Thursday, July 29

TWO HUGE EARTHQUAKES that hit heavily populated northeast China Wednesday caused "great losses to people's life and property" the official Chinese news agency Hsinhua said Thursday. In a broadcast monitored in Japan, Chinese radio said that Tangshan City, an industrial center located near the epicenter of the first quake 100 miles east-southeast of Peking, suffered "extremely serious damages and losses," but the agency gave no casualty figures. The earthquakes registered 7.9 and 8.2 on the Richter scale. The two quakes were the most severe recorded in the last 12 years, according to official reports.

Friday, July 30

THE TWO REMAINING fugitive suspects in the kidnapping of 26 Chowchilla, Calif., children and their school bus driver were captured Thursday, James Schoenfeld, 24, was arrested in Menlo Park, Calif., as he drove home to surrender, while Fred N. Woods, 24, the key suspect, was seized by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police about five hours later near the main post office in Vancouver, B.C. Schoenfeld's brother, Richard, 22, who surrendered voluntarily last Friday, was arraigned in Chowchilla on 43 counts of kidnapping and robbery. He pleaded innocent, and bail of \$1 million was continued.

Saturday, July 31

A THREATENED walkout by more than 4,500 Wayne County workers was averted less than an hour before a midnight strike deadline Friday night when negotiations reached tentative agreement on a new two-year contract. The agreement, which negotiators for both the county and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, (AFSCME), called a major compromise, was reached after more than 15 hours of continuous bargaining Friday.

Sunday, August 1

AN UNEXPECTED abundance of oxygen produced from Martian soil in a biological probe on the Viking 1 lander could indicate processes that may mean life exists on Mars, scientists at Viking control headquarters said Saturday. The scientists said it was far too soon to reach any conclusions about what they were seeing from one of three life detection experiments aboard the three-legged robot. They said the data must be viewed "very, very carefully."

Monday, August 2

A FLASH FLOOD roared through Big Thompson Canyon, Colo., Saturday night and early Sunday, killing at least 58 persons and stranding hundreds of survivors in the summer recreation area in the Rocky Mountains. National Guardsmen flew by helicopter into the canyon Sunday to help the survivors until they could be rescued from the flood waters that raged through the canyon Saturday night. Recovery teams on foot, on horseback and in jeeps found 58 bodies, and Larimer County Sheriff Robert Watson said the death toll will almost certainly go higher.

Tuesday, August 3

AT LEAST 16 PERSONS who attended a state American Legion convention in Philadelphia last month have died of a mysterious illness and more than 35 others have been hospitalized, State Health Secretary Dr. Leonard Bachman said the state does not know what killed the victims. The ages of the dead victims ranged from 30-82. They were among 10,000 delegates who attended the convention.

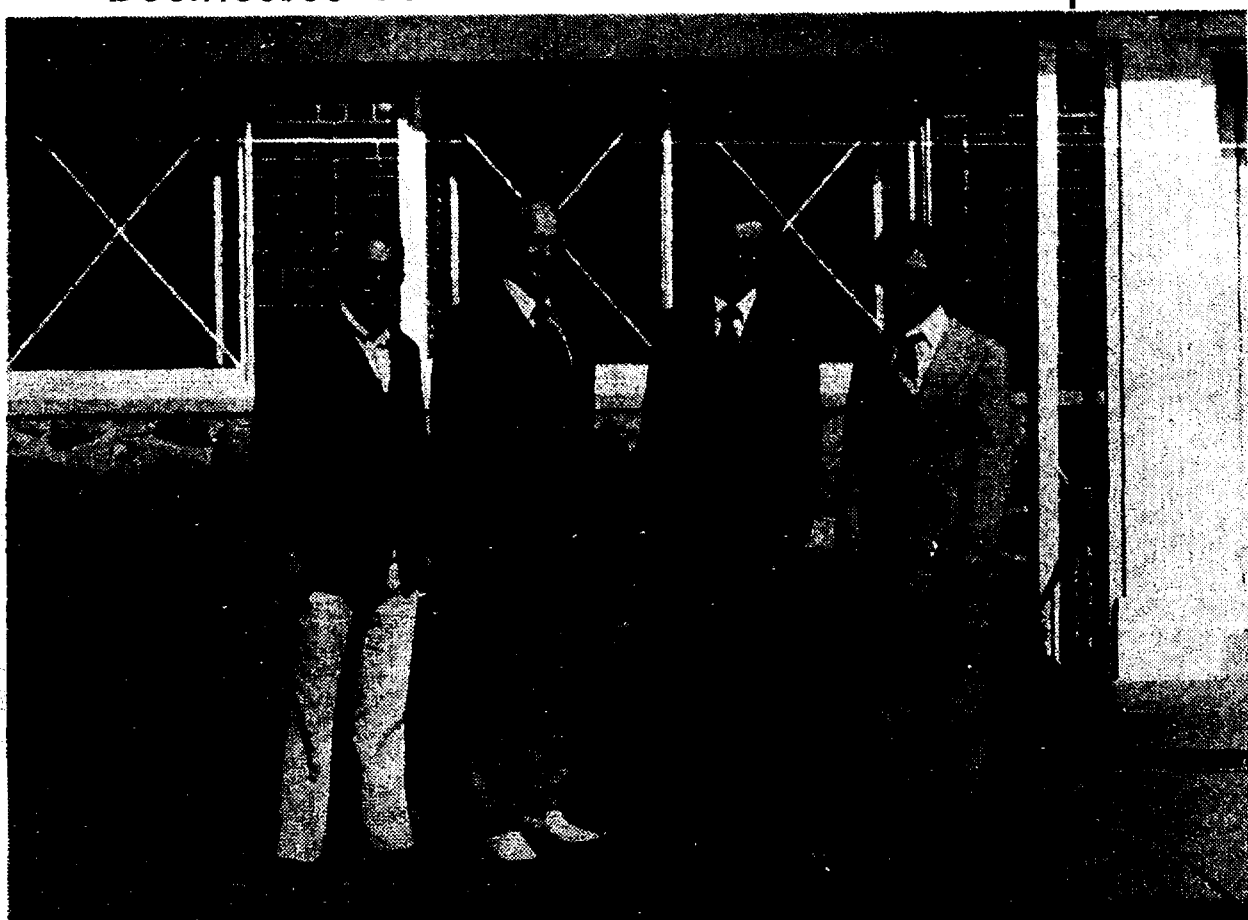

Group Joins To Beautify Block Area

Businessmen Involved in Landscaping, Architectural Project in Mack Between Renaud and Lochmoor

A full landscaping layout for three buildings in the Mack block between Renaud and Lochmoor boulevard is a main part of a beautification program being undertaken in the immediate area.

The businesses involved include the Watkins Harding Co., an investment company, owner of the Watkins Medical Building, 20250 Mack, which houses the offices of six doctors, the new Manufacturer's Bank Building, Renaud and Mack, and Marc J. Alan, Inc., 20276 Mack. "We got together with landscape architects, (Eichstedt, Grissim and Young and Associates), in Farmington Hills and they designed a full landscaping layout for the three buildings," said William Fair, president of Watkins Harding, whose grand-father previously owned the medical clinic. His company moved into the Manufacturer's building in March as its first tenants.

Architectural Work
A combined total of around 3,000 trees, including dogwood, red maple and junipers, shrubs and flowers will be included in the overall layout, he said.

Four Pointes to Receive Funds Via CETA Program

Four Grosse Pointe communities will be receiving funds through the extension of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act, (CETA), that was due to expire last month but was extended through January 1977, according to Wayne County Board of Commissioners Chairman John Barr.

He said that almost \$9 million in new and reallocated Federal funds enables all ongoing CETA programs to continue, except temporary summer employment that ends September 3.

Two Gunmen Terrorize St. Clare de Montefalco Priest, Rob Church Safe

Collection Receipts, Most of Which Were Checks, Taken in Incident in Which No One Was Hurt

Two armed bandits invaded the rectory of Saint Clare de Montefalco Church in Whittier road at 10:05 a.m. on Saturday, July 24. After terrorizing an assistant pastor, they forced him to open the church safe from which they scooped a large sum from collection receipts, most of which were checks, according to information released by Park Lt. Gordon Duncan.

The lieutenant disclosed that the Rev. Father John Honer, who was alone in the building, opened the rectory door after the bell rang and was confronted by two men, one of whom was carrying a .25 caliber revolver, and the other, a rifle.

After the priest was forced back into the vestibule, the man with the hand gun fired a shot into the wall of the hall and ordered the clergyman to his knees. Then he put the gun to the priest's head and demanded Father Honer to lead them to the church safe.

Fires Second Shot
Father Honer, who said he made no pretense about not being afraid, said that five minutes after the man with the small gun fired into the wall, the man fired off another shot, then ordered the priest to take them to the safe.

"I tried to remember the numbers of the safe dial," Father Honer said, "but with the gun against my head, I found it was very difficult. Ironically, the two men tried to calm me down when

the safe would not open, but I tried again, this time successfully. They forced me to hand over the contents of the safe, which was an undetermined amount of cash, but most of the contents being checks."

