

8 Yanks cross Atlantic (sort of) in 240-pound concrete canoe

What was a nice girl like Eleanor Allen doing in a concrete canoe in a river in Delft, The Netherlands in June?

Leading the first American team ever to compete in the International Concrete Canoe competition, that's what.

In 1970 the University of Illinois held the first concrete canoe race, and ever since engineering schools across the country and the world have joined

the fun.

Allen, 23, a civil engineering student, led the Tufts University team in the eastern regionals, competing against other engineering colleges. While they didn't exactly tear up the course, coming in fifth against 15 schools, Allen had her sights set on bigger fish.

The previous year she had studied in Holland and saw the competition there. In fact, she worked on the canoe from the school she attended. Wouldn't

it be great, she thought, if the Tufts University team could compete in Europe?

"I didn't realize when I got that great idea that it would be so much work," Allen said.

To begin with, the European rules for concrete canoe building are different from the American rules regarding materials.

"Concrete is made from three ingredients — cement, water and an aggregate," Allen said. "It's the aggregate that makes

the difference."

After trying out some 50 different concrete recipes, they finally settled an admixture which used sand as the aggregate. It was poured into a fiberglass mold and reinforced by a fiberglass mesh. It was sanded and any small cracks were filled in with bondo. A shiny black enamel and a red-vinyl decal of the Tasmanian Devil completed the canoe.

When finished, the Transatlantic Devil (as the canoe was

called) weighed 240 pounds, took 91 hours of testing and re-testing and cost \$1,030.

"The challenge in this isn't to make the canoe float, that's relatively easy," Allen said. "The challenge is keeping it together for the whole day. They tend to split and crack."

Archimedes' principle says anything will float as long as the volume of the object is equal to its displacement of water.

While they were building the

canoe, they were also trying to raise the \$13,000 the eight-day trip to The Netherlands would cost the eight-person team. The completed canoe displayed the logos of several local companies which donated money to the project.

In Delft, where the European competition was held as part of the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Technical Uni-

Woods council: Detach downspouts

Grosse Pointe Woods residents take note: Your home's downspouts must be disconnected from the storm sewer by next July, according to an ordinance that was recently adopted by the city council.

Residents may ask the city for an exemption from the ordinance if they can prove that the disconnection would cause damage to their property or a neighbor's property.

Phil Belcher, Woods acting city administrator, said the city doesn't know how many homes and businesses in the Woods have downspouts that are connected to the sewer, but it's going to find out.

He said the city will be mailing postcards to residents, notifying them of the ordinance, and telling them how they can apply for an exemption.

Starting this summer, member of the Woods department of public works will be going door to door, inspecting downspouts, he said.

The ordinance was requested by the Milk River Inter-county Drainage Board. The board said that by disconnecting downspouts from the sewer system, the volume of sewage overflow that is sent into the open Milk River Drain in Grosse Pointe Woods and St. Clair Shores would be reduced by 5 percent to 10 percent a year.

The council was adamantly opposed to the measure at first, but after studying the issue for more than a year, unanimously adopted the ordinance last week.

In spite of protests from the city council, the drain board included the disconnection of downspouts in the plan it submitted to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources last year to clean up and reduce the number of combined sewage overflows in the Milk River.

Belcher said that residents will be responsible for disconnecting their downspouts from the sewer, capping the drain tile and adding a device to redirect the storm water onto their lawns.

The drain tile is a pipe that sticks up one to three inches above ground and connects to the underground sewer.

Most hardware stores sell drain tile caps for about \$3. If water pools around the home's foundation, it can cause damage to the foundation and basement flooding.



Problem: Repeated sidewalk replacement — Solution: Tear 'em up

The residents of Berns Court in Grosse Pointe Woods are fed up with paying for sidewalk repairs and have asked the city

to remove the cement.

Last Monday, the Grosse Pointe Woods City Council authorized the department of public works to grant their request. The sidewalk will be re-

moved as soon as possible, at a cost of \$1,500 to the city, said Woods acting city administrator Philip Belcher. The residents will pay the cost of filling the area with dirt and sod, he said.

"The city would have been responsible for at least \$1,500 of the concrete repairs, so it isn't costing us anything more than what we would have paid," Belcher said.

There are 10 homes on Berns Court. Four have a front walk; six have never had one.

Donald Schneider, one of the residents with a front walk, wrote a letter to Thomas Whitcher, director of public works, on June 12.

In the letter, Schneider said that he had borne the cost of replacing the sidewalk in front of his home in 1964, 1977, 1984 and 1985, and that he had just received a notice from the city saying that he needed to replace 161 square feet of concrete in front of his home, in-

cluding his driveway apron.

He said the sidewalk damage was caused by an elm tree that was planted too close to the walk when the property was subdivided, and that the damage to his driveway apron happened because the street was improperly graded when it was repaved a few years ago.

"The curbing is too high," he wrote. "The grade slants down to the sidewalk which causes pools of water to lie there for days."

Because of those conditions, any new concrete would probably have to be replaced within a few years, he said.

The sidewalk on Berns Court ends in front of his property.

He wrote, "It seems to me that a sidewalk that terminates at the end of my property is useless. The only reason for its existence is to give the snow-plow some additional work."

Schneider got all 10 homeowners on his block to sign a petition to have the sidewalks

removed. The fact that they all signed was a major factor in the council's approval of the project.

But councilman Ted Bidigare asked, "What happens a couple of years from now if someone moves in and decides sidewalks are a good thing? What about the issue of accessibility to handicapped persons?"

Belcher said that the handicapped ramps at the corners would remain, and city attorney George Catlin said, "If anyone moves in and wants a side-

walk, they'll be in the same position as people on North or South Oxford — they just won't have one."

Several streets in Grosse Pointe Woods don't have sidewalks, including North and South Oxford.

Belcher said that before the city would consider a request to remove the sidewalk from a particular block, all of the homeowners in that neighborhood would have to sign a petition, as did the residents on Berns Court.

Tim Danielian of Grosse Pointe Farms is an award-winning television director with WTVS-Channel 56, but some people may remember him for his offbeat acting jobs.





To prevent that from happening, an elbow can be attached to the downspout, so that the water is directed away from the building, preferably onto a lawn or garden area where the water will be absorbed. Also, a resident may wish to use a splash block, placed beneath the downspout opening to prevent a large puddle from forming there.

Also, a roll-up sprinkler can be attached to the inside of the downspout, in addition to or instead of an elbow.

When water flowing through the downspout reaches a certain pressure, it causes the sprinkler to unfold onto the lawn. When the rainstorm is over, the sprinkler can be rolled up and placed inside the downspout again.

Downspout elbows cost about \$2; splash blocks cost up to \$10; and roll-up sprinklers cost between \$1.69 and \$10 at local hardware stores. No special tools are required for installation.

Starting July 1, 1993, Grosse Pointe Woods property owners who don't have an exemption and who are not complying with the ordinance may be ticketed and fined by the city daily, until their downspouts are disconnected from the sewer. Under the ordinance, the city's director of public works can grant exemptions if the disconnection would:

- cause water to discharge onto a driveway or sidewalk, creating a hazardous condition.
- cause water to flow next to

a basement wall, tending to create a basement water problem.

• cause water to discharge across or onto a patio or onto the ground near where children's play equipment is installed.

• cause water to flow directly into an in-ground swimming pool.

• create a flooding problem because of low grade.

• cause water run-off to discharge onto a neighbor's property.

• for any reason which would be deemed impractical to disconnect the downspout.

• for the reason that such disconnection would create an undue hardship.

A Woods resident may appeal a decision made by the director of public works regarding his or his neighbor's downspout by submitting a letter to the city administrator, stating

why the decision should be changed.

The city administrator will decide whether or not the appeal should be granted. If the property owner or neighbor is dissatisfied with the city administrator's decision, he or she can file an appeal with the city council, for which there is a \$50 fee.

Although residents don't have to comply with the ordinance until July 1, 1993, the exemption and appeal process officially goes into effect on Sunday, July 26.

However, Belcher said resident may submit requests for exemptions before then, and that he has already received a few.

Anyone who has questions about the ordinance may call the Grosse Pointe Woods department of public works at 343-2460.

Restaurant proposal tabled

The Grosse Pointe Park City Council wants more information about parking availability before it decides whether or not to allow a gourmet chicken restaurant to open on the corner of Kercheval and Maryland.

The council unanimously voted to table the issue again to give the city administration time to study the claims that existing businesses already have on parking in the area, and to give Sherwood Clifford a chance to produce a lease for the parking spaces he needs.

Clifford owns the corner building, which is divided into two storefronts. Automated Health Systems Inc., a computer company he owns, is located in a portion of the corner storefront, and Cup-a-cino's coffee house (which is owned by someone else) is located in the adjacent storefront.

He wants to keep the computer company where it is, and open a gourmet, rotisserie-style chicken restaurant in the remaining portion of the corner storefront.

His restaurant would also offer Italian foods, and would have dine-in and carry-out service.

However, there is no off-street parking on Clifford's property.

Under the city's zoning ordinance, Clifford needs four off-street parking spaces.

Dale Krajniak, Park city

manager, said initially there was some confusion over the number of parking spaces Clifford needed, but that after a careful review by the city attorney, it was determined Clifford needs four spaces.

The zoning ordinance says that there must be one parking space for every 250 square feet of a restaurant's area, and Clifford's restaurant would have an area of about 1,000 square feet.

There is a grandfather clause, which says a business must only meet 50 percent of the zoning requirement if the same type of business existed in the same building at the time the zoning ordinance was enacted.

Clifford said that the corner storefront did house a restaurant at one time.

However, Krajniak said the grandfather clause doesn't apply because the storefront has been used for offices for many years, and because Clifford would be "intensifying" the use of the storefront.

So, Krajniak said, Clifford either needs to lease four parking spaces from a property owner within 400 feet of his business, or get a parking variance from the council.

Clifford said a nearby business owner has agreed to let him use four parking spaces, but no formal agreement has been signed.

"I could do that, and then I wouldn't have to come before the council," he said. "But I

think you should grant me a variance, so that you'll address the parking problem."


Kercheval business owners also urged council to address the parking problem. They filed a petition asking the city to study the impact the requested variance would have on business owners in the area, and to do more for the business community in general.

In response, Mayor Palmer T. Heenan said that the city has spent \$1.6 million in the last four years to improve the city's commercial properties, including the Mack and Charlevoix streetscapes, the creation of better parking on Mack (at Wayburn) and Jefferson (at Beaconsfield), the beautification of Jefferson, improvements on Kercheval, and property acquisition (currently under way) for parking on Jefferson and Mack.

"We're doing all of this for the business community, from which we get about \$200,000 a year in taxes. The rest of our tax money (about \$4.5 million this year) comes from our residents," Heenan said.

"This council wants to help you (Clifford), but I think you first have to help yourself, and get a lease for some parking spaces. You can't lay it all on us. We've made some sacrifices; now it's your turn."

The issue, which had also been tabled June 22, will come before the council again, on a yet-to-be-determined date.

Farms officers get new 3-year contract

The Grosse Pointe Farms City Council on Monday approved a new three-year contract for its public safety officers.

Included is a 4 percent pay increase for each of the three years of the contract and several cost-saving measures designed to streamline the department.

The city will combine the duties of police chief and fire chief into one position to be called deputy director of public safety.

"Eventually, upon retirement, we will transition out the fire chief job and instead of having a director of public safety and a police chief and a fire chief we will just have a director and a deputy director," said city manager Rich Solak.

Also, the public safety officer/dog warden position currently filled by a public safety officer will be filled by a civilian, Solak said, and will have parking enforcement added to his or her duties. That will save the city approximately \$22,000 a year and free-up a public safety officer to do what he was trained to do.

In addition the union agreed


to allow the city to privatize its ambulance service, which the city did late last year.

The new contract puts the Farms in the middle of the salary scale for Pointe public safety officers. This year, the average Farms PSO will make \$39,154. That's higher than the

City, which will pay its officers \$38,906, but it's less than the Woods and the Shores which pay their officers \$39,345 and \$39,650 respectively. No figures were available for the Park.

The contract is retroactive to July 1, 1991, when the last contract expired.

In the moo-d for ice cream? This is the month!

Just when you thought July was safe from being memorialized as one of those "national" something months, usually paying tribute to things we never, ever, wanted to know about (National Turnip Month; National Head Lice Appreciation Month) you're wrong.

But don't have a cow, man! Have a Black Cow instead! (That's a root beer float, for you ice cream amateurs or those without an ice cream trivia book.) Because July is the utterly delicious National Ice Cream Month and this SUN-DAE (sorry it seemed like ice-screamed that) is National Ice Cream Day.

Ever wonder how the sundae was invented and why it's spelled with an "e" at the end instead of a "y"?

Because religious leaders in the 1890s criticized the consumption of sinfully rich ice cream sodas (just 20 years after their invention) on Sunday. Merchants decided to leave the carbonated water out, and invented the sundae, changing the spelling to remove any connection to the sabbath.

Today, more ice cream is consumed on Sunday than on any other day of the week.

Ice cream is one of the few foods in our diet-crazed society where connoisseurs actually seek out brands with higher butterfat (and usually a higher price) because the taste is so much richer.

The Davis Dairy makes Ashby's Sterling Ice Cream in Burton and distributes the brand throughout Michigan and five other states. One of its more famous flavors is called Mackinac Island Fudge.

Michigan produces 40 million gallons of ice cream a year, using about 450 million pounds of milk or 10 percent of the state's supply, and ranks No. 9 nationally in ice cream production.

This Sunday, various area businesses will give free ice cream samples with a purchase from their stores. Merit Woods Pharmacy owner Sheldon Weisberg has erected a smaller-than-life-size Elsie the Cow to promote National Ice Cream Month.

Merit Woods goes through so much milk and ice cream every week, Davis said, that his company makes daily dairy deliveries to the store.

