## SCHOOL TALKS HIT SNAG

### HEADLINES of the WEEK

Thursday, September 13

WITH WINDS UP TO 130 mph, Hurricane Frederic ripped through the Gulf coast of southern Alabama sending an estimated half-million people from their homes and flooding Mobile streets with four feet of water. A hurricane forecaster indicated that the eye of the storm was only 10 miles south of Mobile. An oil driller was killed when he fell off a drilling rig that was being towed through rough waters along the Louisiana coast. Frederic is being cited as the worst Gulf coast storm since 1969 when Hurricane Camille claimed 250 persons.

Friday, September 14

A 16-YEAR-OLD Michigan State University computer whiz, who has been missing since August 15, was found alive in Texas by a private investigator hired by the boy's parents, James D. Egbert III, who had been suspected of being involved in a campus game of Dungeons and Dragons, was found in a "rundown" room at an undisclosed location. The detective, William Dear, said that he had received three phone calls from the youth and that a man with a "Yankee accent" was with Egbert at the time of one of the calls.

Saturday, September 15

FOR THE FIRST time since 1964, General Motors Corp. and the United Auto Workers walked away from the bargaining table without a strike, agreeing on a tentative three-year contract for GM's 460,000 union members. UAW President Douglas A. Fraser termed the contract an "excellent settlement" which calls for 14 more paid personal holidays and a three percent annual wage increase. Pending ratification, the contract will be used as a pattern to negotiate Ford and Chrysler contracts. Negotiators worked around the clock to avert a strike that had been targeted against 46 GM plants across the U.S.

Sunday, September 16

IN AN EFFORT to save itself from financial ruin, Chrysler Corp. presented a plan to the federal government that calls for \$500 million in loan guarantees with an additional \$700 million to be received on a contingency basis. But Treasury Secretary G. William Miller stated that the plan was "way out of line" and that another plan would have to be submitted, indicating that the government would not even consider a plan that wasn't "well below \$1 billion."

Monday, September 17

TWO EAST GERMAN families fled to the West in a hot air balloon that carried them 12 miles to freedom. The ordeal only lasted 20 minutes, but the balloon narrowly missed a high tension wire that would have killed the eight people aboard if it had made contact. It was the second attempt to freedom for the East Germans who no longer could "lie to our children and put up with the political conditions in East Germany."

Tuesday, September 18

JOHN J. RICCARDO, citing ill health and his association with the "past management of a troubled company," announced Monday he plans to retire this week as chairman and chief executive officer of the Chrysler Corp. Mr. Riccardo, 55, said Chrysler's board would take up his request for early retirement when it meets Thursday. The retirement would take effect immediately after the meeting. President Lee A. Iacocca is expected to become chief executive officer, a post he was scheduled to take in November.

### GPW Mayor Withdraws From Race

Benjamin Pinkos' Absence  
Leaves Battle Between  
George S. Freeman,  
George Cueter

Two current councilmen in The Woods will vie for the mayoral seat in the November 6 election after Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos decided to withdraw from the race.

It will be George S. Freeman against George Cueter for the two-year term with the loser not retaining his council seat.

Both men had filed for mayor and council by the time nomination petitions had to be submitted, (at 5 p.m. on Monday, September 10). Under state election laws, each then had to decide which office he would seek by 4 p.m., (originally thought to be 5 p.m. by local officials), on Thursday, September 13.

**Dither Disappears**  
After Mr. Pinkos announced he withdrew from the race, both Mr. Freeman and Mr. Cueter decided to seek the mayoral post, while William Wilson, who also filed for both mayor and council, decided to run for council.

Other candidates for three vacancies on the council, (all four-year terms), include incumbent Robert E. Novitke, Frederick Lovelace, Arthur J. Kuehnel and Tim Mucciante.

### Campaign Financial Statements Give No Clue On POP Expenditures

Organization's President Thinks Group Doesn't  
Come under Law; Records of August  
Primary in Park Show John Prost  
Spent Most Money

If you live in The Park, you are familiar with the phrases "Grosse Pointe Park Set Up for A Giant Rip Off by HUD," "Support Candidates Opposed to HUD" and "Retire Mayor Matthew Patterson."

In case you don't live in The Park, those are the statements being made lately by Proud Of The Park, (POP), in thousands of flyers that are being dropped on the doorsteps of Park residents.

But where in the POP organization is the money coming from to fund the flyers? Has Same Box

A look at campaign financial statements — required by state law of any group and organization that "influences voters for or against the nomination or election of a candidate, or the qualification, passage or defeat of a ballot question — does not give a clue.

A check of those financial statements filed with the Wayne County Election Division for the August 7 primary in The Park did not find a financial statement filed by POP.

The Grosse Pointe Park Republican Club, who lists the same post office box as POP, and who distributed at least one flyer during the campaign that asked voters to remove present city officials, was not registered either.

The four or five POP flyers that have been distributed to residents spell out

the council for six years before he was appointed mayor. He led the ticket with the largest amount of votes each time he was elected in 1973 and 1977.

Three council seats, currently held by Lorenzo Browning, Jeanette Duffield and Arthur Fetters, also are up for grabs in November. All three say they will run again.

