**Thursday, August 7**  
THE WINNER of the Best Driver in Detroit contest, sponsored by the Traffic Association of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department, is a 24-year-old woman who is not allowed to drive her husband's car. Maryanne Cornelius says that her husband will not even let her take their car to the shopping center. It's not that he doesn't trust her skill at the wheel, she said, it's just that he doesn't trust other people's skills and he doesn't want to risk having their new 1975 Chrysler Cordoba smashed up. But commented a contest judge, "She was very smooth, and very alert."

**Friday, August 8**  
ONE YEAR after former President Richard M. Nixon resigned from office, traces of his presidency are hard to come by. According to some Washington officials, "It's almost as if he had never been here at all." The mailed-out announcement of the "Honor America Day" contained patriotic quotes from every recent president since Truman — every president except Nixon, that is. Members of Congress have taken pictures of themselves and the 37th Chief fraternalizing off their walls, and even his old alma mater, Duke University, has stood with other distinguished alumni.

**Saturday, August 9**  
AFTER BEING petitioned by the UAW and Pennsylvania Congressman John Dent, the Treasury Department has agreed to investigate charges that foreign car producers have "dumped" their products on the U.S. market. The petitions allege that cars imported from Europe and Japan are sold in this country for less than in the countries in which they are made. The UAW and Mr. Dent say this "dumping" has caused widespread layoffs of auto workers because it has steadily eroded domestic sales.

**Sunday, August 10**  
IN LOSING 1-0 to the Minnesota Twins Saturday, August 9, the Tigers set a club record with their 14th loss in a row. Ironically, the loss was charged to number one Tiger pitcher Mickey Lolich, who has won more games than any other left-hander in Tiger history. The old Tiger record for losses, 13 straight, was first set in 1920 and was matched in 1953. The American league record for losses was 20 straight, set by Boston in 1906. The Tigers then succumbed to the Twins on Sunday, 4-0. Dave Goltz was the winning pitcher on Saturday, while Bert Blyleven blanked the Bengals on Sunday.

**Monday, August 11**  
DRIED BLOOD found in a car seized by FBI agents investigating the disappearance of James Hoffa came from a fish, a source close to the investigation said Sunday. The car, seized Saturday, August 9, belongs to Joseph Giacalone, son of reputed Mafia leader Anthony Giacalone, and was driven by Hoffa's foster son, Charles O'Brien. Mr. O'Brien has insisted that the blood stains came from a large salmon he delivered to the wife of Robert Holmes, Sr., another Teamster official.

**Tuesday, August 12**  
IN A MOVE DESIGNED to win friends in the U.S., the Cuban government turned over \$2,000,000 in ransom money to Southern Airways officials who flew to Havana over the weekend, it was announced Monday. The ransom was paid by Southern Airways to three men who hijacked a DC9 and 27 passengers and took it to Havana after 30 hours of flying around the South, Midwest and East.

## Public Schools Request Newcomers to Register Before Opening Sessions

Parents Urged to Accompany Students; Immediate Telephone Calls to Make Appointments Suggested

Officials of The Grosse Pointe Public School System urge all newcomers to the community whose children will be enrolled during the 1975-76 year to register prior to the opening of school.

With classes slated to begin at all levels of instruction on Thursday, September 4, school staff members are hopeful that all new enrollees will be processed prior to Labor Day so that the first day of instruction will not be consumed with registration details that could be taken care of earlier.

**Call for Appointments**  
Students new to the Grosse Pointe school district who plan to attend grades 9 through 12 at North High School during 1975-76 are urged to telephone immediately for an appointment. The number is 886-8100.

G. Bruce Feighner, principal, indicated that appointments will be scheduled with Counselor Neil Curtis from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m. from August 11-22.

Miss Frances French, Assistant Principal-Instruction at South High School, said Monday that students new to the Grosse Pointe district who plan to attend South High should call 884-3200 to make an appointment for counseling and enrollment as soon as possible.

"Anyone eligible for mid-summer counseling and enrollment is urged to take

advantage of the availability of staff during the August 23-29 period," Miss French concluded.

**Parents Should Attend**  
Miss French and Mr. Feighner said that the student being enrolled should be accompanied by his parents. The family should have in its possession a copy of the transcript from the student's last school or a copy of the last report card.

Parents of children new to the district who are entering a Michigan school for the first time are reminded that forms for the physical examinations required of newcomers are available in school offices and in the Department of Pupil Personnel at 390 St. Clair. All children slated to begin kindergarten this fall must also have a physical before school begins.

