# Proposed Free Press marathon to include Pointes

After two years on the west side, the prestigious Detroit Free Press International Marathon is planning to return to the eastside route, which includes the Pointes.

The proposed marathon route passes through the Park, City and Farms along Kercheval, Kerby Road, Lakeshore and Jefferson. While the three Grosse Pointe communities have approved the route for the Oct. 15 run, the city of Detroit has yet to give it its approval, according to Free Press spokeswoman Cathy Goltz.

She is hopeful that Detroit will approve the Sunday race, which has been a tradition in Windsor and Detroit for 12 years.

Marathon organizers would like the 26.2mile run back on the east side because it is favored by runners and better attended. The number of marathon participants dropped off considerably when the race moved to the west side in 1987.

Moving back to the east side of town has not been without obstacles. Many church leaders have complained that the Sunday race will interfere with worship services all along the route.

Park Mayor Palmer Heenan said he sympathizes with the affected churches, including St. Paul on the Lake and Grosse Pointe Memorial, both on Lakeshore in Grosse Pointe Farms.

"I would rather it be done on Saturday," Heenan said, "so that it wouldn't interfere with worship." He said he suggested the day change, but other than that, there's little that can be done. He said the race is very popular with residents.

Goltz said that Saturday has been ruled out as a possibility. She said traffic would be much heavier on Saturday and more people have Sunday off from work.

Other than the day of the race, Heenan is concerned about the residents who live on the south side of Jefferson and Lakeshore who will be inconvenienced by the marathon.

For those residents, the only way for them to get out of their subdivisions is to go to Jefferson or Lakeshore. He said those residents will be inconvenienced the most.

The residents won't be trapped at home, Heenan said. The Park Public Safety officers and auxiliary officers will be at intersections to direct traffic across Jefferson when runners are not present. Nevertheless, there will be an inconvenience, particularly for the Windmill Pointe residents.

However, Heenan said he has not received any complaints or concerns from those resi-

Goltz said the bulk of the runners should be traveling through the Pointes between 9:30 a.m and noon, if Detroit approves its portion of the race.

The marathon will start at Jackson Park in Windsor and then proceed through the Detroit-Windsor Tunnel, making the run the only international under-water mile.

Participants in wheelchairs will begin at 7:30 a.m., and the runners will start at 8


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

According to police, when COMET. Grosse Pointe Woods and Harper Woods officers searched the Blairmoor home, they found 4 ounces (112 grams) of suspected cocaine, a scale, an AR-15 semi-automatic weapon, brass knuckles and a shotgun.

The forfeiture proceedings are a civil action and are not dependent on whether the defendant is found guilty of drug activity, according to the prosecutor's office. The laws allowing forfeiture also apply to property involved in illegal gambling activity.

The burden of proof in a forfeiture case is not as stringent as in a criminal case. Since incarceration is involved in criminal cases, defendants must be proved guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. In property forfeiture cases, however, the prosecutor

must only show that a preponderance of the evidence shows that illegal drug or gambling activity occurred.

If the prosecutor's office wins the forfeiture case, the house on Blairmoor will be auctioned off by the county. The proceeds of the sale will pay for the court costs and some will be put into the county's law enforcement budget.

No court date has been set for the forfeiture trial.

# Pointer of Interest Larry Anderson

One day about 10 years ago, Larry Anderson dragged his old tennis shoes out of the back of the closet and ran around the

He did it as a test. He had a recent bout with sarcoid, a disease which resembles tuberculosis and causes high fevers, night sweats, arthritis, loss of weight and shortness of breath.

It was a terrible experience, he said. He hated it. But the symptoms of sarcoid had gone away, and Anderson was afraid he would relapse. He figured if he could make it, he was OK.

He made it. And on the weekend before Memorial Day, Anderson passed another milestone; he ran in his 125th marathon.

A gross anatomy instructor at the University of Detroit Dental School, Anderson is also a consultant at the Allen Park Veterans Hospital and he teaches continuing education classes to licensed dentists.

And Anderson, who is 46, ran in his 126th marathon over Memorial Day weekend.

Although the symptoms could reappear at any time, he has See POINTER, page 16A

> chard said. The governor opposed provisions in the bill that would make prosecutions of liquor license holders who sell to minors possible only if the minors are also prosecuted.

"It makes no sense to cripple the enforcement authority of the Michigan Liquor Control Commission with respect to liquor licensees in all instances in which a local prosecutor chooses not to

prosecute a minor.' The bill also prevented law enforcement agencies from offering immunity from prosecution to a minor who cooperates in naming who had sold him the alcohol.

The legislation was strongly opposed by Rep. William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe Farms. Bryant and other opponents of the bill charged that it was written and promoted by the "liquor lobby," which includes 28,892 liquor license holders, including bars, restaurants and convenience

Under provisions of SB119,

which allow judges little discretion, the 90-day driver's license suspension and minimum \$50 fine was for first-time offenders. On second offense, the minor's driver's license would have been suspended for up to 180 days and the fine would have been up to \$500. A third offense called for a \$500 fine and a driver's license suspension of up to a year.

The bill's detractors, including the governor, pointed out that the penalties against minors would be harsher than those against adults caught drunk driving.

Under current law, a minor caught purchasing alcohol is subject to a \$25 fine. The seller of alcohol to a minor faces a maximum \$1,000 fine and possible revocation of his liquor license. If the minor is caught using false identification, such as a fake driver's license, he could get up to 90 days in jail, a \$100 fine and possible suspension of his driver's license for 90 days.


While there are no mandated guidelines in sentencing adult drunk drivers, judges in the

Pointes are pretty uniform in their sentencing. All first-time drunk drivers face some type of license suspension and alcoholabuse screening and counseling. Offenders often get restricted licenses to get to work and to alcohol counseling sessions.

