## Lease OK'd, WCCC clear to use South classrooms

The handful of Wayne County Community College students who showed up at Grosse Pointe South High School on Tuesday evening, Sept. 1, for classes were surprised to find they couldn't get in the building.

That's because the Grosse Pointe school district and WCCC, despite the fact that classes were scheduled to start, hadn't yet approved a lease which would allow the college to use the school facilities, according to Chris Fenton, assistant superintendent for business and support services.

"And, they hadn't paid us for last year yet," Fenton said.

On Thursday, Sept. 3, the Grosse Pointe school board received a lease signed by the WCCC board of trustees and a check for last year's rent. The board approved the lease at a special meeting held that evening.

The two classes scheduled at South resumed as planned on Tuesday, Sept. 8.



## Couple slain in home

Sometime between noon and 4 p.m. Saturday, a Grosse Pointe Woods couple were killed by shotgun blasts in their home, police said.

The victims were Margaret Ann Benson, 52, and her husband, Ronald David Benson, 49, of Ridgemont Road.

Margaret Benson's body was found by one of the couple's adult daughters, who called police at 4:03 p.m. and reported a possible stabbing.

Officers found Margaret Benson lying on her side in the living room, just inside the screen door, and it appeared she had suffered two shotgun wounds in her back, police said.

Nearby, there were two spent shotgun shells on the living room floor.

Ronald David Benson had also suffered shotgun wounds and was found lying on his stomach on the basement floor. A .20-gauge pump-action shotgun was found near his body.

Police think Margaret Benson's death may have been a homicide and that Ronald David Benson's death may have been a suicide. However, they are awaiting the results of tests being performed by the Wayne County medical examiner's office before making a final determination, Woods public safety inspector Peter Thomas said.

"We don't have any motives in the case," he said. "It appears there were some family troubles at that home, and we are continuing our investigation into it. Right now we're awaiting the results from the medical examiner's office, and once we have them, we'll go to the prosecutor and discuss what happens next."

Thomas said police had been summoned to the home before, but the calls were never over family trouble, just general requests for assistance.

The last call Woods police received from Ronald David Benson was on Friday night, Thomas said. At that time, Benson said he was worried because his wife had not come home yet, and asked police to keep an eye out for her.

"But if you put that in the paper, people will think they had a fight that night, and we have no way of knowing that," Thomas said.

The last time a "chargeable homicide" occurred in the Woods was in the mid 1970s, police said.

The Bensons are survived by their seven children, Debra, Deborah, Denise, Jody Ann, Kim, Ronald and Timothy; and nine grandchildren. Margaret Benson is also survived by her mother, Marguerite and brothers Melvin, Johnny, Ronald and Robert. Ronald David Benson is also survived by his brothers Thomas, Robert, George and Edward; and sisters Blanche, Marion and Ethel.

Services for the Bensons were scheduled to be held at 1 p.m. yesterday, Sept. 9.

## Bummer summer both boon and bust

Did the chilly weather this summer put the heat on local merchants, or were they able to keep their cool?

Richard Roach, manager of the AMC Woods 6 theater on Mack in Grosse Pointe Woods, said ticket sales were down this summer, but attributed it to bad movies rather than the weather or the poor economy.

"We used to have people come to the theater because they wanted to get out of the heat, but most everyone now has air conditioning in their homes, so you can't really say the cool weather has affected ticket sales," he said.

"If we had good movies, I think the people would come out. Last year, the economy wasn't great either, but we had 'Terminator' and that sold out. This year, we haven't had one movie sell out our big room,

which seats 600 people."

The most popular movie of the summer at the AMC Woods 6 was "Sister Act," he said.

Rod Thueme, manager of Damman's Hardware Store on Kercheval in Grosse Pointe City, said his overall sales weren't affected by the fall-like summer. Some items sold better than usual, some worse.

"It all balanced out," he said.

"With the wet weather, there hasn't been a big demand for garden hoses or sprinklers. But sales in paint and housewares are up. When people are stuck at home on a rainy day, they tend to find things to do to improve their indoor surroundings."

Kim Schwarz, owner of Cafe Le Chat, now Cafe Pavel, a gourmet restaurant on Kercheval in Grosse Pointe City that has outdoor seating, said the cool summer has actually improved her business.

"We think it has enhanced our business because it hasn't been so ungodly hot," she said. "When it's hot, people want to go inside for the air conditioning. We've had very pleasant weather."

Not even the rain has deterred her customers from dining outside, she said, because an awning keeps them dry.

Another restaurant that offers outdoor seating (at night) is Sparky Herbert's on Kercheval in Grosse Pointe Park.

A spokesman for the restaurant said, "It's funny. Even though we've had a cooler-than-usual summer, our business hasn't been affected. Sparky's regulars are a pretty hardy, loyal bunch, and for them, it just meant putting on an extra sweater."

The wind, rather than the thermometer, has affected sales at Thomas Hardware Co. on Mack in Grosse Pointe Farms, which specializes in boating equipment, spokesman Todd Thomas said.

"A lot of our customers are (boat) racers, and they race no matter what," even when the weather is cool, he said.

"But we've had a lot of wind this summer, and it's torn up a lot of boats," increasing the demand for his store's merchandise, he said.

On the other hand, ice cream and frozen yogurt sales were far from hot this summer.

An employee of The Country's Best Yogurt (TCBY) on Kercheval in Grosse Pointe City said, "It's been slow."

Over at Baskin-Robbins 31 Flavors on Mack in Grosse Pointe Woods, an employee said, "We've been closing an

hour earlier because of the weather. Last summer, we were open until 11 p.m. This summer, we've been closing at 10 p.m."

Gert Laferte, co-owner of Pointe Pedlar, a store on Kercheval in Grosse Pointe Farms that specializes in kitchenwares, said, "The seasonal merchandise has not sold. Period."

The store's picnic items are

on sale and have been for months. Last week, they were priced at 50 percent off, "but they'll probably go lower than that before we're through," she said.

Pointe Pedlar's sale lasts through Sept. 25. The autumnal equinox, when summer officially gives way to fall, occurs on Sept. 22.

In "Moby Dick" Ishmael offers his experience as a merchant sailor as proof that he's ready to go "a-whaling." But compared to the trials and tribulations aboard a whaling ves-

sel, Capt. Peleg declares, merchant sailing is not worth speaking of.

Capt. Peleg to the contrary, merchant mariners on the Great Lakes earn a hard living, spending long periods of time away from their families and jeopardizing life and limb, to boot.

Tony Gatliff of Grosse Pointe Farms spent 10 years sailing the Great Lakes for Ford Motor Co. until the firm sold the last two ships in its fleet in 1988. Originally he began sailing for the excellent pay, but eventually the sailor's way of life became more of a passion to him.

As a crew member on various Ford ships — the Henry Ford II, the William Clay Ford, the Benson Ford, and the Ernest R. Breech — Gatliff made runs to northern Michigan for raw materials used in the manufacturing of steel at the giant River Rouge complex.

Trips took him to Marquette,

## Former resident wins Emmy

What began as a gofer job for a recording studio in Los Angeles evolved into a career with honors for Mark Keatts, formerly of Grosse Pointe Woods.

Last month he earned an Emmy Award for outstanding achievement in film sound editing for the animated series "Back to the Future."

The cartoon airs on Saturday mornings on Channel 38 at 11 in the Detroit area.

"We were there not expecting to win at all," said Keatts, who received the

Emmy Awards held in Los Angeles last month.

For Keatts, who is 27, this was his second nomination

for an Emmy. He's also been nominated twice for the Golden Reel Award.

Sound editing for animated film involves matching, or "synching up," dialogue with the lip movements of the characters so it appears as though they are actually speaking.

Keatts, who has a bachelor's in music industry management from Wayne State University, and who also studied at the Recording Institute of Detroit, moved to California 2 1/2 years ago to become a music engineer.

"I went to every studio out here," he said, eventually landing a job as a runner for Sound Castle.

The runner position only lasted two weeks. "They started training me from the ground up," he said. "They could hardly pay anyone at the beginning. It was more like a trial basis thing." But Keatts passed the test.

With many sound studios going bankrupt in Hollywood, Keatts was fortunate to get in with right one. "It's going really good," he said.

As for California, the place to be for film sound editing, Keatts said, "I love it."

Keatts is a 1983 graduate of Grosse Pointe North and lived in the Woods until he moved to Glendale, about 10 minutes northeast of Los Angeles.

He was presented his Emmy on national television by John Aniston, who plays Victor in "Days of Our Lives."

In addition to "Back to the Future," other animated series he's worked on are "Tiny Tune Adventures," "Tasmania" and "Batman." Keatts said the usual course for sound editors is to start with cartoons and graduate to feature films, which have larger budgets.

