

## Teachers, schools agree — tentatively

A tentative agreement reached Thursday, Sept. 3, between the Grosse Pointe Education Association and the school district calls for a 19.1 percent salary increase for teachers over the next three years.

Negotiating teams for the union and the district held a marathon negotiating session that went until 3:30 a.m. Sept. 3. The two sides met again later that day and reached agreement around 5 p.m.

Superintendent John Whritner could not comment publicly on the terms of the agreement, since it has not been ratified by the union or school board, but did say he felt the settlement is in line with those reached in other districts.

Doris Cook, union president, agreed. She said the contract which calls for 6.2 percent salary

increase this year, 6.2 percent in 1988-89 and a 6.7 percent raise in 1989-90 is "the going rate" for the 16 other districts in Local 1 of the Michigan Education Association.

"Some of the districts had raises of 26 percent and some had raises of 16 and 17 percent," Cook said. "That puts our agreement at around the going rate."

The agreement for the nearly 500 teachers in the Grosse Pointe district dealt in depth with language issues as well as a health insurance cost containment.

"The agreement gives us some improvement in language areas," Cook said. "We had not had any contractual language changes for years."

Cook said school negotiators asked the union to do something about the rising costs of insurance. As part of the agreement, the school district will offer the union health maintenance organization membership. Cook said members had requested such a move. Also the union agreed to language allowing for a second opinion on surgery and pre-certification in the event of hospitalization.

"Since our medical coverage is with Blue Cross, we went with the HMO offered by that carrier," Cook said.

While it is likely that the union members and the school board will ratify the agreement, the process is likely to take about two weeks. The union had to have approval from Local 1 of the Michigan Education Association, which it got verbally shortly after the tentative agreement was reached. Following that approval, the union must schedule an informational meeting for its membership, then a ratification date must be set so members can vote. Once the union has ratified the contract, the school board must approve the agreement.

Cook emphasized that the negotiating process was a long and difficult task.

"It was a lot of hard work," she said. "We spent one whole night going over the contract. We were very happy to complete it prior to Labor Day. The last two contracts we had, we did not reach agreement until the morning school began. This way it allowed everyone a chance to relax over the weekend."

Among the more important language considerations was an agreement on the school calendar for the next three years.

"We wanted to start school this week," Cook said. "This was a long summer. Summer was 12 weeks this year because of the late Labor Day. We wanted to go back before Labor Day so we could have had a long mid-winter break."

Because the matter was still under negotiation, the school board can set the opening of school which it did for Sept. 9 this year. For the next two years school will start the day after Labor Day for teachers and the following day for students. The last day of school for the next three years will be the Thursday of the second full week in June.

## Daycare issue could be settled in court

At the same time that the Grosse Pointe Woods city attorney is drafting a sample daycare ordinance for consideration by the planning commission, a daycare provider has sued the city so that she may continue offering the service in her home.

Sheila Temkow's attorney filed suit Sept. 1 in Wayne County Circuit Court, asking that Temkow be permitted to babysit for children in her home while the city clarifies its position. She is currently under a cease and desist order that pre-

vents her from caring for the children. The suit also charges that the ordinance is vague and has been enforced selectively by the Woods.

Attorney David Belanger said the suit is a way to "get it off dead center."

"Rewriting the ordinance would take a lot of time — and we don't know what the city would come up with. We requested a moratorium (while the ordinance was being looked at) and the city refused," he said.

The lawsuit, filed by Richard and Sheila Temkow and 13 parents whose children are cared for at the home, charges that refusal to allow day care in the home will harm both the children and their families by forcing them to make last-minute arrangements for alternative care. Among the parties to the suit is Woods Comptroller Mark Christiansen, whose daughter was attending the home part-time. He declined to comment.

It is also the Temkow position that other businesses are operated from homes in the Woods and that the city has not moved against them. "We know there are other people doing the same thing," Belanger said.

The city council had been considering holding an advisory vote to establish the state of public opinion on the issue. Meeting as a Committee of the Whole Sept. 1, the council decided not to hold the vote. City Manager Chester Petersen said the lawsuit was not a factor in the decision, however.

"The feeling was that, as elected representatives of the community, it was their responsibility to make the decision," Petersen said.

Woods attorney George Catlin is now drawing up some proposed changes, but Petersen

wouldn't predict commission reaction to them. "They may or may not reflect everyone's desires," he said. "We have found that some of the parents (of children at the Temkow home) are not Woods residents — why should we amend our ordinance so that residents (of other cities) can take advantage of it?"

Meanwhile, the parents have had to make other arrangements for their children. Some are still hoping that the court will make


"This is a choice assignment (in the Coast Guard) because of the diversity and responsibilities," he said. In fact, Callison added, "I would like to stay here and be group commander."

## New bank proposed

A proposed new community bank was announced today by a representative of the organizing group of investors. Lucius S. Beasley said that an application has been filed with the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau to establish a new state bank in Grosse Pointe Farms.

Beasley is the proposed chairman and president of the new bank. Other organizers of the bank are Peter A. Dow, Robert G. Edgar, William C. Finkenstaedt, Harvey C. Fruehauf Jr., William K. Howenstein, Robert K. Hydon, Charles T. McCafferty, Richard H. Turner and Robert C. Valade.

Beasley noted that all of the organizers are from the Grosse Pointes and have been residents for many years. This will be the first community bank headquartered in the Pointes in more than 30 years.

The bank's proposed name will be Grosse Pointe Bank & Trust. While primarily serving the Grosse Pointes, it will be a full-service institution that will be available to all. The bank plans to offer a full

range of services as well as some not currently available at all banking offices in the area.

The main objective will be personal, confidential service with a rapid reaction time for all services such as personal loans, mortgages, investment loans, lines of credit and other financial products.

The bank plans to have a large safe deposit facility and a wide range of box sizes. There will be a separate vault room in which customers will be able to store large items, such as valuable paintings and objets d'art while traveling or away for the winter season.

The proposed bank expects to be located in a new building now under construction at the southeast corner of Kerby and Mack in the Farms. The bank will occupy the first floor of the two-story building being constructed by Kerby Place Company.

It is anticipated, if approval is granted later this year, that Grosse Pointe Bank & Trust will be open in the early spring of 1988.

# Lawyers find socialism with capitalistic face in China

China stands on the brink of change. Last month some local people got a close-up view of the struggle that change entails.

Five Grosse Pointe lawyers were among nearly 800 members of the American Bar who met with Chinese counterparts in Beijing. The conference was arranged by Attorney Gen. Edwin Meese and Minister of Justice Zou Yu.

"The People's Republic of China is now undergoing a massive restructuring of its legal system, primarily to encourage and expand business relations with the West," Meese wrote in his invitation. "China's leaders in the field of law have openly solicited the views of American lawyers as to the kinds of substantive rules and procedural arrangements that China needs to inspire the level of confidence that will cause American businessmen and their counsel to do business in and with China."

To that end, the lawyers gathered in Beijing for three days of intensive seminars and panel discussions and field trips to inspect Chinese institutions. Grosse Pointers William Gilbride, John Nicholson, Peter O'Rourke, George Mager and Jay Sorge took part in a wide range of workshops and experiences.

The cafeteria of choices led to a variety of reactions and perceptions, but they were unanimous in agreeing that the experience was valuable.

"China is clearly on its way to modernizing," O'Rourke said. "The input they get from a conference such as this is necessary. They haven't had in their experience a legal system like ours."

O'Rourke said he makes a distinction between westernizing and modernizing. "They will re-

for an obsolete line of microscopes — which would represent advanced technology to the Chinese.

The amount of change that comes out of this conference may depend heavily on a fall conference of the Chinese Communist Party, which will have to approve any new direction, according to Sorge. "I think there's an old line that will slow up what needs to be done," he said.

George Mager of Mager, Monahan, Donaldson and Alber saw the conference more as a Chinese wish to inform Americans of the way they do business than a desire to change their ways. "It was a very serious effort on the part of the government to inform American lawyers on joint ventures," he said.

The Chinese government has established a concept of special economic zones where local government will be able to make individualized rules to encourage foreign investment, Mager said. "You can form a joint venture with the local unit of production. They define the profit you can make per project.

"In forming the joint venture, they allow you to make all the


money you want — it's the way to get around the capitalist-socialist dilemma. Their profit goes to the unit of production."

This conference was only one of a series of meetings with business and investment experts this year. It's all an effort to increase access, in the opinion of John Nicholson of Abbott, Nicholson, Quilter, Eshaki and Youngblood.

"It's essential to open the open door wider," he said. "You'll see a profit motive rather than capitalism, socialism with a Chinese character. They're heavily committed to socialism, but they're going to evolve an economic system that rewards for what you contribute. That's a fundamental shift."

Nicholson said the biggest gulf between the two countries is in their basic concepts of law. "They have difficulty conceptually with the rule of law. To us, the rule of law controls. To them, in essence, it's whatever the party decides."

He told a story of a young Chinese lawyer who attended the conference. "She said she couldn't understand our concern

with the rule of law. 'It must be that you don't know us,' she said. 'Now that you know us, there's no problem, is there?'

"So they still don't understand our needs as businessmen."

Nevertheless, there has been progress, particularly in the area

of patents and copyrights, although drugs and chemicals have yet to be covered in a way that will encourage Western investment. And, Nicholson said, "There was a real attempt to say we need to come closer on these issues."

The Chinese are eager to learn Western management and organizational skills and technology in their reach for the eco-


nomie success enjoyed by their Asian neighbors, everyone agreed.

"When you look at what's going on in the Far East, we have a formidable economic adversary," Nicholson said. "We already understand what Japan has done — and these others are just coming along."

"We'll have to get our act together."

tain their socialistic form of government," he said. "That has helped them deal with the pressures of their huge population."

China actually has very few lawyers currently, according to Sorge of Hill, Lewis, Adams, Goodrich and Tait. During the Cultural Revolution, lawyers, along with other professionals, were repressed.