### GPW Gives Program Big Boost

Council Approves Participation in Volunteer  
Probation Plan for  
1979-80

The outlook for the Grosse Pointe Volunteer Probation Program in fiscal year 1979-80 is definitely brighter as the Woods Council at its rescheduled regular meeting Monday, September 10, unanimously agreed to participate in the program during the current fiscal year.

Whether the city contributes its 1979-80 requested share of \$12,985.96 or its 1978-79 share of \$9,312.50 depends on the action of three other Pointes.

The council agreed to contribute \$12,985.96 on the condition that all the Pointes pay their requested share of the 1979-80 budget. (So far The Park is the only municipality to do so.) If one of the communities doesn't agree, The Woods will pay what it did in 1978-79.

**Praises Council**  
But for probation program officials, the fact that The Woods is "in" is pleasant news in itself.

"It's wonderful," said Suzanne J. O'Shea, chief probation officer. "I'm very pleased Grosse Pointe Woods is supporting the probation department. It's a very fair motion and I want to praise the council for its diligence. It's the best thing for their community and they saw this."

Probation program officials had originally felt The Woods let them down when the council approved \$3,000 to go through Wayne County on a per case basis for 1979-80 because officials felt the city wasn't receiving that much service from the program.

However, after a Committee of the Whole meeting in July, the council explored further facts on probation service to the community and heard from Municipal Judge J. Patrick Denis on both the program's tangible and intangible benefits.

With that, the council decided to consider the request at one of its regular meetings, pending the receipt of further information from Judge Denis.

**Plans to Contact**  
For 1978-79, the program's budget was \$25,000, while for the current fiscal year it's placed at \$34,961.65. At this (Continued on Page 4)

### Special Needs Monies Eyed for SOC Program

Minor Home Repair, Maintenance Effort at  
Temporary Standstill But Future Is Favorable  
As Woods, Harper Woods, City  
Submit Applications Totalling Estimated \$145,600 for Next Year

SOC, (Seniors Onward for Change, Inc.), which has been going at a fast clip with its minor home repair and maintenance program since February, has temporarily suspended its services pending the receipt of further monies from Wayne County.

However, while the organization has spent most of its \$49,982 in Community Development Block Grant, (CDBG), special needs monies for 1978-79, the immediate future outlook for the program, which has received around 961 calls between February and August, is favorable.

Currently serving citizens in The Woods, Farms, Shores, City and Harper Woods, SOC officials are hopeful they will meet their budget request of \$120,000 for the upcoming year, as applications from three communities totaling around \$145,600 have been submitted to the Wayne County Office of Program Development and Coordination for SOC as part of the 1979 special needs program.

**Objectives Viewed**  
The Woods, in behalf of itself, The Farms and Shores, is seeking a total of \$69,600, while Harper Woods is seeking \$50,000 and The City about \$26,000.

In noting applications had to be submitted by Monday, September 17, Terrence M. Jarvis, community development coordinator for the Office of Program Development and Coordination, said the CDBG Advisory Council will make its final funding decision on Thursday, October 18, at a meeting in Riverview.

A total of \$900,000 in special needs monies was available with 70 percent of that amount, i.e., \$631,960, going to 15 communities with significant needs on an allocation formula, said Mr. Jarvis. The balance, \$270,040 is available to the remaining county communities on a competitive basis. It's the (Continued on Page 6)

### Schools' Enrollment Drop Reaches 20-Year Low

There were fewer students sitting at their desks when Grosse Pointe schools reopened this month than in any year during the last two decades, according to an enrollment report just issued by the school administration.

This year's enrollment loss — of more than 500 students over 1978-79 — was a bit worse than the schools expected, especially at the high schools, where the drop amounted to 10 percent in one grade and six percent overall.

"It's something we have to investigate when more information is available," said Ben Zenn, director of support services. "We'll have to find out where all those kids went to. Did they move out of the district, go to other schools or what?"

The latest figure on total enrollment, 9,302 students, indicates a loss of more than 30 percent since the high water mark in 1970 when 13,500 students attended public schools. The last time enrollment dropped beneath 10,000 was in the late 1950's.

A report issued by Superintendent Dr. William Coats last year said the schools could close up to three elementary schools and one middle school because of the population drop.

Despite that, the Board of Education has not closed any buildings and has promised not to do so at least through (Continued on Page 10)

### Teachers Preparing For Crisis

Bargaining Breaks Down  
at Weekend Meeting;  
Board Team  
Considers Mediation

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education requested state mediation while teachers began "preparing for a crisis" this week after contract negotiations between the two sides broke down at a weekend meeting.

Teachers remain on the job and have not scheduled a strike vote. However, at a meeting Sunday, September 16, the Grosse Pointe Education Association, (GPEA), requested a vote to "proceed with preparations for a crisis," which teachers unanimously approved, according to union president Curt Lange.

The talks broke down at midnight Saturday, September 15, when the union walked away from the bargaining table after a 14-hour session. Three issues — money, layoff procedures and calendar — remain unsettled.

**"Pride at Stake"**  
The School Board's last offer, a nine percent pay increase for three years with minimum fringe benefit improvement, is "unacceptable," according to Mr. Lange.

"If we accepted that offer we would have the most restrictive layoff provisions, the longest calendar and the lowest financial settlement in all of Local One, (Macomb County), districts," Mr. Lange said.