"It's unheard of in this day and age," Davis said. "But this place is a dairy gold mine. It's the busiest store, for us, in the state."

Davis, a Grosse Pointe

Farms resident whose family has been in the dairy business since 1946, has his company's customers decide at a taste testing session, held in the dead of winter, which ice cream flavors they want for the upcoming year.

Some new ice cream flavors are O-O-Oreo, Raspberry Chip Cheesecake, Chocolate Chip Cookie Dough and Elephant Tracks, a white chocolate ice cream with chocolate peanut butter cups and a fudge swirl throughout.

Humans aren't the only ones celebrating the month of dairy delights.

Elsie, the real Borden cow, and her son, Beauregard, are on tour.

"Borden actually has two Elsie's. One covers the West Coast and one the East Coast. They take them from city to city and to hospitals, where they set up barnyard scenes for the kids. And they treat those cows like gold. You should see what they travel in," Davis said.

They travel in a "Cow-dillac." Really.

"Those cows have more miles than either of us will ever have," Davis said.



Democratic baby boomers take on GOP

Even before they arrived in New York, delegates to the Democratic National Convention that winds up tonight got the electrifying news that Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas had chosen Sen. Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee as his running mate.

With that Southern ticket, the Democrats are making a daring challenge to the Republicans who have been counting the South as their strongest base but who now must face not one but two excellent campaigners who are themselves natives of the South.

As the convention opened, Democrats got a second exhilarating boost when a new national public opinion poll found the three presidential candidates in practically a dead heat with less than four months left in the campaign.

The Democrats are going on the attack with two baby boomers, Clinton at 46 and Gore at 44, who will be running against a senior citizen president who just reached 68 and an independent, Ross Perot, who also has passed 60.

True, George Bush is long on government experience but he also appears to be long in the tooth to younger voters. He has been a visible member of the Washington establishment for more than 20 years and in office as vice president and president for almost 12.

The GOP vice president, Dan Quayle,

at 45, compares favorably in age with the Democrats but many political observers contend he lacks standing except among his admirers on the far right. A new poll indicates the public rates him far lower than Gore in presidential capabilities.

Gore in his acceptance statement emphasized the Democratic strategy, calling

for "a new generation of leadership for the United States of America."

Clinton and Gore also are moderates who will appeal to the people in the middle who traditionally are the source of most presidential votes. They will stress such middle class issues as education and family values that appeal to the suburbs

Is sleaze out of '92 campaign?

President George Bush has rejected the use of political sleaze in his 1992 campaign advertising and has even denounced the producer of one of his worst political commercials of 1988 for starting up again.

But so long as the president can't control all of his supporters, there's still the likelihood that we will see and hear again ads like the Willie Horton commercial that attacked Democratic nominee Michael Dukakis four years ago.

The Detroit News, in the GOP corner as usual, has already begun the name calling. It said Gov. Bill Clinton has nominated "Chicken Little" for vice-president, because of Sen. Al Gore's frequent warnings about threats to the environment and identified the senator as a "liberal ideologue."

The Detroit Free Press, however, approved of both men as "moderate Southerners" and said the ticket "appears to make great sense, both politically and in promising sound public policy."

The New York Times said Gore "has earned respect for his incisive work on foreign policy, arms control and the environment" and The Christian Science Monitor credited Clinton with his first truly "presidential" decision in making the "solid choice" of Gore.

As the campaign moves into high gear after the conventions, we suspect both parties will ignore the president's pledge and will do what they think they have to do to win — and that won't necessarily mean they will follow the Marquis of Queensberry's rules.

where nearly half the U.S. population now lives.

If elected, Clinton and Gore would be the youngest presidential team in history. The Democrats will emphasize their vigor and vision of the future. On the other hand, the GOP sees Bush's experience as a valuable offset to the Democrats' youth.

The parties differ on the reasons for Bush's current low standing in the polls. The GOP blames it on the economy which the president insists is now improving. The Democrats contend Bush is simply not in close touch with today's issues or even with the need for change.

One of those new issues is abortion. Bush has moved from his more moderate position in 1980 to a strong pro-life viewpoint in 1992 while both the Democratic leaders as well as Perot are pro-choice. The president already has been lagging in his support among women as well as among older voters.

True, an incumbent president possesses many advantages. He has the federal bureaucracy at his command. He can use the federal agencies to spread the bread around. He is supported by administration officials, leaders of major businesses and defense industries, and many other beneficiaries of federal largesse. And he still has strong support among many traditional Republicans.

But can Bush answer the appeal for change that the young Democrats already are directing at the country? To date, his attempt to describe himself as the agent of change is implausible, given his 12-year record in defense of the status quo.

An interesting three-man campaign suddenly has become more exciting with the naming of another baby-boomer as Clinton's running mate.

A view from the sidelines

Arnold (Eric) Severeid was one of that host of young people who during the depression deserted their native Dakota prairies for Minneapolis before being drawn to the bright lights of Washington and the wider world.

Like some of the others, Severeid, who died last week at 79, left a permanent mark even though he retired as a CBS commentator back in 1977 and since had only intermittently appeared in print or on the tube that gave him fame.

His voice survives, of course. After his death, Channel 56 continued to run a film in which he narrated an account of the treatment of minorities in World War II.

"Severeid's commentaries inevitably read as well as they sound," I wrote in a Detroit News tribute on his retirement. "In fact, they often read better than they sound because a reader has more time than a listener does to digest and appreciate what he said."

When I was a student at the University of Minnesota in the early 1930s, Severeid was a colleague on the Minnesota Daily and a fellow member of Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalism fraternity.

He was quiet, serious and achieved modest campus fame as one of the leaders of the student groups opposed to compulsory military training which at that time was required of all male students for two years.

In his junior year, it was Severeid who covered and wrote the story about the board of regents, on the June morning of

graduation day for the class of 1934, reversing its stand and approving voluntary military training.

That special edition of the Daily, distributed that night as my class graduated, reported a sweet victory for Severeid and the other Daily editors who had argued that the military training requirement was a waste of money and manpower.

Yet Severeid later had the courage to admit error on the issue in "Not So Wild a Dream," which columnist George Will calls "the best non-fiction book to come out of World War II."

Severeid conceded that he and his colleagues, influenced by the intellectual revulsion of those times against World War I, had helped to mislead the American people and, however minutely, to encourage Hitler by their campaign against military preparedness.

As I wrote in that Detroit News tribute, "That realization led to Severeid's conclusion: 'Lessons of the past have greater power over the mind than any forecast of the future, even if the lessons are conceived in error.'"

Yet Severeid's participation in that campus campaign cost him the opportunity to become editor of the Daily in his senior year. The university establishment turned thumbs down on his application and approved the appointment of a less qualified man.

It was, however, only a small disappointment in the career of a journalist of great distinction.

Tax hikes for county, WCCC?

Grosse Pointe and other Wayne County voters on primary day, Aug. 4, will face two new requests to hike Wayne County taxes by another 1.5 mills, but we have questions about both of them.

Wayne County Community College in seeking a one-mill operating levy is making another in its many appeals to voters to put the college on a sound fiscal basis.

The other request is for one-half mill to finance Wayne County's health services for the poor. The vote was requested by a recent vote of the Wayne County Commission by a 10 to 0 margin.

1st District Commissioner David Cavanaugh, who represents the Pointes but is seeking to advance to the county clerk's job in this year's election, was one of the 10 voting for the half-mill levy, according to commission records, with the other five not voting.

In these times, we are not happy with either request.

Wayne County Community College has


had a history of mismanagement both from the fiscal and the education points of view. That record played a major role in the defeat of previous funding requests.

Despite the improvements made by WCCC President Rafael Cortada, we think the Legislature, which has been phasing out its support, ought to consider closing the college and transferring its best programs to Wayne State University.

As for the county board's request, there is little doubt the county's heavy public health and mental health burdens are not being fully met.

However, this proposal seems to shift to county residents more of the burden the state ought to bear. And even County Executive Ed McNamara opposes the proposal on the grounds it's not well thought-out.

At this time, we can't support either proposal for another tax hike without genuine evidence of both need and improved management.

Besides informing you, my job is to make you think and, if you become incensed about something you read, move you to act and effect change.

Sometimes I hear people say they don't read newspapers anymore because there's nothing but bad news in them anyway. Well, those people are better off with their heads buried in the ground, so when someone shoots them in the rear, they won't know it's coming.



Now it's summer.

Making straw while the sun shines

Every year media experts get together and, after due rumination, announce the major untold stories of the year. Stories about important events that, because their content was unwelcome or too arcane, didn't get into the nation's press, or died after a minor airing.

Often the stories are political. This year they included things like the October Surprise story (which actually did receive enough ink that people know what it is), the news that the federal tax laws are the underlying cause of the growing gap between rich and poor, and the civilian devastation of Iraq during the Gulf War.

Underreported stories are of concern both to the public and to journalism professionals, because it is increasingly obvious that a large percentage of the country gets its information entirely from the mainstream media, especially television.

The problem is that the press operates in a pack, all howling after the same story. As a result, the breaking of unpopular or complicated news is left to specialty news outlets. And those outlets aren't read in large numbers.

An example of the journalistic pack baying down a possibly false trail surfaced just last week in an analysis of June's nationwide rail strike. The mainstream media treated it as a strike and an economic disaster narrowly averted by definitive congressional action. According to columnist Alexander Cockburn, however, it was not a strike at all, but a lockout — and the result of employer manipulation of the legislated negotiating system. His view is that the economic disaster was cynically created by employers

in order to involve Congress.

Clearly, from my less-than-vantage point here in Michigan suburbia, with no direct connection to a train since I last took one for a Montreal weekend, I don't know the truth about the railroad labor action. But Cockburn poured on enough details to raise doubts and questions about the interpretation of it as a strike.

The point that Cockburn was making is that there probably wasn't enough journalistic digging, that journalists wear societal blinders, that they are too willing to accept the company or government line, and that sometimes they aren't educated or perceptive enough to discern the minutia and follow them to a logical (if unwelcome) conclusion.

Journalists are just regular people; the problem is that their imperfect perceptions rub off on an entire nation.

Every reporter should have enough general information floating around in his or her head to recognize when things don't smell right. It's the reporter's job, after all, to ask questions and go beyond press releases.

When a reporter fails to ask questions, the results can be pretty disquieting. One of my personal favorite misleading statements was printed in Time magazine, which called the

Macomb County village of New Haven a typical suburb of Detroit. It isn't an earthshattering mistake, but the small stuff adds up and sets a tone. And if you base a sociological premise about Michigan's future on a shaky idea like that (as Time did), you can end up fairly far afield.

Two similar small examples, also just last week:

My local paper reported that work on sewer separation in town was nearly completed and that concrete roads and curbs would be done by fall. Sounds good.

Red flag: Currently our town has asphalt streets, no curbs, a tight budget, high taxes, and a grumbling electorate. Is it really true that the council chose the very expensive concrete upgrade?

No. A little digging (on my part) revealed that the local paper just had it wrong — nobody on the staff stopped to consider the implications of concrete, so they never checked it out.

Or this: One of Detroit's papers had a little filler story about a drought in Germany. Trucks are now conveying straw to hungry cattle in the area.

"What the hell do they want with straw?" objected my helpmeet. "Do they want to make sure the cows rest comfortably while they starve to death?"

The story suggests several possibilities:

- German scientists have discovered hitherto unknown nutritional value in straw (and not shared the secret with the world's starving millions);
- Germans are dumber than we thought and haven't yet found out that straw has no

nutritional value (in which case we probably don't need to worry so much about economic competition);

- Neither the reporter nor the copy editor knows beans about straw and didn't bother to wonder if they really meant hay.

Without checking it out (hey, I'm a journalist), I favor the third answer.

OK, there are untold stories everywhere and I am doubtless as guilty as the next guy. Let's see . . . underreported stories in the Pointes? How about a story about various underground movements to secede from Wayne County? That's one I've heard from several sources but can't get anyone to own up to. But even northern Macomb has been hearing about it for more than a year.

I'd better quit while I'm ahead. The last time I wrote on this subject, one of my fans urged me to take on the medical establishment.

Yikes.

Ask Bob about his career in education and he won't have much good to say about the politics and red tape after he became a principal. But he loved his classroom years in Grosse Pointe.

There's no satisfaction like seeing old students succeed — and he's as puffed up as a mother hen over Wendy Ewald's MacArthur "genius" grant, reported two weeks ago. His autographed copy of her "Portraits and Dreams" means more to him than his gold watch.

They've come a long way, baby

Men of the '90s are reaching out and touching more often than their fathers and grandfathers did.

So says a recent study on phone calling habits conducted by Michigan Bell and four other Ameritech Bell companies.

Men under age 30 in Michigan make twice as many personal calls as men over age 30, according to the survey.

And 43 percent of the calls made by men under 30 were to "keep in touch."

For men over 30, only 33 per-

cent of their calls were of the keep-in-touch variety.

The conclusion, said Michael Robinson, director of research and strategic planning for Tatham/RSCG, the company that conducted the study, is that over-30s men use the phone for different reasons than under-30s.

Robinson concluded that younger men have grown up in a society where boundaries between men and women are less distinct. They're more into "experiencing life" than their fathers were. They'd rather use a sunset than put a deal together.

The phone fills an emotional vacuum in today's more isolated society, he said.

Maybe these guys just have more phones. And more instant access to phones, like the cellular ones they carry around in their cars and briefcases.

They're reaching out and touching while they're wobbling between expressway lanes, careening around corners and sliding through stop signs.



Riley: Drug penalties not for high court to decide

When the Michigan Supreme Court struck down as unconstitutional the state's mandatory life-without-parole penalty for drug possession, the nation's toughest, it was a close vote.

The 4-3 decision made anyone convicted of possessing 650 grams, about a pound and a half, or more of drugs eligible for parole in 10 years.

