**Thursday, August 8**  
RICHARD M. NIXON told the nation this evening he is resigning as President of the United States. In a television address the nation's 37th president said his resignation would take effect at noon Friday. He said he is quitting the office for the good of the country. Mr. Nixon said to continue to fight for his personal vindication in the Watergate matter would absorb too much of his attention when he should be handling the nation's business. Mr. Nixon becomes the first President in American history to resign the office. The momentous transfer of authority to Vice-President Gerald R. Ford will take place tomorrow in the White House.

**Friday, August 9**  
GERALD R. FORD was sworn into office at noon today as 38th president of the United States. In a ceremony in the East Room Chief Justice Warren E. Burger administered the oath of office to the 61-year-old former congressman from Michigan. In a speech before the nation following the swearing-in, Mr. Ford asked for the prayers of the nation to help him in governing the country and the prayers for Richard Nixon and his family as they begin their lives as private citizens.

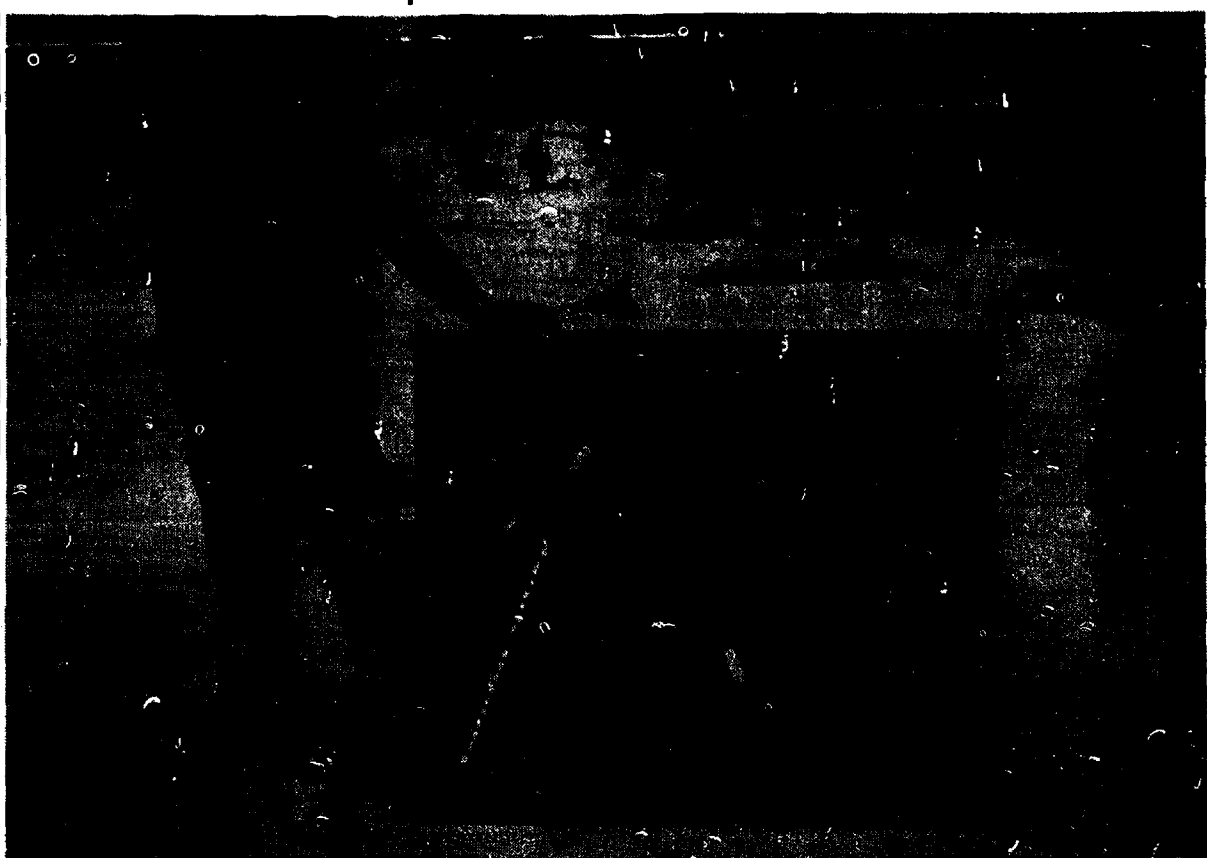
**Saturday, August 10**  
PRESIDENT GERALD FORD spent his second day as the nation's leader in a meeting with his cabinet and the National Security Council and preparing an appeal for national unity. Mr. Ford asked all department heads and executive leaders to remain on their jobs at least temporarily. This was in an effort to maintain some stability following the transition of power that took place only the day before. Mr. Ford pledged an administration of openness with the public.

**Sunday, August 11**  
POLICE ARE INVESTIGATING the disappearance of a French Impressionist painting worth more than \$100,000 that was being transferred from London to Minneapolis with a stop in Detroit last Thursday. The painting, "Femme Chapeau," by Auguste Renoir, apparently disappeared when the carton containing it was moved from a London-Detroit bound plane to a flight from Detroit to Minneapolis at Metropolitan airport. The artwork was being returned to a Minneapolis attorney after he tried to sell it at a London auction but got no takers.

**Monday, August 12**  
AN ENTIRE TEAM of top Soviet women mountaineers froze to death last week as they tried to climb Lenin Peak in the Pamirs Mountain Range in the Soviet Union. It was reported today. Seven bodies were discovered last Thursday by a joint team of American and Japanese climbers. The body of an eighth woman could not be found. Soviet observers described the team as having included six of the finest women climbers in the Soviet Union. The tragedy ranks among the worst in international mountaineering.

