**THE RED WINGS** have signed a 30-year agreement to play in the river front arena presently under construction. The announcement, made Wednesday by Mayor Coleman Young and team owner Bruce Norris, ended speculation that the Wings would move out of the city and build their own arena in Pontiac Township. The Wings will not only play in the arena, but also operate it and the nearby Cobo Arena, now handled by the city. In turn, the team will pay \$450,000 a year in rent. The rent, coupled with \$1.3 million to \$1.7 million from parking and \$900,000 from ticket surcharges should gross the city approximately \$3.2 million annually.

Friday, August 5

**THE BODY OF GM** executive Carson McDowell, 43, was found in a field in Ferndale Thursday afternoon. Mr. McDowell, a resident of West Bloomfield, disappeared Wednesday morning when he left his home to attend a sales meeting at the Hyatt Regency in Dearborn. On Wednesday night Mr. McDowell's yellow station wagon was found on a Detroit side street about a half-mile from where his body was found.

**PRESIDENT CARTER'S** energy bill was approved by Congress yesterday. The program is designed to reduce fuel consumption by increasing its cost. Although the House didn't approve the entire package submitted, 90 percent of the President's program is in the bill. The final vote was 244 to 177. Ten of Michigan's Democratic congressmen voted for the bill, while all eight of Michigan's Republicans voted against it.

Sunday, August 7

**PRESIDENT CARTER** is asking Congress for \$30.7 billion to junk the public aid system, (welfare), and replace it with a program of jobs, tax breaks and cash assistance. The present system is so hopelessly incurable, Mr. Carter noted, that the word "welfare" should be scrapped along with the program, which is, he continued, shot through with "waste, fraud, red tape and errors."

Monday, August 8

**SECRETARY OF Transportation** Brock Adams predicts that gasoline prices may hit \$1 a gallon soon. "The price at the pump is already around 70 cents in many places," he noted. With the wellhead tax between four and seven cents a gallon and the proposed federal gas tax about four to six cents, prices will obviously increase.

Tuesday, August 9

**U.S. AUTOMAKERS** won the delay they were seeking on meeting exhaust emission standards, but a warning went along with it. The timetable included in the amended Clean Air Act will be enforced. The act extends the present auto emission standards for the next two years. In 1980 the tightened standards must be applied. "The automobile industry now has a firm timetable for meeting strict, but achievable emission reductions," said President Jimmy Carter. "This timetable will be enforced." The President signed the act in Plains, Ga., on Monday.

David V. Van Howe, of The Shores, was recently promoted to vice-president, administration and secretary, of the Stroh Brewery Co. Mr. Van Howe was secretary and treasurer of the brewery before his promotion. A native of Roseville, Mr. Van Howe holds a degree in accounting from the University of Detroit.

Six Establishments Suffer Broken Windows; Woods Police Investigate Incidents

A rash of broken windows at businesses along Mack avenue, all of which were discovered Sunday, August 7, around 1:30 a.m., is currently under investigation by Woods police.

Six establishments were victimized and, at this point, total damage to the windows could go into the hundreds of dollars, said Det. Thomas Podewzik.

The businesses vandalized include the following: Emil's Barber Shop, 19865 Mack, a four-by-four-foot window apparently shattered by a rock.

Checks Information Dante Coiffures, 19839 Mack, a six-by-10-foot window also believed broken by a rock.

Hartley's Country Lane, 20614 Mack, a 10-by-12-foot window was smashed.

Grosse Pointe Real Estate Co., 20087 Mack, a door window was broken.

## Pointe's Nutrition Site Strives to Meet Needs Of Its Senior Citizens

Program Provides Noontime Meals and Socialization But Participants Extend Themselves in Providing Other Services

"We're going to do great things," said Mary Ale, co-director of The Pointe's Wayne County-sponsored Nutrition Site for senior citizens, which will soon be incorporated into a non-profit corporation known as the OWLS, (Older, Wiser, Lovelier, Saner), in order to receive grant monies.

Actually, Mrs. Ale should have said "greater things."

While an average of 100 noontime meals, including some 15 home deliveries, are served Monday through Friday at the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, 19950 Mack avenue, the emphasis upon socialization and a variety of activities fills a more definite need—a chance to sit, talk and, more importantly, have someone to listen.

Await Decision This is already transpiring and, along with a variety of other plans, is an effort toward receiving grant monies under Title III of the Older Americans Act, administered by the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging.

In behalf of the OWLS, and with the blessing of the

Woods Senior Citizens Commission, a grant application requesting \$43,443 in the area of home services, i.e., limited chore and in-home support services to home-bound seniors, was submitted prior to the Friday, July 22, deadline.

A total of \$1.8 million will be available for all of Wayne County under Title III this year with 70 percent of the monies going to agencies based in Detroit while the other 30 percent will be distributed to county agencies outside of Detroit, said Laura Whidby, assistant director.

Big Day Crowning Beautification Commission Project Set for October 2

Dedication Day for the Woods Beautification Commission's "Veterans Memorial Parkway" project was unanimously approved by the council for Sunday, October 2, at 1:30 p.m.

This action was taken at the regular meeting Monday, August 1, based upon a request from Dr. Albert C. Howe, commission chairman.

After the approval, Dr. Howe was asked what would happen if it pours on the 2nd. "I hope at 1:30 it doesn't rain," he replied.

Not a Drop It certainly hasn't been "raining" on the commission up to now.

Dr. Howe said program planning is well underway with some military music components already being lined up. "We're still in the process of making up the program and we should fill the loose ends by the end of the month," he said. Then, the proposed program will be brought before the council for its approval.

Invitations have already been mailed to various dignitaries "out-of-town," stated Dr. Howe. These include President and Mrs. Jimmy Carter, Vice-President and Mrs. Walter Mondale, Congressman and Mrs. Lucien Nedzi, Sen. and Mrs. Robert Griffin and Sen. and Mrs. Donald Riegle.

