Forever Family Pulls Up Stakes In Roslyn Road

Neighbors Express Pleasure over Departure of Controversial Group As Members Are Heading for Toledo

The residents of Roslyn road are happy, the police have expressed relief and the Forever Family is gone. Or at least they are going. When contacted by the NEWS a member of the youthful religious group said that they have decided to move and will probably be out by the end of the week.

Standing amid packing cartons and the remaining odds and ends of their sparse furnishings, members of the Family said they are leaving, not because of neighborhood or official pressure, but because they "just thought it is time to move."

Ironically, it was the same "gypsy" life-style, so abhorred by the neighbors, which finally dislodged the group after all other attempts failed.

Time to Go

"We are just moving because we thought it was time to move," said one young man who was not a resident of the house but was helping clear out the Family's belongings. "There is another fellowship in Toledo and I think that's where most of us are going."

The first report that the group was moving came from a Woods police information sheet, which was dated Sunday, January 9.

Forever Family members reported that most of the furniture had been removed over the weekend and was taken away in a group-owned school bus.

For area residents who have had to put up with the ramshackle appearance of the Family's home and late night comings and goings of members, the news that they were leaving was greeted with great relief.

According to Bob Bruske, he and the other neighbors are very happy to see the Forever Family go. "Maybe now we can have some peace and quiet around here again," he said.

Are Problems Over?

Mrs. John Zofchak, who lives across from the home, said she was thrilled to death that they, (the Forever Family), were finally getting out.

"The owners of that house may not be so happy they (Continued on Page 2)

Board Views New Millage, Infeasibility of Closings

The Board of Education is starting early on its bid for millage by setting a meeting for later this month. It also announced that all schools will remain open for the 1977-78 year.

After reviewing a 90-page report prepared by the schools' department of pupil personnel, Superintendent Dr. William Coats said on Monday, January 10, that the closing of an elementary school next year was simply not feasible.

At the same time, the Board announced that a meeting to set the date, amount and duration of the next millage request is scheduled for Monday, January 24, in Board offices, 389 St. Clair avenue, at 8 p.m.

Police, Fire Agreements Approved

Cordiality of Talks Between City and Fire-fighters, Police Command Officers Cited

The Farms Council at its regular council meeting Monday night, January 10, voted to accept economic agreements between the city and its Police Command Officers and the Grosse Pointe Farms Fire Fighters Assoc. Both contracts cover the 1976-77 fiscal year.

According to Farms City Manager Andrew Bremer Jr., the agreement between the Police Command Officers and the city was reached on Wednesday, December 28.

The police received a wage increase of approximately 7.5 percent. Sergeants will now receive a basic wage of \$19,250, up from \$17,900, and lieutenants will receive \$21,000 up from \$19,500.

Longevity Pay Rises

Other benefits include a 60-40 dental insurance plan and one additional holiday, up to 10 days a year. Longevity was increased by \$50 at each step — to \$150 after five years, \$250 after 10 years, \$350 after 15 years and \$450 after 20 years.

The contract also called for one personal leave day a year, which may be charged to sick leave. Officers were guaranteed a minimum of three hours overtime for call backs and will receive a sick leave payout at retirement. The latter was increased from 150 to 160 days.

The payment rate will be one-half between 120 and 160 days at \$75 a day.

In the contract between the city and the firefighters, unranked employees will receive a 7.5 percent wage hike. The basic rate of pay will increase from \$15,300 to \$16,450.

Sergeants will receive a 7.75 percent increase over the new figure, from \$16,256 to \$17,725 a year. Meanwhile, lieutenants will receive an additional 14 percent, from \$17,213 to \$18,753.

Fact-Finding To Continue

More delays last week in fact-finding proceedings between the Board of Education and teacher union will push the release of a final report well into February.

While most of the presentations from both sides have been completed, fact-finder Dr. John Simpkins said he needs more data from the Board on salary schedule distributions before he writes his report.

Dr. Simpkins asked that information be in his hands by yesterday, January 12.

In addition, a final wrap-up meeting, originally set for Saturday, January 8, was postponed indefinitely. Board negotiator Lawrence Kennedy said the meeting will be rescheduled within the next few weeks and may be held in Board of Education offices in the evening.

The two sides have been working on negotiations since last spring and also have worked through a state-appointed mediator for several days, without results.

Both sides identify about 14 major, non-economic issues on which they cannot agree. The Grosse Pointe Education Association (GPEA), economic proposal of about 60 percent of the current school budget for wages and fringe benefits would cost about \$1.2 million additional per school year.

The Board's economic proposal, of a 21 percent pay increase for three years, is estimated to add about \$750,000 a year to the budget.

Thursday, January 6
DETROIT AREA RESIDENTS are facing their coldest winter in 98 years and their highest fuel bills ever. Consistently below average temperatures in October, November and December have combined with increasing fuel prices to make it more expensive for people in the metropolitan area to keep warm. The Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. has included letters with its gas bills warning customers that the extreme cold might have increased their gas use by 40 percent in November and 20 percent in December over the same months last winter.

Friday, January 7
HOUSE LEADERS SAID Thursday they doubt the committee investigating the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy and Dr. Martin Luther King will get the \$6.5 million first-year budget it wants. Republican leader John J. Rhodes said he expects that figure to be cut and Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill indicated that its approval is doubtful. Asked about the complaints of some congressmen about the budget, Mr. O'Neill replied, "I'm not going to comment on something that may not happen."

Saturday, January 8
REP. BROCK ADAMS, President-elect Jimmy Carter's choice for secretary of transportation, indicated Friday he may require air bags in new passenger cars. Mr. Adams told the Senate Commerce Committee he planned to review a Ford administration order requiring further tests on air bags before a decision on their use. He told reporters that he felt outgoing Secretary William T. Coleman Jr. made the wrong decision if air bags and other passive restraints were as effective and cheap as Mr. Coleman concluded.