"Grosse Pointe teachers' pride is at stake." School Board representatives dispute that statement. "Our teachers were the highest paid in Local One last year. They will still be the highest paid under our proposal this year — in fact the gap will widen even more," said chief negotiator Ronald Tonks.

**Tell Different Story**  
Percentage increases in eight Local One districts that have settled contracts this fall range from 18 percent to 19.4 percent for two years.

While those percentages may be higher than the Grosse Pointe Board's last offer, the cash amounts tell a different story, according to Mr. Tonks.

"We're not talking percentages on our side," he said. "You don't spend percentages at the grocery store — you spend cash."

"The Romeo district, for instance, received the high- (Continued on Page 2)

 est settlement in Local One, but still Grosse Pointe teachers at the Master's degree, maximum level will make \$2,582 more than Romeo teachers at the same level in the second year of our proposal," Mr. Tonks said.

Total median reimbursement, including salary, longevity, increments and fringe benefits, will increase to \$30,667 in the second year

of the Board's proposal, Mr. Tonks said.  
**No Plans to Wait**  
 Mr. Lange said his team left the bargaining table Saturday because they found the offer unacceptable and felt they were making no progress.

"Since Labor Day, the Board has increased its offer by three-tenths of a percent," Mr. Lange said. "We do not intend to wait until next April for a contract. Grosse

Pointe teachers deserve a settlement now."  
 Grosse Pointe's 553 teachers and librarians are members of the unified bargaining group, Local One of the Michigan Education Association, Local One also represents teachers in 16 Macomb County school districts.

The first step of the union's "crisis preparation" procedure will be a job action investigation by education association representatives from outside Grosse Pointe. The phrase "job action" is the union's euphemism for a strike.

But before teachers actually walk out, several steps must be taken.  
**On Next Step**  
 The action must be reviewed and recommended by the local GPEA Executive Board and Negotiating Team and Local One's Bargaining Committee and Coordinating Council. If the proposal gets that far, it must then be approved by a 66.6 percent vote of Grosse Pointe teachers.

"Hopefully, it won't be necessary to go through any of those steps," Mr. Lange said. "But we are prepared to do it."  
 Superintendent Dr. William Coats said the Board's team is considering a request for state mediation and has already made contact with mediator Richard Terpin.

"We're at a statement. Mediation seems to be the next logical step," Dr. Coats said.







### Board Says Real Estate In GP Is Alive, Well

Grosse Pointe real estate is alive and well, and Pointers ought to feel very good about their housing investments according to the people who know best.

"Readers of newspapers and periodicals should be aware of applying real estate projections to their Grosse Pointe property," says Paris DiSanto, treasurer of the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Board and chairperson of its Education Committee.

In spite of some rather gloomy predictions about real estate in general throughout the country, Grosse Pointe property is showing stability in a rapidly fluctuating economy, according to figures released recently by the board.

Market value of the average Grosse Pointe single-family dwelling continued to increase through the first seven months of this year at a rate better than two percent per month.

At the end of July, the mean sales price of Grosse Pointe residences for 1979 was \$95,500 — up 20.3 percent over the previous year.

This increase was considerably better than that experienced in such other Detroit suburbs as Birmingham, Bloomfield, Dearborn and Farmington. Increases in those areas ranged from 11.6 percent to 18.6 percent. The national average was 13.8 percent.

August figures are even

more encouraging for the Grosse Pointes, since the mean sales price rose to \$98,700, bringing the increase over 1978 to 24.3 percent.

It is anticipated that more than one-third of the homes sold in 1979 by the 17 member firms of the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Board will sell for a price in excess of \$100,000. This compares with 24 percent last year, and 12 percent in 1977.

These figures are especially interesting according to board vice-president Don Smith, since so much has been written that could scare people about the value of their property.

Mr. Smith's reference was to recent articles in such publications as the "Detroit News," the "Detroit Free Press," "Business Week," "Forbes," "Barrons" and "Money," which indicate a slowdown in the housing market, and prices running behind last year's.

"But here in the Pointes, we seem to be bucking the trend," he said. "In other words, we aren't typical."

Nor has the high cost of gasoline, and fear of shortages affected the Grosse Pointe market, as it has in other more remote suburbs of Detroit.

According to the "Detroit News," a nation-wide survey of home-owners indicates that the demand for homes in the outer fringes of most market areas has been hurt.

"But the Pointes are conveniently located, and gasoline prices and shortages do not appear to be a factor in home sales," according to Karl Mauelshagen, secretary of the Grosse Pointe Real Estate Board.

In fact, realtors point out that the demand for Grosse Pointe housing persists for the same reasons which have pertained for many years: well-maintained houses; a good school system; numerous waterfront recreational facilities; fine shopping facilities; and scenic beauty.





(Continued from Page 1) time, \$26,341.30 of the latter total has been reached.

The Park has approved the 1979-80 request of \$9,248.80 while both The Farms and The City have okayed the amounts they gave in 1978-79, \$4,975 for The Farms and \$2,805 for The City. The Woods at this stage, pending the approval of The Farms, City and Shores of the requested amounts for 1979-80, is contributing \$9,312.50.

If The Farms okay its requested total of \$5,557.27, The City, \$3,911.48, and The Shores \$1,777.94, The Woods agreed to pay \$12,985.96, (with each municipality's share being based upon the 1970 census).