"They wrecked anything capitalistic," Sorge said. "They invaded people's homes, they paraded intellectuals with dunce caps. They wanted to bring everybody down to the level of peasants." Chinese universities are now turning out lawyers in quantity.

Most of the local attorneys invited to the conference said they have not been doing a lot of business in China, but all were pleased to have made some contacts there. "I traded a lot of business cards," O'Rourke said.

The Chinese are even more anxious to make contacts, according to William Gilbride of Fildew, Hinks, Gilbride, Miller and Todd. "The Chinese are so envious of the economic well-being of South Korea, Hong Kong, Japan," he said. "The tone of their talks was that they realize they have to make massive changes in their laws before an American lawyer would let a client make an investment. They're quite critical of their economic situation."

Gilbride said he sees a gradual move away from socialism. "They call themselves a socialistic democracy," he said. "They'll still own everything, but they'll permit profits and withdrawal of foreign exchange."

He described the Chinese as "almost panicky" in their desire to get involved in world trade.

The lawyers invited to the conference were a cross-section of America, not just big-city lawyers, the men said. This stemmed from the Chinese wish to do business with small companies as well as major conglomerates. Gilbride told of one lawyer who represents an American company manufacturing microscopes. Chinese industry is "pretty primitive," he said, and the American discovered a niche

## Fleas 'have school officials hopping mad

School officials are itching to get rid of a problem that's been bugging them for a couple of months.

Employees at the Grosse Pointe Board of Education's administration building on St. Clair in the City, have been inundated with some unwanted guests — fleas.

Superintendent John Whitner said a pest control company made its fourth visit to the administration building Thursday, but that part of the problem is a couple of raccoons that keep visiting the building that are the likely hosts for the tiny pests. Reportedly, the raccoons may have had a litter of kits in the building as well.

"We have been bombing it and spraying it, and the professional sprayers are on top of the problem," Whitner said. "They

are a difficult pest to get rid of."

Efforts to capture the raccoons have proved unsuccessful so far, and officials are looking for a professional to trap the nocturnal critters.

"It is a very serious problem for some people," Whitner added. "We are desperately trying to stay on top of it. 'Rumors and emotions are both tied to this one. If we haven't been able to get rid of the pests, it is not for lack of trying.'"

One local pest control company said the flea problem has been severe this summer.

"We had a very mild winter last year," a spokesperson for White Pine Pest Control of Grosse Pointe Park said. "Last fall was damp, and we had a lot of calls then."

She said fleas live a 10-day cy-

cle. They go through an egg, larva, pupa and adult stage. The fleas lay their eggs only after they have bitten a mammal for a bit of blood.

# Grosse Pointe to be spared school strike

The Grosse Pointe school district apparently was spared the possibility of a teachers' strike when board of education and union negotiators last week reached tentative agreement on renewal of a three-year contract with the teachers' union.

Details of the agreement were not available at this writing, but Superintendent John Whritner said the contract was in line with agreements reached in comparable districts. Doris Cook, president of the union, said the 19.1 percent pay increase was about the going rate for the area covered by Michigan Education Association Local 1, of which Grosse Pointe is a part.

That figure would be reached by a 6.2 percent increase for each of the first two years and a 6.7 percent increase for the

third year. On a percentage basis, the increase is less than reported in other districts in the Local 1 area, although it appears to be higher than anticipated cost-of-living increases for the three-year period.

With respect to class size, the teachers did not win any changes. That means the system will maintain the average of the 1975-76 years, which figures out differently for different departments. On the school calendar issue, the agreement calls for school to start the day after Labor Day for teachers with classes for students opening the next day, as was done this year.

Other changes in the contract language affect chiefly matters of concern to the union and the administration. That means public interest probably will center on the

pay increase. That may seem high to some Pointers, but it was defended by the union as about the average for the Local 1 area. That may be true but the comparisons will be more meaningful when more specific figures are available.

Yet assuming the tentative agreement is approved by both sides, the board and the teachers' union should be complimented on the removal of any threat of a strike such as the one that closed schools in Detroit last week.

True, there was little talk of a strike during the Grosse Pointe negotiations, but the president of Local 1 was quoted as saying that a teachers' union strike was "possible" in the Pointes. If so, the threat apparently has been dissipated now that

Local 1 has given its unofficial approval to the proposed pact.

Without knowing the specifics, we will not comment further about the terms of the proposed contract renewal, but over the years the rates of pay, working conditions and other terms of the contract have compared favorably with those in similar Michigan districts.

Grosse Pointe residents have long supported the goal of excellence in the public school system and they have been willing to tax themselves at the level necessary to achieve it. That does not mean that district residents favor going overboard to meet teachers' demands, but it does mean that the kind of responsible school board Grosse Pointe customarily elects can count on strong public support for sound actions.

The record of the Grosse Pointe schools for excellence does have to be continually defended and protected, however, and that is one of the board's major objectives in whatever actions it takes, including a new contract for teachers. Without knowing its specific terms, we assume the new tentative contract takes careful aim at that traditional goal.

## The shape of future news

With the completion of the Detroit public hearings on the proposed joint operating agreement between the Detroit News and the Free Press, the public should have a better understanding of what the future holds if the proposal is approved by the attorney general.

Most of the testimony by the newspapers simply supported their original application on the grounds that the Free Press in recent years has suffered operating losses which make it "a failing newspaper" under terms of the Newspaper Preservation Act.

Most of the testimony by the opponents of the JOA proposal disputed the newspapers' evidence, contending that both newspapers could make a profit if they changed their accounting methods or their operating procedures and arguing that the Free Press had gained ground on the News in the 20-year period ending in 1986 before the latter paper was purchased by the Gannett organization.

In the process of presenting their case, the newspapers made it clear that if the JOA is approved, a number of significant changes will be made in the newspapers published in Detroit. Among the changes proposed or hinted at were:

1. The Free Press would be forced to close or be offered for sale if the JOA is not approved.
2. While the JOA supposedly would not limit news competition on the five days that both papers would publish, each paper would run the same news hole and the same amount of editorial color in those

weekday newspapers. Those are elements in competition in cities not covered by JOA agreements.

3. Increases in both advertising and circulation rates can be expected if the JOA is approved, even though, because of the combined Saturday and Sunday editions, there will be two fewer papers each week than there now are in Detroit.

4. Under the JOA, the Free Press would be responsible for 70 percent of the news hole in the Saturday editions and the News would fill 59 percent of the Sunday news hole.

Most of the experts who testified supported the newspapers' contention that the Detroit market can no longer support two competing daily newspapers and that the Free Press would fail unless the JOA is approved. But those representing Mayor Coleman A. Young, five newspaper unions and assorted other opponents disagreed with those conclusions.

Administrative Law Judge Morton Needelman, who heard the testimony, gave no indication of which way he might be leaning.

We think most subscribers and advertisers would prefer the continued publication of both papers on a full competitive basis for seven days a week. But we also think they would prefer the JOA, and the reduction in both the competition and the number of weekend newspapers that it would require, to the death of either one of the daily newspapers in Detroit. We really don't like to say it but the proposed JOA may simply be the best of the bad alternatives available.

## Cameras in courtrooms?

Starting next Feb. 1, state courts, except for juvenile and and probate courts, may permit news cameras in the courtroom in Michigan under specific conditions.

The ruling by the Michigan Supreme Court is being hailed by broadcast and print media as well as by some lawyers and judges, but we are pleased to note that the conditions imposed under the ruling do protect participants in court cases who do not wish to be pictured or photographed.

In effect, what we will have in Michigan beginning in February is a test of a new policy and thus the print and broadcast media, as well as the other participants, will have to show the restraint necessary for the plan to become permanent.

It can be argued, as the Free Press did the other day, that the opening of all state trial and appellate courtrooms to this additional coverage is "an overdue gesture that can only enhance public knowledge of the judicial system."

However, we acknowledge some problems with two aspects of this proposal.

One is that television, which already provides only minute coverage of any except the most sensational and newsworthy court cases even where it is permitted, will too often use a brief excerpt of the day's session that will exaggerate or even provide a misleading report of what happened.

The other concern is that the televising of some court cases will result in the kind of "acting for the cameras" that we al-

ready see in some of the sessions of Congress as well as the presidential news conferences that are televised. Some judges, and especially elected ones, are not above such playacting themselves.

It is true that all but seven states now permit some broadcast or photographic coverage of their courts. But fewer than half invite cameras into all trial and appellate courtrooms as Michigan will do.

Despite our qualms, we approve of the experiment but hope that the high court will take a hard look at the results after a year to see whether some of the fears expressed have been justified or whether the conduct of the participants, and especially the media, the bench and the bar, has been so impeccable that nothing will be detracted from justice by making the practice permanent.

Chief Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, a Grosse Pointe Farms resident, said in announcing the rules that they "balance the public's right to know against the rights of witnesses and other participants in court proceedings."

That is a fine objective but the media, which made the strongest arguments for visual coverage of court cases, now will have the responsibility to prove that their actions do not detract from courtroom proceedings and that their coverage does not deny the right of a fair trial to anyone in Michigan.

# Is bad good? or bad? or better?

I was reprimanded by the trashman one morning last week. He told me to put my bags of trash nearer to the curb. As usual, I was barefoot and bathrobed, schlepping armfuls of over-stuffed 30-gallon plastic bags down the driveway — just as the truck was rumbling up to our house. He hopped off the truck and looked disapprovingly at my offerings. I nodded politely, released my trash to his custody, and shuffled back to the house.

Got to thinking about how my life has changed in the last 30

years. My father, a fastidious, well-organized man, always had our trash properly wrapped, bagged and arranged neatly — some might say artistically — at the curb on the night before it was to be collected. For him, attractively packaged trash was the mark of a prosperous and orderly household. My mother used to tease him about how nice our trash looked. "If you wrap a blue ribbon around it," she'd say, "it'll look like a birthday present."

Life was different in the '50s. Behavior that was commonplace then is passé today and some of today's ideas would have been outrageous then.