Sunday, January 9
THE FBI HAS CHARGED a former Soviet seaman with conspiring to obtain highly classified documents from an RCA Space Center at Princeton, N.J., and pass them to a Soviet official at the United Nations. The FBI said Ivan N. Rogalsky, 34, was arrested in Lakewood, N.J., Friday night and held in jail overnight for his arraignment Saturday before a U.S. magistrate in Newark. When arrested, Rogalsky had documents concerning "a highly classified and sensitive Department of Defense project under study," said FBI Director Clarence Kelley.

Monday, January 10
FRENCH COUNTER-ESPIONAGE agents have arrested a suspected leader of the Palestinian terrorists who attacked Israeli athletes in the 1972 Munich Olympics, where 15 persons died, official sources said Sunday. Both West Germany and Israel may seek his extradition. The sources said Mohammed Daoud Audeh, also known as Abu Daoud, was seized in a Paris hotel on an international arrest warrant. A West German spokesman in Bonn said Sunday that the warrant was issued by the Bavarian state government for Munich, and that Munich officials would probably request his extradition within the 18-day limit set by French law.

Tuesday, January 11
SENATE REPUBLICAN LEADER Robert W. Davis in Lansing became the first state lawmaker of leadership rank to support reinstatement of the death penalty in Michigan. Mr. Davis, at a news conference called Monday to outline the minority party's 1977 legislative goals, called for the death penalty as part of a general move to toughen state criminal laws. Mr. Davis said he was convinced a petition drive to place a proposed constitutional amendment allowing the death penalty up for statewide vote would be successful.

GPW Views Kiwanis Bid on CB's

Council Awaits Reply from Public Safety Department on Police Monitored Channel

To CB or not CB, that is the question. The answer to a Kiwanis Club of Grosse Pointe suggestion that The Woods institute a police monitored CB channel will come from Director of Public Safety Henry Marchand and it is expected to be negative.

Director Marchand is skeptical about the usefulness of a CB monitoring system and said that unless the Kiwanis Club is willing to make a complete commitment by providing personnel to monitor calls at the police station, he will not endorse it.

"As long as the Kiwanis will run the program and find some people to stay by the monitor for 24 hours a day, fine, we'll be happy to provide them a place here in the station and our full cooperation," he said. "Otherwise, I just have to say that we haven't the personnel to take on this kind of thing."

Idea Not New

The director went on to explain that besides the regular Woods police calls that his dispatch personnel have to handle, they also monitor calls for all the Pointes and Harper Woods, a state police (Continued on Page 4)

GPEA Files Unfair Labor Practices Charge Against School Board on Jan. 6

Officials Charged with Unfairly Reprimanding Teachers Expressing Opinions, Adopting a Double Standard in Area of Communication

The Board of Education was charged last week with unfairly reprimanding teachers for expressing their opinions to parents and adopting a double standard by denying teachers channels of communication open to the Board itself.

The allegations were made in an unfair labor practice charge filed Thursday, January 6, by the Grosse Pointe Education Assoc., (GPEA), with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission. Superintendent Dr. William Coats said the allegations are "without merit and were probably filed only for effect."

"In House" Matter

The suit charges Brownell Middle School Principal William Christofferson with reprimanding three teachers after they spoke their views to parents at a Family Night meeting on October 14.

One of the teachers said the letter, which was placed in her personnel file, criticized her for discussing weaknesses in the English program with several parents.

The letter, she said, indicated that it was her responsibility to actively support school programs and that criticism of programs was an "in house" matter not appropriate for family nights at the schools.

GPW Police, City Near Arbitration

Slight Chance Remains That Settlement Can Be Reached Prior to Proceedings

The Woods received a communication last week from the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Assoc., (GPWPOA), saying it's apparent that compulsory arbitration is the only "reasonable means" left to resolve the impasse in negotiations between the city and the association.

So said attorney Armand D. Bove in his letter of Friday, January 7, to City Administrator Chester E. Petersen. However, while arbitration appears definite, there's a slight chance that an agreement can be reached prior to such proceedings.

In this respect, Mr. Petersen said on Monday afternoon, January 10, that Officer Michael VanDeGinste, former GPWPOA president who has been directly involved in negotiations since early last summer, advised him verbally that any last offer from the city, in lieu of arbitration, will be taken to the membership for their ratification or recommendation for arbitration.

Speed Up Process

The city administrator also stated the officer indicated that the notice of arbitration was given to speed up the process.

Finally, Mr. Petersen said he was advised that the GPWPOA would attempt to provide an interpretation of its proposal for a new compounding of the cost of living formula toward having the city proceed with its last best offer. He added if arbitration becomes an actuality, the city will submit its last best offer during those proceedings.

Officer VanDeGinste confirmed what Mr. Petersen said, while noting, "We assured Mr. Petersen that we expect an offer which will be taken back to the association sometime this week."

Earlier on Monday, Mr. Petersen stated he requested the association's interpretation on the proposal "so we could govern our last best offer accordingly." He added the city's final offer would be a three-year proposal as it "would be nonsense to consider a one-year proposal because next month we would (Continued on Page 6)

P&J to Close Temporarily

After months of trying to keep the Punch and Judy Theater a going concern despite poor community patronage and problems getting quality films, the owners have announced that the old theater will be closed temporarily.

According to part owner Robert G. Edgar, the closing is necessary because the considerable community concern for the preservation of the 50-year-old local institution never materialized in the form of box office receipts. "We just can't keep the Punch open with only 45 people coming to the shows," he said. "Just heating the place costs about \$2,000 a month. We expect to reopen in a few months though, to give it another try."

Pointers Tackle 'Should Have Stayed in Bed' Day

Only those who stayed in bed were spared. For everyone else the heavy snow and chill winds added to the usual Monday morning malaise to make it a tough way to start off the week.

As the first major snowstorm of the season swirled through the area, traffic stalled, schools closed, (most not all), and many businesses were unusually quiet around 9 a.m.

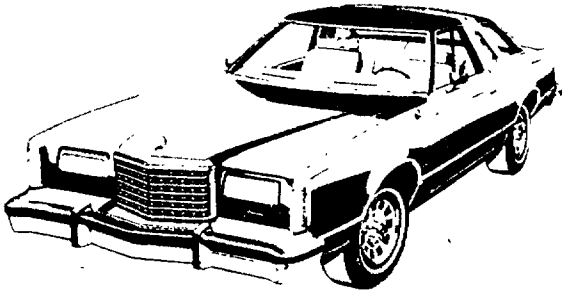
The National Weather Service reported a total snowfall of six inches in most areas, but gusting winds caused knee deep drifts.