Other projects Keatts has worked on as a sound editor include REO Speedwagon's latest album "The Second Decade of Rock 'n' Roll: 1981-1991"; Ray Conniff's latest album, "S Always Conniff"; prerecorded music by The Party for a live tour the group is making with Color Me Bad; and TV commercials for Love Boat, a Pacific cruise line.

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# Being Japanese for 6 weeks is the experience of a lifetime

Grosse Pointe South High School senior Amanda Brown can't say enough about the six weeks she spent in Japan as part of the Youth For Understanding International Student Exchange.

"It was such an incredible experience," she said. "It was a fascinating country, the people were so nice. I want to go back."

Brown, of Grosse Pointe City, spent the end of June, all of July and the beginning of August living in an apartment above a grocery with the Shimoda family in the Tokyo suburb of Hachioji.

She became part of a family which included Aya, a girl Brown's age; two boys, one older, one younger; parents and grandparents. The Shimodas owned the store they lived above and, because it was open seven days a week, took turns running it.

Brown and Aya got up very early every day to take an 80-minute train ride to school. Aya was placed into the high school, which is designed for higher-level students, based on her scores on Japan's national placement exam. That exam determines what high school a student goes to and what subjects he or she will study.

"Their English skills were real good. Learning English is very important over there," Brown said. "But speaking it is not necessarily as important."

That's why Japanese students study the verbal section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test given to American students and read William Golding's "Lord of the Flies."

On her side, Brown was able to get her point across and understand the gist of what was said to her because of her year of Japanese I at Grosse Pointe

South. The class is taught by a teacher in a remote location and is beamed to several schools by satellite. Students are connected periodically to the teacher by telephone for oral exams.

"But the (Japanese) kids my age weren't into studying as much as you'd think," Brown said. "It all depended on the individual's motivation. Just like here."

And the young people Brown met were as fascinated with the United States as she was with Japan.

"I didn't notice any anti-American feelings at all," she said.

In fact, when she visited her Japanese brother's sixth-grade class, she was the talk of the whole school and younger students peeked into the room to see an American.

"Among people my age, MTV is big over there — so is dancing. And (designer Ralph Lauren's brand) Polo. They loved Polo."

The family had defined roles: the grandmother did most of the cooking, the mother did most of the housework and the father ran the business. He kept the books on an abacus, which he tried teaching to Brown. The concept, coupled with the language barrier, proved too difficult for both of them.

In addition to doing the day-to-day things like going to school, Brown packed a lot of sightseeing into her six-week stay.

The Imperial Palace was one of her favorite stops. She wasn't allowed in because visitors are given access only twice a year, on the new year and the emperor's birthday. But the gardens and the grounds were, she said, something to see.

The Asaksa Temple, the larg-

est temple in the world, was also a stop on her trip.

"On the top of each of these temples is supposed to be the Buddha's ashes, but there are hundreds of temples in Japan and even more in China and Tibet, so you have to wonder how big that guy was," she said.

Brown said some of the nicest things that happened to her weren't planned. For example, the street festival in front of her family's store. In a traditional kimono, she participated in a centuries-old dance.

She was pleasantly surprised by the food, she said.

"Going over I was afraid because I don't really like fish, but everything was great," she said. "Well, except for when we went to a sushi bar and I had to stare at a plate of raw octopus all during dinner."

And she couldn't quite get used to the seaweed that was a staple at most meals.

Brown's trip was sponsored by Youth For Understanding, one of the world's oldest and largest non-profit international exchange programs. It is dedicated to global understanding and world peace.

The entire trip — which be-

gan with a four-day Japanese cultural education class in San Francisco — was paid for by YFU. The trip to San Francisco was paid for by the Grosse Pointe Rotary.

"I'd love to go back," Brown said. "I plan on studying international something in college, but I haven't decided what or what school I want to go to. But this experience will help me with whatever I do."







## Be a photo detective

Did you know that one of the best ways to improve your photography is by closely looking at the pictures of others?

Whether it's browsing through a gallery or leisurely thumbing through a good photography book, many benefits can be yours by taking a good, hard, critical look and analyzing the photographs.

Put on your "detective hat" tune into your emotions and ask yourself some important questions as you "read" a photograph. You'll gain insight and technical skills that will certainly help you in taking your own pictures.

Begin by asking what the subject or main theme of the photograph is. Does it move you and how do you respond to it? How do you suppose the photographer felt about it?

Study the lighting. Is it harsh or soft? What direction is it coming from and what time of day do you think it was? Ask yourself what might happen to the picture if the lighting were different.

What camera position was used — near or far, low angle or high? Why do you think the

photographer used a particular camera position and what does it do for the picture? How might another camera location affect the photograph?

What lens do you think was used and why? Was it a wide-angle, normal or perhaps a telephoto?

How about depth-of-field? Is there a lot or a little? Would a change in depth-of-field alter the final image?

What about shutter speed — fast or slow? Is the subject blurred in motion or caught at the peak of the action? Look for the use of filters or any other special effects, too.

Of course, you should carefully study the composition. How are the elements of the picture arranged and does it all make sense to you?

Is the photograph telling a story? If so, tune in to your feelings about the shot. Try to interpret what the photographer is trying to say and what your responses are.

Becoming a photo "detective" can give you deeper insight into photography, which will most certainly help you with your own pictures.

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# State profits from Bush's pork barrel

The nation's economizing president has dipped into a multibillion-dollar political pork barrel to bolster his faltering hopes for re-election.

True, one of the latest beneficiaries of the federal treasury is the state of Michigan and specifically workers at the General Dynamics M-1 tank plant in Warren.

In his recent Michigan appearance, Vice President Dan Quayle announced that the Pentagon would spend \$250 million to begin work on upgrading the Army's M-1 tanks.

While welcomed by many Michigani-ans, and especially the plant's workers, the announcement obviously was a political move to tap federal funds in a key state in an election year.

The Democratic Congress earlier had appropriated the money for the project — but the administration had declined to spend it and had asked Congress to rescind the appropriation. Congress refused that request.

At that time, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney had made two arguments against such projects: First, the Cold War is over and the tank upgrade project is unnecessary. And, second, the Pentagon is not a social welfare agency and decisions on weapons and arms sales should be made strictly on national security grounds.

So what has changed the administration's mind?

The election, of course.

However, Michigan isn't the only key state in the election to benefit from presidential largesse in recent days.

The president also announced last week that the administration would go ahead with its proposed sale of up to 150 F-16 fighters to Taiwan and strongly consider

a \$5 billion sale of F-15 warplanes to Saudi Arabia.

Texas, Missouri, Indiana, Connecticut and California, also among the key states in the presidential contest, will benefit from such announcements because they just happen to be the locations of plants that manufacture the planes involved.

In addition, the president told farmers in rural South Dakota and Texas that he would spend \$1 billion to subsidize U.S.

wheat sales abroad and an additional \$755 million to aid farmers whose crops were damaged by Hurricane Andrew and by Texas floods.

Earlier, he had ordered the federal government to pick up 100 percent of the uninsured costs of cleanup and rebuilding in Florida after Hurricane Andrew rather than requiring the usual 25 percent contribution from the state.

## For labor, an unpleasant day

In many respects, it was an unpleasant Labor Day for Michigan's organized labor, despite the successful political rallies staged in Detroit and Hamtramck. In fact, it was unpleasant for the nation's union men and women because they represent an increasingly smaller proportion of all American workers and, as a consequence, they no longer have the political clout they once exerted.

True, in Michigan the UAW and the AFL still have great influence in the Democratic Party but new economic reports, as interpreted by the New York Times, "paint a depressing picture of workers struggling to crawl up a down escalator."

The Times referred to Commerce Department reports that showed income growth in 1991 trailed inflation for the first time since 1982 with disposable income per capita, after removing inflation and taxes, failing to grow since President Bush took office.

Unemployment did dip slightly both nationally and in Michigan in August but U.S. reports showed that business and industry lost 167,000 jobs last month and factory employment dipped to its lowest level since April 1983.

Bush, reported to be trailing in Michigan, hoped to closed the gap after his appearances at the Mackinac Bridge and in Hamtramck on Labor Day and his speech today before the Detroit Economic Club.

The Democrats are taking nothing for granted, however. In his Detroit appearance, Vice Presidential nominee Albert Gore told the union rally that the president had turned his back on American workers until the campaign began.

But while economic pessimism may improve the Democratic presidential campaign's hopes, it does nothing for the immediate job prospects for the many unemployed.

That's the reason we say it was not a pleasant Labor Day for union workers or, in fact, for the rest of the people.

An additional presidential pledge covered the rebuilding of Homestead Air Force Base, even though it had been a candidate for closure and other Southern bases in the closure category could have been substituted as a training base.

However, there are a couple of downsides to the new federal burdens the president has imposed on the nation in his re-election campaign.

One is that the pork-barrel moves surely will substantially increase the ever-mounting federal deficit since the president said nothing about ways to pay for them.