**Tuesday, August 13**  
PRESIDENT FORD, in his first speech before a joint session of Congress Monday night, declared inflation "our domestic public enemy No. 1." The congressman gave Mr. Ford a wildly enthusiastic greeting of cheers and applause. He promised to continue the foreign policies of former President Richard Nixon in seeking out major peace initiatives. On the domestic front, he promised to cooperate with Congress, to end invasions of privacy and to seek national unity as president of all the people.

### Milk River Complaints Still Heard

Pumping Station Continues to Emit Unpleasant Odors; Petitions Being Circulated

The Milk River Pumping Station, on Parkway between Marter and River roads, continues to be a headache for area residents even though a neighborhood spokesman concedes that the odors given off by the facility have lessened.

Rowland L. Austin, of Edmondton drive, a force behind the petition drive which initiated clean-up action on the matter back in June, said last week, "I don't feel the situation is totally corrected."

**Station Meeting Held**  
This comment came despite the fact that Mr. Austin attended a meeting at the Pumping Station in late July, where he agreed with Wayne County Drain Commissioner Charles N. Youngblood that the smell given off by the station had ceased.

In recent days, however, Mr. Austin said he feels that the situation has worsened, probably because of the weather.

"I think the situation has improved," Mr. Austin said, "but I think it's because of the climatic conditions, the lack of rainfall."

**Blamed on Weather**  
Mr. Austin suggested that the odors earlier in the year

### Park Policemen Arrest Detroit Robbery Suspects; Several Shots Exchanged

One Fleeing Bandit Shoots at Patrolman, Who Returns Fire, During Foot Chase in Which Neither Man Is Hurt; Officers Praised for Their Work

Two suspects in a Detroit gas station holdup were arrested by Park Police officers Wednesday evening, August 7, following a high speed chase through Park and Detroit streets. The incident climaxed with a foot chase when one of the passengers jumped out of the pursued car, with the ensuing exchange of several shots. A third man, who also fled on foot, made good his escape.

The suspects, Lawrence Matthews, 31, of 4265 Montclair, and Wardell Jones, 30, of 3830 Lillibridge, both of Detroit, were identified in a Detroit police line-up as two of the three men who participated in the holdup in which a revolver was used.

**Seek Warrant**  
Park Det. Sgt. James LaPratt, who released the information on the capture, said a warrant will be sought against Matthews, who fired a shot at the policeman pursuing him on foot, for assault with intent to commit murder.

The holdup and the shooting, in which The Park officer returned fire, is under investigation by Detroit authorities.

According to Sgt. LaPratt, law enforcement agencies were alerted over the police radio to be on the lookout for three men responsible for the armed robbery of a gas station at Mack and Woodhall. The trio were reported to be armed and riding in a lime-green convertible Volkswagen.

**Gives Chase**

### Youth Tells Police About Burglaries

Makes Confessions After Being Arrested for Home Truancy; Robbed Church, Bakery

A 16-year-old Woods youth who was arrested for home truancy Thursday July 25, has admitted being involved in several breaking and enterings in the Pointe, St. Clair Shores and Detroit, reports the Youth Service Division, (YSD).

The division has filed petitions on the youth with the Wayne County Juvenile Court for home truancy and the breaking and entering of an occupied dwelling, (stemming from the burglary of an Ida lane home Tuesday, July 23). Action on both petitions is pending.

Officers reported the youth admitted his involvement in the Ida lane break-in after he was nabbed on the home truancy charge.

**Filled Paper Bags**  
While interviewed at the Wayne County Youth Home Monday, July 29, the youth told YSD Detective Patrick Fagan he took two grocery bags from the kitchen and filled them with a portable television set, an AM-FM radio, a camera with flasher equipment, a digital clock AM-FM radio, three stereo albums and five stereo tapes.

So far, the TV, one album and three tapes have been recovered and returned to the Ida lane home.

The juvenile stated he took a brass candlestick holder from the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, 19950 Mack avenue, in August 1973. It was subsequently recovered and returned to the church.

He admitted taking \$127 after breaking into the La Bonbonniere Bakery, 19487 Mack, on January 23. This money hasn't been recovered.

With these facts, officers said both cases can be considered closed.

**Other Admissions**  
A further interview with the youth Tuesday, July 30, produced other admissions. He told officers he was involved in the break-in of a Hollywood avenue residence in December 1973 or January 1974. A turntable, some albums, stereo tapes and a gold lighter were taken. A Woods police file check showed no record of such an incident. However, Detective Fagan said, if the burglary

### Park Policeman Held Blameless In Man's Death

Investigation by Detroit Authorities and Wayne County Prosecutor's Office Show Evidence No Crime Has Been Committed

Park Patrolman Edward Serwach, who fatally shot a Detroit man on July 16, in the man's home, will not have to face charges, according to information received from Dominick R. Carnovale, chief of the Wayne County Prosecutor's Criminal Division. The decision was rendered on Friday, August 9.

Carnovale said that as a result of a thorough investigation by the Detroit Police Homicide Division and the County Prosecutor's Office, "we have come to the conclusion that no crime has been committed and no warrants will be recommended."

He said the final decision was made by Prosecutor William L. Cahalan, based on the Detroit authorities' and the Prosecutor's Office's findings.

**Statement Supported**  
"The evidence supports the policeman's statement that he was rushed at, that a struggle followed and the gun fired," the chief of the Criminal Division said.