Middle school principals have released a schedule of enrollment times. William Mogk, principal of Pierce, has indicated that new enrollments will be handled in his building from 9 a.m.-11 a.m. from August 21-29. William Christofferson, principal of Brownell, has said that enrollments may be made from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. (Continued on Page 4)

## Boat Capsizes on Lake; Father, Son Both Safe

While his father clung to an overturned 12-foot sailboat in Lake St. Clair, Michael Hershey, 12, of 9 Alger place, swam more than a mile toward shore, against strong currents and high waves, to summon help.

Michael and his father, Ernest, 47, were enjoying themselves in spite of the high winds, on Sunday, August 6, when a gust of wind caught the sails and capsized the boat.

Woman resident called Park authorities and the Park Coast officer notified the Coast Guard.

Sgt. George Blair, and Patrolmen Howard Carl and Norman Gargola sped to the scene, just as the CG cutter arrived to rescue Mr. Hershey. The CG crew towed the capsized vessel to the Norbert P. Neff Memorial Park marina.

Officer Gargola took the exhausted boy to Bon Secours Hospital for observation, after which Michael was released. Both father and son are fine, it was reported.

Sgt. Blair said that Mr. Hershey and his son were sailing near the shipping channel when their boat capsized. (Continued on Page 4)

## Park Lashed By Storm; Wires Down

Catches Brunt of Monday Blast; Other Pointes Report Little or No Damages

The Park appeared to have been the only Pointe that suffered extensive damage during the freak, but severe rain and hail and thunderstorm that struck the area at about 4:25 p.m. on Monday, August 11.

Not only was The Park deluged by heavy rain, but it was also pelted with large hail stones.

At first a few large, scattered drops came down in The Farms, City and Park, then it became a torrent. The rain abated slightly in The City and Farms, but continued to come down in "buckets" in The Park, where it was reported that approximately 7.0 of an inch of rain and hail, accompanied by bright lightning flashes and loud claps of thunder, poured down on The Park.

**Lights Knocked Out**  
Street lights south of Jefferson, from Beaconsfield to Cadieux, and at the foot of Bedford lane, were knocked out when a bolt of lightning struck a Detroit Edison utility pole transformer in Trombley road. This section was without power for several hours, and Tuesday morning, August 12, it was disclosed that Edison crews were still working to restore complete electrical service.

Two flags at Windmill Pointe Park were reported to have been shredded by a terrific gust when the wind suddenly shifted.

Fire Chief Phillip Costa and Asst. Chief David Taylor said that there were no "working fires" as a result of the lightning, but small fires were caused by downed wires.

Large tree limbs and wires were reported down at locations in Harcourt, Nos. 910, 751 and 745; 644 Barrington; 616 Lakepointe, 613 Lakepointe; along Trombley and Windmill Pointe Drive; and the 1300 block of Audubon.

The Park fire chiefs said that firefighters were kept busy from 5:10 p.m. on standby duty, at locations where wires were downed. (Continued on Page 2)

## Firemen in Park Seek Arbitration In Wage Dispute

Reject Offer Made by City Negotiators as 'Totally Unrealistic' Due to Cost-of-Living Increase in Past Two Years

The Grosse Pointe Park Fire Fighters Association, (GPPFFA), following the lead of the Grosse Pointe Park Police Officers Association, (GPP-POA), has filed for binding arbitration to settle their wage dispute with the city, according to Ed Koerber, president of the fire fighters union.

The Park has made an offer which was rejected as "totally unrealistic," Koerber said.

The city's offer consisted of a \$1,500 increase in base wages in three steps, over a two-year period, which the president of the Association said represents an actual monetary increase of only \$1,000 in two years, due to the three steps proposed to reach the \$1,500 amount.

**Costs Skyrocketed**  
The Fire Fighters Association feels this is unacceptable because of the skyrocketing costs of the past two years. Too, the city did offer a cost-of-living clause for the second year of the contract, but due to predictions that the rising costs should level off by then, the benefits would probably be negligible.

It was pointed out further that the cost-of-living clause would not be retroactive and had a ceiling of only 20 cents an hour.

City Manager Robert Stone said as in the case of the Police Officers Association, this is the first time the fire fighters have requested arbitration. The police request came late last month and arbitration is expected to start soon, the city manager said.

**Police Reject Offer**  
The policemen on July 22, unanimously rejected a Park offer of \$1,000 pay increase, in the first year of their contract. Effective July 1, 1976, the pay would be boosted another \$500, making (Continued on Page 4)

Police arrested Mrs. Barbour Thursday, March 20, following an investigation led by Farms Det. Joseph Miller.

