Thursday, January 23
MICHIGAN INCOME this year will be \$1,453,200,000 and expenditures will be \$1,510,600,000. The state's general fund will be kept out of the red only by using the \$70.3 million surplus expected at the end of the current fiscal year. It is believed that the new Governor's first budget is merely delaying the day of reckoning on a tax increase.

WILLIAM G. MILLIKEN was sworn in as Michigan's 44th governor Wednesday. The 46-year-old Milliken told reporters, "I'm ready for the job — and eager to get started on it." He pledged a total commitment to the people of the state by working to improve the quality of life in Michigan.

Friday, January 24
THE SENATE confirmed President Nixon's nomination of Walter Hickel as Secretary of the Interior, overriding the opposition of a few Democrats. Hickel was the only Nixon nominee not unanimously confirmed by the Senate.

A TORNADO sweeping across central Mississippi killed 31 people. Damage was widespread in three counties, and it is expected that more bodies will be found as clean-up operations begin. Gov. John Bell Williams pledged state aid in setting up emergency facilities.

THE NIXON ADMINISTRATION announced Friday an increase to seven and one-half percent in the maximum interest rate on mortgages insured by the Federal Housing Administration. Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, George Romney, said when he made the increase announcement that the rate was determined after consultation with the Veterans Administration, which disclosed a similar interest rate for GI loans.

Sunday, January 26
PLANS FOR A DOMED sports stadium at the Michigan State Fairgrounds moved ahead Saturday with the disclosure that impartial experts will be named next week to determine whether the stadium would be economically practical. Alfred R. Glancy, Jr., of Lakeshore road, chairman of the Michigan State Fair Authority, said his group has determined the Eight Mile and Woodward site is the best available for the facility and has developed a model of what it would like to build there. He added that the group will now have to determine if the stadium can be built, financed and maintained under its own earning power.

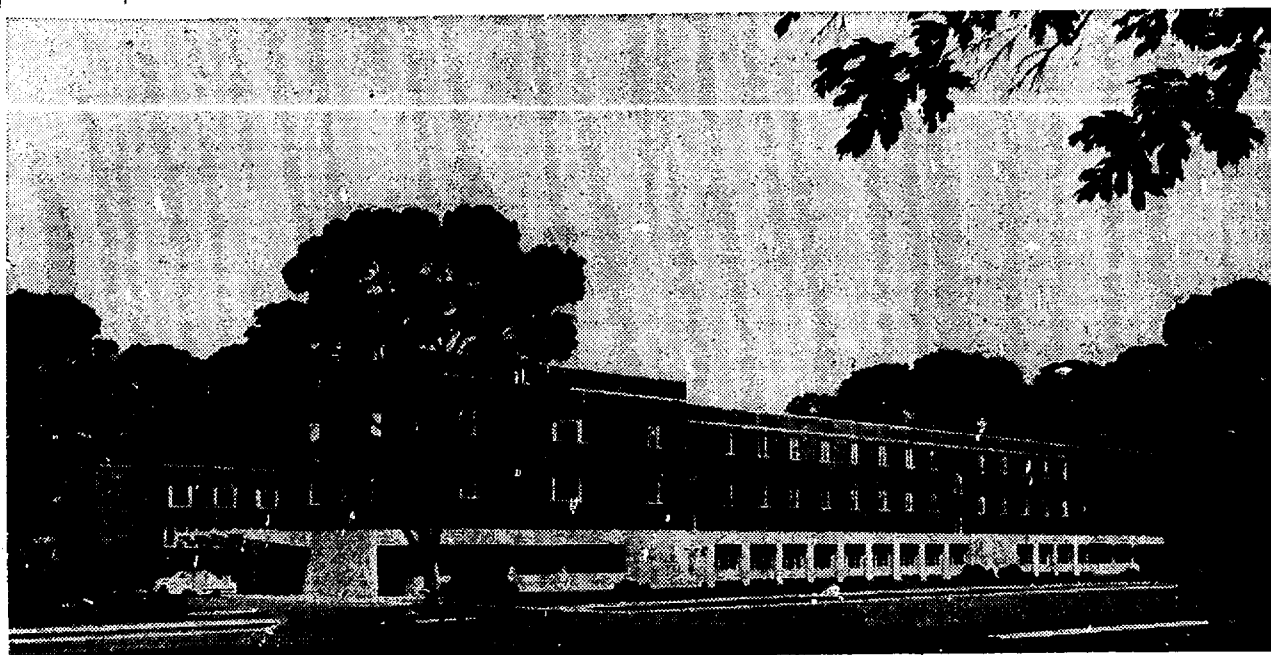
Monday, January 27
MORE THAN 9,000 persons sought shelter Sunday from mudslides and floods which devastated Southern California, causing more than \$30 million damage. The death toll after nine days of storms is 87. President Nixon declared the entire state a major disaster area and provided \$3 million in federal funds for relief operations. The announcement said more funds were available if needed.

THE FLOODING River Raisin appeared stabilized late Sunday night after repeated dynamite charges were used to blast ice jams that formed at the Winchester Bridge in Monroe, Mich. The flood extended seven blocks along Front and Elm streets and lapped to within a block of the downtown shopping district when the threat was halted.

Tuesday, January 28
IRAQ PUT ITS armed forces on alert Monday in expectation that Israel would retaliate for the hangings of nine Jews and five others on spy charges earlier in the day.

PRESIDENT NIXON, in his first White House press conference Monday, declared that he would be willing to accept nuclear "sufficiency" instead of "superiority" over the Russians. He also warned that peace in Vietnam would take time and cautioned against any premature moves toward reconciliation with Communist China and the Soviet Union.

Two Brothers Attack Police After Crash

Officers and Youths Require Hospital Treatment Following Struggle at Accident Scene

Two Farms police officers, answering an accident call at Mack avenue and Bournemouthe road on Sunday, January 26, were injured in a scuffle with two brothers who attacked the policemen without provocation. One brother suffered a gash on the head when other officers were forced to subdue the assailants.

Warrants approved by Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Angelo Pentolino, charge the brothers, Dorian P. Griffin, 22, and Dwayne M., 17, both of 490 Bournemouthe, with assaulting a police officer.

Treated for injuries at St. John Hospital were Patrolman John Kraiza, who suffered a gash over the left eye that required three stitches; and Patrolman Donald Dewey, who suffered multiple bruises and scratches about the face and neck. Both had x-rays taken for (Continued on Page 4)

Cottage Hospital Addition Wins Approval of Council; To Cost at Least \$2 Million

Work to Start in Early Spring; Houses on East Side of Muir Road Will be Demolished To Provide Room for Expansion Program

What better time for a hospital to announce plans for expansion and modernization than in its 50th Anniversary Year? Cottage Hospital, which has served the residents of this community for the past 50 years and which hopes to better serve it through an expanded and modernized hospital facility, has received the long-awaited approval from the Greater Detroit Area Hospital Board.

The hospital is still awaiting the Council's decision concerning the addition of two floors of patient beds in the new wing.

Included in the immediate future of the hospital is the addition of an Intensive Care Unit and Physio-Therapy Department, new facilities for the operating and emergency rooms, an enlarged Radiology department, laboratory, storeroom and central supply, and other extensive modernization and expansion.

Way Back Then
Cottage Hospital was mentioned on October 1, 1919 in the hospital journal which presented the following information: "The Cottage Hospital is a direct result of the influenza epidemic of 1918. There were at that time nearly 600 cases, with seven deaths, in the Township of Grosse Pointe, and many severe cases had to be neglected as the nurses employed by the Board of Health, and the graduate nurses, and volunteers supplied by the Neighborhood Club, were unable to cover the area. The crying need for a small hospital, where severe cases could be concentrated was evident. Baroness Von Kettler, who was a nurse's aid during the epidemic, had the situation before her and initiated the movement to raise funds to buy and furnish a Cottage Hospital. She enlisted the help of Mrs. Benjamin Warren, Mrs. John S. Newberry, Mrs. Phillip McMillan, Mrs. Murray W. Sales, Mrs. Witter Peabody and Mrs. R. P. Joy. Frank W. Hubbard acted as trustee for the fund."