Mothers wore aprons. Fathers took out the trash. Cars had fins. Fourth of July was actually celebrated on July 4. "Made in Japan" was a putdown.

If you saw a man running down the street, you assumed he had just stolen something and

was making his getaway.

Civics textbooks showed pictures of huge factory buildings sprouting smokestacks and belching billows of black smoke. They called these "signs of prosperity."

Kids got excited when an animated cartoon appeared in a TV commercial or a movie theater. Movie theaters ran double features and changed programs twice a week.

Ladies wore hats and gloves to shop downtown at Hudson's. You

gave your jeans to Goodwill when your knees began to show through the fabric.

Bad meant bad. Not good. Old (as in age 30 or over) was bad. Gay meant happy. Grass was something to be mowed. Pure as the driven snow meant pure. Really pure.

In 1957, when the phone rang, it was usually for me.

I was in a contest, of sorts, to see if I could be the last family member to go to bed. And the last one to get up in the morning.

## Yesterday's Headlines

### June 21, 1962 —

The New York Times reported that the West Berlin police built sandbag barricades and earthworks at various points along the 28-mile Berlin Wall to provide western border guards with cover against fire from East Berlin. The action followed a number of bloody gun battles at the border with West Berlin police complaining that East Berlin guards could shoot at them at will.

An American mountaineering team was reported to be lost in bad weather in the Himalayan heights in Nepal. The four-member expedition, led by the grandson of President Woodrow

Wilson, had not been heard from for nearly two months.

Americans were reported digging in for a long war in South Vietnam. A high school, a bowling alley, an Olympic-size swimming pool, a picnic ground with barbecue pits and an armed forces radio station were established for thousands of Americans whose movements were restricted by Communist guerilla warfare. A six-lane bowling alley was to be expanded to 12 lanes and the field where the swimming pool was to be built already had a new lighted softball field, tennis, badminton, volleyball and basketball courts, two handball courts and a gym converted from two Quonset huts.

Forty to 50 orphans were to

leave Hong Kong to become adopted children of American families. It was the largest single group of orphans to come to the United States since the adoption program was inaugurated with official U.S. approval in 1958. In the previous four years, 650 Hong Kong children had been adopted by American families.

President John F. Kennedy met with Australian Prime Minister Robert Menzies to resolve trade issues resulting from Britain's proposed entry into the European economic community.

Pope John XXIII expressed satisfaction with preparations for the ecumenical council of the Roman Catholic Church, to open in St. Peter's Basilica in October.

Negotiations resumed in Cleveland to resolve a two-week-old work standards dispute that halted production of Ford Motor Co. passenger cars. The effects of the parts shortages created by the UAW's strike at Ford's Walton Hills Ohio stamping plant spread, with some 70,000 workers laid off because of the shortages.

Benny Goodman and his band were applauded wildly by more than 5,000 Russians, most of them teenagers, in Leningrad. The band was forced to do 40 minutes of encores.

In Grosse Pointe, a 24-year old Hamilton, Ontario man confessed to 300 burglaries in the Detroit area, including at least nine in the Grosse Pointes. His favorite items were furs, jewelry and television sets. After his arrest, he admitted to six burglaries in the Park, two in the Farms, and one in the City. He was suspected of two more in the Woods.

Grosse Pointe High School graduated 695 seniors the previous Thursday, bringing the total alumni for the school to 11,868.

The Krugers plan a major fund-raising effort Thursday, Sept. 17, at 7:30 p.m. at Wharton Center for the Performing Arts on the campus of Michigan State University.

The trip back will, of course, be by plane. It is being paid for by the Michigan Food Dealers Association, who will be holding a convention in Traverse City. The Krugers will be featured speakers at the convention Sept. 14.

At last report the Krugers were island-hopping their way through the Caribbean and were on the island of Puerto Rico. After returning to the Caribbean, they will be paddling their way to South America, where they will take several of the major rivers south.



# First phase of Shores marina completed; more wells expected

Some 26 new boat wells now grace the Grosse Pointe Shores marina, but at least three of them sat empty this season.

The village entered into an agreement with the Grosse

Pointe Yacht Club this past spring, in which 61 new wells of varying lengths would be constructed by the yacht club over three years, in exchange for the permanent use rights to a significant portion of the village marina.

The first of three phases was completed around June 1. But after calling those on the waiting list to inform them that the new wells were available, Village Manager Michael Kenyon was unpleasantly surprised.

"When the new wells became

available, we called those on the list and quickly exhausted it for those who wanted 25- and 20-foot wells," Kenyon said.

Many of those on the waiting list had already found a slip elsewhere, and some had even sold their boats.

What made for the surprise was that dozens of residents packed the public hearing when the issue of the trade with the yacht club was discussed. Many of those residents were upset at the thought of trading away government use rights to a private club, especially since there were so many people, about 117, on a waiting list for Shores marina wells.

"People turned us down when they were offered a new well," Kenyon said. "There are still a lot of people out there who want a larger well, but this year we had three 25-foot wells which remained empty all season."

What made the situation frustrating for city officials was that nearly everyone on the waiting list was contacted prior to the negotiations with the yacht club, and everyone said they would definitely want a well if one became available.

"We had a situation where someone who just moved into the city contacted us and asked if we had a 25-foot well available. They were able to get a well immediately, while we had people who have been on the waiting list for larger wells for several years."

"How many wells we have empty is very dependent on the economy," Kenyon said. "If the economy stays strong, we'll be full, but if it takes a downturn...The first thing to go when

times get tough is the boat."

Under harbor rules people who already have a boat well have the first choice of getting a new well if one opens up. After the shuffling is completed, the village turns to its waiting list to fill the remaining wells.

In the second phase, the yacht club will construct 14 new 30-foot wells in 1988. Those wells should be completed prior to the boating season. Current well-holders will have first choice, which will mean there should be a number of people on the waiting list who should get a well next year.

Kenyon said that there will not be much of a waiting list by the time the new wells are

added next year, and that in 1989, when the third phase of the yacht club's commitment of 14 new 35-foot wells and seven 40-foot wells are completed, there should be only a few people on the list, if any at all.

"We will send out the renewal applications to our current well-holders in November," Kenyon said. "People on the list should be offered a well sometime around February. Currently there are around 35 residents on the waiting list for wells of all sizes."

Plans are to upgrade the marina's tee-dock for next year's boating season. Electrical service will be upgraded, at a cost of about \$40,000.

## Suspect may be tied to more than 50 Park break-ins

Michael Parks is becoming a household name, that is if your household is one of the Grosse Pointe police stations.

Parks, 29, was arrested Aug. 24 in connection with a break-in in the Park. Once arrested and charged, Park detectives took over and established a rapport

with the man, who described in detail dozens of attempted and successful break-ins he had done over the last three years.

Capt. William Furtaw said the man is likely responsible for 32 break-ins in 1987, 20 in 1986 and six in 1985.

Officials from other departments feel Parks is tied to as many as 20 B & Es in other Grosse Pointe cities, but after refusing to offer him total immunity for admitting to the crimes, Parks has refused to dis-

cuss them.

"The City of Detroit is now very interested in Mr. Parks," Furtaw said. "They have had a string of break-ins in the area north of Mack that stopped the night Parks was arrested."

The victims are not likely to see their property returned. Parks has told detectives that the items he took from homes were almost always quickly sold at drug houses or on the street within hours of the theft.

## Correction

The square footage of the addition proposed for Central Library was incorrectly reported in last week's story.

Construction of the addition would be 13,000 square feet on each of two floors or a total of 26,000 square feet. The building is currently 18,000 square feet. Part of the proposal for the addition would include the construction of a 10,000 square foot basement. The total cost of the addition, at Central Library only, would be about \$100 per square foot.

vice academy that selects applicants from a national pool based on SAT scores rather than Congressional appointments. He said the opportunity to travel was also an incentive.

He graduated in 1971 and was assigned to San Francisco and Alaska. He earned a master's degree in computer science at the Naval post-graduate school in Monterey and then spent three years in Washington, D.C. buying and installing computers. After that, he went to New York and back to Washington.

Now at 38, he is second in command at Group Detroit, one of the largest groups in the Coast Guard. Last year, the 12 search and rescue stations that make up Group Detroit, conducted more than 4,200 missions. The stations are East Tawas, Saginaw Bay, Harbor Beach, Port Huron, St. Clair Flats, St. Clair Shores, Belle Isle, Toledo, Marblehead (the busiest in the ninth District and sixth busiest in the United States), Lorain, Cleveland Harbor and Fairport, Ohio. Group Detroit is part of the 9th District which consists of six groups.

The group's headquarters,

with 90 personnel, is located at the foot of Mount Elliott, which makes his Grosse Pointe Park residence "ideal, just drive down Jefferson to work." Callison says. "It's been fascinating to see the changes in two years, seeing

the stores going up at Harbor town."

The original function of the Coast Guard was to enforce the collection of customs. Under the Department of Transportation, the Coast Guard, besides its

search and rescue operations, maintains advanced electronic and other aids to navigation throughout the world, operates the icebreakers and enforces marine law and all aspects of merchant marine safety. It also has

responsibility for boating safety and marine environmental protection.

Callison, who is responsible for the operation of Group Detroit, said Capt. Theodore Brandsma, also of Grosse Pointe Park, sets policy and meets with elected and other officials in the area. "I implement his policy."

The group maintains three helicopters at Selfridge Air Base that are used for searches and rescues. The group also works closely with Canada. Michigan has the highest concentration of boaters in the United States per capita, Callison said, and esti-

mates there are about 200,000 boats in the Lake St. Clair area.

Marine security during the pope's visit will consist of 35 boats from Canada, the Detroit police and other law enforcement agencies as well as the Coast Guard. "We are prepared for 5,000 boats, the same as for the Freedom Festival fireworks," Callison said.