## Woods Studies Purchase Of Two New Radar Units

Recommendations from City Administrator Chester E. Petersen and Public Safety Director Henry Marchand regarding the purchase of two new radar units for the public safety department were unanimously referred to the Committee of the Whole by The Woods Council at the regular meeting Monday, August 4.

In a memo to the council, Mr. Petersen recommended the purchase of a pair of 250 Kustom Signal M.R. 7 moving radar units without competitive bidding "inasmuch as the practicability and feasibility of such units have been previously tested and utilized by the Michigan State Police."

The combined cost of the units totals \$4,170 including the trade-in of two older units. Each complete unit runs \$2,385, less the \$300 trade-in per older unit, for a net total of \$2,085.

Mr. Petersen suggested the expenditure for both units be charged to the surplus reserve of the Parking Enterprise Fund.

Presently, the department has four T.R. 6 units, including two spares, which will be traded in if the council okays the purchase of the M.R. 7's.

Unlike the current units, which will be five-years-old this November, the new units would provide officers with greater mobility on the radar front, said Director Marchand.

## Seniors Feel Frustrated By Decision

City Attorney George Catlin Submits Opinion on Pleas for Housing Complex

Initiatory petitions circulated by members of The Woods Heritage Group, senior citizens organization, in an effort to place the question of a seniors' housing complex at Ghesquiere Park on the November election ballot, were originally recommended for rejection on two counts by City Attorney George Catlin in his written opinion dated Friday, August 8.

However, a check with the State Attorney General's Office this week eliminated one of the grounds for rejection cited in Mr. Catlin's opinion to City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who, based upon the city attorney's view, rejected the petitions.

Mr. Catlin noted the authority to amend a Home Rule City Charter by initiatory petition of the registered voters of such a city is contained in State Statutes. He cited a portion of a statute which says each sheet of the petition must be signed by at least five percent of the registered voters or, in The Woods' case, approximately 647 names.

**Contacts Office**  
In the case of the seniors' petition drive, approximately 70 sheets or pages containing the state ballot proposition at the top of the page, (with lines for 20 signatures and addresses of signers), were circulated.

This would have meant that one sheet would have had to contain approximately 647 names.

But Mr. Catlin contacted the Attorney General's Office and said he was told they will interpret the language to read each petition rather than each sheet. So, in this instance the number of sheets wouldn't matter.

But a second deficiency was cited by Mr. Catlin in his opinion. "The language of the proposed Charter Amendment purports to require that . . . the council by appropriate action shall . . . rescind the said property, (a portion of the park), as (Continued on Page 2)

## File Unfair Labor Charge

City policemen, now represented by Teamsters Local #214, filed an unfair labor practices charge against The City last Friday, August 8, with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, (MERC).

The charge, which will be heard on October 6 by Judge James Kutz, says that The City is not justified in refusing to pay the patrolmen's clothing allowance that is required under the old contract.

City policemen walked out of negotiations with The City Thursday, August 7, after a few minutes of bargaining. The policemen now refuse to sit down with The City again until a clothing allowance of \$225 per person required by the old contract is settled, according to police steward, Patrolman David Teolis.

"We walked out because the city failed to comply with the present contract in regards to the clothing allowance," said Patrolman Teolis.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach said he had not even taken his seat at the negotiating table before police attorneys walked out.


"We were prepared to enter into extensive negotiations," Mr. Kressbach said, "but before we even had an opportunity to sit down they had walked out."

Patrolman Teolis called the city's refusal to pay the clothing allowance a "stalling tactic."

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

may be required for such purposes: (multiple housing classification)."

He then stated, "The Michigan Supreme Court has said that the initiatory petition process is not available to the citizens of a community to force the adoption of an ordinance to rezone a parcel of land within a community."

### Reason for Rejection

"The rationale of the Court is that the legislature by appropriate statutes, has established the procedures to be followed in order to rezone land parcels, which procedures are designed to afford 'due process of law' to all the concerned parties and to permit initiatory rezoning would circumvent 'due process.'"

"The Court has declared that a change in zoning of particular property is an administrative act and not subject to a vote of the people. (West v. Portage, 392 Mich 458, 1974)."

As a result, Mr. Catlin said, "It is my opinion that the attempt to compel rezoning of the parcel in question, by initiatory charter amendment, is not sanctioned and therefore, is improper when contained within a proposed charter amendment."