State officials scheduled to receive invitations include Gov. and Mrs. William G. Milliken, Lt. Gov. and Mrs. James J. Damman, Attorney General and Mrs. Frank Kelley, Justice and Mrs. G. ## Woods Explores Plan for Sewer Improvements

Council Scheduled to Consider Proposal Affecting Entire Community at August 15 Meeting; Information on Storm Warning System Also to Be Eyed

With the news from the Wayne County Drain Commissioner's Office that no federal monies would be forthcoming for relief sewer projects in the city, the Woods Council authorized the formulation of a relief sewer capital improvement plan for the city.

The council, based upon a Committee of the Whole, (C-W), recommendation, at its regular meeting Monday, August 1, directed City Administrator Chester E. Petersen to prepare a plan of action for the repair of such sewers, plus alternatives for funding, e.g., under Chapter 20 of the State Drain Code or a bond issue, and overall costs involved.

While officials were basically viewing the northeast and southwest sections of the community previously, Mr. Petersen said his proposal will establish priorities affecting the entire city over a 10-year period. Estimated costs, he noted, would run into the millions of dollars.

The council is scheduled to consider this material at its regular meeting Monday, August 15, he stated.

Okay Resolution In March, the council unanimously approved a resolution authorizing the drain commissioner's office to apply for federal funds to construct a relief drain from the Milk River Drain to Woods lane.

This action was an outgrowth of City Engineer Larry Pate's report on flooding conditions stemming from the heavy rainfall last July 28-29.

The proposal, which had an estimated price tag of \$575,000 including engineering and contingencies, would have affected River road, Briarcliff drive, Van K drive, Perrien place, Canterbury road, Morningside drive, Wedgewood drive and Woods lane.

At the same time, the council, based upon a C-W recommendation, also authorized the formulation of a storm warning system program in the community.

In relation to this, Mr. Petersen said he hopes to have a report ready for the council's consideration on the 15th in relation to the number of sirens needed and cost factors.

## Decision On Horizon In Merger

Arbitration Ruling Expected This Week on City's Consolidation Plan

An arbitration ruling is expected this week on The City's controversial plan to consolidate its police and fire forces. The ruling will settle firemen's 1976-77 contract with the city and may, at the same time, determine the future of the proposed merger.

City Council approved an ordinance consolidating the two departments more than 10 months ago, but most of the efforts to implement the plan have been hindered by firefighters who are bitterly opposed to the merger.

The City was ordered by a circuit court judge not to go ahead with the consolidation until an arbitration decision is issued.

Optimistic View

The arbitrator, Inkster attorney Mario Chiesa, is expected to rule on The City's right to force firemen to take police training. Without the training, a complete consolidation would be next to impossible.

Firefighters' attorney Eugene Bolanowski said he expects the ruling "any day now." Although he noted that this is the first time such a decision has been rendered by an arbitrator in Michigan, Mr. Bolanowski said he is optimistic the ruling will be in the firefighters' favor.

"If they allow the city to order firemen to go to the police academy, why not secretaries or public works employees?" Mr. Bolanowski asked. "I don't see how we can lose."

In the meantime, negotiations with firemen on a contract for the new year, (1977-78), also have begun. Bargainers for both sides are currently in the process of selecting another arbitrator to hear that case.

And talks with the police department have started again as well, with the city set to make its first proposal on Thursday, August 18. (Continued on Page 7)

## Input from Residents Requested

Twenty-two Suggestions Scheduled for Official Adoption on August 22

The Board of Education is considering a new series of goals for the coming year that indicates a strong push will be made to tighten management control and zero in on basic skills in the classroom.

The trustees presented the "working draft" of 22 objectives for the 1977-78 school year to the public at their Monday, August 8, meeting. They invited public response to the proposals before they are officially adopted on Monday, August 22.

Although they are somewhat general, the administration has made an effort to tie the goals to specific programs and policies. Superintendent Dr. William Coats said he expects periodic progress reports to follow throughout the year at Board meetings.

Many Suggested

Similar goals that will direct operations in each school next year will be based on the Board-approved objectives, he added.

Among the 22 suggested goals are several dealing with management of the school system including one that calls for improvement of the quality of supervision of teachers, administrators, curriculum and budget.

Others suggested are a complete reorganization of central office departments, as well as development of a "Management by Objectives" model, and a new system of teacher evaluation.

Dr. Coats also emphasized his intention to improve administrative ties with employee groups next year, saying, "I realize I did not have the most effective relationship with the employee groups last year."

Curriculum is stressed in the document, and special efforts are included to improve student achievement in basic skills. The trustees are proposing a revival of the often debunked three R's—aiming for improvement of student writing and spelling, and stressing practical forms of expression and life skills.

SHS Complex Eyed

Career education, integrated into curriculum from kindergarten through high school, also is emphasized in the document.

A suggestion is made to publish a specific recommendation for improving the industrial arts complex at South High School.

The complex, which houses most vocational programs at South, is considered inadequate. (Continued on Page 2)

## Woods Suffers Loss of Power

Residents in the area of Roslyn, Vernier, Lakeshore and Marter roads were without power for over three and a half hours Friday, August 5, after a lightning strike brought down wires in the utility easement south of Anita avenue, near Goethe.

An estimated 650 customers suffered a loss of power from 5:29 to 9:10 p.m. when power was restored, reported Peg Furlong, of Detroit Edison's public information office.

Three crews responded to the scene with the first arriving at 5:55 p.m. A total of nine personnel including the general foreman worked toward restoring power.

When the initial call was received by the public safety department, Officer Michael Genereaux found a wire down at the rear of 1643 Anita. It was lying across a cyclone fence. (Continued from Page 1) call for invitations to be sent to the mayor and city managers in the Pointes, Harper Woods, St. Clair Shores and East Detroit. Schools, churches and area veterans groups also will receive them.

**"Living Memorial"**  
The council also gave its approval to the wording on the funding brochure and the certificate of appreciation for parkway donations from citizens and groups.

Exploring the background of the project, the funding brochure will note that contributions in any amount will be "much appreciated but contributors of \$100 or more will have their names inscribed in an elegant record book that will be kept on public display at the Grosse Pointe Woods Municipal Building."