The Coast Guard is community-oriented, he said. "We work with the boaters and we give informational tours to the public." The group also adopted an elementary school in Detroit, he said.

which will be a half-day for students and full day for teachers.

The tentative contract calls for language improvement in a number of areas. Teachers will be allowed to have more planning time during the recess period. Special education classes will be hand-scheduled rather than scheduled by computer to provide more input from teachers in setting up the classes.

A major change in the way several departments operate will also be forthcoming as a result of the agreement. One departmental chairman will be selected to oversee the art, industrial arts, physical education and household arts/life skills in the three middle and two high schools.

Until now, there was only a department chairman for the high school levels. Cook said the move will help with the curriculum needs on a long-term basis. Also, the music department will be a comprehensive K-12 program.

Teachers will not get a full 12 months of insurance benefits regardless of their status with the district at the end of the school year. Benefits for teachers who resigned at the end of the school year were terminated when they resigned. Under the new agreement, teachers will get the additional two months of benefits. Cook explained that the teachers' year runs from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31, and teachers who resigned were losing the two months of coverage.

In-service staff development and committee work will now count toward workshop or college level study. In some cases, to move up the salary schedule, teachers must take part in workshops or garner college credits. Previously in-service staff development and committee work did

not count toward salary schedule improvement.

Thomas Whall, spokesperson for the union's negotiating committee, said he was pleased with the agreement.

"This just shows that the process works," he said. "Negotiation does work."

# Historical Society to benefit

After seven months, the Doors of Grosse Pointe is reality. The poster features more than two dozen front doors of Grosse Pointe homes.

It will debut Saturday, Sept.

12, at the 28th annual Fall Art Festival sponsored by the Grosse Pointe Artists Association. The poster will be available at the Grosse Pointe Historical Society booth.

The historical society will receive 10 percent of the proceeds

from poster sales.

"The poster points out how unique this community really is," said Nancy Griffin, president of the society.

Other communities have been the subject of similar posters, according to Cynthia Ruffner, publisher of the poster. She said she's seen Doors of Birmingham, Doors of New York, Doors of Soho, Doors of Dublin, Doors of Charleston and Doors of Beverly Hills — to name a few.

Pat Tapper, of Grosse Pointe Farms, was coordinator of the project. Park resident Laura Plansker was the photographer and Fred Hirschman, of Franklin Village, was the designer.

The idea began to take shape last February, Ruffner said, when she and Tapper began driving around the Grosse Pointes looking for likely door subjects. After selecting some interesting front doors, they sent letters to the owners of the houses, explaining their project. Follow-up phone calls and visits found most homeowners enthusiastic about being selected for the poster. "Most were glad to be included," Ruffner said. "We thought probably 50 percent would say no. But we were wrong."

Plansker photographed 150 doors, and they were eventually narrowed down to the final 28 selections. All are private homes and were photographed because they were interesting — not because of where they were or who lived behind them.

Hirschman was responsible for the layout of the poster — placement, sequence and artwork. He also selected the color, type and paper for the final poster and supervised the color separation and color correction for the final publication.

Tish Colett, vice president for preservation of the historical society, said the group is ex-



tremely grateful for the 10 percent donation from poster sales. "We're a major benefactor for this publication," she said. "The poster focuses on aesthetics, and preservation is based on aesthetics. Grosse Pointers are usually very reluctant to pat themselves out our assets."

Ruffner said the first press run will be 5,000 posters. "If we sell all these, we'll run more," she said.

The posters will be for sale at the art festival on the grounds of the War Memorial Sept. 12. It will also be available at other Grosse Pointe locations, including the Gryphon Gallery, 99 Kercheval, and the Grosse Pointe Historical Society (call 884-7010 Tuesdays or Wednesdays). Price is \$25.

## Cottage plans late-fall start for parking deck construction

Groundbreaking for the 500-space Cottage Hospital parking deck should take place in late fall, with completion scheduled for next summer.

Plans are to get bids in mid-October, according to hospital spokesperson Kathy Maslanka.

"We are still going over final plans at this stage," she said.

Depending on what those final plans are, the number of spaces in the parking deck, which has already received site plan approval by the Farms city council, will be between 500 and 522.

"It depends on how large we make the spaces and what the architect comes up with," Maslanka said.

The parking deck will be used

primarily by hospital employees and lessees and employees at 131 Kercheval Center. The alley next to the Farms municipal lot will be relocated adjacent to the building after it is constructed.

During the deck construction period, hospital employees will be shuttled by bus to three local churches, United Methodist on Moross, St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran at Lothrop and Chalfonte and Grosse Pointe Congregational and American Baptist at Chalfonte near Lothrop.

Muir Road will be turned into a three-lane road at the Kercheval intersection to facilitate egress and ingress to the parking structure. The three lanes will provide a left-hand turn lane for those exiting the facility and heading north on Kercheval.

A skywalk between the parking structure and the hospital has been scratched from the plan. It was part of the original plan. The plan still calls for an above-street walkway between the deck and 131 Kercheval Center.

## South orientation




The classes will be taught by Anita Dupes and Susan Gaidica. The fee is \$40.



## ACT Assessment schedule

As the new fall term opens, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation will move one step closer to college and other postsecondary plans by registering to take the ACT Assessment.

The ACT, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

Most students take the ACT Assessment during junior year or early in senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

High school guidance offices have the information and forms students need to register for the ACT Assessment. ACT also pro-

vides free copies of the booklet, "Preparing for the ACT Assessment," which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test.

The basic registration fee is \$10.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10 late handling fee. For 1987-88, ACT has established this test date schedule at North High School: Oct. 24, Dec. 12, Feb. 27, April 16, and June 11.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. 





## Computer-aided design puts sailmaker on cutting edge

When the market is shrinking, you trot out all your guns in order to compete, even when you're the best. Hood Sailmakers turned to computer-aided design to make their custom sails.

"We're the Cadillac or Porsche of sailmakers," said Grosse Pointer Randy Singelyn, manager of Great Lakes, Inc., the Hood "loft" in Grosse Pointe Park. "We use more panels. We don't cut corners."

Sailmaking is "very much a custom business," according to Singelyn. The market is shrinking as more people turn to power boating and more Far Eastern countries get into the sailboat competition. Many of those boats come equipped with sails, leaving only the upper end of a smaller market for companies like Hood.

So Hood is fighting back with new capabilities for customizing sails, and with an array of equip-

ment making cruising easier. The company, with 15 outlets, or lofts, besides Grosse Pointe, was bought last year by Grosse Pointer Tim Woodhouse, whose efforts to turn the Massachusetts company around have caught the attention of East Coast business writers.

"The previous owners were forcing the growth of the company," Woodhouse said in a telephone interview from his Marblehead, Mass., offices. Since 1979, Woodhouse had been both a franchisee and consultant to the company.

"In my travels, I discovered the company was mismanaged," he said. "They tried to hire me to run it, but I wouldn't do it without a majority equity." Woodhouse bought Hood and moved to Marblehead to run it, but says he continues to come back to Michigan for the freshwater racing.

Hood and its Great Lakes loft make sails for both racing and

cruising — two very different markets. Racers want a specialty sail for each specific use and light weight is essential.

Cruisers also like light weight, but are more likely to be interested in sails that can be used under a variety of conditions. They are also more likely to want some of the convenience features, like the Dutchman sail flaking system that folds the mainsail like an accordion, or the Stoway boom that rolls the sail right inside the boom.

"We've only done about four jobs this year with the old, traditional hanks," said Singelyn, plunging his hands into a tray of brass hanks for fastening sails. "Just about everybody has gone to some sort of grooved headstay device."


Great Lakes assembles sails for lofts in Chicago and Florida and other lofts return the favor during the busy season. "Around May we're so busy we can't take on another order, so we find

other lofts with the capacity," Singelyn said. "If we told a customer it would take six weeks to get a sail, we wouldn't get any more business from that person."

The factory is located in an old vaudeville theater on Charlevoix at Wayburn. Half of the building is leased; the other half houses inventory, sewing machines and assembly area, a second-floor spinnaker-cutting room and storage for used sails taken in trade.

Hood manufactures its own cloth with more threads per square inch for longer wear. That and the custom-computer design are what make Hood sails different, Singelyn says. "It allows cutting (for a larger number of panels) that other dealers couldn't economically justify."

Increased convenience is one way to lure customers back to sailing. "Sailing is different," Singelyn said. "You need to be knowledgeable about sailing, about your boat, about navigation, about the waters you're

sailing in. It works against the person who just wants to go out and have fun. Power boat sales are flourishing while ours are diminishing — so we try to make it easier for a sailor to go out and have fun."

Not that there's any shortage of customers in the immediate area. The Great Lakes loft is located right in the middle of the yachting scene.

"We're a convenience for our Grosse Pointe customers," said Singelyn. "Lots of them pick up sails or drop them off on their way to work. To service this area, this is an ideal location to be in. It's central to all the yacht clubs."

Typically, a customer buys a "bare" boat, then heads for a sailmaker. Singelyn's office boasts a large-screen computer programmed to show all the options so that he and the customer can plan and decide what to make.

"The sails represent 30 percent of the total price, so they're an investment just as much as the boat is," he said.

In recent years, sailmaking has gone from an art to a science. The seat-of-the-pants genius of the skillful artisan is still important, but is only about 10 percent of the equation now, according to Singelyn. All the rest is technology, codified in a computer.


Now Singelyn punches in information on weights and dimensions. The talk about lift and pressure zones is engineer talk. The diagram on the screen rotates for a view from every angle. It can be used not only to plan sails for a new boat, but also to troubleshoot problems on an existing boat.

Once the sails are selected, the information is sent by telephone modem directly to a laser-cutting machine in Marblehead, where the panels are cut. The only time a human gets involved is to read the printout and pick out the proper bolt of cloth to insert into the laser cutter.

The cut panels are back in Grosse Pointe within a couple of days for assembly. A small crew works on a huge floor piecing together the sails.