"You, (Mr. Petersen), therefore, would be required to reject the petitions on the basis of this language."

### Review Opinion

Meanwhile, in a letter dated Tuesday, August 12, to Irene Sutton, chairman of the Senior Citizens Commission, Mr. Petersen acknowledged the receipt of the pe-

titions. He noted more than the required valid signatures of at least five percent of the city's registered voters were obtained, and cited the council's request that Mr. Catlin furnish his office with a legal opinion concerning the validity of the petition to amend the city's charter.

The opinion was reviewed on Saturday, August 9, with members of the commission, The Woods Heritage Group and the commission's attorney present.

Based upon Mr. Catlin's opinion, "this office is compelled to reject the initiatory petitions to amend the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods as not being in the proper legal form and/or statement of purpose so as to be submitted to the electorate on the ballot of the November 4, 1975, general election," said Mr. Petersen.

### Cite Disappointment

The seniors are obviously disappointed at the news particularly after some 30-35 citizens worked hard to obtain 1,370 signatures within a two-week period, (from around Thursday, July 17, through Friday, August 1). But while they may be temporarily down, many feel they're far from out at this time.

Mrs. Sutton said the commission already has rehired its attorney in an effort to circulate petitions once again. This time the group has set a goal of 800 signatures to cover the necessary validation procedure. (A total of 689 validated signatures were needed the last time).

In hoping there will be no

more rejections, Mrs. Sutton stressed, "Some seniors are willing to give up but I'm more willing to lose by fighting than by not trying."

Another citizen reacted to the rejection by saying some were "incensed by it" while indicating, "I know they, (the seniors), aren't going to drop it. We plan to do whatever is necessary."

Time still remains on the seniors' side if they circulate further petitions. A proposed charter amendment would have to be sent to the governor's office 60 days prior to the November general election. So, all petitions would have to be submitted to city offices for validation sometime during late August.

## Woods Okays Park Proposal

The Woods Council unanimously accepted a proposal from Cal Fleming Landscaping and Tree Service in the amount of \$750 for design service only for the landscaping of areas in and around the new construction at the Lake Front Park.

This action was taken at the regular meeting Monday, August 4.

The motion by Councilman Conrad A. Naegel also stipulated if the city has Cal Fleming do the landscaping as well as the planning, the \$750 would be used toward shrubbery and trees.

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## Search for Dog Proves Futile

"We've done everything possible," said Shores Public Safety Director Joseph Vitale regarding his department's efforts in trying to find a dog which charged and bit a 15-year-old Shores girl late Friday afternoon, August 1.

However, personnel had no luck in finding the animal, described as a small grey poodle or possibly an older black poodle turning grey with age, so the search has been stopped.

The NEWS carried a front page story last week which urged citizens, who saw a dog fitting the description, to call the department. The director said no calls, based upon the article, were received to his knowledge.

Police took Diane Gird, of Willow Tree place, who received three small puncture type wounds after being bitten on her left ankle, on a check of the immediate area Monday, August 4.

Seven homes with poodles listed in department records were checked with the youngster saying none of the dogs was involved.

Then on Friday, August 8, Woods Dog Warden David McQueen picked up a grey poodle at Edmunton and Marter road. The girl said she was "99 percent" certain this was the animal which attacked her. So the dog was taken to Harvey's Animal Hospital, 18479 Mack.

A short time later, the department discovered the animal belonged to a St. Clair Shores family. One family member said the dog couldn't have been the one involved as it was in the house at the time of the attack.

Diane's mother, who said many neighbors gave them possible leads, expressed her appreciation to everyone who helped.

The City reported minor damages, disclosing only two downed wires and one minor utility pole fire. About .3, or approximately one-quarter of an inch of rain fell between 4:30 p.m. and 4:50 p.m. Official weather gauge records in The Farms revealed that a total of .23 of an inch fell, within the same period. There were no reports of damage.

In The Woods and The Shores, the rainfall was said to have been about .2 of an inch, tapering off to a trace, within brief minutes. No damage was reported in either community.

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
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
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

## Tanny's Larcenies Cause Concern to Woods' Police

Woods police have expressed a concern over the frequency of larceny reports at Vic Tanny, 20835 Mack avenue, and have, as a result, contacted executive offices in Dearborn in the hope of finding ways to curtail such incidents.

"The frequency of larceny reports is greater than it should be," commented Det. Sgt. William Lentz, who added a total of six such reports have been received so far this year. A total of 31 incidents have been reported since the mid-1960's.

