Grosse Pointe Theater presents awards and announces new season

Walking off with statuettes for best in category were: "Anything Goes"—Olivia Wickline of St. Clair Shores and Toni Moore of Detroit, properties; Al Bertel of Warner road, for the featured role of Elisha Whitney; Richard Vreeland of Audubon

road for the supporting role of Moonface; and Gwenn Samuel of Moran road, makeup.

"Equus" awards went to Steve Linne of Maryland avenue and Harry Albertson of Warren, lighting; Bill Clyne of Detroit, sound; Margaret Guertler of Meadow lane, costumes; Harry Stutt of Harper Woods, technical direction; Dean Erskine of St. Clair Shores for the leading role of Dr. Dysart; Lucy Rea of Detroit, producer; and Barbara Bentley of Detroit, director.

Kay Hunt of Trombley road received a Clarence for set dressing in "Blithe Spirit," while Toni Moore received a Clarence for the non-fea-

tured role of Edith and Donna Di Sante of Harper Woods won for the supporting role of Madame Arcati.

"Zorba" awards included Wayman Ezell of Detroit for choral direction and overall musical direction; Michael Boccia of East Detroit for the non-featured role of Fivos; Jeanne Christman of Vernier road for the featured role of the Leader; Harry Albertson, set design; Don Ross of Warren, choreography; Barbara Roney of St. Clair Shores, stage manager; and Gigi Gaggini of Moran road for the lead role of Madame Hortense.

The prestigious Worker of the Year Awards were voted to Dianne Peters of Hollywood avenue and Harry Stutt.

Following presentation of a ceremonial gavel to retiring president Tom Gallagher of Hampton road, the new season was announced by Walter B. Maher of Three Mile drive, the president-elect.

Breaking with the tradition of recent years, GPT will open its new season with a drama of historical proportions, Ronald Millar's "Abelard and Heloise." Seniors can hitch a ride with WAYCART

WAYCART, Wayne County Advance Reservation Transportation, a new service for senior citizens offered through SEMTA, is now in operation in Grosse Pointe.

Customers can arrange to be picked up from their homes, taken to their destination and returned by calling for a reservation up to six days in advance.

The service does accept same-day requests as well, but cannot guarantee a first choice on exact times for pickups. At the time of the call, SEMTA checks the bus schedule and negotiates pickup and return times with the seniors. They must be flexible since this is a shared ride service.

The small bus holds 12 passengers and two wheel chairs. It is available for transportation throughout the Grosse Pointes, as far as Eastland shopping center and to part of De-

troit's east side. Longer trips are transferred to a SEMTA bus line by the WAYCART vehicle.

It is possible to travel to Oakland County which has a similar program, by calling both services to arrange for a WAYCART bus to transfer to an Oakland vehicle. Exact times are more difficult, however since they are essentially independent operations.

WAYCART drivers will assist patrons on and off of the vehicle, but if attendants are required to help passengers into homes and stores they must accompany their patients and ride free of charge.

WAYCART currently operates Monday through Friday, from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. The cost per trip, between 60 cents and \$1.40, is given when the reservation is made. Based on the demand, the service may expand to Saturdays and evenings beginning in the fall.

Coats has a job at U-M

Grosse Pointe's often controversial superintendent of schools William Coats has a new job—if he wants it—at University of Michigan's school of education.

The university Board of Regents voted July 16 to grant Dr. Coats a full professorship with tenure beginning this fall in a "consultative" capacity, according to a university spokesman.

THAT MEANS COATS will be allowed to spend at least one more year as full-time superintendent of Grosse Pointe schools. He will not have teaching assignments at U-M for "a year or more, until Grosse Pointe finds a new superintendent," according to dean of the school of education Joan S. Stark.

That does not mean that the Grosse Pointe board of education will immediately begin a search for a new superintendent, however. Local board members are waiting for word of acceptance from Dr. Coats, who is away this week on vacation.

Earlier this week the superintendent

ent said he was aware of the U-M Regent action, but had not received official notice. "When written notification is forwarded to me, I will make an appropriate response after consultation with the Grosse Pointe board of education," Coats said.

But there is no suspense about the offer in U-M offices. Dean Stark said it is her knowledge that "Dr. Coats will accept the new job." She added that Coats will be expected to meet "an evening or so a week" with U-M faculty for consultation during the first year. She said he will officially be on sick leave for 1980-81.

He will eventually join the educational administration and supervision department as teacher and researcher, she said.

COATS WILL BE leaving behind in Grosse Pointe a \$50,500, five-year contract that includes a house and free utilities a part of its fringe benefit package.

He came to Grosse Pointe in 1976 from Kalamazoo, where he also was superintendent and immediately began instituting a series of manage-

HUD Spends \$100,000 To Fight Mack Blight

An ambitious plan to immunize the Grosse Pointes against urban decay came a step closer to implementation last week when Wayne County awarded a \$100,000 grant to four Pointes for redesigning storefronts, beautifying sidewalks, and improving parking along Mack Avenue.

The program is funded by the federal department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) which funnels grants through the county's Community Development Block Grant office.

The grant will be divided among Grosse Pointe Woods, Farms, City and Park, through which Mack Avenue is the major commercial artery. It will serve as seed money for implementing a series of short and long-term projects aimed at preventing urban decay from getting a foothold in the Pointes.

IN THE COMING months, city officials, business owners and planners are expected to hammer out the details of precisely how the grant money will be allocated and where improvement projects will start.

Generally, a comprehensive year-long study and design plan completed last week by Gerald Luedtke and Associates, Inc.—an accomplished urban planning firm—is providing analyses and guidelines which the cities will follow.

But bringing Pointe city officials to a consensus on any issue is usually a difficult task so county officials have built in some stipulations aimed at assuring distribution of the grant money according to need.

The four cities must agree on the distribution of funds and there must be evidence of private and public financial commitment to implementing the plan before the \$100,000 will be awarded, according to James Curran, director of Wayne County's Community Development Block Grant program.

"The four communities must respond to need, and the greatest need is in the Park," said Curran who resides in the City.

Grosse Pointe Park is already feeling some effects of urban blight at its western limits. City Manager John Crawford said he was satisfied with the grant's stipulations.

CRAWFORD HAD submitted his own \$94,000 grant application to the county proposing an improvement project similar to Luedtke's on a smaller scale. Crawford said he doubted the grant for Luedtke's plan could accomplish the goals he en-

visioned in the Park's individual proposal.

He added that he was "very excited" about the portion of Luedtke's plan that proposes a landscaped median on Mack at the Detroit-Park border. The project would widen Mack, add a landscaped median, and level some buildings to increase parking. The intent is to create a dramatic demarcation at the entrance of the Park, according to Luedtke.

The median project is just a small part of Luedtke's comprehensive plan and it could cost \$1 million, Crawford estimated. Much of that money

would have to come from the business owners and from the Park itself, which like the other Pointes, is already straining its budget to provide basic city services, Crawford said.

In spite of the finance questions, Crawford said he agreed with Luedtke's blight prevention strategy.

An often overlooked benefit of such long-range improvements is its positive effects on commercial property values which triggers a rise in residential property values, Crawford added. "All the way around it has a positive effect," Crawford said.

While Luedtke's plan concentrates most improvements in the Park, it also focuses on two other major development areas: the Mack-Moross area and Mack north of Vernier in the Woods.

Bryant and Higgins face off in debate

Grosse Pointe's state Rep. William Bryant Jr. and Pat Higgins, his Republican challenger in the August 5 Primary, will discuss campaign issues tonight (July 24) at 8:30 p.m. at Christ the King Church, 20338 Mack.

The meeting was arranged by Mrs. Higgins, and she's billing it as a debate on the "due on sale" clause of savings and loan legislation that was recently approved by the House with Bryant's help.

The "due on sale" clause, according to Mrs. Higgins, is a "terrible rip off to homeowners and real estate people." She says the bill could cost homeowners as much as \$30,000 when they try to sell their homes.

"The clause is in the savings and loan companies' interest. It's a way for them to put a gun to your head and say 'renew your mortgage at the prevailing rate or come up with \$30,000 to pay off your old mortgage,'" Mrs. Higgins explained.

Bryant, House Republican Leader and Grosse Pointe's representative for the last 10 years, said he voted in favor of the savings and loan bill that included the "due on sale" clause with assurance from legislative leaders that the clause, and other controversial portions of the bill, would

be amended in the Senate before it is finally approved.

"THAT CLAUSE was part of a very complex rewriting of the total savings and loan association act. It was included to protect the companies from recent court decisions that need to be clarified," Bryant explained.

"I voted in favor of (the bill) with an assurance that the controversial portions—including due on sale—will be settled to the satisfaction of all interested parties in the Senate. I'm

Hill shops lament new meter hike

The recent increase in parking meter rates in the Farms, while in line with similar increases throughout the rest of the Pointes, has some shop owners and customers on the Hill upset with the city.

Shirley Hartley, owner of Hartley's Country Lane, for one, calls the increase a "negative" action.

