IT'S THANKSGIVING, and while most Americans are stuffing turkeys, and them-selves, Sen. Charles Percy, R.-Ill., is reporting 26 deaths of dieters on liquid protein. Sen. Percy is asking the Food and Drug Administration to stop over-the-counter sales of the product immediately. He said liquid protein, linked directly to at least 10 of the deaths, should be dispensed on a prescription basis only if studies prove it is safe.

RHODESIAN PRIME Minister Ian Smith announced plans yesterday to steer the country to black rule though a one-man, one-vote settlement with moderate African nationalists. He added that he would seek guarantees for a secure future for Rhodesia's minority. The Prime Minister also spoke of a "safe return" policy for black nationalist guerillas battling his regime and said he be-lieved his plan would end the five-year war with the guerillas. Mr. Smith did not announce a date for such an election that would certainly assure black rule of the

A PROPOSAL FROM Rho-desian Prime Minister Ian was both praised and rejected. While two out of three moderate black nacalled a trick by the militant Patriotic Front which said it would continue its guerilla white minority. The U.S. and Britain expressed moderate support with reservations about the nature of the plan.

Planning Commission, City Planner Exchange Ideas Toward Defining Goals Being Sought

By Roger A. Waha The process of defining specific goals and objectives toward the final formulation of a land use plan for the city continued when the Woods Planning Commission at its regular meeting Tues-

A foreword by Charles A Lindbergh is of particular interest as are the black and white photographs that illustrate the book.