In this instance, it isn't only the number of reported larcenies which have occurred which have caused concern. Officers also wonder how many larcenies have transpired which haven't been reported.

Articles such as check books, credit cards and other "small easily hidden and negotiable" items have been taken from lockers, said Sgt. Lentz. "There's always so many people in there, we can't pin it down. So we're trying to get them, (Vic Tanny), to put in more security."

Sgt. Lentz contacted executive offices on Monday, August 4, and informed administrators of the number of larcenies The Woods branch

has experienced in recent weeks.

The sergeant said a spokesman was cooperative and receptive to any suggestions which he would make towards the reduction of such incidents.

The spokesman told Sgt. Lentz, according to the officers' report, that from now on there will be a company larceny report made by The Woods branch. He stated more signs would be posted urging patrons to lock their valuables in a locker. The spokesman also said he may possibly assign an employee to observe the locker room if the high number of larcenies continue, noted the sergeant.

At the same time, the spokesman told the sergeant he intended to tighten up on the sign-in procedures with the possibility of rearranging furniture to make it more difficult for a patron to enter the building without signing a registration book.

Sgt. Lentz suggested the use of locks be made mandatory but the spokesman said this would be expensive and difficult to program and control, according to the report.

The spokesman went on to say he has never received a report from any Vic Tanny branch of anything being stolen from a locker which was locked, said the sergeant.

With stricter sign-in procedures in effect and the possibility of an employee watching the lockers in the locker room, Sgt. Lentz said it appears the public safety department may have possible leads to follow in the event of further larcenies.

The sergeant emphasized if people go to similar establishments such as Vic Tanny's, they should always lock their valuables.

## Storm Cancels Park Meeting

For the first time in memory, the Park City council was forced to call off its regular meeting on Monday, August 11, because of lack of a quorum to conduct official business. Meetings are held on the second and fourth Mondays of the month beginning at 5 p.m.

The lack of a quorum was due to the fact that Councilman Charles Tompkins, who had expected to attend the session, was prevented from doing so because of the severe rain and hail thunderstorm that struck in The Park and parts of Detroit, as he was returning home from business.

Under the Park City Charter, four members of the council constitute a quorum under which official business can be conducted.

Present before the storm hit, were Mayor Matthew Patterson, Councilmen Robert Hutton and George Verdonck. Absent were Councilmen Douglas Graham, who was excused because of business reasons, with the excuse granted at the council's last meeting; and Council members Dr. Roger McNeil and Camille Peterson who were reported to be out of town on vacation.

After about a three-quarter of an hour wait, City Attorney Richard Rohr advised the solons present that the only legal action that could be taken was to officially adjourn the meeting.

The Woods Council unanimously appointed Councilman Ronald R. Kefgen to the city's election commission for a two-year term ending November 1, 1977, in action at the regular meeting Monday, August 4.

A provision of the city charter states that this commission will consist of the clerk, attorney and one council member who shall not be a candidate for elective office at the election for which he serves as a commission member.

Grosse Pointe Citizen's Award which is presented annually during Law Week in May.

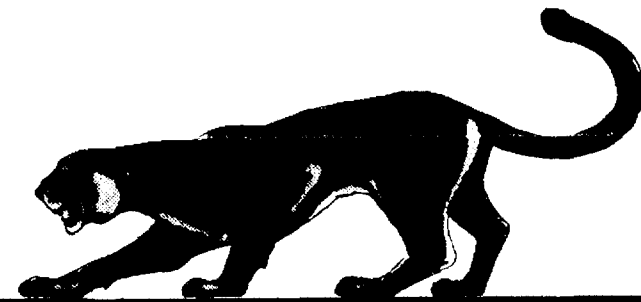

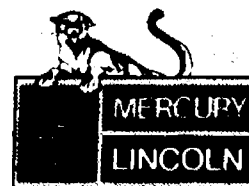

## Park Firemen Seek Arbitration in Dispute

wages \$16,000, and by January 1, \$400 more, making the total \$16,400. The Police Association members charged that this would actually amount to only \$18,300 as the pay increase progresses.

In arbitration, a third party, usually a lawyer or a professor in labor relations and economics, studies the contract offered by the city and the demands of the union, and determines what the contract will include.

President Koerber said that a Park fireman with four years seniority now makes only \$14,200 a year. Mr. Slone said that the offer made to the fire fighters was a raise to \$14,600 retroactive to July 1, an increase to \$15,200 by January 1, and a pay raise to \$15,700 by July 1, 1976.