Road crews from all the Pointes worked around the clock clearing streets and sidewalks, often two and three times. Park City Man-

ager Robert A. Slone, for example, said that work crews in his community had been out since 9 p.m. Sunday night, January 9, salting, sweeping and plowing the community's 40 miles of roadways and 80 miles of sidewalks. In The City, 95 percent of the streets and sidewalks were cleared at least two or three times, according to City Manager Thomas Kressbach. "We're in pretty good shape now but our men were working overtime to keep streets and parking lots cleared for morning traffic, and all rubbish collections were cancelled so those men could help with the plowing." A spokesman for the Wayne County Road Commission reported that its road crews (Continued on Page 2)

"We're happy with the contract," he said. "We're satisfied with it and we're happy we could resolve the talks in a friendly manner."

are losing tenants but they didn't much care about us when they stuck us with these people, so I don't care about them," she said.

"I'm a pretty happy-go-lucky person, or at least I'm no crab, and I used to love to look down this street at all the nicely tended homes, but these people have just wrecked the neighborhood. They're awful and I'm glad to see them go."

Though Mrs. Zofchak is heartened by the Forever Family's decision to move, she is not sure that the neighborhood's problems are over. While earlier reports by neighbors that the house was fit for condemnation proved to be exaggerated, there are repairs that must be made before the home can be rented again.

The peeling paint inside and out, as well as other cosmetic features of the house, are not likely to attract the kind of tenants the neighbors would apparently like.

Not Confirmed

"I'm just trying to put myself in the place of those young couples who are moving into this area to make an investment," said Mrs. Zofchak. "That's what we were doing when we moved here. I mean, how much is that house over there worth after those people, (the Forever Family), have been through it?"

She went on to say that neighborhood rumor has it that the home is being sold for \$23,000, which is considerably less than other homes in the area.

However, this report has not been confirmed and no "for sale" sign was posted on the property, (as of earlier this week).

According to Woods, Building Inspector Earl Wakely the house will be inspected and violations will be issued as necessary. He has already

issued one violation concerning the condition of the front porch and has received assurances from the owners that it will be repaired.

Big Question

While The Woods has no city certification of occupancy laws, the building inspector's report may result in repairs of major structural defects.

The question foremost in the minds of many of the residents, who have spent almost two years complaining to the city about the Forever Family, is whether any action will be taken to forestall similar problems in the future.

But for the present, quiet should return to Roslyn road.

had been on the job 21 hours straight but Mack avenue and Jefferson avenue, which are county-maintained arteries, remained unclear through Monday. One skier also reported that teachers had told them to leave before they were seen.

When asked about his presence in the youthful crowd one snow covered adult said, "I'm not here to supervise, I'm here to play just like everyone else."

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
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Group Starts Program To Aid Widowed Persons

Organizing a program to teach widowed persons to help each other will be the aim of the Widowed Service Program, (WSP), planning committee meeting Monday, January 17, at the Board of Education room, administrative offices, 389 St. Clair avenue, at 1:30 p.m.

Mrs. P. Blixt, assistant state director for Wayne County's 12 chapters of the American Association of Retired Persons, (AARP), said the organization of the group and a discussion of the WSP training would be the meeting's main objectives.

Mrs. Blixt stressed that the program would be a pooling of resources and interested community groups.

"We're not going to have a new organization," Mrs. Blixt said. "What we want to do is organize groups which already exist in order to help widowed people cope."

Plans to set up a consulting service and a filing system also are being made.

Serving on the planning committee, which first met in November, are several members of the area chapter of the AARP. They are Sam Zilly, president, Edward Bunn, vice-president, and Mr. and Mrs. Byron Chambers.

Others participating in the program are representatives from the A. H. Peters Funeral Home, the Charles A. Verheyden Funeral Home, the Neighborhood Club, the G.P. Ministerial Assoc., the Family Life Education Council, the Northeast Guidance Center, the Bluewater Chapter of Business and Professional Women's organization, the public library and the Association on Aging.

According to Mrs. Blixt, plans for a widowed service program for the area arose from her participation in workshops at Schoolcraft and Macomb County Community Colleges. She soon realized, she said, that training pro-

grams would be helpful here as well.

"I get all kinds of calls from widows right here in Grosse Pointe," she said.

The 15-hour training program for those widowed two years or more will enable those trained to help the newly widowed adjust to their changed lives, Mrs. Blixt said.

"Nobody can take care of widowed persons better than other persons," Mrs. Blixt said. "Psychiatrists and social workers referred to the widowed just can't understand the grief involved."

Mrs. Ruth Loewinson, program specialist from the Widowed Persons Service in Washington, D.C., and Leo Baldwin from the Washington office of the AARP also will attend Monday's meeting to assist with organizational activities.

Decision to Open Schools During Storm Ill-Fated

There may have been hazardous driving and blizzard conditions in most of southern Michigan Monday morning, January 10, but in Grosse Pointe "roads were passable and all parking lots accessible."

At least that's what school officials thought when they made the ill-fated decision to keep Grosse Pointe schools open Monday after a winter storm dumped six inches of snow on the area and just about every other school district in southern Michigan shut down.

But parents and students apparently did not agree with the administration's assessment of weather conditions. Attendance was down by 75 percent in the high schools and about 50 percent in middle and elementary schools.

"Why go to class when there's only three kids there?" was a common rationale for truancy offered by the 100 or so students who enjoyed the snow on the

Vernier Ski Hill during the afternoon.

The decision to stay open won the district the distinction of being named one of the "losers of the day" on WJR radio by disc jockey J. P. McCarthy.

While Superintendent Dr. William Coats admitted the decision to stay open "was a mistake" at a Monday evening Board of Education meeting, he insisted "his reasons were good."

"It would have cost us \$100,000 today whether schools were open or closed," he explained, adding that every single administrator got to work on time.