Women Victims Of Purse Thief

A thief accosted a mother and daughter in front of 951 Beaconsfield, on Wednesday, January 22, grabbing the mother's purse but unable to seize the daughter's according to information released by Park police.

Mrs. Sophia Elange of 950 Kitchener, and her daughter, Mrs. Alice Tropper, same address, told police that they were crossing Beaconsfield, from number 966, to their parked car, when the thief took place.

The women said that as they reached their vehicle, a man ran toward them from a southeasterly direction, and snatched Mrs. Elange's purse. Mrs. Elange said that she was surprised she offered no resistance, but not so her daughter.

When the robber made a grab for Mrs. Tropper's purse, she put up a battle. The discourteous thief finally gave up, and fled south, toward Fairfax, where he disappeared, taking the mother's purse with him.

Mrs. Elange said that the purse contained about \$28 in cash, and personal items. Neither she nor her daughter could tell police if the thief got into a car, or in which direction he had escaped on Fairfax.

They described the man as being a Negro, about 18 or 19 years old, five feet eleven inches tall, with light complexion and medium build. He was wearing a red shirt and dark trousers, and in spite of the 35-40 degree weather, no hat or jacket.

A search of the area by police officers was unsuccessful in locating the culprit.

Arrest Man Two Accuse Of Accosting

City Officers Nab Suspect Also Wanted in Farms; Hearing Set for Wednesday, February 26

Within hours after the mother of a 15-year-old student at Grosse Pointe South High School notified City police that her daughter had been accosted while walking home from school on Friday, January 24, police picked up a suspect.

The girl was walking north on Rivard at Kercheval when a man in an old model, black car spotted her and asked where Cadieux road was. The girl approached the car to direct the man. The man then asked her to get into his car and go for a ride. The girl fled. She described the man as about 30 years of age, thin, with black hair and black rimmed glasses.

The suspect was next spotted by City Patrolmen John Drummond and Richard Lanski while they were on routine patrol on Kercheval three hours later. At that time they noticed a car fitting the description of the accoster's car traveling east on Kercheval. The officers pursued the vehicle.

Ignore Stop Sign
The driver failed to stop for a stop sign at Lincoln and Kercheval then took a left turn on Kercheval and another left on Washington. The officers then radioed the station with the information that they were pursuing the suspected accoster.

The driver, Raymond Roy Miller, 3008 Eastlawn, Detroit, was stopped on Lincoln at St. Paul. Police issued Miller a violation for the Stop Law. He was then advised of his rights. After talking with Miller the officers placed him under arrest on suspicion of accosting.

He was taken to the City police station, and once again advised of his rights. Miller admitted to officers that he had spoken to some young girls earlier in the day to ask directions.

Couldn't Be Positive
The girl was called to City station to identify the man. He was placed in a line up and the girl selected Miller out of the line-up, but indicated that she could not make a positive identification.

Further investigation revealed that the Farms police had an accosting complaint that might be associated with this arrest. They contacted a 15-year-old boy who had reported that on January 18, a man who had picked him up while he was hitch-hiking at Stephens and Kercheval, had exposed himself to the youth.

The youth went to the station and positively identified Miller as the man.

Miller was turned over to Farms police and a hold was placed on him for the City of Grosse Pointe. Miller was released on \$50 cash bond and charged as a disorderly person. A court date was set for Wednesday, February 26.

Create Committee To Seek Solution To Convent Edict

New York Province Sending Representatives to Discuss Alternate Plans and Proposals With Committee

Parents of students and alumnae at the Academy of the Sacred Heart continue to work toward a solution to the problem created by the announcement of the New York Province of the Society of the Sacred Heart to close the doors of the Pointe landmark in June of this year.

Currently the Campus Committee president, Peter J. Mercier, is awaiting a hearing before Judge Horace Gilmore in Wayne County Circuit Court, on Friday, January 31. Mr. Mercier, who has two children in attendance at the Academy, has filed as plaintiff in a "class action" pursuant to the applicable Michigan Court rules, where he hopes to enjoin the Academy from disposing of the property now occupied by the school and for such relief as the court deems proper and equitable.

Committee Elected
In the meantime a Planning Committee has been formed. The first meeting was held on Monday, January 20, at the Convent. The following people were elected: Charles Bayer, Mrs. Januarius A. Mullen, Miles O'Brien, Sr., Frank H. Mullen, C. Bradford Lundy, Jr., Mary Ann Beattie, Mrs. Walter Briggs Robinson, William H. Griffith and Robert L. Gottfredson.

Members of the committee met again on Wednesday, January 22, at the home of Mrs. Mullen. At that time they elected Mrs. Walter Briggs Robinson, chairman and Miles M. O'Brien, co-chairman.

Members of the Provincial Council of the New York Province of the Society of the Sacred Heart were scheduled to fly in on Wednesday, January 29, to begin discussions of new and alternate plans and proposals.

The committee has been formed in the hope that through mutual endeavors some solution to the problem can be formulated.

Upon arrival officers were told that a white female, a white male and a Negro male, entered the store and left with a pair of striped bell bottom slacks and a pink blouse.

The girl, described as being about 20 years of age, slender and with blonde hair, then entered the gas station next to Kay Baum's and changed into the stolen merchandise. The trio escaped in a '68, gray Oldsmobile.

Obtaining Good Teachers Requires Constant Fight

"We are committed to getting and keeping the best staff available," Lawrence F. Kennedy, Assistant Superintendent - Personnel for The Grosse Pointe Public School System, said Monday night to the delegates of the PTA Council.

During the course of his address, "Staffing Our Schools," Mr. Kennedy provided comprehensive data on the recruitment process which he directs and focused on problems caused by the demands of an ever-growing school-age population, a mobile society, the impact of collective bargaining, and the nationwide dilemma of financing public education.

Mr. Kennedy said that the schools annually survey professional staff candidates in 18 or 20 states and cover 70 to 80 campuses in the process. "This

provides us with 1,000 to 1,200 prospective employees for our 100 to 150 vacancies each year," he said.

Citing the growth of the school system, he commented that in the past decade the professional staff has increased 46 per cent, the office force 68 per cent, and the plant personnel 29 per cent to accommodate the increase in the student body. The additional personnel have enabled the schools to provide an enriched program and additional services.

Experts Give Scary Facts About Users

Participants in Program at North High Impressed; May Extend Format to Other Classes

If any ninth graders at Grosse Pointe North High School are unaware of the effects of LSD and other drugs, it will not be the fault of the teachers in the social studies department. Working under the direction of John Corbin, department head and Dr. William Craig, principal, they planned a two-day program of education and information in cooperation with authorities in the fields of law enforcement, pharmacy, and scientific research.

The students were provided with many facts related to the legal and medical aspects of drug consumption during their social studies class.

Over and over, speaker after speaker stressed the unpredictability of a person's behavior when he is under the effect of drugs.

Students were informed that, in the case of hallucinogenics, for example, because drugs react differently on each person, even a single dose may cause long-term physical and mental damage. They are even reported to have induced cancer.

May Extend Program
Teachers and administrators at North High are studying carefully the program, evaluation sheets completed by ninth graders on the two-day program with an eye to extending the format to other classes.

"Many of the comments on the evaluation sheets stressed the importance of the need for parents involvement," Mr. Corbin said on Monday. He added that based upon a tabulation of more than half of the questionnaires, 96 percent of the students indicated that the film used was worthwhile, 95 percent said that the question-and-answer periods were valuable, 89 percent believed that the kind of program was necessary.

"More than 90 percent of the students polled evaluated the Drug Abuse Program as 'excellent' to 'good,'" he added. "Students' comments provided us with additional insights," he said.