Blanchard suggested that there is a possibility that he would favor future legislation that would address illegal alcohol purchases involving minors, as long as the legislation addresses both the seller and the underage buyer.

"I believe underage liquor sales constitute a problem which needs to be taken seriously, Blanchard said. "As a result, I can support legislation that strengthens the penalties for minors and liquor licensees who engage in illegal liquor sales. But these penalties should be consistent.

"I am willing to work with legislators to make certain Michigan's liquor laws are enforced fairly and equitably," he said. "I believe Senate Bill 119 is not the solution we need."

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
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
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


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# City buys new parking meters

The Grosse Pointe City Council approved the purchase of 95 electronic parking meters May 22 to replace some of the older mechanical models on Kercheval in the Village and on Fisher Road.

The new meters cost about \$100 more than the mechanical ones, but will be easier to read, work and run, according to City Manager Thomas Kressbach. The cost for the meters  $-49 \sin^2 \theta$ gle head, and 46 double heads is \$38,766.

One hundred thirty-one meters are being replaced, but because some single-headed meters are being replaced with doubleheaded meters, only 95 new ones were needed.

The new meters run on a bat-

tery pack which holds four AA electronic meters may save the batteries, Kressbach said. They will include an expired time feature which will aid parking enforcement in determining how long a car has been parked at

the meter, he added. Although the operating expense of the electronic meters is slightly higher because the batteries must be replaced each vear, the cost is offset partly due to reduced maintenance and conversion costs when parking rates are changed.

Kiressbach said the current meters are between 16 and 19 years old, but have been renovated because they have worn

To replace the current mechamical meters with new mechanical meters would save the city \$14,000 initially, but the city money in the long run, depending on the life of the new models.

Kercheval in the Village and in front of the shops on Fisher Road were chosen to be the homes of the new meters because of the high visibility, and because there is less chance the meters will be hit by errant drivers. The older meters will be used for parts to replace worn meters in other areas of the city.

In other action, the council raised lease parking rates from \$17.50 per month to \$18.25 a month for regular surface lot parking and from \$19 to \$19.75 per month for special surface lot parking. Also, the parking rates for Carriage House leases were raised 75 cents per month. The new rates go into effect July 1.

# Shores budget is up slightly

The Grosse Pointe Shores village council approved a final budget for fiscal 1989-90. Although the number of mills has been decreased for the new budget year, the average taxpayer will feel an increase of approximately 9.46 percent due to an increase in assessments.

According to Michael Kenyon, village manager, the SEV rose from the 1988-89 figure of \$142 million to \$161 million this year; an increase of \$19 million or 13 percent.

Kenyon said the mills levied in the new budget are 14.85, down from 15.40 last year.

The 1989-90 budget is \$3.47 million, up from the previous year's budget of \$3.24 million.

The slight increase reflects a number of major expenditures and construction projects. The Shores is also trying to put some money away so the village is not strapped the following year when it will install new sewers on Colonial Road, a project which will cost some \$500,000, to come out of the general fund.

Repaying of Lakeshore north of Vernier is scheduled to be completed early this month completing the repaving of the entire stretch of Lakeshore in the village. The islands will be landscaped and a sprinkling system will be installed as well.


Although the city of Detroit is not raising the price of water for the village, the use of water has increased, so the new budget reflects that increase.

Another construction project will be the repair of the Vernier Road water main. The Shores will be sharing the cost of that project with Grosse Pointe Woods; the Shores' portion is

The Ford soccer field will be repaired this year, too, at a cost of \$112,000.

And with the completion of negotiations for the public safety command officers, the budget shows an increase of \$80,000, or 4 percent, in salaries.

'I'm satisfied with the budget," Kenyon said. "There is a tax increase, but we're putting the money to work. We're trying to continuously improve the community and keep it the pride of the Pointes.'




Police ran the 25-year-old man's name through the state crime computer and learned he was wanted on several warrants. He was then arrested.



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# Writer takes benign look at Mayor Young

rosse Pointe and other suburban residents probably have read and heard more than they really wanted to know about the paternity suit against Detroit Mayor Coleman Young and his reaction to the blood tests that proved he is the father of a 6-year-old son born out of

But these days politicians from the local to the national level have found their private lives subjected to media coverage. sometimes with damaging effects. In Young's case, however, Detroit community leaders have indicated the suit would not be a big issue if Young, as expected, seeks a fifth four-year term in November.

Until this episode, Young's personal life had been carefully guarded during his 10 years of service as a state senator and 16 years as mayor, even though he often has been an aggressive, contentious leader who seemed to enjoy verbal jousting with his critics.

Even a new biography just written by Wilbur C. Rich, a Wayne State political science professor, and published by the Wayne State University Press, does not dig very deeply into Young's private life, and ignores his divorces in two childless marriages.

"Coleman Young and Detroit Politics, From Social Activist to Power Broker"

Opinion

traces the development of a new political force in Detroit as the city's black population finally became a majority and made Young the city's first black mayor.

For the most part, an admiring portrait emerges from the biography. That is not surprising since author Rich acknowledges his debt to the Young Foundation for providing support for research, travel and word processing and to the foundation's directors for opening doors to sources of information on the mayor. Yet the story Rich tells is an intriguing one of the rise of a one-time black radical to a position of power and influence in Detroit and the national Democratic Party.

Born in 1918 in Tuscaloosa, Ala., Young celebrated his 71st birthday last week at a series of parties whose attendance and enthusiasm were apparently not affected by the paternity suit. In those intervening 71 years, Young obviously has come a long

Young's father and the family left Alabama in 1923 in reaction, author Rich says, "to the violence, economic uncertainty and political instability of the U.S. South." In Detroit the elder Young worked as a night watchman at the post office and

with his wife's help built a family dry cleaning business. So, says author Rich, "Despite his disclaimers, Coleman Young had a basically middle-class upbringing in many ways.

