Thursday, September 8

PRESIDENT JIMMY Carter formally agreed yesterday on national television to turn the Panama Canal over to Panama at 12 noon on December 31, 1999. Panama's Omar Torrijos accepted the agreement. Of course, Mr. Carter and Mr. Torrijos don't have the final say in the matter. It is now up to the U.S. Senate and the Panamanian people to approve the agreement. When Mr. Carter returned to the White House after the signing ceremony, he was greeted by demonstrators protesting the canal treaties.

Friday, September 9

ZERO MOSTEL died last night at the age of 62. The veteran stage and screen actor, most famous for his role of Tevye in "Fiddler on the Roof," died of a cardiac disorder in Thomas Jefferson Hospital, Philadelphia. He had been admitted to the hospital Saturday, apparently suffering from a virus, but was released the next day. He was readmitted later Sunday complaining of feeling ill. As a young man, Mr. Mostel was an artist and started acting only to make money to buy paints.

Saturday, September 10

THE NATION'S governors adopted a resolution yesterday, supporting President Jimmy Carter's welfare reform package. At the National Governor's Conference, held last week at the Detroit Plaza Hotel, they also elected Michigan's Gov. William Milliken to head the coming year. Forty-five of the 54 governors of the states and territories turned up for the conference. This was the first time the conference has been held in Detroit.

Sunday, September 11

SENATE DEMOCRATIC leader Robert C. Byrd, of West Virginia, thinks that Burt Lance should have a chance to tell his side of his banking story and then resign. President Jimmy Carter concurred with Mr. Byrd's suggestion. Mr. Lance will have his chance to explain his side of the allegations to the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee today, September 15. Mr. Byrd said the damage to the President from the Lance affair was "not irreparable" now, but could become so if Mr. Lance were to stay in office.

Monday, September 12

DETROIT TEAM-sters voted unanimously yesterday to accept the city's contract offer, officially ending a three-day strike. The Teamsters involved were from Local 214 representing garbage truck drivers, other city drivers and meter maids. This was the second work stoppage this summer by the 1,300 members of that local. The strike resulted when contract discussions stalled over the issue of holiday pay.

Tuesday, September 13

THREE OF PRESIDENT Jimmy Carter's top aides saw an FBI report last January on Burt Lance's huge overdrafts but never told Mr. Carter about it. Jody Powell, the president's press secretary and closest friend, admitted that he was one of the aides involved. The disclosure came yesterday that the other two were political adviser Hamilton Jordan and Robert Lipshutz, counsel to the president. Mr. Powell explained why they didn't tell the president — "We didn't see it as anything to be concerned about."

Center for Arts, Crafts Dedicated

Over 200 Attend War Memorial Assoc. Ceremony for New \$150,000 Project

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Assoc. dedicated its new Center for Arts and Crafts Wednesday evening, September 7. Over 200 people attended the ceremony to view the exhibit of works by members and former members of the art faculty in the new center.

The center was built as the north wing of the Alger House. It took five months to construct and cost approximately \$150,000.

"It's, (the center), a tremendous addition to the community," said John Park, president of the board of directors of the War Memorial. "No other community has anything like it."

"The War Memorial is used by over 250,000 people annually and I'm sure the addition of the arts center will increase that number. I'm very proud of our efforts."

Grosse Pointe Jaycees Begin Program Toward Helping Young People

New Idea for Local Organization Is Jay-Teen Chapter for Boys, Girls, 13 to 18 Years; Meeting Scheduled for September 29 to Get Project Off Ground

It's something new and the Grosse Pointe Jaycees are excited about it. For the local chapter has never done anything like it before although both the state and national chapters have such a program. What is it? A Jay-Teen chapter for Pointe young people, both boys and girls between 13 and 18 years of age.

"It's designed for teenagers who will set up their own programs, while we give them direction, get them off the ground and give them the support they need," said Bill Marr, program chairman. "The teen chapter will follow the Jaycee concept—individual leadership growth through community involvement."

Calling this the first Pointe area organization for teens, Mr. Marr said he's in the process of contacting public, private and parochial schools regarding their interest and support. At the same time, he's planning on getting in touch with Grosse Pointe Volunteer Probation Program personnel and the Youth Service Division for further input.

Eyes Personal Growth
Several goals are in the minds of the Jaycees, who have been discussing such a program for the past few

years, for the teen project, he said.

"One is to help the young people become more aware of the beauties and values of Grosse Pointe, while another is to increase their personal growth," stressed Mr. Marr. He felt the latter was very important and cited, as an example, a youth, who has participated in such a program, acquiring necessary leadership qualities which will bode him, (or her), well upon entering college.

Through such a project, contributions also will be made directly to benefit the entire community.

As planned, the Jay-Teen chapter will be directly patterned after the parent chapter with its internal and external program emphasis.

Internally, self-improvement, leadership dynamics and public speaking, (including giving all youngsters an opportunity to pursue this area), will be viewed, while (Continued on Page 4)

Presence Felt
The training meetings are scheduled to be held on Thursday evenings from 8 to 9:30 p.m. from September 29 to October 27. Those interested may write the probation program office, 15208 Mack avenue, Grosse Pointe Park, or call 885-8228 between 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Pointe municipal judges refer offenders whom they feel are candidates for probation to the program.

School Board Okays \$23.7 Million Budget

Mill Tax Rate of 38.72 Also Approved to Finance Document; Board President Says Trustees Live Up to Millage Campaign Commitment in Relation to Statement

The Board of Education approved a new \$23.7 million budget for this school year, along with a 38.72 mill tax rate to finance it, at its Monday, September 12, meeting. The budget provides for no major new programs in the schools this year but, nevertheless, calls for an increase in spending of about 11 percent in general fund accounts.

Board President John Bruce said the document allows the trustees to live up to their millage campaign commitment to "maintain current programs with a renewal of the tax rate."

Pointers will finance almost 95 percent of the budget through local revenues expected to total \$20.8 million this year. That is a 5.8 percent increase over last year's local revenues.

Revenues Up, Down
From the state, the schools will receive about \$880,350 this year, up about 12 percent due to expansion of the Title I program for special education.

County revenues will be down about 40 percent next year, to just \$160,000, because of cutbacks in special education funding that most severely affected programs for trainable mentally impaired children.

The Board will spend \$11.5 million on basic instruction in elementary, middle and high schools. An additional \$1.4 million will provide special education, athletic and adult programs.

Administration will cost a total of \$1.45 million.

The largest single cost increase next year will be in employee benefits — up 156 percent due to new retirement, optical and dental insurance plans. Salaries will increase four percent; purchased services, 14.4 percent; supplies, 10 percent; and equipment, 21.8 percent.

Improvements Eyed
Although it is generally a maintenance budget, the document does call for some program improvements.

The Board will fund the summer program for trainable mentally impaired children that was formerly financed by the county.

About 2,000 Elms Fall In GP Park Since 1952

Since 1952, The Park has lost a total of 1,980 stately elms to the dread Dutch Elm Disease, 991 on city-owned property, and 989 on private property, at a cost of many thousands of dollars, according to information released by City Manager Robert A. Slone.

The latest report submitted by the city manager showed that so far in 1977, there has been a loss of 102 elms on city land and 115 on private property due to the blight.

At its June 13 session, the Park Council authorized the expenditure of \$1,670 to remove 11 diseased and dead elms owned by the city. During its July 11 meeting, it

OWLS Fail In Bid for Grant Funds

But Senior Citizens Plan to Try Again, While Exploring Various Avenues

While the OWLS, (Older, Wiser, Lovelier, Saner), of The Pointe's Wayne County-sponsored Nutrition Site for senior citizens failed in its attempt to obtain grant monies under Title III of the Older Americans Act, the group, tossing discouragement aside, is currently exploring further grant application avenues.

"We're disappointed but we'll try again," said Mary Alley, site co-director, after receiving news from the Detroit-Wayne County Area Agency on Aging, program administrators, that the OWLS' application for \$43,443 in the area of home services was denied.