After grabbing their loot, the gunmen forced the priest into a closet and ordered him not to move for at least five minutes, giving them a chance to leave the building. When the time had elapsed, Father Honer left the closet and called Park police.

Investigation Continues
Lt. Duncan said it is not known what caliber rifle the one robber carried, but the caliber of the pistol was determined when officers of the Detective Bureau dug out the spent bullet from the hall.

Park Nixes Gift of Land

After several weeks of consideration, The Park Council has directed City Manager Robert A. Slone to decline a gift offer of a vacant lot at 1322 Somerset road because the city has no use for it.

This decision was announced at the council's Monday, July 26, regular meeting.

Mr. Slone reported to the council that the 40 by 119-foot lot is not suitable for parking, while noting area residents might oppose such a plan.

The neighbors on either side of the lot were considered prospective buyers by the city if they had accepted the property.

But one neighbor was not interested since he had originally owned the land and sold it to the present owner some 15 years ago. The other neighbor could not be contacted and Mr. Slone reported that he is out of town.

A gift of such value to the city, which is a non-profit corporation, would have represented a considerable tax write off for the owner.

Suit Filed In Fatal Shooting

Widow of Detroit Asks for \$5 Million Against The Park, Two Officers

The widow of a Detroit man shot and killed by Park police two years ago has filed a \$5 million suit against the officers and The Park, according to Park Deputy City Attorney Herold M. Deason.

The suit was filed Tuesday, July 13, in Wayne County Circuit Court by Linda Lee Holstin, the widow of Thomas Holstin, who was shot and killed after a high speed chase on July 16, 1974.

Mrs. Holstin, the mother of two children, named The Park and Officer Edward Serwach and Sgt. Charles Petrie in her suit, charging the officers with "negligent and careless use of a fire arm" in the death of her husband.

High Speed Chase
The suit charged that The Park also was liable in the death because the officers were employed by the city.

The suit revolves around the happenings of the night of July 10, 1974, when, according to police reports, Mr. Holstin was pursued by Officer Serwach and Sgt. Petrie to his home in Alter road, after a high speed chase that began at Nottingham road and Jefferson avenue.

The officers said the pursuit began after they saw Mr. Holstin's Jeep go through the intersection at a high rate of speed at about 1 a.m. Mr. Holstin fled to the Alter road home and into the driveway with the officers close enough behind to ram the rear of the Jeep.

As Mr. Holstin ran into his house, Officer Serwach fired one shot at the fleeing man, missing him, and grazing a neighbor's car.

The officers said they then followed Mr. Holstin into the darkened house. Once in the home, they said they heard a woman screaming, and thinking Mr. Holstin had taken a hostage, they drew their revolvers and went into a bedroom from where the screams were originating.

Found Blameless
In the bedroom, the officers said Mr. Holstin was standing behind his wife, Linda. The officers said they did not know the woman was

Severe Rain, Flooding Riddles Area

Powerful Storm on July 28-29 Bombs 5.13 Inches of Water in Pointes; City Crews, Residents Face Big Clean-Up Task

True to Michigan's reputation for erratic and extreme weather conditions the Detroit metropolitan area, and particularly Grosse Pointe, was hit last week with the most severe flooding conditions in over 51 years. According to readings taken at the Moross road water treatment facility, 5.13 inches of rain fell in a three hour period beginning late Wednesday, July 28, and continuing into the early morning hours of Thursday, July 29.

Though the storm lasted only a few hours the clean-up and repair activity throughout the Pointes took the better part of the next few days.

Besides home owners trying to clear basements of water logged debris, public works crews were busy replacing manhole covers swept away by the rising tide of backed up drainage systems, repairing street and sidewalk cave-ins and removing abandoned cars that were strewn like beached fish on median strips and front lawns.

One in 150

Mack avenue and Lakeshore road were blocked in many places with water reaching levels of two to three feet. Motorists churned through obstacle courses of disabled cars while often hearing their own engines sputtering and stalling out as well.

"It's up to my ankles," lamented one woman as the water seeped through the floor boards of her stalled car in a knee deep pond on Lakeshore road in The Shores.

Though all pumping stations were operating to capacity the volume of rain that fell in the space of a few hours was more than they could handle and most side streets turned into long, dark canals.

According to Woods Director of Public Works Anthony Guaresimo it was a 150 year storm — "The kind you should only have every 150 years."

Park City Manager Robert A. Slone reported that their nine pumping units drained more than 100,000,000 gallons of water from the streets after the storm. A single storm water unit was pumping as much as 1,050 cubic feet per second.

Other Damage
The most serious damage to streets and sidewalks were reported by The Farms and The Woods.

Pointes Get Relief from Ice Storm

Five Communities to Receive Combined Total of \$277,957 to Help Defray Disaster Costs

While most of Grosse Pointe was fending off the torrential rains last week, Pointe city officials received notification they are eligible for more than a quarter million dollars in Federal disaster relief funds for the last major storm which hit the area.

The money — \$277,957 in all — will help defray the tremendous costs incurred by the cities after the devastating ice and wind storms which swept through middle Michigan March 2-3.

The ice storm, called by many the worst of the century, left everything in sight coated with inches of ice. The high winds that followed the next day uprooted dozens of trees and downed utility lines, leaving 11,000 Grosse Pointe Edison electric customers without power for as long as one week.

Shores Gets Check
Five months later, most public works departments, with the aid of private contractors, were just completing the mammoth clean-up job, removing dead tree stumps and trimming dangling branches off damaged trees.

Although The Shores is the only municipality that has actually received a check as yet, (in the amount of \$23,351), as of Thursday, July 29, all five Pointes had been notified of their applications' approval.

Assuming all goes well in the final Federal audit of their records, The Farms will be getting \$87,925; The Park, \$38,200; The Woods, \$75,317; and The City, \$52,984 from the Federal Government.

Since The Farms, Woods and Park requested advances of half their approved allocations, they should receive their first checks within a few weeks.

GPW Acts On Pair Of Concerns

Senior Citizens Commission Not Reconstructed, Storage Law Goes to Council Sub-Committee

Two issues which have been very much in the news in The Woods this year received the attention of the council at its regular meeting Monday, August 2, when the motions unanimously concurred in two Committee of the Whole, (C-W), recommendations.

First, the council deleted from the C-W agenda the matter of the reconstruction of the Senior Citizens Commission which means the organization remains as it has since its formation over two years ago — under the guidance of seniors.

In relation to this, the council unanimously appointed five new members to the commission, which has been beset by five recent resignations. The number of commission members now totals its maximum of nine.

Remains Under Study
Second, Ordinance No. 343, which provides for the regulation of the outside storage of boats, various trailers, (boat, utility, travel, house) and other recreational equipment was viewed.

A motion to concur in a C-W recommendation, i.e., that the revision of this law be deleted from the C-W agenda, failed to pass when Councilman Ronald R. Kellen, chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, offered a substitute motion.

He requested that this matter be referred to his council sub-committee for further study and the motion passed unanimously. Other sub-committee members include Councilmen George S. Freedman and Conrad A. Naegel, with Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos an "ex-officio" member.

Cites Several Factors
Administrative Aide Gerard McNamara's proposal towards reconstruction of the Senior Citizens Commission was referred to the C-W on June 7. He recommended that the commission be dissolved and that an ordinance be drafted creating a new commission.

While noting all seniors on the group had worked extremely hard and conscientiously, he felt the creation of a new organization by ordinance would accomplish several factors.

These include relieving a burden from those seniors who are serving on the commission who cannot perform their duties because of illness or other physical impairment; place the business of seniors in the hands of a more representative group of citizens; and expose the concern and needs of seniors to the entire community.

In discussing the C-W's recommendation that the matter be deleted, Mr. Pinkos said the reconstruction proposal was based upon the recommendation of having younger people on the commission. "I disagreed with that, and so did Mr. Petersen," (City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who concurred with the mayor's statement).

"Help Them Along" The mayor felt the group wouldn't be serving their function properly with younger people. As a result, "We'll hold it together the way it is and help them along," he stated. He added the council at the C-W level really didn't say that much about the proposal, while leaving it up to him.

"I'm very happy about the situation as it turned out," commented Irene Sutton, commission chairman. "The council showed good judgment in going along with the C-W's recommendation. I feel the mistake was rectified and the action was a vote of confidence for seniors in having seniors on the commission. Our senior citizens are capable of handling the job," she said. "I want to call a meeting this week and begin making big plans for 'Senior Citizens Day' on September 16," continued Mrs. Sutton. "Our commission is working for

the benefit of seniors and we want input from all seniors to be forwarded to the council."

SALES Like Mix Meanwhile, Mr. McNamara felt the appointment of new members to the commission was something which was needed. "Since I made my suggestion, new emphasis has been placed upon the commission by its own members, who may see themselves in a different light," he said.