In school, however, Rich says, "The negative reception of some of his white teachers to his precociousness reinforced the racial messages he received from his parents and alerted him to the duplicity of the educational system.'

After graduating from Eastern High School, Young worked at a variety of jobs, served in the U.S. Army from 1942 to 1945 and soon after his return from service became an organizer for the CIO. In that post, he was instrumental, according to author Rich, in getting the CIO involved in the fledgling civil rights movement in Detroit.

After flirting with left-wing labor and political movements, Young turned to more traditional politics. His first successful race was as a Democratic candidate to the Michigan Constitutional Convention in 1961. Three years later he won a Detroit state Senate seat and began a 10-year career in Lansing where he first displayed his ability for leadership.

He served as Democratic minority floor leader in the Senate, chaired the Senate Elections Committee, backed liberal legislation and in 1968 became the nation's first black Democratic National Commit-

In view of his continuing interest in Detroit politics, it was not surprising that he was nominated for mayor in 1973 and won election over John Nichols, the former Detroit police chief.

From the beginning, according to his biographer, Young's major agenda as mayor has been the redevelopment of Detroit. This meant his choice was not whether but how to work with the business community which still controls the economic decisions in the city.

Author Rich claims that during Young's four terms, Detroit has been slowly undergoing a metamorphosis of major significance. He also believes Young has made "considerable headway in putting Detroit on the road to economic diversity despite incredible odds and a host of naysayers.'

He points to the visible accomplishments of Young's administration as being affirmative action in the police department, economic development downtown and successful management of two economic crisis. Overall, he claims that "in retrospect, all of the predictions of economic doom or of a failure to entice people downtown have proved false."

Despite the complimentary tone, the book does offer information that is useful in evaluating the career of Detroit's controversial mayor and explaining why he is favored for a fifth term despite his family lapses and other shortcomings.

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# In search of freedom

little freedom, like a little learning, can be a dangerous thing, as China's students have demonstrated to their leaders in recent weeks.

What is truly remarkable is that a generation of young people, heavily indoctrinated in Communist dogma from the time they entered kindergarten, have emerged into adulthood with such a strong desire for political freedom that they are willing to stage a non-violent revolution to try to get it.

Americans who have toured China since former President Nixon's opening to China in 1972 often visited the public schools where they were negatively impressed by the youngsters' devotion to the party line, whether it was in answer to questions about their schooling or their own future. In both cases, they were willing to let the party and government make their decisions for them, or so they said.

Now, however, those youngsters have grown to college age and their political eyes have opened with the results we have seen in the mass protests in many of China's important cities. Furthermore, the students have won the support of millions of other Chinese who, it appears, were waiting for an opportunity to express their support for freedom, too.

True, the students still may lose their campaign but their heroic stand for freedom must have impressed the entire world, including many Americans. The demonstrators paid tribute to U.S. democracy not only by carrying banners displaying Patrick Henry's famous words, "Give me liberty or give me death," but also by erecting a 27-foot sculpture modeled after the U.S. Statue of Liberty.

Unfortunately, the government appeared

the students and their supporters. The Chinese army's Headquarters of General Staff and its General Political Department set a new tough tone by publishing a letter calling for support of martial law and resistance to the "extreme minority" that they claimed is creating turmoil.

Earlier, China's leaders, like those in the Soviet Union, had begun to loosen the bonds of Communist economic orthodoxy because both countries found their economic development lagging far behind that in the Western democracies. Now China's leaders may have to recognize the student and public demand for an easing of Communist political orthodoxy just as the Soviet Union has done to a limited extent.

Among the reforms sought by the de onstrating Chinese students are freedom of the press and freedom to assemble peacefully (as they have been doing) and an end to what the students regard as widespread official corruption.

The student revolt poses a tough issue for the Bush administration which wants to maintain its good relations with the governments of both China and the Soviet Union. President Bush, himself an "old China hand," has been cautiously urging non-violence and restraint, expressing the hope for "the continued implementation of economic and political reforms" and reiterating U.S. commitment "to democracy around the world."

True, the United States must stand on the sidelines physically but there is no reason it cannot express its moral support for the freedoms that the students are seeking. Most of them are enumerated in our own Bill of Rights which, as even American presidents sometimes need to remember, serves as the basis for our political freedom.

again have a chance to win the trophy for best float and if that particular class had never won, shouldn't one factor in a little compassion?


The longer I took, the harder

Fund of our local Fraternal Order of Police, honors high school students who have shown exceptional growth and/or achievement in spite of a learning disabil-

While I enthusiastically supported this project from the start, I was truly not prepared for the high caliber of the nominees we received. These are exceptional young people by anyone's standards, but when one realizes the struggle they have had to go through to become the people they are today, it is doubly impressive.

It is not easy being L.D. in a community like Grosse Pointe. We have a competitive school system which places a high priority on academic success. As early as elementary school, the emphasis is on programs which prepare students for acceptance into four-year colleges. as opposed to vocational or technical programs.

L.D. students must work together harder and study longer than most students to make passing grades. They must set realistic vocational goals and find opportunties for employment in the absence of any extensive voc. ed, programs in the schools.

And, perhaps most importantly, they must recognize and compensate for the challenges presented by their learning disabilities without using them as an excuse for doing less than they are cap able of. This requires a considerable amount of maturity and insight.