Second, they have foreign policy implications because Communist China opposes the sale of combat planes to Taiwan and Israel dislikes the proposed plane shipment to Saudi Arabia.

But in an election year, not many states or citizens will even ask to see the teeth in these national gift horses.

The administration's off-again, on-again actions on upgrading the tanks built at the General Dynamics plant in Warren are instructive.

The fact is that the administration not only reversed its position but it also has authorized the spending of just the \$250 million down payment on the project, as contrasted with the ultimate multibillion-dollar cost of fitting the tanks with new guns and electronic systems.

And approval of the start of the project obviously will make it more difficult for the Defense Department to halt the rest of the spending, as it reportedly would prefer to do.

Sen. Carl Levin, the Michigan Democrat who has led the fight to upgrade the tanks, has been quoted as welcoming the decision — but not the political use that Quayle made of the announcement.

"This is exactly the opposite of what they have been saying for the past three years," Levin told the New York Times.

Very true, Senator, but don't you remember that this is a presidential election year and Bush has said he would do what he has to do to be re-elected?

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## Diversity inches ahead here

Census reports indicate that racial and ethnic diversity is inching its way across the Grosse Pointe community.

In the 1990 census, for example, the population of the Pointes was still 98 percent white but it included 697 Asians and 182 blacks. The proportions of both Asians and blacks more than doubled in the decade of the 1980s.

While increasing diversity poses new problems, there are signs that the Pointes are making progress in accepting people of different racial, cultural and ethnic backgrounds.

Yet many of us in the Pointes obviously still have a long way to go to understand and improve our perceptions of people with racial and ethnic backgrounds that are different from our own.

Those were the reactions of William Weld-Wallis, executive director of the Racial Justice Center of Grosse Pointe, to the recent Sunday Detroit News and Free Press coverage of racial and ethnic problems of Detroit and Grosse Pointe Park residents.

The newspaper hosted a block party for 200 residents of a 12-block area on both sides of Mack Avenue, and then sought the reactions of those attending for inclusion in a series of news stories about the problems of race and integration in that

neighborhood.

One general conclusion that emerged from this group was that the more familiar blacks and whites become with each other, the more they realize the common values and aims that they share.

Better communication between the races is being promoted. The Detroit News and Free Press stories indicated, not only by neighborhood residents but by such schools as St. Clare of Montefalco Church and School and the staffs of neighborhood businesses in Detroit and the Pointes.

Weld-Wallis stressed the point that safety, education, a solid future for their children, nice homes — in other words, stable communities — are among the things that all people really want out of life.

But according to many people attending the block party, there still is concern about negative stereotyping, fear of rejection and hostility, and other problems that often can be attributed to a failure of communication across community and racial lines.

So as greater racial, ethnic and cultural diversity inches its way across the Pointes, there is obvious need for many of us to review our own attitudes and try to accept such changes as the benefit that they really can become for all of us.

## County exec opposes tax hike

Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara is still opposed to the one-half mill increase in the county levy that the county commission is seeking again in November.

McNamara told the Grosse Pointe News that even though he is the county's chief administrative officer, he was neither consulted nor even asked for any input on the proposal that went down to defeat in its first test in the August primary.

Under the commissioners' plan, the tax would raise additional funds to finance public health and mental health services in Wayne County.

The proposal won the approval of only the minimum number of county commissioners when they voted 8-0 in favor of making a second ballot attempt on Nov. 3. But seven other commissioners either were absent or unrecorded on the vote.

One of the eight supporters was David Cavanagh, who represents the Grosse Pointes as the 1st Commissioner District incumbent. He is not seeking re-election and lost his bid for the Democratic nomination for county clerk in the August primary.

McNamara's opposition and the lack of broad support from the commissioners reinforce the view of the Grosse Pointe News that the proposed millage hike is not justified.

Instead, it appears to be another political move by the commissioners to exhibit their support for the poor people in their constituencies by seeking additional tax funds for county health and mental health services.

In fact, McNamara is disputing the power of the commission to deny him the right to veto its resolutions, including those putting issues on the ballot, but the dispute has not yet been adjudicated.

Imponderables can't be solved. The answers can't be looked up somewhere. They're just — something to be pondered.



## New headmaster, new direction

Change. It's the watchword of 1992, politically, sociologically, educationally. We're fed up with everything, and sometimes ready to throw out the good with the bad.

Matthew Hanly, the new headmaster at University Liggett, quotes the dean of the education school at Harvard as saying that we tend to pick on the schools when we're unhappy with ourselves.

A provocative thought. Americans have certainly maintained a steady, vicious attack on their public schools, though private schools have tended to be viewed more favorably. And Liggett has always held a more or less pre-eminent position.

But even at Liggett, the last decade hasn't been all roses. The school has had five headmasters in nine years, counting interims (though Hanly says he can think of schools that have had even more hands on the helm). And nobody at ULS will say so, but rumors abound that the road under the last head had, shall we say, more than its share of bumps.

ULS plunged wholeheartedly into diversifying its student body; like many independent schools, it is way ahead of public schools in its ethnic makeup. But that hasn't been accomplished without difficulty — black students there complained a couple of years ago of feeling invisible, and the result-

ing discussion and disagreement roiled the campus for a while.

But even the students who complained said they believed the school administration was well-intentioned about diversity, but just didn't know how to go about achieving harmony.

That's an illustration of the change that Hanly hopes to bring to the school.

Hanly, who started his duties officially in July, has a background in counseling (before serving as ULS middle school head). He's planning to listen to the kids.

"I hope to create a community of spirit," he said. "That, I think, has been lacking at our school."

Unity has been a popular theme at ULS, but for the last several years, it was focused on physically unifying the campus. Plans to sell the middle school property didn't work out for a variety of reasons, though. Now the concept of unity is re-focused — on emotional unity.

"I've seen us operate as virtually four separate schools," Hanly said. "I'm frustrated that we give so much play to our differences and so little to our commonality."

"We are all young adolescents."

And not necessarily rich adolescents, either. Hanly is eager to make the point that about a quarter of the 6th-12th graders receive financial assistance — and that almost all (98 percent) of the assistance is need-based. And he'd like to see the assistance base widened to include some of the younger kids.

As to ethnic diversity, even Hanly was surprised when he looked at the numbers. After attending a conference on diversity while he was middle school head, he returned to examine the enrollment lists. He

discovered that about 28-29 percent of the students were children of color, including blacks, Asians, Hispanics, and Middle Easterners. But, he said, he was so accustomed to just seeing them as kids, he had hardly noticed.

An emotional community needs stability, which Hanly also hopes to provide. With luck, the school won't be looking at any more rounds of revolving headmasters. And Hanly, who has known since April that he would be headmaster, had a hand in selecting his successor at the middle school, as well as the new upper school head and dean of students (a new position).

That dean is part of the new approach. There has been a great "perceived need," as Hanley put it, for increased emphasis on values and ethics, as well as order and consistent discipline at the upper school. Dean Dana Boocock will handle those areas — and supervise a brand-new program of community service.

Community service isn't new to Liggett, of course, but this year, for the first time, it will be required for graduation.

"There are both pros and cons to making it a requirement," Hanley conceded. The idea has been floating around the school for some time, but it was Hanley who gave the impetus to formalizing the requirement.

Students will have to do 25 hours of service during school breaks or after school hours, with the intent that the involvement will heighten their sense of belonging to the larger community. It's part of the increased emphasis on values and ethics that Hanly hopes will be inculcated both by example and by new content in existing classes.

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

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
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
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## Confident Cadillac wades into 'fiercely competitive' market

Once around the track behind the Hamtramck assembly plant was not enough. Not when the vehicle was a '93 Seville Touring Sedan (STS) with a 295-horsepower 32-valve Northstar engine under the hood and there were a couple of straightaways on which to push that rascal.

The Eldorado Touring Coupe, or ETC, was almost as impressive in its turn, and for some the elegant Allantes, most with their tops down in the heat of the late-August sun, were the frosting on the cake.

Cadillac General Manager John Grettenberger described the near-term future of the luxury-car market as "fiercely competitive" at the briefing that preceded track time. On the strength of four new models this past year, Cadillac sales are up 12.5 percent since January, he said.

Once the playing field of only Cadillac and Lincoln, the luxury-car market today has expanded to include 23 manufacturers offering 66 different models. One-third of the competitors have emerged in the last six years, he said, and we're not through yet.


In a darkened, air-conditioned meeting room in the Poletown plant that houses the assembly operation, reporters, editors and Cadillac staff filled all available seats. Grettenberger and his managers talked about the characteristics of the 4.6-liter Northstar engine and the electronically controlled 4T80-E transmission. The message is clear: Cadillac does not intend to take a back seat to any luxury-car makers, particularly those hailing from Japan and Germany.

The Northstar V-8 bowed earlier this year in the Allante, the Pininfarina-styled two-seater that has been a kind of engineering car and flagship of sorts for GM's prestige car divi-

sion. (Attention: Cadillac's marketing chief told reporters the average household income of Allante buyers is a cool \$150,000. Act accordingly.)