Meanwhile, the certificate of appreciation will thank all citizens for their contribution, while saying the parkway "is a living memorial to those who served their country over the past 200 years."

Dr. Howe said the commission will contact several companies toward preparation of the funding brochure and "we'll see what prices we can get."

The brochure will be used as an insert in the Dedication Day program and also will be given in quantities to various groups and citizens.

**To Surge Ahead**  
While Dr. Howe will present an "impact statement" in relation to fund raising on the 2nd, and while citizens who wish to donate to the

parkway fund may do so now, he expects the overall procedure to be in "several surges" including another effort in the spring.

Citizens who wish to contribute to the fund now may send a check, made out to the "City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Memorial Parkway," to the city, 20025 Mack avenue, Grosse Pointe Woods, 48236, in care of City Administrator Chester E. Petersen.

This fund is distinct from the municipality's general fund and will be used for the holding and disbursement of monies. All contributions also are tax deductible.

West end work, (at the Harper Woods border along Vernier road), totaling \$9,962 including contingency, includes an early American style masonry brick wall and sign saying, "City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Veterans Memorial Parkway," plumbing, electrical service including

underground service and three floodlights, appropriate landscaping and flag poles.

**Heart of System**  
The council on July 11 also approved the transfer of \$2,850 from the maximum \$16,000 appropriated for first stage construction of the project for the inclusion of a three-inch irrigation tap. No date, however, was set for the tap's installation. Dr. Howe had earlier called it "the heart of the future irrigation system."

With this transfer, a total of just over \$3,000 remains to be utilized for any proposed east end work, (i.e., east of the Vernier-Mack avenue intersection), pending further recommendations from the commission.

Dr. Howe added recommendations for the east end will be forthcoming. For his part, he feels some identifying marker will be a plus factor.

Testing also would become a more important part of the curriculum in the schools, as the document suggests an extension of standardized tests to include high schools, at least in the areas of reading and writing.

In addition, an effort to develop original tests for courses not covered by the standardized program is suggested.

Other proposed goals include improved communication with parents and citizens, individualization of staff relationships with students and increasing overall involvement in the decision making process.

**To Take Seriously**  
The document is intended to set a general direction for the school system next year, according to Board President John Bruce.

(Continued from Page 1) cilman George S. Freeman at the C-W level, the solons moved ahead with the exploration of the system because of a concern over the well-being of citizens in the event a tornado approaches the community.

**Concur in "Rees"**  
In other action, the council also concurred in several C-W recommendations including the question of relocating fire hydrants located near driveway approaches, plus the proposed vacating of Kingsville avenue.

At this time, because of cost factors involved, the council decided not to pursue the hydrant relocation matter any further.

Mr. Petersen said around 62 hydrants are less than two feet from respective driveway approaches and another 21 hydrants are located from two to four feet from such approaches.

He estimated the cost of relocating the 62 hydrants at around \$30,000, plus another \$6,000 for relocating the other hydrants. At the same time, it was determined that other matters, such as improving the city's water and sewer system, deserved priority consideration.

As for the vacating of Kingsville avenue, the council set a public hearing date of Monday, September 12, to consider this proposal.

The council also concurred in a C-W recommendation appointing Charles J. Van Hove II to the planning commission for a term expiring January 1, 1978, along with the referral of the proposed property maintenance code to planning consultant Brandon M. Rogers for his review.

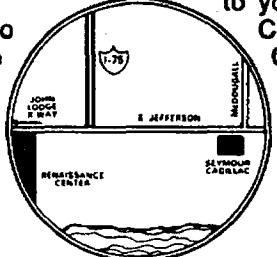

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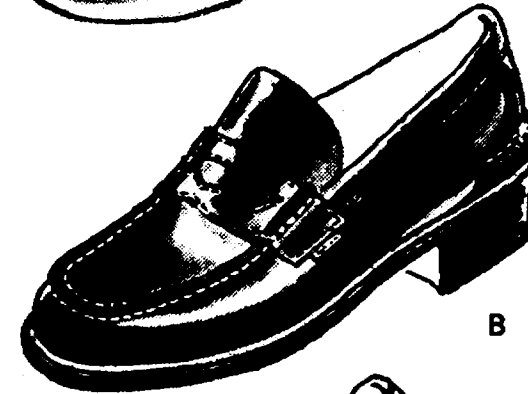

**Group Seeks to Aid Ducks**  
Ducks Unlimited, (DU), an  
organization which boasts a  
large and active Pointe mem-  
bership, reports because of  
drought conditions existing  
in Canada, a crisis exists for  
the duck and goose popula-  
tion.  
Under normal conditions  
there are approximately 13  
million "pintails" acres for  
waterfowl to visit and breed.  
However, this year, because  
of a severe drought, there  
are approximately two mil-  
lion of these habitat acres  
left for nesting ducks and  
geese.  
Forty years ago a group of  
privately financed conserva-  
tionists got together and  
formed DU to combat the  
devastating drought of the  
30's and inadvertently on its  
40th anniversary DU again  
finds itself battling the dis-  
astrous conditions of no  
water.  
In an effort to alleviate  
the situation, the Detroit  
chapter of DU's annual ban-  
quet for sportsmen/conserva-  
tionists will be held on  
September 22 at the Royalty  
House, 8201 East 13 Mile  
road, east of Van Dyke, War-  
ren, at 8 p.m.  
Last year's annual dinner  
raised over \$20,000 and this  
year's goal is \$25,000. Total  
prizes worth an estimated



## Pair Sentenced In Circuit Court

A youth and an adult man found guilty of offenses committed in The Shores were sentenced by Judge James N. Canham and one man's sentence was postponed. It was disclosed by Det. Sgt. Frank Mustazza on Monday, August 8.

Larry Anderlite, 18, of Yorktown road, was sentenced to three years probation, with the first 90 days to be served in the Detroit House of Correction. In the August 7, 1976, fatal traffic accident death of Mark Schoenith, 17, son of J. Lee and Shirley Schoenith, of Lakeshore road.

Young Schoenith was a passenger in Anderlite's car when Anderlite lost control of the vehicle and smashed broadside into a tree in front of 814 Lakeshore. Mark died in Bon Secours Hospital of injuries resulting from the accident.