Students Are Impressed
The evaluation sheet asked eight specific questions ("Was the film worthwhile in the treatment of the subject of narcotics?") and provided a space for comments. Three students wrote:

"It really gave us the information on what happens to a person who takes drugs."

"The panel was very informative. It was a good idea to bring in university students."

"The panel was very good and I learned that I never would want to take any kind of narcotics."

See Sal Mineo Film

At the initial hour-long session, held Thursday, the students saw the contemporary film, narrated by Sal Mineo, "Insight or Insanity?" designed to provide background information on LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs. The film covered the historical development from its discovery in Switzerland in 1938 by researchers working on a cure for migraine.

The effects of LSD were described to the students: the appearance of strange patterns of wildly moving colors; suspension of time; appearance of faces appearing and melting away; the recall in terrifying detail, of long forgotten incidents; a loss of normal cause and effect relationships; and loss of judgment.

Experts Questioned

Following the film the students had the opportunity to ask questions of three authorities who were available to comment on various aspects of the drug problem as it affects youth: Detective Martin Trombley of the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Department; S. A. Macy, Director of Pharmaceutical Services at Grosse Pointe's Cottage Hospital; and Eugene Dembecke, a research scientist at Detroit's Lafayette Clinic.

In answer to a student's question on the effect of LSD, one of the authorities said that a

of the hospital and its maintenance for one year. Of this fund about \$10,000 remained on hand. In September the adjoining cottage on the east was purchased, and between the two cottages an adequate operating room and maternity room were built, thus joining the two buildings.

Soon the frame cottages on Oak Street became inadequate to care for the growing population of Grosse Pointe and by 1927 it seemed necessary to build a much larger and more permanent hospital.

Generous Requests

Shortly before this decision was made, Mrs. McMillan made a generous bequest which made the trustees confident that such a step might be undertaken.

Burns Henry then gave the hospital a large piece of land. The use of this land was made possible by buying the adjacent property and cutting through the present Mapleton road, so there would be better access to the hospital grounds.

A building committee, with Mrs. Frank Brooks, Jr. as chairman, was then formed. Mrs. John Rumney agreed to act as head of the fund raising campaign for the new building.

It was in the same year that the hospital became incorporated as a separate organization and the Mutual Aid and Neighborhood Club legally signed a paper transferring various properties to the Cottage Hospital organization.

New Building Opened

In the fall of 1928, the fine new building was ready. The building was opened for public viewing on November 4, 5, and 6. The hospital's new capacity was 58 beds, 14 private rooms, 31 ward beds or cubicles and 13 bassinets.

Mr. and Mrs. Murray W. Sales made one of the most outstanding contributions at that time by donating the entire children's wing in memory of their children, Frances, Murray and Leonard. Mrs. John Newberry gave a beautiful home for nurses, which was completely furnished by Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Ford.

From 1928 through 1940 the hospital seemed large enough to fill the demands made upon it, although it was often overcrowded.

But looking into the future, trustees and staff saw that Grosse Pointe was changing from a small community into a large crowded suburb of an industrial metropolis.

Need To Expand Again

The trustees decided the time had come to once again branch out. Plans were made to build an addition and enlarge and modernize the X-ray department. This plan was implemented and through the kind generosity of Mrs. Richard P. Joy and Ella Joy a second floor was added, the entire expense of which they assumed. This meant six extra private rooms, as memorials to Richard P. and Thomas Joy.

Mrs. Murray W. Sales, one of the hospital's most loyal and devoted friends died in January, 1943. At that time so many gifts were sent to the hospital in her memory that a permanent Memorial Fund was established. In the years that followed this fund enabled the hospital to buy several pieces of expensive equipment which otherwise would not have been

possible. The fund has provided a constant source of growing revenue through the years.

Many New Facilities

Now in its 50th Anniversary year the staff and administration have once again seen the growing need of the community for expanded hospital services and once again stepped into the breach. This new addition will provide space for a new Physical Therapy unit, a new Central Supply, a new Inhalation Therapy Department, new kitchen and cafeteria facilities. There will also be space provided for meeting and conference rooms, offices, maintenance units. These will all be located in the basement of the new wing.

The ground floor addition will house a new Operating Room suite consisting of five rooms, a new Emergency Suite, a six-bed Recovery Suite, Radiology Laboratory and Pharmacy areas will also be expanded. Provisions have also been made in the addition for a six bed Intensive Coronary Care Units.

To Demolish Houses

The expansion will mean that hospital owned houses on Muir road will have to be demolished, but renters were notified over a year ago about the impending expansion. The demolition of these homes will provide space for the addition and additional parking that will be required by the hospital's expected increased patients and traffic.

The work on the expansion will begin in the spring of this year and hopefully be completed by December, 1970.

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

Judge Don Goodrow Hears 34 Cases in Woods Court

Woods Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow passed judgment on 34 persons who appeared in his court on Saturday, January 25, to answer law violation charges. Twenty-eight of the accused were adjudged guilty, and six had their cases dismissed.

The judge signed warrants for the arrest of 23 persons who failed to appear in answer to summonses.

The following were found guilty of charges brought against them:

In separate cases, Ricardo Walczak of 13063 Burgundy, Warren, and Arthur Markle of 29636 Bonnie, Warren, charged as minors in possession of alcohol. Both were assessed costs of \$15 and sentenced to 10 days in jail.

Mark Stevens of 20821 Bonheur, St. Clair Shores, charged as a minor in possession of alcohol and driving with defective lights. He was fined \$15 on the first count and \$2 on the second.

Bruce Blackburn of 1528 Brys drive, Grosse Pointe, accused of improper use of license plates and having no registration for his vehicle. Fined \$25.

James Denomme of 460 McKinley avenue, Grosse Pointe, paid a fine of \$15 for failing to stop and causing an accident.

Norman Fisher of 23025 Linge-man, St. Clair Shores, accused of being a disorderly person and fined \$35.

We need the balance that those from other parts of the country can bring to a local assignment. We strive to achieve a cosmopolitan staff," Mr. Kennedy said.

"We seek to identify the gifted, flexible man or woman who has a true commitment to education," he added.

"As we attempt to forecast costs for future budgets, we face two problems. First, our desire to improve the educational program. Second, our teachers, like those across the land, are pressing for salaries which they consider to be in line with their true worth as professionals," he said.

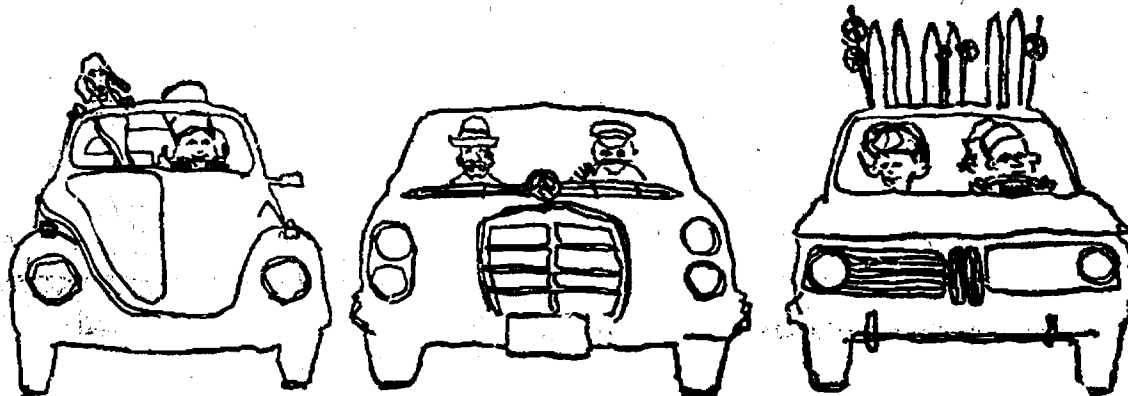
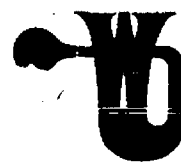

Although those who have taken LSD claim that their powers of creativity and self-awareness are enhanced, scientific studies do not support these claims.