Singelyn is trying hard to combat the seasonality of his business. During the last two winters, he has used discounts to successfully convince people to order their sails off-season. Great Lakes can produce a set of sails in two weeks, but it takes five when things are busy.

"I don't know of another business as seasonal as we are," he said. "Part of it stems from procrastination. It's amazing how the calls come in right after what they think is the last thaw."

## A most welcome task

### Planning for the pope means long hours, plenty of compromise and a sense of satisfaction for local pastor

Imagine yourself spending months cleaning the house, cooking and getting everything ready for a guest you'll probably never get to meet. Imagine that and you'll know just how The Rev. Timothy Pelc feels these days.

Pelc, pastor of St. Ambrose Church in Grosse Pointe Park, is a member of the Site Preparation Committee for Pope John Paul II's visit to Michigan Sept. 18-19. He has worked behind the scenes as a member of a huge team of priests and lay persons preparing the sites where the pope will appear: Metropolitan Airport, Blessed Sacrament Cathedral, Hamtramck, Ford Auditorium, Hart Plaza and the Pontiac Silverdome.

He has spent long hours on everything between helping chose floral arrangements and working with architects, to picking artists to help design the papal chair. "If the people of St. Ambrose knew how much time I've spent on this, they might be angry with me," Pelc said, smiling. "The thing is, we've had to put in long hours because we've really only known for sure since

February that the pope would visit. The other cities he's visiting have had two years to prepare, so we had some catching up to do."

Pelc is a Dearborn native who holds a masters degree in liturgy from the University of Notre Dame. He is past chairman of the Archdiocese Building Committee and has a track record of working on major archdiocese events like Call to Action, the installment of Archbishop Edmund Szoka and the retirement of Cardinal John F. Dearden. It was because of Pelc's roles in large scale events, often as head of planning, that he was chosen for the Site Preparation Committee.

"It's been a lot of work, but I've enjoyed it very much. The best part has been meeting and working with so many people from such diverse backgrounds. The hardest part has been the realization that with everything we do, we have to please so many people it seems almost an impossible task.

"But so far, we've been able to do it," Pelc said.

**EVERY TIME THE** Site Preparation Committee came up with another idea, it had to first meet the approval of the head of the committee, The Rev. Tony Tocco, then be approved by the Executive Committee of the Archdiocese, then the National Council of Catholic Bishops in Washington and finally — and most importantly — the Vatican.

"It was time-consuming, to say the least. Oddly enough, the Vatican has been very cooperative with us, despite what you might think. Most of the compromises have been with the Secret Service, for security measures. And we made those compromises without question, of course, for the safety of the Holy Father,"

Pelc explained.

Security measures, in fact, have been the source of the greatest expense, Pelc said. It bothers him to read and hear the criticisms of the expenses incurred in preparation for the pope's visit.

"I hear these reports of how much has been spent. Well, I know how much has *not* been spent. Nothing is an extravagance. Most of the things people will see — flowers and other decorative items — have been donated or rented. The things that have run up the cost are what we've had to pay for services, labor, etc.

"And we must pay a fair wage to labor. You can't ask the little guy to forego what is due to him when you have the pope coming to speak on social justice," Pelc said.

Because Detroit has had so little time to prepare for the visit, the city won't have a final total of the cost until the bills for those aforementioned services begin to arrive well after the visit. A corporate fundraising effort spearheaded by Domino's Pizza founder Tom Monaghan and Chrysler Corporation Chairman Lee Iacocca may help to defray some of the cost; there also will be a special collection in all Archdiocese parishes this weekend.

"Again, the security and the police overtime are what will make up much of the cost. And you would not believe what it costs to rent PortaJohns," Pelc said.

Finding out how much PortaJohns cost, working with architects on designing the Silverdome area from which the pope will say mass, commissioning art pieces and following just about every one of those tasks through until completion is part of what

Pelc has been doing since spring. He has also kept up his duties at St. Ambrose and at Detroit's St. Martin parish, where there are no priests in residence.

"Actually, most of what I've been doing is liaison work between the committee and the executive committee and architects, suppliers, artisans and craftsmen. A good portion of what I've done is solicit funds and donations. The password from the very beginning has been 'economy.' There has been no need to be extravagant; we felt we could be hospitable and do it with a certain grace and not spend an astronomical amount.

"The business and private sector has been outstanding in terms of contributing gifts and services."

**SURPRISINGLY, PELC** said, some of the best resources have come from outside the Catholic church, including the architectural firm which came up with the plan for the huge earthen structure from which the pope's mass will be said.

"Pope John Paul strikes a responsive chord in people's hearts. He is the only moral leader we have today who speaks with any authority. You don't have to be Catholic to appreciate and respond to that. Everyone I've dealt with has been thrilled to be working on it," Pelc said.

Among the companies and individuals which have donated services or assisted in some way are several with Grosse Pointe ties, including florist Vincent Adamo; St. Ambrose parishioners Eileen Moses and Michael Berlin, whose company, C'est Simone, is helping design stoles and vestments for those distributing communion; florist Jim Scott and Franks Nursery, and others, like composer James

Hartway, architect Terrence McCafferty, who designed the Hamtramck pavillion and Chris Wilson, site director for Hart Plaza.

"That vesture will be sewn in a factory in Alpena by Polish women who are thrilled to have a hand in the pope's visit," Pelc noted.


Pelc added that he's thrilled with the way the Silverdome plans are shaping up. Part of what he and his group wanted to do was to give a different flavor to the pope's stop in Michigan.

"We strove to present a feel for Michigan so that it won't just







be another stop along the way for the Holy Father," Pelc said.

To do that, Michigan materials, products and crafts have been used as much as possible. A theme of soil and water, important elements in Michigan, was carried out in planning the mass. Young and Rubicam artists came up with a color pattern — blue for water, green for trees and gray for Michigan's industrial history — that is repeated in the vesture, outdoor advertising and indoor decor wherever the pope visits in the state, Pelc said.

ALONG THE WAY, Pelc has compiled an enormous amount of interesting yet totally useless bits of information which he will pass along to the television and radio broadcasters who need the material to fill air time.

"I've had to work with the TV people, too, finding out what they need and running our requirements past them," Pelc said. "It's been an experience."

Pelc is one of the thousands of people who will be at the Silverdome in the very early hours of Sept. 19 — the Secret Service, not the church, has required that those planning and attending

the mass be in the Dome hours before the 4:15 start because of the logistics of getting 94,000 people through metal detectors — but he probably won't be able to enjoy either the pre-event or the mass.

"I'll be at the Silverdome, carrying potted palms and rolling carpets out. Since I'll be working behind the scenes and because the pope's schedule is so tight, it'll probably be impossible for me to meet the pope. I'll have to enjoy the whole thing via the magic of videotape," Pelc said with a chuckle.

That's just fine with him, Pelc added. "I knew when I got the call to be on the committee that life as I knew it would be over for a while. But this is a once-in-a-lifetime happening, an historical event which will not be repeated in our generation."

"One of the positive outcomes of this entire preparation is the realization that you cannot put a price tag on this. It is a time to present the good work of the church and to spread the notion of social justice to a worldwide audience. It is also a chance for our city — which has a bad image worldwide — to show people that we are a sophisticated city, a city that cares."





## 'We the People' — a look back

"We the People" — a phrase that once really meant "We the Men" — begins the Preamble to the Constitution.

"Virtually nothing in the original constitutional text and debates directly addresses the situation of women and families," Sylvia A. Law, a New York University Professor of law explained at a recent Smithsonian symposium on the Constitution. At that time, the "dominant conceptions of families denied the liberty, equality and even personhood of women," she said. And so the "original intent" of the Founding Fathers "does not provide answers for today's problems." On the other hand, Law offered, the men intended the constitutional "spirit of experimentation to continue and grow."

Correspondence between John and Abigail Adams in 1776 reveals that this "deafening silence" was certainly no accident. From Braintree, Mass., on March 31, Abigail wrote John, who was serving in the Continental Congress in New York:

"I long to hear that you have declared an independency — and by the way in the new Code of Laws which I suppose it will be necessary for you to make I desire you would Remember the Ladies, and be more generous and favourable to them than your ancestors. Do not put such unlimited powers into the hands of the Husbands."

John was not at all sympathetic:

"As to your extraordinary Code of Laws, I cannot but laugh... Depend upon it, We know better than to repeal our Masculine system."

Adams' snippy response reflected the intellectual tradition of the time. The founding families were profoundly different

than today's nuclear unit. Then, a woman's place was in the home. "Women were assigned, on the basis of status, to perform the essential work" of the household, from childrearing to soap and candlemaking, Law said. The average white woman of the era bore more than seven children; black women, 10 or 11.

And yet, Law told the audience, it is possible to tell another, very different, lesser-known story about families of this era. As men went off to revolutionary battle, the women assumed responsibility for maintaining home and property. They quartered soldiers and provided refuge for displaced friends and relatives.

Women also played political roles during the Revolution — boycotting British goods and sometimes physically attacking the property of merchants who stocked enemy imports. They

turned in lead weights from windows to be melted down for bullets. The war also generated the nation's first women's proclamation and political organization when Benjamin Franklin's relatives petitioned door-to-door in support of the American cause. The signatures were then sent to Gen. Washington.

When active fighting subsided, women managed farms and businesses and dealt with the dangers of epidemics. Courts began to recognize married women's property interests. Both men and women were allowed greater latitude in selecting their mates.

Although women were excluded from the constitutional debates, "just as plainly, women have always played a vital role in constructing our nation," Law added. The challenge for the coming century is to "promote liberty and equality of all people."





## Maps drawn from memory only 'fair'

You are given a blank piece of paper and asked to draw a map of the world from memory. You are told to label all the countries and include any other features of interest or importance. Time limit: 30 minutes. How would you do?

The 4,277 first-year college students in 54 countries who were assigned this task by geographer Thomas F. Saarinen of the University of Arizona averaged about 30 countries per map — fewer than one-fifth of the independent countries in the world.