Noting that preparation of the application was a "mind-boggling" experience, (besides being an initial effort, she said it was a 40-page document), Mrs. Alley said the next time "we'll be more sophisticated about it, it will be better thought out and we'll know what to do." At the same time, she indicated less funds would be requested next year.

Not Enough Money
Mrs. Alley and her colleague, co-director Diane Heavner, are currently participating in a seminar on applying for grant monies.

They also are expecting a list of grant outlets affecting seniors from Congressman Lucien Nedzi's office.

In a report from the grant review committee to the agency's board of directors, four other out-county agencies besides the OWLS failed to receive funds, while 15 Detroit agencies were excluded. The main reason was because there wasn't enough money to go around and demand for funds was high.

This pattern has remained consistent in the past as two application efforts for Title (Continued on Page 4)

Brys Drive Congestion Eyed Again

Woods Council Hears Concerns of Estimated 70 Citizens over Vehicular Flow, Speeding, Noise

An estimated 70 citizens who live in the area encompassing Old Eight Mile road and Brys drive appeared before the Woods Council at its regular meeting Monday, September 12, seeking relief from heavy vehicular traffic on their streets.

A similar group addressed the council in December 1975 expressing concern over the safety of their children, the traffic flow and ensuing noise. Several steps were taken at that time by the public safety department, including monthly reports submitted to the council by Public Safety Director Henry Marchand on traffic flow and violations issued.

However, while the residents indicated some initial improvement in the interim, they also stressed that the situation has worsened on the traffic, noise and pollution fronts.

View Enforcement
At the same time, they complained over an alleged lack of enforcement on the public safety department's part over previously instituted steps, e.g., the use of "No Truck" signs, and stop signs.

Nancy McQueen, of East Eight Mile road, originally sent a letter dated Tuesday, August 30, to "Newsweek" seeking action "because we know of instances where only you were able to overcome the obstacles and 'red tape' confronting people in similar situations." As of Monday evening, she indicated she has received no response from the Channel 7 "News-hawk."

Besides the letter from Miss McQueen, the council also viewed a reply from Director Marchand and a petition bearing 80 signatures from citizens in the immediate area seeking assistance.

The residents, many of whom were obviously frustrated and angry over the situation, were asked by Councilman George Cueter why it took months for them to reappear before the council if the problem was so bad?

One of the nation's leading portrait artists and a dedicated teacher, Mr. Maniscalco is in "Who's Who in American Art" and recently won the audience choice at the Mainstream's 77 International Exhibit. The fee is \$45 for 10 weeks.

Weaving, which the War Memorial with its new facilities is able to offer for the first time with the purchase of a dozen four harness macomber looms will be offered Thursdays, September 22 to November 17, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The instructor is masterweaver Urban R. Jupena, BFA, Philadelphia College of Art and Penland School of Crafts, MFA, Cranbrook Academy of Art and head of the Textile Department, Wayne State University. His works are exhibited in New York and eastern galleries as well as in Detroit.

The class is open both to beginning and advanced students. The fee is \$65.

Three Art and Craft hobby classes will be presented Mondays beginning September 28. Miniatures executed on tile or canvas glued to masonite will be taught by Mrs. Watson I. Ford, a past president of Grosse Pointe Artists Assoc. The fee is \$21.

Potichomania, (decoupage on glass), gold leafing and etching will be taught by Louise Hoyt, known nationally for her organizing and jurying of decoupage shows.

There will be two classes on Mondays beginning September 28, one in the morning from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and another in the evening from 7:30 to 10 p.m. for those em-

played during the day. Students may combine potichomania with gold leafing and etching or work in only one media on bowls, plates, lamps, et al. The fee is \$26.

Sculpture will be taught Monday evenings, September 28 to November 28, from 8 to 10 p.m. by Frank Varga, member of the National Sculpture Society whose works appear in many important private and public collections.

Students will be working in water clay from life. The instructional fee is \$40 plus a model fee.

Children's and young adults' Art Classes begin the week of September 28 under the direction of Mrs. Carol Jenks Lachiusa, who is both a water colorist and a sculptor.

She studied at the Cleveland Institute of Arts and has taught both in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools and in private schools.

It should be noted that all students in the young people's classes are asked to meet with Mrs. Lachiusa for an interview with a sample of their art work on Saturday, September 17, between 9 a.m. and 12 noon.

On Mondays, September 28 to December 21, from 4 to 5

p.m., six-to eight-year-olds will learn to observe, use their imaginations and work in many media. The fee is \$21 plus \$4 for materials.

Then, on Wednesdays, September 28 to December 21, from 4 to 5:30 p.m. children ages nine to 11 will meet to learn the basics of sculpture, drawing with pencil and charcoal, and how to mix paint and apply it. The fee is \$29.50 plus \$6.50 for materials.

A special young adult class will be held Thursdays, September 29 to December 22, from 4 to 5:30 p.m. This more advanced class for high school students will stress use of oils and detailed drawing of the figure. The fee is \$29.50 plus \$6.50 for materials.

Jewelry Making and Enameling will be offered for the first time in the New Art Center. Advance enrollment is mandatory for these classes in order to arrange for the necessary equipment and supplies.

Classes are scheduled for Tuesdays, September 27 to November 29, from 1 to 4 p.m. and in the evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. They also are set for Thursday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m., September 29 to December 1.

Renee Adams Schulte, the instructor, studied at the fine arts department of the University of Dayton, at the Center for Creativity where she got her degree and in Paris for a year.

Students will learn design and how to work with precious metals and stones. They will be able to make rings, necklaces, chains, pendants, earrings and enameled accessories. The fee is \$45 plus \$5 for a starter kit of materials.

Water color classes with Ingrid Hofer as instructor will be held on Thursdays, September 29 to December 8. They are scheduled in a morning series from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and in the evenings from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

Mrs. Hofer is listed in "Who's Who in American Art," and "Who's Who of Women." She received her art degree at the University of Hamburg, Germany. Mrs. Hofer asks students to bring a sample of their work to the first class.

She works with each student individually at their own level and provides still lifes from which to paint. The fee is \$45.

Daniel Rosbury's classes in Painting Composition in Oil and Acrylics has been moved from Mondays beginning September 26 to Fridays, September 30 to November 18, from 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. because of a change in his college teaching schedule.

He is on the faculties of both Wayne University and Eastern Michigan.

A protégé of Robert Wilbert, he stresses structural development of the picture plane using examples of existing painting past and present. The student will develop a full understanding of materials and thoroughly learn the layering process. The fee is \$40.

E. Petersen also said his office has not received any calls from area citizens regarding the situation in the immediate past.

As a result, officials were under the impression the situation as expressed by the citizens in December 1975 was at least no worse.

Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos, in noting the city's many awards for pedestrian safety from the AAA, said the residents, by their attitude, indicated that the problem remains and perhaps has worsened.

Saving the situation will be further investigated, the

mayor stated he wanted input from Mr. Petersen and the public safety department. At the same time, this matter is scheduled to be placed on the council agenda in 30 days so the situation can be reassessed.

In the meantime, Mr. Petersen announced a five-point program, apparently pleasing some residents, which will receive immediate attention.

A meeting will be arranged within the next 30 days with traffic safety officers in The Woods, St. Clair Shores and Harper Woods. (The problem as cited by the citizens not only affects The Woods but stems from the traffic flow in the other communities.)

Enforce the law and ticket commercial vehicles in that area. (The problem of trucks, along with campers, motorcycles and other vehicles on residential streets was a big concern of the residents.)

Obtain new traffic counts and compare the results with other streets in The Woods.

Planning consultant Brandon Rogers will be informed of the situation, which will be included in his report, scheduled to be ready in about 90 days.

(Councilman George S. Freeman told the citizens that the Planning Commission and Council approved the hiring of the firm of Parkins, Rogers and Associates, with one of the firm's main charges being a study of traffic flow in the city.)

Discuss the possibility with St. Clair Shores and Harper Woods of making a one-way street in the immediate area, plus the possibility and feasibility of constructing cul-de-sacs at one or more streets in the area.