Union Claim Refuted  
"In addition to this meager offer," the union president said, "the city has expressed

a desire to reduce Fire Department manpower by three men, as well as the minimum manpower clause from five to four men on duty at all times. This would be brought about by transferring three men to the Police Department to fill incoming vacancies, which reduction in manpower would not be in the best interest of the citizens of Grosse Pointe Park."

The city manager refuted the manpower reduction claim. He said it was something that was talked about during the negotiations, but never went beyond the discussion stage.

Cites Other Requests  
Mr. Slone said that the fire fighters also asked for a yearly food allowance of \$250 to pay for their on-duty meals and a hike in pension benefits which would cost the city approximately \$500 per man each year. "The fire fighters also asked for \$75 for cleaning their uniforms," the city

manager said. "The city already furnished uniforms to the firemen."

"I think our taxpayers should know about these contract requests because they will have to pay and should know what it will cost them," Mr. Slone added.

The Grosse Pointe Fire Fighters Association represents all Fire Department personnel, including the assistant fire chief.

Representing The Park during the wage discussions, besides Mr. Slone, were City Clerk Nunzio Orsini, and City Attorney Richard Rohr. On the Fire Fighters Association side, besides the union president, were Lt. William Hunt, Sgt. Lee Fallieres, and Firemen William Hiner and Martin Buss.

Compares Figures

Koerber, who conducted a questionnaire-type survey among 24 other fire fighters unions in surrounding communities, came up with the claim that The Park fire fighters are well below other area cities in base wages as well as monetary fringe benefits. The results of his survey are as follows:

1. The average fire fighter's wage is \$14,509.26; The Park ranks 15th, or \$309.26 less than average.
2. The average pay for a sergeant is \$15,748.64; The Park ranks 16th or \$659.14 less.
3. The average pay for a lieutenant is \$18,775.06; The Park ranks 17th or \$800.06 less.
4. The average longevity payment is \$756.87; The Park ranks 23rd or \$456.87 less.
5. The average uniform allowance is \$210.65 as compared to none in The Park which ranks 24th (last place).
6. The average food allowance is \$271.81, compared to none in The Park which ranks tie with four other cities.
7. The average holiday compensation is \$555.93 as compared to \$54.64 for The Park which ranks 24th or \$501.29 less than average.

Koerber stated that his survey showed that the 24 cities receive an average total annual compensation of \$16,304.52, as compared to a total annual compensation of \$14,354.64, or \$1,949.88 less than average.

Calls Pension Low

"In addition to being far behind other departments in

wages and fringe benefits," the Association president said, "we are saddled with one of the most inadequate pensions available to fire fighters in Michigan. Members of the department who have retired in prior years are still receiving the same amount in their pension checks, as when they retired before the cost-of-living skyrocketed, with no apparent hope of future increases."

"The statistics I have given are as of March of this year. Since then, many of the departments surveyed have received substantial wage increases, thus widening the gap in total annual compensation to an even larger degree."

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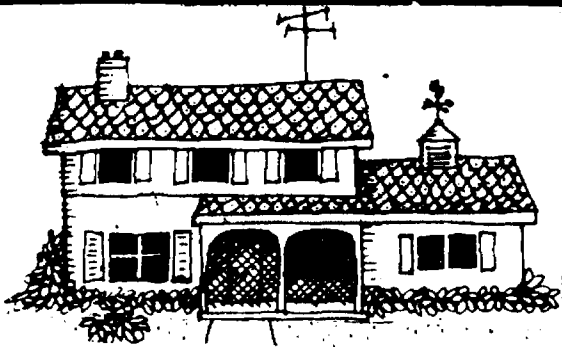
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**Woods Requests Sewage District to Cut Costs**

The Woods Council, advised by the Wayne County Road Commission in May that the cost of sewage treatment will be increased, unanimously approved a resolution urging the Wayne County Northeast Sewage District to redeem all outstanding revenue bonds to help offset future costs.

In a related matter, the council is scheduled to consider a sewer rate increase at the Monday, August 18, meeting. Both of these actions stemmed from the Monday, August 4, session.

The resolution, proposed by Councilman Conrad A. Naegel, says it appears to the city that sufficient funds are available in the Northeast Sewage District system to redeem all the outstanding bonds which financed the construction of the system.

The measure continues by saying it also appears to the city if the outstanding bonds of the system were to be redeemed at the present time that such action will result in a savings of future expenses in the system's operation.