But because the ruling only addressed the possession portion of the law, and not the intent to deliver or conspiracy portions, only about 30 of the 160 inmates sentenced under that law would be eligible for parole, and no one is eligible before October 1996.

Dissenting was Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, of Grosse Pointe Farms, who said even if the court disagreed with the law imposing life imprisonment without parole for drug dealers, the same penalty that is given for first-degree murder, it was not within the court's power "to correct the perceived injustice by judicially legislating a socially or politically desirable result."

"I took the position that the law was very clear. We had no business circumventing the law of the state of Michigan," said Riley.

"I view it as nothing more than an attempt to substitute a judicial policy choice for the policy choice already made by our Legislature."

The majority held that the penalty violated the Michigan Constitution's law against "cruel or unusual" punishment and that "no other state imposes a penalty even remotely

as severe."

Riley disagreed with the premises on which the majority based their decision which, she said, viewed Michigan's Constitution as an independent source of rights, superseding and broader in scope than the Eighth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, which prohibits cruel and unusual punishment on the federal level.

According to Riley, the majority viewed Michigan's Constitution as being broader in scope than the U.S. Constitution because of a case decided by the the U.S. Supreme Court last year.

The case also challenged Michigan's mandatory minimum of life imprisonment with no parole for drug possession of 650 grams or more, and the Supreme Court rejected the challenge as not being "cruel and unusual" punishment under the Eighth Amendment.

She also disagreed that "proportionality," which compares the harshness of the penalty with the gravity of the offense and the sentence imposed with sentences for both the same and different crimes in and outside of the jurisdiction, was an element of Michigan's "cruel or unusual" punishment prohibition.

"... the 'cruel or unusual punishment' clause was intended to prohibit inhumane and barbarous treatment of the criminally convicted, and does not have a proportionality component," Riley wrote.

But, Riley noted, since the Legislature adopted the penalty as law in 1978 it should have been the one to recall or amend it, which it had already done to

portions of the law, dealing with lesser drug amounts, in 1988 and which it amended back to the original mandatory minimum levels in 1989.

"It makes it very clear that they could act if they were so moved," she said. "As a matter of fact, there were bills in the Legislature addressing the very issue."

She supported her dissent by citing several cases which set the limits of legislative power as "defined by our federal and state constitutions, not by the sentiment of the judiciary," and said no matter how "undesirable, unfair, unjust or inhumane" a legislative decision appears to be, "it does not of itself empower a court to override the Legislature and substitute its own solution."

But state Rep. William Bryant Jr., R-Grosse Pointe Farms, one of three legislators who sponsored bills which would allow judges to impose lesser sentences, disagrees.

"The court's job is to decide what's constitutional. It's peculiarly and solely the province of the court to say to the governor and the Legislature 'you can't do that, that's unconstitutional,'" Bryant said.

"My bill does about the minimum that can be done. It installs into the statute some limited discretion that sentencing courts have under the lesser amount categories. If the court finds on the record 'substantial and compelling reasons' to depart from the mandatory minimum sentence and impose a lesser amount, they can," he said.

"I'm pleased to see the court

finding the penalties we had were not constitutional," Bryant said.

"Large discretion was given to prosecutors' offices and they clearly abused that law. The clear intent of the law was that it was to be used against drug kingpins. Prosecutors have admitted that they've used it against people they knew shouldn't have been charged with it but that they could use them to catch bigger drug dealers."

He pointed out that between 1978, when the law went into effect, and 1988, there were 18 convictions and by 1992, there were 160 convictions.

Bryant labeled Oakland County prosecutor Richard Thompson, who called the ruling "another example" of the court substituting its own policy for that of the people's elected representatives, "an idiot and totally wrong" and "a demagogue who rants and raves about things."

"As opposed to someone like (Macomb County prosecutor) Carl Marlinga, who also takes a hard line on crime in the metro Detroit area but realizes that the discretion didn't belong behind closed doors but out in open court," he said.

"Criminal conspiracy to commit murder is parolable in this state but criminal conspiracy state but criminal conspiracy with drug charges is not."

Under existing state law, there is a mandatory minimum sentence of 20 years with no parole for possessing 225 to 649 grams of drugs.

"We have to go back to the statutes and work on the 225 to 650 grams and also make this apply to the intent to deliver and conspiracy charges," Bryant said.

Riley said she believes many state lawmakers disagree with the state's current drug laws but have been afraid to deal with them because they're "political hot potatoes" for politicians who don't want to be perceived as being soft on crime and drugs.

"I know it's an old saw, but it's very true: bad cases make bad law. Lawmakers want to say they're for law and order, but they want someone else to change the law," Riley said.

Though Riley disagrees with the court overturning the life

without parole penalty, it's not because of her personal beliefs.

"What I personally believe is that it's a mistake to remove the discretion from the judges. That's their job and that's their right," she said.

"But I recognize the legislative branch has the right to determine penalties — that the people have that right, and once they do that, the judicial branch has to respect that."

"The judicial branch must never use their power over the Legislature. My job as a justice is never to make the law, even if I don't agree with it, but to interpret it."

"Because you think differently about something or it's something against your philosophy is no reason to dissent."

But, she said, justices have no discretion in that regard so they should remember what their function is.

"We don't represent the people," she said. "We serve the people."

"If the question is whether punishment meets the 'evolving standards of decency,' the answer must come from the democratically elected representatives of the people: the Legislature."




Grosse Pointe Park's 16th annual Fourth of July parade was again a big success.

Park has new city clerk; 2 raises OK'd

Grosse Pointe Park city manager Dale Krajniak has given up one of his "hats" — that of city clerk — to Jane Blahut of Chesterfield Township.

Blahut has been the Park's deputy city clerk for 12 years, and was appointed treasurer of the city in 1989.

Krajniak had been serving as both city manager and city clerk.

He told the council on Monday that for the past two years, Blahut has "really done the job of city clerk, but I have the title. I'd like to see her get the

title she deserves."

The council unanimously voted to transfer the title of city clerk from Krajniak to Blahut, but did not raise her salary.

It did, however, increase the salaries of Krajniak and the city comptroller, Peter M. Dobrzeński, following an annual review by the city's personnel committee, which consists of Mayor Palmer T. Heenan, Mayor Pro Tem Vernon K. Ausherman, and councilwoman Valerie C. Moran.

Krajniak's annual salary was

raised 3.2 percent, from \$63,000 to \$65,000.

Dobrzeński's annual salary was raised 7.4 percent, from \$48,400 to \$52,000.

Ausherman said the raises are higher than those being offered to people in similar positions in the other Grosse Pointes this year, but admitted that the council has "lagged behind other communities" when it comes to raising salaries.

The increases are retroactive to July 1.

Woods creates building authority

A mechanism that could help Grosse Pointe Woods alleviate its parking problem has been set up by the city council.

Last Monday, the council unanimously voted to establish a building authority.

A city-owned corporation, the authority will have the power to acquire, furnish, equip, own, improve, enlarge, operate and maintain buildings, parking lots/structures and other property for "any legitimate public purpose of the city of Grosse Pointe Woods," according to the authority's articles of incorporation.

"It's another vehicle we have for making improvements to the city, and it may be helpful in the future," said Philip H. Belcher, Woods acting city administrator.

He said the city has no specific projects lined up, but that the acquisition of property for more parking along Mack "is one of the things we will be looking into."

All property acquired by the building authority will be leased to the city for no more than 50 years, and the city will own the property when the lease ends. The property will be exempt from state and local taxes for as long as the authority or the city owns it, Belcher said.

Also, the authority will have the power to sue and it can be sued.

The authority will consist of three commissioners (one from the city administration, one from the business community and one from one of the city's various commissions) who will be appointed by the city council and serve three-year terms.

However, the initial terms will be shorter for two of the first three commissioners appointed.

One of them will serve a one-year term and the other will serve for two years.

City council members cannot be members of the authority.

The idea for the building authority came out of the Mayor's Mack Avenue Business Study Committee, which includes representatives from the city council, the planning commission and the business community.

As part of its motion to incorporate the building authority, the council directed the Mack Avenue committee to make recommendations regarding who should be appointed to the authority and what projects should be pursued.

Other local communities, such as Grosse Pointe Park, have building authorities, and Woods councilwoman Jean Rice said, "I think this is long overdue. I commend the Mayor's Mack Avenue Business Study Committee for taking this step, and I think it is a proper one."





Re-designed (and bigger) Cadillac struts stuff up north

A tough, dirty job — someone has to do it, was the message between the lines of the invitation. Paraphrased, the brief business letter said, please come up to the Traverse City area the last two days in June. We'll provide a couple of simple meals, a clean place to sleep and an opportunity to drive the '93 Fleetwood and talk with Cadillac staff and other auto writers.

The view of the East Bay from a sixth-floor balcony of the tower at the Grand Traverse Resort is lovely. So's the vista from the Trillium at the top of the 17-story glass-and-steel structure. The room had a clean bed with windows on two sides, a wee fridge and sink, tasteful overstuffed furniture, a bathroom with jacuzzi, telephone, television and wall-mounted hair dryer.

There are no adjectives suitable for describing the cheese-cake on a candy crust served by handsome young waiters in a small private dining room in the Trillium.

The tough, dirty job began on a Monday evening with a 7 p.m. press conference. We auto-writer types were nearly outnumbered in the private suite with bar by Cadillac staff, some of whom had been on the T.C. scene for over a week. Ours was one of a few two-day mini-conferences following the prestigious long-lead preview for big shooters from the buff books.

These guys — they are mostly men — claim that because their publications are monthlies and because their circulation numbers are well into six-figures (and so, undoubtedly, are their ad prices), they require special treatment. They need to drive the new vehicles and talk with appropriate staff two or three months before anyone else wearing a press badge can be allowed to stray within 10 feet of the product.

Actually, these slaves of the written word are feted early because they are very slow

writers who have an awful time meeting their deadlines and seldom know which country they're in when they wake up mornings. Now THAT'S a tough, dirty job.

The '93 Cadillac Fleetwood, a full-frame, full-size rear-drive sedan assembled in Arlington, Texas, debuted for photographers a couple of months ago at the New York auto show. Our ride-and-drive event in Acme and up around the Leelanau Peninsula was among the first opportunities civilians have had to drive the re-designed luxury car. In fact, the vehicles we used were the first official vehicles off the Texas line.

The new Fleetwood is wider and longer and heavier than its predecessor, and will probably be a little more expensive as well. Prices are not yet available. But listening to the Cadillac engineering, design and marketing people and then driving perhaps 100 miles with them gives good insight into other aspects of the vehicle.

Here are some of the things a dealership salesperson might point out. The '93 Fleetwood has:

- an oversize airbag on front passenger side

- Traction Control (the flip side of ABS brakes)
- 5.7-liter engine is rated 16 mpg city/25 mpg highway
- good seatbelt design; bowed B-pillar adds space
- cupholders for front-seat passengers
- firmer suspension and split-frame seats for comfort
- trailer towing up to 7,000 pounds — highest for any passenger car in world
- rear seat heating improved (directed from instrument panel)
- torque management similar to that in Corvette
- Fleetwood meets mandated 1997 federal standards for side impact
- greatly improved aerodynamics (to 0.36 from 0.49 in 1992)

platinum-tip spark plugs good for 100,000 miles

- Master Coachbuilder "package" readily available for limo builders

"We're very excited about the new Master Coachbuilder concept for converters," said David Clark, manager, specialty and commercial vehicles. "It will answer most of the questions that arise in limousine production. We want all limousines built on the '93 Fleetwood to be as good as they can be. After all, our name is on each car."

Master Coachbuilders completes an assessment summary and prepares the site visits of

their facilities. Cadillac looks for specific design and manufacturing processes, for quality control assurances, for customer satisfaction feedback and for a strong commitment to quality. Those who qualify must renew annually.

Clark said the limousine market is very important to Cadillac. Not only has the Lincoln Town Car, re-designed for 1990, been eating from Cadillac's plate in the luxury sedan market, it has been stealing sales from Cadillac's share of the limo conversion segment as well.

A couple of Town Cars were in our test fleet and there was a distinct difference between their ride and handling and that of the new Fleetwood. Project engineer Greg Payne explained that Cadillac had decided to get away from the softer ride and effortless handling that has been associated with American luxury cars for many years.

The Town Car was so easy to steer and there was so little feedback from the road that it actually took more driver tension to keep it on track. The Lincoln didn't have the pronounced rake of Fleetwood's new windshield — part of the reason for its improved coefficient of drag — so while it may not be a "slippery," it also doesn't have the large horizontal area atop the instrument panel.

As for instrumentation, Cadillac has moved toward a simple layout of buttons which are easy to reach and easy to read. They are larger than the Lincoln buttons and slightly more accessible. And Cadillac provides cupholders for front-seat passengers in the center arm rest; Lincoln had none that we could find, and of course we drove the Town Car after a break at which we decided to bring a cup of coffee into the car.

Now cupholders do not a sale make, but they deserve serious consideration from anyone who

likes to imbibe en route and feels foolish holding a paper cup between the teeth during conditions requiring both hands on the steering wheel.


Our Tuesday ride and drive involved seven vehicles, about 16 people, perfect weather, the Leelanau Peninsula and almost a half-dozen stops during which we changed cars, grabbed coffee, met new people and were thoroughly glad not to be in the office.

There was talk about the need to import cherries for the upcoming Cherry Festival. A local gentleman, observing our first stop at the picturesque pier in Leland, said June's cool, wet weather was killing the tourist business. And the usually busy dock was very quiet that morning, with only a few cars and a camp bus in the lot.

We pushed on to the Sleeping Bear Dunes, where park attendants tried to persuade the Cadillac folks to leave a car with them for evaluation. There was a funeral at the Catholic church in Empire. Crystal Lake was looking good; we had no time for a side trip to Gwen Frostic's studio. A well-worn old white Cadillac hearse sat beside the filling station in Honor that would be our last switching point. The Carmine Red Fleetwood we shared with Greg Payne on the final log of the journey had a gremlin, he said.