Dennis E. Ogg, of Sterling Heights, who was found guilty of possession of PCP, an animal tranquilizer, was placed on two years probation.

Ogg was traveling on Lakeshore road on November 21, 1976, early in the morning when he lost control of his vehicle which left the roadway and landed 60 feet out into Lake St. Clair. He was rescued and brought to the shoreline with the drug found on his person.

Judge Canham postponed sentencing of Frank Michael Auito, 23, of East Detroit, who had been found guilty of third degree criminal sexual conduct. He was arrested on April 21 when he followed a 21-year-old woman home and attempted to rape her on her front lawn. His sentence was postponed to Wednesday, September 7.

## Nutrition Site Strives to Meet Needs of Seniors

(Continued from Page 1) rector of the agency on aging.

Fifty-four applicants, including 37 agencies in Detroit, are seeking funds. The final decision on distribution will be made around Thursday, September 8, she said.

### See What Happens

Aware that two application efforts for Title III funds under the auspices of The Woods failed to be approved, Mrs. Alek remains hopeful that the OWLS will be lucky.

"In the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods, there are 800 seniors below the poverty level, (earning an income of under \$3,000 per year), and I feel we can get some money under Title III," she said.

"There's no senior housing here. They have no place to go, having to live in their homes," continued Mrs. Alek. With many seniors having limited incomes, (she frowns at the thought of some that every Pointer is affluent), major expenses in the area of health, food and housing devour what money the citizens have.

"We went small, (in the amount requested), and let's see what we can do with it," she said. One thing is for sure, if the OWLS are fortunate enough to receive the funds, they will put the money to good use in serving the immediate needs of area seniors.

### "Senior Power"

The Pointe's Nutrition Site is one of over 40 in the county and, according to Mrs. Alek, is in the top three in volume of meals served.

Classes in macrame, weaving and copper enameling already are an ongoing feature, along with sing-a-longs, a variety of trips, bingo, blood pressure tests and speakers

on a wide range of subjects affecting seniors.

The future also bodes well on the activity front. Mrs. Alek hopes to establish several fund raising projects in the area of arts and crafts, plus a food cooperative wherein produce will be obtained, brought back to the site and sold to the seniors at a reduced price.

A comparative shopping effort is currently underway to inform citizens what local stores offer discounts on drugs. When the survey is complete, the information will be posted at the site.

"Somebody asked me why we're doing this," noted Mrs. Alek. "This is senior power as one of their big outlays of money is in the area of health."

She hopes such an effort might even lead to discounts for seniors at all local drug stores.

Phone Reassurance Another important aid toward benefiting area seniors has been in the planning stage for several weeks and will become a reality shortly after Labor Day — a telephone reassurance service.

We've already obtained a CETA, (Comprehensive Employment Training Act), employee, Vera Taroli, who will work four hours a day, (10 a.m. to 2 p.m.), five days a week, (Monday through Friday), as part of this program, she said.

Mrs. Alek said Christ Episcopal Church has donated a telephone with the church paying one-half of the bill and the OWLS, the other half.

Others helping to make this program a reality were the Grosse Pointe Kiwanis Club and the Mack Avenue Merchants Assoc. who donated funds to get it started, she stated.

The objective of the program is to make certain seniors in need, i.e., those who are alone or in bad health, receive constant checks by

the OWLS on a daily basis.

Mrs. Alek said when the service starts, Pointe and Harper Woods seniors will call a specific number, the OWLS will take down the information and then call back regularly.

### Meeting Needs

In fact, the extension of service and the meeting of needs on a one-on-one basis is what the site is all about.

Mrs. Alek cited specific examples of what the OWLS have done in this respect:

\* A man weighing around 250 pounds fell out of bed three weeks ago. His wife called the site for assistance and six OWLS responded and put him back to bed.

\* Many seniors are unable to visit the site because they lack transportation or are physically handicapped. The OWLS respond to their needs and go out of their way to pick them up.

\* A man who received a flu shot became paralyzed from the waist down and needed transportation to the hospital for treatment. Unable to receive assistance from other sources, he contacted the site and Mrs. Alek made arrangements for someone to take him to the hospital.

\* Another man, who is recovering from three heart attacks, needed aid in installing his air conditioner, which was in storage for the winter. No one was immediately available to assist, so the OWLS responded and installed the mechanism so the man could have necessary comfort during the hot weather.

### Someone Caring

"This is a daily thing," said Mrs. Alek. "Every day it's something different. It's been an exciting seven months," (in reference to the opening of the site at GPW Presbyterian late last year.)

Loneliness is prevalent in all aspects of society but is

more intensified when one becomes a senior citizen. Socialization at the site helps alleviate this emptiness.

"Just to have someone sit and listen fills a big need," said Marian Goodhand, who volunteers her service on a daily basis.

"Lonely people come and tell us this, (the site), was a God-send and how much they enjoy it," chimed in Adele C. Ryder, who also volunteers on a regular basis.

For those lonely citizens who are unable to personally visit the site for the noon-time meal and for socialization, the deliveries, plus the visit from someone who cares, are decidedly important.

"They look forward to the people coming," said Mrs. Goodhand. "If we are late, we will get telephone calls from the recipients."

### Restaurant Responds

While the OWLS remain ever responsive to serve seniors in need, a local business did a good turn on Friday, August 5, when, through a mix-up, only 65 meals were delivered from the county, leaving the group short by 35 lunches.

Because of the late hour, the county was unable to respond with further meals so Mrs. Alek, Mrs. Ryder and others put their heads together and, with the clock ticking away, decided to call the fast service Burger Chef, 18800 Mack avenue.

And as the noon hour neared, the restaurant came to the rescue by donating the 35 needed lunches with "all the trimmings," said Mrs. Alek.

"While the OWLS remain on call to respond to the needs of seniors in the community, Mrs. Alek indicated site personnel also require a few necessities including a typewriter, sewing machines and magazine racks. At the same time, speakers always are welcome to talk on subjects affecting seniors.