Killed by a bullet from Patrolman Serwach's service revolver was Thomas Holstin, 24, of 360 Alter road, Detroit. The man's wife, Linda, 23, witnessed the shooting.

Mrs. Holstin and her father-in-law, Eugene, of Grosse Pointe City, say they plan to file suits against The Park over the shooting.

The tragedy took place after what Park authorities said was a high speed car chase, starting from the Nottingham-Jefferson intersection.

Patrolman Serwach and Sgt. Charles Petrie said they saw a Jeep cross Jefferson at Nottingham, at about 1 a.m., at a very high rate of speed and gave chase, reaching speeds of between 70 and 80 miles an hour, to a driveway at 360 Alter, Holstin's home.

**One Shot Fired**  
As Holstin ran toward the house, after jumping out of his car, Patrolman Serwach fired one shot that missed. A car owned by one of Hol-

### Islanders Resentful Over Story

Pointers Who Have Homes on Harsens Island Call Detroit News Report Derogatory

Numerous Harsens Island residents, including many Pointers and former Pointers, are upset over recent State reports of pollution and contamination on the island.

A recent article in the Detroit News said some health authorities believe as much as 90 percent of the drainage fields for septic tanks are not operating. Being State officials suggested that pollution is so bad on the island that homes should be leveled and the island should be turned into a preserve for waterfowl.

Mr. and Mrs. Bewley Priestman, of The City, also have a home on Harsens Island.

**Charge Defamation**

"We have been coming to the island for three summers now," Mr. Priestman said. "The article was derogatory. It defamed the island and the people in a sense because we live here."

The Priestmans hosted a group of island residents concerned over the bad publicity they feel the island received when State officials criticized health conditions.

Over 25 persons responded to their call, given on short notice, to talk about what they feel is right with the island and why they maintain homes there.

**Other Areas Affected**

Mr. Priestman acknowledged there is a restriction on new buildings and sewage facilities because of the high water level. He added this is not peculiar to Harsens Island alone, however, since many areas experiencing high water levels are restricting building activity.

Jean Henkel, a former Pointer who now lives on the island, said she sent some canal water to State laboratories to have it checked. She said the test showed the water passed and was judged "perfectly drinkable."

"We brush our teeth in it, cook in it and wash vegetables," she said.

### G. P. Woods Park To Be Improved

\$1,980,000 Proposition Features New Swimming Pool, Eight Tennis Courts

Woods city officials expressed their pleasure at the passage of the \$1,980,000 Lake Front Park improvement bonding issue which voters approved at the Tuesday, August 6, primary election. The electorate ratified the proposition by a comfortable 2,802 to 1,783 margin.

The improvements include a new swimming pool, (aluminum or gunite), asphalt paving, a concrete deck area, lighting, fencing, a new bath house, alterations of the activity center, the filling in and landscaping of the existing pool and eight new tennis courts.

The estimated construction total, excluding engineering and architectural fees, inspection, legal and administrative fees and construction contingency, reaches \$1,630,500.

**All Will Benefit**

Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos, Parks and Recreation Director Donald J. Hallmann and Councilman Ronald R. Keegan, Parks and Recreation Committee chairman, all said they were very happy over the result.

"The improvements will be an asset to the total community, including our younger and older residents," stated Mayor Pinkos. "With the passage of the bonding issue, we will be able to reconstruct the park in such a manner that all the people will be able to use it fully."

He felt all residents will benefit from the improvements including those who voted against the proposition. In this regard, the mayor cited the increasing property values for the community at large.

Mr. Hallmann said, "I'm very happy about it. The people will have a place to

### County Making Seawall Safer

Farms officials, concerned about the hazards of bicyclists riding along the Lakeshore road seawall, have received a recommendation from the Wayne County Road Commission that concrete bumper strips be placed along the wall to deter such traffic.

The Farms Council, at its meeting Monday, August 5, approved the recommendation, giving the county the go-ahead to begin construction.

Road Commission crews began the work Friday, August 9.

The construction is expected to take about two to three weeks at an estimated cost of \$13,000 for the entire project.

Wayne County has jurisdiction over the road because Lakeshore road is a county thoroughfare. The county earlier this year installed the sloping concrete seawall in an effort to prevent erosion of the roadway because of high water levels of the lake.

The ramp-like wall has been under much criticism, however, since it is now used as a bike path by many and also does little to prevent cars from landing in the water if they leave the roadway.

The bumpers are about eight feet long and eight inches wide and are being placed along the wall at even intervals. They are similar to the type of concrete bumpers often found in shopping center parking lots.

The council members made a further recommendation to the road commission that the bumpers be painted a bright color so bicyclists would be able to see them.

## Criminal Justice Institute Contractual Agreement Entered into by Farms

Will Provide Police Department with Training Programs and Services in Area of Law Enforcement

The city of Grosse Pointe Farms has entered into a contractual agreement with the Criminal Justice Institute of Wayne County which will provide The Farms with training programs and services in the area of law enforcement.

The Farms Council adopted the agreement at the regular meeting Monday, August 5. Attached to the agreement will be a letter from The Farms specifically stating that no financial obligations will result from the city's participation in the program.

James M. Garber, director of the Institute, made a presentation before the council to explain how it functions. Adopted by 17 Others

He said the Institute is housed at 6001 Cass avenue in the Wayne State University complex and hopefully will be utilized by 42 different communities in the county. He said the contract has already been adopted by about 17 other communities.

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber said Grosse Pointe Park is the only other Pointe community to join the Institute.

Mr. Garber said there is no obligation on the part of any city to use the services provided by the Institute. Chief Ferber told the council members he anticipates all officers in the Farms department will eventually participate.

