Thursday, November 28
THE NATION'S ECONOMY is on its longest slide in five years and unemployment lines lengthened by 110,200 persons the first week in November, the government reported Wednesday. The chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, Arthur Burns, said the nation's political and economic structure is threatened by heavy reliance on expensive foreign oil. In the auto industry, the hardest hit by inflation and recession, 80,000 workers began an unwelcome layoff Thanksgiving Day that may not end for months.

Friday, November 29
THE GOVERNMENT announced Thursday a new program to police doctors and hospitals who treat elderly Medicare and needy Medicaid patients, resulting in an estimated multimillion dollar savings for taxpayers. Called utilization review, the controversial program is designed to insure that the government doesn't pay for unnecessary hospitalizations and expensive treatment in the two \$20 billion federal health programs.

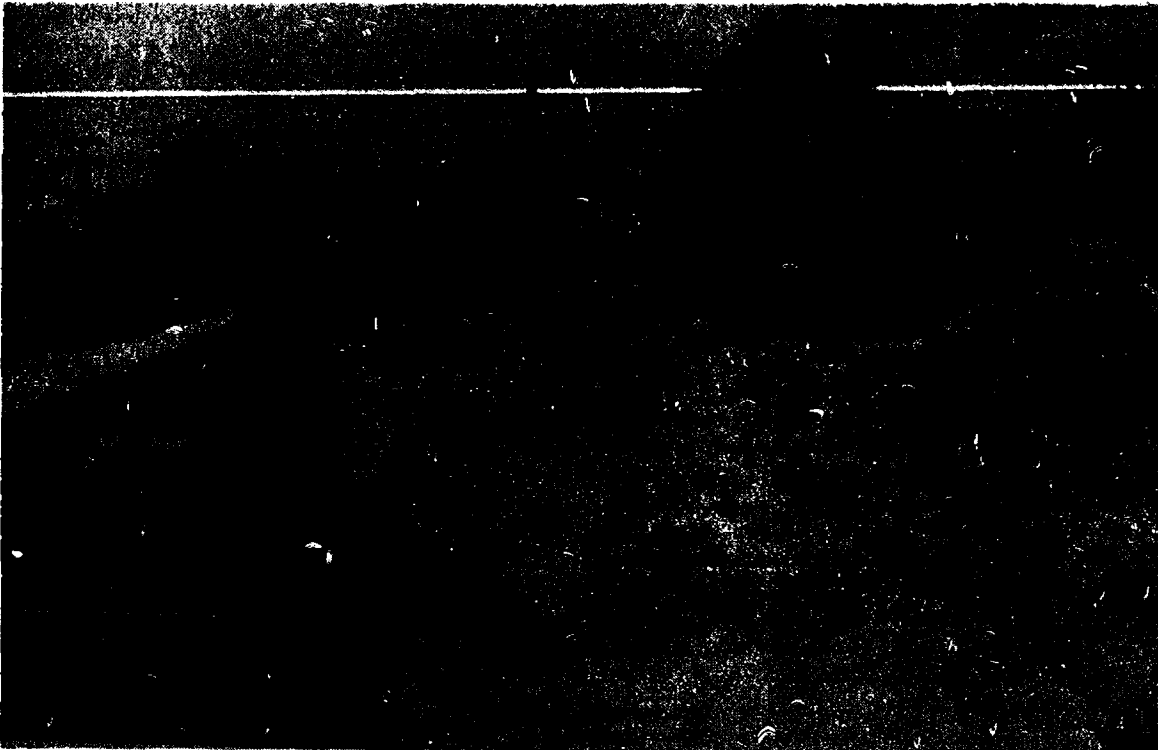
Saturday, November 30
THREE OF THE Detroit area's largest supermarket chains, A & P, Kroger and Allied Supermarkets, have announced a temporary freeze on the prices of about 15 percent of their food items. The voluntary freeze, which will last through the Christmas holidays, will include certain brands of bread, cereals, macaroni, tuna, pet foods, canned fruits and vegetables and frozen foods. A & P, the nation's second largest grocery chain, instituted the freeze Thanksgiving eve, and said the prices would be frozen through December 31 at all of its stores throughout the country.

Sunday, December 1
A PARALYZING SNOW-STORM dumped 19 inches of snow on the Detroit area today with strong winds causing major drifts in some areas. Major freeways were closed in some portions and Metropolitan and City Airports were shut down for both incoming and outgoing flights. The National Guard was called out to rescue stranded motorists on both the I-75 and I-94 expressways Sunday evening. Detroit was one of the hardest hit areas as the blizzard swept across the Midwest.

Monday, December 2
THOUSANDS OF persons remain stranded throughout the Detroit area today as residents and motorists begin digging out of the worst snowstorm to hit southeastern Michigan since 1886. A total of 18.9 inches of snow fell over the Detroit area in the 24-hour period beginning at 4:53 a.m. Sunday. Twenty-seven deaths have been recorded from heart attacks to persons shoveling snow. Portions of the I-94 and I-75 expressways remain closed as road crews attempt to remove abandoned cars and then salt and plow the roads.

Tuesday, December 3
PRESIDENT FORD, in a televised news conference Monday evening, defended his Vladivostok summit arms agreement as one that will eventually mean cuts in spending on weapons. The President said the agreement will limit each side to 2,400 strategic nuclear missiles or bombers of which 1,320 can carry multiple warheads capable of hitting more than a single target. On domestic issues, Mr. Ford said he was confident the nation would overcome the challenges of inflation, recession and the energy shortage. The President ruled out a 20-cent per gallon increase in the gasoline tax but did not mention a smaller increase.

Pair Win Tennis Title In Nationals

Anna VanWalleghem of The Woods and Susan Mascarin of The Shores captured the United States Lawn Tennis Association (USLTA) National Girls Indoor Doubles Championship in the 12 and under classification on Sunday, December 1. The action took place at Port Washington, N.Y.

This is the first National tennis title won by Detroit area players in 10 years. In the semi-finals the pair defeated Florida's top team of Holly Mills and Michelle DePalmer, 7-6, 6-1. In the finals they dumped Carol Loyd, of Tulsa, Okla., and Amy Kneale, of Arlington, Va., 6-4, 6-1.

She Reached Finals
Meanwhile in the singles championship, third seeded Susan Mascarin gained the finals with a semi-final win over Andrea Jaeger, of Illinois, 6-1, 6-1. After a three hour match Susan was finally defeated by Shelly Solomon, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., 6-4, 6-2.

Grosse Pointe also had another finalist in the USLTA National Indoor — Girls 18 division at Plainville, Mass., as unseeded Kris Fulgenzi of The Farms upset three seeded players to gain the finals. In the semi-finals she upset Sherri Acker, of Kalamazoo, 0-6, 6-1, 6-1, but, in a tough match, lost the finals to Anne Smith, of Dallas, Tex., 6-4, 6-3.

School and County Taxes Became Due December 1; Park Residents Get Letter

Municipalities Have Nothing to Do with Setting Rates, but Merely Act as Collection Agencies

By this time, ~~Pointe taxpayers should have~~, or will be receiving, mailed Grosse Pointe School District and Wayne County Tax notices. These taxes are payable by February 14, 1975, according to a Fall 1974 Municipal News Letter sent to all Park residents. Taxes not paid by this February date are subject to a four percent tax penalty.

As far as the 1974 Park property taxes are concerned, the deadline payment for this is February 28, 1975. After that date, they will be turned over to Wayne County for collection, according to City Comptroller Nunzio Ortisi.

Angry Taxpayers
Mr. Ortisi, city comptroller and other Pointe municipal officials have felt the wrath of Pointe taxpayers regarding the collection of School and County taxes. It has been stressed many times during the years that the municipalities have nothing to do with these taxes, but merely act as collection agencies for the School District and the County.