On the enforcement front, Mr. Petersen also made it clear that the public safety department will be directed to give the location special attention in this respect.

Miss McQueen, who took a leadership role in the new thrust, was hopeful after hearing Mr. Petersen's five-point plan but is currently taking a wait-and-see attitude.

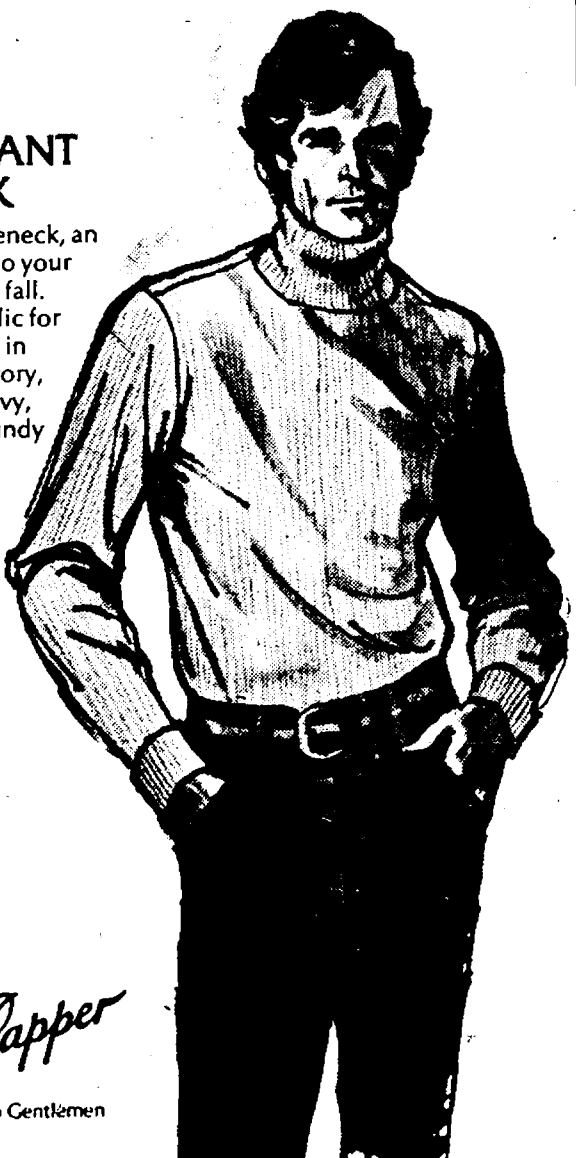

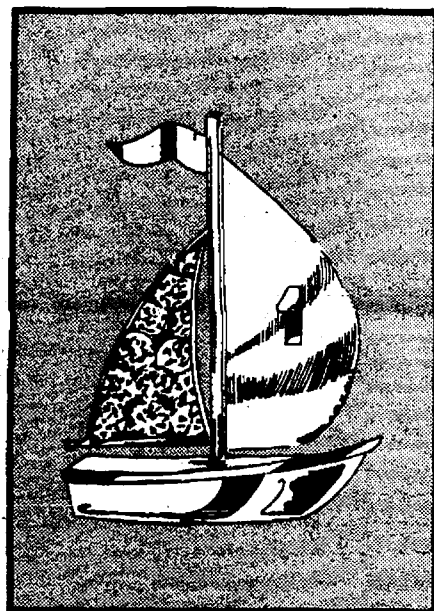

Woods Reaches Two-Year Agreement with Sergeants

Woods sergeants and city officials have put their signatures on a two-year contract earlier this month bringing to a close a long negotiation process which began the first part of the year.

We were able to amicably work out any differences toward reaching an agreement, said City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, while Sgt. James Davidson called the contract "a fair settlement for both sides."

The sergeant also said, "We're sorry it took so long (to reach a settlement). I hope the next bargaining session is shortened up via better communication."

The pact, retroactive to July 1, 1976, is a non-professional package unlike earlier professional packages received by the officers. Three sergeants are affected by the agreement.

The patrolman's contract was adopted by reference with the sergeants receiving all the fringe benefits in that agreement, said Mr. Petersen. (The council ratified a two-year contract, also retroactive to July 1, 1976, with the patrolmen in April.)

In fiscal year 1975-76, when the sergeants were on the professional package, they received an average of \$19,775 per year including overtime.

Under the non-professional package, which includes overtime pay, holiday overtime, et al., the sergeants will receive \$20,375 in fiscal year 1976-77 and \$21,375 in fiscal year 1977-78.

With the addition of another holiday in the 1976-77 fiscal year making the total 10, the sergeants will get paid for all overtime over an average of 40 hours per week, noted Mr. Petersen.

They will be paid for overtime when they are shift commanders at time and a half for a maximum of 15 minutes, he continued.

"Like the patrolmen, they have the option now of converting one half of their unused accumulated sick leave into pay each fiscal year by June. And they must return a minimum of 15 sick leave days in their bank," he said.

GETS NEW POST

Father John Nienstedt, son of the John Nienstedts, of Mount Vernon road, will serve as appointments secretary to the archbishop under a new archdiocesan reorganization plan. Father Nienstedt was ordained in 1974 at Sacred Heart Church, Dearborn.

The pact also incorporates a cost of living bonus and health care, (i.e., Blue Cross-Blue Shield, dental), among other areas.

Mr. Petersen added, in relation to the sergeants, the city has had memorandums of understanding regarding professional packages since around 1971, with the officers becoming an officially recognized union last year.

The department's four lieutenants, meanwhile, are still in the bargaining process with the city. Mr. Petersen said the city just received a counter-proposal prepared by the lieutenants' attorney which will now be reviewed.

Det. Lt. Jack Patterson noted earlier this week, "Things don't appear to be too far apart."

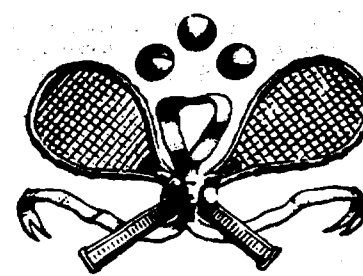

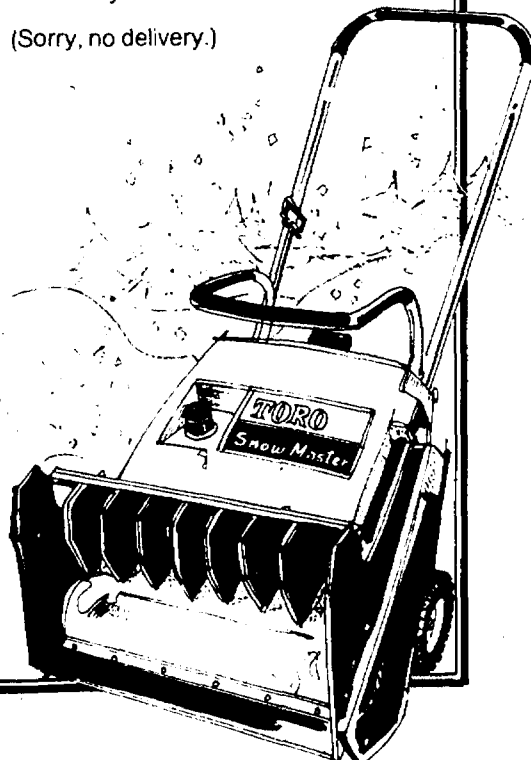

III funds under the auspices of The Woods failed to be approved, basically for the same reason. However, there's a strong feeling on the part of many officials and citizens alike that "Grosse Pointe equals wealth" and such isn't the case.

Citing the problem of limited funds, the grant review committee said it wasn't possible to make allocations to every applicant. A total of 54 agencies applied for \$4.1 million in monies, while only \$1.8 million was available.

Out-county agencies received a total of \$540,000 for social services in comparison to proposals reaching \$974,000, while Detroit agencies received \$1,260,000 in comparison to requests totaling \$3.1 million.