With The Woods' action, Mrs. O'Shea hopes the Farms, City and Shores Councils will approve their requested 1979-80 share of the budget. In fact, she plans on contacting officials in the three communities to seek their cooperation.

Woods Councilman John Sabol asked Judge Denis if the other communities decide not to approve the requested amounts, would the program still function? It would still function, said the judge, but not "at a level which would be most beneficial."

**Take Another Look**  
A general receptiveness appears to be the reaction of officials in The Farms, City and Shores to The Woods' motion of participation.

Farms Councilman W. James Mast, who also is mayor pro-tem, said the council would be willing to consider and evaluate the requested 1979-80 figure.

While The Shores has allocated \$1,300 in its budget for 1979-80 for the program, it hasn't been approved. Both Shores Village Superintendent Thomas K. Jefferis and Village President Gerald C. Schroeder said the council hasn't been asked for the amount but would consider the bid if approached by probation program officials.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach of Grosse Pointe City said at the time his community's budget was adopted, the 1978-79 figure was included for the program, with a final determination pending. However, in light of The Woods' action, he stated the request will be reviewed again.

**Can Continue**  
For Mrs. O'Shea on a personal level, and for the program in total, The Woods' decision to participate was an immediately visible boost. "I didn't know whether we could continue without The

Woods' support," (encompassing the biggest chunk of the budget, over 37 percent), she said. "This means we can continue."

The program's service to the community, she feels, is paying good dividends. Before it got underway last year, the judges felt around 100 cases would be handled over a 12-month period but, as it turned out, a total of 191 cases were viewed over a 10-month period.

(The two-month difference is because supervision of probationers and presentence reports didn't start until last September. While the probation department began operation last August 1, the first month was devoted to organizational tasks, legal forms, procedures, et al.)

(However, as of last July 1, all costs and fines assessed by the courts on probation cases were to be returned to each municipality to help defray their contribution.)

**Expects Busy Year**  
Based upon national crime figures, Mrs. O'Shea expects 1979-80 to even be a more busy year for the department.

If the \$34,861.65 budget isn't obtained, Mrs. O'Shea said some cutbacks in service will have to transpire. On the other hand, if all the communities approve their requested shares, "we can take what the courts feel we should take and do it well."

She added, "I hope all the local governments see the benefits we provide to the community at a most modest cost."  
In a final note, Mrs. O'Shea said the program needs volunteers to work with individuals placed on probation. She has 10 now but would like to have around 20. Interested citizens may call 822-6234 for further information.

(Continued from Page 1) latter category which is being covered by SOC.

Program objectives, as cited by Mr. Jarvis, include the following: To further increase housing opportunities for low-to-moderate income persons; to provide direct benefit to low-to-moderate income persons; and to provide benefit to special segments of the total population.

said since The Woods, Farms and Shores used an estimated 58 percent of SOC's services, his application encompassed 58 percent of the planned \$120,000 budget, with the year from December 1979 to December 1980 being viewed.

In the application, "We tried to make a case for SOC, indicating that the program has increased in size," said Mr. McNamara, who also pointed out that the document says SOC was created with special needs monies and that its performance has exceeded expectations. (The Woods, as part of its 1979 CDBG program, also included \$10,000 for SOC.)

Of the 961 calls received, 656 were service calls, 185 are pending and 120 were either cancelled or denied.

SOC's president Bert S. Francis said these results are "really fantastic," while expressing his hope that the trio of applications are approved.

Indicating that services have been suspended because of a lack of money, he said almost all of the \$49,982 has been used up. "We're still awaiting some money to liquidate all of our outstanding obligations out of the \$49,982."

**Pair Let Go**

Because of the temporary financial situation, Mr. Francis said SOC's board met at the end of last month and program co-directors Mary Aley and Diane Heavner were dropped as "we were unable to meet their salaries."

Saying there was nothing derogatory about this action, he stated both are "perfectly splendid young women" who had to be permanently terminated.

While both Mrs. Aley and Mrs. Heavner, who were both associated with the Out-Wayne County Nutrition Site for Senior Citizens prior to their SOC posts, were disappointed over their dismissal, they each stressed the need for having the SOC program.

"We discovered a lot of people on low incomes, with the program being a big help to them toward maintaining their homes," said Mrs. Aley. "SOC is one of the few organizations doing something for the elderly. I completely support them," noted Mrs. Heavner.

When the program goes full steam again, Mr. Francis indicated it will need someone thoroughly familiar with home maintenance to act as director.

**Must Be Convinced**

We will need a man or woman who can check out a job, what it needs, the man-hours involved and the amount of money necessary, he said, while noting, after completion, the job also will have to be checked.

"We need someone who's convinced that this service needs to be rendered to people so they may keep their homes," stressed Mr. Francis.

A retired person with building skills is being sought to run the SOC program, with the organization's board setting the amount of salary. He suggested interested citizens should call SOC at 884-2790 between 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

**"Really Fantastic"**

The Woods Council at its rescheduled regular meeting Monday, September 10, concurred in a recommendation from its CDBG Citizens Advisory Commission that an application be prepared in SOC's behalf in the amount of \$50,000.

(Continued from Page 1) that membership dues for POP members "add up." Dues are \$10 for single residents and \$15 for family residents.