Allante, the child Mom likes best, gets the top new features first, before passing them down to siblings.

This fall, the Northstar engine will be standard in the STS and Eldorado Touring Coupe; a 270-horsepower Northstar is optional in the new Eldorado Sport Coupe. A road-sensing suspension, that adjusts each wheel independently to its road conditions, takes inch-by-inch "readings" at up to 60 mph. All-speed traction control cuts power to any wheel that is spinning, allowing maximum control of the vehicle on slippery surfaces.

Cadillac showed us its new bigger-than-ever '93 Fleetwood earlier this summer. Also in the fall lineup are Coupe and Sedan de Villes, the Sixty Special sedan and a standard Seville and standard Eldorado.

Forty-five minutes wasn't enough time to really get to know the STS, Eldos and Allante, but it was a lot better than nothing. The acceleration available at already-high speeds with the Northstar "package," which includes the new 4T80-E transmission, is impressive.

The STS, with longer wheelbase and a slight weight advantage over the Eldo Touring Coupe, held the road better on turns. Both were superior to the Allante, which was too

## Curing dents, dings, dimples

With decals, the sign-makers carefully spelled "Dent Eliminators," a phone number and some ad information on the sides of Doug Ziegenbein's new gray minivan in Madison Heights last week.

Inside the garage of his father's specialty car business, Prestige Motors, Ziegenbein demonstrated how he smooths out dings, bumps and dents in cars.

His model was a shiny new black Pontiac Grand Am that, along with hundreds of other vehicles, had been damaged in a hailstorm earlier this summer. The trunk lid was covered with small red circles indicating damaged areas. Most of them were imperceptible to the casual observer.

"They show up in certain lighting, and they are unacceptable — a dealer can't sell a new car this way," Ziegenbein said, turning on a lamp and setting to work.

"The method I use corrects the blemishes without having to repaint the vehicle," he said. "We call it massaging the metal."

Ziegenbein's tools are metal rods of varying sizes. It took a month-long training course to learn to use them properly. A skilled person can push out a dent as deep as an inch with a diameter of perhaps several inches, he said.

The traditional banging out of dents has a couple of drawbacks, he said. You have to remove inner door panels and other obstructions in order to do the bumping, and the process often cracks the exterior paint.

"On doors, we try to go down through the window area," he said. "Sometimes it's necessary to drill a small hole to get the rods where they need to go, or the technician can go through exist-

ing rustproofing and drain holes."

Newer cars are easier to repair than old ones, he said. Much depends on the thickness and "memory" qualities of the metals used. While he works out of a setting filled with vehicles like '56 Chevrolets and Thunderbirds, some Ferraris and Mercedes of several vintages — Prestige Motors handles these wonderful pre-owned vehicles and has a showroom and back area full of them — Ziegenbein seems reluctant to get too involved in that area.

"Dent Eliminators is about nine months old," he said. "A colleague and I travel to dealerships and collision shops to do our work. A collision shop, for example,

may not want to bother with the small dents we repair quickly."

Used car lots are a good market for his services, he said. Often cars have blemishes he can fix faster and cheaper than a dealership's own bump shop can do the job. Individuals preparing to sell their cars might benefit from some body work that improves appearance.

Everyone knows hailstorms and shopping mall parking lots are hard on cars. But pine cones? Ziegenbein said he was at Lake Tahoe earlier this year. "They have huge pine cones there and they can really do some damage to anything they hit," he said.





But sometimes the commercials were more entertaining than the movie.

For other viewers, public television provided special programs featuring symphony orchestras, operas and great individual artists.

The soaps, which many people deplore, obviously have a following. Statistics show that 55 million Americans watch them and they live in all regions of the nation — rural and urban. Professors, doctors, stockbrokers, writers and politicians are among the fans. Soaps are not the sole province of lonely, older people sitting at home.

Radio soaps provided an outlet for yesterday's mothers. They were great to listen to while washing dishes, clothes, floors and kids. Never mind that radio soaps were filled with stock characters involved in improbable happenings.

In contrast, television soaps are sometimes too realistic, as they deal with recognizable people wrestling with the problems of the real world.

Watching the soaps is a form of visual daydreaming. We may not live in the never-never land but for half an hour we can visit soap opera characters in their perfectly appointed homes, wearing beautiful designer gowns, having stimulating conversations and living highly charged lives.

Even the most loyal fan prob-

ably wouldn't argue that soaps are educational. This has increasingly become the province of the VCR. Even with all the available entertainment, including soaps, there are times when twirling the dial fails to turn up a program of interest.

At those times a VCR is a bonus. In many households it has become an integral component of the television set. Proof is seen by the proliferation of video stores, where we can pick and choose from hundreds of titles, concerts, plays or how-to-tapes.

Home video brings the whole world into your living room at your convenience, says Ronald Gross, author of "The Listening Learner." You can have the finest lecturers available at your

disposal at the touch of a button.

You can study the basics of bass fishing, cake decorating or puppy training. You can become acquainted with the works of Van Gogh, sit in on university-level courses in 20th century American history, learn about gardening from Jerry Baker, opera from tenor Vincent Gary, wine from international expert Hugh Johnson, and golf from Jack Nicklaus.

This push for something more than entertainment began with Jane Fonda. Her first workout tape in 1982 sold a million copies. Follow-up tapes have now reached the two million mark.

"Learning by video is ideal for older viewers," Gross said. "Older people like to think

about what they're learning and not go quickly or superficially. This opportunity to do it at their own pace and be able to repeat and review, so that it can sink in, can be a real advantage."

Video stores are not the best place to look for video workshops. Video stores carry entertainment tapes. That leaves department stores, bookstores, mail and telephone-order houses, the public library and specialty outlets, like golf shops for golf tapes or garden supply stores for gardening tapes.

Another source: mail order catalogs. Try "The Video Gift Book," Videotakes, 220 Shrewsbury Ave., Red Bank, N.J. 07701. It contains 3,500 listings, ranging from art instruction to coin collecting.

# Poll reveals beliefs about terminal illness, hospice care

Nine out of 10 Americans say they would prefer to be cared for and die either in their own home or a family member's home if they were facing a terminal illness, according to recent Gallup Poll findings by the National Hospice Organization (NHO) in Arlington, Va.

At the same time, the survey revealed some unfamiliarity with the term "hospice," which NHO believes could keep people from seeking this kind of care. Survey results show that even more educational effort is needed before hospice becomes a permanent part of our everyday health care lexicon.

"The Gallup Poll results tell us people want what we have to offer," said Sondra Seely, director of Cottage Hospice. "The quality of life for people with a limited life expectancy is vastly improved at home with hospice care. But we're concerned that too many people are unable to associate the term 'hospice care' with services they say they want. Although not addressed in the survey, this also tells us they may be very unlikely to know if a hospice program exists in their community."

Hospice is a special kind of care designed to provide support for people in the final phase of a terminal illness and

their families. Hospice care seeks to enable patients to carry on an alert, pain-free life and to manage other symptoms so that their last days may be spent with dignity and quality at home or in a home-like setting.

In the survey, respondents were asked to assume they were terminally ill and had only six months to live. An overwhelming proportion, 86 percent, said they would want to receive care (and ultimately die) in their own homes or those of family members.

According to the survey, 60 percent of respondents reported that they would be "very interested" in considering using a comprehensive program of care in which physicians, nurses, counselors and other professionals kept them comfortable and alert at home, while emotional and other support also was given to family members (a description of some aspects of hospice care). An additional 28 percent indicated that they would be "somewhat interested."

Yet, at the same time, slightly over one-fifth (or 22 percent) of the people who had high interest in the described service did not opt for hospice when asked to choose "by name." The poll showed that

confusion or unfamiliarity with the term "hospice" caused hesitation of respondents who said they were either "somewhat" or "not at all likely" to consider using hospice.

"We need to redouble our already considerable efforts to educate people about what hospice is," said Seely. "Public and professional education is already a priority of Michigan Hospice Organization and Cottage Hospice."

"We publish and distribute brochures/newsletters, maintain close contacts with community organizations such as churches, encourage referrals from health professionals, hospitals and insurers and develop close ties with the families we serve. We are available to speak upon request to local organizations."

Women were more likely than men (by 16 percent) to express very high interests in this type of care, which may be reflective of the fact that women carry more responsibility for family health care decisions in many American households. In the South, where there are more and larger hospice programs and a higher percentage of retirees, respondents were somewhat more likely to consider hospice services. College graduates and higher income respondents exhibited higher

interest than others.

Despite an apparent informal gap, the hospice concept, with roots dating back hundreds of years, is only 18 years old in America but has experienced tremendous growth here recently. Today, it is one of the fastest growing segments of the health care provider community, with the number of programs doubling just since 1983 and many urban centers experiencing a rapidly expanding daily patient census.