Mr. Ortisi also announced that for many years the Park has been following the practice, as did many other Michigan cities, of adding up to one percent charge on School and County taxes for what was legally referred to as Excess of Roll.

Reimbursed Cities
This money, the city comptroller stated, was used to reimburse the cities for expenses related to the preparation of the tax rolls and other office costs. Some cities, he stated further, also charged an additional one percent collection fee which is permitted under the law. The Park has

not charged any such fee on previous school and county tax bills. However, under a more strict interpretation of the statute, the State has in effect negated the application of the Excess of Roll provision and now requires that the cities add the one percent collection fee on school and county taxes unless the city wishes to absorb this cost within its budget.

Will Collect Fee
The Park, Mr. Ortisi said, is not in the position to do this and, therefore, will include a one percent collection fee as a separate charge, to the 1974 school and county taxes. This fee will in effect replace the one percent Excess of Roll and will not be an increase to the taxpayer. The city comptroller said that all School and County taxes fall due on December 1, and can be payable, without penalty, up to February 14. After that date, starting February 15, the four percent penalty is added, and when a month passes, an additional one half of one percent is added, or four and a half percent for each month it is not paid.

City real property taxes are due on July 1 and payable up to August 31, without penalty. On September 1, a penalty of one percent is added, and an additional one half of one percent, making the total penalty one and one half percent each month the tax is not paid. On March 1, all school, county and city taxes not paid, are turned over to the county for collection, which means that the delinquent taxpayers must go to the City-County Building in downtown Detroit to make the payments, including whatever penalties are added, Mr. Ortisi pointed out.

Solons Call On Stevens To Pinchhit

Former Farms Councilman Summoned to Serve Again after Rust Muirhead Resigns

It was a homecoming Monday evening, December 2, at The Farms Council meeting, for Moross road resident Mark C. Stevens. Mr. Stevens was named to fill the vacancy created on the council when E. Rust Muirhead resigned last month to move to California for business reasons.

Mr. Stevens is no stranger to the workings of the Farms Council. He held the position of councilman for two terms, beginning in 1964. He chose not to run after that, "to get some younger faces on the council," but he's back at it again.

By a unanimous vote of the council at its meeting Monday, November 18, Mr. Stevens was appointed to serve the remaining year of Mr. Muirhead's term. At that meeting, the council members expressed their desire to name someone with experience and Mr. Stevens fitted the bill.

Farms Mayor William Butler presented Mr. Stevens to the council at the December 2 meeting. Farms Administrative Assistant Richard Solak administered the oath of office.

Mr. Stevens didn't waste any time in getting back into the swing of things. By unanimous council vote, from which Mr. Stevens abstained, he was appointed to serve as the council representative to both the Policeman and Fireman Retirement System Commissions and on the General Employees Retirement System Commission. He will assume the remaining portion of the term, until May, 1975, which was vacated with Mr. Muirhead's resignation.

Farms Police Elect Officers

The Farms Police Officers Association has elected new officers. Officer Kenneth Pine, an executive board member for the Police Officers Association of Michigan, has been elected president of the local organization.

Officer Pine replaces John Farley, who chose not to run for re-election. Officer Clarence Reichling was elected vice-president; Officer Philip Miglio will serve as secretary, and Officer Gordon Evans as treasurer. All of the men were elected to one-year terms.

Worst Snowfall Since April 1886 Hits Metro Area

Fifteen Inches Dumped on Pointe in Two-Day Period, Compared to 12 Inches During All of December 1973; Detroit Had 19 Inches

The weather forecast for Sunday, December 1, was "mostly cloudy skies with a chance of snow flurries"; and Monday's prediction, "chance of snow with highs in the 30s". Then Mother Nature played her usual unpredictable tricks, when within a 24-hour period of the two days, she dumped a total of 18.9 inches, or to round out the figure, 19 inches of snow on the Michigan scene.

These "snow flurries" were the worst snowfall since April 6, 1886, when a total of 24.5 inches was accumulated within a period of 24 hours.

Sunday's and Monday's snowfall, estimated at about 18 million tons because of the moist air that saturated the falling snow, was the worst on record for a 24-hour period during the month of December. The United States Weather Bureau called it a freak storm, since it originated and came from the west, rather than from the east, the direction from which storms normally come.

Pointe Was Lucky
Records of the official U.S. weather station at the Farms Water Filtration Plant, 29 Moross road, showed that the Pointe area was luckier than most communities in the Detroit area.

The snow started on Sunday morning, and before it ended early Monday morning there was a total of 15 inches on the ground. This was enough to bring business to a standstill, cause schools and other institutions to close, stall vehicular traffic, and in fact, almost caused a complete paralysis of the Metro area.

The U.S. Weather Bureau said that the storm was not classified as a blizzard because the temperature was too warm and wind speeds were too slow, although gusts did reach as much as 40 miles an hour.

Sets December Record
This December's snow storm accumulation is considered the worst for any December, exceeding that of December 1962, which recorded a total of 17.3 inches for the entire month.

In the Pointe, on December 20, 1973, there was a total of 12 inches of snow on the ground, of which seven inches fell on that date and the other five, the day before.

Record keepers at the Farms Water Filtration Plant said that the Pointe should consider itself lucky. During November, when radio and television weather forecasters were telling listeners and watchers of the four to six inches and more of snow that was hitting the Midwestern States, The Pointe and surrounding areas were being pelted with 3.66 inches of rain and melted snow, that is, snow which melted as soon as it hit the ground.

Could Have Been Worse
With 10 inches of snow being equivalent to one inch (Continued on Page 2)

Snow Plowers Do Great Job Battling Big Storm

The personnel of the Department of Public Works of the five Pointes were the heroes of the hour during and following the heavy snow storm that dumped about 15 inches of snow on the Pointe area on December 1 and 2. Fleets of trucks and snow plows cleared away the rain saturated snow from the streets and sidewalks, after which tons of salt were spread to make vehicular passage and walking easier.

Park City Manager Robert Stone disclosed that DPW personnel and equipment plowed through the streets and sidewalks twice, and spread a total of 170 tons of salt. The streets were cleared first, and then the sidewalks, on Sunday, and both replowed

on Monday. The entire DPW crew worked from the first accumulation of snow on Sunday, until midnight; and on Monday, equipment was put back into use again starting from 6 a.m. to about 8 p.m. Mr. Stone said that a stockpile of 200 tons of salt was nearly depleted. To be on the safe side, after 150 tons were used, another 40 tons were ordered, and 20 more tons were utilized. The situation was not quite up to normal when the exhausted DPW crew finished on Monday, the city manager said, but everything appeared to be in good shape. No floodings were reported after the snow was cleared. (Continued on Page 2)

Hope to Get Set for Bids This Month

Woods Council, Citizens Group, Architects Agree on Details of Improvements

Final plans for Lake Front Park improvements were approved by The Woods Council after a Wednesday, November 27, meeting between the solons, the Citizens Recreation Commission and architects Tarapata, MacMahon, Paulsen Associates, Inc., of Bloomfield Hills.

"We expect to have specifications out for bids before the end of December or by the first week in January," reported Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos. "We will open bids shortly thereafter and break ground in February. The project should be completed by the end of summer."

To Cost \$1,815,000
The overall scope of the project, which the architect estimates will cost \$1,815,000 including construction contingency, includes three heated aluminum or granite pools, costing an estimated \$675,000. These include a swimming pool, diving pool and wading pool.

Mr. Pinkos said no decision has been made as yet whether to go the aluminum or granite route. "We'll get prices both ways," he said.

"The architect will make his final recommendation to us based upon timing, cost and maintenance factors."

The mayor expressed hope that the new pool, which will be located near the park's main entrance off of Jefferson avenue, will be operating in late summer.

Will Use Old Pool
"We'll keep the old pool in operation all summer long," said Mr. Pinkos. "We won't take the old pool out of service until the new pool is in operation."