The car, driven up from the plant in Arlington, had somehow managed to get some 15,000 miles on its odometer. And when acceleration was needed for passing, it often didn't happen. He blamed intermittent electronic spooks, admitting he wasn't too keen on a red exterior and matching interior.

Fleetwood and Fleetwood Brougham are the two rear-drive Cadillacs for 1993. The division's front-drive former Fleetwood sedan and coupe will now be called Six Special sedan and coupe, Cadillac says.




1993 Cadillac Fleetwood Brougham




Auto writers and Cadillac staff make final Fleetwood ride-and-drive switches.

So he took a week off from the odd jobs he was doing and flew to Palm Beach, where he rented a car and stayed at the apartment of his friend, "Eggs" Blinder. (Danielian, who is notorious for giving people nicknames, started calling Blinder "Eggs" when they played football together in school, but he said he doesn't remember why.) During his vacation, Danielian made the rounds of television stations in Tampa, which was also a fairly big market. Toward the end of the week, Blinder saw an ABC affiliate truck in West Palm Beach. He told the driver he had a friend who was looking for a job, and got the name of a person for Danielian to contact. The contact person told Danielian that there were no jobs available at his station, but

A member of WPTV's advertising staff, aware that Danielian was creative, asked him to develop a character that would epitomize the swap-n-shops that a client held at drive-ins in the area. Danielian came up with the "Big Swapper." Later, when WPTV began its late-night "Mystery Theater," the producer asked the art department to come up with some graphics for the opening of the show. Danielian and other members of the technical crew decided to go a few steps further, and on their own time, created a set, costumes, a script, and videotaped a segment to open each movie. In the segment, Danielian played a detective. The segments became a regular feature, and the behind-the-

really liked it, because I'm a news hound," he said. In September 1983, he joined WTVS-Channel 56 as a producer-director and moved back to Michigan. For the past three years, he has won the Emmy for studio directing from the Detroit chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, which covers the entire state of Michigan. In all, he has four Emmys at home, including one he won five years ago for studio directing. Winning "is great," he said. "It's really nice because the entries are judged by people who aren't in Michigan. I think Detroit's entries are judged by directors in New York, so there is no familiarity there." This year, he competed against himself in the studio directing category. He was nominated for two projects he worked on: "Class of '95," and "City for Youth."

Both programs involved panels of teenagers, were shot in a studio with multiple cameras, and were "live on tape," meaning little editing was done to the videotapes before they were broadcast. "Class of '95" is a series of programs that tracks the progress of students from schools in the greater Detroit area who are scheduled to receive their high school diplomas in 1995. The series is being co-produced by WTVS-TV 56 and WJBK-TV 2. In "City for Youth," another program produced by WTVS, Detroit youths watched a half-hour documentary and then, for an hour and a half, discussed issues raised in the documentary that were important to them. That program was broadcast last October. Danielian won the Emmy for studio directing this year for "Class of '95." He directs most of WTVS' "live on tape" programs, and is a segment director for the station's teen show, "Club Connect."

When he's directing something like "Class of '95," Danielian may be working with six cameras, 80 people in a studio audience, a group of panelists, a roving Phil Donohue-type host, and a technical crew, and he has to keep an eye on what everyone is doing. "I have to make sure things go smoothly, and they never do on television," he said. "I have to anticipate mistakes, and head them off at the pass." Danielian met his wife Elaine (who he nicknamed "Enu") at WTVS. She's in the engineering department, and often works a minicam. He said he likes using her as a camera person whenever he has a studio program to produce, because she often knows what he wants before he tells her. "I don't know if it's because we're married, but she has this second sense," he said. Danielian is also a proud father. He has two daughters from a previous marriage, Maureen, 11 (who he nicknamed Boo), and Ashley, 8, (nicknamed Zoo). The children live in Grosse Pointe Woods with their mother, and spend weekends and some vacations with their father and step-mother. "One of the main reasons I live in Grosse Pointe Farms is so that I can be near them and take part in their activities," he said. The girls recently won a poster contest sponsored by the Michigan Humane Society, and paper cutouts they made decorate a wall in Danielian's office. He works amid a clutter of paperwork and toys, such as the green blow-up palm tree that sits on his desk to remind him of his days in Florida, and the white radio with the plastic lips and teeth on the front that move with the music. When he's not working, Danielian likes to play tennis and raquetball, and watch baseball, football and hockey. He said deep down, he'd still like to be the next Soupy Sales, but that he'd be more than satisfied to just keep "making good television."

school in 1966, he attended Eastern Michigan University. "I thought about majoring in engineering, because both my father and brother are engineers, and I thought about accounting, but I didn't want to do those things," Danielian said. He graduated from EMU in 1972 with a bachelor's degree in speech and drama, and expected to land a job at one of Detroit's big television stations. But station managers told him that he would be better off starting in a smaller market. If he started out in Detroit, they said, he would have to join a union and would probably get locked into doing one type of job he wouldn't get the chance to try everything he wanted to, such as acting and directing, he recalled. "I decided that if I had to go into a small market, it might as well be where the weather is warm," he said.

that there were two jobs open at WPTV, an NBC affiliate in West Palm Beach. Danielian interviewed for a cameraman position at WPTV, and stretching the truth a bit, said he was in the process of moving to Florida, and gave Blinder's address as his own. Two weeks later, back in Michigan, Danielian called the station and was told both positions had been filled. Three weeks later, he got a call from Blinder. The production manager from WPTV had called, and said there was another job opening. Danielian called the studio, and was hired over the phone. He got his own apartment in Florida, and was trained to work the camera for the station's 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. newscasts. He had to work the weekends (Wednesdays and Thursdays were his days off), and he only earned \$95 a week, but he had what he wanted: a job in television, and the chance to experiment. At the station, he gained experience in video and sound production, directing and acting.

scenes crew often played pranks on Danielian's detective — once, he got a pie in the face on camera, just like Soupy Sales. Danielian was director of WPTV's noon and 5:30 p.m. newscasts in 1977 when he left to become a "minicam" person at WDIV in Detroit, and moved to Grosse Pointe Woods. "Some of my best memories of that time include covering the Rose Bowl, the Super Bowl, and a five-part series that we shot in Hollywood," he said. Also, he got the chance to do "Double Dip Sundae" and "Saturday Night Dead." He hasn't acted since 1981, when he left WDIV to become a director for the Cable News Network's (CNN's) "Headline News" in Atlanta. "It was probably the most stressful job I've had, but I

Applications must be submitted to the Director of Admissions before Dec. 15. Candidates must arrange to participate in either the College Board Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or American College Testing Assessment (ACT) before or including the December 1992 ACT and SAT test administrations.

Appointments are based on the candidate's high school record, performance on either the SAT or ACT, and leadership potential as demonstrated by participation in high school activities, community affairs and/or part-time employment.

Most successful candidates rank in the top quarter of their high school class and have demonstrated proficiency in both the mathematical and applied science fields.

Candidates must be unmarried at the time of appointment, have no legal obligations resulting from a prior marriage, and must have reached the age of 17 but not 22 by July 1, 1993.

All candidates must be assured of high school graduation by June 30, 1993. They must have completed a minimum of three years of English, and three in mathematics to include algebra and plane or coordinate

geometry or their equivalents, and must fulfill basic physical requirements.

Challenging goals? This is a job for 'elderheroes'

Every group has its heroes and heroines. Certain people are singled out for honors because of their achievements and contributions to society and/or their extraordinary power to sway opinion. The world of science, sport, entertainment, teaching and the professions — all have people who are esteemed as examples of what it is possible to achieve.

At this point in history, when people are living longer, more vigorous lives, many of them are anxious not to waste those precious added years. Later in their lives, they pursue interests or causes that they hope will make a differ-

ence in the world. They have previously been busy earning a living. Now they are ready to pursue goals that were once dreams.

Some people hold back because they think they are too old or haven't the energy or the talent.

What these people need for inspiration are examples of "elderheroes" who have either achieved success in new fields after retirement or have reached their stride in their own field after attempting new personal and social challenges at an age when they could have rested on their laurels.

They're shining examples of men and women who have achieved extraordinary goals and deserve the accolade of "elderheroes" and worthy role models.

One example that comes to mind is Anna Mary Robertson — Grandma Moses — a farm wife, who began painting in her 70s. With no formal training, she produced colorful, simple and carefree scenes of farm life and won recognition for her primitive American art.

Another is Mother Teresa. Even as a teenager, she had a passion for missionary work. She entered a convent and was sent to Calcutta where she taught for more than 20 years at St. Mary's High School, a bastion of privilege.

Older volunteers needed

One of the most satisfying and needed services in the community is provided by Retired Senior Volunteers through the program's Care Sharing Project.

Men and women, 60 or older, can be trained to provide companionship to frail elderly persons one-half day each week, thus allowing caregivers a much-needed break from the responsibility of round-the-clock care for loved ones.

Prime Time

One night, she said she heard "a call within a call" — to leave the convent and help the people while living among them. She exchanged her habit for a white sari and took to the streets of Calcutta, barefoot. At 49, she moved into the industrial slums of the city where the lepers lived and began to dispense medicine and food.

At 60 she moved to New York and started the first American mission in the dangerous Fort Apache area of the South Bronx. At 60 she won the Nobel prize.

Albert Schweitzer began his adult years as a renowned musician — an organist and interpreter of Bach. At 30 he became a physician. At 38 he established a hospital in French West Africa where he practiced until he was incarcerated as an enemy alien by the French during World War I.

He was 50 when he was released. His hospital was in ruins. But he started over. He rebuilt the hospital and ran it until he died at 90.

In 1970 the national office of the United Presbyterian Church retired 65-year-old Maggie Kuhn. Furious, she formed a radical group known as the Gray Panthers. Its purpose was to overturn society's bias against older people.

For nearly two decades, Kuhn led the Gray Panthers in campaigns designed to eliminate age bias in America. With 74,000 members and chapters in 30 states, the Panthers acted as the voice of elders for serious social change.

Henri Matisse, the great post-impressionist painter, had been a cultural revolutionary for 40 years. He reached a time in life when he could have enjoyed the fruits of his labors.

At 66, he began painting again, constantly refining his craft. At 71 he underwent an intestinal operation that left him bedridden. But he still kept going. He invented ingenious ways to create art.

He had special easels made so that he could sit up in bed and work. When he could barely move, he used crayons and brushes tied to ends of long bamboo poles to draw huge murals. Between ages 76 and 80, he produced six major illustrated books that included hundreds of paintings and he designed the now-famous Chapelle du Rosaire.

He worked until he died in 1954 at the age of 85.

Such stories of famous people can be matched by stories about people who are not well known. For instance, Jacob Landers entered law school when he was 67 after spending several years in education as a teacher, administrator, professor of education and consultant. After graduating from law school, he went to work as a public interest lawyer in New York where he speaks for the elderly.

Bob Phelps worked as a journalist for 40 years at the Boston Globe. After retiring he decided to become an actor. Not just a night and weekend community theater actor, but a pro. He went to acting school, took his resume around to agents, got some small parts, did some commercials, dinner theater,

summer stock. He made a new career.

Intellectual pursuits are not the only way to go. Many older people are into physical achievements. John Gurner at 72 pumps iron. Eric De Reynier, 85, took up hang gliding at 72. E. T. Smith, known as "Smitty the Jumper," was one of seven members of a world champion sky diving team. He was 87 when he made his 276th jump.

Stories of people like these are remarkable, but not unusual. There are millions of people in their seventh, eighth and even ninth decades who carry on with great vigor, agility, intensity and physical courage.

Drug aid restored

Gov. John Engler has signed into law the appropriation for the Medical Emergency Pharmaceutical Program for Seniors (MEPPS) and operations have resumed statewide, says Nancy Crandall, director of the State Office of Services to the Aging.

The funding of the \$2.5 million emergency prescription drug program helps pay for emergency prescription needs of eligible older adults. To qualify for MEPPS, a person must be 65 or older; in a given month have expenditures for prescription drugs that exceed 10 percent of monthly household income; and have income at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty standard, which, at present, equates to \$827 for a single person and \$1,108 for a couple. Medicaid recipients, residents of nursing homes or mental health facilities licensed by the state are not eligible.

An eligible senior may seek emergency assistance twice a year. Payment for prescription drugs is made via vouchers issued by local Area Agencies on Aging and their contracted service providers. There is no limit on the dollar amount of the MEPPS voucher. To apply for assistance, contact your local Area Agency on Aging.

When it comes to counting sheep, older adults may be getting fleeced

Older adults who accept poor sleep as a "normal" consequence of aging may be short-changing themselves of rest desperately need.

In a study of people over 65 conducted by the National Institute on Aging, more than half of those surveyed complained about some type of sleep disturbance.

Yet elderly troubled sleepers commonly don't seek help. Because they can't sleep as well as they used to, many older adults conclude they don't need as much sleep as before and resign themselves to making do

with less.

"Older people need just as much sleep as younger adults," said Thomas Roth, Ph.D., director of Henry Ford Hospital's Sleep Disorder Center. "Increased complaints of disturbed sleep in the elderly do not reflect normal aging processes, but rather an increased prevalence of specific sleep disorders. These complaints demand careful attention."

Many sleep problems in older persons can be treated in much the same way they are dealt with in younger adults.

Even though older adults

don't have to accept restless nights as an inevitable part of growing older, they may have to put some effort into improving the quality of their sleep. For a variety of reasons, the ability to sleep well tends to diminish with advancing age.

Beginning around the age of 40, the amount of time spent in stage 3 sleep — the deepest, non-dreaming sleep — declines. As a result, the slumber of older adults is much lighter and more easily disturbed. Sleep becomes "fragmented," with frequent nocturnal awak-

enings and early morning arousal.