Views "Stigma"
In each case in citing out-county and Detroit agencies who were excluded, the committee noted, "The final selection was most difficult because many of the proposed services detailed within the grant applications are greatly needed by seniors in order to maintain dignified and independent lives."

Adele C. Ryder, who volunteers her services on a daily basis at the site, represented the OWLS at the agency's meeting announcing the results on Thursday, September 8.

Noting that around 110 individuals including representatives from applying agencies attended the session, Mrs. Ryder stated, "They said those agencies not receiving money should keep applying. They also suggested that we write our senators and congressmen regarding increasing the money allocated for funding programs."

In relation to the denial of the OWLS' application, she feels, besides the fact that enough funds weren't available, that there's a "stigma attached to us" regarding an application originating from Grosse Pointe.

Despite this, Mrs. Ryder said another try should be given next year to "show we are still in existence."

Have Bazaar Booth
With the nutrition site providing a variety of services for area seniors thanks to the consistent efforts of the site directors and many hard-working volunteers who

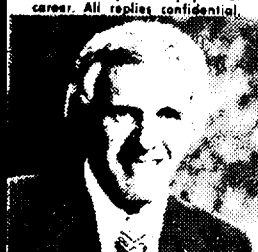

Jury Finds Two Guilty of Theft

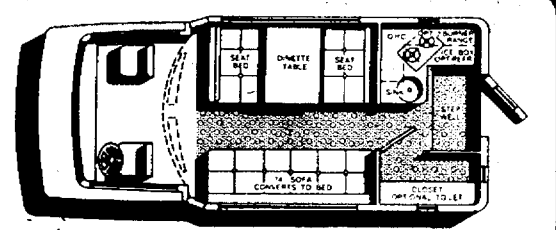

Detroit Gets Prison Term

A 20-year-old Detroit man was sentenced to from one to two and a half years in prison on an attempted receiving and concealing stolen property over \$100 charge, reported Woods Det. Thomas Podeszwick.

Mark Raymond Marcin was recently sentenced by Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Joseph B. Sullivan, stemming from an incident on May 31.

At that time, Marcin was arrested after police responded to the Saint John Hospital parking lot on a burglary of a vehicle call.

A hospital employee said he spotted four men loosening the tire lugs on a van which had been reported stolen to Utica police the same day. Upon seeing the employee, the men ran to a blue van and fled from the scene.

The arrest was made several hours later when patrolling officer John Harwood spotted a blue van going north on Mack avenue. A check of the license number proved it to be the van in question. It was stopped at Mack and Cook and its five occupants, including Marcin, were transported to the station.

Date Changed For Pre-Trial

The pre-trial of a 28-year-old Detroit woman, who's charged with robbery armed with a gun, was adjourned from Thursday, September 8, to today, September 15, reported Woods Det. Thomas Podeszwick.

With the adjournment, the pre-trial of Suzanne Barber, of Washburn, will be held the same day as that of Roderick Simpson, 28, of San Juan, Detroit, who's facing a similar charge. The pair are both accused of the robbery of Bijouterie, Inc., 19860 Mack avenue, on July 2.

In the incident, an estimated \$115,000 in precious stones and around \$3,000 in cash were taken. About \$2,000 in missing jewels were subsequently recovered.

GP City Officer Elated Over Conclusion of Case

An array of 18 witnesses, including a Detroit police officer and a Michigan state trooper, apparently convinced two men accused in a June 21 felonious assault on a City policeman to plead guilty before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge James N. Canham Thursday, September 8.

The sentencing date was set for Wednesday, October 19.

Awaiting sentence are Norman Wilson, 27, of 5369 Belvedere, and David V. Merrill, of 1035 Navaho, both of Detroit. The pair were found guilty of attempting to run over City Sgt. Duncan MacEachern, who was off duty at the time, in a shopping area of a Mack avenue business store in The Farms.

Sgt. MacEachern, whose arm was in a cast on the date of the assault, was delighted that so many witnesses had arrived at the courtroom of Judge Canham to testify against Wilson and Merrill.

"This, without a doubt, gave me an overwhelming feeling of elation that so many people arrived to testify against the accused men," he said.

"I deeply feel that when they saw so many people in the courtroom ready to take the witness stand, if they were called, that it led to the fact that these men felt they had no chance. I am sure that this is why the two pled guilty before a trial started."

"Added to this is the investigation made by (Farms) Det. Sgt. George Van Tien, and the officers of his division in making the case air tight. They certainly did a terrific job and my sincere thanks go to them."

On the June date, while at the rear of the Mack shopping center, Sgt. MacEachern, whose arm was in a cast as a result of a fracture received while subduing a violent prisoner, attempted to stop Wilson and Pierce when their vehicle sideswiped two parked autos.

An unidentified citizen shouted that the pair had just stolen four wheel covers,

valued at a total of \$300, from another car.

The sergeant identified himself, when the police officer stopped the pair and ordered them out of their car, they refused and started to drive away. The officer reached into the window and grabbed the driver around the neck with his good arm.

The driver, it was not disclosed who, backed up the automobile, forcing Sgt. MacEachern to release him or have himself crushed between two cars.

The policeman ran to the other side of the car and opened the door, reached in and tried to remove the ignition key and was grabbed by Wilson and Merrill. The officer was pulled into the car, assaulted then thrown out of the rear door, landing on the pavement.

The driver then backed up the vehicle. The sergeant rolled out of the way but he was struck by the open rear door. He was hit again by the door as the driver drove the vehicle forward.

Off-duty Detroit Patrolman Michael Thomas, who heard the commotion while shopping in a store, and State Trooper John T. Korzek of the New Baltimore Post, who was flagged down by concerned citizens, assisted in the arrest of Wilson and Merrill.

Sgt. MacEachern was taken to Saint John Hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises and to have his cast reset.

Woods Judge Resigns Office

Judge George N. Bashara Jr., of The Woods, has resigned as member and chairman of the state advisory commission to the Office of Substance Abuse Services, (OSAS), according to an OSAS news release.

Judge Bashara cited his election as chairman of the Judicial Education and Training Advisory Committee for the Supreme Court and an increased case load as reasons for his resignation.

He previously served as vice-chairman of the advisory commission to the Office of Drug Abuse and Alcoholism for two years and was the first and only chairman of the OSAS Advisory Commission.

In addition, Judge Bashara has been active in many community based substance abuse programs and agencies.



Board Okays New Budget

hired in the high schools to allow for additional writing assignments to students in the mandatory 10th grade writing workshops. In addition, funding for vocational programs, high school newspapers and research testing will be increased.

The Board approved the budget Monday after discussing it at four open meetings, including a public hearing on August 22.

Although few residents attended the August meetings, two disgruntled citizens showed up Monday to express concerns about class sizes in Montclair and Trembley Elementary Schools.

They were assured by Superintendent Dr. William Coats that as soon as enrollment in the system begins to stabilize for the year, the problem of oversized classrooms will be resolved.

Libraries Get More

This year, for the first time, class size ceilings are included in the Board's contract with the Grosse Pointe Education Assoc.

The \$865,897 public library budget, also hit hard by additional costs for employee benefits and supplies, will increase 12 percent next year.

A change in the state aid formula will boost the Michigan funding of the libraries by about 49 percent, to \$31,100 this year.

The entire package will be paid for by a 38.72 mill tax rate throughout most of The Pointe. (One mill equals \$1 per every \$1,000 of State Equalized Valuation of property.)

In Grosse Pointe Township, (The Shores), the tax rate will be one mill lower. Residents of Stanhope and Allard roads in The Woods will pay a 38.38 mill rate.

Elms Topple in Park

county thoroughfare, and two located in Mack avenue, which also is under county jurisdiction.

The Wayne County Road Commission's (WCRC), policy not to remove blighted and dead elms until sometime in the fall was waived due to the pressure put on the commission by Ervin Steiner, Pointe representative on the Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

Mr. Slone disclosed that due to the efforts of Mr. Steiner, the road commission has removed the 10 elms in Jefferson, and is scheduled to cut down the two in Mack within a few days.

