaulle, immediately wired back his appreciation. However, most Western bankers and financial experts believe de Gaulle's refusal to devalue the franc has plunged the world in another all-out money crisis.

Tuesday, November 26

HERBERT G. KLEIN, longtime aide of President-elect Richard Nixon, was named Monday by Nixon, to be in charge of all information originating from the White House and all cabinet departments. lle will be "director of com-munications" for the entire executive branch.

Ford introduced in 1951 the now famous "Detroit Plan" to place the orchestra on a sound financial basis-enlisting major support from business, foundations, and the city, with representation for sponsors on the Symphony board.

Semple said, and even today contributions from the business sector remain the keystone of fund support.

Flowever, over the past five or six years, Semple explained, a "new age" has descended on orchestras across the nation, characterized by the emergence of the orchestral musician as a virtual full-time professional with a commensurate salary. The Detroit Symphony's annual budget has risen from less than \$1-million six years ago to \$2.2million for the current year, he said, while three orchestras have moved up to an annual. budget of \$4-million or more.

Even if the Symphony can meet its ambitious annual maintenance and endowment fund goals between now and 1972, Semple said, current projections indicate that the Symphony will face a deficit of \$1/2million for that year unless other sources of income are found. Hopefully, a continuing bequest program and new support from several levels of government will help fill this gap.

Semple said that The Ford Foundation foresaw the economic plight confronting American orchestras and established an \$80.2 - million "challenge" grant program two years ago.

In reviewing how The Ford Foundation will assist the Symphony in its endowment campaign, Anderson explained that the Orchestra has been favored with two Foundation "chal-Symphony finances remained 1964, was for \$2-million. Half essentially in balance until 1963, the sum was an outright gift while the other million was made available to the Symphony on a one-for-three "matching' Symphony's maintenance basis until April, 1969. In 1966, The Foundation promised another \$1-million if the Symphony could raise an additional \$2million on its own by mid-1971.

The combination of Ford Foundation gifts and the Symphony's fulfillment of the "challenge" grant opportunities will result in \$8-million for the Symphony endowment fund, Anderson said. He added that the Symphony has set its sights higher, however, feeling a minimum endowment fund of \$10.8million will be needed by 1972.

Those first years of awareness and education were spent in a neighborhood that could be nothing but sheer delight to a child of that time. The house in which we and the damage done to newly were born and lived through this precious early period, asphalted streets is an additionwas small but adequate, and blessed with an unusually large L-shaped yard. There were fruit trees and grape the fact that countless gorgeous than worn out markings to proarbors, an ample vegetable garden, a separate detached structure for the storage of coal, and garden and lawn equipment . . . and a beautiful barn complete with hayloft, some moldering deerhides tacked on the wall, and empty stalls and a broken-down buggy.

The yard afforded plenty of room to play kids' baseball, football, or "Kick-the-Ricket," which pleased both us and all the parents involved. They were much happier when we were on the property and they could see us having fun and fights . . . both important parts of grow-

It was definitely what we later came to call a "commercial neighborhood," though we were not aware of it at the time. All the business activity so close at hand contributed tremendously to the excitement and contentment and education which can only come to children thus endowed by environment. Vivid recollections disclose, among the business establishments contained within that one block in which we lived: — a German butcher science, find a way to pass an children store, (now called a meat market); a tailoring shop, ordinance before the fall of Lethar store, (now called a meat market); a tailoring shop, whose beloved proprietor called us in to share matzoth with him every Passover. (We also broke windows in his shop practically every time we played baseball, but father seemed to consider that an expected expense connected issue to have joined us in drawwith having us in our own yard, and made weekly settlements for damages without rancor or question.)

On the other side of our house was a German bakery which produced everything from bread, (which we used to help extract, on long, wooden paddles, from the huge brick ovens), to fantastic French pasteries, ice cream cones which cost from one cent to two-for-a-nickel, and a wide assortment of penny candy. Next to the bakery two double houses punctuated the landscape up to the location of a marvelous grocery store, with the owner's home next door completing the block on that side.

The other side of the street contained a few more double houses, a tiny church of forgotten faith, a coal and ice dealer, complete with stables, horses we helped curry, ice and coal wagons which we frequently rode with their friendly drivers; a barber shop with shelves of monogrammed shaving mugs; a drug store with marble-topped tables with stout wire legs, and chairs To the Editor: similarly supported, beautiful big apothecary jars in various colors, phosphate bottles and enhancing racks of drawers which held all the mysterious ingredients of which prescriptions are compounded; a notion store which dispensed everything from needles and thread to dust coats for intreped motorists; and a shoe repair shop presided over by a lovingly indulgent Italian.

Our family doctor, who delivered all four of us children at home, lived in the next block, which also boasted an undertaking establishment whose stables contained magnificent patent leather funeral carriages and coal were available, some purpose black horses.

That was the setting for the most glorious childhood dalism in any form . . . a despicable demonstrativeness one could imagine. When the fourth baby was soon to be introduced into the family, it was time to move . . . but not very far. No change of schools or friends was required. We were still within easy walking distance of everything encompassed in our young lives. Upon graduation from grade school, it was a much longer walk to high school. (a mile and a half each way,) but this didn't bother anvone. No more did it concern any of us that the twiceweekly trips to the YMCA gym classes were the same distance. Some of our friends had bicycles, but walking was considered both acceptable and fun, affording a much better chance to see what was going on about us