She said anyone who can help should call the site at 886-4532.

## Punch's Future Still Undecided

The fate of the Punch and Judy Theater still hangs in a state of limbo.

Robert G. Edgar, co-owner of the Punch, said that nothing concrete has transpired recently. There have been informal talks and ideas expressed, but nothing has materialized.

Shep Norton, former president of the Hill Merchants Assoc., confirmed Mr. Edgar's statements from the association's perspective.

However, concern over the future of the Punch remains strong.

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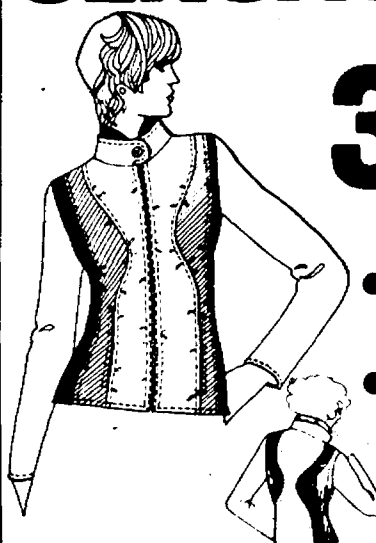



"It's all tied up in a big knot," said one police negotiator. "I don't see this public safety thing being settled for at least five years and, in the meantime, I don't know exactly what's going to happen to us."

**Eye Reductions**  
The City Council passed the consolidation ordinance last October, saying the plan could save the financially strained city \$80,000 a year by increasing the efficiency of the work force.

Under the plan, all personnel would be trained in both fire and crime fighting and assigned to street patrol, thus allowing for an eventual reduction in the work force.

Firefighters, though, claim that a consolidation would result in a reduction of services in both areas. They have

had backing from the International Firefighters Assoc. in their attempt to stop the merger.

Since October, all police officers in The City have taken rudimentary firefighting training, provided by Woods Public Safety Sgt. James Davidson.

Two members of the force, Public Safety Director Bruce Kennedy and Sgt. Richard Clarke, also have received more intensive training in a week-long session at the University of Michigan.

Francis J. McCann, 85, of Harper Woods, a former instructor and coach at University Liggett School, (ULS), died Sunday, August 7, in Boh Secours Hospital.

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**Wax Begonia Is A Bloomer**

Indoors or out, winter or summer, the wax begonia, (Begonia semperflorens), lives up to its Latin name: "everblooming."

Michigan State University horticulturists say that this fibrous-rooted begonia blooms almost continuously for years if it's taken indoors for the winter.

Outdoors, in containers or planted directly in the garden, it will provide large masses of summer color in white, pink, salmon, coral or red.

Wax begonias are succulent plants with fleshy leaves and thick, juicy stems. Leaves may be bright green, dark red or variegated with green, white and yellow. The plants branch freely but generally remain quite compact.

For indoor use, pot the wax begonia in a soil made of equal parts houseplant soil and peat moss. Let the soil dry slightly between waterings, and fertilize once a month with a standard houseplant fertilizer.

Place the pot in a spot that gets bright, diffused sun in summer, full sun in winter and temperatures a little on the cool side, with a minimum of 50 to 55 degrees F. at night.

Outdoors, pot in containers or hanging baskets or plant in the garden. Select a shady planting site and organic soil.

If you plant wax begonias outdoors and don't want to bother digging up entire plants to take indoors in the fall, take cuttings instead.

You can take cuttings anytime before the first frost. Portions of the stems root quickly.

Whole plants taken indoors in the fall should be cut back and rejuvenated. Remove about half the foliage, trim the remaining tips, shape the plant and fertilize.

To avoid infesting your other plants, treat any insect problems that may be present before you carry the plant indoors.

## Know Your Schools

Our discussion of the teaching of English, which has generated so much interest in the school community, continues this week and next with contributions from Alma Fleming, chairperson of the English Department of South High School.

"No easy answers exist to today's problems in English education, much as we would like to find them. English is a complicated field, and as yet, the specific skill problems of today's youth are largely undefined," she said.

"What specific skills for example are 85 percent of the University of Michigan freshmen lacking? What must they be taught in the remedial English they have to take their freshman year? What high schools are they from?"

"Of M needs to tell us before we know what to do. Just how effective is English in the nation's high schools? The state's high schools? Grosse Pointe's? What areas of English skill do students have and what do they need?"

"English encompasses writing skills such as spelling, punctuation, sentence structure, word choice, paragraph structure, unity, organization and coherence in a written piece; and reading skills such as visualizing, comprehending detail and main ideas, following an argument, recall, vocabulary recognition.

"It also encompasses listening skills which include the above 'reading skills' and note-taking as well; oral skills such as planning and presenting a speech, discussing as part of a group, leading a discussion; and the content of the literary heritage to modern work including the ability to read works perceptively, understand historical significance and philosophical implications.

"This list just touches the surface.

"So when colleges tell the public schools that the students need remedial English, we in the public schools need to know why. What skills do they lack? We have a similar problem with the SAT verbal scores.

"We need to have the Educational Testing Service tell us what specific verbal skills are low, and we need to know if they are significant skills. When parents are concerned about their students' ability in English, we need to know exactly what their concerns are.

"Presently we are lost in a morass of hearsay and innuendo in which it is difficult to pinpoint the area of need. The tendency has been to make a target of the English teacher with the impression that he ought to know better and try harder and straighten up and do the job right!

"Perhaps a teacher's confusion is understandable when he is asked the question: What would you do to improve the teaching of English in today's high schools? I am going to presume to answer this question on a small scale.

"Since I do not know what

is going on in all of the other school systems, and I do not know what the specific concerns of the colleges are, but I do know the Grosse Pointe High School picture and I do know the field of English, I shall make a calculated guess about ways we can improve here.

"From the conversations I have heard and the media statements I have read and heard, I have the impression that student writing is the present area of worry. My suggestions will therefore be directed toward improving the teaching of writing specifically and focused on the high schools' program.

"I think we must first realize that not all children in Grosse Pointe have equal potential in writing. We have some students in this school system who are seriously remedial and others below average.