Mr. Garber said the Institute serves as the police training facility for all the county and there is no cost for recruit training. He said the program is federally funded for about 70 percent of its operating costs.

Chief Ferber said The Farms will get complete criminal justice training from the Institute.

"It will be used for basic recruit training, command officer training and specialized training, such as juvenile, traffic, vice and narcotics investigations," he said.

The concept of the Criminal

Justice Institute is broader than just police programs. He said the Institute will also deal with probation, parole, judge training, the public defender and prosecution which are all part of law enforcement.

"It is the most unique facility of this type in the country in that its scope is so broad," Chief Ferber said. "It recognizes the police are just a small part of the criminal justice system."

Other in-service programs that will be available include equipment loans, research for establishing programs like a juvenile bureau, and assistance in regulating paper flow.

**Diversified Faculty**

The faculty of the Institute is 50 percent Criminal Justice Institute employees who are all accredited teachers, 25 percent Wayne State University faculty and 25 percent instructors from police forces.

Mr. Garber stressed the Institute is a non-profit public corporation and not a government agency. He said the Institute does train private security forces and receives some income through this.

He added that college credit will be offered for many of the advanced courses.

## B-B's Damage Parked Cars

Two youths firing their B-B gun at a target placed on a rear fence apparently damaged two automobiles parked in the west end of Saint John Hospital's lot. This incident occurred Sunday, August 11, reported Woods police.

John Gierthy of Royal Oak returned to his parked car and found five B-B gun holes in the 1969 vehicle's front windshield. As Officer Paul Crook was taking the report, he noticed a 1973 auto parked near Mr. Gierthy's which also had a B-B hole in the front windshield. This auto belonged to a Farms resident but she was unable to be located at that time.

The officer's investigation revealed the line of flight of the B-B's appeared to come from the rear yard of a Raymond road home.

He went to the house and, upon entering the yard, spotted the juveniles, one 14 and the other 16, peering through the stockade fence.

Both admitted shooting a B-B gun at a target which they had placed on the fence during the afternoon in question. The pair added they were unaware they had damaged the complainant's auto but believed they could have been responsible for the destruction.

The juveniles were told they would be contacted by the Youth Service Division, (YSD), concerning the incident.

arrived at the scene and took Jones into custody.

**Fires Shot**

In the meantime, Pat. Pretty chased the first man to leave the car, later identified as Matthews.

Matthews, trapped by a fence at the alley between Ashland and Alter road, turned and fired a shot at the pursuing officer, who returned the shot, firing once. Neither was hit.

The suspect jumped over the fence and turned. Pat. Pretty, seeing the gun in the man's hand and assuming he was about to shoot again, fired two shots in rapid succession. The bullets missed. Matthews back-tracked to Ashland where he was arrested by Detroit police.

Sgt. LaPratt said police searched the area where the men were apprehended, and found two fully loaded hand guns, believed to have belonged to the suspects.

The sergeant said the bandit trio held up David Cavezza of The Park, an employee of the gas station, who was alone at the time.

**Demand Money**  
Two of the men entered the station and announced a hold-up. One bandit produced a nickel-plated revolver and demanded all the money from the cash register. Mr. Cavezza gave them the currency and one of the bandits

ordered him to include all the change. The money was then placed into a yellow cloth-type bag.

The holdup men ordered the station attendant to open the office safe, but Mr. Cavezza said he didn't have the keys. The duo searched Mr. Cavezza and took his money and personal items, before fleeing.

"Sgt. Paton and Patrolman Pretty did an excellent piece of police work in apprehending the suspects, even if one did get away," said Sgt. LaPratt. "The third man is being sought by Detroit authorities."

"Pat Pretty was extremely fortunate that he was not fatally shot or injured in the gun fire exchange. Personally, I feel that both officers did a beautiful job in handling the situation. They both are to be complimented for a job well done."

**Detroit Handles Case**  
Sgt. LaPratt said that the entire matter, the holdup and the shooting at Pat. Pretty, since it happened in Detroit, has been turned over to Detroit police for further processing.

The sergeant said under Michigan law, conviction on a charge of robbery armed

can mean up to life in prison. Detroit police will press for the warrants on the armed robbery charge against the trio, and with the assault with intent to commit murder warrant against Matthews.

Poor Mixture**

James S. Gillis, 22, of 12033 Rossiter, Detroit, will face a court hearing on Wednesday, August 28, on a charge of reckless driving. He is free on \$100 bond pending the court date.

Gillis was arrested by Sgt. Donald Jacob on Sunday, August 11, when the officer observed Gillis stop for a light on Lake Shore and Vernier roads.

According to the sergeant, the motorist stopped at the intersection and waited when the light turned green. The light turned red and Gillis drove through, ignoring the signal. He was stopped at the blinking amber light at the entrance to the George Osius Park.

Sgt. Jacob ordered the man out of the car and the officer stated in his report that Gillis staggered as he tried to stand on his feet.

The public safety officer informed Gillis that he was under arrest for driving while under the influence of liquor and with the assistance of Public Safety Officer Michael Kenyon, conveyed the accused man and two passengers to the station.

The sergeant said that Gillis allegedly admitted smoking marijuana while drinking. The drunk charge was changed to reckless driving. He was released after posting bond. The two passengers were not charged.

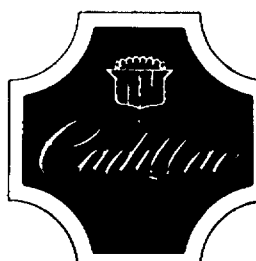

tables in it," she said. "Any problem with the water is not really sewage but is just grit from all the sand that gets stirred up with summer activities on the river."

