Thursday, January 27 PRESIDENT JIMMY CAR. TER asked Congress Wednesday to give him emergency authority to transfer natural gas to areas with the worst gas shortage. The bill also would allow intrastate pipelines to make emergency gas sales to interstate lines at unregulated prices until July 31-a move that could raise the monthly gas bills of consumers. The impact of Mr. Carter's program on Michigan was uncertain. The state now has enough natural gas to meet its needs, but under the new plan it may have to share some of it with hardhit states like Ohio.

Friday, January 28 LABOR SECRETARY F. Ray Marshall announced a \$1.3 billion federal program Thursday to find jobs for 200,000 of the nation's more than 500,000 unemployed Vietnam era veterans. Mr. Marshall outlined the plan just after taking the oath of office. He said it calls for the government to provide public service jobs for 145,-000 veterans and for private industry to hire 50,000-60,000. Mr. Marshall said the public service jobs would be "meaningful" and could include such things as working in national parks and forests.

Saturday, January 29 GUNMEN KILLED THREE law officers in Ma-drid, Spain, and wounded three others Thursday, po lice said, in a pair of quick attacks that deepened Spain's worst crisis since the death of dictator Francisco Franco. Ten persons have been slain in political violence this week. Rumors are spreading that some police and the symbols of repression in the Franco era, have been helping the right wing extremists who are blamed for much of the recent violence.


Sunday, January 30 PRESIDENT CARTER called an emergency cabinet meeting on the winter energy crisis Saturday and suggested that both the government and private industry go to a fourday 10-hour-a day workweek gas He also declared Pennsylvania and New York federal disaster areas-his first such proclamation in response to the devastating combination of bitterly cold weather and heating fuel shortages-and said he will do the same Monday for Florida. Mr. Carter called the session after White House energy chief James Schlesinger informed him that the government had learned there was gas in the northwest that could be transferred to the east.

Total Second Highest in Division's History; Board of Managers to Meet February 9

The Youth Service Di-The deadline for registering to vote in the vision, (YSD), concluded another active year in one week away, and the local branch of the League 1976 with its second heaviest case load since becoming fully opera-

tional in August 1970. Last year, the division's four detectives investigated a total of 755 cases referred to them by Pointe police departments, down from the record 819 incidents of two

years ago.
With the exception of the YSD's first full year of operation in 1971 when 670 cases were handled, the load has increased through 1975 as 646 cases were handled in 1972, 690 in 1973 and 725 in





Crime Problems Viewed By Assistant Prosecutor

By George Polgar Jr.

Wayne County Chief Assistant Prosecutor Dominic Carnovale told the audience at the Monday, January 31, meeting of the Rotary Club of Grosse Pointe, that mandatory sentencing and certainty of punishment are the imperatives of dealing with Detroit crime problems.

Appearing as guest speaker at the meeting of the Ro-tarians, Mr. Carnovale said that while all other approaches to the crime control problem have apparently failed, the certainty of imprisonment approach is sure to act as a deterrent and will protect society from crimin-

als.
"Right w 65 percent of all convicted felons in Michigan serve no time in prison," Mr. Carnovale said.
"The reason for this is that the decision to send a convicted criminal to jail is subject to judiciary discretion, which is nothing more than the whim and caprice of the judges."

He went on to say that while "we insist on the fair and equal treatment of accused persons according to the constitution, we do not insist on equal punishments for criminals." (In other words, punishments to fit the crimes, not the individual cases.)

"I'm not accusing the judges of being wrong, I'm just saying the discretionary system does not work," Mr. Carnovale said. "What we have now is a certainty of non-punishment which does nothing to discourage people from committing crimes."

"One of the most important advantages of mandatory sentences is the segregation from the rest of socity of the 15 percent of the population which commits 50 percent of all violent erimes," Mr. Carnovale said. "Further, mandatory sentences will serve equal justice."