"It didn't seem to be very timely," she remarked. "Here we're trying to get people to come back to the Hill. Most of the customers and shop owners I've talked with are surprised and upset."

THE FARMS CITY Council approved the increase at its May 19 meeting, basing its action on several factors. First, there has been no increase since 1971. Second, it wished to conform with the actions of the other Grosse Pointe cities. And third, the council hoped to structure the Farms' rates in a manner similar to the proposed parking structure of Richard C. Rich and Associates.

The city began installing the new meters last week and should finish within the next three weeks, according to Police Chief Robert Ferber.

It's Buck Rogers vs Erv Steiner for Wayne County Commission

Incumbent Wayne County Commissioner Ervin A. Steiner and challenger Buck Rogers will square off for Steiner's District I seat in the August 5 election, although a plan to reorganize the county could reduce the number of commissioners in a new county structure and eliminate that position.

That reorganization plan is also on the August 5 ballot, and will give voters the chance to approve a new charter for the county. If passed, new charter commissioners would draw up that charter, which, among other things, could call for a reduction from the 27 commissioners at present.

Steiner, a Republican, is seeking his sixth term in office. Rogers, also running as a Republican, has never held public office but has run for a Congressional seat in the 14th District, Detroit city councilman, city treasurer and sheriff of Wayne County.

Rogers who runs a business specializing in fiberglass sales, has worked on the campaigns of several politicians, including Blair Moody.

and claims to have attended numerous county commissioner meetings. He also has the endorsement of the Detroit and Southeastern Michigan Maritime Trades Port Council, AFL-CIO.

Although he's never won an election, Rogers is optimistic about his campaign to unseat Steiner.

"I think I have a good chance," he says. "I've been out talking to people door to door and the feedback I get is that Mr. Steiner's been in office a long time and maybe a change would be good."

The two men are at odds on a number of important issues currently facing the county, which is expected

to have a \$20 million deficit by the end of the year.

While Rogers fully supports reorganization, Steiner has gone on record as saying any reorganization should first begin at the state level and that streamlining and natural attrition is sufficient for the county.

Rogers also feels the 27 commissioners should be reduced while Steiner is satisfied with the status quo. Rogers claims most of the commissioners are mere "figureheads," with the people underneath them doing most of their work.

Students Work Way into Convention

Two native Grosse Pointers recently took part in an unique journalism "class" at Wayne State University offering credit hours to students who worked for a major media organization during the Republican convention.

Shelly Deneau, a South High graduate now living in Hamtramck and Susan Coppa, who lives in the Woods, were among more than 30 students from colleges throughout the state participating in the program.

Conceived by the Civic Host Committee and the Carl Byoir Public Relations agency of Detroit, the program was geared towards providing students with a chance to see the convention up close and to get practical experience working for various news media.

Wayne State University was invited to supervise recruitment of the students and the school's journalism program coordinator, Wilbur Elston, served as teacher.

Half of the students were from WSU's journalism department. The rest came from the University of Michigan, Michigan State University, Central Michigan, Eastern Michigan, Oakland University, Ferris State, Wayne County Community College and the University of Arizona.

Most were assigned to specific media organizations to act as messengers and drivers and to perform any other function required by the news media people. Others served as volunteers for the Civic Host Committee working out of Cobo Hall servicing the needs of the press.

As part of the course, they had to write a term paper on what they learned about the convention and on how the

media covered it. As an extra bonus, the majority of them got paid from the organizations they worked for.

Among those organizations were the Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Associated Press, Wall Street Journal, Newsweek and Newsday, CBS News, KYW-TV from Philadelphia, Independent News Service and Independent Network Service.

In their spare time, some of the students had a chance to get on the convention floor and attend committee hearings and press conferences.

Deneau, 22, a junior at Wayne and former editor of the "Tower" newspaper at South, worked for the Associated Press as a dictationist. Deneau took stories over the phone and keyed them into a computer, from which they went to either a regional or convention desk and then out over the wire.

She received stories from the Plaza Hotel, state delegations, even a couple from Los Angeles before Reagan came into town, as well as receiving speeches before they were delivered.

There was one drawback, however.

"I didn't get a chance to see the overall perspective since I was so busy with stories," she said. "I also didn't get a chance to go on the convention floor."

Still, she claimed, the program was worthwhile, affording students like her to make important contacts with people in the national news media and to get some practical experience as well.

"It was more realistic than regular classes," she added. "I think more students should have done it."

Deneau estimated she put in about 140 hours work during the convention and says she has a 50-50 chance

to work for the AP again when the Democrats hold their convention in New York.

Coppa, who is 29 and will be a junior at WSU next semester, was assigned to the Wall Street Journal. Her duties included obtaining advance copies of speeches, chauffeuring various news people around town and "just doing whatever they needed done."

Working out of Cobo Hall most of the time, Coppa had to settle for watching the convention on TV, but says she wouldn't have missed out on the experience.

"I loved it," remarked the 1968 South graduate. "I think the program was fantastic. I learned a lot about how the media handles the pressures of an event like this and how the news people prepare themselves."

Another Grosse Pointer, Elsa Frohman, also worked for a media organization although she didn't enroll in the class. Frohman, a senior at WSU, worked for the Independent Network News answering phones, running for Big Macs and viewing the network pool.

This last chore consisted of watching all the videotape recorded by the networks on the convention floor and logging all the events that happened as well as the time they occurred.

Working an average of 8-9 hours each day, Frohman got to "see some celebrities" and learn a bit about TV production, including how to

operate a videotape recorder.

Elston, the course's teacher, felt the program was important in that it gave students a "first-hand idea of how the media works and how a convention works. They also learned some of the routine work that journalists do, and realized it's not all glamorous."

Several of the students have been asked to attend the Democratic convention when it meets in New York in August by their media employers.

Mini-courses Offered in Aug.

Although the five-week summer session offered by The Grosse Pointe public school system ends Friday, July 25, special mini-courses in the basic skills will continue Tuesday through Thursday, August 12 to 14 and August 19 to 21.





says could be realized by next year involve sidewalk beautification, store facade and sign redesign. All three factors contribute to keeping business areas vital and attractive and could bolster the current shopping trend away from centralized malls, Luedtke said.

LUEDTKE SAID since his plan has been publicized, about 30 businesses along Mack have expressed interest in it. Some, including the Harvest Park Restaurant in the Park, Revco Drugs on Mack and Moross, and Roslyn Market in the Woods have said they will participate in initial improvement projects.

A goal that is perhaps 20 years away, Luedtke said, is the large scale redevelopment of the Mack-7 shopping area and property around St. John Hospital.

That area has much "untapped potential" and could be used to meet the area's demand for a first-class hotel, Luedtke's plan says. Also proposed are office structures, apartments and senior citizen complexes, improved parking facilities, and a climate-controlled SEMTA transit station.

But before any of those major developments take place, the cities must do a selling job of their business owners and win initial commitments that will get Luedtke's plan off the drawing board.

Detroit, which has already been ravaged by decay along Mack from Woodward to Alter Road will also play an important part in Luedtke's plan since it involves many businesses on the Detroit side of Mack. Detroit community leaders have ex-

pressed interest in Luedtke's plan and with Detroit's allocation of \$60 million in block grants it is in a much better position than the Pointes to finance improvement projects, Luedtke said.

The Woods' grant for Luedtke's plan was one of eight awarded by the county totaling \$600,000. About 30 communities were competing in the funds. The Woods' application

requested \$200,000. The \$100,000 grant it received was one of two for that amount. The other went to a proposed senior citizen housing project in Northville Township.

Block grant director Curran and his staff made recommendations after reviewing grant proposals. Their recommendations went to a committee of community leaders who made the final decisions.

sure it will come back to the House before it is signed, and we can look at it again then," he said.

Mrs. Higgins, however, is not so confident of Bryant's "assurances."

"The savings and loan companies have a very powerful lobby. There's no guarantee that bill will ever come back for (Bryant) to vote on again. He's playing politics with my mortgage," she said.

While Bryant says he's willing to discuss the "due on sale" issue, he also wants to use tonight's forum to air other campaign issues—including Mrs. Higgins' support of the Tisch tax-cut amendment, which he describes as "appealing in a simplistic way" but warns would be a "disaster" for local and state governments.

Bryant supports a legislative alternative to Tisch on the November ballot that would cut property taxes and at the same time raise the state sales tax to make up for lost government revenue.

Bryant, 42, is an attorney and for-

mer Wayne County Commissioner. He has not faced a primary challenge in a primary election since he first won his post in 1970.

His campaign literature describes him as a "moderate on social issues and a fiscal conservative." It proudly points out he received a low score of 24 out of 100 from the Liberal Americans for Democratic Action group.

Mrs. Higgins, 43, is a dental hygienist who has not been active in local party politics and is making her first bid for elected office. She has been active in the Grosse Pointe Motion Picture and TV Council as current president and Better Literature for Youth, as vice-president.

