Creating Caricature

A volunteer probation officers program in Grosse Pointe moved a step closer to reality at an organizational meeting Monday night, April 29, at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. 



Nix Measure

In a final item, The Woods Planning Commission, by an 8-1 vote, recommended to the council that the proposed "recreational vehicle ordinance" not be adopted, but that some type of outside members a total of 15 other storage for recreational vehicles would be desirable. The Commission reached its decision at a special meeting Tuesday, April 9.

Various aspects of the measure were discussed and some of the main objections included the "appeal" procedure and the so-called "standards" which must be approved by neighbors, according to the meeting's minutes.

At the May 6 council meeting, the solons unanimously referred the Commission's recommendation to the Committee of the Whole for further study with a report back to the council.



New Probation Plan

(Continued from Page 1) year to incarcerate a person, and national statistics show that 74 percent of offenders become repeaters if they are not placed in a rehabilitation

Many interested

Attending the Monday meeting were representa-tives of the Pointe police departments, the Youth Service Division, (YSD), Family Life Education Council, (FLEC), the Northeast Guidance Center, the Jaycees and several other community organizations.

If a volunteer probation program were established, it would be the first unified effort on the part of the five

Judge Leenhouts, who is now head of National Volunteers in Probation, Inc., explained the growth of the Royal Oak program was reflected on the national scene. In 1987, 25 lower courts used volunteers, in contrast to the over 2,000 courts using volunteers in 1974.

The three acting Pointe judges, Judge Pytell, Woods Judge J. Patrick Denis and Park Judge John Urso, estimate that between 150 and 200 young offenders appear in their courts yearly who could benefit from skilled probation guidance.

Judge Urso, in his Park Municipal Court Wednesday, April 24, noticed a 19-yearold youth on a speeding charge who had a downtown Detroit law office for a mailing address. When asked, the defendant said he was under the care of a guardian and admitted he had not told the guardian of his arrest. Judge Urso adjourned the case and instructed the defendant to notify his guardian of the arrest and a later court appearance.

Specific Ages The volunteer probation officers program would be geared towards helping the

17 to 30-year-old offender. Once over 16, and out of the jurisdiction of the Youth Service Division's supervision program, the youthful offender receives no guidance if he commits a crime,

It's known that at least 80 percent of violent crimes are committed by persons who first appeared in municipal courts.

Judge Leenhouts said about seven percent of the offenders placed on probation in Royal Oak had later encounters with the law, in contrast to the national average of 74 percent.

The Royal Oak program was thought to be so successful that the Department of Grosse Pointes since the Health, Education and Welfoundation of the YSD in fare conducted a study in 1968. It ran tests on about 100 offenders in Royal Oak and on offenders in a court identified as "Court A" which had little or no probation services. The tests registered hostility, aggressiveness, bel-ligerence and anti-social at-

> After 18 months, the tests were repeated. The Royal Oak offenders, who had been placed in the intensive probation program, showed that 73.8 percent had improved in their attitudes, 15.3 showed no change and 11.7 regressed. In "Court A," 17.8 percent improved, 34.2 perent showed no change, and 48.0 had regressed.

Both courts had similar budgets, about \$17,000 a year. The difference was the extensive use of volunteers in Royal Oak to enrich the probation services.

Lois of Work

The cost to Grosse Pointe for a volunteer probation service would be that of a part-time administrator, office space and supplies. The judges are thinking in the neighborhood of \$6,000 for the administrator who would supervise the volunteers and oversee the program. A committee is now looking for a suitable place to house the probation offices. Office expenses would be routine, such as phone, paper supplies, etc.

If Pointers are responsive to the program, the volunteer services would be expanded. Judge Leenhouts described the many rehabilitation programs offered through courts such as an alcoholics anonymous chapter and marriage counseling services.

He also said support was given from the professional sectors of the city; from optometrists, doctors and attor-

Judge Leenhouts said as he closed his presentation, "I can give you just one word of caution, a volunteer probation officers program involves a great deal of work. If you are going to to do it badly, you are better off not doing it at all."



Big Jump in

March Total Shows Rise of 28 Over February Amount

A total of 70 complaints were processed by the Youth Service Division, (YSD), during March. This was an increase of 28 complaints over February and a jump of six over March

The overall total for the year is 160. This is a rise of 13 cases over the comparable period of last year when 147 complaints were processed.

Violation of Controlled Substances was the leading category of complaints as 13 such cases were handled. The breakdown of these incidents shows one heroin, nine marijuana, two synthetics and one "all other," (sale of narcotics).

The heroin case involved one male adult; the marijuana cases involved three male adults and 14 male iuveniles; the synthetic cases involved one male juvenile and one female juvenile, and the "all other" case involved one male adult.

Busy Categories Larceny-theft was the cate-gory of second highest incidence as 12 such cases were processed. However, with associated categories - breakone, and auto theft, one the total amount of these incidents reaches 21. These involved 30 male juveniles and seven female juveniles.







YSD Has Multifaceted Photo Identification Kit

(Continued from Page 1) 1970), the Lawyers' Wives have made contributions to division to purchase the specialized equipment." The first item purchased by the YSD was chemical analysis equipment for drug substances

When the kit was obtained, Mr. Petersen said Mrs. David Williams, of North Oxford road, was president of the Lawyers' Wives. The organization's current president is Mrs. Thomas Coulter, of Westchester road. Both were instrumental in obtaining the

Division Service

Since the division has had the kit, it has been used an estimated 20-25 times. This may not seem like a great number but Sergeant Kane cautioned its use depends on crimes with witnesses who can make identifications. "There will be more of a use for it as people become acquainted with its operation.'