Mr. Connor said, however, that there is a "pretty substantial number of members" in POP and that about 150 new members have been added since the August 7 primary.

According to a spokesman for the Wayne County Election Division, any group, political or otherwise, that spends \$200 or more in support of an issue or a candidate is required to file a statement of organization. That statement indicates what type of committee has been formed and for what purpose.

Mr. Connor acknowledged that the POP flyers have cost over \$200.

A closer look at campaign financial statements filed by candidates in the primary showed Mr. Connor as Anthony Spada's treasurer. Although he was the top vote getter among council candidates, Mr. Spada was not the biggest spender. Mr. Spada spent \$484 out of his own pocket during the most recent reporting period, according to his report.

John Prost, who came in fourth in the primary, spent the most money — \$2,137, while receiving \$3,820 in contributions that ranged from \$25 to \$50, including a \$25 contribution from former Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh. A big chunk, about \$1,300, went for printing and newspaper ads.

Council candidate Dean Brunke, who lost a bid for one of three council seats to be filled in November's election, failed to file a financial statement before the September 6 deadline and will be fined \$10 each day until a report is filed with the election division.

Some Exempted

Mayoral candidate William Faber spent and received \$845 on his campaign with Park Municipal Judge Beverly C. Grobbel listed as a contributor.

The Committee to Re-Elect the Incumbents, made up of Mr. Patterson, Mr. Alandt, Dr. Roger McNeill and Char-

les Tompkins, contributed \$1,100 to their campaign. The committee spent about \$811, most of which went for newspaper ads.

A flyer circulated to Park residents, paid for by the Grosse Pointe Park Political Action Committee endorsing Mr. Patterson and three council incumbents, was not registered with the election division.

Mr. Tompkins indicated that the particular flyer did not cost \$200 to print and so the Political Action Committee would not be required to register with the election division.

Those candidates filing reports that exempted them from disclosing their expenditures were Mr. Alandt, Arthur Moran, Dr. McNeill, Mr. Patterson, Daniel Schaitberger, Richard Swanquist and George Verdonck.

Under the Campaign Finance Act, individuals running for office may file a reporting waiver if they expect to spend \$500 or less during their campaign.



(Continued from Page 1) Judge J. Patrick Denis will be unopposed for the four-year term of office.

If officials were in somewhat of a dither on the 10th as to who would run for what, Mr. Pinkos' decision to withdraw swiftly caused everything to fall into place.

While feeling he could have defeated all three potential challengers for mayor, Mr. Pinkos said he would have opposed Mr. Wilson, who he felt wasn't "a knowledgeable candidate," head on.

At the same time, he decided not to oppose either Mr. Freeman or Mr. Cueter who both have had municipal government experience.

Another consideration affecting his decision in not seeking a fourth term, which he had cited several weeks ago, was the fact that his company is in the process of a major expansion. Mr. Pinkos felt at least for six months he couldn't give as much time as he would like to city governmental responsibilities.

With Mr. Pinkos withdrawing from the mayoral race, the decision for both Mr. Freeman and Mr. Cueter apparently was easier as to which route to follow.

The NEWS asked both Mr. Freeman and Mr. Cueter

why they filed for both offices. "I filed because the mayor was undecided as to what he was going to do," he decided not to run, I would run for it," said Mr. Freeman. "I felt if the mayor decided not to run, I would take a chance at running for mayor," said Mr. Cueter.

On his decision to run for mayor, Mr. Freeman stated, "I feel I've had experience on the council since 1970 and as mayor pro-tem since 1973 and I wanted to serve the city."

For his part, Mr. Cueter, who has served on the council since 1976, indicated he made his final decision after Mr. Pinkos announced he would withdraw from the race.

When asked if Mr. Pinkos' decision to not run again had any effect on his decision to seek the mayoral post, Mr. Freeman replied that he waited to see what the mayor would decide, while indicating he would not run against Mr. Pinkos.

On a related subject, both candidates also were asked for their views on comments that neither might run for mayor if Mr. Pinkos had participated.

Admires Both "I declared myself first (for the mayoral office) before the mayor went through with his petitions," said Mr. Freeman. "I also was the first one to withdraw from the council race."

Mr. Cueter acknowledged he probably wouldn't have run for mayor if Mr. Pinkos had. Saying the mayor had been an asset to the community, Mr. Cueter stated, "He's more qualified than I would be. He would be in a better political position to aid the city than me," while citing the contacts and associations Mr. Pinkos has built up through the years.

"I feel George (Freeman) is a capable person and so am I. May the best man win. It's up to the voters," added Mr. Cueter.

Meanwhile, Mr. Wilson said he originally filed for both offices because he didn't know who would run for mayor at the time he filed.

He said he would have run against Mr. Pinkos but wouldn't have opposed Mr. Freeman or Mr. Cueter because he admired both men for their "sound judgment and management capabilities in running the community."

## GP Woods Comes Full Circle on Brush Law

The Woods Council came full circle on its ordinance governing the placement of brush by permanently tabling a previously requested amendment to the measure at its regular rescheduled meeting Monday, September 10.

A complaint from a citizen over receiving a \$2 citation for placing a small tree stump in front of his home resulted in the council taking another look at its brush ordinance on Monday, August 20.