She said in an earlier speech that she plans to conduct her campaign "in the spirit of Barry Goldwater," and has suggested a 10 percent cut in salaries for legislators as part of her platform.

Whoever comes out on top in the August 5 Republican primary will face Democrat Bernard Simbole in the November election for the 13th district.

Spring will bring the third show of the season, Abe Burrows' delightful comedy, "Cactus Flower," March 25 to April 4, 1981. The story of the bachelor dentist who has remained single by convincing his understanding girlfriend that he is married with three children, is one which has garnered plaudits for both stage and screen versions from critics and public alike.

"Irene," the rousing, energetic finale to the season, is a happy reflection upon 1919 when the Great War was over and sentiment was sweet. In its 1973 revival, the Cinderella story with its beautiful songs, broad comedy and rousing dance numbers is lovely, lively, raucous, happy and thoroughly entertaining. "Alice Blue Gown," "They Go Wild,

Simply Wild, Over Me," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows," "You Made Me Love You" and the title song are but a few of the well-known musical interludes in this play. Season nights are June 3 to 13, 1981.

The new meters are all based on a charge of 20 cents per hour. The 15 minute meters cost a nickel, and the one, two and four hour meters cost a nickel for 15 minutes, 10 cents for a half hour and 25 cents for 75 minutes.

The 10 hour meters in the rear of the municipal lot behind the shops on Kercheval were previously 25 cents for every five hours. The new rate will up that cost to \$1 for those same five hours.

The general opinion of shop owners, people who work on the Hill and customers who shop there is one of disappointment. Maria Dinon, who owns the shop of the same name, feels Grosse Pointers shouldn't have to pay any more than the rate downtown, 10 cents per hour.

"It doesn't do any good and I don't understand their (the city's) thinking," she says.

CAROL BULLOCK, who works for Toles and Associates, calls the in-

crease "absolutely horrible. I'll ride a bike, hitchhike or walk but not pay that."

Bart Edmond, who lives in St. Clair Shores, feels the hike will hurt the customer who just parks for a few minutes. With the old meters, a penny was good for six minutes.

"It's silly," he says. "If you don't have a nickel, you have to put a dime in and only be gone a few minutes."

Sylvia Marinos of Johnston and Johnston real estate doesn't mind the increase so much as the trouble she sometimes has finding a place to park. That problem should be solved with the new parking deck.

While most of the quizzed seem upset with the new meters, there are a couple of exceptions. Shep Norton, owner of Picard-Norton, thinks the increase will lower the use of on Kercheval parking by non-retailers, such as real estate people, thereby freeing up additional spaces for customers.

"I'm certainly not unhappy with it," he says.





Two Named To Plan Posts

Reluctant City Council Aids SOS

Maybe it was grass-roots politics that finally persuaded the City Council this week to agree with the next step of a local group to keep small shops on Fisher road.

After some heated words between Save Our Shops supporters and the Council, city administrators reluctantly agreed to contact the state's Financial Institutions Bureau, who will eventually examine Detroit Bank & Trust's application to replace the shops with full-service subsidiary next year.

"Did you ever hear of grass-roots politics? Well, that is why we are here. We are coming to you for some help," said Joe Hartmann, SOS spokesman.

The SOS sympathizers say a meeting with the Financial Institutions Bureau will help "educate" them on how the agency approves a bank's application.

They say they have no choice but to turn to Lansing after a meeting last week with bank officials and the City "concluded on a negative note as far as the SOS position was concerned."

"We don't expect you to take sides, and we don't want to force you to take sides. We just want to find out what the procedures are in Lansing."

But Mayor David Robb told the group he wasn't exactly sure what the City's "responsibility" was to the bureau.

"Why should we have a meeting with them?" Mayor Robb said.

Councilman Arthur Fetters stopped the statement discussion and recommended that the City contact bureau officials in Lansing to arrange the meeting, which is expected to take place in August.

SOS crusader Elaine Hartmann said the meeting with bank officials was an attempt to try to change the bank's location choice, but that the bank "disputed most of our questions and claimed they have been blackjacked by the media over this issue."

Bank spokesman Charles Snell said the meeting has not changed the bank's plans.

"We have made our position very public through press releases and the media. Our position has not changed."

The bank intends to raze the Pointe Pedlar and other adjoining shops with a full-service bank. SOS supporters are especially angry over plans to create 30 new parking spaces. The bank recently extended the lease of the shops until June, 1981 in order to give the merchants time to relocate.

Pedlar owner Joyce Detwiler said she is looking for a new location in Grosse Pointe but would still renew her offer to purchase back her building from the bank.

Hartmann said if the Financial Institutions Bureau approves the bank's application, she will be on the doorstep of the Federal Reserve Board in Chicago, who also must approve the bank's plans.

Meanwhile, Hartmann said the SOS group intends to press on with a petition drive.

"We just aren't going to give up."

The Bureau has reports from consumers that the call letters of the radio station, over which the promoter advertises, are used in such a way that many people think the station is conducting the promotion. Many consumers who have received these calls are under the impression that they have been specially selected to receive this coupon book offer or have won a prize when such is not the fact.

"It is the Bureau's opinion that it is misleading for a coupon book promoter to notify a consumer that he is eligible to receive anything of value, if in order to receive this item, a special service and handling fee is charged," Ashcraft said.

St. Maron to Celebrate



overall charge of the county. Eliminating the majority of the commissioners would go a long way towards easing the county's financial difficulties, he adds.

If he's elected, Rogers says his role in county government would be to try and "shake people up" and concentrate on not wasting money. He cites the proposed mass transit system as one example of wasted tax dollars.

"We need it like Hamtramck needs a LaGuardia," he says.

Rogers feels the current commissioners should spend more of their time looking at the feasibility of saving those tax dollars.

"There's a hell of a lot of things that should be done," he continues. "If I'm elected, I'm not going to be a yes guy, I'm not going to be out to make friends, I'm gonna do what's right."

Responding to Rogers' charge that most of the commissioners are "figureheads," Steiner says, "It's obvious

he doesn't have a clear understanding of the office and its duties."

Reducing the number of commissioners to five, Steiner says, would result in Grosse Pointe and much of the east side losing all of its representation. He claims that input from all 27 are needed so that the county's problems can be fully understood.

The transit system, says Steiner, is "down the road," and he doesn't feel it's a pertinent issue at this time. What he feels is pertinent is trying to attain more fiscal responsibility within the county and state and in streamlining county government by eliminating or combining unnecessary departments and department heads.

According to Steiner, the root of the county's problems stems from what he calls the state's practice of mandating services and then refusing to pay for them. He would also like to see more power returned to the commissioners regarding the road commission and county judges.

Fine Arts Stereo
The Cable TV Connection

This is the eighth of a series of articles explaining the services soon to be offered by Grosse Pointe Cable TV.

Because of the phenomenal growth and popularity of the cable industry, the term "superstation" has become a household word, at least as it applies to independent television signals like WTBS and WGN.

Now, however, the term can also be applied to a radio signal. WFMT, Chicago's fine arts radio station, will be available via satellite to Grosse Pointe Cable subscribers this fall. WFMT is the first radio "superstation."

WFMT is an FM station that broadcasts in stereo 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The addition of unique equipment at the uplink site in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin allows the service to reach cable systems in full stereo. WFMT has been providing classical and fine arts programming to the Chicago area since 1951.

Regular programming in-

cludes live broadcasts or pre-recorded tapes of public performances from eight orchestras and five opera companies including the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Boston Pops Orchestra and the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Exclusive programs from overseas include international music festivals and BBC productions. Stereo simulcasting of the Metropolitan Opera, Boston Symphony Orchestra and Great Performances concerts is done in conjunction with public television station WTTW in Chicago.

WFMT's library contains more than 20,000 records, and at least 100 additions are made each month. Plus, more than 10,000 tapes of various programs are included in the library.

WFMT also produces many original programs including folk music concerts, jazz festivals, and interviews and commentaries. Prominent among these programs are Studs Terkel, The Midnight Special, Critic's Choice, Chicago Radio Theatre and Friday Night Folk.

Wakely Named to BOCA Post

Safe Ways to Insure Credit

When buying a bigger priced item such as a refrigerator or furniture on an installment plan a creditor may require insurance be carried as security for the debt. Credit life insurance, which guarantees the debt will be paid, can be purchased from banks, finance companies, retailers or auto dealers. Although the cost of credit life insurance and state regulations vary, it often tends to be overpriced.

Before you buy credit life insurance, The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants says, consider increasing your regular life insurance coverage first.

You can not be required to buy credit life insurance in order to get a loan. If you decide to buy this type of insurance, the lender does not have to include the cost in the loan's annual percentage rate.

The charges will be set in a separate statement for you to sign and you should understand you are signing such an agreement, otherwise you'll be buying the insurance without realizing it. CPAs say, read before signing!

You also can buy credit property insurance to protect against items being stolen, lost, damaged or destroyed. This insurance is expensive and does not provide complete coverage, say CPAs.

For example, coverage may be based on the amount still owed on the item at the time it was stolen and not on the full value.