Saarinen, who personally administered the classroom test in 30 of the countries surveyed last year, says he would give the maps a worldwide grade of "fair." Most students managed to draw and name all seven continents and the major countries, but lacked specific knowledge about the rest of the world.

The 640 U.S. students who were tested ranked with the world average in numbers of countries labeled, he says, but made more mistakes in placing the countries on the map. The more than 4,000 maps from every continent except Antarctica represent the largest collection of world sketch maps ever assembled, Saarinen says, and will form an archive of compu-

terized information about mental images of the world.

"Before we can have a shared world image," he says, "we have to understand what images are at present and why." The college mapping project was sponsored by the International Geographical Union and financed by the National Geographic Society.

Saarinen selected a cultural cross-section of students enrolled in introductory geography courses, because they already had completed their countries' basic educational process and were interested enough in geography to take a college course in it. "If they don't know how to draw a map of the world," he reasons, "who does?"

What was totally unforeseen, Saarinen says, was "the perceived importance of Europe everywhere. It has to be part of the colonial legacy, at least in the educational system. I thought there'd be a home-continent bias, with it pictured biggest, but more important was the exaggerated size of Europe.

Eighty percent of the students placed Europe in the center of their worlds. This positioning, with the Americas on the left and Asia on the right, has been the most commonly used world-map projection since the discovery of the New World.

Even in countries such as India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and

Saudi Arabia, virtually all students drew "eurocentric" maps, whereas "sinocentric" maps would put Asia in the middle. Most students in Thailand, Hong Kong, Singapore and the Philippines also centered Europe, although that put their own countries on the map's edge.

Lingering colonial influence was further evident, Saarinen says, in that small European countries such as Great Britain showed up on most maps, and maps from faraway places such as New Zealand contained detailed information about the mother continent.

Saarinen says that with the exception of certain European countries, the nationals most often included were those of continental dimensions such as the Soviet Union, Canada, China, the United States, Brazil, India and the continent-country Australia.

Distance, he assumed, would be a factor in map-making: Countries closer to home were drawn in detail and places farther away were sketched as "vague blobs with lots of blanks." But he also found that in cases such as New Zealand there were other criteria — language, cultural and political ties — that made distant places better-known.

In contrast to the exaggerated size of Europe, Africa was gener-



## One-dish meals make fall suppers a snap

Versatile, one-dish meals are marvelous to have to fall back on when you're looking for something tasty, different and innovative.

The following recipes come from the low-calorie, low-cholesterol, budgetwise kitchens of Thyra Grey Howard and Helena DeWitt Roth.

### Super-Duper Eggplant Casserole

Roman Lamb Stew  
High Protein Cassoulet  
Chicken, Hunter Style  
Honey Glazed Pork Roast

### Super-Duper Eggplant Casserole

1/2 lb. very lean ground beef  
1 cup chopped onions  
3 cups or more chopped eggplant  
1 cup chopped celery stalks  
2 Tbsp. unsalted margarine  
1 can (16 oz.) stewed tomatoes  
1/4 to 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning  
1 slice whole-wheat bread, trimmed of crust, finely broken up  
1/4 grated cholesterol-free cheese

Saute ground beef in medium teflon skillet with the chopped onions until meat loses its color and onions are slightly brown. Pour off any excess grease that may have accumulated in the skillet. Pour meat mixture into large serving casserole. Melt margarine in skillet, saute eggplant and celery until eggplant has turned partially limp. Add stewed tomatoes and let come to a boil. Pour eggplant mixture into casserole along with Italian seasoning.

Bake covered in preheated 350° degree oven for 40 minutes. Remove and sprinkle bread crumbs over top; then sprinkle with cheese. Bake uncovered for about 20 minutes more. Serves four. Hot corn bread and a platter of fresh nibbling vegetables, and a light dessert to complete the meal.

### Roman Lamb Stew

3 lbs. shoulder of lamb, cut into 1-1/2 cubes  
3 Tbsp. flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
2 tsp. ground sage  
2 Tbsp. corn oil  
2 cloves garlic  
1 cup beef bouillon  
1/2 cup red or white wine vinegar  
1 tsp. leaf rosemary, crumbled  
3 carrots, cut into 1-inch chunks

12 small onions, peeled  
1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
1 cup frozen green peas

Trim all excess fat from meat. Combine flour, salt, pepper and sage; sprinkle over meat and toss to coat completely with flour mixture. Heat oil and garlic in large skillet until garlic is browned. Remove and discard garlic. Brown meat in oil, about 1/4 at a time. Remove meat as it browns to a flame-proof casserole. Pour oil from skillet, add broth, vinegar and rosemary to skillet; bring to boiling, scraping browned bits from bottom. Pour over meat. Add carrots and onions.

Cover and simmer over low heat 45 minutes or until meat is tender. Skim off any excess fat. Stir in lemon juice; add peas and cover. Simmer 10 minutes longer or until peas are tender. Sprinkle with parsley and serve to 6.

### High Protein Cassoulet

1 chicken breast, boned, cut into 1-inch chunks  
1 large onion, chopped  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
1/2 lb. smoked pork chops  
3 Tbsp. dry vermouth or dry sherry  
2 cans (16 oz.) vegetarian baked beans in tomato sauce  
1/4 to 1/2 tsp. thyme  
Salt to taste  
1/8 tsp. pepper

Saute chicken, onion and garlic in teflon-lined skillet, covered for a few minutes. Add meat from pork chops which have been trimmed of all fat and cut into thin strips. Continue to saute until onion is tender and chicken is lightly browned. When the skillet starts to become too dry, add vermouth; cover and continue over low heat until done.

Remove from heat. In casserole, place 1/3 of the canned beans, a layer of chicken mixture, another layer of beans; continue until all ingredients have been used. Place casserole in 350° oven and bake for about 20 minutes or until thoroughly hot and bubbly all over. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### Chicken, Hunter Style

4 chicken breasts, split  
1 tsp. paprika  
3/4 tsp. seasoned salt  
1/8 tsp. seasoned pepper  
1 Tbsp. margarine  
10 small white onions, peeled  
1/2 lb. fresh mushrooms  
1 small eggplant, peeled and cut into 1-inch strips  
1 green pepper, cut into narrow strips  
1/2 tsp. thyme

1 tsp. basil  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
2 bay leaves (small)  
1/2 cup dry sherry  
4 tomatoes, quartered  
Hot brown rice

Rinse chicken pieces, dry on paper towel. Sprinkle with seasoned salt and pepper. Place skin side down on broiler rack and brown well on both sides. Remove and arrange in three-quart casserole.

Melt margarine in skillet, saute onions until golden. Add mushrooms, eggplant, green pepper and saute for a few minutes. If it starts getting dry, add 2 or 3 Tbsp. of the sherry wine. Then sprinkle with seasoned salt and pepper, thyme, basil, minced garlic. Add contents to casserole of chicken along with bay leaves and the remainder of the wine. Bake covered for 25 minutes in 350° oven.

Add tomatoes, quartered; cover and bake another 20 minutes or until chicken is tender. Serve over hot cooked brown rice. Makes 8 servings.

### Honey-Glazed Pork

Roast  
5 to 8 lbs. pork loin roast, rib end (8 to 10 ribs)  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1-inch fresh ginger, peeled  
Or, 1 Tbsp. sage  
2 Tbsp. parsley, finely minced or 1 Tbsp. dry parsley flakes  
6 potatoes, quartered  
1 lb. small white onions  
3 Tbsp. margarine  
6 Tbsp. honey  
3 tsp. grated orange peel

Rub roast with salt and pepper. With tip of sharp knife, cut slits about 1/2-inch deep over top of roast and insert very small pieces of ginger in each slit. Or rub sage into slits if you prefer. Sprinkle with parsley. Insert thermometer in meat; roast fat side up in 350° oven in shallow pan for 1 hour.

Meanwhile, put potatoes and onions in baking dish, dot with margarine, cover and roast in oven with pork 30 minutes. Uncover vegetables and baste with margarine in dish. Combine honey and orange peel and drizzle about 1/2 the mixture over the vegetables; return uncovered to oven.

Spoon or siphon pork fat from roasting pan. Drizzle remaining honey mixture over roast. Roast 1 hour longer or until thermometer registers 170°. Baste occasionally with drippings. Also turn and baste vegetables occasionally. Remove roast to warm platter and let stand.

Increase oven heat to 400° and continue roasting vegetables about 20 minutes or until golden brown and tender.

# For Sara Kuzenko, horsing around comes easily

At the tender age of 12, Sara Kuzenko is not getting into trouble, but she is becoming notorious for her horsing around.

It's not your average bout with a childhood fad and on the other hand it isn't something all little girls do.

The sport of being an equestrienne may go unnoticed by many, but Kuzenko has mounted an attempt to put it on the map. She has been jumping since the age of eight and in her four years of the love for horses has grown threefold.

"I'm on my third horse now and when I started riding I never thought I'd be still doing it," said Kuzenko. "My uncle Robert and his daughter really got me started riding. They showed me basically how to ride horses and then I got my own horse."

Since saddling Jay Bars Trouble (her first horse), Kuzenko's career has blossomed quite nicely and she credits her success to her father Bill.

"I think I'm successful because anything I do in riding I concentrate and try to do my best," said the Parcells Middle School seventh grader. "Also, I have a wonderful father who has supported me all the way. My family also understands that I want to do this."

In her four years of jumping, Kuzenko needed time to "get on her feet." She started slowly, but in 1986 she eventually hit the winner's circle when she was twice crowned the Champion of Shortstirrup Equitation Over Fences and on the Flat.

"That was pretty exciting to win those championships," said the 5-foot, 2-inch Kuzenko. She then rode her golden chariot, Major League, to the championship of the Novice Ridden Pony Hunter of the Michigan Jumper/Hunter Association on the weekend of Aug. 27.

"I think all the championships I've gotten is the best thing that's happened to me since I've been jumping," she said. "Another thing I am happy about is the fact that I haven't been injured yet."