Feeling his proposal was one which may produce other positive results, Mr. McNamara maintained he would have still liked to have seen a greater mix of people as members, e.g., some practicing professional people such as a doctor and lawyer, plus members of the business community.

In actuality, he feels the organization is at a point they were two years ago, i.e., just beginning. "I hope they develop their own operating rules and regulations, (as the other commissions), and make their regular meeting dates known, and available, to all seniors."

Their rules and regulations, he said, should include when they will hold their meetings, qualifications of members, length of office, specifics governing the removal of members and the process of electing officers, among other items.

Difficult Job Indicating he's in the midst of preparing the city's annual report and 1977 calendar which will include council meeting dates and a variety of other information, Mr.

McNamara stated he wants to list the meeting dates of all commissions. At this point, he said he has nothing from the seniors' group on this.

He added it's a hard job serving on any commission and the people who have been named to such a group should understand this. "It also can be a thankless job, too," continued Mr. McNamara, "and I hope the seniors begin to work together and zero in on all seniors' problems."

The new members appointed to the commission for terms expiring on January 1, 1977, include Harry Findlay, of Lancaster road, Alice Cairns, of Brys drive, Thomas Barlow, of East Williams court, Fritzeth Komerska, of Allard road, and Audrey Daigner, of Hollywood road.

In viewing the background of the C-W's recommendation on the recreational vehicle law, Mr. Pinkos said both the council and the Citizens Recreation Commission decided not to amend the measure at this point in time.

Wants Further Look A recommendation that the storage of RV's on residential property be prohibited wasn't agreed upon by either body, so under the circumstances, there was nothing to do but recommend it be deleted from the agenda, he noted.

However, Mr. Keften said at the meeting if the original C-W recommendation passed the situation would be left as it now exists.

Indicating his close connection with the law and the problems and concerns revolving around it, he said he has some thoughts towards alleviating such problems and wanted the subcommittee to have the opportunity to explore the matter. "We received less than a half dozen complaints in two years," (including several from two residents on various occasions regarding the storage of an RV on their neighbor's property), he said, while noting the law is toler-

well. The second fired bullet was not located. The lieutenant said that detectives are continuing an investigation of the incident. He also said that the robbery suspects might be the same pair who are being sought by Detroit authorities for robbery of a church in Detroit on Monday, July 19. The method of operation in both cases appeared to be the same, he added.

"All I can say is thank God no one was harmed, especially myself," said Father Honer. "One of our priests returned to the rectory about 10 minutes after the incident. The holding man seemed to know what they were doing, and therefore I was happy no one came home until after it was all over." Lt. Duncan said that both men were black and in their middle 20's. Both had medium colored skin, but one was slightly taller than the other and both had medium length hair. The suspects wore black patent leather shoes with high heels and black trousers. One of the men was wearing an orange shirt. Both appeared to be well-dressed, he added.

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Storm Causes Garage Fire

A Shores public safety officer suffered an injured shoulder and back while fighting a garage fire at the residence of Frederick Van Assche, 939 Ballantyne, on Thursday, July 29.

The fire was believed to have been started by lightning during the height of the storm that morning.

Injured was PSO Ronald Klotz who suffered a sharp pain through his chest, shoulder blade and back. He was conveyed to Bon Secours Hospital where X-rays revealed some muscle and tissue inflammation indicating a muscle pull.

The fire started in the east section of the garage, which is partitioned. The garage is attached to the Van Assche home and divided into two separate areas, one of which was made into a family room.

According to an official report, the severe storm struck several electrical appliances, causing sparks to ignite stored gasoline cans and power mowers.

Shores public safety officers were forced to chop holes in the walls and ceiling to check for the fire. The terrific heat shattered the windows of the garage, and there was some smoke damage to the house itself. The total property loss is not yet known.

The Farms Fire Department responded with trucks and personnel, but the Shores PSOs had already extinguished the flames.

The Shores report disclosed that the heavy rainfall flooded Lakeshore, Vernier, Moorland and Ballantyne, with the water well over the curb, forcing Shores' fire rigs to slow to between five and 10 mph before arriving.

Little Caesar's Pizza Victimized by Robber

An employee at Little Caesar's Pizza Treat, 19767 Mack avenue, was held at knife point and forced to turn over around \$278 in cash and change to a man who entered the business late Monday evening, July 26, reported Woods police.

The 17-year-old employee, who wasn't hurt in the incident, said he was alone in

the store when the suspect entered and ordered a large pizza. As the youth started to write the order, the man went behind the counter and produced a knife.

He ordered the employee to give him all the money with the cash being placed in a white paper bag which is used to cover pizzas. The suspect then took the youth into the back room and forced him to handcuff himself to the leg of a large stainless steel sink.

The culprit then left through the rear door but not before wiping his prints from the handcuffs which he gave to the employee, police said. A few minutes later, two customers entered the business, heard the youth's call for help and then contacted the department.

The suspect was described as a white male, around 21-years-old, about 5'9" tall, of a slim build and weighing approximately 140 pounds. He had black collar length hair, a mustache and a sparse, untrimmed beard.

He was wearing a red body shirt with a V-neck and a black draw string, blue jeans and tan boots above the ankle with a 1 1/2" heel, (pull on type), without laces.

The knife was described as between eight and 12 inches and of a kitchen variety with a white handle and a serrated edge.

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GPW Mayor's Auto Stolen, Recovered

Woods Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos was victimized by car thieves last week when his 1974 Lincoln Mark IV was taken from the driveway of his Broadstone road home, reported Woods police.

The culprits took the car sometime during the early hours of Friday, July 20, and later that morning it was recovered in an alley in the area of Warren and Crane, Detroit.

Police reported all four wheels were missing, the windshield had been smashed and the car's ignition had

been punched. The glove compartment had been gone through and its contents scattered. Three hubcaps were found in the rear seat where they were apparently placed by the recovering officer.

Mr. Pinkos said the air conditioning unit, a tape deck and the battery also were taken. Golf clubs, a sweater

and a pair of sun glasses, which were in the trunk, were removed.

"I couldn't believe they picked it up. The car is highly visible, (it's white in color), and has personalized plates," the mayor stated.

Police indicated they have no idea who was responsible for the theft at this time.

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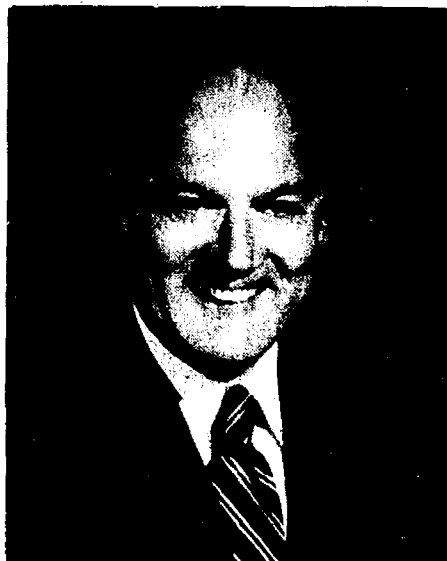

that it was not part of a long range plan to replace the system the entire length of Colonial road.

As one possible solution to the water service problem, Mr. Edgar suggested that the water main for Renaud road might be tapped to service the homes at the end of Colonial road.

A question not previously discussed but of considerable interest to residents is the possibility that further development at the end of the street would result in the extension of Colonial road for through traffic to Morning-side drive. This would be a detriment to the neighborhood, according to citizens present at the meeting.

Mr. Edgar told the council that such fears were unfounded and that the building of two new homes would have no such result.

"The best way to avoid turning Colonial road into a through street would be to build these houses at the end," he said.

After hearing the comments from the residents

Woods Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos expressed an uneasiness about granting the variance appeal before the water services issue was settled with The Shores.

"It would be unwise for the Council to grant this variance at this time with all these possible problems unresolved," he said. "Once the houses are there and these problems come up this council will be open to criticism for approving the plan."

The Shores has made no decision whether or not to extend services to the two proposed new homes, according to Village attorney William Killebrew.

"The Woods Council has to make the first move by granting the variance," he said. "Then we'll know whether or not we have to make a decision."

Since The Woods is waiting for The Shores to make their decision until they grant the variance, "we, (the city attorneys), will be meeting to discuss the question and work out a solution together," said Mr. Killebrew.

The final question which grew out of the Colonial road issue is a suggestion discussed at the last Shores Council meeting to work out an annexation plan to make all of the properties on that street part of The Shores.

Though Shores officials have denied that the idea was any more than a casual aside, it was discussed as reported in the NEWS.

\$38,000 to pay the wages of 10 persons currently on the city's payroll.

He indicated the allocated money will pay the salaries of two park attendants, two office employees and six men in the public works department.

Woods City Administrator Chester E. Petersen has indicated that the \$24,400 his city will receive will pay the salaries of three office workers, one department of public works employee and one animal warden. "We will also use the money to add two more persons to our public works department," he said.

The Shores did not apply for any funding, according to Village Superintendent Thomas Jeffers.

The final payments will be made after an intensive audit of the clean-up records by the Michigan State Police, which is administering the funds.