Hospice growth can be attributed, in part, to the fact that the hospice patient/family-centered care model appeals to people in this age of proliferation of life-prolonging high technology which extends life often at the expense of the quality of that life. Other factors such as longer life expectancy, a growing senior population, rising numbers of AIDS patients, skyrocketing health costs, and growing acceptance by medical professionals and the public of the hospice concept of care have contributed to the growth.

Cottage Hospice which has a daily census of 30, served 136 patients and families last year. Volunteers from the community, which now number 65, contributed more than 3,404 hours of service.

Two private, non-profit groups assisted NHO with this research effort — the newly formed National Hospice Foundation of Washington, D.C., which funded the Gallup Poll research as one of its first educational efforts, and The Hospice Foundation of Miami, Fla., which assisted with funding for dissemination of the survey results.

Results of the Gallup Poll are based on a survey of randomly selected telephone households in the continental United States. The survey was conducted in February and March of this year by The Gallup Organization under contract with the National Hospice Organization. For a survey of 1,000 randomly selected adults, the sampling tolerance is plus 3 percent. This means that if 100 different samples were drawn and surveyed from the same population during the same time period, 95 times out of 100 would be the results if all adults were surveyed.

There are currently 1,830 hospice programs in the United States, and hospices served

over 210,000 terminally ill persons and their families in 1991. Hospice costs are covered by the federal Hospice Medicare Benefit, by Medicaid in some states, by CHAMPUS, a program for military personnel and their dependents, and most private insurers.

Cottage Hospice is recognized nationally as an innovator in the care and counseling of terminally ill patients and their families. It is a program of Cottage Hospital, 159 Kercheval, Grosse Pointe Farms. Cottage Hospital is a member of Henry Ford Health System.

## Campaign receives support

Grosse Pointers driving, bicycling, walking or jogging along Lakeshore in Grosse Pointe Farms this summer have had their imaginations piqued as they viewed the piles of dirt and construction equipment on traffic islands that bisect the beautiful boulevard.

When the grading, landscaping and irrigation are complete this fall, the vision of the city of Grosse Pointe Farms and the Grosse Pointe Farms Foundation for the \$350,000 restoration of Lakeshore will be apparent for all to see.

Meanwhile, members of the Grosse Pointe Farms Foundation, a private charitable organization which supports projects for the public good, continue to encourage and cajole their fellow residents to contribute \$270,000 to its Adopt-an-Island campaign.

"Lakeshore is a county road," said Daniel Grady, president of the foundation. "Since the county has limited money and a broad spectrum of projects to fund, it hasn't been able to keep the road up to date. The Grosse Pointe Farms Foundation allows the community to fund projects for which there are no tax dollars available, but which we feel are important."

Since 1991, private citizens, city employees, community organizations and some corporations have contributed \$150,000

to the fund, which makes the foundation's 19 trustees hopeful that their goal will be reached by the target date of Jan. 1, 1993. Foundation trustees themselves have contributed \$35,128.

Foundation trustee Hugo S. Higbie and his family exemplify those who have chosen to adopt an island in honor of their ancestors. They have adopted the island on the corner of Moran and Lakeshore. It was at this site in 1898 that the Hugo Scherers built their home. In 1927, Mr. and Mrs. Harley Green Higbie, Hugo Higbie's parents, built their residence. Today the properties are the site of the Scherbrook development.

"As a foundation trustee, I am supportive of the Adopt-an-Island program because it is an opportunity to enhance our community," Higbie said. "But, as a resident of the Farms, I also appreciate this chance to honor my ancestors."

More than \$11,000 has been contributed by members of St. Paul's parish for the beautification of the islands fronting the church.

"Contributors have been more than willing to help because the project enhances both the community and the church," said foundation trustee Frisky Hickey, who also is the president of the Grosse Pointe Farms Beautification Commission.

"More than a dozen friends of Grosse Pointe Academy have adopted one of the islands in front of the school," said Dr. Sidney DuPont, headmaster, who also is a member of the beautification commission and has been known to pull weeds and water day lilies on the islands in front of Scherbrook.

Farms employees have contributed more than \$3,000 to the project. City Manager Richard Solak said that "although only a handful of employees reside in Grosse Pointe Farms, many have a certain pride in the uniqueness of the community they serve. We have received contributions from all departments, and hope to raise the total collected much higher."

And Grady reports that the foundation has received several contributions from corporate representatives because "Lakeshore is not just a Grosse Pointe Shores or Grosse Pointe Farms boulevard, it is part of the fabric of greater Detroit."

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## Park is a good investment, noted bond-rating firm says

Grosse Pointe Park recently received the second highest grade assigned by the national municipal debt rating firm, Standard & Poor's.

The Park got a "AA" rating, which means it has a very strong capacity to pay the interest and repay the principal on its loans.

"This rating is greatly the result of the professionalism, background and conservative fiscal management that the (city) council has brought to this city over the last decade," said Park city manager Dale Krajniak.

There are two main companies that rate municipalities in North America: Standard & Poor's, and Moody's Investor's Service, both headquartered in New York City.

The two companies have similar rating systems. The top rating issued by Standard & Poor's is AAA, the lowest is D. The top rating issued by Moody's is Aaa, the lowest is C.

Debts in the top four categories in either of the two rating systems are known as "invest-

ment-grade bonds," said Alfred Diebel, second vice president of the public finance group of Manufacturers' Bank (which recently merged with Comerica).

Debts ranked in the lower categories (starting with BB in Standard & Poor's system and Ba in Moody's system) are commonly known as "junk bonds" because they contain speculative elements and their futures can't be secured, he said.

There are plus and minus modifiers within each category. For example, using the AA category in Standard & Poor's system, a debt may receive the rating AA plus, AA (as did the Park), or AA minus. Of the five Pointes and Harper Woods and St. Clair Shores, only the Park, Grosse Pointe Woods and St. Clair Shores have received a municipal debt rating in the past several years.

Standard & Poor's said St. Clair Shores was last rated in 1987, and that it received an A minus at that time.

Grosse Pointe Woods received a AA minus rating from Moody's in 1987, a representative for that firm said.

Municipal bonds "are one of the most critical means by which infrastructure is paid for in North America," Diebel said. "They not only fund necessities, like sewers, but perks, like parks and zoos."

The Park council and administration applied for a debt rating — the city's first ever — several months ago because they wanted to issue a limited tax general obligation bond (LTGO) to pay for about \$2.3 million in improvements at city hall.

Diebel helped the city apply for the rating.

He said Moody's and Standard & Poor's base their ratings on four fundamental factors: the municipality's economic strength and diversity, its fiscal strength, its professional management (and political stability), and how much debt the community has on its books.

Any of these factors can affect a municipality's ability to pay its debts, he said.

There are essentially three ways a municipality can issue debt, he said: through short-term general obligation notes (when the debt has to be paid off within 10 years), long term obligation bonds (when payments can be spread over more than 10 years), and revenue bonds.

In addition to paying off the principal in annual installments, the municipality must also pay interest on the loan semi-annually (usually every six months), Diebel said.

Municipalities can use funds generated through property taxes to pay off short-term notes and long-term bonds. However, revenue bonds can't be repaid through property taxes, rather, they must be



paid off with the earnings from a public enterprise. For example, a revenue bond for sewer replacement can be paid for from the fees the city collects for water and sewage service, Diebel said.

State law prescribes what the terms of general obligation notes and bonds and revenue bonds should be, and before such a debt can be issued in Michigan, it must be approved by the Michigan Department of Treasury, he said.

There are two kinds of general obligation bonds: unlimited tax general obligation (UTGO) bonds, which are usually safer for investors, and limited tax general obligation bonds (LTGOs), which are riskier and therefore earn a higher rate of return.

"Yield follows risk," Diebel said.

The difference between UT-

GOs and LTGOs is the amount of tax the city can levy to repay the loans.

When a city issues an unlimited tax general obligation bond, it means that voters in the community have authorized the city to levy taxes in any amount necessary to pay back the principal and interest.

The city can issue a limited tax general obligation bond without voters' approval. However, it can levy taxes only up to the maximum allowed by the city charter.

If the maximum allowed isn't enough to meet the bond payments, the investor could lose part of his return, Diebel said.

In Michigan, after a debt has received a grade from a municipal debt-rating company and the approval of the state treasury department, the municipality can begin to accept sealed bids on the interest rate from

banks and investment firms.

Under Michigan law, the debt must be awarded to the bank or investment firm that offers the lowest net interest cost.

The Park received five bids, and the debt was awarded to the national investment firm of Clayton, Brown & Associates, which offered an interest rate of 5.6956 percent, Diebel said.

The next lowest bidder was Manufacturers' Bank, which offered 5.71 percent interest, followed by bids of 5.74 percent, 5.78 percent, and 5.8 percent interest, he said.