Administrators or not, there is not much doubt the education process came to an abrupt halt Monday, and there are a good number of angry, snow-weary parents and teachers to testify to that.

channel and other official channels.

"Another thing about this suggestion from the Kiwanis is that it isn't even new in this community," said Director Marchand. "We had a CB patrol volunteer unit a few years back before the whole thing became such a fad."

While the director pointed out that staff problems were the biggest obstacles blocking his approval of the program, he noted that there might be liabilities in such a system for the police.

"As I see it, the Kiwanis wants to put up signs on roads entering the community which designate a particular CB channel as a police band. Now if people with CB's get used to thinking of this as a direct line to the police, and for some reason we fail to respond to a call, we'll be in line for some real liabilities," said Director Marchand.

Wants Early Reply

When the CB monitoring program was discussed at the Monday, January 3, meeting of the Woods Council, Councilman Conrad A. Naegel, a Kiwanian, called for a swift review of the proposal by the public safety department.

"This is a good idea and I think the public safety department should give us an early reply on the matter," Mr. Naegel said.

Kiwanis Club of Grosse Pointe President Robert B. Frederick responded to some of the comments of Director Marchand by maintaining that his group offered the CB program as a purely service-oriented suggestion.

"Well, I can understand some of the director's personal problems and I don't want this to become any cause celebre. It was just a suggestion in keeping with

the community service aims of the Kiwanis Club," Mr. Frederick said.

He went on to note that it might be worth some expenditure on the part of the city to put "a few thousand more eyes into community crime control efforts."

"Second Thoughts"

Beyond the actual crime stopping functions, with CB equipped motorists calling the police if they notice any irregularities, just having such a program would serve as a crime deterrent, according to Mr. Frederick.

"I think that if a mugger or rapist drives into our community and sees the signs with the CB police monitor channel and figures that there are a lot more than just police watching for strange activities, he'll have second thoughts about doing his dirty work here," said Mr. Frederick.

"I really believe in the deterrent value of the fear of being caught."

The Kiwanis Club, which offered to pay for the signs if the CB plan is approved, requested that the club logo be printed on each one as an indication of its involvement. As for Director Marchand's suggestion of a complete commitment for staffing the monitoring service, Mr. Frederick said that the Kiwanis Club was not in the position to do so.

Statewide Success

A number of Detroit area communities have already adopted CB patrol systems similar to the one suggested by the Kiwanis Club and the state police also monitor CB channels.

A spokesman from the state police reports that while many of the calls they get from CBers about drunk drivers and speeders turn up nothing, the program as a whole is a success.

"In the month of October our CB monitoring unit got 1,174 calls statewide," said the state police spokesman.

"Of those, 125 were reports on drunk drivers leading to 44 arrests. There were 222 assistance calls from stranded motorists and 10 felony calls leading to four arrests. The rest of the calls were not necessarily unfounded but for one reason or another we couldn't follow them up."

While questions of the cost of the CB program have yet to be discussed, the Kiwanis Club has proposed that a Coronado II, SBE 23 Channel scanner recently donated to the city could serve as the central monitor.

critical of the current GPEA leadership.

The practice tends to "restrain and coerce teachers in lawful union activity," in that they may not communicate their views through similar channels, according to Mrs. Cook.

Mrs. Bassett said the unfair labor practices charge is "as slanted as the material the GPEA has been presenting to the community and their staff for months."

"Their attack on Superintendent Coats, and now their attack on me and Mr. Christofferson, are ample proof the GPEA and MEA, (Michigan Education Assoc.), can't tolerate those who don't share their opinion."

Hearing Stated

The charge also states that Mr. Bassett has subjected teachers to dissertations on his own view of negotiations and has individually examined them regarding their own views while coercively attempting to undermine their support of the union.

Dr. Coats said he stands 100 percent behind the two principals and is confident their actions reflect responsible management and sensitivity to the needs of students.

A hearing on the charge is tentatively set for Monday, March 14, according to Dr. Coats.

GP Park Will Participate In Block Grant Program

The Park Council at its regular meeting held on Monday, January 10, adopted a resolution approving the city's participation in the Community Block Grant Program, with Federal funds allocated to Wayne County to be distributed among communities wishing to become a part of the plan.

The county may qualify as an urban county as specified under Title I of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

Under this act, Wayne County is authorized by state legislation to undertake essential community development and housing assistance activities within its boundaries, provided it has an intergovernmental agreement with the specific community.

Questioned by Mayor Matthew C. Patterson and the council, City Manager Robert A. Slone disclosed that the amount of Federal funds allocated to the county and the number of cities participating in the Community Block Grant Program will determine how much The Park will receive, if the city is accepted as a participant.

It could be as much as \$60,000, he said.

The resolution was prepared by City Attorney Richard Mohr at the request of the mayor and the city council at a previous session. Mr.

Rohr pointed out, at the time, when this becomes a specific program, the city can withdraw if the program does not meet with its approval.

Under the resolution, The Park agrees to allow the county to use its population and other demography as specified in the Act and Administrative Regulations governing the use of the funds.

Mr. Slone said the funds The Park may receive will be used to purchase additional open space, or lots for off-street parking, badly needed in the city, to augment property recently bought on Mack and Jefferson avenues.

The biggest project part of the fund, he said, will be for the 1977 program to resurface the alleys in the community and install better alley lighting.

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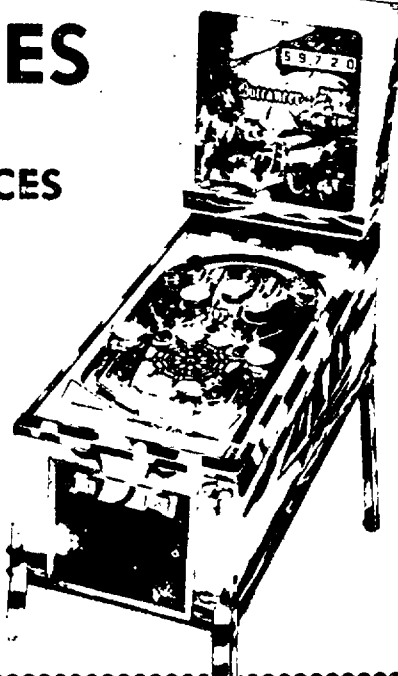

Harte, 33, who describes himself as a "companion" to 80-year-old Mrs. Lucy Steffens, was arrested by Farms police on Saturday, January 8, when he went to the police station to complain that Mr. Pattyn was trying to poison him, his two sons and Mrs. Steffens with excessive auto exhaust fumes.