The Shores' allotment was received earlier than the rest because, by staying under a \$25,000 limit in their application, they avoided the more intense State audit of their books.

Grosse Pointe City Finance Director Dennis Foran said they did not ask the government for an advance, as the other Pointes did, because "it almost doubles the paperwork involved, and it just wasn't worth the time."

The majority of the clean-up expense was for labor including overtime for police, fire and public works personnel, and for the private contractors who handled much of the clearing of trees.

Monies Big Help
For almost a week after the storm, public workers labored around the clock, answering hundreds of emergency calls a day, guarding dangerous, downed electrical wires, dousing fires and removing huge trees from roads and walkways.

Most of the cities delved into their public works funds to cover the costs, putting quite a strain on their budgets.

"We were just a bit tight on the cash for a while there," said Park Comptroller-Assessor Nunzio J. Ortisi.

Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer estimates that the federal funds will cover about 85 percent of his city's expenditures for storm clean-up. "Without that, I don't

know what we would have done," he said.
Wayne County was one of 29 counties declared a disaster area by President Gerald Ford on March 19. Gov. William Milliken's estimates of storm damage in all of Michigan topped \$52 million. He also estimated that 85 percent of that damage involved costs for debris removal.

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Outreach Plan Serves Public

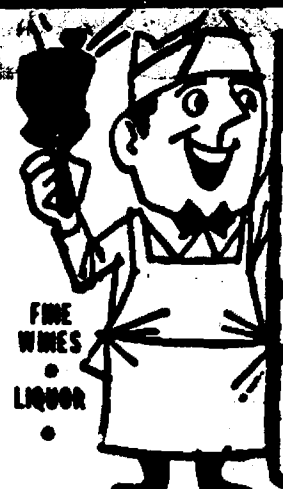
If you are bedridden for just a few weeks or several months, are handicapped or just can't reach one of Grosse Pointe's public libraries, the Outreach program is for you.

This plea, however, must be accepted by a circuit court judge before both men could be placed under Section 47.

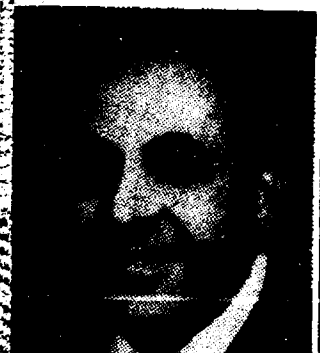

Several officers provided aid the day they were apprehended including all YSD detectives and men from The Woods, Farms and a representative from East Detroit's Narcotics Unit.

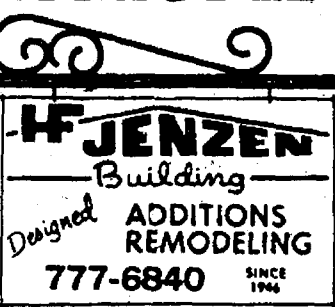
A third man arrested in the incident was from The City, but charges against him were subsequently dismissed.

GPW Endorses Hospital's Plan

The Woods Council via a 4-2 vote endorsed the plan of Bon Secours Hospital to install a CT scanner for the purpose of providing improved health care facilities for residents of The Pointe communities and the surrounding area.

This action was taken at the regular meeting Monday, July 19.

Susan E. Weiss, director of public relations at Bon Secours, said the hospital is asking for the endorsement of all Pointe councils regarding the scanner before an application for approval is submitted to the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan. tissue abnormalities and bone fractures with the possibility of eliminating the need for some exploratory surgery, noted Miss Weiss.

At The Woods meeting, Councilwoman John M. Mulian and Councilman John Sabol both nixed the motion. Both stressed they were not against good health care but felt there were other hospitals in the Detroit metropolitan area with CT scanners.

Those voting in favor of the motion included Councilmen Ronald R. Kefgen, George Cueter and Conrad A. Naegel, along with Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos.

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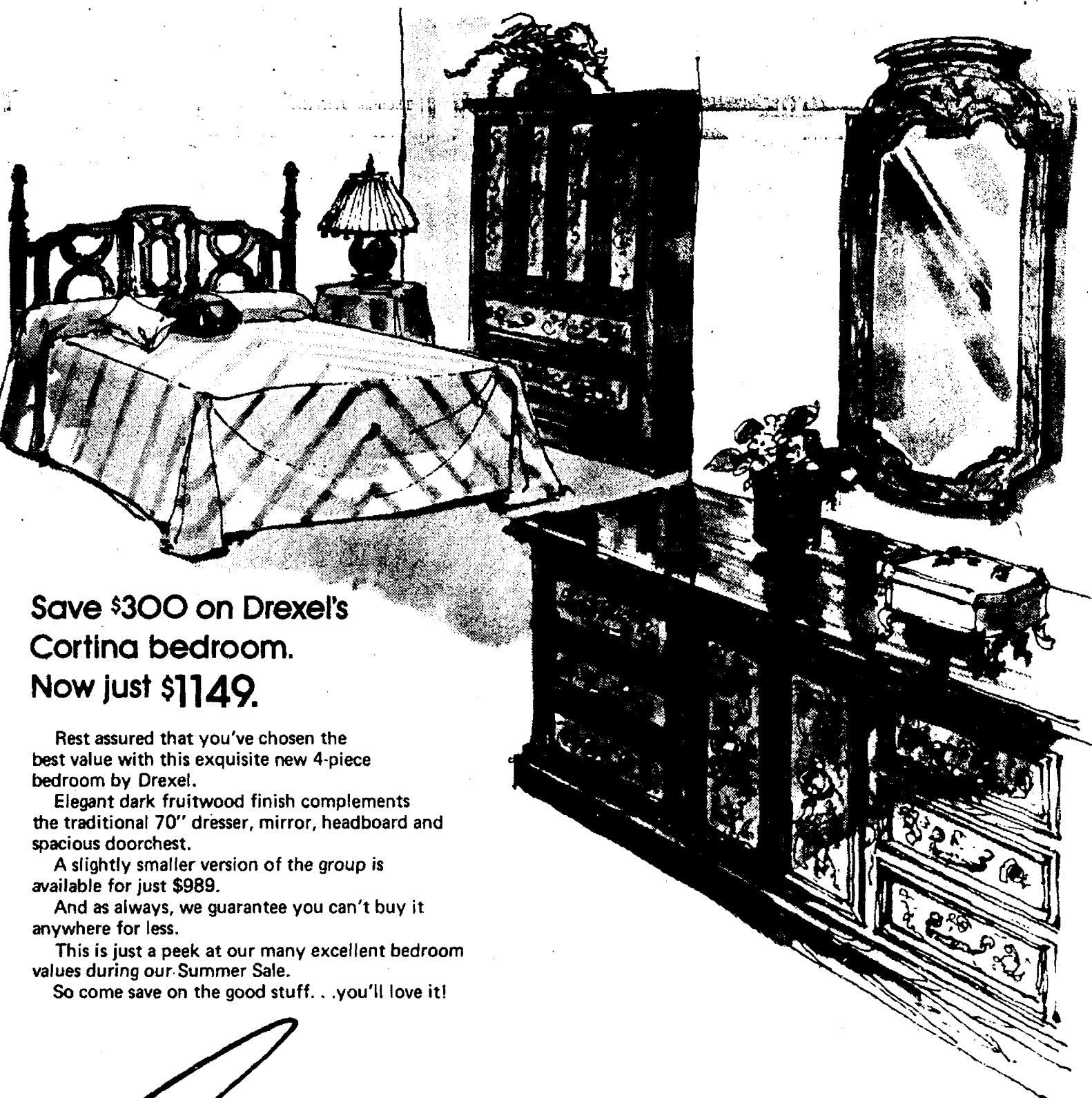
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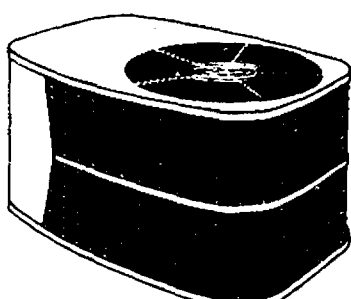


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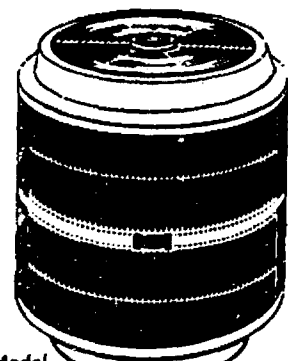
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Heavy Rain, Flooding Fills Pointe Area

"The two biggest trouble spots were street cave-ins in the middle of McKinley road and one on Lothrop," said Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer. "There were about seven other minor cases of streets and sidewalks sinking."
In The Woods, there were 15 various cave-ins, some of which will necessitate digging up and repairing sections of the drainage system, accord-

ing to Mr. Guaresimo. In The City one section of Charlevoix near Lakeland avenue sank at a sewage drain.
Police in all the Pointes were kept busy responding to calls from residents with flooded basements, plus a few small fires.
Woods police received over 100 calls in the aftermath of the storm, 77 for flooded basements alone between 12:30 a.m. on the 28th and the rest for cars blocking road-

ways, arcing power lines and small electrical fires.
Shores officers responded to a total of 47 storm related calls including one small fire, one abandoned car and scores of basement flooding reports. Electrical power also was knocked out by the storm in the Deeplands subdivision area, affecting about six blocks of homes.