The nominees of these awards have not outgrown their disabilities. A learning disability is a life-long condition. They have however. come a long way toward conquering their disabilities, in the sense that they do not allow themselves to be limited by them. These are fine young people. They are a credit to their families, their schools and their community. And they are an inspiration to those of us whose children still have a long way to go

I offer my heartiest congratulations to our four \$200 winners and three \$50 winners, and also to their families, teachers. Little League coaches and everyone else who has helped them to reach their potential. What a great feeling that must be! I also urge our entire community to take notice of and support our local Fraternal Order of Police. It's good to live in a community where the police not only protect us, but care enough to support worthwhile projects such as this.

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I would like to take this opportunity to respond to a recent letter to the editor published in the Grosse Pointe News from Eileen M. Liska of the Michigan Humane Society.

Ms. Liska wrote to you concerning the auctioning of live animals at a recent fundraiser for Our Lady Star of the Sea Schools in Grosse Pointe. On behalf of some Grosse Pointe area members of the Michigan Humane Society and some purebred dog breeders, she raised several objections to the auctioning

of the animals, including: 1. "Animals are living, feeling beings, not commodities to be sold . . .'

2. "... the primary problem is that absolutely no screening . . . has occured in order to ensure ... that they will be responsible pet own-

3. "... no provisions are made to ensure that their owners will have them sterilized."

4. "The fact that someone has paid a large sum of money ... in no way ensures that the animal will have a responsible home or even remain in that home."

5. "...for educational institutions to auction animals ... sends a message to the young people ... that it is acceptable for them to acquire an irresponsible attitude toward animals."

Given Ms. Liska's, I would make the following observations.

The first four objections all revolved around ensuring a good home for the animal. In point of fact, pet stores, private breeders, and those who sell animals through ads in newspapers also have no EST EDUTILITIES. way of ensuring the quality of the home in which the animal is placed. Even the Michigan Humane Society, which I understand does some screening, cannot guarantee a good placement. If the absolute assurance of a good home is required by the MHS, then all trafficking in animals (including placement by the MHS) would have to be terminated. Otherwise, there is simply no way to "ensure" (Ms. Liska's word) that the animal will go to a responsible pet owner.

In addition, it seems fairly safe to say — Ms. Liska's objection notwithstanding that a person who does indeed pay \$400 or more for an animal does indeed choose to have the animal and will therefore care for it.

Without any kind of proof that her assertion is correct, Ms. Liska accuses Our Lady Star of the Sea Schools of promoting an "unethical and insensitive concept." At best, the charge is presumptuous; at worst it is slanderous.

In response to Ms. Liska's fifth and final charge, I would only say the following. I have always considered myself a person who cares for animals, would certainly never actively do anything to harm any creature.

In the past I have supported the welfare of animals; in the future, I shall have to find a way to support their welfare other than through the Michigan Humane Society.

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



# Abstract photography


The word "abstract" means apart from the recognizable object. This opens up a realm of photographic opportunties.

Shooting abstracts is a terrific exercise in enhancing your photographic vision which in turn will greatly improve your picture taking abilities.

A good place to begin is with architectural subjects. All the construction going on in the area provides a wealth of abstract subject material. An isolated section of steel beams, reflections in glass panels, or a geometric curve in a building corner all lend themselves well to abstract photography.

A good way to make abstract pictures is to exclude part of the subject. We all tend to identify objects by their whole. We recognize their outlines and the context in which we find them. A hot air balloon, for example, is easily recognized when we photograph it in its entirety coasting through the skies. But close cropping and unconventional framing of just a section of the baloon as it sits on the ground can produce a photograph of bold color and tight pattern that will make viewers guess what they're looking at.

Try using slow shutter speeds to form abstracts. Colorful clothes hung out to dry in a breeze will produce a formless blur when a long shutter speed is used. Or try intentionally moving the camera up and down as you shoot a field of flowers. You'll be pleased with the ab-



stract results.

Photograph still lifes through heavily textured glass for another kind of abstract feeling. A scrap of shower door glass obtained from your local glass dealer works fine.

Consider photographing your subject completely out of focus to where it may barely be recognized. You see, there's no end to the possibilities for abstracts.

Nature abounds in abstract subjects. From the intimate pattern of veins in a single leaf to the vast array of geometric designs seen from an airplane, abstracts exist in abundance.

Lithotripsy is a nonsurgical method that uses sound waves to pulverize kidney stones into small, sand-like particles that a patient can then pass through the urine.

Kidney stone sufferers will tar is Michigan's first mobile lithotripsy unit. It was recently approved by the Federal Food and Drug Administration for mobile usage. Patients utilizing the Lithostar require little or no anesthesia. The unit eliminates the need for a waterbath, a common procedure in past litho-

tripsy treatment. First-generation lithotripters, available since 1984, required anesthetized patients to lie in a shock wave-conducting waterbath. This often required an overnight stay in the hospital.

A patient receiving lithotripsy treatment lies on a multipurpose table. After an overhead x-ray unit pinpoints the stone's exact

location, shock wave generators enclosed within the table, and waves through a water-filled cylinder positioned on the patient

The lithotripter sends up to 5.000 shock waves during the 60-90 minute procedure.

Soon after the treatment, the patient returns home with both a prescription for antibiotics and advice to drink plenty of water Stone fragments may take up to a few weeks to pass.

Under conventional kidney stone surgery, patients spent a week or more in the hospital and up to eight weeks convalescing at home, with full recovery tak ing nearly six months.



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

Invited by art teacher Brian Wilson who met Mark Bruckner while at the University of Chicago, the two Bruckners spent a week creating the as-yet-untitled sculpture. and playing their unique brand of music for students.

The sculpture was completed Saturday and will be on permanent display in the

Bruckner said the hardest part of the

sculpture was finding a hollow log which was large enough yet not too unwieldy. Calling all the landscaping companies in the area, Bruckner finally found one and his sculpture could begin.