He added that the swimming season will be extended some with the new heated pool.

Other facets of the program include an asphalt parking area for 250 cars, a concrete sundeck area, 85,174 square feet, site lighting, fencing, and a new 11,000-square-foot bathroom, fully enclosed and heated.

Continuing activity center alterations include the removal of present partitions in the east and west wings, with the adoption of those areas for summertime senior citizen activities, filling and landscaping the present pool and eight open tennis courts with lights.

The new bathroom will contain a variety of items including men's and women's locker rooms, showers and toilets, a lobby-activity area, first aid room, life guards' room and equipment storage rooms.

Students Get Snow Holiday

The snow Sunday and Monday meant a holiday for Pointe students and teachers — one that the school system says will probably not have to be made up at the close of the year.

As a result of the severe weather conditions, the entire school system was closed down on Monday and Dr. George Eddington, Assistant to Superintendent Dr. James A. Adams, said after much effort was made to alert everyone to the fact, he did not think anyone actually showed up for classes on Monday.

Dr. Adams made the decision to close down the schools and all were re-opened on Tuesday.

Student attendance Tuesday was a little lower than normal, Dr. Eddington said, and 22 teachers were unable to make classes because they were still snowbound.

Plowers Do Great Job Battling Big Storm

"We had to plow the streets first," the city manager said, "because we thought it best people had to go to work. Then we tackled the sidewalks. The snow was very heavy, but we had only minor breakdowns of two jeeps and trucks during the plowing operations."

He said that during the Sunday clearance, roller broom equipped jeeps were used to sweep the sidewalks, but when the snow became heavy and wet, the brooms were removed and replaced with plows.

"We deeply regret that in plowing the streets and sidewalks, snow was pushed onto the driveways of the properties of our residents," Mr. Stone said, "but this could

not be helped, and I am sure our people understand this. "I would like to compliment the DPW workers, and the personnel of the Police and Fire Departments for doing a very excellent job. They were really magnificent and we are very proud of them."

In the Shores, Village Superintendent Thomas Jefferis said that the DPW personnel of his community did a tremendous job in clearing the streets, working continuously from 11 a.m. on Sunday to 5 a.m. on Monday. Everything is back to normal, as far as the streets are concerned, he said.

At the time he gave the information, on Tuesday, December 3, he said most of the sidewalks had not yet been plowed, but work on this has already begun.

"The situation in our community is a little bit different than in the other Pointes," Mr. Jefferis said. "Where the others spread salt, we drop small piles at strategic spots along the streets and intersections, and let passing cars carry the salt along. This is very effective. We used about 15 tons of salt after the storm."

"We have had good luck with our equipment, with only one bolt breaking on a truck used in the plowing. We have had no flooded streets or basements, and only one water main break in South Duval."

Mr. Jefferis said that personnel who worked from early morning on Sunday to evening, were sent home to rest and a fresh crew was put to work. The only exception was Stanley Vernier, DPW superintendent, who started with the first crew and continued on with the second until the work was finished. The workers are to be complimented for doing a great job, he added.

City police might have had an inkling of what was to come on Sunday and Monday when they responded to a complaint on Saturday, November 30, at 8:42 and had to remove a snowman from the street in the area of Rivard boulevard and Kercheval avenue.

The following day, the major problems were falling wires and trees or limbs down as a result of the storm. At 7:30 p.m., firemen responded to a report of a wire down at the rear of the University and since it was a 4000 volt wire, firemen Steve Madar and Robert Millington took turns standing by until Edison arrived about 3 1/2 hours later.

At 9:30 a.m. on Monday, December 2, a resident of Neff road reported her garage had collapsed under the weight of the snow and two cars were inside. Police advised her to call a wrecking service.

of rain, and vice versa, that would have been almost 40 inches of snow last month, if the weather had been cold enough. Coupled with what fell Sunday and Monday, imagine the predicament The Pointe would be in this time of the year, it was said.

Other heavy snowfalls that hit the area, are: 12 inches in 1929, according to Detroit's records; and on February 25, 1965, when according to the Farms' record, the snowfall was 13 inches.

There probably were others throughout the Detroit Metropolitan and out-state areas, but records would have to be checked for an accurate report.

Farms Issues Snow Warnings

Farms Police Chief Robert Ferber has issued a memorandum to all department personnel regarding the issuance of violations during a snow emergency.

Persons depositing snow in Farms' rights-of-way will be ticketed under The Farms litter ordinance. The department noted that under the ordinance no debris, including snow, can be placed in a right-of-way.

In addition, the 48-hour parking regulation will be enforced beginning with the day shift on Wednesday, December 4. Cars in The Farms cannot park for longer than 48 hours, without being moved.

Beginning with the day shift on Friday, December 6, cars that have not been moved will be towed away if deemed necessary by the public service director.

These measures will assist the city in clearing the roads when there is heavy snowfall, thus speeding the time in which traffic flow can return to normal.

Ferry Teachers Donate Time to Nature Club

If a number of Ferry students noticed the distinct aroma of peanut butter lingering in their halls last week, they could have turned to members of the Ferry School Nature Club for an explanation.

A group of about 35-40 kids, who meet every Monday after school, the club operates under the supervision of faculty members Wayne Bolden, Jean Harris, Carolyn Megge and Thomas Whall.

As the name implies, the group is concerned with environment—especially the environment around their school. They've already studied the trees on the Ferry grounds, cleaned up the area of litter and planted bulbs they expect to see flourish in the spring.

And the peanut butter is part of the club's latest venture into the world of birds—a subject they've been delving into for the past month. They have already constructed bird feeders to hang around the school yard and on Monday, November 25, they made somewhat less glamorous feeders of pine cones, peanut and bird seed to take to their homes.

When Mr. Bolden explained that the idea was to smear the cone in peanut butter, then swirl it in the bird seed, he was greeted with a chorus of "yucks." But after he objected to their reaction, "If you were a bird you would really think it was neat," the classroom took on the unmistakable smell of peanut butter while the children worked enthusiastically at their projects. A few even

snatched some peanut butter. Whatever they did, they appeared to be enjoying themselves and that's partly what the organizers had in mind.

"We donated our time," said Mr. Bolden, "and the kids are here on a voluntary basis, to build school pride. It's strictly non-academic. We try to make it pleasurable in the hope that they carry through at home and all during their lives."

Mr. Whall concurred. "We're trying to improve their outlook on the school." He added that although the pupils play a major role in deciding what the club does, with the assistance in grade levels, (one through six), the

four teachers really have to give the club some kind of overall structure.

Mr. Whall took charge on Monday while the group watched a movie on an endangered species of birds called the Kirkland Warbler, and outlined some statistics on the blackboard so the youngsters could see the alarming decline in this type of bird.

This week, the club will take a brief leave of the world of birds to get into the Christmas spirit of stringing popcorn and cranberries. During the following session they will make holiday centerpieces. They'll return to birds and make onion bags full of suet. In all their bird

projects, they've been assisted by donations of the suet and bird seed which they are still actively seeking.

In January, they'll work on terrariums and aquariums and in March, they'll undertake some spring planting.

Other activities planned include a field trip to some as yet undecided place and a paper drive in April.

One way or another, the teachers plan to keep the kids busy and the fact that the size of the group is so large when membership is strictly voluntary speaks well for what the four Ferry faculty members are doing.

Guard Against Holiday Deaths

What should be the happiest, most festive month of the year historically is the most tragic and most dangerous in the Detroit area, traffic accident-wise, according to the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit.

With the Christmas holidays and ensuing preparations, there are numerous reasons why December should be the most joyous month of the year. But invariably each year more traffic deaths occur in December than in any month.

"There are a number of reasons why fatal accidents increase in December," said Garnet M. Griffin, association president. "We have more hours of darkness when neither driver nor pedestrian can see as well. This is aggravated by snowy, icy streets and holiday shopping."