So, the city urged the district to call for redemption of all outstanding revenue bonds of the series issued April 1, 1971, and transfer the remaining sum of \$60,877 to the system's replacement and improvement fund to be utilized for future maintenance costs.

A copy of the resolution was sent to the Northeast Sewage District, the Wayne County Road Commission, Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores.

City Attorney George Catlin told the council, based upon information received from City Comptroller-Assessor Frederick G. Hornfisher, that there presently are some outstanding bonds in the sewage treatment district with funds available to redeem them.

The redeeming of such bonds would help eliminate proposed charges on the sewage treatment bill, particularly in regards to the service fee.

Mr. Hornfisher said this action was taken by the council with an eye towards next year in the hopes of cutting down possible future increases, while noting the bonds won't be called in until December 1.

He also hoped both Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores would pass similar resolutions.

The solons referred the subject of the proposed sewer

rate increase to the Committee of the Whole for further study and requested Mr. Catlin to prepare an emergency ordinance for consideration on August 18.

In a memo to City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, Mr. Hornfisher said the Wayne County Road Commission, operator of the Northeast District System, notified the city about the sewer rate increase.

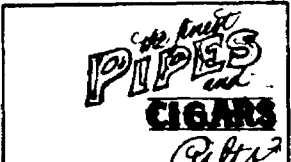
The Public Works Committee of the Wayne County Board of County Commissioners, sitting as a Board of Review last month, approved a rate hike of \$.365 per 1,000 cubic feet, effective September 1.

"This increase will be on water we are billed for by the Northeast District which means we will need an additional amount to pay on the excess flow of water which develops from rain and snow over and above the amount

we receive through the water lines," said Mr. Hornfisher. As a result, he recommended an additional increase of \$.335 per 1,000 cubic feet, using the additional funds to replace sanitary and sewer lines, and to pay on the excess flow of water.

Mr. Hornfisher then listed the present and proposed rates per 1,000 cubic feet: present, water, \$2.345, sewer, \$1.825, total, \$4.170; proposed, water, \$2.345, sewer, \$2.525, total, \$4.870.

"This change would reflect a net increase of \$.70 per 1,000 cubic feet of sewer consumption," stated Mr. Hornfisher. "This will increase the minimum bill from \$6.26 to \$7.31 or \$.35 per month."

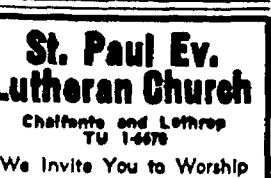

"stationary" units with a scout car remaining parked during the unit's operation. On the other hand, the new M.R. 7 unit may be worked while the scout car is in motion.

If an officer is parked working radar, that's 100 percent of his duty, commented Director Marchand, who added with the new units he can work radar and patrol at the same time.

As a result, officers will have more flexibility in picking up speeding drivers coming towards them and going away from them before the motorist sees a scout car and slows up.

While noting the two T.R. 6 units have held up very well, the director said their down time, (repair time), is beginning to increase. As for the two spares, he said they were between 10-15 years old.

In calling the M.R. 7 units "remarkable" and ones which "will enhance our traffic enforcement capabilities twofold," Director Marchand said the State police have 250 such units and are very satisfied with them.

He also stated the Ohio State Police have 500 M.R. 7 units and the Indiana State Police are presently switching over to these units as they replace their present equipment.

Upon proper motion made, supported and carried, the meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

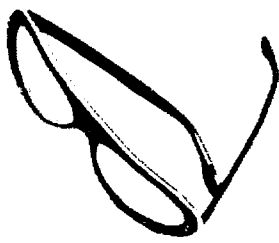

## What Goes On at Your Library

Several weeks ago I reviewed some new books that will assist in the safe handling and maintenance of your boat. We also have some fine new books for the armchair sailor.

**SUPERSHIP** (Knopf) by Noel Mostert is the detailed account of the author's long voyage to Bordeaux, to a Persian Gulf port and back on the S. S. ARDSHIEL — one of those mammoth supertankers currently carrying crude oil on the oceans of the world and posing threats quite new to the world of seafaring. Mostert's story brings to life the mind-boggling implications such tankers spawners. Often inadequately tested, these behemoths have had accidents. Hundreds of them are now at sea and frighten ocean ecologists with their steady oil leaks and tank washings. Mostert rivets his readers with his eye-opening and ultimately portentous narrative.

The story of the Pilgrim Fathers and their MAYFLOWER voyage is known to every English-speaking child from the age of 8, and it is a tribute to the talent of historian Kate Caffrey that she tells it in her new book **THE MAYFLOWER** (Stein & Day) with such freshness, wit and elegance of style as to make it an entirely new and vivid adventure.