Fatigued sleep leads to daytime sleepiness, which some older adults try to counter with naps. But frequent naps make it even harder to sleep soundly through the night.

"People need to understand that day and night sleep are not totally independent on each other," said Roth. "Each person's sleep allotment is for a 24-hour period. To the extent that you nap during the day, you're going to sleep less that night."

Other factors that can contribute to sleep problems in older adults include diseases, medications and changes in the body's circadian rhythms (natural sleep/wake cycle). In addition, older adults are more susceptible to sleep disorders, such as sleep apnea and nocturnal myoclonus (periodic leg movements), that can compromise sleep.

Still, sleep doesn't have to become a nightmare just because you're getting older. Sleep research has produced a number of practical tips for improving sleep in later life, including:

- Pace yourself. If you're waking up too early, go to bed later. If you're not getting enough sleep at night, limit naps during the day.

- Lighten up. Exposing yourself to bright light during the day and early evening will help keep your circadian rhythms in sync. Spending too much time indoors, especially in darkened rooms, throws off the body's natural sleep/wake cycle.

- Exercise. Engaging in some form of moderate exercise, such

as walking several hours before bedtime, will promote better sleep. Avoid any strenuous activity right before bedtime, however.

- Get into a routine. Making a habit of going to bed at the same time every night will help set your internal body clock and increase the likelihood you'll be sleepy and able to rest during that block of time.

- Be exclusive. Reserve your bed for sleeping. There shouldn't be a major discrepancy between how many hours you sleep and how many hours you spend in bed.

- Toss the bottle. If you want to sleep well, avoid alcohol. Al-

though alcohol may make you drowsy and help you fall asleep, it will make your sleep fitful.

If better sleep habits don't improve your sleep, it may be necessary to consult your family physician or seek specialized help from a sleep disorders clinic.

"Each individual is the best judge of whether or not they need help. If problems with sleep are impairing their quality of life, then they should probably do something about it," Roth said.

With all the help that's now available, there's no reason for older adults to take sleep disturbances lying down.

Tips on insuring against nursing home costs

One of the biggest threats to the security of your financial future is the possibility of spending years in a nursing home without the money or insurance to help cover the expenses.

To protect yourself and your assets, the Michigan Association of CPAs recommends that you review all available long-term care insurance and the level of nursing home care and in-home services that they cover. Make sure you know who will pay the bills when you can't.

Why Medicare and Medicaid may not help

Don't rely on Medicare for long-term chronic care. Medicare coverage for long-term care is limited to only 100 days of skilled nursing care if an individual meets specific criteria. Even during this time, individuals are required to pick up a substantial portion of the costs themselves. What's more, Medicare does not cover custodial care — that is, care which does not require the services of skilled nurses, such as assistance with meals or personal hygiene.

Medicare supplemental insurance (often called Medigap) is private insurance that is designed to help cover some of the gaps in Medicare coverage. But those gaps are usually: hospital deductibles, physician deductibles and co-insurance payments — they are not long-term care.

Medicaid is the federal-state program that pays for long-term nursing home care for people with no other resources. Although Medicaid pays a large percentage of nursing home costs, you generally are not eligible for Medicaid benefits unless you have depleted your assets and your life savings.

Private long-term care coverage

A solution for some people is private long-term care insurance, now offered by more than 140 companies nationwide. This insurance is designed to protect people when they become chronically ill or disabled.

These policies generally cover three types of care in state-licensed nursing homes: 1) skilled care provided by a registered nurse or therapist usually on a daily basis for a relatively short period of time; 2) intermediate care that is provided by skilled medical personnel on a less frequent basis than skilled care but for a considerably longer period of time; and 3) custodial care which includes assistance with activities of

daily living (bathing, dressing, eating) and is often provided by non-medical personnel.

Since you cannot predict the kind of care you will need if and when you enter a nursing home, it's best to look for a policy that provides coverage for the three levels of care.

The price tag for long-term care insurance

Policies for long-term care can range in cost from approximately \$480 a year to more than \$3,800. The amount of your premium depends on your age when you purchase a policy, the level of benefits and the length of time before benefits kick in. The premium is also affected by the size of the daily benefit. You can get the most for your insurance dollar if you purchase a policy with a higher level of benefits at an early age.

Policies and their benefits

Benefits vary with each long-term care policy. Before nursing home coverage begins, the

policyholder may have to meet certain requirements. For example, many policies require that you be hospitalized for three days before entering the nursing home and that the nursing home care be for the same injury or illness that caused the hospitalization.

Most policies have indemnity benefits, which means that they pay a fixed amount per day of covered nursing home care. This will not usually cover the total cost for nursing home care and you will be expected to pick up the rest of the tab. Also, almost all policies have some limitation on the number of days and total dollars that will be provided.

Since long-term care policies are relatively new, prices can vary greatly. CPAs recommend that you look for a policy that is guaranteed renewable for life. This will prevent the insurer from cancelling the policy when covered expenses are high.

Young artist wants to make an impact with Impact Art

Bill Austin says his art is designed to have an impact on those who view it.

Last year, in an effort to get people to notice their surroundings, he "decorated" an area of the Hill shopping district in Grosse Pointe Farms with "space pillows" — chicken wire wrapped in colorful tissue paper. He also wove pipe insulation through a cyclone fence.

Now he's hoping to have an impact on the shops along Kercheval in Grosse Pointe Park near the Detroit border.

"I'd like to see this area as a little Soho," Austin said. "A place with art galleries and restaurants and neat little shops."

Austin opened Impact Art, a gallery of modern art, at 15110 Kercheval on June 27. It's the second business in that area designed to attract an eclectic, culture-minded crowd. Cup-A-Cino, a 50s-style coffee house, opened earlier this year two doors away from Impact Art.

The response, he said, has been good.

"It's kind of a conservative area over here," he said. "But with the opening of Cup-A-Cino, new people are coming into the area. This place is another thing to bring people in."

Until recently, Austin, 28, was a glass furniture designer. But he'd always set his sights on opening a studio.

"As an artist I got tired of working for someone else," he said. "I liked my work but I wanted to do something else. So I saw this place and because I grew up in the area, I thought it would be nice to work in a place I know and that's close to home. So I quit my job in the middle of a recession — not a smart thing — and within a month had this place open."

To fill his emporium, Austin turned to his artist friends. There's a little bit of everything in Impact Art, some purchased by Austin, some on consignment. The gallery boasts large and small sculptures and paintings, and also jewelry. (Don't miss the clocks that double as art.)

He even has a selection of black-oriented art, which he included for a reason. "Art isn't a black or white issue," Austin said. "These works have black themes, but they shouldn't be looked at as black art. Art is art."




Edison Foundation awards \$1.5 million





Michelangelos-in-training brighten neighborhood with original mural

Bright geometric shapes are climbing the walls of a bland one-story brick storage building near the Ambassador Bridge.

Bold yellow circles, hot pink rectangles, purple squares, orange, blue and green blocks of color are growing taller daily. They're creeping around the building, putting pizzazz on the white bricks of the six-sided warehouse, a storage area for maintenance equipment used on the bridge.

Artists Lisa Ficarra and Tassia Papatriantafyllou, both of Grosse Pointe Woods, are creating an original mural. Their design was the winning entry in a contest held by Amex Inc., a duty-free store on the Detroit side of the Ambassador Bridge.

Ficarra and Papatriantafyllou won \$500 for their design.

Then they were hired to paint it

themselves, freehand.

The bright blocks of color will become an art deco-style cityscape, its skyline representing Detroit. Some of the mural's buildings will resemble products that are available in the Amex store. One building will look like a chocolate bar, for instance; another skyscraper will take the shape of a well-known brand of vodka; another painted building will resemble a cigarette pack with a few cigarettes sticking out of the top, like smokestacks.

"It's intended to advertise things that are for sale at the store," Ficarra said. "The idea is to beautify the neighborhood, to incorporate the buildings into a cityscape full of color and life, showing a positive attitude about the community. It will be a colorful attention-getter and it will brighten the neighborhood. We're already getting nice comments from people who live nearby."

"It's a contemporary cityscape in the Miami style with bright, bold,

eccentric colors," Papatriantafyllou said. "I'd compare it to Paul Gauguin's paintings. I hope it will become a landmark like the Eastern Market mural."

The finished painting will be 16 feet high and wrap around four sides of the six-sided building, a total of 214 feet of eye-catching color

and design — as well as some advertising for the store's merchandise.

The mural will be visible from the adjacent expressway and service drive as motorists approach the Ambassador Bridge.

Ficarra graduated from the University of Michigan last December


with a bachelor of fine arts degree. She majored in graphic design and minored in watercolor painting.

She's employed full time at an advertising job. She's painting the mural after 5 p.m., on weekends and in her spare time.


"For now, I have no social life," she said, with a smile and a shrug.

The Pastor's Corner Defining terms

I am not a person who thinks that careful definition of terms makes a discussion "merely semantic." Rather, I think definition of terms, by more clearly outlining our thoughts, makes discussion possible. I also think that, while dictionary definitions can be helpful, the definitions that matter are those which a person or community is actually using at any time.

Being ensconced in an election year, there are two definitions I would like to toss out for discussion. The first is the term "political."

I recognize that embedded in our word "political" is the ancient Greek term "city." The political is first of all that which has to do with the community of women and men of which we are a part, our "city."

But it more centrally is the action by which these men and women interact on issues which pertain to all or a large portion of them. Or, even more, it (politics) seems to mean the force at work when a community of persons interacts over common concerns. We tend, I think, to narrowly misuse the term to describe the control of forces to manipulate members of a community. Thus we say that a decision was "merely political," meaning that some person or group controlled forces to manipulate part of a community.

The other term is "spiritual." This term focuses on the ancient idea that every human being is more than flesh and bone. The totality of the human hopes and drive are what I mean by spirit. Anything which reaches to express or to modify the most basic and central hopes and efforts of women or men can be labeled "spiritual." Thus, issues of God and religion are obviously spiritual issues as they express and modify the center of human living.

But isn't it also true that the political is a spiritual issue?

Aren't the forces that shape our "city" linked inseparably to the basic hopes and efforts of us all?

As we seek to find answers to political questions this year, we must be open to the input of spiritual resources. Political answers are not divorced from spiritual questions: questions of fairness, limits to suffering, and openness to forgiveness and redemption.

Of course, our spiritual directions are also political. For what pursuit of hope and effort can ignore that we exist in a community. When we seek our own center we are never away from the forces that bind us to each other.

In 1992, it seems we must allow our spiritual awareness to guide our political decisions. And we must see to it that our spiritual life is expressed in our political reality.


Or else our politics become manipulation divorced from hope and our spiritual becomes effort isolated from our living.

years." She's working full time on the mural.

Ficarra and Papatriantafyllou heard about the contest two months ago. The judges were looking for a mural to publicize Amex store merchandise as well as a design that would add color and pizzazz to the neighborhood.

Ficarra and Papatriantafyllou got together in Papatriantafyllou's studio for six hours three nights in a row to create a design for their contest entry.

"We had a great time picking colors from the paint catalog. We put colors together that would vibrate... just sort of 'shoot off the building,'" Papatriantafyllou said. "We chose more than 16 colors."

"Since we got started, we're up to more than 25 colors," Ficarra said.

They began work about five weeks ago and hope to be finished by mid-August.

They're using oil enamel and outdoor latex paints and they'll cover the finished mural with a clear sealant to protect it from the weather.

"I hope it will last 50 years at least," Papatriantafyllou said. "I want my grandchildren to see this."

Their design is evolving as they work. They're hoping to create some three-dimensional effects by adding flowerboxes with real flowers, some neon tubing, some pieces of metal, and a moon that lights up.

"The Ambassador Bridge will be in the background. We'll add that last. We're going to take apart a children's swing set and reassemble it to represent the bridge," Ficarra said.

"When this is finished I hope I'll be able to get enough of my own watercolors together to have a booth at the Grosse Pointe Artists Association's

September art show," Ficarra said. Her favorite subjects are landscapes, flowers and water scenes.

"I haven't sold anything yet," she said. "I've just given some of my work away as gifts."

Papatriantafyllou has been trying to get some local art galleries interested in exhibiting a series of oil paintings she recently completed.

"The paintings capture emotions and senses in figures that resemble the figures of Easter Island," she said. She has already sold a few paintings in the series.

The downside of painting a mural, according to both artists, is cleaning themselves up at the end of each day.

"I rub off two layers of skin every night. We use Lava soap, sponges, Brillo pads. Cleaning up the body takes about an hour of scrubbing each night," Papatriantafyllou said.

They agreed that two of the biggest problems in the actual painting are weather and bugs. "We can't paint when it's raining," Ficarra said.

"And truckers," Papatriantafyllou added. "We get harassed by truckers going by. We just keep working."

"We've made friends with some of the people in the neighborhood," Ficarra said.

"They've told us how much they like it and how it's brightening their neighborhood."

What did they do with the \$500 prize money?

"Hah," they laughed simultaneously. "We went right to the Village and spent it on clothes."

"Ray Bans for the sun," Papatriantafyllou said, "and stuff from Ann Taylor."

"We went on a shopping spree," Ficarra said. "Then we had dinner at Cafe Le Chat."



Students learn a lot about themselves by writing a musical about Columbus

Who says the arts aren't educational?

Not the students taking part in Grosse Pointe Summer School's Talent Today program, that's for sure.

On Wednesday, July 22 the students will present "Columbus: The Myth" — a new musical written, scored and performed by the 18 talented youngsters, who range in age from 10 to 18.

The performance will be the culmination of five weeks of work by the students under the direction of Grosse Pointe teachers Gael Barr, May Krager and Bob Reimer.

"This is pretty damned ambitious," said Reimer, who oversaw the scriptwriting.

In five weeks, the students were to write dialogue and music, choreograph, learn lines and dance steps, and they have been up to the challenge.