"On the other hand, we have some extremely talented students. We have some students who are not very motivated in schools and others who are extremely so. Thus a good writing program must consider the needs of many kinds of students."

Next week Mrs. Fleming will present her suggestions for improving the writing program for high school students.

## July Heat, Low Rainfall Hikes Farms Water Usage

By James J. Njaim

This July was one of the hottest on record in The Pointe, reaching a high of 103 degrees on Monday, July 18, in comparison to a "cool" 96 degrees last July 15, according to official United States weather records kept at the Farms Water Filtration Plant, 29 Moross road.

The average temperature for all of last month came to 88 degrees, as compared to 84 degrees for the same month last year.

Drenching rainfall during the entire month of July 1976 amounted to 6.86 inches, whereas, last month, The Pointe area received only a mere 3.35 inches.

Another comparison views the total of water consumption recorded. Last month, records showed the water plant pumped a total of around 170,440,000 gallons to its local consumers as well as to The City, the Farms' only customer. This compares to 143,500,000 gallons during July 1976.

Darrell Schuurman, superintendent of the plant, released the following records of the temperatures, rainfall and water pumpage for the months of June and July 1976 and 1977:

June 1976—The hottest day occurred on the 14th, when it reached 92 degrees, and the lowest was 48 degrees, occurring on the 2nd. The average was not given. Rainfall, 3.18 inches, with the heaviest, .91 of an inch, falling on the 19th, and the least, .01 of an inch, dropping on the 27th.

Water pumped was 131,390,000 gallons, with the highest pumpage, 6,920,000 gallons, on June 14, and the lowest, 2,780,000 gallons, on June 1.

July 1976—The hottest day, 90 degrees, was on the

### GP Applies For U.S. Grant

As a result of talks last week with Wayne County, Farms officials are hopeful they will receive almost \$100,000 in federal CETA, (Comprehensive Employment Training Act), funds this year.

Farms City Clerk Richard Solak met with Wayne County officials Wednesday, August 3, to work out a new application for the federal public works funds. An earlier application was rejected by the county.

The City and Park have already received notification they will receive \$80,000 and \$99,000, respectively, from the CETA program for street resurfacing and other projects.

The Farms hopes to use its grant to make renovations on its water system to increase pumping capability to meet National Fire Underwriters standards.

The total project would be extended over a few years and cost close to \$400,000, according to Mr. Solak.

The Farms must now re-submit its application to the county, which administers the federal funds to small communities in this area. It will be several weeks before The Farms is notified of the application's final status.

15th, the lowest, 50 degrees, occurred on the 14th. The average for the month was 84 degrees. Total rainfall was 6.86 inches, with 8.13 inches pouring down on The Pointe area in one day, the 29th. The least rainfall was on the 2nd, a mere .01 of an inch.

Water pumped during this month amounted to 143,500,000 gallons, with the highest pumpage taking place on the 27th, and the lowest on the 4th, 7,800,000 and 2,750,000, respectively.

In June of this year, the highest temperature of the month was recorded on the 18th and 29th when the heat rose to 90 degrees on both days. The lowest temperature was 78 degrees which settled on The Pointe on the 24th.

Rainfall for the month totaled 2.92 inches, of which .61 of an inch fell on the 29th, and .41 of an inch fell on the 6th, 8th and 9th, the same measure dropping on each day, respectively.

Total water pumpage reached 134,472,000 gallons with the high day being the 27th when 7,610,000 gallons were consumed and the lowest, 2,528,000, was used on the 8th.

From this July 1 through 31, the heat soared to 103 degrees on the 18th and was down to a low of 55 degrees on the 2nd. There were 11 days registering heat over 90 degrees during the month, as compared to six during July 1976, according to Mr. Schuurman. The 17th saw the temperature at 102 degrees, he said.

As the records disclosed, Mr. Schuurman said, just 2.35 inches of rain fell last month. Of this total, only .9 of an inch fell on the 25th, and .02 of an inch fell on the 7th.

Of the more than 170 million gallons of water pumped last month, 8,000,000 gallons was the highest pumped in one day, the 14th, and the lowest, 3,340,000 gallons, was pumped on the 1st.

Two musicians who have been ranked among the giants of jazz for longer than many of their present fans have lived share the jazz concert stage at Meadow Brook Music Festival this Friday evening, August 12.

They are Maynard Ferguson, with his special M-F trumpet and band, and Buddy Rich, one of the world's foremost jazz drummers, with his Killer Force combo.

The weekend's festival programming also brings to Baldwin Pavilion, as guest conductors of the Detroit Symphony Chamber Orchestra, Otto-Werner Mueller and Philippe Entremont.

They will conduct tonight and Saturday evenings, respectively.

Soprano Roberta Peters guests with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in a Sunday evening pops concert, to be conducted by Philip Greenberg.

Buddy Rich, one-time child vaudeville star and veteran sideman of a number of the most famous of the Big Bands, including one of his own, keeps the average age of his combo at about 24 and plays no arrangement more than six months old, just to be sure he is on top of contemporary tastes in the rapidly-changing jazz scene.

In that respect, Rich and trumpeter Maynard Ferguson have much in common.

"I believe in change," Ferguson says. "I never try to re-create an image of yesterday in my music. Everything we play is new, with new rhythm and new experiments."

"Even the few old standards we play have been re-arranged to create a new, 'today' feeling."

Ferguson has been acknowledged for decades as one of the leading trumpet players. He has been a band leader as well as sideman with a number of the world's big bands.

His most recent album, "Primal Scream," had higher sales figures in its first five weeks than any of his previous albums enjoyed in a year. The album is controversial in jazz circles, but, as one critic put it, "Maynard and the band do what they do so well—turn everybody on."

Tonight's classical concert features Garrick Ohlsson, pianist, as guest artist in a program consisting of Copland's Appalachian Spring Suite, Bach's Piano Concerto in D minor, Weber's Konzertstück and Stravinsky's Pulcinella Suite.

The Saturday Chamber Concert will present Bizet's Symphony in C, Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 1 in C and Haydn's Piano Concerto in D.