"But there are other equally important reasons. Too many people drink too much, more than they would at other times of the year. They become a menace when they get behind the wheel. And this doesn't apply only to drivers. Pedestrians, who have had too much to drink, are as much a hazard, both to themselves and to drivers."

Mr. Griffin said more than 50 percent of the fatal traffic accidents involve either a drinking driver or a drinking pedestrian.

"Don't drink too much either at a home or an office party," he said. If you

plan on drinking make certain you are sober enough to drive or that someone can see that you get home safely.

"Our traffic accident record starting into December this year is a good one. Traffic deaths are reduced approximately 20 percent," Mr. Griffin said. "You can make this holiday season a much happier and a much safer one if you stay sober enough to drive or to walk safely."

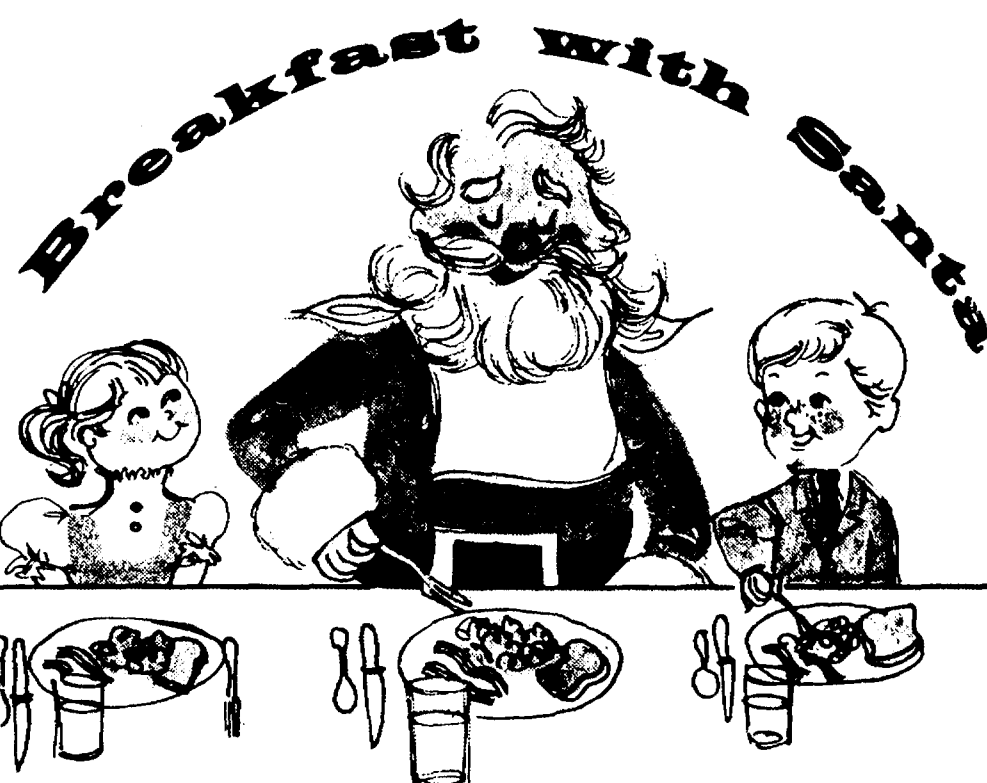

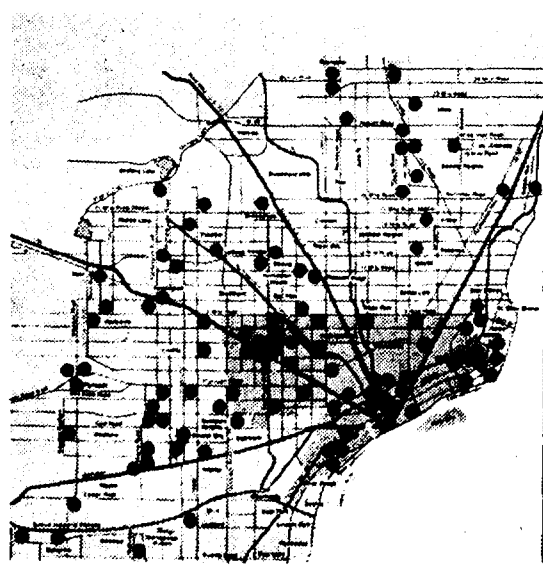

Car Battery Explosion Warning Given by Costa

Park Fire Chief Phillip Costa picked an article from the monthly "Arson News," which he believes will be of interest to the people of The Pointe community — exploding automobile batteries.

The chief pointed out that during the winter especially, when it becomes hard to start the car, consequently causing the car battery to run down, people are prone to use "jumper cables" to get their auto started.

As a public service, the NEWS was asked to pass on a warning from Dr. Davidoff, and that is, people who use "jumper cables" are risking serious eye injuries.

The doctor cited at least three cases in which he treated persons injured when their car batteries exploded. His report, sent in a letter to the Journal of American Medical Association, was written to document the danger involved in using a booster battery to start a car.

"Charging batteries release a mixture of hydrogen and oxygen gases that will explode with great violence if a spark of flame is brought too near," Dr. Davidoff stated.

He cited a case of a 60-year-old man who suffered secondary glaucoma and required surgery to repair a retinal hole caused by confusion of the eye after his car battery exploded when he was using a jumper cable.

In another case he treated a 47-year-old man who lost the vision of his left eye and suffered multiple facial lacerations the required plastic surgery, when his battery exploded.

And in still another case, a 30-year-old woman suffered central corneal laceration, requiring hospital care and intensive medical supervision. The battery exploded in her face when she was using jumper cables to start her car.

The Ohio ophthalmologist outlined the proper method

of starting a dead battery with cables:

1. Connect one end of a cable to the positive pole of the discharge battery;
2. Then connect the other end to the positive pole of the booster battery;
3. Connect the second cable to the negative pole of the booster battery and the other end to the engine block of the vehicle with the discharged battery, as far away from the battery as possible;
4. After starting the auto, remove the cable from the engine block of the vehicle with the discharge battery first, then remove the other end of the cable from the

booster battery. Disconnect the other cable, first, from the newly recharged battery, and then from the booster battery.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has had authority since 1966 to issue standards that would minimize or eliminate battery explosion hazards. The agency has taken no regulatory action in this area.

"A good idea," said Chief Costa, "is that when you purchase a set of 'jumper cables,' check to make sure that proper directions are attached, and follow the directions as stated. You will be doing yourself a favor."

A custodial search of the suspects' vehicle revealed one work glove, found under the right front side of the auto, containing \$9.60 in assorted coins.

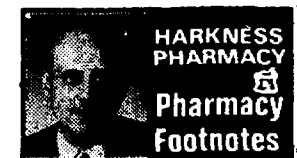
Youth Council To Hold Party

Fourteen North High School students finished in the top four percent on Part I of the Eighteenth Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition and are among 1,000 Michigan students to compete in the final examination held Wednesday, December 4.

North math students who qualified for the second test included David Bastianelli, Michael Gilford, Craig Hanson, David Howell, Phil Howels, James Klimchuk, Amy Lowichik, Eric Moon, Joe Parise, Tom Swineford, Robert Trombly, Charles VanBecelaere, Fred VanHorne and David Wybo.

This competition is sponsored by the Michigan section of the Mathematical Association of America and is designed to foster a wider interest in mathematics, to focus attention on the necessity for mathematical training in most professions and trades and to identify and provide scholarships for capable mathematics students in the State.

The 100 winners of the competition will be honored at the Awards Program sponsored by Michigan Bell Telephone at Western Michigan University on February 22. Forty of the winners will receive a total of approximately \$7,000 in college scholarships.

Contributions to the scholarships fund include Burroughs Corporation, Kuhlman Corporation and the Michigan Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Earl Veenendaal, Math Department chairman, has served as the high school supervisor for North students competing in the examination.