Balancing the large log on an equally large fulcrum, the two Bruckners set out to create a sound sculpture that creates sound by being moved like a see-saw. It can also be played by striking the various parts with mallets, which are also parts found in junkyards.

It is his second sound sculpture, and Bruckner, who is trained as a composer, calls what he does "sculpting by the seat of the pants," because he is not sure exactly how it will turn out, or sound for that matter.

Bruckner first thought about sound sculpting while looking through junkyards,

mallet in hand, for items to play in his compositions.


"I take mallets to junkyards and strike anything that looks like it might have an interesting sound," he said. "Every time I discover a new sound, it's exciting. I hope to instill that into people. Kids have a great fascination with sound, I hope to

keep that fascination." He is currently looking for funds to build an entire playground with musical sculptures, for kids of all ages.


And how does his music play with his neighbors in Iowa City?

"Well, no one's said anything, yet," Nancy Bruckner said. "But our neighbors are a little different.'

"We hope our work opens your eyes and ears to the environment," he said, "and stretches your mind."

# Local travelers witness freedom cry heard 'round the world

When Woods residents Charles and Evelyn Frohman booked their trip to China, their second in two years, they had no idea that they were about to step into a momentous period of history.

Upon arriving in Beijing, they learned that martial law had been declared by the ruling Chinese government due to massive student protests.

The couple began its trip the first week of May with Elderhostel, a travel-study group based in Boston. The fact that worldwide reports of student demonstrations and government crackdowns were being circulated did not deter the well-traveled cou-

Among the stops for the Frohmans were three universities where they encountered students who were extremely curious about how Americans viewed the massive calls for new reforms.

The first university, Qufu (pronounced chee-fu) Teachers University is located in the town of Qufu, the home town of Confucious. The other two, Shan Dong University and Shan Dong Teachers University were brisk with students wanting to know any American point of view regarding the recent unrest.

Mrs. Frohman said even though the students were told by government officials not to engage in discussions regarding the demonstrations, the students took the risk of bringing up the

The students were pleased, she said, to learn that many Americans supported the students' efforts to gain more freedom of choice.

During a 12-hour train ride from Jinan to Beijing, normally an eight-hour ride (about 450 miles), transportation authorities were told not to let students board trains bound for Beijing.

Ignoring the order, students all, along the route climbed in various towns, then refused to

leave. In most cases, said Mrs. Frohman, the train would depart after several futile attempts by officials to oust the students.

When the Frohmans finally arrived in Beijing, they noticed city services, such as water, sewage and local transportation had broken down completely due to the demonstrations.

The couple described the scene as masses of people all rallying for a common cause.

"You just can't believe how many people there are," Mrs. Frohman said. "It's just unbelievable. Students were pushing buses into the roadway to keep the military from entering the heart of the city. Once the buses were in place, tires were slashed.

"Besides that, the students through the train windows in were utterly non-violent. In many areas the students them-

selves were the roadblock.'

The massive demonstrations had such an impact that visiting Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev was unable to place a wreath at the foot of the monument for martyrs in Tiananmen Square.

Indeed, said Mrs. Frohman, the Chinese government was forced to move the "wing ding" to Shanghai. The official welcoming ceremony was held at the airport.

Mrs. Frohman added that the demonstrations had put just about everything on hold.

"The sanitary conditions were absolutely terrible," she said. "The hunger strikers were also refusing to drink water and many had to be hospitalized. Many had to be given I.V.s (intravenous feeding) and caught hepatitis from dirty needles. There was great concern that one of the students would die. This would have been a great tragedy.'

In an attempt to ward off dis-

ease due to poor sanitary conditions, many of the students ate garlic shoots. Human waste was literally piled up and doused with formalin (a disinfectant) to kill bacteria.

"The smell was terrible."

Many of the soldiers and government officials had no weapons and tried unsuccessfully to plead with students to clear the area of Tiananmen Square in the center of the city. The Frohmans noted that the soldiers were the most unmilitary group they had ever seen.

"Many of the soldiers looked as if they were playing soldier," Mr. Frohman said.

The uniforms were too small leading the couple to believe that the soldiers had the same uniforms for several years. Also, most of the military, he said. had no desire to use force against their countrymen.

The Frohmans put the students' plight in perspective as they explained that a minute percentage of the population ac-

tually move into decent jobs such as tour guides. The vast majority are assigned menial labor jobs or teaching posts and are not allowed to leave the particular province of assignment.

In addition, salaries and living conditions are poor. An associate of the Frohmans noted on a recent visit that the prisons in China offered better conditions than student housing.

Mr. Frohman said the core of the problem is an outdated political system that never really worked in the first place.

"Only one or two percent of the Chinese population belongs to the Communist Party," he said. "That's where the good jobs are, but still, the people of China

are not the least bit communist. They are pragmatic - they can't be governed and you shoudn't

even try. While talking to students studying English language, both of the Frohmans engaged in dis-

cussions about freedom. Mrs. Frohman asked what the students liked best about the United States and a student simply replied, "I like best your freedom of choice."

The Frohmans stressed the point that the students both in Tiananmen Square and in the smaller towns shared a very genteel spirit and truly desired the freedoms that many American take for granted.



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# Maire School comes together to update library

Maire School PTO President Sandy Lowden said the project to update the school library was started because the group wanted to undertake something that would have lasting value for the school.

"It was Principal Jay Flowers who recognized the potential for improving the original library and making it a real enhancement to the entire school," Lowden said.

That was in 1986. The new library is not a library any more, it's a media center, and it was dedicated in March.

With renovation costs financed by a PTO gift of \$27,000, the new media center is one of the a school by a PTO. Subsequent sized wooden furniture,

raised the PTO's total contribution to \$38,500.

