Thursday, November 28 THE NATION'S ECONO-MY is on its longest slide in five years and unemployment lines lengthened by 110,200 persons the first week in November, the gov-ernment reported Wednesday. The chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, Arthur Burns, said the nation's political and economic structure is threatened by heavy reliance on expensive foreign oil. In the auto industry, the hardest hit by inflation and recession, 80,000 workers began an unwelcome layoff Thanksgiving Day that may not end for months.

Friday, Nevember 29 THE GOVERNMENT announced Thursday a new program to police doctors and hospitals who treat elderly Medicare and needy Medi-caid patients, resulting in an estimated multimillion dollar savings for taxpayers. Called utilization review, the controversial program is designed to insure that the government doesn't pay for unnecessary hospitalizations and expensive treatment in the two \$20 billion federal health pro grams.



Monday, December 2 THOUSANDS OF persons remain stranded throughout the Detroit area today as residents and motorists begin digging out of the worst snowstorm to hit southeastern Michigan since 1886. A total of 18.9 inches of snow fell over the Detroit area in the 24-hour period beginning at 4:53 a.m. Sunday. Twentyseven deaths have been recorded from heart attacks to persons shoveling snow. Portions of the I-94 and I-75 ex pressways remain closed as road crews attempt to remove abandoned cars and then salt and plow the roads.

Worst Snowfall Hope to Get Since April 1886 Set for Bids This Month Hits Metro Area

The weather forecast for Sunday, December 1, was "mostly cloudy skies with a chance of snow flurries"; and Monday's prediction, "chance of snow with highs in the 30s". Then Mother Nature played her usual unpredictable tricks, when within a 24-hour period of the two days, she dumped a total of 18.9 inches, or to round out the figure, 19 inches of snow on the Michigan scene.



HAPPY INVENTION

It was a tradition for Henry Cole, a 19th-century London museum director, to send short notes to his friends at Christmas, wishing them a happy holiday season. But in 1843 he was unusually busy, so he asked an artist friend, John C. Horsley, to design a card with a printed message that would substitute for his annual greeting. That, says December Reader's Digest article, marked the invention of the Christmas card, which has since developed into a holiday tradition and sparked a billion-dollar industry.

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Let's look at a few facts.

- 1. You can save about 3% for every degree you permanently dial down during a heating season. For example, set your thermostat back five degrees, leave it there, and you'll save about 15%.
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- 3. Of course, you can save even more by leaving your thermostat down

every day and dialing even further down at night.



Certificate of Occupancy comes to Grosse Pointe Cityl It come to G.P. Park Aug. 2, 1972 and most people will agree its for the best. Simply said, a seller in either of these two areas must apply for a "C.O.O." before he can sell or rent his home. The City of G.P. pointed out that 78% of its dwellings were more than 25 years old and 65% were more than 35 years old.

The C.O.O. comes under the City Housing-Property maintenance code and is designed to protect the public health, safety and welfare of all the City's dwelling units — they call it "preventive maintenance" to insure that aging properties do not deteriorate. Some will say the C.O.O. is unconstitutional and many lowyers will agree. The fact remains however that it is here to stay. About the nly variable that remains is who shall pay for the corrections the buyer or the seller -- this is still negotiable.

December 13 is Lucia's Day, beginning of the Christmas season in Sweden. On that day, in Swedish homes, the eldest daughter, dressed in white and with a crown of lighted candles on her head, softly singing Santa Lucia, awakens her family with coffee and cakes.

There are many legends surrounding this tradition, but in each Lucia emerges as the symbol of light and hope. She comes on the darkest day of the year. The first Lucia was a Christian martyr who went out at night with her mother to take food to the poor. Subject to persecution the pair made their visits in darkness and secrecy, Lucia with a candle on her head to light their way.

She was discovered and sentenced by the authorities to be burned—but the wood would not catch fire. Lucia was eventually killed by a sword thrust on December 13 but her spirit, harbinger of the returning sun, continues to light the north's midwinter darkness.

Is Major Center

Saint John has been designated by the Emergency Medical Services Advisory Board which studies metropolitan Detroit hospitals as the major emergency center to which EMS vehicles are routed on the East Side.

Presently, the Emergency Center staff includes six fulltime emergency physicians, a supervisor, a head nurse. 15 full-time Registered Nurses, five Licensed Practical Nurses, 16 nurse assistants, (male and female), nine especially trained ER secretaries who handle all the book work, and Emergency Room coordinators who meet and assist ER patients and their families. Five cardiac monitors are

available at all times. Twenty-five units are equipped to handle all types of trauma. Eugene Cetnar, M.D., chief

of Emergency Services at Saint John, is a member of the board of the Michigan Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians and the Greater Detroit Planning Council, Emergency Services Committee, and is on the Advisory board of Emergency Medical Services of Detroit.