MASSIVE STRUCTURE
The Great Pyramid of Pharaoh Khufu (whom the Greeks called Cheops), may be the most massive stone structure ever created. 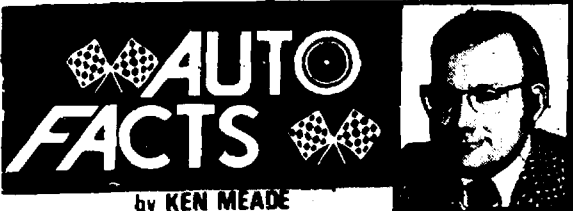

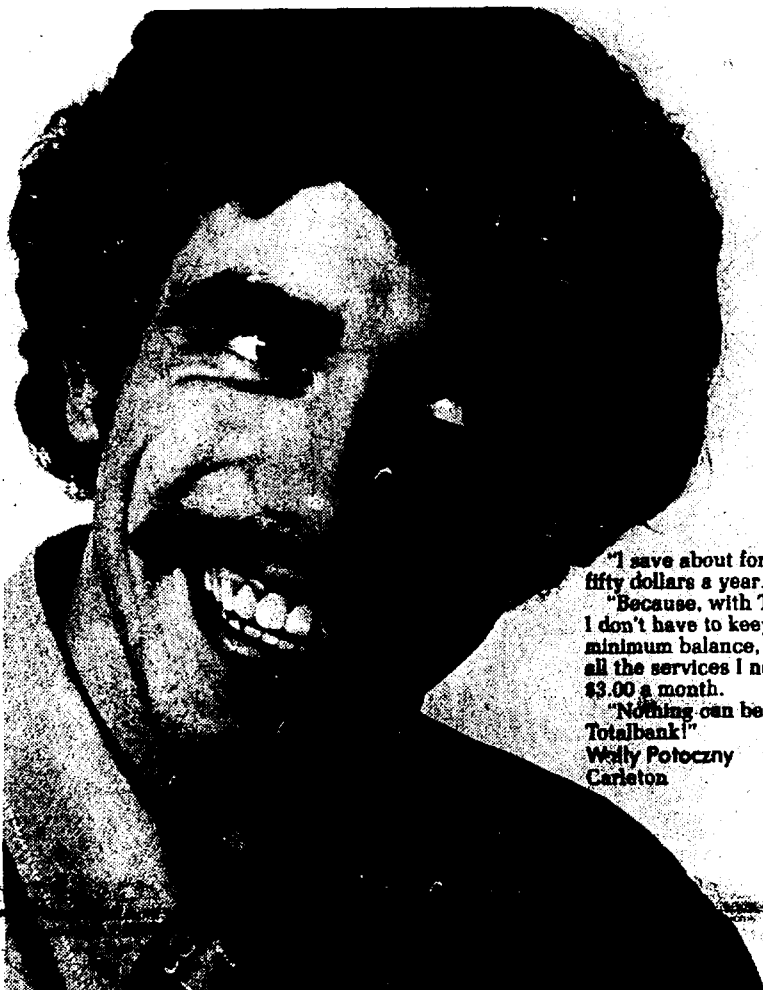

Continue War on Gypsy Moth

The summer of '74 should go down as a very good year in Michigan's fight against the gypsy moth. Recovery of traps last summer shows a drastic reduction in the insects' population in Michigan.

"Plant industry and protection men in Michigan experimented with new control methods during the summer and are now comparing their effectiveness," said B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Gypsy moth larvae devour leaves and defoliate millions of acres of forests in other states. The 1974 program in Michigan had two objectives, Ball said, to find infestations of the moth and to prevent reproduction.

Trapping to find infestations this year covered almost the entire state, according to Dean Lovitt, Plant Industry division chief. Only 122 moths were found in nine counties, compared to 15 times that many in 21 counties in 1973.

Experiments to control the moth involved five different techniques. One showed complete success, Lovitt said. In the area where a combination of sex lure and insecticide application was used, no

mated females were found and no male moths were captured.

Graduate students at Michigan State University worked on a monitoring system whereby female moths were sterilized, placed in the field and later picked up and tested for presence of male sperm. In this experiment, Lovitt said, only about two percent of the recovered females actually mated.

Laurie DeSantis won the one-half mile distance for the second year in a row with a time of 2:56.6. Mary Austerberry, with a time of 2:59.5 came in second and Tracy Nelson, at 2:12, placed third.

Chris Douglas came in first in the mile run for the seventh grade boys with a time of 6:06.7. Right behind him was Todd Platt, with 6:06.9 and Ed Fish, clocked at 6:32.5, was third.

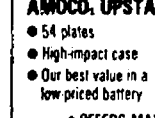

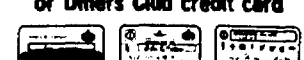

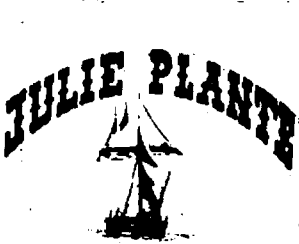

New Members Are Goal Of Channel 56 Campaign

Beginning Friday, December 6, and lasting through Sunday, December 15, Detroit's public television station, Channel 56, will be campaigning for additional members which will mean increased revenues for the station.

The goal is 3,000 new members and \$50,000 for the 10-

day period. The theme for the campaign is "Just Another Week" of great viewing on Channel 56.

Campaign organizers say the idea behind the theme is that if viewers in Detroit want to keep 56 more exciting weeks of great viewing coming into their homes, support is needed from the citizens of Detroit.

The membership drive is part of a new program called the Station Independence Project which is being organized nationwide by the Public Broadcasting Service to bolster public television's community support. The project hopes to triple membership in the area.

For Channel 56, this means a jump from 16,000 members to 48,000 members. Audience surveys show that over 400,000 homes tune into Channel 56 at least once a week and yet only 16,000 of these homes have taken out a membership. This is only four percent of the viewers supporting the station.

The minimum contribution to become a member is \$15 which provides one year's membership. Included with membership is a monthly copy of the station's program guide.

Phone-in-pledges will be taken daily, December 6-15, from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., by calling 872-7500.

The DYC "A" swimmers will compete in the Warren Consolidated Aquanauts "A" meet Saturday-Sunday December 14-15.

