total of six planners for the position. Given the responsibility to screen, interview and recommend a consultant, the committee comprised of Councilmen George S. Freeman and George Cueter and Planning Commissioners Peter Gile-zan, Robert Trinklein and John Kennedy, recommend-ed that the firm be engaged to perform work toward up-dating the city's zoning ordi-nance and preparing a land

use plan. Mr. Freeman's motion to concur in the committee's recommendation stipulated that the estimated cost for the work, i.e., updating the zoning ordinance, \$4,400, and formulating a land use plan, \$9,200, be considered for incorporation in the 1977-78 fiscal year budget.



"But most people have little, if any, control over the school their children attend," she said. "They do have a choice among doctors, lawyers and others." State Rep. William Bryant

said that, although he has some problems with HB 4242, he does not oppose the bill. "I don't see anything par-

ticularly wrong with teachers having a board to con-trol licensing," Rep. Bryant said. "And I don't think MEA control of the profession is

Win Legal Right to Force Police Training on Firemen

By Susan McDonald

since the City Council passed a law to consolidate its police and fire forces-yet, during that time, there have been few changes in the small community's public safety operation.

A new public safety director, retired Detroit Inspector Concert Slated Bruce Kennedy, has been hired, and police have begun to take training in firefighting skills. But, until The City can win the legal right to force police training on their firefighters, the consolidation plan will go no further.

The City has been tied up in arbitration, circuit court and Michigan Employment Relations Commission hearings since last summer by firefighters opposing the consolidation plan. And the strains on both the city administration's time and bud-

get are beginning to be felt. The various court battles "have taken a substantial amount of legal and adminisager Thomas Kressbach. "There's no question that a number of other matters have been placed on a back burner as a result of all this."

The council approved the recommendation of the Citizen's Research Council of Michigan to consolidate their departments last October.

The Research Council conducted a study of The City's facilities and force and concluded the municipality could save \$80,000 in salaries with a joint public safety depart-

Argue Case

Arbitration proceedings, hefore Inkster attorney Mario Chiesa, began last August but final arguments and rebuttals have to be made.

Mr. Chiesa said that he hopes the next meeting, scheduled for Saturday, May 7, will "wrap it up."

In the meantime, The City is under orders of a Wayne County Circuit Court judge not to implement the consolidation plan in any way that will effect firefighters until the arbitration hearings are

In more than one hundred hours of testimony, the firefighters have argued their case against forced consolidation from a variety of standpoints, including testimony from occupational phychologists, fire science professors, a national consultant in firefighting and local fire chiefs.

City Finance Director Dennis Foran, Citizen's Research Council consultant Glen Leonard and an Escanaba public safety director have testified on behalf of The City.

Whatever the arbitrator's final ruling, there's a strong possibility that one side or another may appeal the case in Wayne County Circuit Court as well.



accident report via the public safety department. It was slashed from \$10 per page to \$5 per page.

City Attorney George Catlin felt that the \$5 figure was more justifiable under the statute and would cover the time needed to gather, xerox and mail such a report.

The fee guidelines are broken down by department and include those of the city clerk, finance, tax, parks and recreation and public safety departments.

Under the city clerk classification, agendas of all council, committee of the whole and planning commission meetings are free of charge as they have been in the past, while minutes of these public bodies will be available at 10 cents per page. They were free of charge before.

Cites Public Relations Copies of death certificates will remain the same, i.e., the first copy, \$2, and each additional one, 50 cents.

For those requesting a list of voters in one of the city's 12 precincts, the price was upped from \$2 each, (\$24 for all precincts), to \$5 each, (\$60 for all precincts). Payment in this case must be in advance so there's no wasted

Meanwhile, citizens wishing copies of ordinances, (excerpts from the city code), will be able to obtain them free of charge. Mr. Petersen, in his memo, said, from a public relations stand-point and as an aid in informing the citizenry about city laws, it's unwise to charge for such copies.

Records constituting a clearly unwarranted invasion of privacy; investigating records compiled for law enforcement purposes; records exempt by statute; and records exempt under the Federal Family Educational and Privacy Act.