Mrs. Robert Werner, of The Woods, said she has been coming to the island for seven years and doesn't know of anyone who doesn't have an adequate septic tank.

**Raps Oil Spills**  
"All the organic material goes through septic tanks," she said. "It's the oil spills in the water that are unpurified and not fined."

Another Pointer, James Scheuler, of The Park, vouches for the lack of contamination of the water.

"I've been coming here for 50 years and I drink a glass of water daily right from the river," he said. "Silly as it is, I drink it. We're not frightened up here."

All the residents gathered definitely felt the island's good qualities far outweigh the bad.

**Mr. James Schroth, of The Woods, summers on the island.**

**Ideal for Children**  
"For nine years we have been coming to Harsens Island," she said. "Our kids live in order to come up here! It's an ideal life for a child. They fish, swim, bicycle and are very healthy. Our kids have been known to spend as many as five hours in the water a day and they haven't gotten any diseases. They've been healthy since leaving the city."

Mr. Priestman pointed out that the bird sanctuary, run by the State, enjoys a fine reputation, and said there is excellent fishing, duck and muskrat hunting on the island.

Mrs. Priestman said she raised 10 butterflies last year, an experience she shared with her grandchildren.

**Many Rare Plants**

Mrs. Charles DeFever, an avid conservationist, commented that many rare and endangered species of plants and animals can be found on the island. She said the black-crowned night heron, the king rail, the white-fringed orchid and the silver lady's slipper are all on the island.

"The spotted turtle is supposed to be here but we're afraid it is extinct," she added. "I couldn't not live here," remarked Mrs. Donald Wicke, formerly of The Pointe, but

now a permanent resident of Harsens Island.

She added that she and her husband, who is a doctor, are close enough to the city for him to commute to his office each day.

**Cites Camaraderie**  
"There is a special feeling of camaraderie among the people on the island," she said. "Even if you don't know a person they will immediately be friendly."

"The things we do here you just don't do in the city. We can see the sun rise over the water and set over the bird sanctuary. And you ask why people come to the island!" she laughed.

There are problems that many residents feel are legitimate. One is the number of visiting cars parked along the roadsides and the litter often left behind by these visitors.

**Want Parking Area**  
Most would like to see a parking area designated so those who come to the island to fish would not have to line the roads with their cars and cause a traffic hazard.

They would also like to see trash containers placed around the island and a comfort station for public use.

"We realize much of it is state property and people do have a right to use the land but we'd like them to take care of it," Mr. Priestman said.

Mrs. Bernice Bates, of The Park, noted that having the right to use public property does not give the public the right to pollute.

Civic groups, such as the Harsens Island Garden Club, the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts have undertaken clean-up campaigns to rid the island of trash.

**State Should Do More**  
Many also feel the State, which owns a large portion of island property, is not doing its share in providing facilities for visitors. They would like to see more attention given to the island.

Already State Representative Thomas Gustafson of Sterling Heights, the island's district, has informed the islanders that new, restrictive parking signs will be installed. The project was undertaken by the Department of State Highways and Transportation after they received several petitions and many complaints from residents of the island.

**Parking will be prohibited on certain roads on the island.** The litter problem has also been brought to the attention of State officials.

The proud residents of the island are meeting the problems that do exist head on. They certainly aren't going to let some bad publicity get the best of them.

## Two Park Couples Okayed To Keep Foster Children

Two young married couples, both having children of their own, were granted a variance from a section of the Zoning Ordinance governing the operation of foster homes, by the Park council, sitting as a Zoning Board of Appeals, on Monday, August 12.

Granted the variances were Dr. and Mrs. Richard Muir of 858 Bedford road; and Mr. and Mrs. Roger A. Jacklyn of 1371 Bedford road.

The doctor and his wife requested a variance to permit them to become foster parents of a 12-year-old boy, Charles Allen Barwick presently of Jmjay City, whom they are in hopes of adopting within a few months.

The agency involved in determining that Dr. and Mrs. Muir have a happy home and that the boy would make a wonderful addition to their family is The Children's Aid Society of Detroit.

The couple have two children of their own, Rick 15; and Beth, 14, both students at Grosse Pointe South High School.

The audience in attendance, not very large, but enough to fill the few seats in the council chambers, appeared highly in favor of the children being accepted in the homes of Dr. and Mrs. Muir and Mr. and Mrs. Jacklyn, although a minor few objected.

After a short debate, the Board of Appeals granted the Muirs the variance, which would allow them to bring the boy into their home.

Mr. and Mrs. Jacklyn, however, had a more difficult time in presenting their case, and were granted approval with an attached condition, which initially was rejected by a 3-3 vote.

Kelley O'Day, an attorney representing the Catholic

Social Services, spoke on behalf of the agency and for the Jacklyn's, stating that the couple had been completely investigated by the State of Michigan and licensed by the State to maintain a foster home, but with only two foster children to be cared for at one time.

The attorney, backed by Joanne Jaque, of this agency, disclosed that the two girls now staying with the Jacklyn's, are not up for adoption, since their natural parents still have legal rights to them and the children cannot be adopted without their consent.

Mr. and Mrs. Jacklyn asked the Board of Appeals for a variance to become foster parents of Carol A. Bender, who has resided with them for the past four years, and Karen Konie, who has been with them for two weeks. Both are 15 years old.

The couple have two children of their own, Jason Philip, 3; and Matthew Stevens, 1.