"They were all pretty close. They were all very aggressive bids, reflective of the investors' eagerness to purchase this debt," he said.

Grosse Pointe Park's payments to Clayton, Brown & Associates will be spread over 20 years.

The avid boat enthusiast said some people have questioned his loyalties and are wondering why he chose to help those who have lost their homes rather than their boats.

"People have said to me 'why don't you help the boaters,'" he said. "But I think the people who have lost their homes and didn't have insurance are more important. Most of the boaters probably have insurance."

The center, located in the Jefferson Beach Marina complex, 24400 East Jefferson, will be open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. every day until Sept. 15. Signs will be posted showing the way to the drop-off site.

Someone will be on hand to help unload donations.

Residents who want to make a monetary donation can send checks payable to the Salvation Army.

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

### Hall of fame elects Cross

## Bridge

**HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION**  
**BRIDGE BY WOODY BOYD** ♠♥♦♣

There are a number of fancy bidding gimmicks that we keep in seclusion for a seldom, but oh so essential specific use. When such a monumental bid is necessary, in the description of one's thirteen pasteboards, it 'tis a blessing to have such a gadget in your bidding bag.

One of the most difficult hands to describe over partners one no trump is the two suiter of at least five cards in each. Years ago Ira Rubin and Phil Feldesman conquered this problem by limiting all three bids by responder to particularize just such a holding. Stayman's search for a four card major fit and Jacoby transfers were used at the two level to ask or tell about most of the common holdings and Lebensohl if there was intervention, but three bids by responder were sanctoriously reserved to portray two suiters. Ira never got involved with any artificial bid that he didn't complicate the issue, but in its simplest form, here's how it works.

Three clubs and diamonds promised at least five-five in the minors. Clubs was invitational and diamonds forcing to game with slam search implications. Three hearts and spades promised at least five-five in the majors. Hearts was invitational and spades forcing to game with the same slam implications. If the no trump opener rebid three no trump he denied holding either four cards in one of the stipulated suits or less than seven cards in the major or minor shown by the responder. Any other bid had forcing intentions and showed top side of no trump values. Four clubs by either partner was gerber and suggested only doubt about hand was number of controls. No trump bidder could pass three clubs or three hearts with minimal opener and no fit.

All bids by opener at four level (other than gerber call) promised length and forward going interest. Five clubs over three clubs or three diamonds showed fit, but no slam interest with some unstipulated defect in no trump hand (possibly worthless doubleton that defense might run against three no trump).

The bid is on my convention card when playing with some of my favorites even though it's use is naturally limited. Today, I write about it as on two occasions this summer it came in handy and landed us a top. Once in Grosse Pointe with Jack Danaher and more recently with one of my favorite Oakland partners, Dave Buskirk.

Try it for size and see if you like it.

A word about the bidding. Three diamonds was forcing showing minors. Three hearts acknowledge minors and showed heart control. Three spades showed control. Four clubs was gerber and five clubs was no aces and useable void which must be spades because of preceding bid. North now knew his cards were working and bid the slam in his best minor. It was a lay-down in either minor and a top for Dave and this columnist, but three no trump played by the field fared badly. Those in the minor game had the second best match point score. Bidding gimmicks have their glorious moments!

## 'Vegas' hits jackpot

"Honeymoon in Vegas," a non-stop series of hilarious situations, is comedy at its best.

A romantic farce, it is seamless from beginning to end. Written and directed by Andrew Bergman, it boasts an outstanding cast. Even the bit players and extras are funny. Nothing has been left out right down to director of photography William Frakas' beautiful shots of the show-stopping finale.

In the prelude, we are introduced to Jack (Nicholas Cage) rushing through hospital corridors to visit his mother (Anne Bancroft). Hollow-eyed, indomitable, she grabs his hand and demands that he never marry.

Jack, whose longtime girlfriend Betsy (Sarah Jessica Parker) is getting tired of the dating game and wants to be married, is reluctant to make such a promise. But when he hears his mother's last words, "No one will ever love ya like I do," he promises to honor her dying wish.

Actually, Jack is marriage shy because of his profession. He is a private eye whose specialty is getting evidence for husbands and wives who suspect their spouses of cheating.

But love conquers all, even death-bed requests, so still reluctant but scared of losing Betsy, Jack flies off with her to Las Vegas where they intend to be married.

By coincidence, they arrive during a convention of Elvis impersonators.

After checking into a luxurious hotel, Jack and Betsy make arrangements for an evening wedding. But a funny thing happens on the way to the altar.

To pass the time, they make a tour of the game room where they are spotted by ace card shark Tommy Korman (James Caan) who is still mourning his wife Donna.

When Tommy sees Betsy he is astonished by her resemblance to Donna (also played by Parker in flashbacks).

Setting a trap for the unsuspecting Jack, he invites him to a poker game. Jack, who considers himself somewhat of a whiz at the game, accepts and winds up owing \$65,000, which he cannot pay.

Tommy graciously offers to cancel the debt if Jack will agree to loan him Betsy for a weekend — for companionship only.

The rest of the story is a hilarious succession of Jack's misadventures trying to catch up with Betsy. The search culminates in a spectacular scene in which we see a troupe of Elvis wannabes sky-diving over Las Vegas at night all wearing sequined jump suits with flares attached to their boots.

Caan oozes charm. His timing is perfect as the devious "King of the Rackets." Cage is in control as Jack until his situation heats up and he becomes more like the familiar Cage we have seen in "Raising Arizona" and "Wild at Heart." Parker is super as Betsy, who behaves sanely and at the same time retains a sense of humor.

Others who contribute to this outstanding comedy are Robert Costanzo, a blue collar worker who is sure his wife is having an affair with Mike Tyson; Peter Boyle as the Hawaiian chief; and Johnny Williams as Johnny Sandwich, Tommy's errand boy; who jumps to his commands but not before he stops to eat.

"Honeymoon in Vegas" is topnotch entertainment. It is a model for what good comedy should be. It will take some doing to equal or surpass it.

### Greenfield Village shows antique cars

"Brassy" activity will fill Greenfield Village when more than 200 vintage motor cars roll in for the 42nd annual Old Car Festival, Sept. 12-13.

A panorama of the history of America's early motoring days unfolds as automobiles, trucks, motorcycles and bicycles built before 1930 are displayed. But visitors get to see this diverse gathering of early automobiles in action.

"The Old Car Festival provides visitors a rare opportunity to learn more about antique cars and their preservation from the people who own and drive them," said Randy Mason, a former museum curator, who will narrate the festival's vehicle parades. Both drivers and machines are put to the test in a series of races and contests to determine skill and maneuverability.

Collectors from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and as far away as Missouri will demonstrate the skills motorists needed to drive and maintain their horseless carriages in the days before modern "conveniences" like service stations and paved highways.

As part of the festival, a 100-mile Lansing-to-Dearborn run will put drivers and their pre-1915 one- and two-cylinder autos to the test. 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## Much ado about the Bard

From McLean, Va. . . . During his 25 years of life, our son has made three major moves — from the plush enclaves of Grosse Pointe to the rugged splendors of Greenbush and now to Foggy Bottom in Washington, D.C.

For three weeks he has bravely survived life in an unfurnished apartment. After much fruitless dickering with our local moving firms, we finally received the message — no commitment available — and we decided to seize the dilemma by its horns.

Consequently, a Ryder van became our clumsy chariot for two long days and a night, over the twisting hills and dales of southern Michigan, into Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and at last, Virginia. Not only was our despairing son and heir relieved to see us, but he also was very happy to receive his belongings: furniture, kitchen utensils, and six huge boxes of books.

After the tedious business of unpacking and putting away agreed to give his "bookaholic" mother a real treat the next day in the form of a visit to The Folger Shakespeare Library right in the heart of Washington. The Folger, a striking white marble edifice, is situated across the street from the Jefferson Building, the oldest part of the Library of Congress.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Clay Folger gave their Shakespearean collection to the American people 60 years ago in 1932 in this Grecian-style building. While a young student at Amherst College, Folger was fortuitously inspired by a Ralph Waldo Emerson lecture to buy an inexpensive set of Shakespeare's works. This simple purchase marked the beginning of a great collection, amazing in its range and variety, which now consists of approximately 280,000 books and manuscripts, plus paintings, drawings, engravings and prints. Also, there are many musical instruments, costumes, and films which reflect that golden Renaissance era. Incidentally, this incomparable treasure is administered by the trustees of Amherst College, Folger's alma mater.

Typical of their thoughtful concern, Mrs. Folger insisted the frieze, a horizontal band of carvings around a wall, be placed at eye-level rather than at the usual spot near the top of the building. As a result,



blind people as well as children can feel the sculptured figures. The Georgian-style facade is decorated with nine bas-reliefs depicting scenes from Shakespeare's plays.