Pat Minnick, Bonnie Tolman, Julie Scott and Lowden were named to a study committee that researched media centers nationwide, including visits to schools in Ann Arbor and Bloomfield Hills to see the latest in media

They found that the best school media centers served as the hub of a school, allowing students to work independently and creatively and helping teachers in their curriculum planning.

Taking the information they gathered, they began transforming the usually vacant Maire lilargest single gifts ever given to brary into a facility with child-

gifts of materials and books have reinforced with cast iron, a carpeted story area, production equipment, individual study tables and audiovisual equipment for viewing filmstrips and listening to tape players.

The shelves — formerly adultsized metal shelving - were replaced with freestanding childsized wood shelves. Even the checkout desk and card catalog are now pint-sized.

"What we did," Lowden explained, "is to renovate the library above and beyond what the board of education could be expected to do."

The entire Maire community joined together to support the project. Parents organized the Maire Faire, which raised the original \$27,000 in 1988. The

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# Lake level

Lake St. Clair at the end of April was at elevation 573.90 feet above the mean water level at Father Point, Quebec, or 26 inches above chart datum. This was about 8 inches below what it was a year ago, but 3 inches above one month ago.

The April-monthly mean level of 573.87 feet was about 4 inches above the long-term average for April. The lake, however, remained about 28 inches below the all-time high April-monthly mean level, which was recorded in 1986. The forecast shows that at the end of May, the level of Lake St. Clair will be about 2 inches above what it was at the end of April. The lake is expected to continue its seasonal rise into June.

The water level in October 1989 is expected to be about 2 inches above the long-term average for that month.






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



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# begins in the harbor at Woods' Lakefront Park

Boat owners leasing slips at Lakefront Park will soon have an unobstructed path into Lake St. Clair due to dredging at the mouth of the Milk River.

According to Chester Petersen, expected to be completed by early June.

"We can't give an exact estimate on the completion date, but the boats now can get in and out," he said.

The area of the waterway to be dredged begins at the mouth of the river and extends approximately 1,200 feet into Lake St. Clair. The marine pathway leading out of the Lakefront Park marina is 120 feet wide and narrows to a 60 foot width just outside the marina entrance.

When completed, the area of Mount Clemens, and the city of dredging will be an average of six feet deep and will involve the

removal of more than 8,000 cubic yards of sand and clay. Total cost is expected to be \$105,400.

Robert E. Novitke, mayor pro tem, said there was some concern initially that soil removed from the basin could be contaminated, but core samples tested Woods city administrator-clerk, under the direction of city engithe dredging has begun and is neer Lawrence H. Pate showed no contamination.

Novitke added that there was concern that heavy boating traffic over the Memorial Day and subsequent weekends could cause potential problems for boaters.

"I'm keeping my fingers crossed that it will not be a problem," adding that his concern was shared by council members.

Petersen said as of May 25, no additional costs have been incurred and that both the excavating company, P&M Marine of

Grosse Pointe Woods do not expect any cost overruns.


'We're right on the money,' said D.J. Hallman, director of Parks and Recreation. "The project should be completed by the second week in June.'

The dredging plan was approved by the Woods council during mid-January following several months of discussion regarding both the need for dredging and the amount available for the excavation.

Hallman said a surcharge will be billed to boat owners. The amount will depend on the size of the slip.

For example, a 28-foot slip that is \$500 will cost boat owners an additional 20 percent, he said, or in this case \$100 a year for the next three years.





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

### Number your baby at birth as medical or school records.

For the convenience of parents of newborn infants, the Social Security Administration has announced a new program for the State of Michigan -- to issue Social Security numbers automatically to newborns if requested by the parents, according to Verlyn J. Rebelein, district manager of the Social Security office located at 17420 Mack Ave.

Under the new service, parents can indicate whether or not they want a Social Security number (SSN) card issued to their child as part of the birth registration process. Should they request this service, the state's vital statistics office will electronically transmit the needed information to the Social Security Administration and a card for the baby will be automatically issued.

This eliminates the need for parents to apply for an SSN for their child at a later date. That method requires the submission of an original birth certificate and other proofs of identity, such

In addition, parents are required to fill out Form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Number Card. Under this process, parents also have to provide proof of their own identity (e.g., a valid driver's license). This process can be eliminated for those parents who request the new service for their newborns since all of the information required on the SS-5 is contained

on the state's birth registration

The need for a more convenient service to the public became apparent as parents sought SSNs for their children at an earlier age to establish savings accounts, purchase savings bonds, or to apply for other government benefits. Also, taxpayers are now required to show Social Security numbers for all dependents age 5 or older on Federal tax returns.





# Optimists recognize efforts of teachers

Typically, the day began early
for teachers from eight of Grosse
Pointe's private schools. Only on
this particular morning — May
24 -- the teachers were not in
their classrooms, but at the
Grosse Pointe War Memorial,
where they received some muchdeserved recognition.

The occasion was the fifth annual Excellence in Education program presented by the Lakeshore Optimist Club of Grosse Pointe. Educators from Bishop Gallagher High School, the Grosse Pointe Academy, Grosse Pointe Christian Day School, Our Lady Star of the Sea Grade School and High School, St. Ambrose: Academy, St. Clare of Montefalco and St. Paul Grade School were honored.

Phillip Van Tiem and James Clarkie co-chaired the event. Clarkie called the program "important to the club because it ties into the substance of what the Lakeshore Optimists are all about — the belief of giving oneself to others.

"That's what these educators do every day."

The Excellence in Education Awards are given annually to local teachers who best exemplify a commitment to education and bringing out the best in young people in the areas of academics and athletics.