She individualizes the Pilgrims, places them in the context of their times, shows them in all their strengths and paradoxical frailties. Each passenger had a total area the size of a mattress

under a 5-foot ceiling in which to live during the 67 days of the crossing. Not all of the company were saints; sinners, too, make their appearance and spice the narrative.

**IN THE MUTINY ON THE GLOBE** (Random House) Edwin Hoyt uses his journalistic skills to make a readable true-life melodrama of a late-19th-century mutiny on a whaling schooner, Nantucket in the 1880's was the teeming home port for the New England whaling fleet of the time, and it was the island from which the GLOBE fared forth for oil for the lamps of America.

Hoyt, himself a Nantucket man, has researched the GLOBE's logs and the letters of the mutiny's survivors, along with the reports of a Navy captain sent to investigate the story of what happened after six intrepid seamen managed to bring the ship into Valparaiso two years later. This is a strong tale of greed and cruelty at sea.

Those who love good seafaring yarns will get a kick out of **STRANGE ADVENTURES ON THE GREAT LAKES** (Dodd, Mead) by Dwight Boyer. These well-documented tales of the Great Lakes have the drama of men battling the elements; the suspense of daring rescue attempts; the mystery of inexplicable disappearances of ships and crews; and a leavening humor in the anecdotes of stubborn sailors and wayward ships. Engrossing as it is, this authoritative book is a fine addition to the history of Great Lakes' ships and men.

Too often lavishly illustrated books are short on substance. In **THE DISCOVERY OF THE SEA** (Dial), however, distinguished Harvard professor of oceanic history, J. H. Parry, has supplied a history that is as full-bodied, authentic and enthralling as the book's visual assets are eye-catching. Before men could venture forth to learn that "all the seas of the world are one," they had to master shipbuilding. So Parry launches his narrative with a lucid tracing of the development of the ships that enabled the early Mediterranean seafarers to turn "the street corner of Europe." Africa. Thus began the long adventure that finally encompassed the Atlantic and the Pacific. The story has a sweep and majesty richly enhanced by some 75 full-color photos, drawings and engravings, plus rare period maps that students of cartography should find exciting.

Alexander McKee's **KING HENRY VIII'S MARY ROSE** is the absorbing adventure story and scientific report on the ill-fated ship MARY ROSE. Henry VIII's flagship, she sank offshore with the death of more than 400 men after sailing from Portsmouth in 1545 to engage the French fleet. In 1985 the author undertook to locate the wreck and examine the possibility of working underwater in the busy Portsmouth harbor make for suspenseful reading. Those interested in the Tudor period, maritime history or undersea exploration will find in this book a wealth of detail.

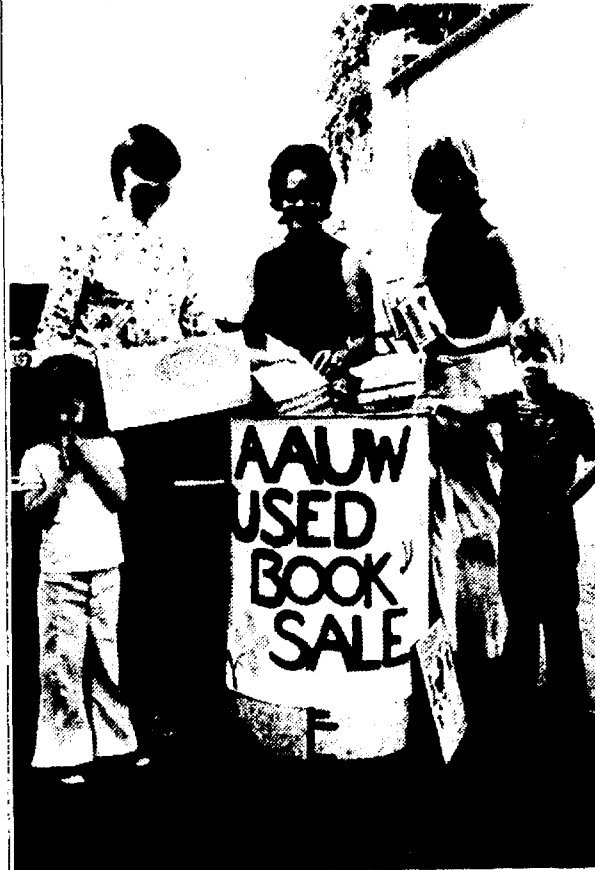