After some discussion, the council requested that City Administrator Chester E. Petersen review the ordinance, with the purpose of having City Attorney George Catlin amend the section affecting the brush provision so brush could be set out anytime and picked up on the citizen's regular collection day.

Prior to the proposed amendment, brush and rubbish were set out at the same time for pickup, (and with the tabling action, they still will be).

At the same time, the council on the 20th indicated no violation would be issued regarding the placement of brush until the ordinance

was amended. Now, with the tabling action, citizens will be cited beginning Monday, October 1, if they violate the ordinance.

An original thought in seeking the amendment was that many residents, for instance, do tree trimming over a weekend and then have to cart and place the material in their back yard, and then carry it out to be picked up later.

Mr. Petersen had told the council that many citizen complaints had been received in the past over placing brush out for pickup too early.

As it turned out on the 10th, Councilman George Cueter moved that the proposed amendment be adopted as an emergency ordinance, thus becoming effective upon posting, but after some discussion, he rescinded that motion.

Jean Rice, chairman of the Beautification Commission, questioned the reason for the proposed amendment, while wondering why one complaint would change "a very good ordinance." She felt a way a city could deteriorate was to have citizens place their brush out four or five days before their pickup day.

Councilman George S. Freeman said it was difficult for him to see why citizens cannot save their brush and then put it out on their regular pickup day.

Mayor Benjamin W. Pinkos expressed some concern over the potential ticketing of residents who have their trash out, with the DPW failing to pick up the refuse.

Mr. Petersen explained, in relation to enforcement, that there have been occasions that the city was short on manpower or equipment in relation to picking up brush, e.g., after a heavy storm.

"We try to make a diligent effort to pick up brush at the same time, (as other refuse). If it's not on the same day, there will be no ticketing if it's our fault," he said.

He also assured Mr. Pinkos that such a situation can be monitored so citizens won't be ticketed if the city fails to pick up the refuse.

## Curb Ramping Bid Accepted

A quote for the ramping of curbs at intersections, (removal of architectural barriers), as part of The Woods' 1979 Community Development Block Grant program was accepted by the council at its rescheduled regular meeting Monday, September 10.

The low bid of the A and T Excavating, Inc., of Mount Clemens in the amount of \$15,014 was accepted by the council, with the other bid coming in at \$18,824.

As part of the city's program, which totals \$120,000 for the year, the northwest area of the community is receiving the main focus, with \$7,600 for curb ramping being originally requested.

However, Administrative Aide Gerard E. McNamara said the city has requested a transfer of funds so more curbs can be ramped, (hence, the higher quote), going from water main work to the removal of architectural barriers as there's a surplus of monies for water main work. Until final word is received from the county, he

said at least \$7,600 worth of ramping can transpire.

City Administrator Chester E. Petersen told the council 115 individual curbs would be ramped. Work would be mainly in the northwest area of the city, plus at every intersection on the west side of Mack from the north to the south city limits.

He added that around 30 percent of the curbs had already been marked for removal under the city's sidewalk program.

the 1980-81 school year. It has, however, put its central office and auxiliary services buildings on the market.

Instead of closing schools, the School Board has responded to the decline in the number of students by physically expanding its programs — much to the educational advantage of Pointe students, according to Mr. Zenn.

Music, art and special education teachers have taken over empty classrooms to set up permanent bases for their activities. Parents in a few schools have converted unused rooms into inexpensive, paperback book libraries for their kids.

"In order to actually close three of four schools, we'd have to consolidate considerably and retrench," said Mr. Zenn.

"I think our kids would be missing some fine opportunities if we did," he added.

There was some good news for school administrators among the figures in the enrollment report as well as bad. For the first time in many years, the number of kindergarten children attending their first day of school in The Pointe increased by a modest eight students.

It may not be much, but the figure tends to confirm a possible trend detected in earlier census reports — that the local birthrate is picking up.

"It's too early to tell if it's a true trend, but we're hoping it is," said Mr. Zenn. "We might see an increase or at least a stabilization of enrollment in the years ahead."

But until that trend works its way up the grade levels, the schools can expect enrollment to continue to decline by about five percent a year, Mr. Zenn said.

This year's enrollment breaks down to a total of 3,909 students at the elementary level. (a loss of 236), 1,057 in the middle schools. (a loss of 39 students), and 3,988 in the high schools. (a loss of 263 students).

As usual, there were more students at South High than at North, although the difference has been reduced. This year there are 1,903 students at North and 2,085 at South High.



## Pointe Sail Crew Takes Great Lakes Match Title

An all-Pointe sailing crew earlier this month traveled to Youngstown, N.Y., and brought back the Richardson Cup, symbolizing match racing supremacy on the Great Lakes.

The team, sailing for the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club and representing the Detroit River Yachting Association (DRYA), was skippered by Eric Hollerbach of Lewiston road. Crew members were Bob and Al Declercq, Joe Kobylak, Roger Gamache and Bill Pratt.

The winning team had the best record, (4-1), in the five-race series held in Youngstown from Tuesday, September 4, through Friday, September 7. The races were sailed on a modified Olympic course, with no reaching legs.

The team thus defeated other crews representing each of the five Great Lakes, with the next best series record being 3-2.