"It is absolutely impossible to determine whether a person taking LSD will have a bad experience or a pleasant one," one panelist said. "Instant insanity could be caused by a single dose of LSD," he added.

possible skull fractures, according to Farms Police Chief Jack F. Roh, who was one of the policemen who rushed to the scene when a "Police officers need help" broadcast was radioed to all units.

Brothers Also Hurt
Also treated at the hospital were Dwayne, who suffered a gash atop his head that required four stitches, and Dorian, who complained of a sore abdomen.

The brothers were arraigned before Park Municipal Judge C. Joseph Belanger, who presided in the Farms court in the absence of Judge Robert Pytell. The pair entered pleas of innocent, and their examination was set for yesterday, January 29. Both were released on \$1,500 bond each, pending the examination.

Kraiza and Dewey, while on routine patrol, received a broadcast at 2:41 p.m. to investigate a reported accident at Mack and Bournemouth, and arrived to find Dorian and Dwayne in a 1963 Cadillac convertible. The car was over the northeast corner of the intersection, with the front end resting against a traffic sign.

Lost Control of Car
Dwayne, who was the driver, told the officers that he was making a right turn from Mack onto Bournemouth, when the vehicle slid and he lost control.

Kraiza and Dewey asked Dwayne to sit in their scout car while giving information for a report. The youth was settled in the rear seat, when Dorian, who the officers said was intoxicated, followed and sat with his brother.

Dorian left the car door open, and was asked to close it by Kraiza. The older brother, mouthing an obscenity, wanted to know for what reason and was told because of the cold.

Whereupon, Dorian snarled, "I've taken enough — from all you punks during the past two years to fill me up to here," making a gesture commonly used to indicate one was filled up.

Placed Under Arrest
Dewey politely asked the man to control his temper, or leave the car. Dorian mouthed more obscenities, after which Kraiza informed him that he was under arrest for disorderly conduct and being drunk.

Dorian got out of the police vehicle and walked away. Kraiza walked after him and as he approached Dorian, the man turned and swung a blow at the

officer, hitting him in the chest, and the fight began.

As Kraiza was trying to subdue Dorian, Dwayne got out of the scout car and jumped on Kraiza's back, and Dewey went to his partner's assistance. The policemen were kicked, punched and scratched by the brothers, according to a submitted report. During the fight, Kraiza suffered the gash over his eye.

Kraiza radioed for help, then returned to aid Dewey. The call brought Chief Roh, and Farms Sgt. Marvin Krebs and Patrolman Ronald Wooten, and several units from the Woods, City and Shores.

Forced to Use Clubs
According to the police report, Wooten pulled Dwayne away from Kraiza. Dwayne attacked Wooten, who had to use force to subdue the youth, and during this mix-up the officer struck the teenager on the arms and shoulders with a club to beat him off. Dwayne suffered the gash, when he was struck on the head.

The younger brother was grabbed by Krebs and dragged to a police car, where he was handcuffed. Dorian was also subdued and handcuffed, and the brothers were taken to the hospital for treatment of their injuries, then taken to the Farms station by the chief and the sergeant, and booked for disorderly conduct and assaulting a police officer.

Any person assaulting a policeman in the performance of his duty, faces a stiff penalty under a Michigan law. The law reads:

Could Set Two Years
"Any person who forcibly assaults or commits a bodily injury which requires medical care or attention upon a peace or police officer of this State, while the peace or police officer is engaged in making a lawful arrest, knowing him to be a peace or police officer, is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not exceeding \$1,000, or by imprisonment in a State Prison for not more than two years, or both."

Chief Roh said that he sent Kraiza and Dewey home after the officers were given treatment for their injuries, but the policemen reported for duty the following day.

Ski Equipment Taken from Car

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Elm Spraying, Sea Wall Projects Contracts Let

At its bi-monthly meeting held on Monday, January 27, the Park council awarded contracts for two specific projects, the spraying of elm trees by the use of helicopters, and the construction of a seawall extension in the Waterfront Park.

After a two-week study of the programs, the council decided to give the spraying job to the Ag Helicopter, Inc., of Detroit, which offered to do the work at 60 cents per public-owned tree, and 75 cents per private-owned, for an over all total of \$3,975. The firm will use methoxychlor purchased by the city, in a one-time-only spraying, to be done as soon as the weather permits. The elms will be treated during their dormant stage.

The A. J. Dupuis company of Detroit, was given the contract to build an extension to the present seawall at the park. It offered to do this project for the low bid of \$56,000.

The helicopter method of spraying is a comparatively new method, and it is superior to the conventional method of spraying from the ground, according to information given to the council by Herbert Heger, Director of Public Services.

He told the council that spraying of a tree requires an average of between one-half a gallon to one gallon of chemical, depending on its size. There is a saving by using helicopters, in that the trees are sprayed from above and are saturated from top to bottom, especially the top, which is the most sensitive part of the plant. Too, less chemical is needed, Heger added.

The conventional method of spray is fine, it was said, but this way, the top is rarely touched by the chemicals spurted from equipment from the ground.

At the last council meeting, City Manager Robert Slone informed the council that the 1968 spraying program cost the city approximately \$22,000, using chemicals purchased by the city, and using Department of

Public Works personnel and equipment.

The total cost of purchasing methoxychlor and spreading over the trees by "choppers," this year will cost the Park a total of \$3,975.

There are approximately 3,500 publicly-owned elms and about 2,500 on private property.

Residents will be given ample warning before spraying is done on their streets, to give them time to remove their cars, Slone said. The next quarterly newsletter will designate the time and day when each area will be sprayed, he said.

Slone said that the seawall is needed to protect boats berthed in wells, and to prevent erosion of land area by wave action. Work on this project should be completed within 90 days from the time it is started, or by the time the boating season officially opens on May 1.

OKAY RESOLUTION
At its meeting held on Monday, January 27, the Park Council approved a resolution thanking Councilman William Luedders for his services as the city's appointed representative on the Wayne County Board of Supervisors since 1964. The 134-member Board ceased to exist on January 1, and was replaced by a much lesser number of supervisors elected by the people.

Lack of Phone Helpful to Thief

The Famous Cleaners store at 20737 Mack was held up and robbed on Friday, January 24.

Miss Robin Wilkinson, part time employee of the store and a student at Grosse Pointe North High School, was approached by a young man approximately 24 years old who said he was looking for a job. She suggested he apply at the downtown headquarters of Famous Cleaners.

At this point, the young man asked to use the store's phone. When informed by Miss Wilkinson that there was not one in the store, he put his hand in his pocket as though he had a gun and announced the holdup. He demanded the money in the cash register and warned Miss Wilkinson that she would not be hurt if she did as he demanded.

She gave the thief a total of \$7, then he left the store and made good his escape.

Police were hampered in their investigation because there was no phone in the store. Miss Wilkinson had to leave the store, find a phone and then get change before she called the police.