In the case of Dr. and Mrs. Muir, the council, with Councilman Dr. Roger McNeil absent, voted without reservation to grant the couple the right to let the 12-year-old boy live with them. It was brought out during the discussion that Councilman McNeil favored the Muirs' petition.

In the matter regarding the Jacklyn's, Councilman Douglas Graham offered a resolution granting the Jacklyn's petition pertaining to the girls' names only, but that the council retain jurisdiction over the matter as a condition to the grant of this petition. He explained that in regard to this, if one of the girls should be taken away, or should leave, and another child should be accepted, Mr. and Mrs. Jacklyn would have to appear before the Board of Appeals for permission to allow this variance.

Councilman Graham made a motion to that affect and it was seconded by Councilman Robert Hutton.

Mayor Matthew Patterson said he would like to see the variance granted without the condition.

The mayor asked for a vote on the matter.

Councilmen "Douglas" and Hutton and George Verdonekt voted for the resolution with the attached condition, and Mayor Patterson, and Council members Camille Peter-

Such appeals require review and a public hearing to determine whether they should be granted, pursuant to the Park Council's powers under Chapter 20, Building Zone Ordinance.

Councilman Graham noted that the city will not police these homes, since this falls under the jurisdiction of the State, which conducts a monthly check on all foster homes.

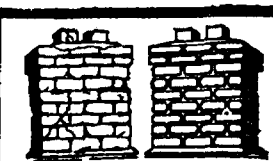

## Rising Cost of Plastic Bags Disturbing Woods

The price of plastic rubbish bags continues to increase for The Woods and, as a result, for its citizens. Within the past year, three price increases have been authorized with the latest being at the regular council meeting Monday, August 5.

At that session, the solons unanimously, though not happily, agreed to raise the selling price per roll of 50 bags from \$4.50 to \$6. City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher also said a box of 100 bags will increase in price from \$8 to \$12.

In reviewing the price hikes, Mr. Hornfisher stated around a year ago a roll of 50 bags cost residents \$2.50 per roll. Then, prices jumped to \$3, \$4.50 and now to \$6 per roll.

"Less than a year ago we were paying five cents a bag," City Administrator Chester E. Petersen told the council. "Now we're paying 12 cents a bag."

Mr. Hornfisher, in a memo to the council, said Cadillac Products Inc. has completed the delivery on the city's last order of plastic bags. The price is now \$120.00 per 1,000, including sales tax. "I would recommend we place another order with Cadillac Products for 240,000 bags in rolls of 50."

Inasmuch as the cost is now \$6.00 per roll to the city, Mr. Hornfisher recommended the selling be increased from \$4.50 to \$6.

Mr. Hornfisher said prices

have really gone up in the past six months since the reported oil shortage. He stressed the "tightness" of resin, an oil by-product, which is used in plastics.

"We used to buy a year's supply of plastic bags at one time and deliver so much a month. Up to a point, we used a million bags a year," he said.

He added the city is trying to find other sources regarding suppliers but, so far, there's been no luck on this front.

## Refund Checks Await Owners

Many Michigan taxpayers have undelivered refund checks waiting for them at the Internal Revenue Service.

Any taxpayer who has not yet received his refund should call or visit his local IRS office as soon as possible, said R.L. Plate, district director of Internal Revenue for Michigan.

The most common reason for an undelivered check, according to Mr. Plate, is that the taxpayer has moved and left no forwarding address with the U.S. Postal Service.

In cases where the taxpayer suspects his check may have been lost or stolen, Mr. Plate urged the person to get in touch with his local IRS office as soon as possible so that the IRS can put a "tracer" on the missing check.

Some refunds may have been delayed because of errors or omissions on tax returns, he said.

Mr. Plate stressed that in all refund inquiries to the IRS, the taxpayer should be prepared to provide the name and address as it appeared on the return, the actual name and address if

## Farms Council Approves Tennis Court Ordinance

The Farms Council Monday, August 5, approved a tennis court ordinance that applies to the use of public and private courts within the city. The meeting was scheduled for the public hearing at the regular meeting July 1. No residents appeared at the hearing and the ordinance was passed by a 4-1 vote.

The ordinance requires that anyone wishing to construct an outdoor tennis court within the Farms must obtain a permit under the city's zoning ordinance and a fence permit under the fence ordinance.

The original wording of the ordinance stated persons wishing to construct "or maintain" a tennis court must obtain permits but the council members deleted that passage.

Councilman Joseph Fromm voted against the ordinance because he felt it should apply to courts already built.

"I have a problem with passing an ordinance that doesn't take in facts already occurred," he said.

The ordinance states courts must be landscaped to screen them from public right-of-ways and from adjacent or adjoining residential properties. No large backboards are allowed under the ordinance.

Courts may have artificial lighting but it is not to be used between the hours of 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. All lights must be shaded so any direct rays or glare do not project onto other property.

There is no restriction on the hours courts may be used but only on the times lights may be in operation.

The ordinance also states that no outdoor courts in a residential district of the city shall have constructed or maintained as a part thereof a practice backboard.

Violators of the ordinance, upon conviction, will be subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment for not more than 90 days or both.

Voting in favor of the ordinance were Mayor William Butler and Councilmen E. Rust Muirhead, James Mast and James Dingeman. Councilwoman Nancy Waugaman and councilman Jack Cudlipp were not present at the meeting since both were out of town.

## Young Skater Medal Winner

Linda Van Dusen, 11, of Stephens road, representing the Detroit Skating Club, won a first place gold medal in the Columbus Summer Figure Skating Competition held Saturday-Sunday, August 3-4, in Columbus, O.