You can protect yourself from sickness or an accident when you're between jobs by buying short-term health policies. The policies are good for 60 to 180 days and may be able to be renewed once or not at all.

Parade to Mark the Woods' 30th

The name of the community was changed to the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods in 1939 and it became a city in December, 1950.

Doris Kronmer, member of the recently organized Historical Commission, was appointed Chairman of the Grosse Pointe Woods 30th Anniversary Celebration Committee by Richard Miller, chairman of the Historical

Commission. In planning for this important day, she has been assisted by help and advice from Mayor George Freeman, City Administrator Chester Petersen, Councilman Frederick Lovelace, the Merchants' Association, the Recreation Commission, Senior Citizens Commission, and Beautification Commission. Public Safety Department Director John Dankel has also helped in the planning.

Chairmen for the celebrations are: parade — Richard Miller and Al Abend; music

and entertainment — Arlene Rapp; park ceremony — James Kaloger; merchants participation and donations — Loretta Mitschke; food and refreshments — Mary Jo Gustafson; publicity — John Hammel; senior citizen involvement — Irene Sutton, and Awards — Sue Strickroot.

During the day of celebration, an open house is planned for the City Hall on Mack avenue and Mayor Freeman will host the dignitaries invited to this historic event.

Police Spot Good Drivers

Considerate, careful, good drivers, who are on the "look out" to give other drivers a break deserve more recognition, according to Howard Cox, the president of the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit. That is why the TSA is holding its annual Good Driver Contest in Detroit for the 25th year.

"It seems that the only driver stories you ever hear are about the guy that 'tailgated' you, or the woman who 'cut you off,' according to Bruce Grubb, the TSA's director of field operations and coordinator of the contest. "We want to give some much-needed recognition to the drivers who help make driving in Detroit both safe and enjoyable."

Four officers from the Detroit Police Department's Traffic Safety Unit will help find Detroit's good drivers this year between July 21 and August 1.

One of the people spotted a few years ago for being a good driver was Pointer Ross Roy, chairman of the advertising firm of Ross Roy, Inc. Roy, however, declined to accept the award, because he considered himself ineligible as chairman of the TSA's board of trustees.

He is probably going to feel ineligible this year as well, because the Ross Roy firm is sponsoring the contest for the fifth straight year. The company will be presenting the winner — Detroit's Good Driver for 1980! — with a \$100 government bond. The second place driver will receive a \$50 bond. Three runners-up will be presented \$25 bonds each.

The drivers that are stopped during the contest will initially be presented with a paperweight ball point pen with the inscription: "Courteous Driver Award."

Over 250 of these awards are expected to be given out during the contest period.

The records of all drivers cited by the officers as good drivers will be checked with the Detroit Traffic Court records. The records of the outstanding drivers — generally those with no accidents and no moving violations — will be submitted to a board of judges who will select five finalists for a 10-mile competitive road test on August 14.

Dr. Robert O. Nolan, director of the Michigan State University Highway Traffic Safety Center, will judge the five finalists on how safely and smoothly they handle their car, their observance of traffic laws, their awareness of possible accident hazards and their courtesy to other drivers.

The Wayne County Department of Social Services ranks fourth nationally in terms of its Aid to Families with Dependent Children (ADC) caseload. The county trails only New York, Los Angeles and Cook County (Chicago).

Caulkins was inspired to start riding by President Carter's appeal for energy conservation, but Sterr says this benefit is secondary to him. Caulkins also enjoys the exercise. He tried jogging, but found biking much more satisfying and not as hard on the knees.

Caulkins pedals 2.5 miles each way from his home on Willow Lane to his job at National Bank of Detroit at St. Clair. He often rides home for lunch which makes 10 miles his daily total.

A regular golf and tennis player, Caulkins rides during the spring, summer and fall. Traveling in his coat and tie, he laughs, saying his co-workers would like to put in a shower for him on warm days.

Caulkins says that bicycling is great exercise and is happy to see others involved. He mentions friends Peter Thurber and Hugo Higbie who both ride several

miles each day. Dick Sterr pedals his bike five miles every day because he likes riding, the exercise and the beautiful route between his home on Canterbury Road to Carl Sterr's Men's Wear on the Hill.

He expressed his love for the outdoors saying, "It's nice to be outside, enjoying the trees and the smell of flowers." Sterr rides from May through October and keeps an exercise at home to stay in shape during the winter months.

The bike has become part of Sterr's business day. The devoted rider says that people are amused when he delivers a package or arrives by bicycle at a customer's home for a fitting.

Sterr travels this way rain or shine and keeps a set of old clothes at the store to be prepared for foul weather.

The 58-year old is in excellent condition. In addition to bike-riding he plays tennis two mornings each week. He is also a fisherman and boater.

Both Jack Caulkins and Dick Sterr certainly recommend their daily routine to others. It seems like a great idea, especially these days.

Starfish: an aquatic oddity

With eyes at the end of each arm, a stomach that can turn inside out, and the ability to regenerate new arms, the starfish — or sea star — surely ranks as one of the ocean's strangest inhabitants.

Starfish, which are found in tidepools of every ocean in the world, are not really fish at all, says the current issue of Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine. They belong to a group of sea animals called echinoderms, and come in a variety of shapes, colors, and sizes. The largest can measure two or three feet across.

Sea stars get around by way of hundreds of tiny tubelike "feet" located on the underside of each arm, explains the National Wildlife Federation's monthly publication for children. Suckers attached to the end of the tubes enable the animal to grip onto rocks, as well as its next meal.

Once a sea star homes in on dinner, a scallop perhaps, it locks onto its shell, and its tube feet begin to suck the shell open. The scallop, with only two muscles to hold its shell tightly shut, quickly tires of the tug-of-war.

It's a battle the scallop always loses. After the shell

Drowning Prevention Stressed

Summer means swimming, scuba-diving and other water activities. Too often, it also involves accidental drownings.

According to the American Lung Association of Southeastern Michigan (ALA-

SEM), drowning is the second most common cause of accidental deaths among children under 15. Only motor vehicles accidents take a higher toll.

Drowning victims include infants unattended in bathtubs as well as children who fall into ponds, plunge through thin ice, swim beyond their depth or endurance, or misuse scuba or snorkel equipment.

Most drowning victims, says the lung association, are boys in the 10 to 19 year-old range.

While submerged in water, a natural protective response by the body takes over to keep the person alive longer. During submersion there is no breathing and therefore no oxygen entering the lungs or blood. However, a major redistribution of blood may occur, flowing to the brain and heart, organs that are very sensitive to a lack of oxygen. Blood may flow away from the skin, muscles and stomach, where it is not so critical for instant survival.

For complicated chemical reasons, oxygen concentrations are more sharply reduced.

June Jobless Rate Stabilizes
Employment continued to decline, but unemployment was virtually unchanged in June, the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor reported. Following extraordinarily large increases in both April and May, the unemployment rate held about steady at 7.7 percent in June.
Total employment — as measured by the monthly survey of households — dropped by 450,000 over the month. At 98.5 million in June, employment has declined 1.4 million since February and was at about the level which prevailed a year ago.
Nonfarm payroll employment — as measured by the monthly survey of establishments — fell by more than half a million in June to 90.1 million and also was at about its year earlier level. Average weekly hours fell for the fifth month in a row.
Both the number of unemployed in June, 8.0 million, and the unemployment rate, 7.7 percent, remained near their May levels. Despite the stability in overall joblessness, the number of persons on layoff as well as those whose jobs have been terminated continued to rise in June. This was countered by a decline in the number of unemployed who were reentrants into the labor force and those leaving their jobs voluntarily.

Reagan: True Conversion?

Now that the convention dust has settled at the Joe Louis Arena, Cobo Hall, the Ren Cen and even the Grosse Pointes, and the sound and fury of the delegates have died away, it is appropriate to try to put the 1980 Republican Convention into perspective.

It was, of course, a Reagan convention all the way, even though it had its surprises, too. The chief surprise was the performance of Ronald Reagan himself who proved to be less of a conservative ideologue and more of a moderate than many people had expected.

REAGAN'S NOMINATION—coronation was the popular description—was a foregone conclusion when the session opened and that certainty robbed the Republicans of the drama and suspense that results from a closely contested convention. The presidential nomination went according to script—and so did the conservative platform. But the choice of a vice-presidential candidate was something else again.

Gerald R. Ford had been expected to play only the role of a respected elder statesman in celebrating his 67th birthday with a convention speech. But after Ford's hard-hitting and effective speech aroused convention enthusiasm, Reagan's interest in a Reagan-Ford ticket was revived.

Even though the TV networks convinced almost everyone that Ford had agreed to run, Ford himself wasn't convinced—and Reagan turned to the only man who had given him a genuine contest through the long series of primaries. Even the choice of George Bush was somewhat of a surprise. In the public perception, if not in reality, Bush had been regarded as too much of a moderate for the GOP ultraconservatives to accept.