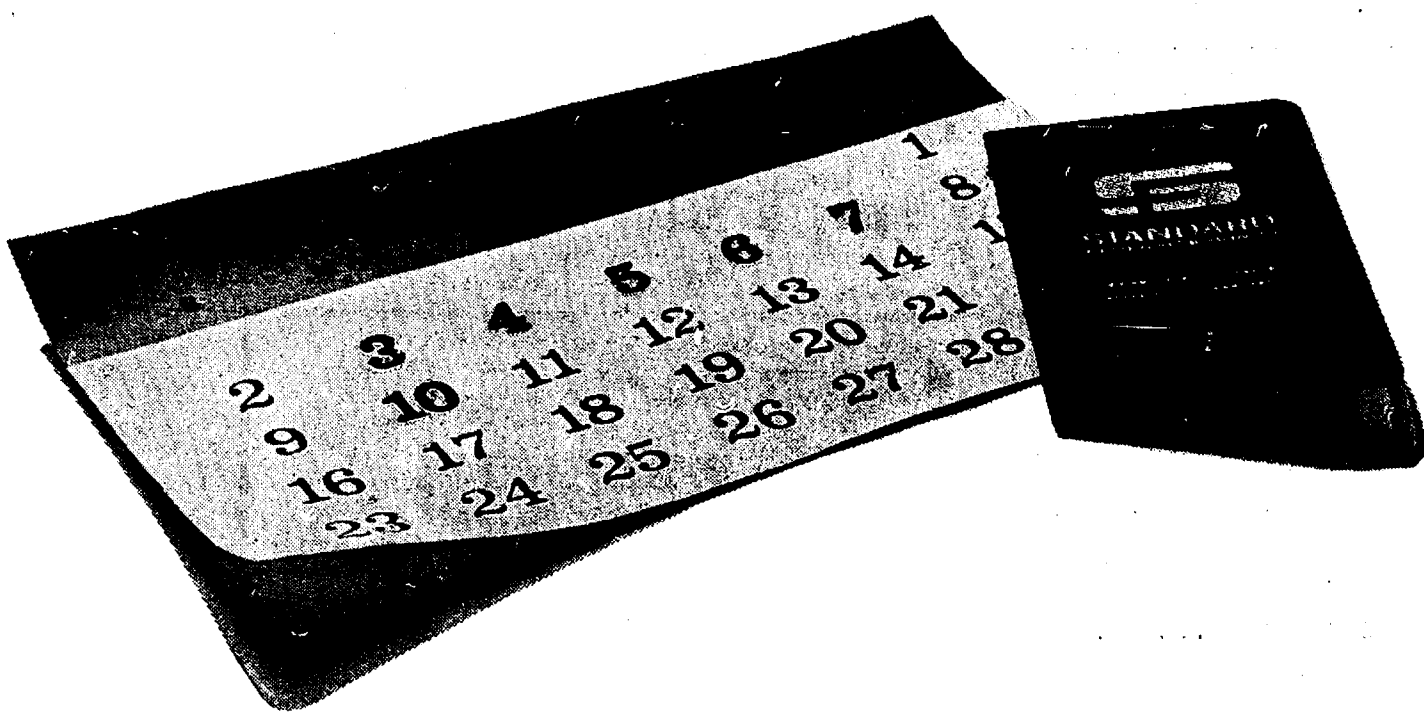

Police Recover 50 License Plate Sets Stolen from AAA

Detroit police, with the co-operative efforts of Park detectives, arrested several persons and recovered most of the loot reported stolen from the Pointe branch of the American Automobile Club of Michigan, Jefferson and Somerset, in a December 22 burglary, it was disclosed on Monday, January 27.

Included among the recovered loot were 50 sets of 1968 license plates taken from the AAA office, and personal items, including a Polaroid camera, belonging to office employees, according to information released by Park Det. Sgt. LaPratt.

LaPratt said that one set of plates was found on a stolen car recovered by East Detroit police, and a second set was on a stolen car recovered by Warren authorities. The other 48 sets were found in the possession of a Detroit man, along with hundreds of dollars worth of other stolen items, said to have been taken from homes in five surrounding communities.

Detroit detectives, accompanied by LaPratt, and Park Dets. Robert Saiford and Charles Petrie, armed with search warrants, went to the homes of several suspects, and recovered goods reported to have been taken from homes in the five-city area.

The investigation, which is very extensive and extremely complicated, is still underway, it was said, and no names of those in custody have been released. Those arrested, however, have been charged in warrants obtained by Detroit police, with being in possession of stolen property.

On the December 22 date, the burglars who broke into the AAA office, left the place in a complete shambles. It appeared that every single desk drawer on the first floor and drawers of the files in the basement of the building had been pulled and searched, and the contents dumped on the floor. This included office records and papers and personal items of the employees.

A safe, on rollers, was taken from the Claims office by the thieves and wheeled to a storage room a short distance away, and an unsuccessful attempt was made to "peel" it. The dial had been knocked off, and the safe tipped over on its side, and the burglars tried to get into the vault from the bottom.

George Measel, branch manager, said, at the last report, that efforts to unscramble the mess made by the robbers, and the repairing of damages, are still uncompleted. Until everything has been restored to order, business is being conducted out of two trailers at the rear of the office building, he pointed out.

A second breaking and entering of the AAA office was reported on Tuesday, January 21, the Park detectives said, but nothing appeared to have been taken.

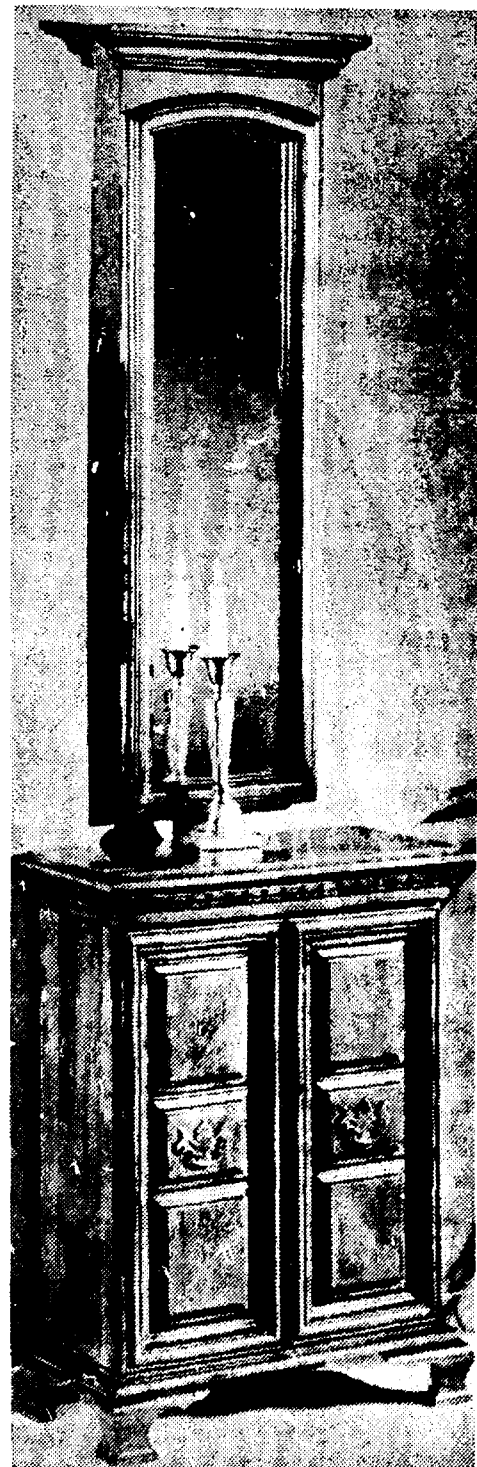

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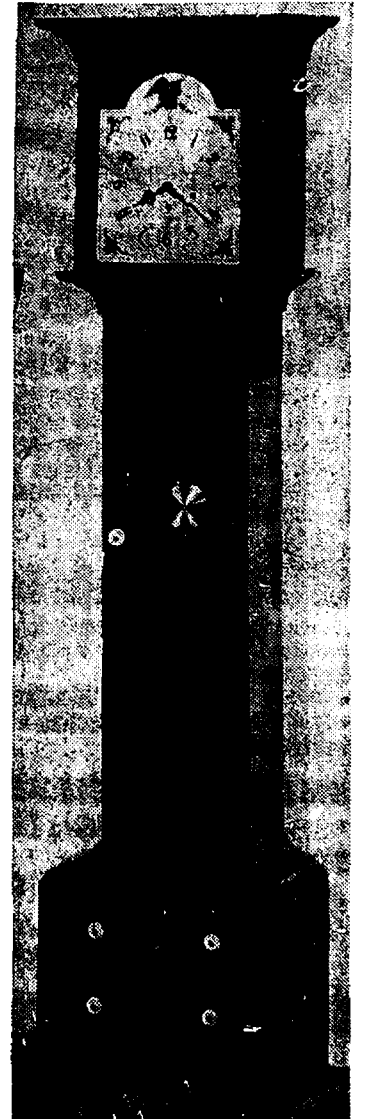

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**Blaze Damages
Obert Residence**

A two-alarm fire, believed to have been started by careless smoking, damaged the entire second floor of the home of Mrs. Mary Obert, 315 Ridgemont, on Thursday, January 23, according to information released by Farms Fire Chief William Mason.