They were chosen from dozens of students living in the Grosse Pointe school district who auditioned for the arts enrichment program. Students were able to audition as writers, dancers, singers, actors or any combination of the four.

Working with the timely subject of Christopher Columbus, the students did research the first week and decided what the theme would be.

"But when they did the research, they discovered that there aren't any set truths about Columbus," said Barr, who is directing the show. "For instance they discovered that Columbus had two brothers who were successful businessmen in their own right, but were overshadowed by what Columbus did."

The students also discussed presenting Columbus' expedition from the point of view of his patron Queen Isabella or of

the natives or of his family. Because they couldn't agree, they decided to use a shifting perspective to touch on all these facets.

"This is not what you'd call a historical pageant," Reimer said. "In fact, no one will have seen anything quite like it before."

As teams and individually, students wrote dialogue and lyrics for the 15 musical numbers. One student wrote a poem in which the ship's cat discussed his views of the trip. That became a song and a scene was written around it.

The result is a series of related scenes about Columbus' voyage that tells what other people thought about the voyage. Columbus himself is a minor character.

The music — the melodies

were written by Krager and scored by student Scott Gwinell — spans the range from calypso to tap to heroic ballads.

"What's amazing to us is how well they work together," Krager said. "One day we wrote the words to a song together on the blackboard. They were open to all ideas and very willing to work together."

"There is a wide range of experiences in this group and they learn from each other," Barr said.

It is the second year for the Talent Today program. Last year the class culminated in three one-act musicals.

"Last year was an experiment and it worked," Barr said. "This year it's a different kind of experiment."

The program was started to provide summer enrichment and encouragement to students who are talented in a non-academic field. It is the only class in the district like it.

In addition to encouraging blossoming talent, the class also is a good example of how inter-disciplinary teaching works. The students are learning composition and English by writing the script, history by doing the research and music and dancing through the musical numbers.

"It's been a fun experience," said Grosse Pointe South junior Mark Brewster. "We've done a lot of work but we also had a lot of fun putting this together."

"I've never been in a musical before," said '92 South graduate David Scott. "If I were

around longer I'd do this again."

The class is open to students entering middle school to those who have just graduated. Charlie Babcock, who's entering eighth grade in the fall, also likes the class.

"It's something interesting to do in the summer," he said.

The teachers learned a few things, too.

"To me, the most interesting aspect is that it's an ongoing, creative program," Reimer said. "It's never been the work of a single person."

"Columbus: The Myth" will be presented free of charge at noon, July 22, as part of the summer school open house at Grosse Pointe North High School auditorium. It will also be presented free of charge at 7 p.m. that evening.

Grilled Lamb Salad Paella

2 lean fresh American lamb leg steaks, cut 3/4 inch thick

Marinade

2/3 cup extra virgin olive oil
1-1/2 t lemon zest
1/3 cup lemon juice
3 garlic cloves, minced
1-1/2 t chili powder

In small bowl, blend olive oil, lemon zest, lemon juice, garlic and chili powder.

In 9 x 13-inch glass baking dish, arrange lamb steaks in a single layer. Pour on 1/3 cup marinade. Cover and refrigerate, marinating 4-8 hours, turning twice.

To Broil: Place lamb steaks on cold broiler pan. Broil 4 inches from source of heat 4-5 minutes per side for medium rare.

To Grill: Ignite coals in barbecue; allow to burn until bright red and covered with gray ash. Grill lamb steaks 4 inches from coals 4-5 minutes per side for medium rare.

Slice cooked lamb 1/4 inch thick. Cut into 2-inch strips cover and set aside.

Salad Ingredients

3 cups broth
2 t dried oregano leaves, crushed
2 t garlic salt
6 saffron threads or 1/4 t turmeric
1/2 cup rice
1/2 cup diced red peppers
1/2 cup diced green peppers
1 jar (6-1/2 ounces) marinated

artichoke hearts, drained and coarsely chopped

1-1/3 cups frozen peas, thawed

1 cup diced Roma tomatoes

1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted

1/4 cup thinly-sliced green onions

Grilled American lamb slices
In medium pan with lid, combine broth, oregano, garlic salt and saffron or turmeric. Bring to a boil; stir in rice. Cover, lower heat to simmer and cook for 20 minutes; cool slightly.

In a large bowl, combine cooked rice, red and green pepper, artichoke hearts, peas, tomatoes, almonds, green onion and lamb. Add remaining 2/3 cup salad dressing; toss to mix salad ingredients. Serves six.

Gazpacho

2-1/2 pounds tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and chopped fine

1/2 pound seedless cucumber, cut into 1/2-inch dice, plus thin slices for garnish

1 cup finely chopped red onion

1 red bell pepper, chopped fine, plus julienne strips for garnish

1/4 t minced garlic

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 cup tomato juice

1 cup beef broth

1 T tomato paste

1 t ground cumin

1 t salt

1 T Worcestershire sauce

In a bowl combine the tomatoes, diced cucumber, onion, chopped bell peppers, garlic, oil, vinegar, tomato juice, broth, tomato paste, cumin, salt, Worcestershire sauce and black pepper to taste. Stir in 1/2 cup ice cubes and chill the soup, covered for at least 4 hours or overnight. Ladle the soup into chilled bowls and garnish it with the sliced cucumber and bell pepper strips. Serves 6.

Mixed Greens with Cumin Vinaigrette

1 shallot, minced

1/2 t Dijon-style mustard

1/2 t ground cumin

6 T fresh lemon juice

2/3 cup extra virgin olive oil

6 cups assorted lettuce

leaves such as red and green oak leaf lettuces, sorrel, Lollo rosso, and dandelion greens (available seasonally at specialty produce markets)

rinsed and spun dry

2 cups watercress sprigs, coarse stems discarded, rinsed and spun dry.

In a bowl, whisk together shallot, mustard, cumin, salt to taste, and lemon juice. Add oil in a stream, whisking, until the dressing is emulsified. Let stand, covered and chilled, for 1 hour.

In a large bowl toss together the lettuce leaves and the watercress. Whisk the dressing, drizzle it over the greens, and toss the salad until it is combined well. Serves 6.



1 cup heavy cream

5 large whole eggs

5 large egg yolks

1/4 t almond extract

1 t vanilla

1/2 pint strawberries

1/2 pint blueberries, picked over

2 peaches, cut lengthwise into sixths and sliced crosswise

mint sprigs for garnish if desired

In a saucepan, dissolve 1/4 cup sugar in 1/4 cup water over moderate heat, stirring. Bring the syrup to a boil, covered, and boil it, uncovered and undisturbed, until it begins to turn golden. Swirling the pan, until the mixture becomes a deep caramel, pour it immediately into a loaf pan, 19 x 5 by 3 inches, and swirl the pan to coat the bottom and 1/2 inch up the sides. Let the caramel harden.

In a sauce pan, scald the milk and the cream. In a large bowl whisk together the whole egg, the yolks and the remaining 1 cup sugar, add the scalded milk mixture in a

stream, whisking, and stir in the almond extract and the vanilla. Pour the custard through a fine sieve into the loaf pan, set the pan in a baking dish, and add enough hot water to the dish to reach halfway up the sides of the pan. Bake the custard covered with a double layer of foil in the middle of a preheated 325 degree oven for 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until a knife inserted 1 inch from the edge comes out clean. (The flan will continue to set as it cools.) Remove the pan from the dish and remove the foil. Let cool on a rack and chill it, covered, for 3 hours. The flan can be made 1 day in advance and kept covered and chilled.

Run a thin knife around the sides of the pan, place a platter over the pan, and invert the flan onto it. Arrange the strawberries, the blueberries, and the peaches around the flan and garnish the flan with the mint sprigs. Serves 6.

A solution presents itself in the form of an invitation to join a recently divorced friend on a getaway vacation to Greece. Will she have the nerve to let her routine-bound husband cook his own dinner and wash his own clothes for two weeks? Can she even break the news to him in advance that she plans to go? Can she ignore her daughter's disbelief and disapproval of the trip? Wrestling with these challenges and the enormous temptation to use this trip to recapture life, humor and independence of spirit is the fabric of the first half of this totally engaging play.

Wright manages to exude such indecision that she creates a delicious suspense as to whether she'll really make the break. Even as she sits on her suitcase in the kitchen and repeatedly checks her "tickets, money, passport," waiting to be picked up at four o'clock and looking at her watch, she sighs portentously, "It's quarter to two."

You wonder.

The second half is fantasy come true as titillating and amusing as the independently produced film "Never on Sunday" was in the 60s. The comparison is apt because this production borrows generously from the romantic bouzouki

'Bonjour, la, Bonjour': High family drama in Montreal

If the two plays by Michael Tremblay presented at Stratford — last summer's "Les Belles Soeurs" and this year's "Bonjour, la, Bonjour" — are any indication, life in French Montreal is a world class soap opera.

"Bonjour, la, Bonjour," which opened July 3, continues Tremblay's exploration of French

true and selfless love between the brother and the youngest of the sisters which reaches out to the father whose deafness up to then had been the focus of the family's non-communication.

To baby brother Serge, three of his sisters are like the Furies of mythology. Each has a particular format of wiles to try to win and dominate him. Pat Galloway as Lucienne, who won status and security by marriage to a rich doctor, is masterful in revealing the chinks in Lucienne's hauteur that expose the emptiness she seeks to fill by controlling Serge. Michelle Fisk as Monique, draws a marvelously pitiful picture of the hypochondriac playing for sympathy with an effectiveness that's hard to resist. And Lorna Wilson as Denise is hilarious and shocking as she gradually converts teasing and horseplay with her brother into an attempted rape. The audience holds its breath as Marc Ruel, playing Serge, cries out for release.

And there are still more gems. Janet Wright and Kate Reid as the two aunts who live with the father, deliver characterizations of frustrated, meddling, domineering old maids that are eerie in their realism. Moreover, Reid makes the wickedly selfish old harridan, Charlotte, downright comic in her hatefulness.

But there is joy and redemption, too, in this insightful look at humanity. It is the sincere and ultimately open love between Serge and his youngest sister, Nicole. The taboo becomes unimportant as they reject the restraints and unhappiness of the family ties, and reach out to include their father in a happier relationship.

And Douglas Rain, in the father role, having established a clear pattern of withdrawal into his deafness, breaks his veneer just enough to punc-

Canadian family life with bitersweet humor and relentless revelation of the warts.

The big wart, in this case, is one of society's greatest taboos, incest, but its shame is overshadowed by the selfish behavior of the family members who can't share their love but demand it all from each other.

Brilliantly acted in a whole array of cameo roles, the play has its audience alternating between shock, uneasy suspense and side-splitting laughter at the incredibly true-to-life types the characters represent.

An unexplained blood red cord stretched loosely the length of the stage adds an item of mystery. Gradually it is understood to symbolize the blood tie that binds the four sisters and young brother of this family together. This in spite of their incredible failure at communication as the sisters compete for their baby brother's affection.

In an ironic sense it brings to mind the old revival hymn, "The tie that binds." That tie, in fact, has the power to keep them all trapped in their twisted relationships in which each presents a distinct example of the crippled personalities that social traditions too often create. It fails only because of a

tuate the triumph of his two youngest children's mutual love over all the anguished strife.

The influence of classic Greek theater traditions on Tremblay's work are both very noticeable and powerful in adding to the impact of the play. As in "Les Belles Soeurs," he again has groups of actors speak in chorus and he has written his script in a compressed form that does away with scene changes because they come too fast.

The effect is almost musical as spoken lines, interrupted and interwoven, become themes and variations, and words uttered simultaneously by actors in chorus have a special and different meaning for each speaker in the group. It's diabolically clever and enormously

stimulating to keep on the edge of your seat to not miss a note, or a word, or any of the barbed thoughts that dart back and forth in the rapid-fire progress of this amazing play.

Nor is it possible to miss the engrossing, down-to-earth story of a family living its life in poorly disguised torment, miserable yet humorous, as life can so often be. Theater as a lens on the details of our lives certainly lives in Tremblay's writing, and it has the fascination of a highly developed, complex craft in Tremblay's ingenious hand.

Las Vegas — heaven, hell and everything in between

Here's the burning question of the day: Is Las Vegas really fun or is it one of the tackiest and most over-promoted destinations in the United States?

Aside from the gambling (which either is your thing or it isn't), it really is a one-of-a-kind place. And while Vegas probably has more neon than Hong Kong, it really isn't too awfully tacky, despite the Liberace Museum in a strip shopping mall.

For me, it's the greatest people-watching place on Earth. You'll see it all here, including lots of celebrities hobnobbing in the casinos after their late shows.

There is nothing quite like a Las Vegas stage show. Some of them are months in production and they show it. Also, they vary dramatically, from lavish revues with scantily-clad ladies to Bill Cosby sitting alone in the middle of the stage on a folding chair. One of the interesting things they do in Vegas is to introduce celebs that are in the show audiences. I guess it pumps up the crowd. At any rate, the night I saw Cosby many years back, Elvis Presley was sitting in a booth about 20 yards away.

And I must give you this piece of necessary advice if you have never, ever been to Las Vegas: You must definitely tip the maitre d' a twenty or so to get any kind of decent seat at a popular show. However, the shows in the smaller rooms often offer great seats with no tip required. I saw Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass from the front row with no special arrangements.

The lounge shows are also fun and a great place to catch acts on the way up (or down). Here I saw the memorable Mills Brothers (Cyd Charisse in the audience) and a riotous presentation by female impersonators.

For most people, three or four days is the limit for a Vegas trip and the tour packages reflect this. One reason is that a Las Vegas vacation runs on its own time schedule: You will laze by the pool, sightsee or golf during the day, attend a dinner show at 9 p.m. getting out around 11:30, then you'll cruise the casinos for several hours, maybe catching a late lounge show. Because this city really hums from about 11 p.m. to 3 a.m., you tend to go to bed hours later than you thought you would. So, of course, you wake up later and the cycle begins again. Believe me, three days is all this mid-aged body can take.