Yet in choosing Bush Reagan showed greater independence from the right wing than had been anticipated. Of course, Bush brought to the ticket Washington and foreign policy experience in the executive branch and Congress that Reagan lacks. Bush balanced the ticket geographically and ideologically. He also blunted the age issue. And while he pledged to support the entire platform, he personally had endorsed the Equal Rights Amendment which the party had refused to do. So Bush brought certain assets to the ticket, despite the right wing criticism and despite Reagan's awkward handling of the Ford candidacy.

Yet earlier Reagan had shown unexpected independence in trying to conciliate the moderates, minorities, women, union members and others who had been dissatisfied with the platform and other convention proceedings.

After adoption of the platform, Reagan tried to placate backers of the Equal Rights Amendment and in his acceptance speech pledged to seek

elimination of discrimination against women. He acceded to the request of the Black Republican Council to put Benjamin L. Hooks, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, on the convention program. He consulted with unemployed auto workers and showed sympathy for their plight. He ate lunch in Hamtramck to show his interest in the problems of that community—and by extension in the problems of ethnics everywhere.

REAGAN'S FOREIGN policy advisers even tried to smooth off the rough edges of the defense and foreign policy planks whose strident tones had aroused fears of a new arms race with the Soviet Union. To cap these conciliatory actions, Henry Kissinger was persuaded to announce his own detente with Reagan, saying "it is time to close ranks and turn to Ronald Reagan as the trustee of our hopes."

All conventions seek unity. The Republican slogan, "Together, a New Beginning," emphasized that search. Yet Reagan and his cohorts did more to placate their GOP critics than anyone expected. In fact, Reagan went so far that some of his ultraconservative supporters felt betrayed, especially by the choice of Bush as his running mate. To them, Bush represents the effete Eastern, Rockefeller wing of the party even though he is a millionaire Texas oil man who has been long gone from Yale and New England.

All in all, Reagan's compromises and conciliatory moves brighten the party's hopes for victory in November. To Michigan Republicans, who gave Bush a stirring victory in the state's Republican primary, and especially to Grosse Pointe Republicans, who favored Bush by a two-to-one margin, the choice of the Texan as Reagan's running mate came as a welcome consolation prize as well as an important offset to the platform planks which had displeased many of them.

In his acceptance speech, which normally sets the tone for the campaign, Reagan again tried to show that he is more of a reasonable moderate than a shrill conservative ideologue. He still emphasized his opposition to big government and the Democratic Party but implied he is not as trigger happy nor as insensitive to the needs of the less privileged as he has been painted.

As the campaign progresses, the public will have new opportunities to decide whether there is really a new and more moderate Ronald Reagan who is reaching out to broaden his party's base or whether the retired actor gave a convincing convention performance for cosmetic purposes and to paper over the ideological fissures in the Republican Party.

Local Sportsman Urges Hunters To Show 'Respect of the Land'

When Bradley Smith was a teenager in Grosse Pointe Farms during the late 1960's, he used to hunt out by 13 Mile Road in what was then wilderness.

That area has changed today as have the attitudes of most of the thousands of recreational hunters who descend upon Michigan's rural areas during each hunting season creating what Smith sees as a growing ecological problem.

The problem is the sheer number of hunters and the increasingly short supply of wilderness compounded by many hunters' "poor understanding" of outdoor ethics, said 30-year-old Smith, a hunter and fisherman who now lives with his wife and English Setter on a small farm in Midland Michigan.

Between teaching political science at Delta College and working on his Ph.D. in Natural Resources at the University of Michigan, Smith, a 1968 graduate of South High, and his wife find time to raise a few chickens, grow some vegetables, and hunt one deer a year.

In the coming year he'll also be using a \$2,000 fellowship from the National Wildlife Foundation to research and develop a national hunter

education program.

"I'm trying to do something practical and meet the doctoral program requirements, but do more than a statistical analysis that sits on a shelf," said Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Brent Smith of Mt. Vernon road.

Smith's goal is to develop a comprehensive program to deal with the whole range of ethical problems caused by the increased presence of the "urban hunter" on land that provides the livelihood for rural residents.

The problems range from much publicized fatal shooting accidents to the lesser-known problems of property destruction and trespassing, Smith said.

Using Michigan's existing hunter education program as a base, Smith is working with 30 states to develop guidelines which approach hunting as a privilege available to those who prove themselves qualified to earn it, Smith said.

The country now has about 10 states with mandatory hunter education programs compared to European countries where hunting is a privilege available only to the elite.

That attitude is shocking to many of the state's 750,000 hunters, Smith said, who see the hunting season as

a "party atmosphere with high powered weapons."

His program will try to inject a better understanding of hunting which in this country is a \$14 billion a year business involving two million hunters.

As an example of the kinds of gaps in existing state programs, Smith cites Michigan's duck hunting regulations which each year identify ducks with high populations. The problem is that most hunters don't know how to identify the animals and can't determine which are the proper ducks to shoot.

Smith's solution is to educate hunters to "respect the land" and to understand nature. The need to instruct hunters in ethics is analogous to the need to educate and license growing numbers of boaters and snowmobilers, Smith said.

Other problems are bureaucratic obstacles to implementation and public acceptance of its intentions, Smith said. He also said his program will be plugged into a hunter education program being developed by two national agencies for the U.S. and Canada.

"The problems are going to get worse," said Smith. "When the lake or forests belong to everyone, they really belong to no one."

UF Names Two GPF Residents

Two Grosse Pointe area residents have accepted key leadership positions in the United Foundation 1980 Torch Drive.

Charles T. Fisher, III, of Grosse Pointe Farms, will serve as Chairman for Chapter Campaigns; and Peter P. Thurber of Grosse Pointe Farms, a partner in the law firm Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, will serve as Chairman for Special Gifts.

The announcement was made by H.L. Smith, vice president and group executive, Power Products Group of General Motors Corporation and General chairman for this year's campaign.

As Chairman for Chapter Campaigns, Fisher will supervise the six chapter units that account for more than 90 percent of the Torch Drive total.

Fisher currently serves as president of National Bank of Detroit and is a director of American Airlines, Inc., The Detroit Edison Com-

pany, General Motors Corporation, Hiram-Walker-Gooderham & Worts, Ltd., and International Bank of Detroit.

Thurber will direct the pre-campaign solicitation for specially selected individuals, family groups and foundations as Chairman for Special Gifts.

A director of Detroit Area Council of Boy Scouts and the American Red Cross, Southeastern Michigan Chapter, both Torch Drive-sponsored agencies, Thurber is also a director of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

The 32nd annual Torch Drive will be conducted from October 13 to November 6 to raise operating funds for 137 charitable agencies in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

Last year's Torch Drive raised \$45.3 million.

Mack Plan Needs Support

The plan to halt blight and urban decay on Mack Avenue in the Pointes has moved one step closer to realization with approval of \$100,000 in Housing and Urban Development funds for demonstration projects in the communities involved. The federal funds, which come to the Pointes through the Wayne County Community Development Block Grant Program, support a worthwhile concept.

What will happen next, if all goes well, is that various kinds of demonstration projects will be approved to show specific ways of halting blight. They could include parking improvements, facade or storefront renovation, sidewalk beautification, improved commercial signs and security improvements through improved lighting and other efforts. The local governments in the Park, the City, the Farms and the Woods as well as private business interests which will benefit will share in the financing.

Before the demonstration projects can be started, of course, more preliminary planning is needed. Even the basis for distribution of the funds has not yet been settled, but areas in which blight already is threatened ought to have a strong claim for one or more demonstration projects.

ONCE THE POINTE communities agree on the distribution of funds, work ought to be started as soon as possible on some of the projects to see whether they hold promise of protecting Mack Avenue from any further invasion by blight and urban decay. If some of them work, they ought to be carefully tested to see whether their success can be repeated elsewhere or even expanded if possible.

Gerald Luedtke and Associates, the urban planning consultants, report that blight has been traveling down the Mack Avenue commercial corridor for about 40 years. It already cov-

ers the portion of Mack from Woodward Avenue to Alter Road in the city of Detroit and now is at the doorstep of Grosse Pointe Park. So the current program is one that is obviously needed, even though it still shocks a good many residents to realize that blight and urban decay can occur in the Pointes. The fact is, as the Luedtke report emphasizes, blight already has arrived here.

Blight has a nasty sound and yet it abounds in older communities. It can be seen, according to the Luedtke study, "in high degrees of store vacancy, stores which are poorly maintained, stores which are gaudy and unattractive, obsolete store fronts with poor display windows, unattractive and littered sidewalks, lack of off-street parking and such evidences of crime as metal grates pulled across store fronts at night." All of those evidences of blight are well-known to those who drive through the aging areas of Detroit.

But blighted areas go through several phases of deterioration. Usually, Luedtke points out, prime commercial enterprises and professional offices slowly move out and are replaced by marginal businesses, pornography stores and vacancies. That means as a rule fewer and poorer commercial and professional services to the residents of such an area. So halting the spread of blight ought to be of concern to all the residents of the Pointes and not just the business and professional men located in the threatened areas.