More include exempt records furnished by one public body to another; attorney. client privilege; bid proposals; real estate appraisals; test questions and answers; advisory communications within a public body or be-tween public bodies; law enforcement communication codes; and records of a police agency that would interfere with law enforcement or endanger a law enforcement officer, among others.

The public body must separate exempt and non-exempt material and must furnish the non-exempt material upon request. A spokesman in the attor-

ney general's office in Lansing indicated that all records are open to the public under the law unless they fall into the exempt material category. He added that no criminal

penalties are provided under the law. However, the act permits a person to file suit to force an agency to release a record which should be open. If that person is successful in his court battle, he can recover attorney fees



# Pointe Students Cited by U-M | Flooding Report from City

ment of a citizen's committee with City Engineer Larry Pate's recent engineering report on storm water run-off and basement flooding was viewed by the Woods Council

The communication from M. J. Messerschmidt, on behalf of the northeast area group, also contained several additional recommendations for the council's consideration. Jim Gilleran spoke on behalf of the committee at the meeting.

In his report, which was released in February, Mr. Pate's recommendations included the diversion of surface water run-off from roof conductors to ground surfaces, i.e., diversion of flows from downspouts, plus the initiation of three sewer projects in an attempt to alleviate flooding conditions which affected various sections of the city last July 28-29 via a heavy rainfall.

Two of the sewer installation projects were proposed for the southerly end of the city and the other for the northerly end. The estimated cost of the proposed projects reaches \$389,100 for the northeast section and \$22,500 for the southwest end, according to Mr. Pate's report.

In his letter, Mr. Messerschmidt suggested that the Pate Plan be implemented in several stages. Stage one would be the construction of a new storm sewer on Van K and Briarcliff, while stage two recommended that all catch basin inlets in the city be of the "restricted type," i.e., allowing the street to act as a reservoir.

Stage three eyes the disconnection of drain tile behind curbs in the area, while the fourth stage recommend-ed a tie-in of the present sewer system, terminating at the intersection of Van K and Perrien place, to the adjacent storm sewer system at North Rosedale, to provide for a relief situation.

The final stage suggested was the disconnection of the front downspouts on all buildings in the northeast section. The committee felt that this stage be implemented only if all other ave-

During the course of the discussion City Administra-tor Chester E. Petersen rec ommended that disconnection of the front downspouts should actually be implemented first.

In relation to this, he told the NEWS that homes in the northeast area of the city will be sent a letter recommending this mode of action to help alleviate an individual home owner's own potential flooding problems, including the prominent one of water in basements.

In relation to "restricted type" catch basins Mr. Petersen said all catch basins in the northeast section are of this type, where openings in the basins restrict the flow of water so it will not

The second film to be shown by Mr. Matthews is "Galloping Goose," named after the odd, hybrid conveyance used for years on Colorado's narrow-gage railroads for carrying light freight and a few passengers.

These vehicles, one of which is seen on display at Delores, Colo., began life as Pierce-Arrow and Packard cars, and were later modified by installing railroad wheels on the axles and replacing the regular bodies with large wooden structures for freight and passengers.

The audience will visit Colorado's Great Sand Dune National Monument where some of the country's greatest sand dunes are located. Rising to heights of 700 feet in places, the dunes are unique in that they are confined to this small area, hundreds of miles from any other similar dunes.

At Mesa Verde National Park, the film will show views of the numerous cliff dwellings, structures built into the faces of sheer cliffs where their occupants, the Basketmaker Indians, lived and worked. The dwellings were built after 1200 AD for protection from hostile warriors and from the weather. In the southwest, scenes of the U. S. Air Force Acadamy, the Petrified Forest




How does the pink get into pink champagne? Most likely it is produced by the addition of some red wine that comes from a region near the champagne vineyard. Sometimes, it comes from leaving the skins in the fermenting vat for a little longer than is usual. Most champagne is white, though, because it comes from grapes that may be red on the outside but are white on the inside. If it is made from an all white grape, it is labeled blanc de blancs and generally has a lighter taste than other champagnes and is very pale. Pink champagne is also lighter and dryer than regular champagne, and these light wines are usually more expensive than the regular old champagne. These days, light champagne is in vogue, wine people say, but experts agree that good wine is a matter of