Probably the main reason so many people are attracted to Las Vegas is that you can live and eat very cheaply — gambling being the main draw. I mentioned sightseeing,

first life. And for Rita, who thinks the world is a terrible place and getting worse by the minute, it's not so bad, except she can't be with Peter.

As the man in the middle, Baldwin is moving when he tries to figure out why his beautiful new bride is having more fun with the senior citizens on their honeymoon than she is with him. It's even more touching when the two souls reunite to confront the old man's soul in Rita's body.

There's lots of talk of whether you can still love someone's soul if it's not in such a

pretty package, and whether living two lifetimes is beneficial, and whether pure love can withstand the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune. The answers, in this unabashedly romantic tale, are yes, no and maybe.

These questions are posed and resolved in some of the wittiest, realistic, well-written dialogue of any recent movie. But at times it still feels like a play and the bizarre camera angles used by director Norman Rene to open it up only end up irritating.

If you don't mind suspending

disbelief, or watching an overly long setup, the payoff is ultimately touching and telling for all the characters and life in general.

It would have been helpful and maybe more rewarding if director Rene had listened to the script and added a little more life to the film. Instead of creating a fun romantic comedy with a bizarre twist, he's fashioned a film only a dyed-in-the-wool romantic will love.

But go see it anyway; everyone could use a little dose of love and magic.



and the switch is a little long in coming, the film version of Craig Lucas' Tony-nominated play of the same name is a pleasant diversion. Sort of like a trashy novel you read at the beach that actually had some thought put into the characters as was put into the sex scenes.

There's no sex in "Kiss," though, just a lot of thought.

It's the story of Rita and Peter who meet at a party and fall head over heels in love. They date for a while, decide to get married, and at the wedding, the switch takes place during a kiss.

The problem is that the prelude to the kiss is so talky — it has to be to set up everything that happens later — that it borders on being dull.

It's saved by the performances of the leads. Alec Baldwin (who looks like he's pouting when he isn't acting) as Peter, the boring microfiche editor, is as charming as one would expect a microfiche editor to be, and Meg Ryan as Rita is child-like and silly without going over the edge.

After the kiss, Rita's soul is trapped in the body of an old man and the old man's soul is trapped in Rita's.

Murphy returns with 'Boomerang'

Fans of Eddie Murphy's raunchy humor get a double whammy in "Boomerang," a hilarious film in which he meets his match in sassy Robin Givens, who gives him as much as he hands out.

Murphy, as Don Juan extraordinaire, Marcus James leaves his conquests panting after him. But Givens, as cool Jacqueline, casually walks away with, "I'll get back to you."

Hit with a boomerang, James can't handle it.

He's all pep and ginger walking toward the audience on the screen as he approaches his high-rise office in New York where he is a successful marketing executive.

His first order of the day is to placate each of the six demanding admirers lined up on the telephone. Then it's off to the lounge for lunch with his buddies, Gerard (Alan Grier) and Tyler (Martin Lawrence). This is no business or power lunch. The subject is women — in detail. What pleases them. What turns them off.

James even gives a polished demonstration in the art of pickup when a gorgeous girl strolls by with her dog. In no time he is on the curb calling for his non-existent dog and getting sympathy because he can't find the animal. His next encounter occurs while waiting for an elevator at work. The girl, Jacqueline, not only isn't buying it, she gives it back to him. It comes as a crushing blow to James when he discovers Jacqueline is his new department head because he was promised the job if he would romance elderly, retiring Lady Eloise (Eartha Kitt), titular head of the cosmetic company.

Then there's Grace Jones, a high-powered model who comes riding into an announcement party in a chariot drawn by eight broad-shouldered men. Talk about feminist payback — Jones rants, sneers and shouts and so intimidates the male board members that they don't dare open their mouths.

When she learns of James'

reputation with women she demands equal time publicly in the coarsest of terms.



In the meantime, James is still working on Jacqueline. For the first time he seems genuinely interested in one girl. When she agrees to have dinner at his apartment, he goes all out on the trappings. No dice. She passes up his important wine, plants herself in front of the television and demands a beer.

Standing in the wings is Angela (Halle Berry), Jacqueline's assistant. She is obviously attracted to James but settles for being his friend in his desolate brooding over Jacqueline. Along the way, Murphy lampoons several modern issues. He hits on racism in a restaurant scene and in another he uses a pool game as an example of black superiority.

The modern woman gets her comeuppance with Jacqueline, who is as casual about sex as James and in Jones, who is so

liberated she is scary in her flamboyant outbursts.

The sex scenes are anything but romantic. Rather, the bedroom sets the stage for more of Murphy's outrageous humor. Murphy fans will not be disappointed in "Boomerang." There's enough down and dirty humor to keep the laughs coming. The twist is that the quicksilver egomaniac Murphy, as James, learns about himself from beautiful women; his nemesis Jacqueline and Angela who deals more kindly with him but lets him know that she will not be used.

Givens ("A Rage in Harlem") as the sassy Jacqueline is Murphy's match in every way and Halle Berry as Angela, a sprightly actress, is likable. Director Reginald Hudlin ("House Party") serves up a cynical but funny film on a grand scale. "Boomerang" is a "good-welcome-back Eddie" film but it is definitely not for the fastidious — but then every Murphy fan knows what to expect going in.

Master Gardener helps grow pride on once-barren lot

A green thumb's a nice thing for a gardener to have, but a little scientific knowledge won't hurt, either.

With that idea in mind, the national Master Gardener program was started out west some 22 years ago and has since spread coast-to-coast, with a strong showing in Michigan.

With the purpose of enhancing community environments and cultivating rich landscapes, Master Gardener programs have produced some pretty fruitful results.

The Master Gardener program in Macomb County, an annual 12-week course offered through the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University, provides individuals with up-to-date, accessible horticultural information based on research conducted at MSU and other universities.

Topics run the gamut of basic horticulture, such as fruit and vegetable production, lawn care, flower gardening, tending house plants, tree and shrub management and pest control.

The Master Gardener course is designed for people who want to pursue horticulture as a business and also for those who just want to improve their back yard gardens or spruce up their house plants, said Sandra Richards, Macomb County's Master Gardener program coordinator.

The course seeks to foster appreciation of gardening, promote advanced techniques and shatter common myths. For example, research shows, contrary to popular belief, that watering your lawn during the hot part of the day actually cools it rather than burns it.

Master Gardener classes are taught by various specialists from MSU, by county agents and by local gardening experts.

"It's a fantastic course — I highly recommend it," said Janet Martin, an advanced Master Gardener. "It's changed my life."

Martin followed up the Master Gardener program with a week-long advanced course at MSU which goes into greater detail. In addition to the Master Gardener course, the Cooperative Extension

Service offers specialty classes.

Martin — from Birmingham, England, where she maintains, vegetation grows easily — said she took the course to learn more about gardening techniques in a temperate climate, such as the Grosse Pointes, where she has lived for the last 20 years.

"In England things grow despite you — you just throw it in the ground and it grows," she said, crediting the country's favorable weather of substantial rains and mild sun.

"Here (in teh Pointes) you've got the freezing winters. I grow perennials and I wanted to know why I was losing them."

Students begin the Master Gardener course studying soil preparation and plant systematics — categorizing plants by their structures, pieces and parts, said Richards.

In the Grosse Pointes, the soil is mostly thick clay, which does not easily absorb water and nutrients. "Basically, if you want to be successful, do something with your soil," Martin advises.

Adding organic material — fertilizers and mulches consisting only of animal or vegetable matter that act as micro sponges to hold water and nutrients — greatly improves a clay soil.


Course members can bring in samples of soil which are tested at MSU labs.

Various insects and diseased tree and shrub branches are studied so students can identify common gardening problems.

To be certified a Master Gardener, the course requires the budding horticulturist to put in at least 40 hours of community service. It is part of the Master Gardener philosophy to extend horticultural knowledge to others in the community through volunteer activities.

To fulfill this requirement, several of the gardeners volunteer for the Macomb County Cooperative Extension Service hotline set up Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. to field phoned-in questions, mostly from community residents, but sometimes from farmers.

For serious problems where money may be at stake, specialists

will go out to the field to take a look.

Other Master Gardeners in Macomb County serve their community by offering their time at the weekly Mount Clemens Farmer's Market, the Armada Fair, the


Michigan State Fair, the Older American Festival, city beautification projects and at local churches. And still others help provide training for the handicapped, the elderly and underprivileged youths.

Whittier has all the angles

Chuck full of odd and interesting interior angles, the contemporary split-level Whittier is clearly an angle-lover's delight.

Plans for this four-bedroom home, designed for construction on a gently side-sloping lot, include a three-car garage — storage space for a boat or recreational vehicle, in addition to the standard two cars. Garage and family room are at the lowest level with family living space and half-flight up at mid-level. Sleeping areas are another half-flight up, over the garage and family room.

But to say the home has only three levels is an over-simplification. One step down and to the left of the mid-level entryway is a quasi-octagonal sunken living room. Surrounded by windows, this bright room is also warmed in winter by a wood stove.

One step up brings you to a dining room with glass doors that open onto a wide deck. This room is almost completely rectangular, allowing for a visually satisfying alignment with a formal dining room table and buffet.

The kitchen, another near-octagon,

is illuminated by skylights. In addition to counter space ample to provide elbow room for two or three cooks, a work island at its center has a vegetable sink. Off to one side, wedged in a near-triangular enclosure, is the pantry, and off to the other is the most oddly shaped room of all — a sunny eating nook.

Half a flight down, the upper half of the family room is open to the lower half of the nook. Beverages and clean-up are close at hand with a small sink and refrigerator.

While the exterior of the upper level is rectangular, designers have managed to work at least one odd angle into every room but the master bedroom. The over-sized walk-in shower stall in the master bathroom features multiple shower heads. A huge linen closet, with extra storage space, is centrally located, and a compartmentalized bath with double vanities serves the other three bedrooms.

The legacy of Frank Lloyd Wright

It's been 125 years since America's greatest architect was born and 33 years since he died, but somehow Frank Lloyd Wright's spirit is as alive as ever.

Consider, for example, that of 829 architects responding to an American Institute of Architect's survey, 99 percent voted for Wright as one of the 10 greatest American architects of all time; in fact, Wright was a runaway for first place.

In the same light, his 1935 design of Fallingwater, the spectacular house cantilevered over a waterfall in Bear Run, Pa., topped the list of all-time best works of American architecture.

The 1909 Robie House in Oak Park, Ill., a quintessential example of Wright's low-slung, broad-roofed, all-American "Prairie House" style, placed seventh.

Frank Lloyd Wright loomed larger than life even during his own lifetime. His extravagant taste for the finer things, as well as a sharply honed appreciation for members of the "fairer sex" (sometimes when they were other men's wives), earned him creditors and enemies.

He often was a target of the yellow press, which presented every misfortune to befall the architect as his "just desserts" for not conforming to post-Victorian societal norms.

However, accounts of the time do not ignore the architect's irrepressible zest for life and his ability to rise above whatever muck fell or was flung his way.

Wright was a brilliant speaker and writer who, allowing leeway for a tendency toward exaggeration, had the mesmerizing power of persuasion of Houdini over his audience.

Legends aside, however, there is the truth of the lasting legacy of Wright's work: 500 buildings and projects during a career that spanned 75 years. In addition to his houses, Wright designed a masterpiece of almost every building type imaginable, from Trinity Temple in Oak Park to the Johnson's Wax administration office building and research towers in Racine, Wis., to the magnificent curling spiral of the Guggenheim Museum in New York City.

The Guggenheim is but one example of the architect's efforts while he was in his 80s, long past the age when most people exchange their life's work for the comforts of retirement.

Critics and historians long have speculated about the universality of Wright's appeal to the American people. It seems that the closest verbalization we can get is in the architect's own words: that Wright's work is "of the earth." It reunites us with Mother Nature; it exalts our place in the grand scheme of the planet.

His skill in bringing out the natural beauty of wood and stone he molded into places for people in turn brings out the druid in us all. And

he carefully fit every building he designed to its site — look at any piece of land graced by a Wright design and try to imagine it without the building. Chances are it would be poorer in spirit.

Complementing the arts of Wright's architecture is the science of his engineering. The architect was ahead of his time in embracing new structural technologies, as evidenced by the peerless mushroom-shaped columns supporting the Johnson's Wax building's roof and Fallingwater's bold concrete cantilevers thrust over a woodland stream.

Part of the reason Wright's work has endured is that it is so well built; his Imperial Hotel, built in Tokyo, survived a killer earthquake in 1923, when most of the structures around it suffered severe damage.

Wright predicted that a double windmill (named "Romeo and Juliet") he designed for his aunts' country school in Wisconsin near Taliesin would stand for a record 25 years; 95 years later, Romeo and Juliet is still going strong.

Library extension combines innovation, tradition

Walking through downtown Princeton, N.J., your attention is more likely to be drawn to the neo-Gothic splendor of Firestone Library than to the addition that lies in front of it. That was Princeton University's intention when it hired Koetter, Kim & Associates, a Boston architecture firm, to design an extension to the world's largest open-stack college library.

Most of the addition lies underground; passersby see only a few expanses of glass behind a low stone wall, the corner of which is adorned with a small tower.

Zoning requirements mandating a 20-foot setback from the street are met by a strip of parkland, a gravel walk, and a double row of trees between the sidewalk and the wall, which marks a boundary between the town and the campus.

Through its granite and limestone facade accented by small windows and vertical trellises, the extension exerts an independent identity while blending with the main library and other campus structures. The addition "harmoniously respects the architectural forms and materials of the original building without literally imitating them," noted the jury that selected the extension as one of 10 projects this year to receive an

Honor Award from The American Institute of Architects.