In fact, if the program is successful in halting blight, it will tend to enhance property values not only for the commercial areas but for residential areas as well. In the end, that could serve as the most important reason for community-wide support of the anti-blight program.

OSA to Choose Senior of Year

The deadline for receiving nominations for Senior Citizen of the Year Awards has been extended from July 15 to August 8, according to Peter Kok, Director of the Office of Services to the Aging.

"We're still looking for two outstanding senior citizens," he said, "one who has made a significant contribution to his or her community in the area of leadership, the other who has made a significant contribution in the area of service."

Nominees are to be judged on their activities over the past year, however, a person's contributions over a number of years will be given consideration. Only organizations may submit nominations. The awards are sponsored by the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging (OSA) and the Michigan State Fair. The U.S. government says the nation now has 520,000 millionaires, up from 180,000 in 1972, and the total is growing at the rate of 15 percent a year. New York state has the most—51,031 or 2.83 per 1,000 residents, but Idaho's 23,797 is at the rate of 26.65 per 1,000.

New SEMCOG Report Shows Ridesharing Up in Area

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) has released a study showing a significant increase in auto occupancy rates during the past year.

The 1980 Vehicle Classification and Occupancy Survey, carried out from April 14 through May 8 counted the number of people riding in cars at 39 key locations in the seven-county region.

The results showed that auto occupancy is lowest on urban freeways and highest

on rural main roads. Low occupancy is the norm for trips made during peak morning and afternoon hours (7:9 a.m. and 2-6 p.m.). Highest occupancy is found during mid-day (11 a.m.-1 p.m.) traffic.

However, there has been an increase during 1980 in the average number of persons per vehicle. The survey reveals that on urban freeways in the morning, occupancy increased from 1.13 in 1979 to 1.18 in 1980. Mid-day occupancy increased from 1.28 to 1.33 and for afternoon peak hours on urban freeways, occupancy increased from 1.24 to 1.28.

Rural freeways and main roads also show a consistent increase in occupancy this year when compared to the same time last year.

On rural main roads, occupancy increased during morning peak hours from 1.25 to 1.27, mid-day from 1.43 to 1.47, and late afternoon from 1.43 to 1.56. On rural freeways occupancy increased from 1.24 to 1.26 during morning hours, stayed at 1.45 during mid-day, and rose from 1.35 to 1.42 during late afternoon.

SEMCOG Executive Director Michael M. Glusac is enthused about the increase. "The figures at first glance appear to reflect only a small increase," Glusac said, "but given the great number of cars on the road in Southeast Michigan, it's a significant step."

Glusac attributes the in-

crease to two factors. "First, the price of gasoline has increased 40 cents per gallon since the same time last year. Rising gas prices have motivated increased ridesharing," he said.

"Second, because of energy, air pollution and traffic problems, ridesharing in general has been well-promoted during the past year by transportation planning agencies like SEMCOG, SEMTA and M-DOT as well as by employers sensitive to their employees' need for ridesharing programs," he added.

"The survey has again confirmed the need for SEMCOG's RideMatch program, especially as it serves to coordinate efforts to get people together who are interested in ridesharing—to save money and gas while helping to minimize traffic congestion and air pollution."

The survey was first conducted in 1979 when the Federal Highway Administration asked SEMCOG to test key locations in the region for vehicle type and number of occupants during morning, mid-day and afternoon peak hours. This year, however, SEMCOG conducted the survey on its own after finding the 1979 survey was a cost effective way of gathering data for transportation planning.

Formal statistics from the Vehicle Classification and Occupancy Survey will be available upon request later this summer.



Survival Kits at Children's

Children's Hospital of Michigan is doing something to help parents who are coping with the double burden of unemployment and the cost of unexpected medical care for their children.

Most importantly, the hospital is assuring parents that, regardless of their ability to pay at the moment, their children will receive the medical care they need. Children's also is distributing a Survival Kit to guide parents to sources of assistance for which they might be eligible, to ease the financial and other burdens of unemployment.

"Because of increased layoffs and unemployment in our area, many families who come to our hospital today may not have adequate insurance coverage or any insurance coverage at all to pay for medical expenses," says Virginia Henry, patient service representative supervisor at Children's.

"Parents can be assured that we will care for their children willingly and responsibly," reports Aliee Belden, the hospital's social services director. "Being unemployed is a new experience for many families, and we know they are concerned about how to pay the bills."

"They don't know what aid they might be eligible for. Frequently, they don't know where or how to begin looking for aid. The kits provide information about what is available, and we ask the parents to help us by applying for assistance from community agencies."

The Survival Kit was developed jointly by the admitting and social services departments at Children's. It contains several pamphlets from United Community Services which provide basic information about services and programs available from community agencies in Detroit and the tri-county area. There is also a listing of social services districts according to zip code.

Mrs. Belden notes that applications for assistance under any of the programs offered by the Wayne County Department of Social Services must be submitted to a district office which is determined by zip code. Parents who need to apply for emergency medical programs are referred directly to the Chief/Adult Medical District,

How to Freeze Peas in Pods

The newly popular edible-podded peas are ready for freezing now. Snow peas, sugar peas or Chinese pea pods are the same sweet, tiny peas in a flat pod, says Sharon Kennedy, Extension specialist in Foods and Nutrition at Mich-

igan State University. They should be harvested when the peas are just visible in the pod. To prepare for freezing, blanch a pound at a time in at least a gallon of boiling water for two minutes. Start counting time as soon as you put the peas in the water.

"We say it over and over, but the only way to destroy the enzymes that cause a grassy or hay-like flavor in vegetables during freezer storage is to blanch the vegetables properly," Kennedy says. "And the best way to blanch vegetables is to work with one-pound batches, use at least a gallon of boiling water per pound of vegetables and begin to time the process as soon as you put the vegetables in the water."

At the end of two minutes, remove the vegetables from the pot and put them directly into icy water to cool for as long as they were in the hot water. Then pack the peas into freezer containers, leaving some head space for expansion, and freeze.

Sugar snap peas, another variety of peas with edible pods, were introduced by Burpee last year and were immediately popular. These should be harvested when the peas are large and fully mature and the pods are round and two and a half to three inches long. Blanch these pods for two and one-half to three minutes; chill as for snow peas and pack for freezing.

Peas in the pod are not recommended for canning, but sugar peas can be shelled and canned just as you'd can regular peas.

Mammograms Helpful For High Risk Women

Annual mammograms for every woman over 50 are being recommended by one of the world's leading breast cancer experts, Dr. Michael J. Brennan, of Three Mile drive, president and medical director of the Michigan Cancer Foundation. A mammogram is an x-ray procedure which is highly accurate in detecting breast cancer and, according to Dr. Brennan, mammography is surrounded by considerable confusion these days.

"While experts discuss whether this procedure causes more harm than good due to low-dose x-ray exposure, women are left to deal with their fears over the conflicting information," Dr. Brennan says.

"For women with a higher risk of developing breast cancer, the benefits of low-dose mammography in finding cancers at an early stage outweigh the slight chances of possibly inducing cancer by the radiation decades later.

"Furthermore, it is now becoming possible to identify women who need particularly careful surveillance against the disease. Mammograms make it possible to examine the internal structure of the breast."

The incidence of breast cancer, leading cause of cancer death in women, increases rapidly after age 40. Other risk factors include:

- Family history of breast, uterine, ovarian or bowel cancer.
- Being childless or bearing one's first child after the age of 30.
- Onset of menstruation before age 12.
- Menopause after age 55.
- High socio-economic status.
- Northern European ancestry.

Obesity, hypertension or diabetes in post-menopausal women.

Women who have required a biopsy for benign breast conditions also have a somewhat higher risk of breast cancer.

Women between ages 35 and 50 should have a mammogram only if, in a physician's judgment, there are specific indications for it.

But all women, of every age, should learn the correct way to examine their breasts and do so on a regular schedule, Dr. Brennan emphasizes.

The Michigan Cancer Foundation, recently chosen as headquarters for the newly formed International Association of Breast Cancer, offers free breast cancer prevention services. These include a medical history, examination by a specially trained nurse, consultation with a physician examiner where indicated and a personal private tutorial on self-examination for each woman using the service.

Women may make appointments either directly or through a physician's recommendation. Further information on the foundation's breast cancer examinations may be obtained by calling the Breast Cancer Detection Center, 833-0710, Extension 371.

Presidential 'Wheels' Shown

The plush limousines and elegant carriages that carried the presidents of the United States have always fascinated Americans. The Detroit Public Library's current exhibit, "Presidents on Wheels," features some of those vehicles.

Photographs of horse-drawn broughams and victorias used by Lincoln, Grant and others are followed by turn-of-the-century motorized vehicles. There are pictures of Teddy Roosevelt on the campaign trail and Taft about to enter his chauffeur-driven White Steamer.

A top-hatted Herbert Hoover riding in the inauguration in a luxurious Pierce-Arrow is shown, along with the ill-fated Continental limousine in which Kennedy rode on that tragic day in Dallas.