City Gets Most
The highest number of calls was reported by City police who estimated a total of 200 complaints. The City Fire Department also responded to a number of calls, mostly for relighting pilot lights and dousing burning wires.

Li. Tim Champine warned that residents should check their pilot lights and electrical wiring if their homes were flooded.

Home owners were not the only victims of flooded basements. Cottage and Bon Secours Hospital reported flooding in their basements and first floor areas. The surgical suites in both places were flooded and all surgeries had to be cancelled on Thursday at Bon Secours. No patient areas were affected in either building.

Officials at Saint John Hospital reported some flooding in the basement but added there was no disruption of normal operation in any departments.

There were scattered cases of basement floodings in the

school district's 17 facilities. The most serious were boiler room flooding at Ferry School and South High School, and in the halls and auditorium of Pierce School.

"Fever Keep Away"
It is almost impossible to estimate the number of Pointers who awoke Thursday morning to find their stashed away treasures, or accumulated odds and ends, in their basements awash in a sea of brackish muck. The cost of damages on the residential front remains an unknown factor.

Some people, resigned to being victims of an "act of God," went about the chore of hauling the soggy dregs out to the curb. Some even did this with considerable good humor as was evidenced by a large hand lettered sign planted in a heap of junk in Moross road which read, "Flood victims #277, fever keep away."

Other less jovial sorts have been "calling up the city of fides blaming us for not providing adequate facilities," said City Finance Director Denis Foran. "The fact is about two or three times as much rain fell in this storm than there usually is in a regular heavy rain and, even though the pump house itself was flooded, the machinery worked perfectly."

Mr. Foran added that residents might be interested to know that the mayor's basement was flooded, and all the councilmen's, too.

Gives Advice on Storm Loss

If you suffered a casualty loss of personal or business property because of the rain storm you can deduct the loss on your Federal income tax return, reports the Internal Revenue Service, (IRS), in a news release.
R. L. Plafie, district director of Internal Revenue for Michigan, pointed out that losses to personal property are limited to the amount over \$100.

For tax purposes a casualty is defined as the complete or partial destruction of property resulting from an identifiable event of a "sudden, unexpected, or unusual" nature, he said.

Casualty losses include damages caused by flooding, but taxpayers are required to be able to prove that they actually sustained a casualty loss.

To help establish the amount of the loss, the taxpayer should compile a list of items lost or damaged showing the cost or other basis, the value before the loss was sustained and the value immediately after the loss occurred.

Before-and-after photos will be helpful in showing the extent of damage, he noted.

"In computing the amount of the loss," Mr. Plafie said, "the amount of insurance or other compensation received to offset the loss, including the value of repairs and clean-up provided without cost, must be deducted from the gross amount."

Taxpayers who need more information can get a free copy of IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Thefts," from their local IRS office.

Given 90 Days For Larceny

A 19-year-old Detroit man, who first gave his name as Robert Carl Allen to Woods police, pled guilty to a charge of larceny under \$100 in The Woods Municipal Court on Wednesday, July 28, stemming from his arrest on Sunday afternoon, July 18.

He was sentenced by Judge J. Patrick Denis to 90 days in DeHoCo, (Detroit House of Correction), and was given credit for 10 days served in the city's jail.

After his arrest for taking eight pair of blue jeans from J. C. Penney's, 19251 Mack avenue, the man, while being held in the cell block, then gave his name as Jeffrey Johnson to police, while saying he recently escaped from DeHoCo.

As a result, a "hold" was placed on him by DeHoCo and also by Warren authorities, who are investigating him on a disorderly person charge under another name.

Another publication available from IRS offices is a "Workbook for Determining Your Disaster Loss," IRS Publication 584, which is designed to help the taxpayer determine the loss.

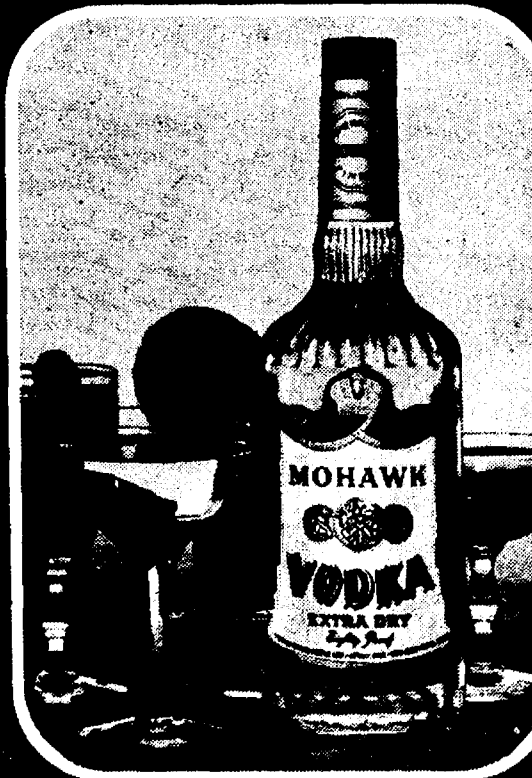

Woods Views MML Query

A letter from the director of the Michigan Municipal League, (MML), requesting The Woods' assistance in the area of employee testing service and fees involved in potential litigation was considered by the council at its regular meeting Monday, July 19.

City Attorney George Catlin reviewed the letter from Robert E. Fryer, plus a proposed resolution, and recommended that the council decline to adopt the proposal because of "the unknown and possible unlimited exposure to liability involved."

In a letter to the solons, Mr. Catlin noted the proposed resolution, if adopted, would provide that the city would be responsible for any litigation costs arising out of any lawsuit involving a claim of unfair or illegal employment practices which might be brought against the MML.

This indemnification agreement covers testing procedures done by the league for and on behalf of the city, either for new hiring or promotional examinations, he said. "It provides that the city would hold the league harmless should any judgment be rendered against the league and the city would be obligated to pay any such final judgment within 30

days." Mr. Catlin then stated that any claim based upon an unfair or illegal employment practice would not be covered under the existing insurance protection of the city. "Therefore, any such judgment would, of necessity, be paid from the general fund."

Based upon his understanding of the present arrangement with the league, i.e., that the city pays for the testing service furnished by the MML, "it would appear that the league should be responsible for furnishing this service and standing behind it."

The council took no specific action on the request.

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Widow Files Suit

Mr. Holstin's wife, nor that they were in the Holstin home.

Then, according to police reports, Mr. Holstin made a grab for Officer Serwach's revolver, and when the officer jerked the gun away, it went off, striking Mr. Holstin in the abdomen.

Mr. Holstin was pronounced dead at Bon Secours Hospital at 1:50 a.m., where he had been taken by The Park

Fire Department ambulance. On August 9, 1974, Officer Serwach was found blameless in the shooting death by Dominick R. Carnovale, chief of the Wayne County Prosecutor's Criminal Division.

In a NEWS story on August 8, 1974, Mrs. Holstin and Eugene Holstin, father of the slain man, said that the shooting was "without reason and needless." They said that Thomas Holstin was afraid of Park police and charged they "held a grudge against him" because of his previous brushes with the law.

Different Version

Mrs. Holstin's version of the shooting differed markedly from that of the police officers. According to her, the Holstin house was lit and not dark when the police arrived. She said she did not scream and that the neighbors did not hear her screaming.

She asserted that her husband was not standing behind her and that he identified himself and his wife to the policemen when they entered. She also said her husband never tried to grab Officer Serwach's revolver, but that the officer shot her husband when he was only three feet away from him.

She said she felt the shooting could have been avoided. When asked about the suit, Mr. Deason said, "Any death is tragic, but in this case, the city maintains that the officers' conduct was neither negligent nor improper. The lawsuit will be defended by the city's insurance carrier."

At press time, the NEWS was unable to reach either Mrs. Holstin or Eugene Holstin for comment on the suit.

At the same time, the program, which will be completed in stages over the summer, also includes architectural work as the clinic will be renovated both inside and out.

A new fiber glass roof already has been laid on the structure. This material, which has never before been used in Michigan, is produced by Johns-Manville, said William V. Koczara, of Charing Cross Exteriors, who is handling design planning.

Totally fire retardant and of a light weight, this material is a shake type laminate with a fiber glass mat, he said. It's called Johns-Manville "Woodlands" and has a 25-year warranty.

The building also will be painted and receive some interior renovation, particularly in the area of the common reception area, said Mr. Fair.

Program Snowballs

The overall objective of the project is to provide continuity and identity to the entire block from an aesthetic standpoint, he continued. "This particular location is one of the more desirable settings. We want to blend more with the residential section than with the commercial storefront area."