Early on, Kuzenko got the fear of her life as she was tossed from her second horse, Hawkeye. Despite picking up some dirt and a few bumps and bruises, she collected her thoughts and got back in the saddle.

"Hawkeye and I got to the fence and were ready to jump it when all of a sudden it stopped," she explained. "As soon as the horse did that, I flew forward and crashed into the fence. At that time I wasn't hurt and I knew I had to get right back on so I wouldn't be scared the next time I rode."

A favorite on the course, Kuzenko knows she has become one of the more prominent riders, but with her friends she feels a bit more hesitant to bat her own eyelashes.

"All my friends know I ride horses, but that's all they think I do," she said. "They don't know that I'm actually on the back of a horse that is jumping through the air."

Kuzenko mounts a 900-pound pony and escalates, on the average, two to three feet off the ground while steering her horse over a fence.

"I would like the publicity with my friends, but I don't think they'd believe me," she said. "I am one of the more fortunate kids who is able to do this sort of thing and that's why I don't think they'd believe me."

With approximately three hours of work a day, Kuzenko doesn't find much time to spend with her friends, but that doesn't bother her. Being engulfed with horses is what she prefers. Currently, the jumping season is over and her time with Major League is dwindling as she plans to pick up a new partner soon.

"My trainer (Deb Whiting) is going to pick me out a new horse," she said. "With the new horse I hope to accomplish a lot more."

For a 12-year-old girl, Kuzenko has reached many plateaus. However, a little success is not enough for this hazel-eyed and highly motivated girl.

"I am proud of what I have done, but I want to win more championships," she said. "If I can do that and then go to the Olympics someday then I will be very happy."

When asked what she was going to do now that the season has concluded, Kuzenko said she would not let her guard down for the winter as she continues her workouts at the Bloomfield Open Hunt.

"In order for me to continue to do well, I'll practice and get used to my new horse," she said. Why would a 12-year-old girl concentrate on horses as opposed to snowballs in the winter and falling leaves in October?

"Because if you practice hard enough horse jumping can bring you prestige, excitement and pleasure. To me it's the most wonderful thing. It just comes natural."

Sara has been jumping for four years now and plans to continue being an equestrienne and hopes to arrive on the scene of the Olympic Games one day. Sara is in the seventh grade at Parcells Middle School and she enjoys English and reading. On her free time she will go to the stables and wash down Major League. She says that practicing three hours a day also includes the grooming of her "best friend." She said that riding a bike is similar to riding a horse, but "I love riding a horse because it's more exciting."



## A really big show

Anyone who thinks that sailboat racing is not a spectator sport should have been at Crescent Sail Yacht Club on Saturday, Aug. 29, or for that matter, anywhere along the shoreline from Crescent to Gaukler Point for Crescent's annual regatta.

Crescent is one of the few DRYA clubs that does not use the standard, triangular race course with permanent race marks out in the lake, but prefers their rooftop Race Committee platform. The rooftop station has worked well for Crescent's active club racing program and the club sees little reason to change their successful format. It is one of the few times during the summer that the Detroit River Yachting Association officials, judges, timers and other race personnel remain on terra firma for a race day.

At least once a year, Lakeshore Road is lined with spectators watching the majestic scene as wave after wave of various sized boats leave the starting line just off the Crescent breakwall; sailing a course that takes them up the lake past Gaukler Point. Even the non-sailors can't help but be impressed with the spectacular vista of sails progressing up the lake to a point where they turn, sail to another mark of the course, turn again and parade back to the same area where they commenced in front of Crescent.

Most of the race course is visible from the rooftop. It is one of the rare opportunities for the non-racing community to see the thoroughbreds of sailboat racing up close; boats like "Sprint" that won the SORC this past winter, as well as the rest of the folks that enjoy sailboat racing to its fullest.

Just because Crescent has resisted moving their start out into the lake away from spectator view does not mean they are opposed to innovation. This year Crescent added doublehanded fleets to their starting lineup. Boats in any size range had the opportunity to sail with only the skipper and one crew in either the PHRF class or JAM (jib and main) class. I sailed, with my husband, in the jib and main class. We didn't do all that well, but had a great day sailing. The weather cooperated and created a cool, crisp, picture-perfect day for the sailors and the spectators. There were at least 21 boats in the doublehanded starts; an excellent showing for a first time endeavor. Crescent makes sure that there is something for everyone, from the small boat fleet of lightnings, thistles or snipes, to the largest boats racing on the lake.

Crescent's annual regatta has tremendous appeal for non-resident Crescent members. They try to return for the regatta if at all possible. It is a gathering of the Crescent Clan, so to speak. In years past, non-members have come "home" from as far away as Florida for the annual event. This year the prize for the greatest distance traveled went to Dennis Cazabon, who flew in from Japan to be with his Crescent mates.

Sailboat racing can be boring, especially observed from a distance. However, for at least this one Saturday every summer all of us get to watch the big race boats and the small alike, jockey for position at the starting line from one of the greatest vantage points on the lake — Crescent Sail Yacht Club.



The Grosse Pointe Yacht Club's swim team won the Michigan Inter-Club Swimming Association's Championships in late July at the Dearborn Country Club.


It was the third consecutive year GPYC captured the champi-

## Feeling Fit

### Fitness Exchange Program results

You've probably been waiting with bated breath to learn the results of the U.S./Soviet Union Youth Fitness Exchange Program I wrote about just a few months ago. The first evaluations are in.

Although more than 20,000 youngsters in each country will take the fitness test of the other country as part of the agreement signed in February between the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports Chairman George Allen and Marat Gramov (chairman of the Soviet Committee for Physical Culture and Sports) some 300 boys and girls have now taken the Soviet Youth Performance test to see how they compare to Soviet youth.

Overall, American students appeared to compare favorably with Soviet standards with the possible exception of upper body tests for upper body strength and endurance.

It's important to remember that the purpose of the exchange is to encourage a comparison, not competition. The Soviet test includes such items as a 60-meter sprint, 1,000-meter run, long jump, pull-ups, target throw and 25 and 50-meter swims. The President's Challenge, which is the American test being administered to the Soviet youth, includes curl-ups, pull-ups, one-mile run/walk, shuttle run and a flexibility test.

It does seem strange to me that if the purpose of the test is comparison, why aren't the tests similar in the items included? A true comparison appears to be difficult under the circumstances outlined above. All concerned will gain "Better Understanding Through Youth Fitness", which is the theme of this first fitness exchange. That is what it's all about!

Meanwhile, send your children out to the park to work on the monkey bars to help build upper-body strength; remember how much fun they were?

## Physical Education; is it the other half?

If you are a parent or guardian of a young child, you undoubtedly have given some thought to the quality of education that the youngster is receiving.

In doing so, have you paid attention to their physical education program, which is often re-

ferred to as the "other half" of education?

You should, because physical education is the only subject that involves both body and mind. Your child's physical education program should teach habits and skills that can be carried on throughout adulthood, helping

him or her to lead active, healthy lifestyles.

First, you need to know whether or not your school has a physical education program and if not, why? Don't be reluctant to ask your school principal, PTA or School Board about state laws and regulations on this subject. Decision makers often will respond to parental persuasion.

Where programs are in place, the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports suggests you check to see if they have three basic goals: to produce physically fit youth, to teach the relationship between physical activity and physical fitness and health, and to provide the skills, knowledge and motivation to keep working out in the future.

To tell whether the program meets these objectives, go through the following checklist. The more YES answers, the better the program.

- Does your school provide at least one period per day of instruction in physical activity? The amount of curriculum time devoted to physical education is determined by the state's educational requirements.


- Is part of each physical education class devoted to fitness activities like running, calisthenics, weight training or other types of vigorous exercise? Play alone won't develop physical fitness.

- Does the class include instruction in lifetime sports such as tennis, volleyball, or even

skiing? Skill in some sport is a valuable social and health asset.

- Does the school give a screening test to identify students who are physically underdeveloped for their age and might need extra attention? Are there special programs for the handicapped and mentally retarded? This helps both teacher and student know if what they are doing in class is working.

The Presidential Physical Fitness Award Program can be used in a school or other youth-serving organization fitness testing program. Information is available from the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports, Department 91, Washington, DC 20001.



## RICE for sprains and strains?

How do doctors treat common injuries such as sprains and strains? With RICE.

Not your everyday household rice, but R-I-C-E, which is a handy acronym for rest, ice, compression and elevation.

Douglas McKeag, M.D., a sports medicine specialist at the Michigan State University College of Human Medicine, comments in MediScene Magazine:

"About 90 percent of common injuries of the athlete or the amateur are minor and may be self-

treated. But they should be checked by a physician for any further damage."

He recommends the following treatment:

REST — which allows the injured part of the body to heal.

ICE — which should be applied to the injured site as soon as possible and for at least 10 minutes every hour.

"The cold discourages the movement of fluid out of blood vessels and into adjacent areas," says McKeag.

COMPRESSION — of the injured site, which also reduces fluid buildup and should be applied to the injury as soon as possible.

ELEVATION — which also reduces swelling and fosters healing.

"This last step is especially important when you're sleeping," McKeag says in the article.

Anything that doesn't get better after 24 hours of the RICE treatment should be checked by your physician as soon as possible.

#### Is your child a victim of obesity?

He walked home slowly, huffing and puffing. Thank God he only lived two blocks from school. Walking was such a pain. He finally reached his house. Great! In the kitchen he spotted the sandwich, chips and candy his mother had left for him. Billy took it and a couple bottles of pop and settled down in the sofa to watch television until it was time for dinner.

Another day at school — he was glad it was over! No more jokes, smothered giggles, or the shame at how awful he always did in physical education class. Billy's parents called him "chubby" and the kids at school called him "fatso."

Billy is not alone. Nearly one out of every seven children is overweight. In fact, childhood obesity is "perhaps the greatest 'nutritional danger' in our country today." In the last century, children have grown taller and heavier. However, in the last decade the problem of childhood obesity has multiplied from a 10 percent prevalence in 1966 to 15 percent by 1987.