Because of Mr. Steiner, the city manager said, the city has extended its full cooperation in moving up its schedule in removing 12 elms touched by the blight.

Mr. Slone said as fast as diseased and dead elms are removed, trees of varied species have been planted, to replace them under The Park's tree replacement program.

The city has a small nursery of its own at the Three Mile Drive Park, which in its own way helps to keep down the cost of tree purchases each year, he said.

The city manager also revealed that from 1952 through 1967, The Park customarily sprayed its elms twice a year in their dormant and foliage state with DDT. Because of the toxic nature of the chemical, which killed birds, this was discontinued.

Since 1968, the city has been spraying elms with methoxychlor, and then only during the trees' dormant stage. This chemical is less potent and therefore less harmful to wildlife.

The loss of city and privately owned elms last year reached 212, as compared to 217 this year.

Time Clocks Eyed in GPW

While the president of the Grosse Pointe Woods Police Officers Assoc., (GPWPOA), indicated the union might take action regarding the city's proposal to install time clocks for most employees, the president of Local 1121 of Council 23 of AFSCME, (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees), AFL-CIO, is awaiting an opinion from Council 23 on the matter.

Phil Cadieux, president of the local, said he doesn't know what action, if any, might be taken by the union until a ruling is received from Council 23. The local includes membership from public works and administration employees, two of the groups affected by the proposal.

Besides the public safety department, parks and recreation personnel also are affected.

City officials indicated the installation of time clocks would offer a method toward accounting for all employees' time and aid toward determining specific amounts of overtime put in by the employees.

GPWPOA President Stephen Petrik indicated his union would probably fight it either by an unfair labor practices charge and/or by filing a grievance against the mechanisms are installed.

Calling the planned installation "a complete change of working conditions" not discussed in bargaining, the officer said the department will possibly be the only one in the state, if not the country, to have time clocks.

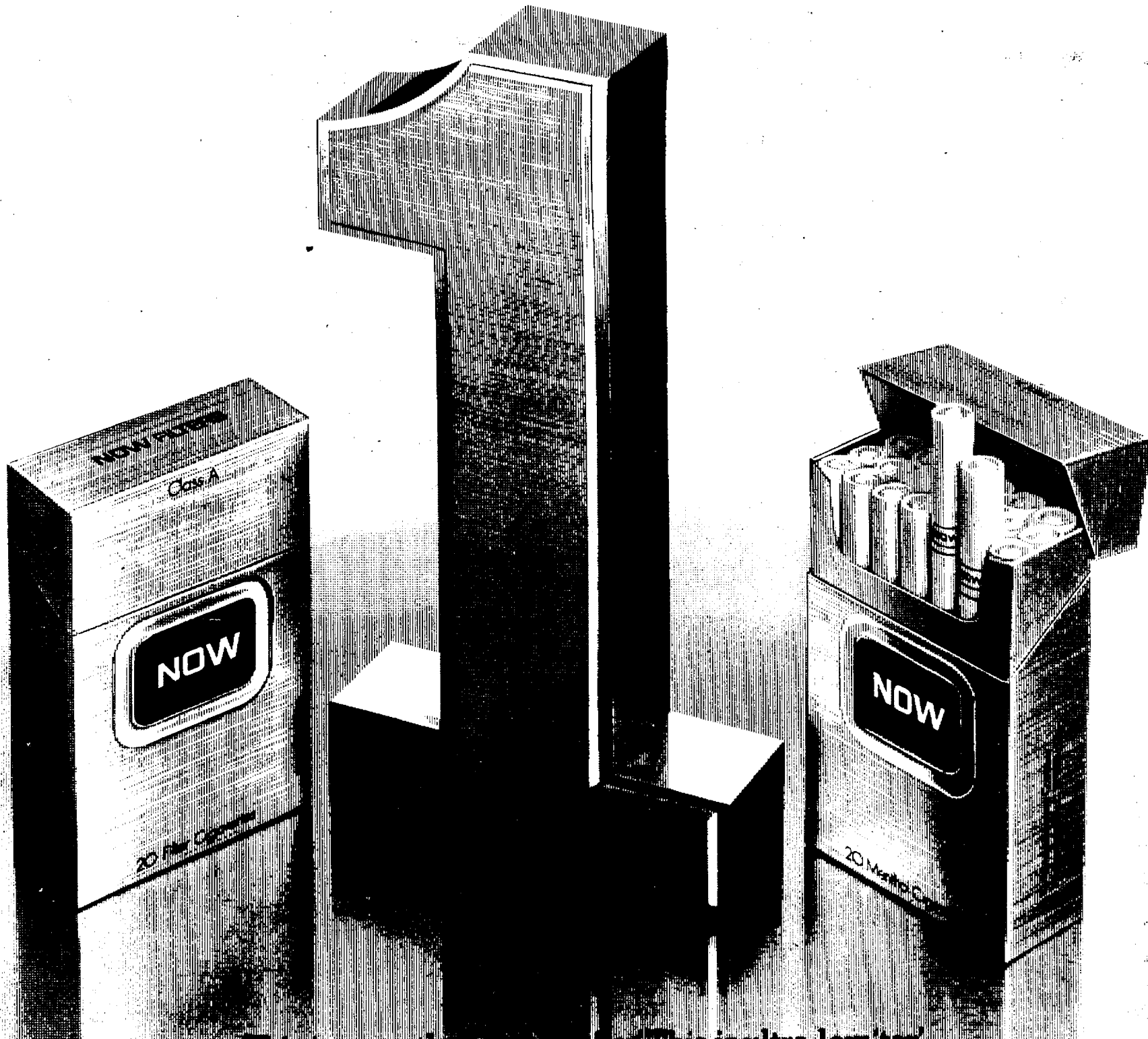

The camera visits Varna, Bulgaria, and the former home of Queen Marie of Rumania at Balchik.

Featured are the charming Greek Islands of Rhodes, Patmos and Mykonos. Of special interest are ruins of the early "Mayo Clinic" Epidaurus, and Corinth, the most opulent, luxurious and lascivious city in ancient Greece.

The Spanish portion of the movie covers Malaga and the famous Alhambra at Granada.

A tour is made of the little-visited island of Malta, as well as a drive around Gibraltar and the exotic city of Tangier, Morocco.

There are lovely views of the Azores, visited by only five cruise ships a year.

A reception for Cinema League members and their invited guests follows the performance.

The league welcomes new members, at the nominal dues of \$5 a year. Members take turns supplying refreshments for the social hours following each program.

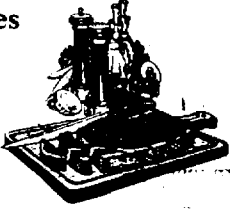

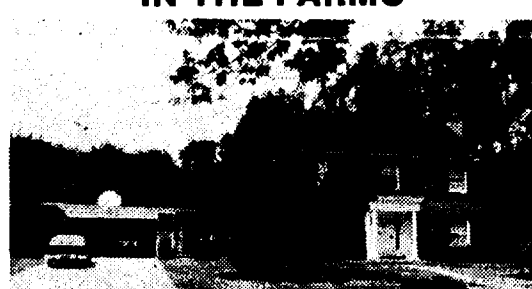

Detroit Symphony Eyes Challenge Grant

If the Detroit Symphony is successful in raising some \$3 million in new monies during the next three years, the orchestra will be the recipient of \$1 million in matching funds from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Under the terms of a recently announced Challenge Grant program involving \$27 million in federal funds, the DSO is one of only six major orchestras in the United States to qualify for an NEA matching grant of \$1 million.

The purpose of the grant is to assist the orchestra in a program to stabilize its financial position by developing new and increased sources of continuing income.

Both new monies raised and challenge grant dollars are earmarked for long-range financial development programs which include reestablishment of a reserve fund to help cover operational expenditures and help meet cash flow problems, increased endowment funds and increased annual contributions to help solve the problems connected with meeting general inflation and yearly budget increases.

Commenting on the NEA Challenge Grant, DSO President Robert B. Semple, of Beacon Hill, states: "We were delighted to learn that the Detroit Symphony has been singled out to receive a substantial amount in the NEA Challenge Grant program."