This move towards improvement snowballed from one business to another, he indicated. The bank began

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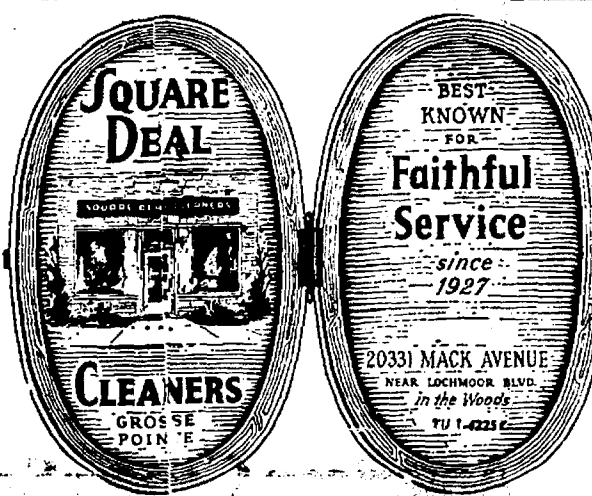
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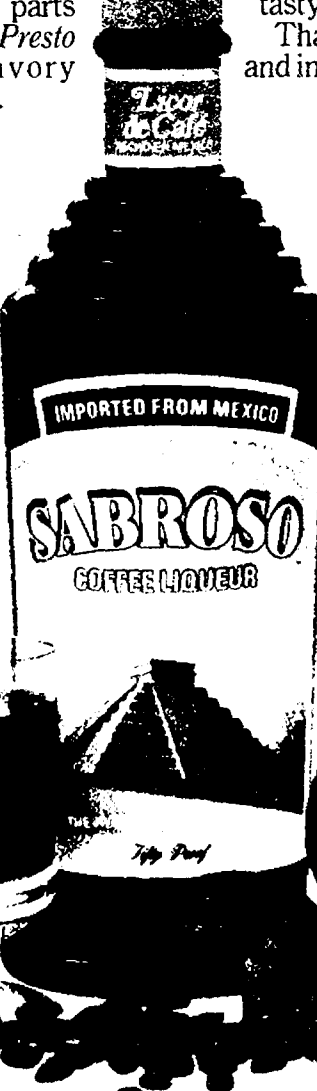

AAA Reports on Colorful Excursions for Canoeists

Canoeists who travel the Huron River and the River Raisin from their headwaters to the marshlands of Lake Erie pass through a panorama of scenery that covers two centuries, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

The major part of the Huron's nearly 128-mile trek from its source at Big Lake in northern Oakland County is through primitive countryside reminiscent of how Southeast Michigan looked in the 1800's.

But the Huron also carries canoeists into the 20th Century hustle and bustle of Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and smaller communities where cars and trucks can be heard whooshing by on some of Michigan's super-highways.

The River Raisin, too, gives canoeists glimpses of how Michigan has changed from the last century. From its headwaters at Goose Lake in Hillsdale County's lake country, the Raisin travels through farmland, rural villages and former mill towns until it reaches Lake Erie in sight of the smoke stacks of the Detroit Edison power plant at highly industrialized Monroe.

The portion of the Raisin recommended for canoeing is a 42-mile stretch in Lenawee County that starts at Clinton, once the site of grist and woolen mills, and ends at Deerfield, named for the numerous deer found in the area when the community was settled in the early 1800's.

The two-day trip takes canoeists through Tecumseh, named for the great Shawnee chief, the outskirts of Adrian, home of Adrian College, and Blissfield, where city parks line both sides of the river.

The river was named Raisin because wild grapes, (in French, raisin), grew along the riverbanks. In the spring of the year, the water is good for canoeing but later it becomes too shallow in many sections. The 17 dams on the Raisin—six in or near Monroe—make long trips arduous.

The lower section of the waterway can provide an afternoon of canoeing pleasure, especially in Monroe, where there are nearly a half-dozen parks lining both sides of the river.

While in Michigan's only Lake Erie port city, be sure to check out the Monroe County Historical Museum with its fine collection of memorabilia of Gen. George

Armstrong Custer. He lived in Monroe after his marriage. There are no liveryies so bring your own canoe if you want to follow the River Raisin, or drive M-50, which parallels the river for several miles.

The 100 miles of the Huron River deemed suitable for canoeing start at Proud Lake in Oakland County and traverse Livingston, Wayne, Washtenaw and Monroe Counties before reaching Lake Erie. The trip takes seven to 10 days, and there are four campgrounds especially designated for canoeists.

Canoeists who take the two-day trip on the Raisin must rely on the graciousness of private landowners if they wish to camp for the night, but the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority has provided campsites for those who follow the Huron. These are at Kensington Metropark, the Island Lake Recreation Area and the Hudson Mills and Lower Huron Metroparks.

A Huron River Canoeing Map from the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority provides all the information needed to plan a trip lasting anywhere from a few hours to two weeks.

It lists the seven canoe liveryies along the river, including Heavner's at Milford. In winter, Heavner offers combination canoe and cross-country skiing trips for experienced outdoorsmen.

There are 13 dams on the Huron and a short stretch of white water near Delhi, just outside of Ann Arbor, which must be portaged. Some daredevil canoeists try to shoot the picturesque rapids when the water is high enough. It is not recommended, however.

Except for an occasional highway bridge, the stretch between Proud Lake and Milford is unchanged from a century ago, and on week-days, when there are few canoeists out, deer, raccoon and other animals can be seen at the water's edge.

Where the river empties into Lake Erie at the Pte. Mouille State Game Area, waterfowl abound and canoeists sometimes catch a glimpse of herons and egrets in the marshlands.

Probably one of the most popular sections of the Huron — because of its proximity to the University of Michigan campus — is along Huron River Drive at Ann Arbor. Students' canoes often are seen gliding through water lilies and past tree-lined banks.

Motorists who follow Huron River drive will catch a glimpse of the rapids at Delhi, where there is a beautiful picnic grove, and see fishermen patiently waiting a yank at the end of their line.

The State Department of Natural Resources has been engaged in an extensive fish stocking program for the Huron, with plantings of rainbow, brown trout, coho salmon and other game fish in 1975 and again this year.

A \$480,000 model work-study program funded by the U.S. Department of Labor will train 240 jobless residents in the Washington, D.C. area for medical jobs greatly in demand. The model program, the department's Worklife magazine reports, is comprehensive Employment and Training Act under the special target provisions.

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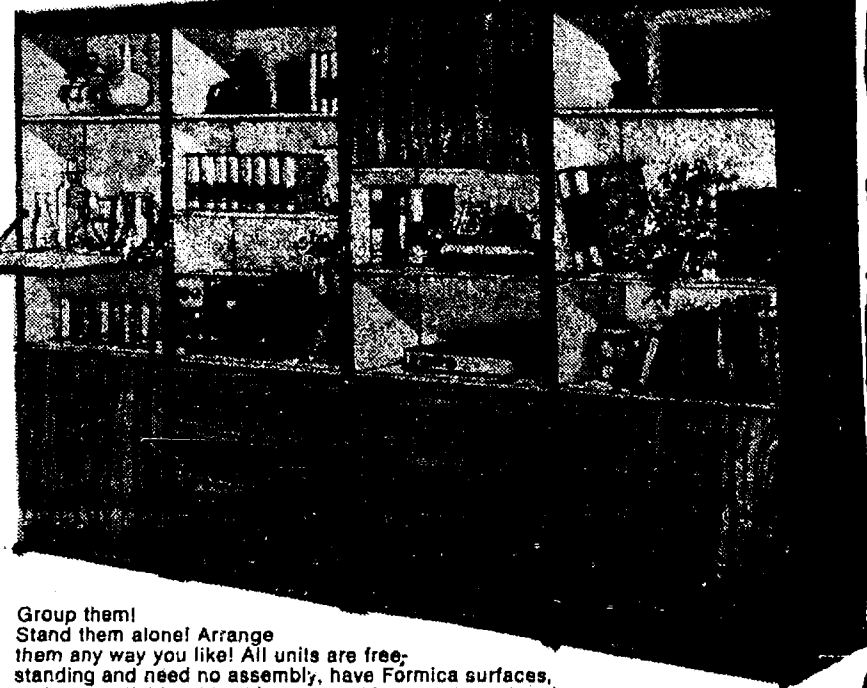
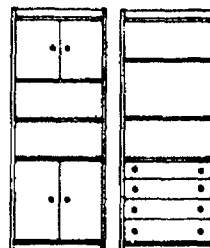

Advice Offered on Coping With Flooded Basements

The recent rainstorm which flooded many communities in Metropolitan Detroit resulted in a deluge of calls to health department officials from concerned residents reporting flooded basements.

According to Michael Andrews, assistant director of Environmental Health at the Wayne County Health Department, a flooded basement may create both a serious health and safety hazard.

"People should be especially concerned about disease causing bacterial contamination from backed up sewage as well as taking extreme precautionary steps to protect themselves from being electrocuted," said Mr. Andrews in a news release.