The chief said that the blaze originated in a back bedroom on the second floor and spread throughout the second floor and attic. When firefighters arrived, clouds of black smoke were pouring out of the eaves, but no flames were visible, it was said.

The first alarm was called in by an unknown neighbor of the Obert family at 2:28 p.m., after which Mrs. Obert's son, John, 17, not knowing that the alarm had been given, called the Fire Department.

Fire Capt. Michael Beaupre, on arrival at the scene, promptly called for Mutual Aid assistance, and the City Fire Department dispatched two fire trucks and five firemen. All Farms equipment, and 10 Farms firemen, including off-duty personnel, responded to the fire.

Chief Mason said that the fire was brought under control within 30 minutes, and extinguished in approximately one hour, but not before one bedroom was completely destroyed, and another badly damaged. Heat and smoke damage was heavy on the second floor, but the first floor was hardly touched by the smoke, and the water damage to the walls and furniture on this level was extremely minor, the chief added.

No one was injured fighting the blaze, the chief said. Members of the Obert family also escaped unharmed, he reported.

"I want to compliment the men of my department, and those from the City Fire Department, for doing a tremendous job in putting out the fire, and keeping damages confined to the second floor and attic," the chief said. "While several firemen manned the hoses to battle the flames, other personnel, working extremely fast, placed salvage covers over the furniture and appliances on the first floor, which prevented smoke and water damage to these items."

"I cannot praise officers of the Farms Police Department enough, for their part in calling up off-duty firemen of my department, in directing traffic at the scene, and the all-around cooperation they gave while this was going on."

The chief said that when the second alarm was sounded, the police dispatcher called up off-duty firemen, and directed them to the location of the fire. This happened so fast, that by the time he arrived at the Obert home, all on-duty and off-duty firemen were battling the blaze, Chief Mason said.

"This indicates how closely the police and fire personnel work together here in our city, and in the other Pointes, as well," the chief said. "I cannot find the right words to express how pleased I am, that there is this kind of cooperation between the two departments."

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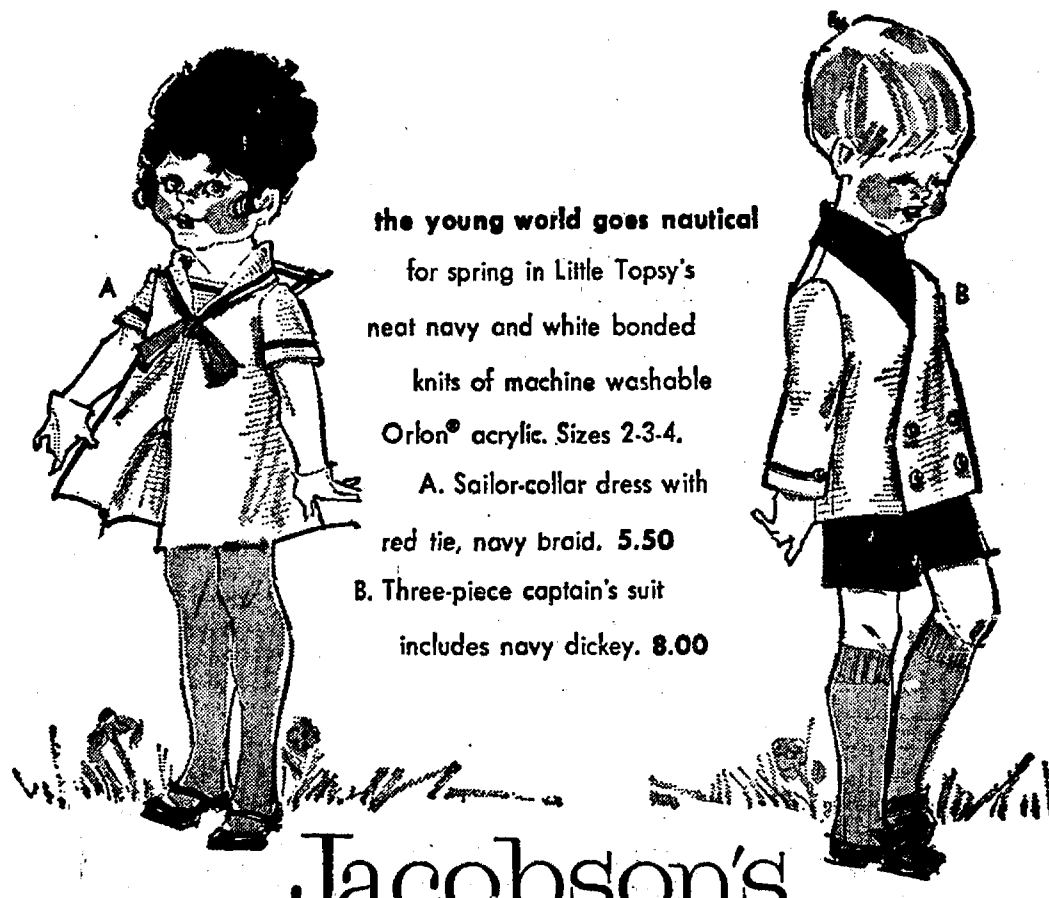

Income from the Fund enables the museum to purchase works of fine and decorative art. The annual municipal budget of nearly \$1,000,000 does not include money for additions to the Collection, one of the largest comprehensive collections in the U.S.

William M. Day, president of the Founders Society, joining Mr. Woods in acknowledging the Rogers' bequest, pointed out that the Founders Society is now embarked on a campaign to improve the museum's Endowment Fund to \$100,000,000 by 1985, the 100th anniversary of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

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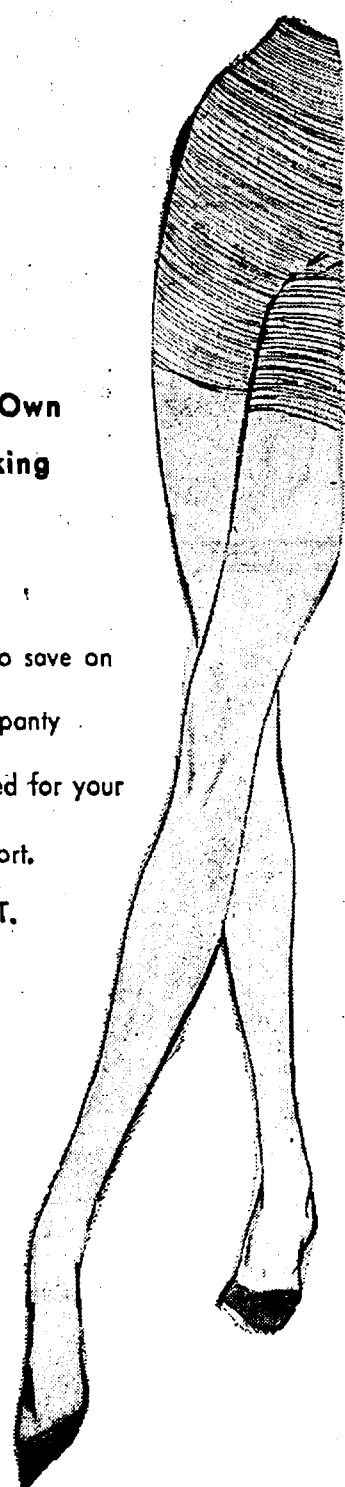
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Public Schools in Focus

Whether or not by design, practitioners of many professions seem to have a tendency to envelop themselves and their activities in a certain mystique. They accomplish this in many ways, but no more effectively than through the terminology they use.