Sailing on loaned C&C 29s, the races were an added challenge to the Pointe crew, none of whom had sailed that boat before. To Hollerbach, who sailed the elimination series here in Detroit on North American 40s, (NA-40), the 29s were too small for match racing.

Saying the smaller boats turned too fast, he explained the leading boat can lose the tactical advantage of position if the other boat can easily tack away. Larger boats turn more slowly and are more work to tack.

An added disadvantage, Hollerbach said, was the fact that all of his crew but one were well over six feet tall, and used to working on a larger boat. Working in the relatively cramped quarters of a much smaller cockpit, there were a lot of elbows knocking.

Hollerbach and his crew had to beat out three challengers in Detroit prior to earning their right to represent the DRYA. The leading opponent proved to be Gene Mondry's Leading Edge, out of the Bayview Yacht Club. Hollerbach sailed Frangipani, another NA 40.

He credits his victory in the Richardson Cup mainly to the fact that his crew has sailed together for quite some time on other boats. "Our depth of knowledge in match racing became obvious," he said, giving credit to the tactician, Al Declercq, who "did an outstanding job of out-thinking the opponents."

As the crews were limited to two headsails per race, (size and weight depending on the wind strength), the

boats were theoretically supposed to be equal. Hollerbach, however, said the boat they sailed on for the first race, and their only loss, never did win a race. Fortunately, they only got it once.

Although it took two days to do it, he said, "we were able to analyze our sails and determine what point of sailing was the best for them, then force the other guy, with tactics and strategy, to come to our point of sailing."

The crew is now hoping for an invitation to the prestigious Congressional Cup series next March in Long Beach, Cal. If they go, they'll be sailing aboard



### SEMOG Says Citizens Drive Alone, Lose Money

Thousands of drivers in southeast Michigan are losing about \$11.20 each week, reports SEMOG. (Southeast Michigan Council of Governments), in a news release.

That's because they are not doubling up on their way into work and, therefore, on the average, shell out about \$22.40 each week that could be cut in half if they'd only find a friend.

A recent study by SEMOG confirms that, on the average, most people are still riding in their cars by themselves.

And that's not good. SEMOG says, for saving energy, curbing air pollution or avoiding traffic jams.

SEMOG, which is in the business of transportation planning for the seven counties of southeast Michigan, released a summary of a traffic-counting survey that was conducted in early May with the help of the Michigan Department of Transportation.

During the survey, traffic surveyors were stationed at 69 locations scattered throughout the seven counties of southeast Michigan. The surveyors noted the number and type of vehicle on the road, (cars, vans, motorcycles, trucks), the number of

passengers each carried and the time of day.

Although SEMOG transportation planners will be using the data in sophisticated, computerized analyses to determine whether various transportation and air quality-related programs are useful or needed, the data itself produced some interesting findings about passenger loads and travel.

For example, people using their cars in the morning from 7 to 9 a.m. will generally be alone, while the midday period from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. will show the greatest amount of ridesharing.

More people also ride by themselves on urban freeways than on rural arterial roads.

But, in the more rural counties, (Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw), people tend to double up more on arterial roads than on freeways running through the same area.

The reverse is true in the country where people seem to ride together more often on their freeways than they do on their arterial roads.

And, for those who don't like to follow a truck, you'll have to put up with more trucks on the road during the midday period than at any other time.

SEMOG's report says that when all locations were grouped together, the average passenger vehicle occupancy load never even reached 1.5 persons per car.

The highest average passenger load was 1.44 and occurred on local rural roads from 2 to 5 p.m.

The lowest figure was 1.15 for urban freeways between 7-9 a.m.

The survey was conducted to aid SEMOG and other agencies in the development, evaluation and updating of regionwide and local transportation plans and needs, including ridesharing programs. The statistical data also will be used in SEMOG's air quality planning work.

"If you know what type and how much traffic is using a particular road, you can better estimate the amount of air pollution that is being discharged daily into a certain area," says Michael M. Glusac, the council's executive director. "We need that kind of information."

SEMOG said it intends to do another study next spring to see if the energy situation, ridesharing programs or other factors are having any impact on increasing vehicle occupancy.

### 'Alice in Wonderland' Set for Performance at Punch

Ever since Marc Etter took over managing the Punch and Judy Theater last spring, he's been waiting for the opportunity to use the building for what it was first designed for. On Sunday, September 23, he will premiere live drama at the theater with two different productions of Lewis Carroll's "Alice in Wonderland."

For Mr. Etter, who formerly toured with a children's theater group, and holds a degree in speech and drama, it will not only be a testing of the waters here for drama in general, but also a tryout of a new concept he has for familiarizing children with the theater.

Using a shortened version of the play, the children's offering at 1 p.m. will have a question and answer period following the show, with the actors participating, as well as a visual tour of the backstage area along with explanations of how things work there. A longer, more mature version for adults will be held that evening.

Mr. Etter, who has approached numerous school systems about setting up field trips for students, said he already has engagements set up with several schools for October.

Sunday's performance, he said, is "to get reaction to it before the schools start coming," as well as "to have a chance to have the adults view the product we are producing for their children."

Three members of the cast are from the Pointes: Maureen Murray of The Woods participated in the first summer stock at the Grosse Pointe Theater; "Bye Bye Birdie."

Thirteen-year-old Wendy Honstain of The Farms has been involved in the Grosse Pointe Children's Theater for two years and was last seen as Sara Crewe in "The Little Princess."