Outdoors there is a small, charming garden featuring herbs and flowers of the kind grown during the Bard's time. The east lawn also has several comfortable benches under spreading trees which provide shade and a retreat for quiet meditation. At the west end there is a statue of Puck presiding over a pool and a fountain. Inside there is a wee Elizabethan theater complete with three-tiered gallery, carved oak columns, and topped with a canopy ceiling — all reminiscent of an inyard theater of Shakespeare's age.

Displayed in all its glory in the magnificent Great Hall is the excellent exhibit of fine and historic bookbindings from The Folger. Heading the exhibit, as a magnificent centerpiece, is the First Folio, the 1623 collection of Shakespeare's work. It was a thrilling introduction to what was to follow — 15th century bindings on incunabula, bindings from the reign of Queen Elizabeth I, bindings from the Restoration, vellum bindings of the 16th and 17th centuries, lovely embroidered and velvet bindings, fore-edge paintings, various clasps and ties from the 15th-18th centuries, and bindings from the reign of Queen Anne to King George III.

To see all these books in so many types of bindings makes one admire the unsung craftsmen who created such artistic and protective covers. We noted, of course, that all of these gorgeous artifacts were owned by royalty, noblemen, and other personages of wealth and influence. Obviously, books were cherished items to be guarded and adorned.

From a "bookaholic's" point of view, I believe that we should take good care of those books we have and wish to keep far into the future. It was inspiring for me to visit The Folger and to see how Mr. and Mrs. Folger made it possible for generations of Americans to share and enjoy the richness of the Shakespearean legacy.

## Autumn color display expected on schedule

Cool weather may have dampened plans of Michiganders who thrive on summer, but fall color buffs should enjoy a spectacular viewing season, according to AAA Michigan.

"People are already getting excited because of reports that Upper Peninsula trees were changing color in early August," said AAA Michigan member services director Peter Erickson. "While that may be true in isolated areas, the traditional fall color season is still on target to begin in mid-September."

"Weather conditions in early September largely determine the success of the fall color display," he said. "If we have bright sunny days and cool nights, we can expect a good show. Daylight length is also significant. Shorter days cause leaves to stop producing chlorophyll and they lose their green color."


Michigan's rainy summer helped growing conditions, which means that tree leaves will be bigger and healthier

when they turn to autumn shades.

Visitors to Michigan's fall color panorama will find it displayed on 65 species of trees in 18 million acres of forest. The show will peak in mid-September in the Upper Peninsula and northern tip of the Lower Peninsula. Late September marks the peak in the remaining northern third of the Lower Peninsula. Early-to-mid October in mid-Michigan and mid-to-late October in southern lower Michigan round out the color show.

Fall color is particularly impressive around lake areas because the nearby water keeps the soil constantly moist. With the five Great Lakes and more than 11,000 inland lakes, leaf-peepers will find some of the best color-viewing around Michigan lakes. However, the peak time for viewing is generally a week or so later near lakes than in forested areas.

AAA Michigan has created nine driving routes this year that focus on fall color around the Great Lakes. The routes



range from 53 to 100 miles and from one to two hours each way. Free copies of the routes are available to the public at all full-service branches statewide.

Travelers can also find weekly fall color updates in their local newspapers and on their favorite radio stations between early September and late October.

Current owner Ron Fox will show a home movie of the Dodge family. The program will begin at 6:30 p.m. and pre-paid tickets are \$50 for non-members and \$45 for DHS members.

## The birds and the plants (forget the bees)

If you are a birdwatcher as well as a gardener, you will have bird-friendly flowers and plants in your garden. Catbirds, cardinals and thrashers enjoy dogwood, honeysuckle and hawthorn. Columbine, trumpet vine and cannas attract hummingbirds.

Birds are a great asset in gardens, not only for their songs and bright plumage, but for their immense value as insect eaters. (It's possible, as well, to plant herbs to repel insects. Mint will discourage bugs in vegetable gardens, especially near cabbage and broccoli, and basil will keep flies away. Garlic will keep marauding cats away from your roses.)

There are, of course, some plants that are harmful to birds, but the birds seem to know which ones they are and avoid them. Birds and plants generally seem to co-exist quite happily, but there are a few plants that birds really hate and will actually destroy.

In this category are any plants that the birds perceive as stringy. Spider plants, ferns of many kinds, palms and bamboo are some of them. An asparagus fern will vanish completely in a few days. And while birds will eat most kinds of herbs, they will not touch rosemary or mint.

Sunflowers are wonderful and natural bird-feeders. The Russian mammoth is a good one and produces flower heads more than a foot across on stems 10 to 12 feet tall. During the growing season, the sunflower's practice of turning its head toward the sun as the sun's position shifts in the sky makes it an interesting plant to watch. Cardinals, finches and sparrows all love to feast on the maturing seeds.

Francisco Pizarro, arriving in Peru in 1532, was amazed at the giant sunflowers he saw there, which were venerated by the Inca empire as the image of its sun god. The priestesses, the maidens of the sun, wore long golden disks on chains around their necks depicting the sunflower.

The North American plains Indians considered sunflower seeds sacred food. They placed ceremonial

bowls of sunflower seeds on the graves of their dead for food to sustain them on their long and dangerous hunting journeys.

Dahlias are another late-summer flower beloved by many. This tuberous, rooted plant comes in every conceivable shade and combination of shades, with the exception of blue, and blooms exuberantly from August until frost stops its vivid display. A member of the daisy family, dahlias grow wild in Mexico and are named for Dr. Dahl, a Swedish botanist.

Modern varieties have lost their old habit of hiding their blooms under their foliage and now flaunt their lovely flowers on strong stems high above the leaves. They are easy to grow and very accommodating as to where they are located in the garden.

Most of us are only too familiar with two plants which encroach upon our lawns no matter how zealously we try to keep them out — the dandelion and the clover.

Dandelions originated in ancient Greece. Historians believe they were one of the bitter herbs spoken of in the Old Testament. The botanical name for dandelion, taraxacum, is a Greek word meaning "remedy for a disorder." The American Indians called it "strong root" and used it medicinally.

In Russia, some experiments have been conducted in an effort to create a rubber substitute from the milky juice of the dandelion. Dandelions have been scientifically proven to have a beneficial effect upon the liver and kidneys, and are very good sources of vitamins A, B, C, and E, as well as



calcium, potassium, magnesium and iron.

Clover traces its long history back to the days when St. Patrick used it to demonstrate to the peasants of Ireland the unity of the Trinity. The peasants used to put clover leaves in their shoes to protect the wearers from evil spirits, and to find a four-leaf clover was, and still is, considered a sign of good luck.

The clover was used by the Greeks and Romans to mark festive occasions, as garlands to decorate banquet halls and as flavoring

for wine. It is the state flower of Vermont and has long been used by gourmet cooks everywhere for its unique honey-like flavor.

Clover butter is a delicate spread for tea sandwiches or toast. To make it, pull off the petals from the flower head. You need two heaping tablespoons of them. Blend with one stick of sweet butter and one tablespoon of clover honey. Refrigerate for about an hour before using.

You will have a new understanding of the expression being in clover.



## Household Help by John Amantea

**Q.** I have had a chronic problem with a leaky bathroom faucet. Over a period of time, the valve seat has worn and is now impossible to remove for replacement. I have tried unsuccessfully and have ended up rounding the square opening for the valve wrench. How can I remove the valve seat without having to call in a plumber?

**A.** If you have already stripped the tool opening, the easiest way to get the valve seat out is with a screw extractor. This tool is commonly referred to by the brand name, Easy Out. A screw extractor has wide spirals that run in the opposite direction of a drill bit and is also tapered to a point. The top portion of this tool is square so you can grip it with an adjustable wrench, vise grip or other pliable tool.

You should first start this job by inserting the extractor into the valve seat opening and gently tapping it until it's snug. The way this works is, as you turn the tool counterclockwise, it is forced more and more tightly into the valve seat opening. Applying a penetrating solvent will hasten the removal of the valve seat. Tapping the extractor as you turn it will also assure a better grip.

These tools can be bought in auto-parts stores and hardware stores at various costs, depending on their

size. They are very versatile and can be used for a most common purpose, removing a bolt whose head has snapped off.

**Q.** I'm writing to you about a problem my niece has with waterbugs in their home in Texas. She said they are really bad and quite difficult to control. Is there anything that can be used to control them and keep them from coming into the house? Bug spray or bug bombs just don't help.

**A.** A lot of people don't know this, but a waterbug is really just a roach, and they are tough critters to get rid of, as your niece has found out. They can multiply more quickly than you can ever kill them, thus making them so tough in terms of survival.

However, they can be controlled. If your niece doesn't want to invest in a professional exterminator, she can purchase those insecticide "disks" commercially. She should place them anywhere and everywhere she sees a bug. These disks are extremely effective in controlling insects. If there are no pets or children in the household, she can apply thin lines of boric acid under doors to prevent the bugs from getting in.

While these methods won't eliminate the bugs completely, there will be a big difference — one I believe your niece will be able to live with.