"I must point out, however, that dollars received during the challenge grant period will be used as insurance for the orchestra's continued existence and are not intended to supplant other vital fund-raising activities which support the orchestra's artistic and educational projects."

"More than one-third of the total grant, for example, must be allocated to our Endowment Fund as a condition of receiving the grant."

"This long-desired increase for our Endowment Fund will help bring the orchestra closer to the level of the more heavily endowed orchestras of the nation."

Philip Caldwell, Ford vice chairman of the board and chairman of the Symphony's 1977 drive to raise \$1.5 million, notes the three-to-one grant "could help us reach the \$1.5 million goal."

"Our committee raised nearly \$1 million during the drive's first eight weeks. With half-a-million yet to go, I hope that the three-to-one matching program of the National Endowment will encourage new donors to contribute as well as traditional supporters to dig a bit deeper so that their gifts of 'new money' will enable our symphony to capitalize on the grant."

"The grant should be especially helpful this fall in our solicitation of foundations and in our direct mail campaign to new donors."

An example of new money stipulated in the award, Mr. Caldwell points out, is the amount of the increases for 1977 over 1976 made by several corporate donors.

Another example of new money would be receipts from the City of Detroit's garage sale which were given the orchestra for the 1977 fund campaign; as no such contribution was made in 1976, the 1977 gift is eligible.

Kingston Trio to Launch 'Lighter Side' at Center

The War Memorial's gala "Lighter Side of Life" series opens Tuesday evening, September 27, with the Kingston Trio.

A black tie dinner will be served in the Crystal Ballroom overlooking the gardens and Lake St. Clair at 7 p.m. The performance follows in Fries Theatre, 32 Lakeshore road, at 8:30 p.m.

In 1957, three young men, Bob Shane, Nick Reynolds and Dave Guard, decided to form a group called the Kingston Trio. They selected that title because their music had a calypso sound to it and the name "Kingston" evoked Jamaican vibrations.

They were playing night clubs in the San Francisco area and were booked at San Francisco's Purple Onion for a one-week stand.

That week turned into a standing-room-only, seven-month engagement.

The trio was the first group to perform popular songs in the folk style with strong rhythmic background and their own unique brand of folk music and entertainment.

caught on quickly.

While playing an engagement in Hawaii, "Tom Dooley" hit. The trio cut short its engagement and returned to the mainland to go on a nationwide tour. One of their stops was the famous engagement at San Francisco's Hungry "i".

The Kingston Trio's first LP was a huge success and they were on their way to becoming a household word.

"Tom Dooley" was one of the biggest record sellers of the year in 1958 and it was followed by hits like "Tijuana Jail," "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?," "Scotch and Soda," "Rev. Mr. Black," "Greenback Dollar," "The MTA" and others.

As the trio's popularity grew, they appeared on the top network TV shows and performed to packed houses around the world. The trio also was enormously successful on college concert tours.

In all, the Trio has no fewer than seven gold albums to its credit.

During the trio's rise to the top, they met John Stewart, a performer and songwriter. When Dave decided to go his own way in the spring of 1961, John joined Nick and Bob.

Finally, after years of overwhelming success, the three members of the trio wanted to change their music style but discovered that they were confined by their own image. They decided to part ways. On June 17, 1967, exactly 10 years to the day after they had gotten together, the Kingston Trio broke up.

John is now performing as a solo artist. Nick, who decided not to continue a career in music, is living in Oregon. And Bob, after a few years as a single performer, decided that the trio should not have ended.

And Bob's back, with Roger Gamble and George Grove, to see that the Kingston Trio lives on.

Further programs on the series include the Fiesta Folklorica—a splendidly costumed and colorful troupe of 32 singers, dancers and musicians from Mexico including mariachi, marimba and jorochob bands which will appear on Fries stage Thanksgiving eve, Wednesday, November 23.

Harry James with his big band will be featured in concert on Thursday, October 13.

The series will conclude with a special cocktail party preceding dinner on Thursday, December 8, a concert by Tommy Dorsey's band led by Buddy Morrow and dancing until midnight in the Crystal Ballroom.

Pass System Set At Bon Secours

Bon Secours initiated a visitor pass system on Monday, September 12.

In order to visit patients, outpatient services or other hospital departments, hospital visitors must receive special passes from receptionists at the lobby information desk.

Everyone entering the hospital will be given a pass which will allow them access to hospital areas. The lobby entrance is located off Cadieux road.

Visitor pass systems are used to enhance patient environments, because patients often find it uncomfortable to be surrounded by too many visitors at once.

To reduce this patient discomfort, Bon Secours' patients will receive two visitors at a time. Should someone wish to visit a patient who already has the maximum number of visitors, the receptionist will call and inform the patient that a visitor is waiting.

Children under 14 are not allowed to visit patient rooms nor can they be left unattended in the lobby.

Since 1972, Bon Secours has been involved with an extensive expansion of hospital and community services. Construction and renovation caused the hospital's layout to change periodically and made a visitor pass system impossible.

Now that the renovation is complete, Bon Secours may join other area hospitals in this common hospital practice.

Know Your Schools

Anyone reading a headline on the front page of the September 1 issue of this paper, "Disappointment Expressed over Demise of Middle School Athletic Proposal," (outlining a proposal for a \$75,000 program presented by two citizens at the August 8 regular meeting of the Board of Education), might gain the wrong impression of the status of the schools' program for the 1977-78 year.

Athletic programs did not "take quite a beating" as the Board of Education hacked away at accounts in order to balance the books for the coming (school) year in the mid-August budget sessions.

Those who followed the budget development process are aware that since last spring some school district revenues are higher than anticipated, while others are lower. The same is true of proposed expenditures.

However, the net effect of these puts and takes was a reduction in funds available for new program development.

The middle school athletic program for the coming year as well as all other athletic and academic programs in the district—are the same as or better than they were in 1976-77. This position is consistent with the Board of Education's commitment made to the public at the time of the millage renewal election in March.

As was pointed out during the August 8 meeting, and as has been made public numerous times in recent years, the Board of Education is attempting to implement recommendations made in the final report of the community-wide Athletic Study Committee which met from June 1975 until January 1976. Since it received the report, the trustees have put into practice a number of its recommendations.

Headed by William Mogk, principal of Pierce Middle School, a sub-committee studied the area of athletics in the middle school. Consultations were obtained from each middle school physical education teacher to ascertain their thoughts on interscholastic athletics, tri-school athletics, intramurals and the role of the coach or supervisor.

Research was conducted on middle school athletic programs in neighboring school districts, tours were made of our system's athletic facilities, parents were interviewed and financial information on the middle school athletic programs was amassed.

From what I regard as an outstanding data base, the Athletic Study Committee made the following recommendations that:

"1. The Board of Education announce as policy its commitment to intramural programs at the middle school level in the absence of a bona fide middle school interscholastic program.

"2. The Board of Education dedicate itself to sustaining a very thorough interscholastic program for all grades and sexes at the high school level.

"3. The daily physical education program for middle schoolers be more clearly defined and scheduled.

"4. A system wide, coordinated intramural program be developed for each middle school as an outgrowth of

the regular physical education program.

"5. Two to four activities for each grade and sex, (if not coed), be agreed upon to have tri-school competition for more talented youngsters in the activity. (The cost of the tri-school activities would be approximately an additional \$1,000/school.)

"6. The intramural program has emphasis on skill building and techniques as opposed to a pure recreational-type activity. (This is not to say that coaching would take place as in an interscholastic activity but it should not be a "choose up sides, let's play" approach either.)

"7. Wording in the Master Contract be changed to insure that adequate school personnel are actively involved in the program. (The committee believes that the more directly involved the physical education teachers are, the better are the chances of success for the program.)

"8. Consideration be given to altering the amount of pay for persons involved in the intramural program.

"When an adequate intramural program is functioning, serious consideration should be given to an interscholastic program for the middle schools."

Presented to the Board of Education in February 1976, the staff and trustees have been working steadily toward implementation of these recommendations since then.