Linda received the award for her efforts in the free style event for girls her own age, outclassing nine other entrants in the minds of the judges, some of whom are world or nationally rated.

The win culminated a summer of daily eight-hour practices for Linda, who was one of 175 skaters from 35 mid-west clubs entered in the event.

Most of Linda's practices were carried out at the Grosse Pointe Community Rink, under the instruction of Ann Seror.

## New Ordinance Restricts Pets

The Farms Council passed an animal ordinance at the regular meeting Monday, August 5, that would, among other things, restrict Farms residents to no more than two cats or two dogs or no more than a total of two dogs and two cats.

The ordinance provides that, "any domesticated animal, including without limitation mammals, birds and fish, which is kept primarily for pleasure rather than for utility or profit and which is of a species that is not generally regarded as being dangerous or posing a threat to the health or safety of mankind," may be kept in the city.

The ordinance allows for additional pets based on the number of square feet in the resident's property. One additional dog or cat may be maintained for each 10,000 square feet of property provided the space is of adequate size, has adequate ventilation and sanitary equipment, and the animal will be kept at a sufficient distance from the adjoining property so the pet will not constitute a nuisance.

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber said persons applying for a multiple animal permit will first be required to contact the police department who will give the pet owner a form to fill out, stating the vital statistics of the pet and where it will be housed.

Upon completion, the application will be reviewed by the Farms public service director who will determine the square footage and therefore the number of pets that will lawfully be permitted.

Chief Ferber said the police department will then visually inspect the property to see if the permit will be approved or denied.

The ordinance specifically

states, "No person shall raise pets in any residential zoning district of the city as a business or for sale or profit."

Chief Ferber said persons who now have more than the allowed number of dogs or cats may keep them but they may not be replaced when they die except under the multiple animal provision.

These residents must submit an affidavit to the department within 30 days attesting to the number of dogs and cats they now have so they can continue to maintain the pets, he said.

The ordinance also stated that offspring of pets not exceeding 12 weeks of age are exempt from this section.

## Broken Glass Poses Danger

Woods Parks and Recreation Director Donald J. Hallmann, in his monthly report for May, said there was a problem of broken glass bottles in the Chene-Trombley, Ghesquiere and Sweeney Parks.

"For some reason, people continue to break glass in these parks and it's a constant problem even though we continue to clean the grounds," he stated.

The NEWS contacted Mr. Hallmann and asked if this situation has continued through August. He replied that it has and not only at the aforementioned parks, but at the Lake Front Park, too.

"I don't know who's responsible, what age group," he said, "but they're people who aren't taking pride in their park facilities. We're watching and trying to see who's responsible but we haven't been able to come up with anything yet."

Besides the overall unsightliness of the shattered glass, Mr. Hallmann added it poses a great danger, especially for children.

## Woods Okays Fund Transfers

The Woods Council unanimously approved a resolution recommending the transfer of funds for the end of the budget year, 1973-74. This action was taken at a recent meeting.

The measure says that the sum of \$163,198 in the 1973-74 unappropriated surplus account of the general fund be transferred into the general fund account as the beginning fund balance of the adopted 1974-75 budget.

It provides that any other excess revenue collected in the general fund, unencum-

bered general fund appropriation, together with excess funds, be transferred to the reserve for sick days account. Lastly, the resolution notes that the sum of \$17,000 be transferred from the contingency fund to three accounts due to the increased cost of labor in the public safety department and operating supplies in two parks and recreation accounts, the baseball program and the Lake Front Park.

The public safety account totals \$12,000 while the two Parks and Recreation accounts total \$2,500 each.

In the August 1 issue of the NEWS, it was reported that the Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge No. 102 is holding a very important meeting on Monday, September 2, at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club (GPYC). September 2 is Labor Day.

The meeting is scheduled to be held at the Yacht Club on Monday, September 9, postponed from the first Monday of the month, when the Lodge holds its regular session. The group holds its meetings on the first Monday of each month at the GPYC. Every third meeting, associate members are invited to participate.

Park Patrolman Andrew Meeker, president, said that the meeting is only for the regular members, comprised of police officers of The Pointe and Harper Woods. To be discussed is a section of the organization's by-laws for a possible change. This session is closed to the associates.

## Farms Council Approves Lakeview Ave. Clean-Up

About 12 Farms residents from the area of Lakeview avenue between Mary and Carver streets appeared before the Farms Council Monday, August 5, seeking relief from a traffic and debris problem in the area.

The residents came to hear the recommendations made by the Mayor's Advisory Planning Committee which had been studying their complaints.

The council accepted the committee's suggestions that minimal improvements be made to the gravel roadbed, that trees and shrubs in the area be trimmed and that the possibility of installing lights in the area be explored.

In addition, the council requested that City Manager Andrew Bremer investigate the feasibility of making Lakeview a one-way street and putting logs along the side of the roadbed or creating a ditch to keep cars from parking on the grass. Mr. Bremer was asked to check the cost of blacktopping the lane.

Lakeview avenue is an unpaved public thoroughfare that has been the scene of numerous parties where empty cans and bottles are left strewn about the area. Residents also have complained about cars racing down the street stirring up dust and gravel.

Minton M. Clute, a Whitcomb road resident whose property extends to Lakeview in the rear, asked that the street be closed to traf-

fic since he feels the road serves no purpose. He also questioned whether a clean-up effort will be sufficient if the area is not regularly patrolled.

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber said patrol cars do give considerable attention to the street.