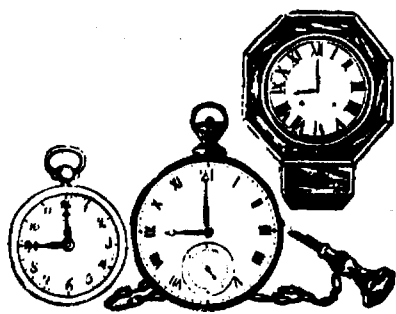

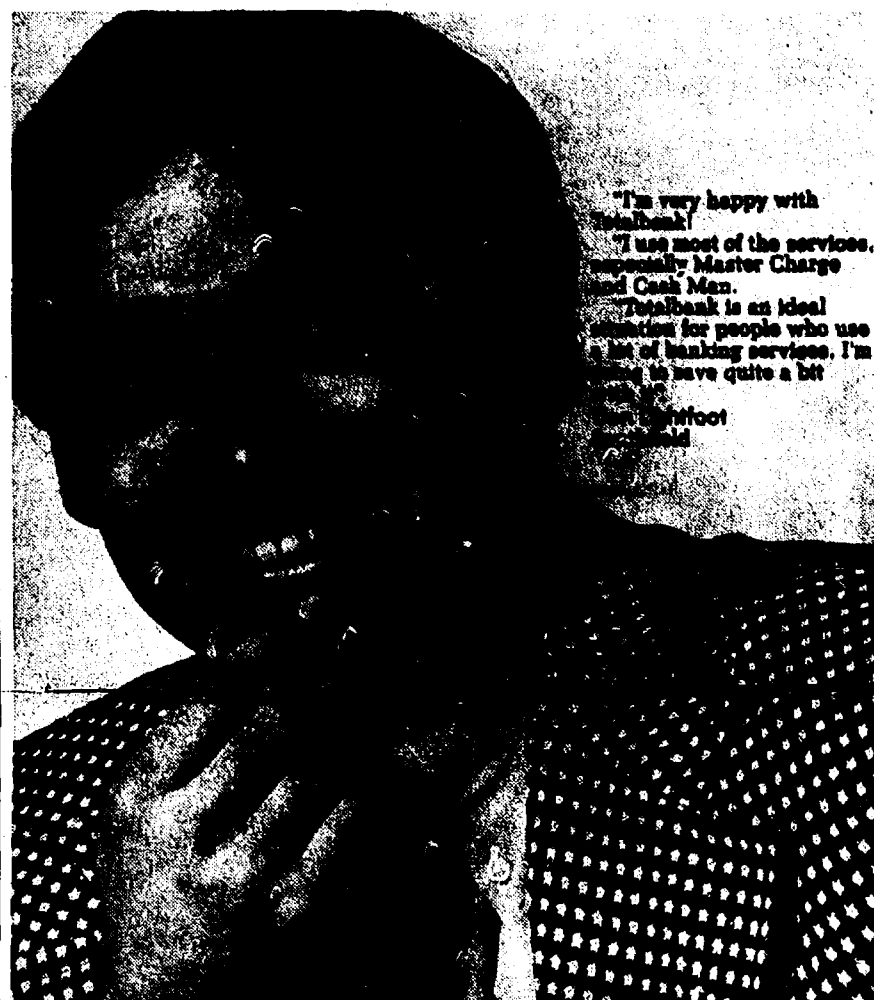

What Goes On at Your Library

Several weeks ago I wrote about a number of our new titles on wine and winemaking. This week I would like to share with you some books, all available at your Grosse Pointe Public Library, on beer and whiskey.

Long before Coke, there was beer. From the time of the first settlement at Jamestown, Americans have enjoyed home and commercial brewed ale, and other lively forms of fermented malt.

Will Anderson's *THE BEER BOOK*, (Pyne Press), is an affectionate, knowledgeable and colorful tribute to American breweries, and their one-thousand-and-one collectibles.

This inclusive guide is profusely illustrated with black-and-white photographs and colorplates showing such breweriana as bottles, cans and trays, old advertisements, openers and labels. Advice is given for successful collection of items while the objects themselves are described in the major portion of the book.

Representative U. S. breweries are discussed in an alphabetically arranged survey with one chapter devoted to the great brewing cities including Detroit.

While written primarily for the collector, *THE BEER BOOK*, like the refreshing brew it celebrates, is a book

to enjoy. It will provide many hours of nostalgic entertainment.

For those readers who would like to take a try at brewing on their own, I recommend *BREW IT YOURSELF*, (Farrar), by Leigh Beadie. Written specifically for the American public, this is a convenient and foolproof guide to the brewing of beer, ale, stout and mead at home.

It is no longer necessary, if you follow the author's easy to read recipes, to mash barley and invest in costly copper utensils in order to make a superior beer with minimum fuss and maximum enjoyment.

Fifteen days after bottling, according to the author, "you will have a beer that is equal or superior to the finest German imports."

For those who don't want to brew their own, but would like to read about how others did it, there is Joseph Dabney's *MOUNTAIN SPIRITS*, (Scribners).

This book is subtitled "A Chronicle of Corn Whiskey from 'King James' Upland Plantation to America's Appalachians and the Moonshine Life," and is largely composed of anecdotes about and by moonshiners and moonshiners of the era when making "shine" was regarded as a God-given right by many of the Appalachian mountain folk.

Along with his anecdotes, the author provides a history of the coming of distilling to America, and its place in the culture of the frontier.

Dabney's nostalgia for the days of "pure corn" when moonshiners felt respect, and often liking, for one another is apparent, and dominates this book.

Like moonshine itself, *MOUNTAIN SPIRITS* runs clear and will give any reader a good old time.

WHISKEY IN THE KITCHEN, (Bobbs), by Emmanuel and Madeline Greenberg is a very special kind of book about whiskey. The authors, both well-known home economists, believe that whiskey and other distilled spirits can enhance every course on the menu, and in this spirited cookbook proceed to show how this is done from cocktails to dessert with a good balance of recipes.

The best of the recipes are for foods that seem to have a definite affinity for spirits, like Beef Bourguignon, Rum Cream Cake and a delectable dessert called Paddy's Parfait, consisting of Irish Coffee, jelly and whipped cream.

The authors conclude their book with a complete guide to whiskey and other distilled spirits and a chart of standard measures and suggestions for bar equipment.

This next title is a book that everyone who enjoys a drink — from sherry sippers to boilermaker belters — will enjoy reading. In *THE BOOZE BOOK*, (Playboy Press), author Ralph Schoenstein, the noted humorist and essayist, has collected a variety of stories, essays, drinking songs, toasts and odes to the romance of alcohol.

Contributors to this collection include such celebrated authors and tipplers as William Shakespeare, Oliver Goldsmith, William Makepeace Thackeray, G. K. Chesterton, Robert Benchley and Alex Waugh.

Ever wonder how much beer an ancient Egyptian pyramid-builder drank a day? The answer is here, and so it is an article on how America managed to survive the greatest crisis in its history — prohibition. You can read about the greatest taverns and saloons in history, from Elizabethan England to the Old West. If you're feeling academic, you can take the alcoholic IQ quizzes. And if you succumb, the book provides the final word on what