Given limited revenues for the immediate future, competitive interscholastic sports at the seventh and eighth grade level are not a matter of the highest priority at this time.

However, we are continuing to study the matter and hope to be able to make some inroads as soon as finances are sufficient to expand current programs.

What Goes On at Your Library

"A story, a story, tell me a story!" — familiar words to any parent. Parents, then, should take note, the library will again be offering Story Hours for both pre-school and school-age children starting in October.

School-age Story Hour — 45 minutes of stories, games, songs and movies—is offered once a week at all three agencies right after school at 4 p.m. The program begins the first week in October and continues every week until the end of March.

At the Woods branch, Story Hour is every Tuesday at 4 p.m. starting October 4; at The Park branch, its every Wednesday at 4 p.m. starting October 5; and at the Central Branch, its every Thursday at 4 p.m. starting October 6.

Registration for school-age Story Hour is not necessary, but children should be ages six and older. Further publicity will be distributed through the schools in late September.

Pre-school Story Hour for three and a half to 5-year-olds starts the first week in October also, and runs for eight weeks until the end of November.

Morning and afternoon programs are offered at all three branches. Due to the large response, pre-schoolers must register in advance. For further information, call your nearest branch—The Woods at 881-2640, Park at 822-2336 and Central at 884-2200.

For those who can't wait until October, here are some read-aloud suggestions that are sure to make a hit. First, some suggestions for pre-school students.

THE THREE BEARS AND FIFTEEN OTHER STORIES. (Crowell, 1975), is selected by the talented author-artist Anne Rockwell. This is a timeless treasury of old familiar folk tales beautifully illustrated with clear, bright water colors on every page.

This delightful collection includes the wonderfully scary "The Three Billy Goats Gruff" as well as "Henny Penny," "Lazy Jack" and "The Shoemaker and the Elves," and, of course, "The Three Bears." Its a perfect lap book for families to share and treasure forever.

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH CARRUTHERS? (Houghton Mifflin, 1972). What's the matter with Carruthers? What indeed? nothing appeals, nobody can please him. All the well meaning efforts of his good friends, Emily, a motherly pig, and Eugene, an amiable turtle, only make the big bear groucher.

But wait, something quite dramatic takes place and the two friends realize it's just a matter of time till their sleepy friend is his old sweet self again.

James Marshall, creator of the irresistible **GEORGE AND MARTHA** delights us all again with this amusing account of "true blue friends."

THE FAT CAT. (Parent's Magazine Press, 1971). An amusing rendition of the traditional Danish folk tale by Jack Kent. A tale of a cat with a voracious appetite told with a marvelous refrain that will have your listeners chanting along with you. It is perfect for reading aloud.

AT MARY BLOOM'S. (Morrow, 1976). Another charming book by the well-known children's illustrator Alike. At Mary Bloom's, there is a fantastic array of animals — dogs, a cat, an owl, a skunk, a magpie, a monkey, hamsters, a gerbil, a rabbit and some mice, not to mention the Baby.

Children will enjoy the humorous scenes of chaos and confusion when a little girl comes to call and announces that her pet mouse has just had babies. The simple text makes this an ideal book for older brothers and sisters to read aloud to younger ones.

A WISE MONKEY TALE. (Crown Publishers, 1975). An amusing "trickster" tale boldly illustrated by Betsy and Giulio Maestro. One day as Monkey is walking through the jungle eating a banana cake, she falls into a big hole and can't get out.

Children will delight in Monkey's devious scheme which leads to her escape, leaving some rather shameful animals behind.

For school-age children we carry the following:

STREGA NONA. (Prentice-Hall, 1975). An old Italian tale, retold by the popular author-artist Tomie de Paol.

Strega Nona—"Grandmother Witch"—has many magic secrets including a marvelous magic pasta pot.

Mr. de Paola's hilarious account of magic gone berserk will remind many readers of the Sorcerer's Apprentice. The colorful illustration with many humorous and sly details will appeal to every child's sense of the absurd.

THE BOOK OF GIANT STORIES. (American Heritage, 1972). Children love to be scared and the pictures alone of these enormous giants and other gruesome creatures are guaranteed to make spines tingle. Actually, it's a matter of "his bark is worse than his bite."

Despite their tremendous size and strength, these particular giants are rather timid souls; in fact there is even one "who is afraid of butterflies." Illustrated by Philippe Dix in a style reminiscent of Arthur Rackham, this will be one they'll want to read again and again.

DUFFY AND THE DEVIL. (Farrar, Straus, Giroux, 1973). Winner of the Caldecott medal for 1974, this is a charming version of "Rumpelstiltskin," inspired by an old Cornish folk tale, and retold by the well known husband and wife team, Harve and Margot Zemach.

Children will delight in the many illustrations by Mrs. Zemach and enjoy an old familiar story with a new twist.

A FOX IN ONE BITE: AND OTHER TASTY TALES FROM JAPAN. (Kodansha International Ltd., 1968). In long ago Japan, foxes and badgers were thought to have magic powers allowing them to assume a number of disguises in order to trick the unwary. These short, amusing tales provide a wonderful introduction to Japanese folklore and will have young listeners asking for more.

If that's the case, they'll want to try **HOLD TIGHT, STICK TIGHT.** (Kodansha International, Ltd., 1968), compiled by the same author, Elizabeth Soodfield, during her two-year teaching stint in Japan.

TEENY-TINY AND THE WITCH WOMAN. (Pantheon, 1975). Another tale to chill the blood, it is a Turkish version of Hansel and Gretel.

Three brothers, Big One, in the Middle and Teeny-Tiny, ignore their mother's warnings and go into the deep forest where they meet the feared witch-woman who eats little children.

The spooky illustrations by Michael Foreman are bound to terrify parents but children will love them.

There is no reason to worry that clear colored glass will lose its dye. Indeed, the glass is clear because the color is introduced into the molten glass, rather than after the glass is blown. It is, therefore, impossible for any of the color to fade, rub off, or dissolve into the liquid the glass is holding. Small quantities of specific metal oxides are used to obtain particular colors. Iron produces an amber color, cobalt a blue one, and copper green hues. Ruby is the most difficult color to create as a result of the chemicals needed. A colored piece of glassware is more expensive than an equivalent colorless piece.

Tannin is an acidic substance that comes from the pips, skins, and stems of the grape, and gives wines some of their power and punch. After World War I, wine growers from the Burgundy region saw that the days of cellars and big country houses was at an end, and people would not want to lay down a wine and have to wait ten years before they could drink it. They also saw that society would become faster paced and that wines would have to keep up with this.

ANNA HUSBAND, LATE OF CALVIN AVENUE

She was going to stay one year, "to get things started." Maybe two, "if I had to." And then... "I went in in September. By November we had bought a new, (old), building. We moved in on a cold and snowy day in February — without missing a day of school. I remember the board members plying everyone, including the movers, with sandwiches and coffee."

Anna Husband retired last month after 13 years as director of the Detroit Community Music School.

The school she went to was located in a rented building at the corner of John R and East Grand boulevard. It was simply a series of studios, with seven teachers, (six piano, one flute), and an enrollment of under 100 students.

The school she left has a faculty of over 40 teachers, all dedicated professionals, among them members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, well-known composers and performers who have made extensive concert and recital appearances.

It is located in East Kirby street, in Detroit's Cultural Center, near the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Center for Creative Studies, the International Institute, the Children's Museum and the Science Center. Its facilities include an auditorium, a dance studio, practice rooms, teaching studios and administrative offices.

It offers class lessons in all phases of dance, in piano, theory, beginning music, history of music, accompanying, sight reading and opera workshop, private lessons in piano, voice, harpsichord, organ and all orchestral instruments. "We even have harp now!"—and coaching in a variety of ensembles.

In the 13 years Anna Husband headed the Detroit Community Music School, enrollment has increased more than 600 percent.

She stayed because she saw things were beginning to happen. "When I was teaching — at Eastman, for instance — I realized so strongly that students with great talent who had not had the opportunity to get good, early background would never be able to develop their full potential.