After his arrest, Harte's two sons were sent to a children's home. Separated from his wife, Harte is trying to re-locate them with friends. "The reason we requested such a high bail on a misdemeanor is because of the numerous complaints against this man," said Farms Police Chief Robert K. Ferber. "That, and because we want him to stick around for a case coming up against him in the Farms Municipal Court in February."

According to Chief Ferber, Harte has been the center of "at least 75 complaints between now and last spring." Neighbors have accused Harte of throwing garbage on his driveway, then encouraging toddlers to eat it, saying "get used to eating garbage, like the way my kids eat the garbage from excessive auto fumes."

tipping over garbage cans, throwing tomatoes and dousing the coals of a neighbor's barbecue grill to "stop the fumes from poisoning me."

Interviewed in his cell, Harte denied the accusations. "I'm not paranoid and there are no neighbors out to 'get me,'" he said. "The interview written about me in the 'Detroit News' was inaccurate. I didn't tip over any garbage cans, throw tomatoes, or pelt Mr. Pattyn with snowballs."

"This is a sham," said Harte. "I shouldn't be in jail on charges like this, especially on \$10,000 bail. I think the real reason I'm here is because Mr. Pattyn doesn't like me. Especially after the court last month said I could stay with Mrs. Steffens."

In December, Mrs. Steffens' sister-in-law tried to have her declared incompetent. Harte appeared in court and won the right to remain with Mrs. Steffens. One person who testified against Harte was Mr. Pattyn.

According to Chief Ferber, a jury trial is scheduled for February to determine if Harte is violating city zoning ordinances by living with Mrs. Steffens.

Harte, who claims to have received a degree in psychology from Oakland University, has been with Mrs. Steffens for three-and-a-half years. "I handle the outside work for her, prepare some of her meals and provide companionship," he said. "Mrs. Steffens' condition was exaggerated by her sister-in-law. She is not feeble-minded or incompetent in the least."

Until he can come up with the bail money, Harte will remain in jail. "I'm amazed that I'm in here, and I think it's too much of a coincidence that Mr. Pattyn testifies against me in December, then has me jailed in January," said Harte.

"It's only my opinion, but I think Mr. Pattyn and Mrs. Steffens' sister-in-law are working against me."

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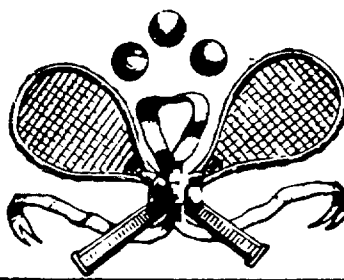

toward obtaining names of those who need transportation, while finding individuals who are willing to transport seniors. She suggested those who have such a need should call Betty Kilcline at 885-6134.

Ultimately, it's planned that this information will be turned over to the Woods

Senior Citizens Commission. Other immediate needs include finding a piano player who would be willing to "hit the keyboard" for sing-alongs, plus someone who's qualified to share the secrets of backgammon for the seniors.

Mrs. Alek may be contacted at the church personally or by phone in this respect.

In taking a long-term view of the program, Mrs. Alek and aide Diane Heavner originally listed over 20 objectives which they hope to accomplish, and both have high hopes for the future.

The goals which they wish to incorporate into the program are decidedly diverse but the ones they shared all have one point in common: to let seniors know that others care.

One objective is to set up an "adoption agency" where a senior, who may be alone, is brought into a family on a regular basis as a "grandpa" or "grandma."

Here, a family, for example, may invite a citizen over for dinner, thus giving of themselves. In turn, a senior also would give of himself or herself and spend some time with children in the family.

Noting that seniors lead viable lives and are often hamstrung with the senior citizen label, Mrs. Alek feels some are unwanted and aren't appreciated as they should be. "We want to get them into a situation where we can call on their resources and expertise," she said.

Besides the apparent area of teaching crafts to others, another concept also is being viewed.

Know Meaning

That is to set up a program where seniors can obtain part-time jobs, i.e., working for pay for two-three hours a day. "There are many men, (for instance) who are good, who are reliable," said Mrs. Alek. "They know what a job means."

In relation to this, it's hoped a list will soon be compiled indicating what seniors can do, e.g., baby-sitting, general handyman work, et al.

At the same time, plans call for an effort to involve community organizations into the nutrition program. One group cited was the Board of Education in relation to having seniors attend a variety of school-oriented functions such as sporting events and plays via a coordinated plan.

It's also hoped local merchants might become involved in a voluntary discount-type program where seniors would be able to save money on food, drugs and clothing.

Other ideas include setting up a referral agency and establishing direct links to local governments.

As Judy Maghakian of the church staff notes, "The program is doing very well. The people seem to be enjoying themselves, and with the additional space, (in comparison to the American Legion Hall in Mack avenue, the interim site which was appreciated by all), there is more socialization."

Now, she continued, there's an attempt by those directly involved to build upon, and develop, the concept.

The dedication of those individuals in the nutrition program, along with that strong potential, is there. What happens now depends on the interest and cooperation of the community in total.

be starting negotiations again."

For his part, Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos indicated Tuesday morning, January 11, "As it stands now, Mr. Petersen will try to resolve the problem prior to arbitration. If not, we'll have to go to arbitration."

From his perspective, Mr. Petersen had earlier cited an impasse over the GPWPOA's proposal on the compounding of a cost of living formula and the city's counter-proposal for residency requirements. He hoped both parties could mutually agree upon withdrawing the individual proposals toward resolving differences and arriving at an economic package.

The city administrator said the officers already have a cost of living bonus and felt the union's new proposal would skyrocket the city's cost.