To illustrate the latter point, Mr. Carnovale cited a Harvard University study which showed that with the present discretionary sentencing system 74 percent of black convicted felons go to jail while only 49 percent of while convicted felons serve pect," while at the same



While non-fatal mishaps dropped from 75 two years ago to 72 in 1976, property damage accidents jumped from 205 to 260 last year.

"It's always bad when accidents are up. Now we have to look back and discover the circumstances which caused them," said Officer Crook, who cited three factors, driver error, a vehicular defect and an engineering problem within the city itself, which will be studied.

Noting that a majority of the accidents occurred along Mack avenue, he felt a combination of the aforemen-tioned factors could be responsible with many happening because drivers were following too close or were unable to stop in an assured clear distance ahead.

Another big cause of many mishaps, he stated, was failure to yield the right-of-way. Besides gearing himself for

a variety of traffic safety programs within the schools and the community at large this year, Officer Crook is currently putting together a book, for submission to the AAA, comprising the three E's of traffic safety: educa-

For instance, the basic rules of traffic he draws a parallel between safety which are taught to an officer's badge number and a youngster's house number, emphasizing the importance of knowing the latter in case a child is lost. In relation to this is the readily identifiable symbol of a police officer.

Officer Crook also stresses never to play with guns when youngsters ask if they can see his revolver, while drawing parallels between bullets, with matches

Hence, in the latter case. fire safety is brought to the fore along with the responsibilities of a public safety officer, (whose duties encompass both police work and firefighting)

Viewing the overall concept of program planning, Officer Crook stresses a consistent flexibility keeping everyone involved, (with a focus on question and answer periods with the youngsters).

"We also try to get as much parent involvement as possible," he continued, while citing the purpose of brochures given to youngsters to take home. (In this respect, he hopes Mom and Dad reviews the contents before throwing the material away).

Realizing the prominent role which Officer Stephen Petrik has played in the past, (he was traffic safety officer for nine years), Officer Crook has a solid foundation on which he hopes to further expand and develop.

"I want to work with other communities on our program, and I want to look at all our citizens in working toward an overall safety package,"

As a result, this year he hopes to coordinate an overall traffic safety plan geared toward senior citizens. 



"The doctors have told me I have a 21-year-old body and a 50-year-old neck. Strain and impact has compressed the vertabrae comparable to a person twice my age. It sounds funny, but it's true.

"As you might expect, getting insurance in my profession is very difficult," he added. "A great deal of my earnings go just to pay my premiums. So many skiers try freestyling and get injured, that the premiums are driven up. That's part of the reason for forming the Coaches Association."

The association is a group

of professional freestylers who hope to instruct ski instructors in the "hot dog" style growing in popularity. "There's no really good

amateur or teaching program established right now," said Ben. "There are a few teaching camps, but newcomers almost have to hire a tutor to learn the sport correctly.

"Freestyle skiing is a combination of skiing and gymnastics. If we have regular ski instructors teach it correctly, we can reduce the Mass, composed by Darwin number of injuries that occur each year. You have to learn



Congress and Environmental Education Committee began this aluminum recycling project last November with the help of students, parents and friends of the school. One load of aluminum has





> Their letter identified that all Board members had "reviewed the complete tape of the meeting and (found) no reason to apologize to Mrs. Cook or the members of the

> The Board letter also established that President Warner's remarks were "an accurate assessment of (their) combined feelings concerning the point he covered.'

> Knowing now that the entire Board agreed with Mr. Warner's prepared and ad lib remarks, I, as chief association representative for North, wrote to the Board on November 22, 1976. I specified the unwarranted language, but asked that the tape of the meeting be made available to the North staff so that we could hear as well as read the language. The tape was made available on Thursday, January 13, 1977.

Representatives heard the tape and read the transcript. We again request, this time through this public letter, that Mr. Warner and the Board of Education make public apology for the follow-

1. "But as a result of the Union's attempt to go public, a number of misrepresentations of fact have appeared in print, both in the leadership's directives to its membership and in the information to the general public." (Transcript A. page 4, para graph 3).