It was the first time that teachers from non-public schools were recognized by the club, according to Van Tiem.

The day's keynote speaker was Marilyn F. Lundy, a 42-year Grosse Pointe resident who was elected last November to an eight-year term on the Michigan State Board of Education. She is also a board member of New Detroit, an executive officer of the League of Catholic Women, a member of the education commission of Our Lady Star of the Sea School and a board member at St. Ambrose Academy.

Lundy talked about the history of non-public education in America, noting that the roots of all education in the U.S. were non-public.

"At first, American education was all private," Lundy said. "Educators were the most learned persons at that time: the ministers and priests."

She pointed out how the educational system evolved from its sectarian roots and in general, underwent decades of constant

"Now we're coming to a point where we are reevaluating and looking at what is happening in education in this country," Lundy continued. "It hurts sometimes to think we may have made mistakes, but we must address the vital issues facing education today: the free market system of education, who has the right to educate, parents or the

government.

"And it's good to know that we have good people, people like yourselves, who are on the cutting edge, to help us face those issues," Lundy told the teachers, guests and Optimist Club mem-

She finished her speech by telling those teachers who were to be recognized to "never give up — because you are the basic, real structure of our communi-

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


They have seen family structures change as "till death do us became "till we grow apart."



John Evelyn's diary contains some quite poetic passages regarding "sallets" which, he says, add sprightliness and harmony to any menu.

In the 18th century, a popular salad was called "Salamagundi," and the many ingredients were carefully arranged on a platter according to color so as to create a pattern. Sometimes a footed compote or cake stand was placed in the center of the platter and a second layer of various colors would be added.

The salad dressing would be in a small bowl in the center of the top tier and the whole thing garnished with eggs and flowers.

Salad gardens were popular in colonial America and a salad of several kinds of lettuce embellished with nasturtiums was popular. # Bill Leonard, South strike out Southeastern

South baseball coach Dan Griesbaum told his players they couldn't just toss their gloves on the field and expect to beat Southeastern, but as it turned out, South didn't need gloves until the fifth inning.

Thanks to senior left-hander Bill Leonard, the Blue Devils went on to defeat the Jungaleers, 15-5, in a predistrict game at Manz Field May 26. The game ended after five innings because of the mercy rule.

South, which finished the regular season at 11-15, collected 13 hits on the day, but it was Leonard's outing that was the most impressive.

Not only was it Leonard's third straight win, but he struck out the first eight batters, three more in the fourth and two in the fifth; totaling 13 on the day.

"It was nice because we didn't have to field anything," said Griesbaum. "Bill has really come on since he was 1-4. He's really thrown well and this time out he received a lot of support."

Offensive support, that is. After scoring twice in the first inning and five times in the second, South put together its best inning of the season in the third with eight runs.

The Devils sent 12 batters to the plate after the first batter was retired. Jim Morris singled and scored on Ray Roxas' triple. Dale Wilson, who collected four RBI, drove home Kevin Nugent (walk) and Roxas, and later scored on a Brian Letscher single. Jason Weissert followed with a sacrifice fly and Matt Wysocki drove in two with a sin-

Scott Adlhoch, who had an RBI, Morris and Roxas, who leads the team with a .419 average, singled again, just ahead of Nugent's RBI walk.

"I really think we could have beaten anybody that day," Gries-

baum said. "We came out and hit the ball very well and it became infectious. We've had a couple of five-run first innings during the season, but that inning was by far our best of the season.'

South, which has struggled somewhat defensively all season, was tested in the fourth inning, but Leonard's arm once again bailed the Devils out.

"We got a little sloppy in the fourth," Griesbaum said. "We're fortunate we had a big enough lead, because all season long we've not been able to overcome our mistakes.

Southeastern's first hitter in the fourth was safe on an error and moved up when Leonard issued one of his three walks. The next batter singled, one of two hits off Leonard, and Southeastern was mounting its first at-

"We knew they could score runs," said Greisbaum, "because they finished second in their division of the PSL. Going in we knew we had to keep them off the base paths in order to win, and eventually we got out of that inning."

That's because Leonard struck out the next three hitters.

The Jungaleers scored five times in the fifth and final inning after Leonard walked one, hit a batter, and Caldwell and Weissert committed errors.

"We had a 15-run lead and knew we had the chance to mercy them so I think we lost some of our concentration," Griesbaum said. "Again, we were very fortunate to have such a big lead, because with the way this year has gone, we never know just what's going to hap-

# Brady paces ULS in overtime

University Liggett School soccer player Meghan Brady thrives on pressure games.

Brady, the Knights' leading scorer this season, booted two goals in overtime to give ULS a 2-1 victory over Lakeview in the district championship game at ULS on May 27.

The game ended 0-0 in regulation after both teams went 87 minutes without scoring a goal. Then, within a minute's time, Brady gave ULS a 1-0 lead in the first 10-minute portion of the overtime, but Lakeview struck quickly to tie it.

"We had the lead, but all of a sudden we gave up the tying goal," said ULS coach David Backhurst. "Throughout the course of the game I kept thinking it may go into a possible shootout because both teams were playing such good defense, and in one minute two goals were scored. That was frustrat-

Frustration turned to happiness for Backhurst and the Knights five minutes later as Brady kicked home the game-

"There was still five minutes to play in the overtime and I just kept telling the girls to hang on," Backhurst said. "We just packed in our defense and eventually won a big game."

The win catapulted the Knights, who have now lost only once in their last 13 games, into their third consecutive regional title game in Class B-C-D against top-ranked Bishop Foley.

Regional championships are nothing new to Foley or ULS, but winning one would be new for ULS.