He indicated that the following precautions should be taken during and after any flooding:

1. Do not handle any connected electrical cords or appliance while standing in water or on the wet floor until all power has been shut off. Call the electrical utility service department for assistance before attempting to disconnect cords or open the fuse box in a flooded basement.

2. While your basement is still flooded, avoid flushing toilets or using other water connected appliances or fixtures whose discharge would increase the hazard or make your basement more difficult to clean.

3. After cleaning the basement the individual should make sure that all clothing and parts of the body which come in contact with the sewage are thoroughly washed. Prevent the tracking of sewage into the living quarters of the house.

Do not allow children to enter the basement until after the floors and walls have been washed, disinfected and dried.

4. Discard any contaminated food and vegetables into tightly covered, vermin-proof receptacles. Food containers such as sacks, cardboard boxes or open containers of any kind should be considered contaminated.

Canned goods in sealed cans may be safely kept provided the containers are thoroughly washed and brushed in hot water and detergent and then rinsed in a chlorine disinfecting solution of one-half cup of household laundry bleach to each gallon of water.

5. Clothing, carpets, upholstered furniture, toys, bedding and similar items should be discarded unless they are cleaned and disinfected. Some salvage agencies or companies are equipped to process contaminated material without hazard to employees or eventual customers. Discarded clothing should not be left accessible to unauthorized scavengers pending pickup.

Stores with flood damaged merchandise are required to obtain clearance from the health department before offering items for sale.

6. After the sewage has receded, flush the floors and walls with water from a hose than wash with detergent and hot water. Keep the hose stream away from electrical equipment or wiring unless it is completely disconnected.

Disinfect the floors and walls as high as they were wet using a chlorine solution. Household laundry bleach diluted about one-half to one cup per gallon of water is a satisfactory and inexpensive disinfectant. Do not mix chlorine bleach with ammonia. This combination produces poisonous gas. Ventilate the basement thoroughly to assist drying. The disinfection solution will aid in deodorizing the basement.

Elevate all material stored in the basement above the high water level to prevent damage in case of a recurrence of flooding.

7. Check all affected pilot lights or burners on gas fired or oil fired appliances. If electricity is connected to an appliance which had had the motor controls submerged, do not attempt to start until you have consulted your appliance service company or dealer.

If gas is used, turn off the gas supply to the main burner. After about five minutes light the pilot burner in accordance with equipment instructions. If pilot will not light, turn off supply to pilot and call your appliance service company or dealer.

Use Herbicides Intelligently

Properly used, herbicides can be a big gun in your war against weeds. Improperly used, they may not only fail to stop the weeds but also damage desirable plants.

"The first step in using herbicides to control weeds is to know what the weeds are," says Al Putnam, Michigan State University weed control specialist. "Some herbicides are very selective; they'll kill only annual grasses, for instance."

"Using one of these chemicals on perennial broad-leaved weeds would be a waste of time and effort."

On the other hand, there are chemicals that will kill almost any plant. Using these carelessly may wipe out your vegetable garden or seriously damage woody ornamentals.

"So, know your weed and choose a suitable chemical," Putnam sums up. "That won't guarantee success, however, unless you also apply the herbicide properly at the correct strength and at the right time."

Environmental factors can influence how well the chemicals do their job. A heavy rain immediately after you've sprayed may wash a chemical off the foliage before it's had a chance to work.

A herbicide that must be watered into the soil immediately after it's applied may evaporate and lose its effectiveness if you wait too long to irrigate.

Postemergence herbicides—those that kill weeds after they have germinated—are usually more effective on young weeds than older ones. If you wait too long after weeds have emerged to apply the chemical, control may not be a complete success.

What Goes On at Your Library

To many yachtsmen, the ultimate in sailing is racing. This week I would like to review a half-dozen books on sailboat racing that we have added to our collection during the last couple of years.

Whether you are a seasoned yachtsman or a weekend novice, there is material here for every sailor and most every type of boat.

This first book is the revised edition of Manfred CURRY's famous volume RACING TACTICS, (Scribner). Editors Edward Cox and Edward Muhfeld have brought this book up to date with new information on racing rules and proper tactics for the entire race—including start, finish, rounding marks, attack and defense.

Solutions are suggested to problems which confront, at one time or another, every racing skipper. There are techniques for defending leads and attacking the lead boat, blanketing opponents, avoiding collision, gaining the "Safe Leeward Position" and other tactics necessary for winning races.

In TUNING A RACING YACHT, (Norton), authors Mike Fletcher and Bob Ross show what makes a boat go and, more important, how to make it go faster. They set out basic tuning techniques for sailing boats of all kinds,

all his adult life.

"I'm convinced that one of the finest, overall training grounds for young men and women today can be found at the academy," he explains. His son, Christopher, a 1976 midshipman first class, is proof of his belief in that.

Although the mainstay of the academy's program is still training professional seamen, as it was at its founding in 1845, midshipmen may now choose from a variety of other courses, ranging from engineering to oceanography to history and international affairs.

In addition, the academy stresses development of physical prowess as well as responsibility and leadership qualities.

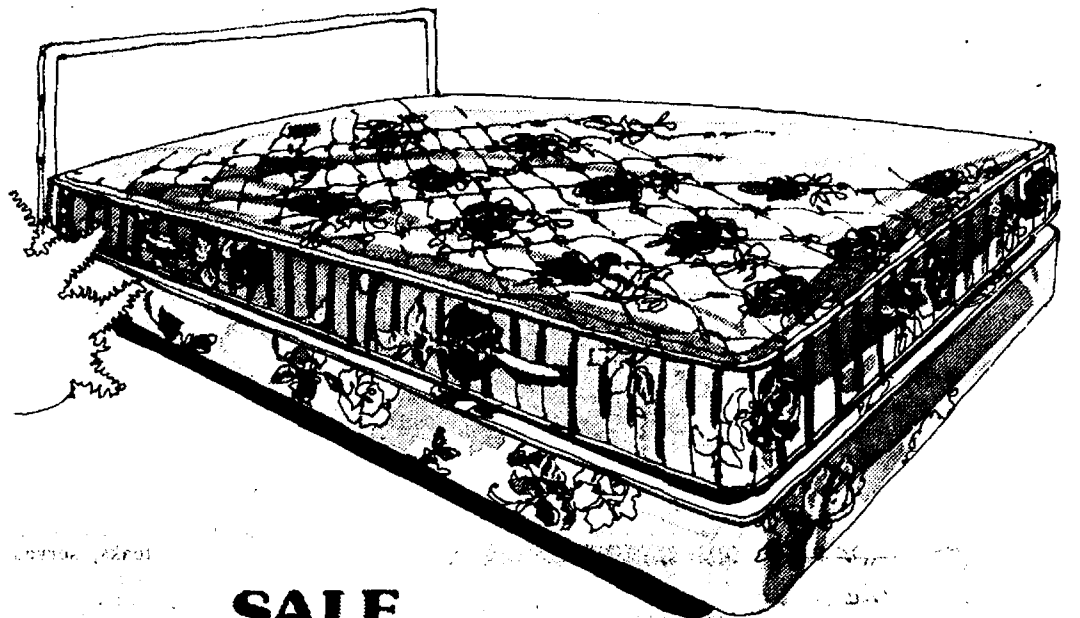

Present chatelaine of Seven Gables is Carolyn Hubbard Parcells (Mrs. Russell H.) Lucas, of East Jefferson avenue, a third generation member of the Hubbard clan to call Huron City "home."

It was Carolyn who conceived the idea of restoring the old lumber village as a museum. In designating this summer's special program "Phelps-Guest Day," she has invoked two magic names out of Huron City's past.

"Phelps" was William Lyon Phelps, Yale University professor of literature who gained a national reputation as critic, author and lecturer. He first visited Huron City in 1887. He eventually married Annabel Hubbard.

He served as guest preacher in the Huron City Methodist Church as early as 1888 and, in the 20's and 30's, (he spent many vacations in Huron City, and was in residence at Seven Gables most years from 1923 to 1940), occupied the church pulpit on a regular basis during the summer months.

His eloquence was such that people came 100 miles to hear him preach. It was twice necessary to enlarge the little church to accommodate overflow crowds, until the seating capacity reached 1,000... and still the crowds overflowed.