Only lawn tickets at \$5 are available for the Ferguson-Rich jazz concert, according to Leon C. Petrus, festival managing director.

Except for Sunday evening pops concerts at 7:30 o'clock, all evening concerts at the festival's Baldwin Pavilion on the Oakland University campus begin at 8:30 o'clock.

Pre-concert dining is available at adjacent Trumbull Terrace, which offers sit-down dinners by reservation, or buffet. A large party tent may be reserved by groups for pre-concert dinners or afterglows.

working with programs for wives of professional men. Clearly, these women wanted—NEEDED—something more than they were getting via the occasional continuing education course.

Clearly, what they wanted—needed—was direction: help specifically tailored to their specific situation: a program of their own.

So off Jude went to the University of Michigan, to ask what research had been done on these women as a group. Not much, she found. But she also found that there were a great many of them and that, almost to a woman, they were increasingly interested in developing their personal competence, quite apart from their roles as wives, mothers, community volunteers or employees.

So . . . for these women, the University of Michigan Detroit Center has designed a new program, first of its kind in the country. It offers a variety of scholarly pursuits, all aimed at defining today's woman's image of today and herself, in relation to the past and the future.

How do I know where I am until I know where I have been? How do I know where I'm going until I know where I am? Seminar College: An Academic Interlude is designed to put the woman who asks these questions into her own picture.

As a continuing educational experiment, Interlude is unique in that it requires an eight-month commitment on the part of each student.

Decision-making: that's the big thing," explains Jude. There are so many choices open to these women—Shall I get a job? Shall I go back to school?—that the easy choice is not to choose, to leave one's options open . . . and, ultimately, opt for nothing.

Interlude requires a choice: a commitment of eight months. Within that framework, it offers courses in Literature, Mathematics, Theology, Architecture, Aging and Work, seminars in History, Humanities and Economics.

Classes will be small, so that interaction with University of Michigan faculty can help students gain confidence in their ability to master, and question, contemporary wisdom in several fields.

Campus will be Detroit's Rackham Memorial, surrounded by libraries and museums, maintaining its own branch of the U. of M. library system . . . and opening a new, enclosed and attended parking garage this fall.

The class "week" will be two days, Mondays and Wednesdays, with lectures, seminars, library and counseling periods and special events scheduled between 10 in the morning and 2 in the afternoon.

There is no upper age limit. There are no academic pre-requisites. Some Interlude students may be high school graduates, others may have their Bachelors degrees. Others may have done graduate work.

Tuition is steep, \$528, but in line with graduate school fees—and one is unlikely to become a \$500 drop-out.

The class year will run September 26 through April 26. An opening seminar will provide an overview of the proposed course of study and give students a chance to ask questions.

## Cut Flowers Can Use Help

A fresh flower arrangement will last much longer with a little special care. Here are some suggestions from Jesse Saylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University:

With a sharp knife or shears, cut your garden flowers early in the morning or late in the evening. At this time they are crisp and turgid with water.

Place the flowers in a bucket of warm water, (110° F), immediately after cutting. Leave them there for two hours, then arrange them.

If you can't arrange them right away, store them in water in the lower half of the refrigerator, with plastic over the top.

Always be sure to select a clean container for your arrangement. A proper con-

tainer, together with a commercial flower preservative added to the water, will help the flowers live longer, as well as, placing the arrangements in a cool place at night.

After her fifth child was born, and she had full-time help, and she was becoming tired of "just going downtown once a week," Ruth got a call from Kerby School. Would she PLEASE consider coming in as a substitute once in a while?

After eight years of subbing, in 1961, Ruth took on a permanent job—but after noons only—at Brownell.

The afternoons turned into all-days in 1962.

Ruth Paulson retired this spring as a Mathematics teacher at Grosse Pointe South High School. She'd been there three years, and her schedule this past year had been light, for she was winding down as she'd wound up.

Was Very Convenient

She taught at Kerby when her own children were in it, and at Brownell when her own children were in it, and both schools were extremely convenient, for Ruth lived, and still lives, in the heart of The Farms, in Lothrop road.

And the Teague children, Dwight, Doug, Sue, Bruce and Lucy, thought it rather fun to go to school with their mother.

Until Lucy got old enough for high school, Lucy went to South, her mother to North, which suited Lucy just fine: a typical teen, she'd decided she'd just as soon enter high school solo.

Ruth, like Lucy, was ready for high school. "I enjoyed working with ninth graders most, so when North opened, I went there."

The Teagues are grown now, and all independent. Doug, Bruce and Lucy, who has three children of her own, live nearby. Dwight is in Toronto, Sue, a round-the-world traveler, in Portland, Ore.

They Remain Close

"I'm very close to all my children," Ruth maintains. "I'll miss the kids I've been teaching, but my family has always been the most important part of my life."

Ruth's boys were rather a noisy part for a while. They are, and were, all motorcycle enthusiasts. Doug, a Chrysler engineer, spent two weeks in Europe this spring visiting Bruce, a mechanic with the 1977 Grand Prix races.

Dwight's still into motorcycles up in Toronto.

When they were growing up, they spent a lot of time at home: that's where their motorcycle workshop was. "Do YOU know where your children are?" Ruth never had to worry much about that. She knew.

A Native Detroit

She's a native Detroit, a Southeastern High School graduate and a graduate of Wayne State University. Her undergraduate major was Math, her minors in Music and Social Studies. She also attended Central Michigan University.

She's a square dancer. That's how she met John Paulson. They've been married five-and-a-half years, and he's been retired one year from Vickers.

"We read, we garden, we spend time with the kids," John has one daughter, who lives in Chicago. "We like to travel. We had our first taste of European travel last summer, and we want more—but we'd like to go some-

place and STAY for a while."

May Trade Homes

They're thinking in terms of a house trade, with a London family, for example. They'd also like to visit the northwest, and pay a call on Sue. "And we'd like to explore Florida for the winters."

As a retiree, Ruth's looking forward to not seeing 6:30 in the morning. "Eight-thirty, yes; six-thirty, no!" Among her favorite memories is a day early in her teaching career. "I had a class that didn't show up."