We in education are as guilty as the others in employing a "jargon" and in relying on a kind of "alphabet soup" to designate various programs and activities. In a recent informal talk to some women at Richard School, one took me to task when I lapsed into what to her was unintelligible and unfathomable when I used three educational acronyms currently in wide use in Grosse Pointe: IMC, ERT, and ITA.

IMC stands for "Instructional Materials Center." While a "library" has traditionally been a collection of books, the tools of learning in general use today encompass an ever-widening field: records, films, tapes, and filmstrips. Although we could continue to use the term "library," it would hardly be descriptive of the expanded range of materials being utilized.

ERT stands for "Elementary Resource Teacher." In Grosse Pointe, our elementary schools' Instructional Materials Center are under the supervision of an ERT. In the past, the person holding such a position might have been called a "librarian" but today he deals with more than books. In our system the positions are filled by experienced master teachers who advise teachers on materials available for use with various lessons and who may be called upon to do demonstration teaching on request. A highly skilled ERT may well have an impact upon the instructional program of an entire school because of the expanded nature of the position.

ITA stands for "Initial Teaching Alphabet," a relatively new method of teaching reading which is in use in some of our schools. Dr. Albert Mazurkiewicz and Dr. Harold Tanyzer describe ITA in this way: "English orthography has some two thousand print forms for the forty-four sounds we use in speech. Faced with a confusion of spellings for each sound, the child loses confidence in the logical relation of written to spoken language—and hence he may lose confidence in his own ability to learn."

"An ITA program gives the child confidence by postponing the introduction of spelling irregularities until he has experienced the principles that relate writing to speech. The program starts the beginner on an alphabet with a one-to-one relation between sound and written character. The child associates each of the alphabet's forty-four characters with one sound and one sound only."

There is much more to be said about IMC, ERT, and ITA. However, the preceding brief introduction may clarify some confusion.

Rotary Club Contest

Fred Amrine, a junior at Grosse Pointe North High School, is this week's winner in the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club's Youth Forum Contest. He has been awarded \$25 for his winning entry which follows.

In view of certain anxieties created by recent events such as the Great Agitation in Chicago, I feel it time we did something once and for all to not only relieve any uneasiness about that event, but also to insure that there will never be another like it. However, as I am taken to carefully weighing both sides of an issue, and always try my utmost not to overstep others' freedoms, I have taken a great deal of time deliberating what this next logical extension of our Democratic Tradition might be, and trust that my decision is neither hasty nor unwarranted. To this end, I propose that a simple piece of legislation be enacted which would limit political activity of any kind to those who had satisfactorily completed an intensive program of Voter Education, and had attained the age of 40 years.

Although the advantages of such legislation are widespread, the primary gain for society is in the elimination of dissent. When there is no dissent, the benefit is moral, or at least psychological, in that there exists the feeling of unity present when there is no conflict. Who can imagine the ultimate effects of such education on the populace until it has been fully exploited? I, for one, would surely like to find out. Most states already require programs of training for young drivers, and the reduction of mishaps through these programs is a documented fact. Why can't similar measures be employed to

reduce the number of mistakes made in voting?

The reasoning behind the age clause should be apparent. After all, how can people so young and so new to the exchange of money possibly have attained healthy Republican virtues? Good voters, like good lumber, must be carefully seasoned. It does take time to discover the Democratic ideal; to learn what is valuable in our society. Unfortunately, until the young have learned the importance of stability and have recognized the God-given right of property, they must be classified with the poor and other deficients.

I would here suggest that these programs be initially undertaken by the government, and eventually taken over by an equally legitimate and prevalent authority such as business. May I also suggest that these programs be aimed first at more radical students, for I fear that this faction, with their extremist idealism, is most dangerous to our objectives. I've been told that these tendencies are generally the result of what is called a liberal education. A little re-orienting here could save training time later. These details remain to be worked out, though.

In closing, allow me to express the urgency of these reforms. I trust that those in power will recognize the merit of my proposals, and, in the name of expediency, I pray the forces of order will thereby triumph over anarchy.

What Goes On at Your Library

Today we abandon books as a subject in favor of two other media—television and motion pictures. The first book to be considered, dealing with the former medium, is SEVEN GLORIOUS DAYS, SEVEN FUN-FILLED NIGHTS by Charles Sopkin. Mr. Sopkin, a New York editor, for one full week, from dawn of Saturday, April 22, 1967 to dawn of Saturday, April 29, suspended his life to watch six television sets (five of them rented) tuned to six different channels.

The suggestion had been made by Fred W. Friendly that the top management of three networks sit down and watch his company's complete programming from 7 a.m. to midnight for just one day. Mr. Sopkin did him one better, he watched for seven days, from early morning until 2-3 o'clock in the morning!

The ghostliness of this experience is very well conveyed by the author, and you suffer right along with him. You switch from one channel to another; your head aches, your eyes blur, you have his same nightmares. Can you imagine colleges such as this? "Bogart gets gunned down again. The sisters turn out to be the McGuire sisters. As Bogart gets riddled in a group of clips, the sisters McGuire are singing 'Thoroughly Modern Millie.' The Pauper, over on Channel 4, is botching things up in the castle, and Robinson Crusoe is crawling around on the sand."

Exhausted Sopkin's conclusions? TV does its best in covering news stories. Commercial television has rendered itself incapable of showing the viewer an event as it is happening. Spontaneity is lost through pre-recording; even laughter is canned. The only spontaneity Sopkin found was in the Carson, Bishop and Griffin shows. He was oddly drawn to the soap operas, but only in a "crazy, camp way."

Games repelled him, situation comedies bored him, he found specials wanting in quality. He vigorously denies any possibility of a culture boom that would mean that citizens are attending concerts instead of watching television. Concert audiences, he claims, week after week will be composed of the same faces while the other 99 per cent (!) of the population is home drinking beer and watching "Bonanza."

The author's first emotional reaction was to gun down all executives at every network. Now, somewhat cooled, he feels that there is no way to improve

TV. It is what it is, and this is what the bulk of the American public wants. However, he admits that this medium is still only 20 years old. Perhaps in about 200 years things will improve. In the meantime, I'm afraid we will have to live with what we have. Mr. Sopkin's experiences and conclusions are not cheerful; let us hope that relief comes sooner than he predicts.

The second book I would like to consider deals with films and has just as provocative a title: THE PRIVATE EYE, THE COWBOY AND THE VERY NAKED GIRL, by Judith Crist. The author teaches at Columbia's School of Journalism, is a film and drama commentator on the NBC-TV Today Show, and is regular film critic for TV Guide and the NEW YORK magazine. Critic Crist has a distinctive, witty and tough style. This book contains many of her film reviews—some complimentary, some devastating, some very funny. The subtitle is: "Movies from Cleo to Clyde." She includes big movies, little movies and foreign films. She also lists ten worst lists. She considers such movies as "Sound of Music," "The Sandpiper," "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner?" and "Cleopatra" (she calls the latter a "monumental mouse").

In her introduction the author tells how she became hooked on motion pictures. As a child she was such an aficionado that she and her friends would hoard their dimes, walk out of the house with school books and tank suits to support alibis that they had been studying at the library or swimming at the Y, (wetting the tank suits in the drinking fountain before coming home), and off to the movies they would go!