Aden Russell of The Woods is currently playing the female lead in the original jazz opera "The Peddlars' Parade" at the Grand Circus Exchange and has also done much work with the Grosse Pointe Theater. Ms. Russell has worked with the Dearborn Civic Theater and the Windsor Community Theater as well.

Cynthia Harris-Czuchaj appeared in the Robert Altman Academy Award nominated film, "Nashville." Her last performance was with the Studio 100 production of the University of Detroit as Carla in "Kennedy's Children." She's a resident of St. Clair Shores but will soon be moving to The Woods.

To encourage educational patronage, Mr. Etter is offering half price admission to all teachers, and school administrators at the Sunday evening performance.

He also has invited some local political figures, as well as Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and at least one member of the state board of education who he said has

been supportive of his efforts, John Waterman Jr.

The children's performance begins at 1 p.m., and lasts for two hours. Only about 45 minutes of that is the actual show, which means that even a first-grader will be able to absorb all that happens within his attention span, Mr. Etter explains.

The adult performance begins at 8 p.m. and is a full feature length production. That version, he said, isn't suitable for small children, since it contains considerable violence.

The production is being directed by Vincent Hall-Balestri, whose adaptation of "Alice" for the Am-ranth Theater in Chicago in 1965 won favorable reviews.

## Everything's AOK at Science Center



A 10,000-pound Apollo Command Module Egress Trainer, developed by NASA for crew practice in emergency rescue operations, was moved into the Detroit Science Center the last Wednesday in August, much to the delight of Junior League of Detroit members who have worked for over two years to acquire the exhibit. MRS. CHARLES B. VAN DUSEN, MRS. WILLIAM J. GEHRKE and MRS. ROBERT J. VIEWIG, (left to right), are members of the Junior League's Science Center committee chaired by Mrs. G. Howard Willett, III. Other members are the Messdames Paul R. Gilleran, Arthur E. Judson, J. Russell Labarge, Jr., Joerg M. A. Lehnert, Robert R. Michalik, Frederick L. Olds, C. Kenneth Perry, Jr., Michael R. Ryan, James S. Sanford and Miss Bethine Whitney.

The giant module, built just prior to Apollo XI, has been used by NASA for training during the Apollo, Skylab and Apollo-Soyuz space series for quick exit in the launching pad.

The Junior League of Detroit is responsible for providing the exhibit, on permanent loan from the Smithsonian Institution, to the Detroit Science Center, and Louis Purnell, curator of the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum, and Curtis Graves, chief of Community Affairs at NASA, were the primary individuals instrumental in the complicated task of bringing the Kennedy Space Cen-

ter module to its new home. Logistic problems developed in moving the massive Egress Trainer from Florida through a glass-paneled exterior wall of the Science Center.

The Fruehauf Corporation provided transportation from the Kennedy Space Center, and the first problem arose when the mammoth size of the transport truck required front and rear flashing escort cars.

In Detroit, three large glass panels and steel beams had to be removed to provide access for the transport lift truck, donated by International Industrial Contractors,

to lift the module and gently bring it to its resting spot on the Science Center's first floor.

The module is on view now, from a staircase, enabling each observer to see the intricate hatch opening and the lighted interior complete with a simulated astronaut.

It will be surrounded by large, silk screen photographs, suspended from the ceiling, depicting an Apollo launch sequence from lift-off to splash-down.

The formal dedication, with an Apollo astronaut and NASA officials as special guests of honor, will take place in early October.

The Norwegians arrived a little later and, with their adaptability to a cold climate, stuck to the north and settled in Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa.

Religion also was prominent in their very baroque and rococo Rosemaling. Some symbols date back to early Mesopotamia.

Since the Vikings brought back Africa from as far away as Africa and the Orient, as well as southern Europe, styles from many lands are sometimes reflected in Rosemaling.

Folk Art in America lasted from 1700 to 1850. It died with industrialization, but a revival of interest has sprung up in recent years in both the eastern and western states and, although today's decorative artist maintains respect for the traditional ways, many new and creative approaches and interpretations are being developed throughout the country.

ing is defined as "the method of painting designs on any object to decorate or make a picture." Tole painting today is dedicated to preserving and renewing interest in the various styles of folk art that originally came to America from Europe.

The Pennsylvania Dutch and Early American Decorative and Tole painters were influenced by the styles of the English, French, Norwegian Rosemalers and country painters.

In French, Tole painting means "painting on tin." During the French Revolution, many aristocrats sold their beautiful silver pieces for survival money and turned to a much less impressive substitute: tin.

Craftsmen, in an effort to retain some of the graciousness of past days, painted lovely designs on the tin utilitarian pieces. Many of these objects made their way to America, where Tole was called "Poor Man's Silver."

When Edward J. Pattison, an Irish immigrant from Dublin, started a business as a tinsmith in Berlin, Conn., about 200 years ago, he soon discovered that painted tinware was the hit of the day. Pattison hired local ladies to paint his wares. Country peddlers sold them throughout the east.

Meanwhile, slightly farther south, the Pennsylvania Dutch, Germans who followed the first English Quakers to William Penn's land of freedom for all peoples, were developing their own style of folk art.

They decorated everything: their furniture, their cook-