She was at Brownell, where William Christofferson was in his first year as principal, and when her first morning class was absent, en masse, Ruth stuck her head out in the hall to find out what was what, and what she found was Mr. Christofferson, and what he said was, "They've got to be somewhere. Let's look around."

"We found them in Evelyn Toll's room," (Mrs. Toll, also retiring from the School System this year, is among the subjects profiled in the second of this year's Retired Teachers "Pointers of Interest.")

The class had brought refreshments, potato chips and pop, and a gift, a gold pin with an ivory rose, and a note saying, "Thank you for helping us."

Ruth cried.

Had Her Own Credo

"True education is more than filling a child's mind with statistics and facts. I feel it is developing an awareness of the world in which they live. I believe in encouraging them to face realities."

That was Martha Graham's credo for 40 years at Trombly School, and the children she taught, some of them the children of children she taught, (Healey and Marshalls, LoCieros and Drettmans), were richer and stronger for it.

Also: they loved her.

Martha, born in Battle Creek, graduated from Albion College, (she has also attended Wayne State University), began her career in a second grade at Battle Creek's Lincoln School.

She came to Grosse Pointe, and to Trombly, as a second grade teacher, but it's the third grade that's been her bailiwick for years.

Special Classroom

Mrs. Graham's classroom has always been a special place. Her second year here, she won a Merit Award for a community-centered project: The Building of Pierce.

Her class followed the progress of the new school, visiting it every two weeks or so to see how things were getting on, documenting its rise via drawings and photographs and written reports—and, in the process, learning spelling words and math and the practical application of knowledge.

They grew to know the workers and the materials. They watched the heating system go in. Observing cause and effect, they made con-

nections, and The Building of Pierce was the base on which Martha built her students' school year.

And how they learned! Reading, "riting and 'rithmetic aren't the only things students learned in Mrs. Graham's classroom. In the past 25 years, her classes have earned over \$1,500 via Red Cross Bookmark sales.

Earned Their Gifts

Martha stressed the importance of EARNING money for the annual Red Cross drive. The bookmarks were made from scraps, and left-overs—"we recycle material!"—and sold in the children's own classroom store.

More than one Trombly second grader voiced his preference for Mrs. Graham's third grade class "because of the bookmarks."

For the past three years, her students have assisted LINC, (Linking Individuals to Needs in the Community), by stuffing toys for children in foster care homes. Mothers were drafted into service, too, to do the fine sewing, and "old" materials were recycled.

"I feel that children learn by doing for people less fortunate than themselves." What the Spirit of Giving is all about has been one of the Golden Learning Experiences in Martha Graham's classroom.

Another Tradition

Her booties are another tradition. "When a child has a new baby brother or sister, the child makes a card, and the child and I send the card and a gift the teacher has knit for the new baby."

Martha was especially delighted when one of the children for whom she knit booties turned up a few years later in her class.

Her own special hobbies are candle making, creative stitching and handwork—and fly tying for trout fishing. If she hadn't been a teacher, she might have tried for the stage. She was very active in dramatics in high school and college, the only freshman ever asked to join her college's Dramatic Club.

No simple ingenue roles for Martha, though! Character parts were always her forte.

She Has Big Plans

Now, "as any retiree—or, I should say, as most retirees—I plan to travel, read, and do all the things a busy, active career has kept me from doing." She and Harry will be staying on at their home in Harper Woods, at least until he retires. When Mr. Graham leaves Fruehauf's Government Service Division, Martha and he would love to take a long, leisurely trip through the northwest.

Everybody who has ever known Martha Graham is delighted she chose teaching over acting. Nobody can believe she won't be back at Trombly next year.

The school's Parent Teacher Organization gave her a farewell reception in early June. Mayor Mathew C. Patterson proclaimed Martha Graham Day in Grosse Pointe Park.

Given Surprise Party

The third grades hosted a surprise party, with a special program planned and executed by music teacher Mary Jane Pavlak, who had some of the children dress as the children of 40 years ago, taught them the Charleston and led them in songs celebrating Mrs. Graham and her love for children. There were poems, too, and recitations,

The children are what Martha will miss most about teaching. "I think, if you're a true teacher, they're your life."

She finds today's third graders sharper than their parents. Perhaps it's television, perhaps simply the '70's Way of Life... whatever, "their vocabulary is fantastic."

Ruth Paulson, whose oldest grandchild will start school in September, agrees. Ruth was struck recently when her three-year-old grandson informed her that a circle has no sides.

"That would never have come from kids 10 years ago," Ruth says, and Martha nods. It never would have. And sharp children are a joy to teach... but it's not the child's sharpness that brings the teacher joy.

It's the child.

Discuss Space Travel Holly Angell, a NEWS reporter a few years back, was one of Mrs. Graham's third graders. The class was discussing space travel, and Martha mentioned that she was sure she'd never do it—she was too old—but she was equally sure that some of the boys and girls sitting right there in that class would.

Martha also mentioned that the one thing she regretted about missing out on space travel was experiencing it. She'd like to feel it.

Mrs. Graham always had a mailbox in one corner of her classroom. The idea was to

dents the opportunity to choose concentration courses and major electives.

There will be research and writing projects, but no exams. In consultation with appropriate faculty members, goals for a commencement portfolio will be set.

Each student will have a faculty advisor, available all year for advice and consultation. A counselor from the U. of M. Center for the Continuing Education of Women will provide guidance for students interested in university degree programs—or confer with them on other personal concerns.

Twenty-four Continuing Education Units will be awarded upon completion of the 30-week, 240-hour program. For women who decide to go back to school, some of these CE Units may translate into college credits.

For women who decide to take a different approach to "what am I going to do with the rest of my life?" the commencement portfolio will provide tangible evidence of Interlude achievements.

Pointers are heavily represented on the Interlude faculty. Eugenie Beall, Ph.D., a former "Pointer of Interest," is instructor for "Literature of the 20th Century." Bob Roney, M.A., A.I.A., will lead a course in "Architecture as a Key to Man's Development."