In her conclusion, Miss Crist traces the film from 1900 to date. She notes that when the public began to stay home to listen to the radio in the twenties, the talkies came out. Again, in the forties and fifties when the people preferred free television to the cinema, expanding screens and 3-D experiments were introduced. Motion pictures, like books and television, tend to reflect and mirror the temper of the times, and so recent movies have much that is good and bad to portray, patrons in other ways. I think it is well to remind them that

Kurt Weill's "The Choice" and Donizetti's "Night Bell" Featured This Season; Program to be Presented at War Memorial Auditorium

Overture to opera, Michigan's most promising and unique cultural enrichment activity, will open its eighth season Sunday evening, February 9, with an 8 o'clock program in the Grosse Pointe War Memorial's Fries Auditorium.

Mrs. Mark Littler, of Webber place, and Mrs. Wesley R. Johnson, of Ridge road, are chairman and co-chairman of the Grosse Pointe Overture.

Tickets are \$2.50 each. Ticket information may be obtained by contacting Mrs. Littler, TUxedo 6-0438, Mrs. Johnson, TUxedo 5-0315, or the War Memorial office, 881-7511.

Overture is expanding its professional artistic staff in 1969, giving Detroit-area audiences exposure to two rarely-seen operas and bringing to Detroit an outstanding operatic star.

This expansion of staff and activities is made possible by a gift from the Marie and Alex Manooagian Fund, arranged by Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh's Committee for the Cultural Center.

General director of Overture to Opera is Dr. David DiChiera, chairman of the Music Department at Oakland University and the motivating force in the growth and direction of Overture since 1964. He is being assisted by three leading professional artists this year.

Carl Karapetian, Detroit-born conductor who studied under Viennese conductor Von Karajan and has had international concert experience, is musical director.

Robert Cowden, who leads the Graduate Opera Department at Wayne State University and is assistant director of the Chautauqua Opera Association in New York, is stage director.

John Broome, of the Academy of Dramatic Arts, Oakland University, is also a stage director. Following the 1969 Overture to Opera season, he will return to his native England where he will be a director for the Royal Shakespearean Company in Stratford and London as well as director of opera for Sadler Wells.

Under Dr. DiChiera's general direction, Messrs. Karapetian, Cowden and Broome are pre-

paring a cast of 30 professional performers for 15 appearances in the metropolitan area throughout February and March.

For the 1969 season, Dr. DiChiera has selected two operas that will be new to almost all the area's opera buffs as well as those with only limited exposure to opera.

"The Choice," known in Germany as "Der Jasager," is a two-act opera by Kurt Weill. Written in Berlin before World War I, it concerns the interaction of an impossible student with his friends and a teacher and offers timely parallels with situations that face young people and minority and political groups today. This will be the premiere performance of this work in the Midwest.

Also on this year's bill is "The Night Bell" (Il Campanello) by Donizetti. It's a one-act comic opera about a pretty young maiden whose marriage to an elderly Italian apothecary brings revenge from her young suitor.

A highlight of each Overture to Opera season is the appearance of a leading operatic star in one of the performances.

Italo Tajo is the renowned artist who will sing the lead in "The Night Bell" in the February 28 evening performance at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Mr. Tajo, an Italian bass, has sung with the Metropolitan Opera Company and La Scala and the other leading opera houses of the world.

Overture's complete 1969 schedule includes five evening performances for adult audiences and 10 performances in metropolitan area schools.

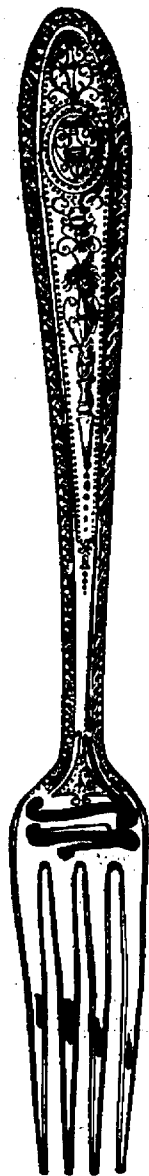
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THEY'VE ARRIVED DEAR PAT,

The second EVENING spring lecture in the history of the Grosse Pointe Garden Center is scheduled for Friday, February 7, at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, and Fran Parcells is general chairman of it. Which figures, "I always seem to be chairman of things or committees," she admits, but smiling, with no hint of self-pity, no nuance of self-aggrandizement.

But with more than a touch of humor: Fran Parcells is a "doer" who can—and does—laugh at herself. Which also figures.

It runs in the family.

Consider Fran alone. Born in Newark, O., lived in Huntington, W.Va., most of her pre-college, pre-marriage life. Attended Stephens College, ("I've been chairman of Stephens' fund-raising and building campaigns, but it didn't take the College long to find out where the brains of the family are: It was Charlie they put on the Board . . . That's the Stephens Board of Curators; 'curator,' you know, means 'protector.' So Charlie's officially a 'Protector of Young Ladies.'")

Third U-M Generation
Then to the University of Michigan, ("because that's where my mother and father and grandparents went"), and first contact with Charlie.

"He was in the Graduate School of Business Administration, after four years in the Army. We met at the U. of M. Flying Club. I was president, he was treasurer.

"I suppose he joined the Club originally because he wanted to fly, but he got so busy with his treasurer's job that we decided to pool our talents: I'd do the flying, he the book-keeping. He never did learn to fly."

Flying: Something Fran had been doing for a long, long time. At U. of M. she entered the International, ("we called it that because we had two Canadian contestants"), Inter-Collegiate Air Meet.

She won, received the Friedlander Trophy for Women Pilots. "It was a wonderful, huge thing, a revolving trophy—I had to give it up after one year. I've often wondered where it is now."

Publicity chairman for Ibex. First vice-president of the Grosse Pointe Farm and Garden Club. ("I've served as Farm and Garden's program chairman, too—that's something that keeps popping up: 'Program' Chairman"). Vice-president of the Parents Association at Liggett . . .

Six Different Schools
Six children in six different schools this year. "I was filling out Nursery School forms for David and College forms for Charles at the same time, and I remember thinking, 'I hope I don't put down that Charles likes to fingerprint!'"

Member of the Grosse Pointe Garden Center. Chairman of the second EVENING spring lecture in the Garden Center's history.

Consider now, for a moment, Mr. Parcells. President Charles A. Parcells and Company, currently celebrating its 50th anniversary. Elder, Grosse Pointe Memorial Church. Headed Memorial Church's Loyalty Fund

Fred, 14, a ninth grader at Grosse Pointe South High School. Plays first trombone in the GPHS Concert Band. Sings in the Youth Choir at Memorial Church.

All Sing; Mom Drives
(Music, singing especially, seems to be a Parcells' Family "theme" . . . "One year," Fran recalls, "we had someone in every church choir—there are six choirs at Memorial Church—except the Chancel, that's the professional choir . . . And 'Monotone Mother' did the driving . . .")

Inherited his older brother's Christmas Wreath sales acumen, (and Charles' list of prospects, and his Saturday delivery scheduling notes). Second love is horses, (another Parcells Family "theme").

Naturalist. Has a 55-gallon tank full of salt water fish. "He started," Fran remembers, "with some goldfish seven years ago. They got so big I threatened to fillet them."

Current family pets (well, when you have six children, why not?) are a black poodle named Rene or Coco or Chanel, but Rin-Tin-Tin—"There are," Fran explains, "only two dog's names, and Lassie's a girl"—and Pal. Fred's parakeet, who, to everyone's astonishment, really talks!

Rather a full house. But not too much for Fran Parcells to handle: The thing about "doers" is: They cope. More than that: They enjoy coping.

Lecture Is Free
"The Garden Center Lecture," Fran says, discussing the latest project with which she is, enjoyably, coping, "is free and open to all."

Title of the 8:30 o'clock program is "A Japanese Adventure." It will feature Kaneki Domoto, expert on Bonsai, (the art of creating miniature trees in the Oriental manner), describing and demonstrating how to fashion tiny trees and gardens.

The evening will begin with a special Japanese dinner, designed by the Grosse Pointe War Memorial's Helen Blair to appeal to men as well as women.