In addition to extending the existing building's two levels of stacks, the 55,000-square-foot addition provides three large reading rooms, a number of smaller study areas, and office and conference spaces. The secondary reading areas act as "public squares" punctuating the vast expanses of stacks. The reading areas get most of their daytime illumination via natural top lighting, and the skylights serve the additional purpose of bringing the outside world into the underground spaces.

"The small tower-like element at the corner of the addition links the below-grade areas with the world above and brings natural light to what otherwise would be a dreary environment," the jury commented. The turret contains a sweeping spiral staircase and is lit by a diagonal skylight.

The largest of the three reading rooms abuts the main section of the library and is texturally enhanced by what was formerly an outer wall of the original building. The two-story area is traversed by arches, which support a glass-paneled shed roof, and a pair of bridges connecting the old structure with the new. Another room is described by the architects as "a traditional collegiate reading space," and the third was

designed as a garden room.

"The students love it; they can sort of shop around and find different kinds of space, maybe matching different sorts of moods," said university librarian Donald W. Koeppe. "It is the most heavily used space in the library at this point."

Glen Odell, deputy librarian, agreed: "Students flocked in on the day it opened. They have abandoned the old building."


The addition uses the campus' central heating and air conditioning system, and the energy efficiency of the heavily insulated building envelope is augmented by the mostly underground construction and by earth insulation at roof level. Metal tubing under the skylights serves the triple function of supporting the glass panels, shading excess sunlight and reflecting the wall-mounted uplights used when daylight is insufficient.

The types of jobs for which MESC can refer temporary workers include painting, yard and garden work, window washing, cleaning homes and offices, stocking shelves, taking inventory and doing general labor.

"We screen the workers before we refer them to a potential employer," Edwards said, "to ensure they have the skills required for the job."

MESC's Job Service does not charge a fee to either the employer or the worker. Employers pay the workers directly at a recommended rate of \$5 an hour for at least four hours work.

In addition to finding temporary workers for homes and businesses, Job Service can also help employers find qualified professional, managerial, technical, skilled and unskilled workers for their job openings.





Antiques by Ralph & Terry Kovel

Q. What can you tell me about Handel lamps? I have a metal lamp base that has been in our family since the 1930s. It has a glass shade with a night scene and a full moon. There is a label on the base. Unfortunately, the shade is gone, but I wonder if there is any value for the base.

A. From 1885 to 1933, Handel lamps were made in Meriden, Conn., and then in New York City. The reverse painted glass shades are the best known of his products. The value of the lamp was primarily the shade. A good Handel lamp and shade is worth from \$1,500 to \$6,000. A base without a shade still has a value of a few hundred dollars.

Q. My wife collects small metal and glass boxes that must have been used on a dresser. One dealer sold her four filigree boxes she says were "art deco, made about 1890." We have not been able to identify the age of the all-metal boxes with the raised flowers on the lids. The boxes seem to be made of gold-plated metal.

A. The art deco period of design started about 1920. The filigree and glass boxes were first made in that period. The solid metal boxes with

the raised flowers were inspired by the art nouveau designs of the 1890s, but we have seen them offered for sale in the Sears, Roebuck catalog from 1927 and after. They are called jewel or handkerchief cases.

Q. I have a set of casino chips from Monaco from the 1940s. They say, "Societe des Bains de Mer." Each chip is made of a different color plastic. Have they any antique value? Should I clean them before I try to sell them?

A. If the casino is still in business, you might be able to cash your chips. There are collectors of gaming chips, but the prices usually range from \$1 to \$10 each. Don't clean the chips with soap and water. If they are dirty, they should be cleaned with a rubber eraser.







To satisfy his community service requirement, John Griffith, who is also an advanced Master Gardener and the program's top student, started a community garden for low-income families on Maryland in Detroit.

With the help of several neighborhood volunteers, Griffith, who was granted a permit by Detroit's Farm-A-Lot project, converted two empty lots into an urban farm.

The 75-by-115-foot area was divided into about a dozen parcels to enable families of the South Maryland Block Club to grow vegetables.

"We can grow so much in that lot that we can't eat it all," said Griffith. All surplus produce will be donated to soup kitchens, charities and neighbors, he said.

The community garden was started in the late winter of this year when volunteers removed the debris — bricks, glass and rubbish — from the area, which formerly was the site of two houses. After the city picked up the debris, a private contractor, summoned by state Sen. John Kelly, bulldozed and excavated the area, which consists of mostly clay and loam — a combination of sand, clay and silt.

Griffith, a St. Clair Shores resident, shelled out the money for the excavation, but everything else — rototilling, plants, seeds, fertilizers, garden tools and fencing — was donated by Allemon's Nursery, Farm-A-Lot and the Macomb County Cooperative Extension Service.

As part of his obligation, Griffith has instructed community gardeners on how to make use of their surrounding natural resources, such as mulches — grass, leaves

and straw that keep the soil moist and stunt weed growth.

Griffith and company are working on an irrigation system and a beautification project is in the works to restore the turf and hedges in front of the garden and plant flowers along the new fence. The garden is an oasis among the many broken-down homes in the neighborhood.

"We're growing more than just vegetables here," Griffith said. "We're growing pride and commitment."

Griffith, whose father's amateur involvement in horticulture prompted him to follow in the same footsteps, offered high praise for the Master Gardener program.

"I think you more than get your money's worth," he said.

The class, which begins in January and winds up just before gardening season, costs \$100 and includes a course manual. The class meets once a week for four hours and quizzes and a final exam are given.

Griffith said he sat in on some outstanding lectures and most of the instructors were very receptive to any kind of questions. Moreover, he said he was impressed that all the information is research-based, not merely popular opinion on gardening.

The national program started in Washington state in 1970 and it now operates in 45 states. Michigan has programs in 27 counties, and more than 4,000 people have been trained since the first class was held in 1977.







Park man calls the shots for Mackinac race

Peter Griffin will breathe a big sigh of relief when the last of the 253-boat fleet reaches Mackinac Island sometime next week.

"This is like being the CEO for a corporation," said Griffin, a Grosse Pointe Park resident and Bayview Yacht Club member who is the race chairman for the 68th annual Port Huron to Mackinac race which will be held Saturday.

"We start planning for each race in October and the work starts in earnest in April when the invitations are sent out," he said. "That's when I started getting 90 phone calls a day at the office. I'm just fortunate I

have some great people on the race committee."

Griffin was assistant chairman for the race the last two years and he said the experience was valuable in preparing him for the top job.

"The logistics of the race make a lot of work for the committee," he said. "You can't start and finish the race in front of the club so we have to work with the city of Port Huron, the Coast Guard, the DNR and the chief of police on Mackinac Island. There are so many things to coordinate with all those people.

"As soon as you think you have everything taken care of, you realize there are 10 other things you've forgotten. I'll be

happy when next week comes."

Griffin heads a race committee of more than 100 people who work to make the event one of the most prestigious fresh water races in the country.

"It's a special race," he said. "That's why you have skippers come in from California, Florida, New England and Canada. There aren't a lot of races of this nature and when they come here they can run two races."

Most of the Port Huron to Mackinac fleet will also compete in the Chicago to Mackinac race in two weeks.

Although he won't be sailing this year — he'll drive to the island after Saturday's start —

Griffin is a veteran of 18 Mackinac races and he's been on a winning boat four times.

"I think the races I remember most are the heavy air ones in 1981 and '85," Griffin said. "The wind was blowing at 35 to 40 knots and it was cold. Eighty-five was the year half the fleet dropped out and a lot of others were just hanging on. A lot of the crew members got sick, so the rest of us had to stay up all night. The wind was so strong — 50 to 55-knot puff — it blew the instruments right off the deck.

"Another year I was navigating and I happened to hear a Coast Guard report that there was a squall with 65 mile-an-hour winds off Harbor Beach and it was heading right toward us. We had our largest sails up, but we were able to get them down and prepare for the storm. Some boats didn't and they had ripped sails and broken masts."

Griffin said there aren't many innovations for this year's race.

"There isn't a lot of new technology and there aren't that many new boats, either. The technology has leveled off for the last few years. I think a

few more boats will be using the Global Positioning System," he said.

GPS is a system of monitoring a group of satellites that report weather conditions. It was used by the U.S. Defense Department during Desert Storm.

More boats are expected to use GPS in the future as the cost of the system drops each year.

"I think the economy is a reason there aren't more new boats," Griffin said. "In the late '70s and early '80s you'd see skippers with new boats every two or three years. Now they're keeping a boat for 15 years."

This year's race will mark the first time two courses will be sailed. The old Cove Island course measures 259 nautical miles and the new Shore Course is 204 miles.

"We have 33 boats entered on the Shore Course and although it's shorter, it's still a challenging race," Griffin said. "The sailors have to be careful because the water is shallow and rocky. We think this will appeal to the smaller boats and newer sailors who don't want to sail the open waters."

The first of the 15 classes starts from Port Huron at 11:30 a.m. Saturday. The first boat is expected to arrive in Mackinac late Sunday or early Monday.


"We've had light air the last three years, so we're praying to the wind gods for more favorable conditions this time," Griffin said.

Argo stays busy after Cup win

Stu Argo Jr. doesn't plan to compete in this year's Port Huron to Mackinac race, but that doesn't mean he's resting on his America's Cup laurels.

He recently competed in a match race regatta in Germany and later this month will sail in a similar race in France. Then there's the J-44 North American championships in Harbor Springs, where he'll be part of Bill Alcott's crew on Equation.

"My schedule changes so fast sometimes," Argo said. "Right now I don't plan to sail any of the Mackinac races, but I might jump on a boat at the last minutes. I enjoy the Mackinac races."

Argo and former Grosse

Pointer Dawn Riley were members of the crew on the victorious America³ boat that beat Dennis Conner's Stars and Stripes in the defender series and beat the Italian entry in the Cup finals near San Diego this spring.

"I really enjoyed having the opportunity to compete against the best sailors in the world at the highest level of the sport," Argo said.

Argo said the secret to success for America³ was the support group that syndicate head Bill Koch put together.

"The people were the key because they were willing to put in the time and the discipline that's necessary to prepare at that level. (Koch) didn't decide to enter the Cup until August of 1990, so we were playing

catch-up all the time. The Italian entry started putting things together three years earlier and the Japanese started about half a year ahead of them."

Argo had a big hand in the success of the Japanese team's first venture into America's Cup competition.

"I coached their team for eight months, starting in October 1987," Argo said. "They had never sailed before so there were 15 sailors we had to develop from scratch."

The Nippon syndicate finished among the top four in the America's Cup races.

"They came a long way in four years," Argo said. "Their crew included a lot of the guys I started out. The thing about the Japanese is that they look at everything from a long-range

view — where they're going to be 100 years from now. They're not like Americans, who are so finance-conscious that there have to be immediate results."

Although ocean sailing has captured the imagination of many Americans through the America's Cup coverage on ESPN, lake sailing is still a major part of the sport.

"About 65 percent of the crew on our boat were lake sailors," Argo said. "There are a lot of good, solid lake sailors. I think lake sailing has a great future, especially with the youth programs that clubs like Bayview and the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club offer. Dean Balcirak Jr. came out of these programs and is one of the top junior sailors in the country and he's traveling all over the world."

Tae Kwon Do academy grows

Lee Shin is making it easier for Grosse Pointers to learn Tae Kwon Do.

The master instructor at the Grosse Pointe Academy of Tae Kwon Do is opening a new location at 20647 Mack, in Grosse Pointe Woods.

"Our school has been growing and now we have enough students to open a second location," Shin said. "Even though we've never had any problems, some of the residents of the Woods and Shores have been reluctant to come to our other school. Now they can come to this one."

Shin said he is pleased with the way Grosse Pointers have received his martial arts instruction since he opened his first academy on 15006 Mack, Grosse Pointe Park, in 1990.

"We're always trying to educate people who don't know and understand the philosophy of Tae Kwon Do," Shin said. "Our students learn discipline, re-

spect for their elders and self-confidence."

Many of Shin's students also participate in other sports.

"We have a lot of the kids playing soccer, hockey and other things, but they still keep coming to our classes," he said. "It benefits them physically and mentally."

When Shin was an instructor at Michigan State University, Spartans' football coach George Perles had an off-season requirement that his players take either a ballet or a Tae Kwon Do class.

"They all took Tae Kwon Do," Shin said with a smile. "Some of those 250-pounders came to the first classes and they could hardly lift their legs. By the time the class was over, some of them could even do the splits."

Shin said that youngsters of kindergarten age can learn Tae Kwon Do.

"I've had some as young as 4 years old," he said. "Those who start early enough — 5 to 10

years old — can really do a lot. You're looking at Olympic hopefuls. It's a responsibility I'm excited about, to think that we could have some of these kids on the Olympic team in 1996 or 2000."

Shin was a reserve on the 1988 U.S. Olympic team, so he knows what it takes to compete at that level.

Shin said that it's more than the physical aspect of Tae Kwon Do that appeals to parents.

"Integrity, perseverance, self-control, respect for elders and the indomitable spirit are the tenets of Tae Kwon Do," Shin said. "Our behavior and the atmosphere in our classes shows all of that."

Shin has the same rapport with his students that he had with his own master instructor.

"I watch the kids in their workouts and I see them pick up some of my mannerisms," he said. "They look at me like a god. That's a tremendous responsibility but it makes me a

better person. They believe everything I tell them. I can understand that because I would have done anything next to death if my master instructor had told me to do it."

Shin is planning to take a group of his students to his native Korea next year.


"The World Federation headquarters is in Seoul and I'd like to show the kids where Tae Kwon Do came from," Shin said.

Shin will also be an instructor at YMCA-sponsored Camp Ohlyesa near Holly from July 26 through 31.

Although he has achieved the level of master instructor and fifth-degree black belt, Shin is still learning.

"I'm working to achieve the rank of Grand Master," Shin said. "Experience is a big part of reaching that level. You never stop learning."

The Mets erupted for four runs in the fourth, featuring a key hit by Otto, to take an 8-6 lead.