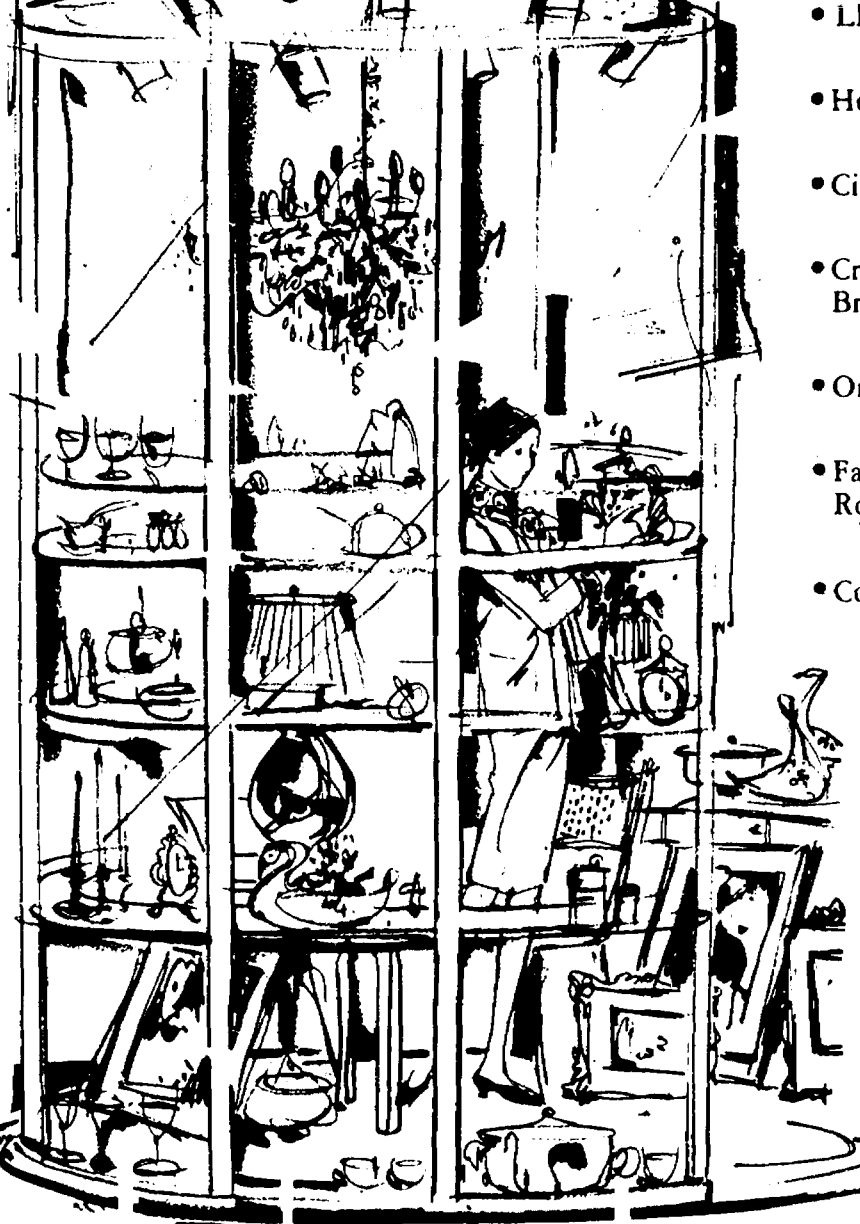

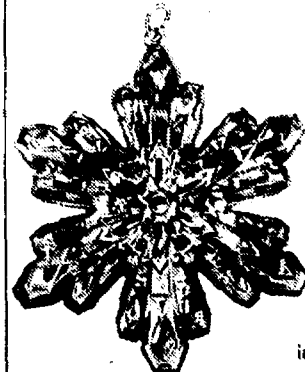

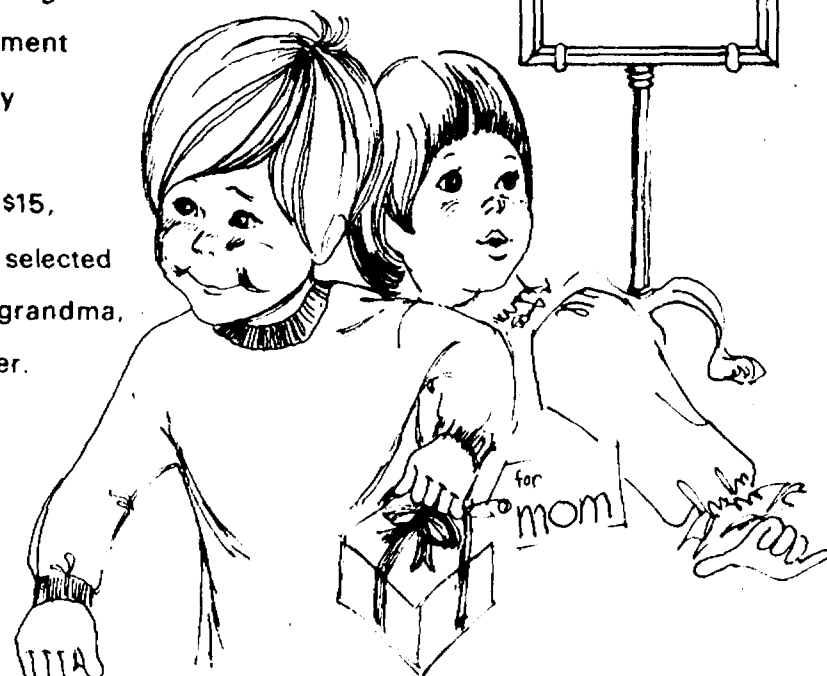

December 13 is Lucia's Day, beginning of the Christmas season in Sweden. On that day, in Swedish homes, the eldest daughter, dressed in white and with a crown of lighted candles on her head, softly singing Santa Lucia, awakens her family with coffee and cakes.

There are many legends surrounding this tradition, but in each Lucia emerges as the symbol of light and hope. She comes on the darkest day of the year. The first Lucia was a Christian martyr who went out at night with her mother to take food to the poor. Subject to persecution the pair made their visits in darkness and secrecy, Lucia with a candle on her head to light their way.

She was discovered and sentenced by the authorities to be burned—but the wood would not catch fire. Lucia was eventually killed by a sword thrust on December 13 but her spirit, harbinger of the returning sun, continues to light the north's mid-winter darkness.

DSO's Busiest Month Begins with Concerts This Weekend

The Detroit Symphony Orchestra begins one of the busiest months of its 1974-75 season with two pairs of subscription concerts in Ford Auditorium this week, the first pair tonight and Friday morning, December 5 and 6, the second Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon, December 7 and 8.

The evening concerts are scheduled for 8:30 o'clock. Friday morning's concert, second in the NBD Coffee Concert series, begins at 10:45. Sunday afternoon's concert, second in the Kresge

Omnibus Family series, starts at 3:30 o'clock. A DSO conducting debut and the DSO premieres of two works highlight the December 5 and 6 concert pair.

Guest soloist will be young Korean violinist Kyung-Wah Chung who first appeared with the Orchestra in December, 1968.

Guest conductor is James DePreist, dynamic young black associate conductor of the National Symphony in Washington, D.C., in his first appearances with the DSO. Mr. DePreist will conduct

the Orchestra in Strauss's tone-poem "Ein Heldenleben," (A Hero's Life), and the first DSO performances of Mozart's Symphony No. 23 in D major, K.181.

He and Miss Chung will join in the DSO premiere of Sir William Walton's Violin Concerto.

The December 7 and 8 concert pair features Andre Kostelanetz, a favorite guest conductor with DSO audiences, in his fifth appearance with the DSO.

Mr. Kostelanetz' all-orchestral program includes Tchaikovsky's March for the Coronation of Aleksandr III and his Serenade for Strings, Ravel's "La Valse," Webern's very early tonal piece "Summer Wind Idyll" and Kodaly's colorful "Hary Janos" Suite.

James DePreist studied at the University of Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia Conservatory. Stricken with polio on a State Department tour of the Far East in 1962 he recovered sufficiently to make a second tour in 1963.

The following year he won first prize in the Dmitri Mitropoulos International Conductor's Competition.

Leonard Bernstein immediately engaged him to be assistant conductor of the New York Philharmonic for 1965-66; since then he has conducted many of the major American and European orchestras.

He was appointed associate conductor of the National Symphony in 1971.

Kyung-Wah Chung is the youngest daughter of an almost incredibly musical Korean family, including her

cellist sister Myung-Wah who appeared with the DSO at Meadow Brook in 1969. Kyung-Wah studied first in Seoul, later with Ivan Galamian at Juilliard and shared first prize in the 1967 Leventritt Competition with Pinchas Zukerman — the first time the competition ever awarded two first prizes.

She has since toured the world several times and played with all the major orchestras, always to highest praise.

Andre Kostelanetz first appeared as DSO guest conductor in 1961. He has been associated with the New York Philharmonic since 1952 and inaugurated the Promenade concert series in 1963.

He has appeared as guest conductor with the symphonies of Philadelphia, Cleveland, Los Angeles, Houston, Minneapolis and other cities in this country and Canada. He has made many tours abroad, leading the Royal Philharmonic, the Philharmonia Orchestra, the London Symphony, the Berlin Philharmonic and principal orchestras in other European countries, Israel and Japan.

Mr. Kostelanetz also has been responsible for the commissioning of works by many leading American composers, including Aaron Copland, William Schuman, Alan Hovhaness and Virgil Thomson.

During World War II he volunteered his services to train and conduct GI orchestras in Europe, the Orient and North America; for this he was awarded the Asiatic-Pacific campaign ribbon.