Mr. Clute added that he thought a Farms zoning ordinance eliminated the possibility of homes being built on the street. Mayor William Butler said this is not necessarily the case since several rear portions of Moross road lots could potentially be divided into new lots. He said he didn't want to preclude this possibility by closing the street.

Frank Murphy, of Moross road, said he does not want Lakeview avenue closed since he uses the lane to get to his home. He said there isn't enough room on his property to build a driveway from the front.

Mr. Murphy brought up several other problems that could arise if the lane were closed. He said a turnaround would be needed for people who drove down Carver or Mary streets and found the dead end at Lakeview.

He wondered whose property would be confiscated to make such a turnaround and, additionally, how fire and emergency vehicles could get through if needed.

Mr. Murphy suggested lighting the lane and paving it so cars would have to remain in the road and not be able to drive off to the side and park on the grass.

Most of the residents present at the meeting hoped to retain the country atmosphere of the area which exists since there are no lights on the lane and it is not paved.

Stella Dill, of Mary street, lives on the corner of Lakeview avenue.

"We've put up with the problem because we think our area is a little bit of the country in the city," she said. "We'd like to maintain the rustic image."

She added that blacktopping the street rather than using regular pavement would preserve this atmosphere.

Mr. Bremer warned that blacktopping would be an expensive undertaking and residents would probably be asked to assume the costs. He also said that any lighting installed in the area would more than likely be the bright mercury vapor type. He said this might be objectionable to Whitcomb road residents whose homes are close to the area.

The council voted to implement the advisory committee's recommendations to see if the problems are alleviated and study the other suggestions made at the meeting.

Mr. Bremer said he expects to report back to the council at the regular meeting Monday, September 9.

## Onassis Holdup Nets Thief \$120

A white male, described in his mid-20's, took an estimated \$120 after holding up the Onassis Coney Island, 20760 Mack avenue, Monday evening, August 5.

Charles Jeffries told Woods Public Safety Officer Paul Crook the man entered, walked up to him and pulled out a blue snub nosed revolver, saying, "I want your money and don't make any fast moves."

After the register drawer was opened, the suspect took the assorted bills and change and put the money into his jacket pocket. Mr. Jeffries was told to go back into the kitchen area and not to move, which he did. The culprit then backed out and made his escape.

An immediate check of the area met with negative results.

The man was described as around 6'2" tall, 190 pounds and had long blond hair tied back in a pony tail. He had a light blond moustache, fuzzy sideburns and a light acne complexion. The culprit

wore gold rim glasses, a green Army jacket, red plaid shirt and blue pants.

## What Goes On at Your Library

One of the great literary characters of the 20th century was Horatio Hornblower. In all, Hornblower's career, from midshipman to admiral in England's navy of the late 18th and early 19th centuries was chronicled in 11 novels by C. S. Forester.

Unfortunately, after 30 years, the Hornblower saga came to an end with Mr. Forester's death in 1966. For the millions of readers who eagerly looked forward to the next installment of Hornblower fighting England's enemies, (usually the French), it was difficult to realize that there were to be no more stories from the Forester pen.

In an attempt to fill this void, a number of authors have created their own fictional naval heroes. One of the more successful of these is Dudley Pope. A long-time author, Mr. Pope's hero is Nicholas Ramage. Set in the same period as the Hornblower novels, the adventures of Lt. Ramage have been told in four novels, the latest entitled GOVERNOR RAMAGE, R. N. (Simon and Schuster).

In this new novel, Ramage's enemy is a vindictive officer of his own fleet, Rear Admiral Goddard, through whose actions Ramage is sent off on a mission that ends in conquest of a Caribbean island and the discovery of a treasure. The author's expert but simply related knowledge of naval lore lends so much authenticity that, if one closes his eyes, one can almost taste salt and feel the sting of sea spray.

Mr. Pope's characters are real people, and his vignettes of sea life in the British Navy are the work of a naval historian.

Author Patrick O'Brian, who is probably better known for his translations of the works of Simone de Beauvoir, has written three novels of the adventures of Jack Aubrey. These historical sea tales, set in the early 1800's, chronicle the adventures of Captain Aubrey and his friend Stephen Maturin. Aubrey is a brave but not remarkably practical seaman of the Royal Navy. Maturin is a brilliant surgeon and a British spy.

Mr. O'Brian's latest novel is H.M.S. SURPRISE (Lippincott), and in it he sends our two heroes off to the Indian Ocean.

A Farms youth was issued a violation, and his case was referred to juvenile authorities, for careless driving on McKinley avenue between Ridge road and Charlevoix avenue Thursday, August 8.

**SATE BABI** (Barbecued Meat from Indonesia)  
Contributed by Mrs. Kim Khong Lie  
From "No Second Fiddle," the Cook Book Compiled by the Junior Women's Association for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra  
2 lbs. pork butt or 1 1/2 lb. pork cutlets  
1/2 cup soy sauce  
juice of 1 lemon  
1 tbsp. sugar  
2 cloves garlic, crushed  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/2 tsp. curry  
1/2 tsp. coriander  
1 1/2 tbsp. peanut butter  
Cut meat into bite-size cubes. Combine remaining ingredients, except peanut butter, and marinate meat overnight. Put meat on small metal or bamboo skewers, (four to five pieces per skewer), and broil over single layer of coals, (white-ashed), until delicately brown. Strain marinade and add enough water to make one cup of liquid. Add peanut butter; heat until slightly thickened. Season with salt and pepper. Serve as sauce over meat.  
Serve with dry, white rice, mixed salad and a variety of pickles. Serves four.