On the other hand, Officer VanDeGinste stated the association wanted the same thing, (regarding cost of living), that Shores officers received in their recent pact, while feeling officers who currently have unlimited residency provisions, could not justify dropping their cost of living proposal in exchange for the city dropping its residency proposal, (which would require officers to live within the corporate limits of the city).

Pick Representative
Meanwhile, Mr. Bove felt

the cost of living formula rolled into salary was a forward looking proposal. In his communication to Mr. Petersen on compulsory arbitration, he said J. Douglas Korney has been designated as the union's representative to the proposed arbitration panel.

Mr. Bove also requested that the city notify him of the name of its designated representative "in order that selection of an impartial arbitrator may be accomplished at an early date."

At the same time, in another letter to Mr. Petersen, Mr. Bove said he has made arrangements to retain a respected auditing firm for the purpose of reviewing in detail the financial situation of the city in the 1975-76 fiscal year and in the current fiscal year to date.

Mr. Bove requested that a time and place be designated whereby the auditors may review the books and records of the city in detail with the assistance of any city personnel so designated by Mr. Petersen.

Finally, Mr. Bove notified Richard Terpin of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission of the intent to proceed with arbitration.

As a result, arbitration appears definite, pending any last minute breakthrough.

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Know Your Schools

During a series of recent meetings and conferences, the Board of Education, in addition to working with negotiations and many other issues, has been attempting to develop a statement covering the educational philosophy and basic goal areas of the Grosse Pointe Public School System.

Documents on which these discussions have been based include the philosophy statement approved by the Board of Education in 1951, results of the community survey taken in 1975 and priorities and goals developed for the 1975-76 school year.

Groups involved in discussions have included parents and citizens from all segments of the community, students, teachers, administrators and representatives of all employee groups.

Hearing Date Set by Woods

The Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, January 3, unanimously set a public hearing date of Monday, February 7, to consider the request of the Grosse Pointe Woods Development Co. to rezone property.

This area is located in Vernier road near Morning-side drive.

The development company is proposing to rezone the property from R-1, (one family), to R-2, (two family), to accommodate the construction of four duplex units.

At its meeting Tuesday, December 28, the Planning Commission recommended to the council that the request be approved with the understanding that the specifications and plans for the proposed construction be okayed by Building Inspector Earl Wakely and Public Safety Director Henry Marchand.

The commission's motion also stipulated that the plans incorporate a modification to include a minimum of one window on the Vernier side to enhance the units' appearance.

Philosophy Statement The Grosse Pointe Public School System

"We, in the Grosse Pointe Public School System, are committed to promoting and fostering the education of our constituent citizens with particular emphasis on youth in K-12 programs.

"Our primary purpose is to provide educational programs in which students acquire the basic skills (1) and self-discipline (2) necessary for intelligent citizenship (3) in our society. Furthermore, we are dedicated to the importance of academic excellence (4) and career preparation (5) as essential goals if students are to realize full and free participation in our school system and in the broader society to the limits of their potential.

"We believe that the democratic ideals emphasized in the Constitution of the United States of America and in western civilization should be transmitted as a part of our overall commitment to the importance of cultural development (6) as a self-renewing process in a society which plans for its future as it renews its traditions.

"In the belief that the implementation of this philosophy is the real measure of our service to the community, we believe that the school system should organize itself into an effective, responsible management system (7) so that our goals become realities and our intentions become actual practices."

The above statement represents the major priorities, goals and directions for the school system. We recognize that there is a significant gap between this type of general philosophy statement and specific programs and practices related to the statement.

We will continue our efforts to define and explain this Philosophy Statement in operational terms through the media, Board of Education publications, public Board meetings and frequent meetings conducted by appropriate administrators and others throughout the school system and community.

GPW Seniors Formulate Plans for New Program

Specific plans toward formulating a program for senior citizens by the Woods Senior Citizens Commission in conjunction with city officials are beginning to accelerate.

After the council approved the program's start on December 6 by the commission with Parks and Recreation Director Donald J. Hallmann and City Administrator Chester F. Petersen, progress was apparently, (and naturally), slow over the holidays toward outlining activities for the rest of this fiscal year.

But now the program is on the move, said Mr. Hallmann, who noted the seniors are excited about it and hope it starts soon.

The council allocated \$1,500 with this amount being included in the present 1976-77 fiscal year budget, (which ends June 30). Then in 1977-78, the council will consider budgeting \$3,000 for the program.

At a special commission meeting Wednesday, January 5, attended by Mr. Hallmann and Councilman George Cuelier the "ex-officio" member of the commission, the group submitted a number of recommendations which were considered by the Citizens Recreation Commission at its scheduled meeting Tuesday, January 11.

Then, Mr. Hallmann said, these recommendations and others made by the recreation group will be reviewed by Mr. Petersen before going to the council. It's possible the seniors may consider a final package at its regular meeting Monday, January 17.

Several recommendations were made by the seniors' group last week, according to Mr. Hallmann. These include the following:

- Budgeting money for the use of two city-owned buses for a variety of activities, e.g., transportation to baseball games, the state fairgrounds, the Detroit Institute of Arts, etc.

- Set aside funds for the rental of a hall to hold various functions, such as a Christmas party, where North High School facilities, (where the seniors currently meet twice a month), may not be available to hold a large group.

- Make funds available for paying instructors for such activities as square dancing and physical fitness.

Still more recommendations are for the purchase of equipment for socially-oriented and sports activities, the purchase of some trophies for participation in golf, swimming, gymnastic and rifle-club competition and approval for three commission members to attend one day of the Michigan Recreation and Parks Convention, (on Monday, January 17), at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Dearborn. The latter runs Sunday-Wednesday, January 16-19.

For her part, Irene Sutton, commission chairman, said the group recommended the use of the buses for short trips, while stressing such usage was something for which she had been striving since she became commission head.

Emphasizing the need for the buses, Mrs. Sutton said many seniors wouldn't go by themselves on trips because they prefer socializing with a group, or they are afraid to go out alone. And, she noted, many citizens are unable to drive.

If the recommendation for use of the buses is turned down, "we'll be sunk," she added.