In 1987, the Knights lost 2-1. One year later they had a 1-0 lead, but lost 5-1. This season, Backhurst is seeking a different

"I was more concerned with linking a couple passes together and getting a goal," Backhurst added. "We had many shots on goal, but nothing was going in. It was only a matter of time, but how much time was the ques-

One look at the shots on goal and it's easy to see that ULS did carry the play.

"We had 29 shots on goal and they had nine," Backhurst said. 'We kept battling and battling until finally something clicked."

This little bit of history about our taste buds has not been lost in today's world of food process ing. Both salt and refined sugar are inexpensive additives and we are inundated with both in today's food products. Salt is an especially addictive taste; the more we have, the more we need to satisfy our taste for it. Once you make a concerted effort, years those people who were not however, to get yourself off the fortunate to live near the oceans salt "habit" it is amazing how were in a continuing search for well your tongue and the rest of foods from plants and animals your mouth is able to respond to the more subtle and delicate flavors of foods and seasonings.

The craving for sweets can be just as overwhelming as that of salt, but seems to be more intricately woven into the physiology of some people. The craving for sweets during a woman's menstrual cycle is well known, although not very well understood. And we are all familiar with the weird food cravings of the pregnant woman.

A strong message from the body is sent for good reason. The pregnant woman could be lacking an important vitamin or mineral or the unborn child needs something that is low or lacking in the mother's food intake. But the more a woman understands how to read the signals her body is giving, the better she will be able to address her particular needs without resorting to the "quick fix."

In today's world of fast foods ies have learned how to trigger the mechanism for a quick fix. But, they are just that; a quick answer that has no staying power and very often little, if any, nutritional value.

Taste sensitivity can also be tied to normal hormone changes within the healthy body. For both men and women, the amount of cortisol (a hormone) is circulating in your body at a much higher level during the early morning hours. And at this time our taste sensitivity is at

its lowest. Throughout the day, the cortisol level declines and the taste buds pick up. It is no wonder that many of us eat our largest meal of the day at about 6 or 7 p.m. and often keep snacking until we go to bed.

#### Mood food

How are you feeling about yourself also can affect your perception of taste. Generally, a negative mood signals hunger, while positive moods will give you a sense of satisfaction. I like to use a scale from zero to 10 in helping to understand our mood swings and food.

If zero represents the point on the scale of low stress and a feeling of well-being and 10 represents maximum stress and a feeling of despair, most of us would admit to over-eating or experiencing food cravings to hit their worst when we are somewhere in the middle of the mood scale. When we are at the farand over-processed, over-salted thest of either number, we tend and over-sugared foods, our bod- to experience a drastic drop in appetite. Can we learn from this information and will it help us develop a healthy and satisfying food plan? Yes.

The problems with having an over-developed salt habit or sweet tooth is not caused by some unknown disease, nor uncontrollable process within our systems. We can control both of these taste cravings by limiting the amount of salt and refined sugar we ingest.

The following are some guidelines that may help you gain control of your taste buds.

1) Eat more fresh fruits, vegetables and grains in their most natural state.

2) Choose fiber-rich foods that have to be chewed, not inhaled. They will give you a better sense of feeling full and satisfied, plus you will have a longer-lasting, visual picture of eating (these

foods can't be gulped). 3) Before you buy, invest a few extra minutes to read the ingredients on the package. What is the salt content of this particular brand? What is the sugar content? Beware of the words ending in "ose." They are just substitute words for sugar.

4) Limit your intake of artificial sweetners. The tongue is still getting the message that

5) Experiment in your cooking by using more natural herbs and spices. You may surprise yourself with how much fun this can be, plus you are waking up those sleeping taste buds.

6) As you work through changing your dependency on salt or over-sweet foods, when a craving hits, give yourself 20 minutes. During this time, you could go for a quick walk, do some stretching or practice a yoga ex-

With good practice you can retrain your body's responses. You can enjoy good health, good food and good taste.

# Some background on cholesterol

You can't see it or feel it. You don't feel sick, yet, slowly but surely it will sneak up on you and before you know it your "plumbing is clogged." Clogging could result in heart attack or stroke.

What is cholesterol?

When you eat fatty foods they are absored by the digestive system and delivered to the liver for processing. Fatty substances

can't travel through the body alone, as the blood's major ingredient is water. For this reason, the liver produces cholesterol to carry such fats through the blood vessels. The liver combines this absorbed fat to cholesterol and protein is manufactured to form what is called "lipo proteins."

There are three types of lipo proteins:

1) The very low density lipo proteins (VLDL). 2) The low density lipo prote-

ins (LDL) 3) The high density lipo prote-

The VLDL carries the fats from the liver to the rest of the body. Once this fat is unloaded, VLDL becomes LDL, or "bad cholesterol." This is because it sticks to the anterior wall. HDL, or "good cholesterol" protects the arteries by linking to LDL and bringing it back to the liver for recycling and reprocessing. So, for your protection you should lower the VLDL or LDL, while trying to increase the good HDL.

What should your cholesterol level be? Screening for a cholesterol

level has become wide spread: at health fairs, shopping malls, drug stores, work place or

through the doctor's office. Accurate readings are important as results can vary significantly. What is usually measured is the total cholesterol, which is the sum of HDL plus LDL, plus

Right now, if your cholesterol is below 200 milligrams/dl, you are lucky. Try to maintain such levels with good dietary habits and exercise

If your cholesterol is between 200 and 239/dl, you have "borderline high level" and you are at increased risk of cardiovascular disease. If your cholesterol is 240 milligrams/dl or higher, you should see a physician. A complete and detailed fractioning of your lipids into VLDL, HDL and LDL is needed; particularly because such levels could be due to high intake of fat as well as other reasons, such as low thyroid function, diabetes, liver disease, etc.



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
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