The exhibit includes the flags and Presidential seals borne by White House limousines that served Johnson, Nixon, Ford and Carter. A special license plate with portraits of Eisenhower and Nixon recalls the 1954 in-

auguration. Most of the items in the exhibit come from the archives of the Detroit Public Library's world-renowned National Automotive History Collection. The collection contains about 1.5 million items relating to the history of the automobile.

Jim Bradley, curator of the collection, notes that he tried unsuccessfully to find a suitable illustration of what would be a very historic picture: one showing President McKinley in an auto. McKinley became the first United States President to ride in an automobile.

The car was a Stanley Steamer and McKinley said afterwards that he did not like automobiles. Ironically, his last ride in life was in an electric ambulance when he was rushed to a hospital in 1901 after being struck down by an assassin's bullet.

gan, Frank Hinks maintained a summer home off US-23, near The Narrows, and there came a day, in 1945, when the Alpena Township Board of Education asked if he'd be willing to sell a part of his land. It would, thought the Alpena Township Board of Education, make an excellent place for a school.

And Frank Hinks said, "No." His land was not for sale. For a school, he'd give it away.

The gift was 19 acres. The school that rose on it, in 1951, was named the Frank T. Hinks School. That, too, figures.

Now David Hinks, like his father Alpena-born, has come "home" with Avis to the north. Dick and David both became lawyers, following in Frank's footsteps. And like Frank, both have maintained strong roots in Alpena through the years. David lived most of his adult life in Grosse Pointe, but always Alpena remained in the background.

For the law makes a distinction between a domicile and a residence, and so does David. "Your home, your domicile, is where you think of it as being," he says.

"This (Alpena) was always my father's and mother's domicile, and it's also mine." The area has grown, but not changed. The brand new Frank T. Hinks School replaced a one-room schoolhouse in 1951. Since then, four additional classrooms, two in 1961, two in 1966, have been added.

The school district just completed a \$60,000-plus Hinks School renovation program. Its 421 students learn in an atmosphere that's as bright and modern as they are, but they're still kids, and times may change, but kids don't. And, in Alpena, the kids know the people who live around town.

David has lived around town for the past few years now. His name is Hinks . . . "Do you own the school?," the kids ask. No, but there's a connection. "Well, even if you don't own it, maybe you could help us get rid of this really rotten teacher . . ."

But don't think David and Avis have truly deserted The Pointe. Hinks roots are here, too. "We spend a lot of time in Grosse Pointe," Avis says, "and I recently chaired the Grosse Pointe Farm and Garden Club's annual flower show."

Then, being Avis, she puts in a plug for a friend. "The new chairman is Mrs. Arthur Seder, exhibits committee."







Bill & Jane Toast William & Mary

The cups may be made for coffee, but they're filled with champagne as BILL and JANE SMITH, of Colonial road, prepare to toast to their joint alma mater. The Smiths have a special reason for celebration. They've just finished spearheading the most successful annual fund raising campaign ever conducted by the nation's second oldest college. The 1979-80 William and Mary Fund collected \$392,000 to support academic and alumni programs. That's an increase of nearly \$40,000 over last year's record breaking total.

Thomas A. Graves, Jr., president of the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va., describes Bill and Jane as "two of the most dedicated and creative alumni to ever serve the college."

Graves cites as proof that the Smiths' enthusiasm was overwhelming—and contagious—the fact that almost 8,000 alumni across the nation responded by contributing to the 1979-80 campaign.

Bill and Jane own and manage "Mr. Tennis" in downtown Detroit, and Bill is a founding partner in Smith, Paklaian and Bell, Inc., a Detroit advertising firm. They kicked off the William and Mary Drive last September by sending some 25,000 alumni a bit of nostalgia: a real leaf from one of several magnolia trees on campus.

Later efforts included mass phonathons, handwritten letters and mailgrams, and the Smiths added visibility to the campaign by supplying buttons, ballpoint pens, balloons and key chains emblazoned with the slogan "Making the Eighties Our Best Years Yet."

They also took advantage of a readymade support staff of family members. Oldest daughter Laurie, who graduated from the College of William and Mary in 1974, now works for an advertising agency in New York City. Second daughter Susan married a professor, currently at Milliken University in Illinois.

Son Sandy, a William and Mary Class of '78 graduate, works for the Justice Department in Washington, D.C., and son Doug, a member of William and Mary's Class of '81, serves as his parents' "eyes and ears" in Williamsburg.

Bill Smith has spent more than 30 years promoting, for fun and profit, everything from the 1947 Varsity Show on the William and Mary campus to the retail-mail order "Mr. Tennis" business he and Jane founded. Bill spent three years at William and Mary (1940-43), then served in the military during World War II before returning to William and Mary to get his degree.

At college, he admits he was at times "a wild and crazy guy" who liked to organize things. He served as president of the Backdrop Club, president of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity and was a member of the choir.



In 1949, after what seemed like an endless job-search during the post-war unemployment period, he landed a job at a New York ad agency. His contact there was a tall, slender girl who was also a William and Mary graduate: Jane Spencer.

In a relatively short time, the Smiths became a team and moved to Detroit, where Bill started his own advertising firm. Both have been leaders in Detroit civic organizations.

Bill has received the Spirit of Detroit Award and the March of Dimes Award. He has served on the board of the Michigan Kidney Foundation, as director of the Torch Drive and as a leader in Citizens for Education. When she's not store managing "Mr. Tennis," Jane works for the United Foundation. She was named the Detroit Rehabilitation Institute's Volunteer of the Year in 1974—and later she was named the Rehab Institute's top female worker of the decade.

She is a former president of the local Kappa Kappa Gamma Alumnae. She joined the sorority at William and Mary, of course; also at William and Mary, she served as news editor of the Flat Hat and was a member of the chorus, the Student Assembly, the varsity tennis team and the women's athletic association.

MSU Offers Vegetable Garden Tips

Experienced horticulturists who visit vegetable gardens all over the country can tell you that a few simple practices make the difference between successful and so-so gardens. Your first garden can be an unqualified success if you follow this checklist. Draw up a rough plan of what goes where. Select varieties adapted to your climate. Start early and plant at the proper time. Dig in plenty of organic matter for good drainage. Cover the seeds to the recommended depth. Thin and space plants as directed. Water every week during dry spells. Feed plants occasionally. Use insect controls sparingly where and if necessary. Harvest when vegetables are at their peak. Garden plans are not straitjackets," says Gordon Dennis, Growing Goals coordinator. "All gardeners modify plans to fit the season and availability of seeds and plants." The major purpose of a plan is to tell you how many

packets of seeds you will need and how to arrange them so that the little stuff is in the front and the tall plants are in the back. The Cooperative Extension Service office can supply you with a list of vegetable varieties proved by trials to perform well in your climate. And ask friends and neighbors who garden; many will be using varieties from seed displays with excellent results. Others will be sending to mail order seedsmen for their old favorites and brand new hybrids. Planting time is not so critical where summers are cool, but over much of the country hot summer enters almost as soon as winter cold departs and the "fudge factor" on planting dates is greatly reduced. The old adage "cover seeds to three times their diameter" still holds. Old-time gardeners work up the soil, lay a 1" x 6" board down the center, then walk on it, making a wide depression. They scatter small seeds thinly on the firm soil, then sprinkle sand or vermiculite to cover. Larger seeds can be planted in deeper furrows, made with the corner of a hoe. Late and inadequate thinning of vegetable plants is almost a hallmark of beginning gardeners.

Shakey Start for Huron-Mackinac Race

After a somewhat shakey start Saturday morning under low wind conditions, the first of the record 290 boats entered in the 56th annual Port Huron-to-Mackinac race crossed the finish line Monday at 12:29 p.m.

The first finisher was the class A scratch boat Heritage owned by D. Wildman of Chicago. Second was Brassy, formerly Dutch Schmidt's Sassy, out of Macatawa Bay.

As of press time, boats were expected to finish by Tuesday morning and winners were not available.

But the big surprise came earlier in the race when the last of the first 15 boats to round the half-way point was a class D boat — Grosse Pointe architect John Stevens' Checkmate Too, a Chance custom yacht carrying its designer, Britain Chance.

As of Monday noon, three boats, Jaeger I. Moonraker

and Notre Dame Du Lac, were dismasted. Another, Bright Star, had rudder trouble and dropped out. A Coast Guard helicopter was called in to remove an injured crew member of the Sea Wolf.

Another near fatality was Golden Goose, owned by singer Gordon Lightfoot, which was hit by lightning at the race's start. The boat continued to race without its radio.

Class N of Division II

crossed the starting line at the scheduled 10:45 a.m. time. Southerly wind gave the leading edge to Scheherazade out of the North Star Sail Club, Little Yankee IV from the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club and Ayers Morison's Sunshine which berths at the "Little" Club. Later evening reports credited Class N's Rainbow Darter out of the Ford Yacht Club with leading the entire fleet which was spread out from the American shore to the Canadian shore across Lake Huron and still carrying spinners in the light going.