In the areas of sports, Mrs. Sutton expressed her hope that citizens can become part of the Michigan Parks and Recreation program and participate in competitive activities such as bowling and golf with other senior groups.

And at this time, it's planned that Mrs. Sutton, Fritzeth Komerska and Alice Cairns attend the convention for the one day.

What Goes On at Your Library

Last week I reviewed the top 10 novels on the best seller list for 1976—this week the 10 non-fiction best sellers.

Number one for 1976, 34 weeks on the best-seller list, was William Stevenson's *A MAN CALLED INTREPID*, (Harcourt). This book concerns the Canadian scientist and industrialist, Sir William Stephenson, and his British Security Coordination, (BSC), the agency which, from its New York offices, coordinated British intelligence activities during World War II.

A best seller for 32 weeks was Irving Howe's *WORLD OF OUR FATHERS*, (Harcourt), a sociocultural study of the experience of the East European Jews who migrated to America in the 1880-1924 era.

Gathering material from published sources, memoirs, letters and taped reminiscences, Mr. Howe has produced an extraordinarily rich and charming history, a scholarly yet thoroughly entertaining work.

On the best seller list for 29 weeks was Bob Woodward's and Carl Bernstein's, *FINAL DAYS*, (Simon & Schuster). As a follow-up to

their *ALL THE PRESIDENTS MEN*, this book covers the "final days" of President Nixon's term of office.

The authors have constructed a two-part narrative, the first half covering the period from April 30, 1973—the day John Dean was fired as White House counsel—until late July 1974. The second half covers in detail the last two weeks of the Nixon presidency.

From two of the "beautiful people," Beverly and Vidal Sassoon, we have *A YEAR OF BEAUTY AND HEALTH*, (Simon & Schuster), a best seller for 28 weeks. Although you will probably find more beauty than health here, this book is best on all its "head-to-toe" advice for keeping yourself looking natural and feeling well through exercise, yoga and an austere diet.

Hedrick Smith's *THE RUSSIANS*, (Quadrangle), was a best seller for 27 weeks. This book is an excellent study of ordinary existence and social structures in the Soviet Union by the Pulitzer Prize-winning former Moscow bureau chief of the "New York Times."

Mr. Smith's major achievement here is to have denigmatized Russia, vividly, sensibly and comprehensively.

The number six best seller for 1976, 24 weeks on the list, was *PASSAGES*, (Dutton), by Gail Sheehy. As a study of the various phases and crisis periods that come to many adults in our culture, the author begins with a survey of current theory. To fill out the theory, she interviewed many people who seemed to exemplify the conflicts and attitudes characteristic of each stage.

Mrs. Sheehy shows how male and female life stages differ and examines the typical clashes that result from these differences.

Lillian Hellman's *SCOUNDRELL TIME*, (Little, Brown), was a best seller for 23 weeks. This book describes some of the experiences Miss Hellman and her friends endured during the McCarthy period of the early 1950s.

In the end she makes it clear that what really shocked and hurt her was the failure of any significant numbers of the American intellectual community to stand up and be counted.

DORIS DAY: HER OWN STORY, (Morrow), by A. E. Hotchner was on the best seller list for 21 weeks. This autobiography reveals the "other side" of Doris Day—"all in her life antithetical to the screen image of the unscarred-by-life blonde caught in innocent caprice."

Contrary to popular belief, she has had her share of disaster and near tragedy and in this book she emerges as a very lovely and very strong woman.

Billy Graham's *ANGELS: GOD'S SECRET AGENTS*, (Doubleday), was a best seller for 20 weeks during 1976. As a counterweight to the current fascination with the demonic and the occult, Mr. Graham restates the biblical belief in Paul's "cloud of unseen witnesses" which surround the visible world.

He draws extensively upon scriptural citations and interprets many present-day incidents to support his assertion that angels have a direct influence on the living.

Number 10 for 1976, a best seller for 19 weeks, is David Niven's *BRING ON THE EMPTY HORSES*, (Putnam). In this sequel to *THE MOON'S A BALLOON*, Mr. Niven describes Hollywood as he knew it from 1935-1960. He portrays the "stars, producers, directors, writers, tycoons and oddballs, many of whom were his friends." An enjoyable view of Hollywood's quirky past.

DIA Italian Wing Opens Next Week

First Public Showing of Four Paintings from Eleanor Clay Ford Bequest to Highlight Debut of New Installation

The Detroit Institute of Arts' Italian Wing, 10 galleries newly designed to display the museum's collection of historic Italian art, will be previewed by patrons and guests following a subscription dinner Monday, January 17, and by all members of the DIA's Founders Society Wednesday evening, January 19.

It opens to the public next Thursday, January 20, during regular museum hours: 9:30 to 5:30 o'clock Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday; 1 to 9 o'clock Fridays.

Beginning February 2, museum hours will change to Wednesday through Sunday, 9:30 to 5:30 o'clock.

Tours of the new installation's 150 Italian paintings, 50 sculptures and decorative pieces acquired since the DIA was founded in 1885, may be arranged by advance appointment for organized groups of 10 or more through the museum's Education Department.

The Detroit Art Institute's

Italian collection, distinguished by scores of Renaissance masterworks, is the third largest outside Europe. The new Italian Wing in the main building will be a major showcase among the museum's 101 galleries.

A feature of the opening will be the first public showing of four fine paintings from the Eleanor Clay Ford bequest to the museum: "The Annunciation" (ca. 1435) by Fra Angelico; "Madonna and Child with Cherubim" (1460) by Benozzo Gozzoli, principal painter to the Medici family during the time of Cosimo I; "Madonna and Child" (1495) by Perugino, close in style to the early works of Raphael, his most famous pupil; and "Portrait of Andrea Nava-

gero" (1515) by Titian.

The occasion also will introduce three of the museum's recent acquisitions: "Christ Walking on the Sea," a masterwork by Sebastiano Ricci, gift of the Matilda R. Wilson Fund in memory of Matilda R. Wilson; a secretary of Inlaid wood and ivory veneer with large shaped glass doors above a drop-leaf writing desk, example of the rare craftsmanship of Pietro Piffetti, (1700-1777), who worked in Turin for the Kings of Savoy, purchased through the Robert H. Tannahill Foundation Fund; and "The Rest on the Flight into Egypt" by Corrado Giaquinto, a monumental work, (112" x 70"), originally painted for the church of S. Luigi di Palazzo in Naples.