The kit is utilized by all Pointe police departments and Harper Woods as a service provided by the YSD. 'Any face they want us to construct, we do," the sergeant said.

"We have a working arrangement with Harper Woods as they have a decent photo setup. They will photograph our composite picture and in return we make composites for them," he con-

Detroit police have utilized this service on two occasions. "They are in the process of acquiring the same kit for use by the woman's division in rape cases," said Sergeant Kane.

Aids in Arrest

The value of such equipment can readily be seen when Detroit police used the kit to capture a rape suspect. After the composite was completed at YSD offices, it result. was used in a flyer by De-

Further Detail

To explore in further detail the steps towards creating a composite, the witness starts first with a basic facial outline which con-siders forehead line and jaw and chin lines with the technician's assistance. From there, the witness

goes to the eyes, nose and

mouth. As mentioned hefore. adjustments can be made as the visual input grows. After the face is completed to the witnesses satisfaction,

the composite is sent to Harper Woods to be photo-The ensuing prints are then

utilized by the various departments as necessary, (depending on the crime), and provide officers with an opportunity to stop and talk ballpark of a suspect." Officers, of course, also

With this kit, the technician has the capacity to work with the features of whites, blacks, young people and women. At this time, Sergeant Kane noted supplements to the kit are needed to keep up with current styles in a variety of areas, e.g., glasses, and also in various ethnic backgrounds,

e.g., Orientals. The entire unit includes the facial outline chart, the binder of facial features, facial breakdowns, a book on facial composition, compo-nent parts of a face, grease pencils (both black and white), overlays, cut outs and grid patterns.

Composites also are used in newspapers to aid police in their apprehension of a suspect by giving an opportunity for further potential witnesses to contact a department based upon the published picture. (The NEWS has run composites past issues in helping towards the apprehension of a suspect).

Train by Practice

Sergeant Kane said, in the past, officers who have been technicians in creating composites include YSD Detectives Ferrence and Donald Schmaltz, former YSD Detective, (now Public Safety Officer), Thomas Podeszwik and former Woods Detective, (now Public Safety Officer) Theodore Hinz.

Detective Ferrence said a composite, when completed, will have a minimum of five overlays and mug shots, and can have as many as eight or nine parts depending on the specific description. The longest it has taken him to complete a composite is two a half hours. But it usually takes around two hours with a good witness.

He added when the kit was first obtained a company manufacturer reviewed the 'how-to-do-it'' aspects. But the detective felt most of the training comes from simply doing it.



Meanwhile, The Woods man was treated and released at Saint John Hospital for the blow on the head, which caused a slash of around one and a half inches long, police reported.



High School Chess Clubs Compete in Area Tourneys

"It's the responsibility of the visiting team to make arrangements," Mr Schreiner said. "The visiting team is given the white players on Boards One, Three and Five, which means they have the first move and that's considered an advantage.

Every move made in the chess tournament is annotated so the students can review their games and learn from mistakes. A typi-cal entry is "P-K4" which means absolutely nothing to the uninitiated, yet means "pawn to king 4" to a chess freak

Both faculty advisors said they though the chess clubs attracted above average students with leanings towards science and math. It's very rare to find a girl in heavy chess action. The faculty advisors said they are always shy away from competition.

What Goes On

ric system. The question of "going metric" has been discussed in the United States for over 150 years. In 1821, John Quincy Adams called attention to the then relatively new system. In 1866, the National Academy of Sciences recommended its adoption.

But for the following 100 determined by the points accumulated throughout the over the world changed to the decimal system, conversion in the United States remained a much-debated issue that got almost nowhere.

Now, after decades of lollygagging, the time may be at hand. Acting on an exhaustive 1971 Commerce Department study that strongly recommended a 10-year plan to turn the nation predominantly though not exclusively metric, the two Houses of Congress have been taking turns working up conversion bills.

The major reason for the change is economic. The United States is now the only major nation that is not on the metric system or com-mitted to change to it. If the U. S. drags its feet in holding to what many considered an out-moded system of weights easy-to-use format. and measures, it is likely to suffer heavily in the world

market place. Americans actually are not strangers to the metric systrying to interest girls in tem. To help you understand and learn the metric system, your Grosse Pointe Public Library has available a variety of materials. WEIGHTS AND MEASURES: U. S. TO METRIC AND METRIC TO U. S. by Helmer A. Ronninger is a handbook that gives compari sons of the two systems in table form. Along with area, length, temperature and volume, one helpful table compares clothing sizes.

Another useful ready-reference volume is METRIC SYSTEM SIMPLIFIED by Gerard W. Kelly. This little book tells how the metric system was developed, how it is organized and how it can be applied in various fields. It also shows how the metric system is related to our U. S. system.

The book explains how to change quickly and easily from one system to the other and includes a variety of methods, tables, formulas and short-cuts. Additional features of this book include chapters on "Metric in the Kitchen' and "Metric and the Car."

Along with these books, the library has available giveaway copies of a handy four-page pamphlet "The Metric System . . . " which presents the metric system in a simple,

For organizations, the library has available 16mm films on the metric system. METRIC SYSTEM is a 13minute color film which shows the advantages of "going metric" as opposed to "staying imperial." THE METRIC SYSTEM, (an 11minute black and white film), clearly illustrates the basic units of the metric system and its uses today. English in centimeter sizes. The width and metric units are compared, and the advantages of computations in the metric system are demonstrated.

LEARNING ABOUT MET-RIC MEASURES, (17-min-utes, color), is a film that in-troduces the viewer to the basic concepts and patterns of the metric system, while LITER AND GRAM, (13-minutes, color), introduces the viewer to the three basic units of the metric system.