Two yacht clubs without their own "home" clubhouses stole the starting show in Class M. Bodacious and Sacre Blue out of the Lake Shore Sail Club were in first and third position starts with Grosse Pointe Sail Club's Cannibal in second. Another LSSC sloop, Wa-Ke-Ta soon came from behind, blanketing its way to the lead.

In spite of shifting, dying winds, Class L managed to get off to a good start with Bayview's Yare, John Tipp at the tiller, leading. Following closely and to windward were Misty out of Port Huron Yacht Club, Crescent Sail Yacht Club's Herb Mainwaring with Easterly and another Lake Shore Sail Club boat, Vauntercurrier. Boats were drifting backwards and some with 45 minute leads were still trying to get out of their own way. Among them was Charlie Bayer's Old Bear from Bayview in Class K. Old Bear has been a money finisher in previous Mackinacs.

While much of the CIC Class which races boat-for-boat, was lost in the spinner shuffle, Roy Hawkins out of BYC had his usual excellent start with Cygnus. Some of the I Class were sailing with the tail end of the L Class which started 45 minutes earlier.

It was 1:30 p.m. before the race got underway and still the air was scarce. The leaders in order of their appearance were: Gold Rush, Africa III, Quicksilver, J. O. & Co., Cadence, Happy Hour, El Rojo, Tomkat, Wild Card, Boomerang, and Hustler.

The start of Class D became rather hairy when Hot Flash and Belly Up, having picked up momentum in running the line, could not get out of each other's way. Both gave Taylor Made, the cruiser at one end of the starting line a good scare.

Leading the Class D fleet were Ping from Rochester, Mover, Out of Bayfield, North Star's Knockout, Rush from Little Traverse Bay, Bayview's Hot Flash and Belly Up, Dandelion from North Cape and Pied Piper from Grand Traverse Bay Yacht Club.

Planning a Serious Bike Tour? Specialist Offers Tips for Traveling Light

You've found the perfect bike, gotten it in good running order and become confident about taking a spin through your neighborhood or the local park. You feel you're ready for the big time—a serious trip on the open road.

But before you pedal merrily off, make sure that you're prepared for your trip. Depending on the length of your journey, you'll need certain supplies and equipment, like repair kits, tools, food and water, packs clothing and camping equipment.

"Though being prepared is the key to enjoyable bike tripping most people take along too much equipment," says Dr. Bonita Dostal Neff, Michigan 4-H Youth Program bicycle specialist. "The best rule of thumb is to travel light."

Neff, who has ridden more than 20,000 miles on Ameri-

ca's highways in the past five years and participated in several long-distance bicycle rides, suggests that something that hasn't been used in the first week of a long trip should be sent home.

"Thirty or forty pounds of equipment is about right for a lengthy trip. Anything more tends to tire the rider and greatly affects the biker's endurance and enthusiasm," she says.

Neff offers the following list of equipment for the everyday cyclist or commuter, as well as essentials a long distance bike tourist should carry.

• **Helmet**—Neff notes that 75 percent of all cycling fatalities are due to head injuries. Though helmets represent a sizable investment, they've become a "must" item for serious bicyclists. For maximum protection, bicyclists should buy hard-shell helmets lined with crushable foam.

• **Small tool kit**—You never know when something will go wrong with your bike, even though you've kept it in good running order. Neff suggests that on local trips, you carry a spare tire tube, patch kit and tire irons, a six-inch crescent wrench, a small screwdriver, a small bottle of oil, a tire gauge and a small tire pump.

• **Water bottles**—After a vigorous ride, there's nothing more refreshing than a long, cool drink of water. Plastic water bottle and cage sets available at any bike shop can easily be mounted on your bike frame.

• **Poncho or rain jacket**—"Waterproof or water-resistant rain gear is a matter of preference," Neff says. "The only problem with many waterproof garments is that they don't let perspiration escape." Neff suggests that riders experiment and find comfortable rain gear that gives maximum protection.

• **Rear-view mirrors**—Though these aren't required by law, most cyclists find them a real help in traffic. Attached to your helmet, sweatband or eyeglasses, a rear-view mirror enables you to see traffic approaching from behind without turning your head. "However, like automobile rear-view mirrors, bike mirrors do have a blind spot and bikers should look before they turn or merge into traffic," Neff warns.

• **Pant clips**—Getting a pant leg caught in your bike chain can cause a nasty accident. To prevent a mishap, Neff suggests bikers buy pant clips from a bike shop or make their own. A rubberband put around the ankle is an easy solution. Or make a pant clip out of elastic tape and fasten with Velcro.

• **Handlebar bag, rack or backpack**—The key to carrying materials safely is to use something that doesn't restrict the rider's movements or unbalance the bike. Choose a lightweight, streamlined carrier that can be strapped to your back, han-

debars or fender. Make sure that the carrier can be closed securely, so that you don't lose your valuables or equipment along the way.

• **Bike locks**—After you've spent a good deal of money getting your bike in shape, the last thing you want is to have your bike stolen. According to Neff, most bike racks are poorly designed and aren't theft-proof. She suggests that you park your bike in a conspicuous spot that's well traveled by pedestrians and use a heavy duty, theft-resistant lock.

If your bike is stolen, you'll have a better chance of recovering it if it is registered. Check with local law enforcement officials about bike registration procedures in your area. A few dollars spent now could save you the cost of a new bike later.

• **Lights**—There are three basic types of bicycle illumination devices. Generator lights are reliable but cause drag on the bike's wheels. Also, because generator lights are powered by your turning wheels, they are of little use when you stop or travel slowly. Battery-powered lights are better because they don't rely on generated power. They can be mounted on your bike or on an arm, leg or helmet.

• **Toe clips**—These are small metal loops that attach to your bike pedal and hold your feet. They are usually used in conjunction with toe straps, leather belts that buckle around your instep and prevent your feet from slipping on the pedals. "The purpose of the clips and straps is to enable a biker to both push and pull with each pedal stroke," Neff says. "Toe clips and straps transfer a biker's energy from one set of muscles to two sets. This means your legs will get less tired and you'll be able to ride farther and faster," she explains.

• **First aid kit**—This should include basic first aid supplies like antiseptic, bandages, aspirin, gauze and

adhesive tape, eye drops, burn cream, lip balm and a pocket knife or razor blade. Cyclists should also carry emergency identification cards in case relatives have to be notified or special medication is needed.

• **Spare parts and more tools**—When attempting a long-distance ride, bicyclists should carry a larger selection of repair materials and tools. Neff suggests extra rear brake and derailleur cables, extra chain links and a chain tool, spare spokes and a spoke wrench and properly sized Allen wrenches, and a freewheel tool.

• **Panniers or saddle bags**—For long trips, bikers may find that a backpack or handlebar bag isn't enough. Panniers or saddle bags that fit over the wheel are a handy addition. Select one of rigid and durable construction. Neff says that panniers that can be removed separately or used and handled

like luggage when taken off a bike are the most useful.

• **Sleeping bags or camping equipment**—On organized bike tours, a "sag wagon" (a car or truck that follows the group to pick up sagging riders) is usually used to carry heavy or bulky equipment like tents and sleeping bags. If you're going on a long trip alone, be sure to select lightweight sleeping and camping equipment, or plan to stay in a hotel or motel. Extra unnecessary weight can slow you down and wear you out, Neff notes.

If all this equipment and these fancy terms and precautions seem a bit too much to handle, Neff suggests you enroll in a 4-H bicycle safety and instructor training program. The workshops cover bicycling basics, equipment, cycling tips and safety precautions. Fees are usually modest and programs are offered often during the warm weather months. Contact your county Cooperative Extension Service 4-H youth office for more information.





Sealing Your Home May Trap Pollutants

Conservation-minded people who are sealing their homes tighter to cut energy demands and costs may also be trapping indoor air pollutants, warns the American Lung Association.

Insulation and other energy-efficient techniques cut energy use 20-35 percent by preventing outside air from seeping in and inside air from leaking out. As a result, indoor air pollutants can accumulate to hazardous levels, according to the association.

In a study of homes in six cities, researchers at the Harvard School of Public Health found that in five cities, indoor levels of smoke and dust particles in the homes were twice as high as those outside. What people breathe indoors is critically important, since most people spend 70 percent of their lives indoors.

Some communities and a few states have passed laws restricting the levels of tobacco smoking allowed indoors. Although tobacco smoke can be a major source of indoor pollution, there are others.

Nitrogen dioxide and carbon monoxide accumulate when gas stoves and heaters are burning. Formaldehyde, used in foam insulation and in furniture made of plywood, can escape into the air. Radioactive radon from brick, concrete, stone, and soil can pervade a home. In one experiment, 13 organic chemicals were detected in a room after a scented oven cleaner had been used.

What's to be done? Some experts suggest that gas ovens should be ventilated to the outside, that materials emitting radon and formaldehyde should be painted over with sealants. Though it would increase energy use somewhat, a daily airing of the house could help — if the outside air is clean.