Some \$150,000, mainly from the Ina M. Clark bequest, has been expended to refurbish the area, under the direction of Dr. Dewey F. Mosby, curator of European Art.

Mrs. Clark, a resident of Grosse Pointe who died in 1972, was the widow of Dr. George R. Clark, a Detroit dentist.

"Never before has the museum had the capacity to display so fully its entire Italian collection."

The physical "renaissance" of the galleries resulting in the Italian Wing required more than a year of preparation. Several new galleries have been constructed and old ones renovated, floors refinished and lighting modernized.

From wainscoting to ceiling, five of the new galleries now are covered with velour in rose, slate blue or gold.

A cove ceiling conceals overall illumination in a central corridor for three successive galleries of double

bays, and carpeting has been installed in seven of the galleries. Architect for the project (Continued on Page 16)

The museum's Conservation Services Laboratory staff examined all works of art before they were installed in their new setting.

"Many paintings were cleaned, and various conservation techniques applied to present furniture, ceramics and bronzes in the best possible condition."

Chronological sequence of the Italian Wing begins in the Early Christian gallery and the Gothic Hall, with works like the sensitive marble "Madonna and Child" of Andrea Pisano, (1273-1348), executed with the same humanity and realism that characterizes his reliefs on the bronze doors of the Baptistery in Florence.

Paintings from the 13th, 14th and early 15th centuries with brilliant gold backgrounds glitter against slate blue velvet walls in the next gallery.

Outstanding in this period are Carlo Crivelli's lunette panel "The Deposition of Christ," with its anguished figures; three vivid scenes from the passion of Christ by Sassetti; Mino da Fiesole's marble relief "Madonna and Child" and a small cassket of ivory and marquetry decorated with exquisitely sculptured miniature figures.

Among the masterworks in successive galleries are the votive altarpiece "Tobias and Three Archangels" by Neri di Bicci; three lustrous glazed terracotta sculptures by Luca della Robbia and Giovanni Bellini's "Madonna and Child" in warm, jewel-like colors against an idyllic landscape.

A series of galleries with three-sided bays introduces the High Renaissance.

Titian's "Man with a Flute" — virtually an ideal of the Renaissance man — stands out in a group of four works by the artist and faces "The Mystic Marriage of St. Catherine" by Correggio.

The Mannerist inclination to graceful elegance and elongated figures appears in Niccolò dell'Abbate's "Eros and Psyche," Parmigianino's "Circumcision" and Adriaen de Vries' sinuous bronze "Hebe."

"The Conversion of the Magdalene" by Caravaggio dominates the next gallery with its announcement of the new Baroque age.

'Arts & Crafts' Closes Jan. 16

Seventy years of a proud tradition are surveyed in "Arts & Crafts in Detroit/1906-1976," the major exhibition at the Detroit Institute of Arts presenting 400 objects — ceramics, glass, textiles, sculpture, painting, enamels, architecture, precious metals, ironwork and manuscripts — which reflect the influence of the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts, the School it founded, and the American extension of the English arts and crafts movement.

The free exhibition continues through Sunday, January 16. It celebrates a dual occasion: the 70th anniversary of the Society's founding and the 50th year of the School, now the Center for Creative Studies—College of Art and Design.

The show, on two floors of the Art Institute's South Wing, is the country's first major survey of the benefit one city received from the historic arts and crafts involvement of industrial technology, artist and public.

The Arts and Crafts Movement developed in late 19th century England when, to offset the shoddy, mechanically-produced objects spawned by the Industrial Revolution, William Morris and other advocates attempted to re-establish ideals of simplicity, beauty and craftsmanship through total involvement of artists in all aspects of decorative and applied arts.

The Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts was founded in 1906, with the support of prominent citizens like George G. Booth, then director of the Detroit News, later founder of the Cranbrook educational complex, Mary Chase Perry, founder of the city's famous Pewabic Pottery, architects William B. Stratton and Albert Kahn, and socially prominent sisters Alexandrine and Katherine McEwen, both artist-designers.

An amazing number of special exhibitions were sponsored by the DSAC in its first two decades, including a 1907 English metalwork show which later circulated to seven additional United States cities, the first important international exhibition of British Arts and Crafts.

This section includes spectacular vases by Rene Lalique, the most important French glassmaker of the century, a silver gilt pendant and an impressive sterling jewelbox studded with amethysts by Edward Oakes, a master craftsman of the Boston Jewelers Guild, silver by Georg Jensen, and handsome stoneware by French ceramists Lenoble and Decoeur.

A group of 22 ceramics from Mary Chase Perry's Pewabic Pottery represents another aspect of the period as her work was exhibited and sold by the DSAC. Objects range from a small, undated early vase through ambitious vases more than 23 inches tall, showing the unique glazes Perry achieved.

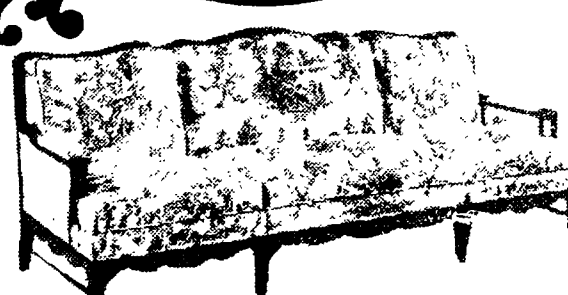
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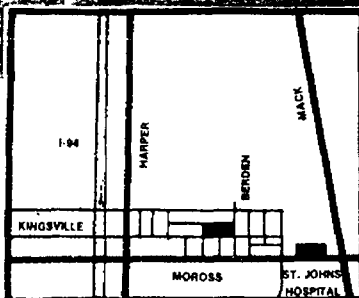

She and Sarah have both enjoyed Interlochen, but where they'd really love to be next summer is Michigan State University, which has a superb, highly-concentrated summer string program.