"Guest" was Michigan's famous poet laureate Edgar A. Guest, a close friend of Phelps. Eddie Guest, who summered at nearby Pointe aux (Continued on Page 24)

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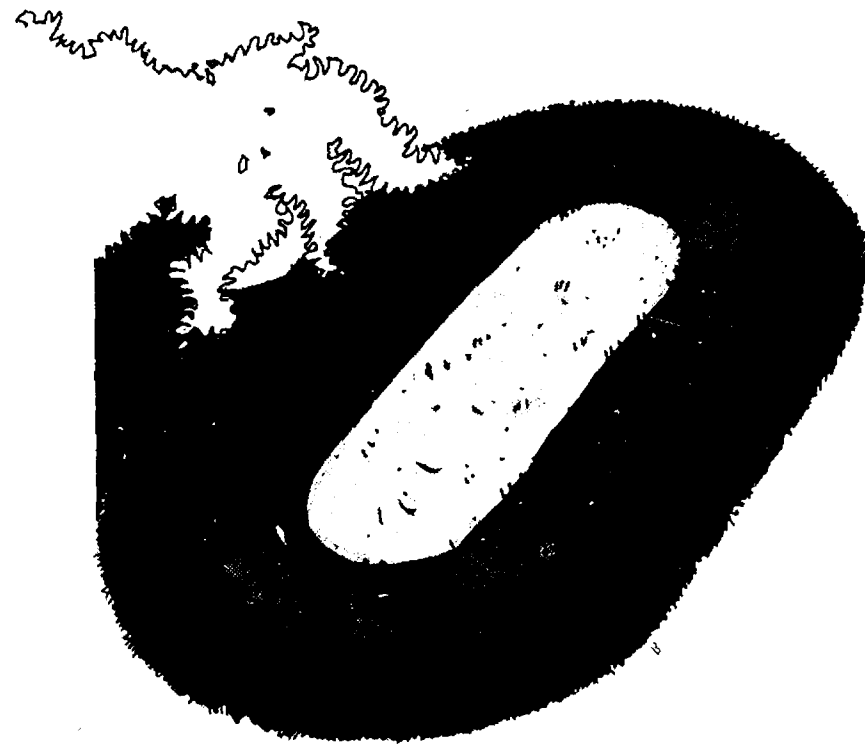

Beat the Birds to Garden Fruit

Protect backyard crops or the birds may harvest them for you, says Glenn Dudderar, Extension wildlife specialist at Michigan State University. "Starlings, robins, catbirds, orioles and cedar waxwings can get most of your fruit crop unless you take steps to prevent it," he explains. "Strawberries, cherries, grapes and peaches are crops birds find most attractive."

Before investing in bird control devices, be sure the birds are really the primary problem. In some crops, such as apples and tomatoes, birds may be going after insects that have infested the crops. The birds will leave crops alone once the bugs are destroyed.

Spread plastic netting over garden and backyard fruit trees for inexpensive reusable bird control, Mr. Dudderar suggests. The netting must be securely tied down to prevent birds from getting under it, where they panic and cause damage.

A thousand square yards sell for less than \$30 and will cover one 20-foot tree, two 10-foot trees, 670 square feet of garden, (three feet high), or 340 square feet, (six feet high).

Acrylic webbing is a spiderweb-like covering that adheres to the plants and keeps birds from getting under. The air must be absolutely still when you spread the webbing evenly over trees, branches or other crops. The webbing is harmless to birds, though a persistent one may get tangled in it.

Harvesting crops through webbing is difficult, but a few dollars' worth will cover

a backyard fruit tree or average size garden and provide 100 percent effective protection.

Visual frightening devices, such as dangling cloth strips, aluminum twirlers and pie pans can be effective if used properly. Move devices from place to place around the garden and vary the types used.

It is also important to frighten birds out of fruit crops during the main feeding times in early morning and evening by shouting or making other loud noises. These keep birds from becoming accustomed to "set patterns," which they will soon ignore.

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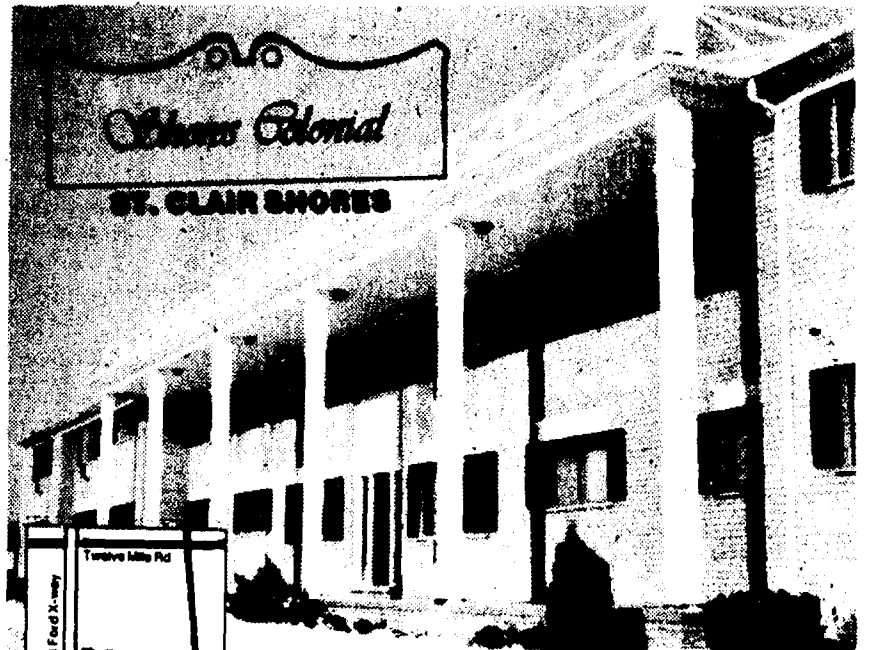

Barques, was often called upon to recite his poetry during a service. On occasion, he also helped take up the collection.

During those exciting years when these two outstanding personalities, still well remembered by area residents whose lives they touched, were active in the village, Phelps-Guest Day was inaugurated.

Bud Guest, who will speak at a special program at 3 in the afternoon, is the son of the poet. Bud, noted in his own right for his radio talk show "Sunny Side of the Street," and as a lecturer, is a longtime friend of the Hubbard family. He was a frequent boyhood visitor to Huron City.

Speaking with him in the church will be The Reverend Mr. Walter D. Wagoner, grand-nephew of Professor Phelps, son-in-law of Mrs. Lucas. Mrs. Wagoner is the former Mariana Parcels.

Dr. Wagoner, summer pastor at Huron City for a number of years, himself enjoys an illustrious reputation. His career ranges from service as a chaplain in the United States Marine Corps to director of The Boston Theological Institute, a consortium of all Protestant and Roman Catholic seminaries, university-related and independent, in the Greater Boston area.

The two speakers will look back in memory, recalling some of the excitement of the days when Phelps and Eddie Guest were center stage at Huron City.

Mrs. Lucas began Huron City's restoration in 1952, with construction of the William Lyon Phelps museum to house the most valuable of the Phelps papers. Then she went to work on the old village.

All of the seven museum buildings remain much as they were in the 1880's. The earliest, the log cabin, dates from 1825. All were constructed at or near Huron City before 1885.

The museums are run by the William Lyon Phelps Foundation. The pioneer village is open only during July and August, but each year attracts several thousand visitors. Seven Gables, still summer headquarters for the Hubbard-Parcels clan, stands amid the cluster of buildings, overlooking Lake Huron, eight miles east of Port Austin, just off M-25.

It was built in 1881 by Langdon Hubbard, who had founded the lumber town in 1853. It is the third home built on the site. The first two were destroyed in the great forest fires of 1871 and '81, as they swept across Huron County.

The Hubbard family has always been interested in the Bad Axe Hospital, and Carolyn Lucas is most happy to cooperate with the hospital auxiliary to aid a drive seeking funds to complete a third-floor addition.

It was, after all, her father, Frank W. Hubbard, who in 1906 established the former Hubbard Hospital at Bad Axe, forerunner of the present Huron Memorial.

Tickets for the special day, at \$5 for adults and \$2 for children—since the money will go to the hospital as a donation and is tax deductible, persons who wish may become "patrons" with contributions of \$25—are being sold by members of the auxiliary in Port Austin, Kinde, Bad Axe and Uby.

Seed-Grown Trees Result in Poor Fruit

The home gardener with notions of becoming a modern-day Johnny Appleseed is in for some disappointments. Apples and other fruit trees grown from seed generally aren't of high quality.

Tree fruit specialists at Michigan State University explain that most fruit trees are produced from vegetative plant parts rather than seeds. By grafting buds or twigs of one variety onto the rootstock or limbs of another variety, the nurseryman creates a tree with the best characteristics of both parts; for instance, he can grow full-sized fruit on a miniature

tree by combining a standard-sized variety with a dwarfing rootstock.

Vegetative propagation, as the production of plants by budding, grafting and other such methods is called, produces plants identical to the parent plant.

Growing fruit trees from seed, on the other hand, usually produces plants that are different than and usually inferior to the parent plant. This happens because most fruit trees are hybrids: plants produced by crossing two or more different varieties.

When the flowers are pollinated and the seeds form,

the desirable traits of the parent plants are often lost in the shuffle of genetic material. The resulting offspring may be very unlike its parents.

Genetic changes are often the source of new varieties. But these "sports," or mutations, are usually the result of changes within a small part of a single tree rather than the result of crossbreeding.

The chances of producing an improved variety by growing fruit trees from seed are very poor.

Even if high quality fruit trees could be grown from seed, the time necessary for such trees to grow to bearing age would make them impractical, the specialists point out. Grafted trees bear at a younger age than trees grown from seed.

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