"That's one reason I got into piano pedagogy: in teaching teachers."

Miss Husband, originally from Pittsburgh, holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Duquesne University. She earned it after a two-and-a-half-year student sabbatical: the post-high school, pre-college time she spent in Europe, traveling with a friend of the family.

"It wasn't too good for me as a pianist," she observes. But it was a marvelous experience for Anna the Person.

Later, "when it became desirable that a college teacher have a Masters degree," she spent some summer time earning the necessary credits at the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music. She was, of course, already a college teacher.

She is a former faculty member of Stephens College, the University of Missouri,

Eastman School and Wayne State University. She is a recognized authority on teaching principles and materials.

She was named Outstanding Teacher of Music in Michigan in May, 1965. In 1972, she was recipient of the Elizabeth Mathias Award from Mu Phi Epsilon international music sorority.

Her extensive concertizing throughout the east and mid-west has included appearances with symphony orchestras.

Her concerts have included many first performances of contemporary piano works, piano duet recitals and appearances with chamber music groups.

She has been active throughout Michigan, performing and lecturing before various piano teacher's organizations. She is a member of the Michigan Music Teachers Association, a past chairman of the Board of Teacher Certification and has been active as a contest judge and adjudicator.

Now, it's desirable that a college teacher have a Ph.D. No doubt, if Anna Husband were not retiring, she'd consider getting one... although it DOES seem as if Miss Husband would be teaching her teachers.

She's gone from Calvin avenue, bag and baggage, already. "I should have been a small town person," she always said. "I hate cities." Now she's living in New Mexico, near Albuquerque, on a mesa, the desert world stretching below her. "It's like looking down from an airplane."

There's plenty of area for the backpacking she loves, but has had no time for in the past 12 years. There's snow in the mountains, so she'll be able to do the cross-country skiing she so enjoyed in northern Michigan.

The days are warm, the nights are crisp, and "it's very active musically throughout New Mexico." Anna Husband joined the New Mexico Music Teachers Association as soon as she knew she was moving there. It's a very good, strong association, which accepts members only if they are Certified or in the process of becoming Certified.

"I joined it immediately, because I'm going to be doing some teaching. And I'm going to do some of the articles I never had time to write..."

Miss Husband hasn't moved to New Mexico to vegetate. She IS moving into a new life style.

After a few days on the job, learning the ropes from Anna before she left, Philip Jenkins, DCM's new director, observed: "To become a director of this school is not a

job—it is a way of life."

The Detroit Community Music School had its beginnings in 1926 when a group of women, including the late Mrs. Edsel B. Ford, helped organize music lessons at Tau Beta Settlement House in Hamtramck. Other settlement houses heard about the program, and it was expanded to serve them.

The era of the settlement houses ended. Many metamorphosed into community centers. The Tau Beta House closed, but the Music School continued, in the rented building at the corner of John R and East Grand boulevard, at first with some financial assistance from the United Foundation.

When this assistance ended, the school's board appealed to musicians throughout the area, asking them to please help... "That," says Anna Husband, "was when I first heard about the school."

Today, the Detroit Community Music School, first such institution in Michigan accredited by the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts, provides programs for children as young as four, ("Baby Strings"), and includes Senior Citizens among its students.

It remains primarily, however, a school for through-high school students, who come from all over the metropolitan area and beyond—"from as far away as right outside Toledo; we've had one from up near Lansing"—and from Canada across-the-water.

It has been dedicated, since its beginning, to providing the finest quality music and dance education to all interested persons, regardless of racial or socio-economic background.

DCM feels that no serious student should be denied musical training because of inability to pay, and that presents a problem, for the school, although tax-exempt and non-profit, is not endowed and, as Anna Husband notes, "any private school is lucky to be one-third of the cost of its operation is covered by tuitions."

But many DCM students receive financial help in the form of scholarships, awarded to young people of outstanding ability via competitive examinations, and student aid, determined by need as well as seriousness of purpose.

DCM receives partial funding from the Michigan Council for the Arts and from foundations and individuals. "We have an annual fundraising drive," Miss Husband notes wryly, "that lasts 12 months a year!"

Miss Husband herself only had an assistant since spring, "when we finally received funds to do an Outreach Program." The possibilities money opens up are endless.

"We need to get into Music Therapy in the city—if we can get the funds." And then there are the students of truly outstanding ability... "The exceptional student is overlooked too much of the time." It's been frustrating.

Funding can be found for all sorts of community programs, programs to help the disadvantaged, programs aimed at special age and interest groups, "but no one seems to think we need funds for the very talented students, too."

To educate an exceptional student properly can be extraordinarily expensive. "I'll bet 90 percent of the leaders in the field of music today have had some financial assistance," Miss Husband maintains. Students of all abilities can be found at the Detroit Community Music School; perhaps the top one percent could be professionals, "and no place else in the state of Michigan—no day school, that is—can they get what they get at our school."

Many of these exceptional music students have flexible arrangements with their regular, (academic), schools, providing them with released time for the practicing and lessons they need.

"I think the biggest things our school offers are the studio classes and the monthly student recitals, where students get practice performing in public." Poise must accompany skill. Poise, like skill, comes with practice.

Proof that DCM must be doing something right lies in the fact that full or partial scholarships have been granted to its students by many of America's leading institutions of music and the dance, including Juilliard, Philadelphia's Curtis Institute, the Eastman and Manhattan Schools of Music, the New England Conservatory, Interlochen Arts Academy...

Anna Husband knows she will enjoy getting back into teaching. She's missed it. As director of the Detroit Community Music School, most of her time was taken up with administrative duties — duties she enjoyed, for she enjoys working with people and she enjoys making things happen, but duties that precluded her acceptance of other duties.

Up until last year, she managed to teach one pupil per year, "in the beginning, it was more". She did some coaching, too. And, until last year, she was the school's accompanist.

Now, anticipating "fresh air and sunshine," she knows she'll miss some of the city and school excitement. There's the DCM high that comes "every time a student does something he couldn't have done without us."

There's the working with parents, the counseling, the consultation with staff, the individual victory. "When a student finally gets on top of a thing: that gives you a little lift."

There are the Special Times. Planning new school facilities, checking to make sure that DCM's music rooms will be the best, best-constructed anywhere, conferring with architects and engineers... and all the while, keeping the school going, "doing all the other stuff on the side."

It's hectic. It's exhausting. It's exciting. It's rewarding.

But the quiet quiet(er) life has its compensations. Anna Husband can at least plan to get her 1977 Christmas tree up in 1977.

There was the year, a few years back, when Detroit Community Music School moved into its present building. The move was made over the Christmas holidays.

That year Anna Husband, to whom Christmas isn't Christmas without a tree, refused, despite all the excitement, to forego hers. She got it up, and trimmed—on New Year's.

Speaking of Books...

"Hungarians of Detroit," the first in a series of booklets called "The Peopling of Michigan" designed to demonstrate something people of ethnic background have known all along—that the United States, called the "melting pot of the world" so often by so many, isn't melting its rich and diverse amalgam of ethnic heritages very fast after all—came out this spring.

Thirty more booklets are slated for completion by 1980, according to James A. Anderson, of Anita avenue, director of Wayne State University researchers in the Ethnic Studies Division of the Center for Urban Studies who are compiling and analyzing data on ethnic communities in the metropolitan area.

Mr. Anderson and his associate, Malvina Hauk Abonyi, opted for the Hungarian study first partly because of her close ties to the community. Ms. Abonyi lived for years in southwest Detroit's Delray section, where the largest concentration of the region's 50,000 Hungarian-Americans still lives, and remains active in the Hungarian community.

She believes close cooperation of the ethnic groups is the key to making "The Peopling of Michigan" a successful project, and Mr. Anderson concurs.

"We had invaluable help from many members of the community on our first booklet and the complete text was reviewed by several prominent Hungarians before publication," he notes, adding that "when the entire community takes part in the project, the finished product is much more accurate and reflects the thinking of the ethnic group involved."