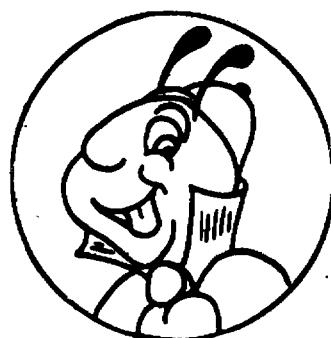

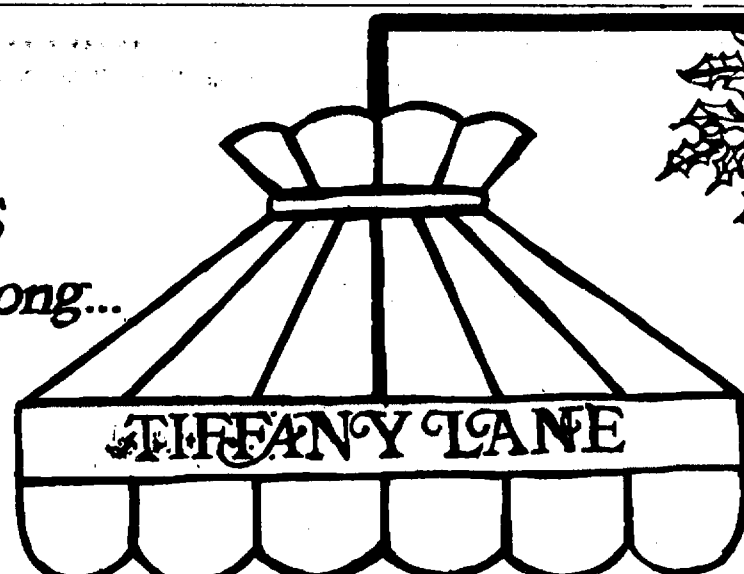

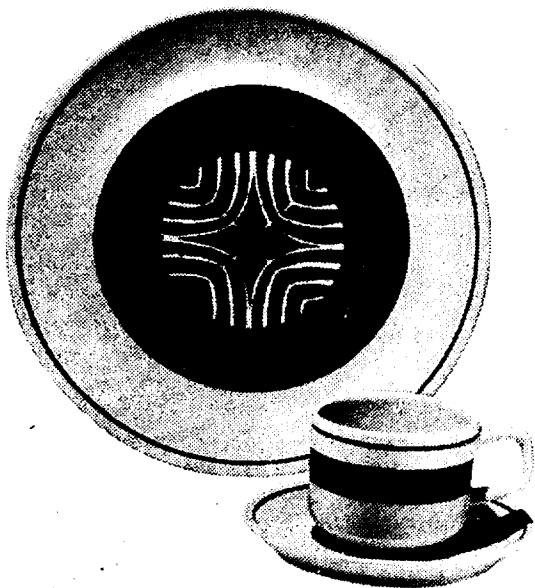

Water Heater Uses Energy

The home appliance that uses the most energy is not your range, freezer or washing machine. It's your water heater.

"Heating water uses more energy than any other household activity except heating space," says Jim Boyd, Extension Housing Specialist at Michigan State University. "Efficient selection, installation and operation of your water heater are three ways you can pare pennies off your utility bill."

Choosing the right size water heater for your family assures you of hot water when you need it. Figure on 15 to 25 gallons of hot water per day per person in your family.

"A rapid-recovery water heater makes it possible for you to get by with a smaller capacity tank," Dr. Boyd observes. "It also uses more energy, however."

Scheduling baths, showers, dishwashing and laundry so they don't conflict gives your water heater time to recover between demands for hot water.

Whenever possible install your water heater as close as you can to the major points of use. Every 25 feet of water pipe wastes the heat used to warm a gallon of water every time you turn on the faucet.

Even short lengths of pipe should be insulated to minimize heat loss.

Set the thermostat no higher than necessary. Water doesn't have to steam as it comes out of the faucet. Heating water hot enough to scald an unsuspecting child or unthinking adult is a safety hazard as well as a waste of energy.

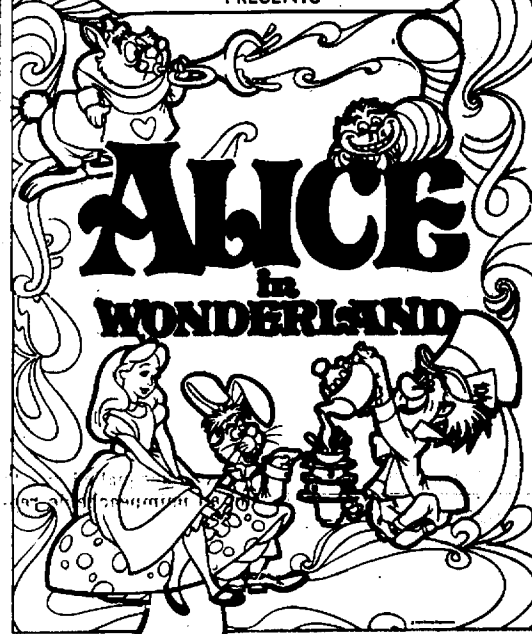

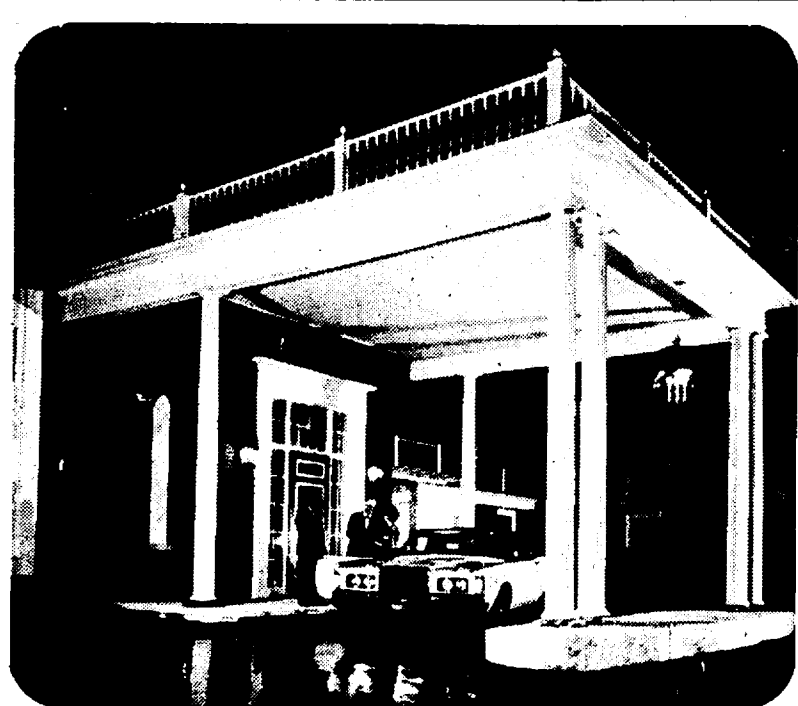

She enjoys tennis, recently took up paddle tennis and won the women's paddle tennis doubles at the Detroit Boat Club this year. She's pretty darn proud of that. After all, she had done nothing in competitive sports since college . . .

She's a staunch supporter, current board member of and past Earth-Fest worker for Environmental Action Now. "I've got to get in a plug for EAN's new Endangered Species Coloring Book."

One at a Time

She's a one-project-at-a-time person, (if she's doing something for EAN, she's not doing something for the Symphony Juniors), and she hates to repeat herself, to handle the same project for the same group two years in a row. She prefers to explore a new possibility.

Soon they'll be sitting home in a new home. Their Lennon road house is sold, and they'll be moving into Colonial road after the first of the year.

Presently, the Emergency Center staff includes six full-time emergency physicians, a supervisor, a head nurse, 15 full-time Registered Nurses, five Licensed Practical Nurses, 16 nurse assistants, (male and female), nine especially trained ER secretaries who handle all the book work, and Emergency Room coordinators who meet and assist ER patients and their families.

Five cardiac monitors are available at all times. Twenty-five units are equipped to handle all types of trauma.

Eugene Cetnar, M.D., chief of Emergency Services at Saint John, is a member of the board of the Michigan Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians and is on the Advisory board of Emergency Medical Services of Detroit.