#### Physical effects

The physical effects are quite similar to those suffered by obese adults — a body that can't handle extreme physical exertion without dangerously straining the heart, bones, joints and muscles. Obesity among children has been associated with an increased risk of high blood pressure, hyperinsulemia and carbohydrate intolerance. Obese girls not only grow faster and mature earlier than normal weight girls, but they are also more likely to develop uterine cancer.

A study of 5,000 Iowa school children associated an increase in weight with an increase in coronary risk factors. "Obesity at 14 initiates the degenerative process on the coronary arteries that kills at 44." The greatest tragedy is, unless checked, overweight children become overweight adults. The odds against an overweight adolescent becoming an average-weight adult are approximately 28 to 1.

Emotional and psychological effects

Overweight children are stereotyped as lazy, "gluttons", lacking in self-restraint and these children carry the affects of such labeling into their adulthood. Research has shown that overweight children receive less encouragement from their parents, less acceptance from peers and outright discrimination from adults. In fact, overweight adolescents stand a smaller chance of being accepted by colleges or for job positions than normal-weight adolescents. Overweight children perceive themselves as unattractive and inferior and the brunt of jokes and ridicule. Their self-confidence erodes with each stinging comment.

#### Causes of childhood obesity

It has been argued that it is physical inactivity, not overeating that causes childhood obesity. Indeed, research has shown that many obese teenagers eat far less than their normal-weight peers. This, however, is less of a cause than a result of childhood obesity. Are children overweight because they are less active or less active because they are overweight?

Diet Center, working with children who are overweight for the past 15 years, believes the cause of childhood obesity lies in a combination of diet and learned eating patterns transferred by parents and peers.

#### Learned eating habits

Parents have the greatest affect on shaping children's perception of food. Food often becomes more than a way to nourish the body. A recent

study of thousands of preschoolers showed: One in four mothers used food as a reward; one in 10 mothers used deprivation of food as a punishment and one in three mothers used food as a pacifier.

With the increase in today's world of two-income families with shared responsibilities, we must look at both parents and their influence on the child's eating habits. If one parent is overweight, their children have approximately a 40 percent chance of also becoming overweight, but if both parents are obese the possibility increases to 80 percent. By the time children begin school, influences on eating have switched from parents to television and friends. A child of this age is bombarded by over 5,000 television commercials each year about food. Unfortunately, these commercials generally push foods that are highly sugared cereals, candy and soft drinks.

Another major factor of obesity is the composition of the diet; more importantly in the quality than the quantity of foods consumed. The recent increase in childhood obesity can be directly related to the increase in the amount of "junk foods" and fast-food meals" eaten by children. As a result of these and other factors, diets of many children are lacking in vital nutrients and fiber.

#### Possible solutions

Diet Center believes that the only effective solution to childhood obesity involves the restructuring of eating habits and attitudes towards food;

both for the children and parents.

Here are some basic steps parents can take to help their child overcome obesity.

- 1) Take the child to their doctor for a physical exam. At this time, an evaluation can be made to determine a healthy weight for the child; taking into account age, height, bone structure and muscle content.

- 2) Keep a record of what the child consumes and what the family consumes.

- 3) Removing high-calorie "foods" which are usually high in refined sugar and fat, will reduce calorie intake and remove the temptation for the child to eat them.

- 4) Replace candy and cookies with fresh fruits and vegetables.

- 5) Lean meats, whole grain cereals and breads, fresh fruits and vegetables offered at regular intervals will cut down on "junk snacking" and keep the child feeling energetic and satisfied.

- 6) Encourage and help your child develop a daily exercise routine. You may choose from many structured activities, getting out for a daily brisk walk or bike ride with your child.

Weight reduction and control is never easy, especially for children. It requires not only the cooperation of the entire family, but also the willingness to change harmful eating habits. However, the effort seems minute when compared to a life filled with the physical and emotional pain of obesity.

## 'Arsenic and Old Lace': Laughter, looniness at Fisher

"Arsenic and Old Lace," a charming and preposterous theatrical chestnut, is visiting the Fisher Theater. Through Sept. 27, audiences will be treated to a twisted, witty comedy, crammed with nutty characters, fast-paced plot, looniness and laughter.

The 46-year-old play is brightly updated by five principals from long-running TV sitcoms and soaps. And each one brings his/her own special mania to the production.

The dithering, ditsy Brewster sisters, Abby and Martha, are played by Jean Stapleton (Edith Bunker of "All in the Family") and Marian Ross (Mrs. Cunningham of "Happy Days"). Edith's voice occasionally creeps in around the edges of Abby Brewster's character when Stapleton (perhaps deliberately?) inserts a skillfully timed, "We-lll..." as she gleefully counts the corpses the charitable duo has stashed in the cellar.

Ross portrays the prim, Victorian maiden aunt with just the right amount of head-trembling, hand-wringing, righteous prattling and scurrying about.

The charitable Brewster sisters do good works by putting lonely old gentlemen out of their miseries with their special mix of elderberry wine, strychnine, cyanide and arsenic. They persuade their amiable nephew, Teddy, (who thinks he's Teddy Roosevelt) to stash the stiffs in the cellar. Teddy thinks he's digging the Panama Canal and burying yellow fever victims.

However, Mortimer is a (gasp) drama critic. And he's beginning to question his own sanity as he evaluates the assorted eccentricities of his kinfolk while working feverishly to cover up the kindly aunts' propensity for murder and mayhem.

Larry Storch (Corporal Agarn of "F Troop") is a special delight as the wimpy, sleazy sidekick, Dr. Einstein. He's pure caricature — villainous German accent, zoot-suit, an exaggerated skulk, and a slavish devotion to the psychopathic Jonathon. Dr. Einstein slithers and slides around the stage, clutching a suitcase to his chest and snatching quick glances over his shoulder.

"Arsenic and Old Lace" was first performed in 1941 and was one of Broadway's longest-running hits. It has become a mainstay of amateur theaters, summer stock and student productions and is probably one of a handful of the most-performed plays in the nation. Probably because it's chock-full of a wonderful mix of loony characters.

When Mortimer discovers the sisters' charitable hobby, he tries to cover their tracks, get Teddy

committed to an asylum, get Jonathan and Dr. Einstein out of the house, and explain all this looniness to his fiancée.

Add to this a couple of buff cops, an aspiring playwright, and 11 (or is it 12?) lonely corpses in the cellar.

It all adds up to a funny, fast-paced few hours of entertainment, highlighted by expert acting, split-second timing, and a couple of plots and subplots that converge nicely to a satisfying ending, tying the whole batch of nutty nonsense up neatly. There's plenty of double entendres, double-takes, double-dealing and a surprising curtain call.

It's a dippy delightful comedy. You'll never look at a window seat in the same way again.

Another nephew, the psychopathic Jonathon, is played by Jonathan Frid (the vampire, in Dark Shadows) with split-second timing and a slew of funny double-takes. He cringes every time someone notes his resemblance to Boris Karloff, and he plots a way to stash one of his own corpses in the Brewster's basement.

Gary Sandy (Andy Travis of "WKRP in Cincinnati") plays another nephew, Mortimer, the only (relatively speaking) sane member of the Brewster family.

## 'Hamburger Hill' violent, graphic depiction of Vietnam

"Hamburger Hill" demonstrates the futility of wartime brutality better than any of the recent Vietnam war movies. This is a picture about irony and contrast. It's a film about faceless soldiers fighting in a ubiquitous war. It's based on a true story, and that makes the images of the piece that much harder to accept.

On May 10, 1969, 14 soldiers of the 101st Airborne Division made their first attempt to take Hill 937, at the base of Dong Ap Bia, a strategic hill in the Vietnam conflict. They failed. The squad tried repeatedly to secure the land, and each time they were stopped; sometimes by the North Vietnamese, sometimes by their army's own ineptitude, sometimes by Mother Nature.

History shows that after 11 assaults in 10 days, the Screaming Eagles of the 3rd squad managed to get to the top of the hill. This film shows, in striking emotional detail, just what a hollow victory it was.

Indeed, the soldiers were fighting an uphill battle, both metaphorically and literally. Every bloody blow is recounted in the film, and it's not pretty. Every time a soldier is hit, it becomes all too clear that regardless of the color of one's skin, everybody's blood is red.

The piece does not take place exclusively in the trenches, however. An equal weight is given to the bonding of the boy-soldiers, and their indoctrination into the hostile realities of a world at war. Before long, the victims of the relentless siege are not as faceless as we would like. Writer Jim Carabatsos, who spent time in Vietnam, based the characters on those with whom he fought. But the aim here is not to elicit sympathy for those who died. Rather, the thesis of the piece is to force viewers to sense the needlessness of war. And allowing us to make friends with the soldiers guaran-

tees that the thesis will transcend mere cliché.

Throughout the film, visual images strengthen the unity of the whole. A young boy sits peacefully behind an umbrella as American vehicles of destruction crush the ground behind him. Little girls run alongside American trucks, trying to sell Coke to the soldiers. And older girls are everywhere too, trying to sell their bodies to those same soldiers. Planes and helicopters whiz by. Bombs drop. People die. Children cry. And yet life goes on.

"It don't mean nothin'" becomes the credo of the fighting men, who as time passes, become

almost numb to the destruction around them. They dream about going home, yes, but they also wonder if they'll remember how to act in the regular world. And as the final frames flicker on the screen, the film asks if it really matters.

'Hill's' technical work is as crisp and clear as its thesis. A late '60s rock'n'roll soundtrack and good sound work complement exceptional photography by Peter MacDonald. And the acting, mostly by unknowns, is uniformly convincing.

This film's punch is not as powerful as "Platoon," nor is its philosophical ideology as disturbing as that in "Full Metal Jacket." As a film which simply wants to make a point though, "Hamburger Hill" is second to none.