## Scholes in Spartans' first Hall of Fame class

Watching the swimming competition in this year's Olympic games brought back some pleasant memories for Clarke Scholes.

"I followed the swimming as closely as I could," said the Grosse Pointe Park resident, who will be among the 30 charter members inducted into the Michigan State University Athletics Hall of Fame this weekend.

"I was very happy for all of the swimmers who won gold

medals because I know what it feels like. I was especially happy for Pablo Morales, because he had spent so many years working for his medal.

"I enjoyed seeing all of them experience a moment they'll never forget and it helped me relive a big moment in my life."

Scholes stood on the Olympic podium in Helsinki, Finland, in 1952 after winning the gold medal in the 100-meter freestyle.

"Nothing tops standing on that podium at the Olympics

and hearing them play the national anthem and watching them raise your country's flag," Scholes said. "You know they're playing it for the country, but you can't help but feel they're playing it for you. It chokes you up real good."

Scholes, who is probably the finest swimmer to ever compete for Michigan State, was a three-time NCAA and National AAU champion in the 100 freestyle when he made the 1952 Olympic team.

He didn't waste any time making his presence felt in Fin-

land. He set an Olympic record in the semifinals when he was clocked in 57.1.

"There was no TV at the time, but there were reporters all over the place when I set the record," Scholes recalled. "They wanted to talk to me, but I was superstitious. I told them, 'Don't interview me now, but if I win, I'll give you 30 minutes for whatever you want.' They agreed, I won the finals and I gave them 30 minutes. It was a pleasure then."

Scholes is still amused by the request of one photographer.

"He asked me to bite the medal," Scholes said with a laugh. "I guess to show that it was really gold."

Scholes got a big surprise in the finals.

"I thought my toughest competition going in would be my teammate, Dick Cleveland, but he didn't make the finals," Scholes said. "Then I thought it would be the European champion from Sweden (Goran Larsson), but it turned out to be a Japanese swimmer (Hiroshi Suzuki). He was on my blind side and he came out of nowhere."

"Near the end of the race I looked over and saw him right there. My heart went into my throat. I held on, but his arm was coming over just as I touched."

Scholes wasn't even sure he had won when the U.S. coaches and swimmers came over to congratulate him.

"I figured they were prejudiced and hoped I had won, but when the Japanese coaches congratulated me, I finally thought I did it," he said.

Scholes' winning time (57.4) wasn't quite as fast as the semifinals, but it was good enough to make him part of Olympic history.

Scholes probably would have

won at least one more gold medal in the 4 x 100 medley relay or the 4 x 100 freestyle relay, but they didn't become Olympic events until a few years later.

Scholes finished his competitive swimming career in the 1955 Pan-American Games with gold medals in the 100 freestyle and 4 x 100 medley relay, which he anchored.

He swam in the National Masters meet about 15 years ago and won the 50 freestyle, but didn't compete again.

"I did so much swimming between 1950 and 1955 that I didn't get the enjoyment from it that I once did," Scholes said. "It just isn't much fun to go up and down a pool. These days I enjoy tennis more."

Scholes is the president of the Indian Village Tennis Club and spends much of his free time on the courts.

Swimming has changed a lot since Scholes joined Alan Ford and Cleveland as the first men to officially break 50 seconds in the 100-yard freestyle.

"Now you're not even a good high school swimmer unless you can break 50," Scholes said. "The kids today are so much better than we were because of new techniques and practice methods."

"We trained hard in my day, but it was nothing like they do now. Kids will spend six hours a day in the pool. I just wonder if they enjoy the sport as much as we did. I also wonder if I could have kept up the regimen."

A big change in technique has involved the start of the race.

"They're much more sophisticated than they were 40 years ago," Scholes said. "Swimmers will use the semi-jackknife to propel themselves into the water, which was something that

was unheard of. But the only real advantage swimmers have now is that they don't have to touch the wall with their hands. We used to have to touch with our hands and the officials watched closely for that."

Scholes wonders what's in store for swimming in the future.

"You wonder how far the times can drop," he said. "You can't finish before you start, but they keep going down."


Scholes, who grew up in the Detroit area, began swimming competitively at the age of 7. He swam for the Detroit Golf Club in the Michigan Inter-Club Swimming Association.

"For years, my only coach was Clarence Pinkston," Scholes said. "When I went to Michigan State, Charles McCaffrey was my coach."

Scholes was the Detroit city champion in the 50 and 100 freestyle in 1948, but didn't swim as a freshman at Michigan State.

He joined the Spartans' squad the following year and in 1950 began a string of three



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# Blue Devils grind out a victory in grid opener

Chad Hepner smiled and shook the hands of the fans.

Grosse Pointe South's senior running back was performing a typical post-game ritual after a typical on-field performance.

Hepner, who rushed for 997 yards in 1991, started the 1992 season with 75 yards in 14 carries last Saturday to lead the Blue Devils to a 38-14 victory over Clintondale.

The rushing game was a major factor in beating the Dragons and South coach Jon Rice hopes it continues to play an important role Friday when the

Blue Devils visit Warren Mott. The game will be at 7:30 p.m. at the old Warren High School field.

"The first and third drives indicated we could move the ball when we wanted to," Rice said after the impressive win against a team that had an 8-1 record a year ago and is expected to be a top contender in the Macomb Area Conference Blue Division.

South's first White Division test will come against Mott, which beat Cousino 41-12 in its opener. The Marauders were 9-0 during the regular season last year and have since

merged with Warren, which also has a history of producing strong football teams.

T.J. Valente is the top running threat for Mott.

"They're very well coached and they play very sound defense," Rice said.

South didn't waste any time establishing its superiority over Clintondale as it scored on the opening drive.

The Blue Devils marched 65 yards in 10 plays — nine on the ground — with senior quarterback Scott Lupo hitting junior end Ryan McCartney with a 14-yard touchdown pass. Senior Tim Harmount added the first

of his five extra points.

Lupo finished with five completions in seven attempts for 97 yards and two touchdowns. McCartney caught three of the passes for 76 yards and both passing touchdowns.

Clintondale handed South its second touchdown when the Dragons' punter fumbled into his own end zone and Matt Reynolds fell on the loose ball for a 14-0 lead.

Clintondale scored on a 14-yard touchdown pass nine seconds into the second quarter, but the extra point was blocked by South's Jesus Graham. Gra-

ham and senior linebackers Ted Hanawalt and Shawn McCann spent most of the game stifling the Dragons' offense.

"Our defense did a great job," Rice said.

Hepner scored on a 30-yard run with 10:33 left in the second quarter and Harmount gave the Blue Devils a 24-6 halftime lead with a 33-yard field goal.

South had good field position for its first possession of the second half and it took only 1:27 for senior Steve Bednarchik to go the final two yards

for the touchdown.

"Bednarchik is an added dimension in the backfield," Rice said, noting that the Blue Devils are happy to hand the ball to Bednarchik when defenses key on Hepner.

The 6-foot-3 McCartney used his height advantage to complete the South scoring when he hauled in a 39-yard scoring strike from Lupo.

Clintondale scored with two minutes left in the game on a 56-yard run by Anton Washington. The Dragons' two-point conversion attempt capped the scoring.



## Norsemen stumble in opener

It was like deja vu for Grosse Pointe North football coach Frank Sumbera when he watched the Detroit Lions lose to the Chicago Bears last weekend.

He saw many of the same things in the Norsemen's 35-0 loss to Fraser in their non-league opener.

"They didn't take away the inside break on that winning touchdown and we got beat the same way a couple times. You can't come from behind and cover that play," Sumbera said. "Both of us tackled poorly and you could see the inexperience in both offensive lines. We're starting a sophomore and three juniors who've never played on the varsity before."

The one advantage the Norsemen have over the Lions is that their game didn't count in the league standings.

That ends Saturday when North visits Mount Clemens at 1 p.m. for the first Macomb Area Conference Blue Division game for each team.

"Damion Platt (of Mount Clemens) might be the best running back we'll see this year," Sumbera said. "He's a Division I prospect. We'll have our hands full trying to contain him."

Platt rushed for 247 yards and two touchdowns in the Bathers' 34-13 loss to Marine

City last weekend. Mount Clemens held a 13-12 halftime lead in that contest.

"Their strength is their running game," Sumbera said. "They have a lot of speed and run a lot of misdirection."

North found itself in a hole early against Fraser, which posted a 7-2 record a year ago. One of the defeats was administered by the Norsemen.

Ramblers' quarterback Matt Fishburn raced 59 yards on a quarterback sneak on the first play from scrimmage to put Fraser on the scoreboard.

"That wasn't even a designed play," Sumbera said. "He (Fraser coach Ray Barr) said he just wanted to loosen up his kids. (Fishburn) blew past one of our tackles and one of our halfbacks missed him."

North ran three plays and punted on its next possession. Fraser quickly made it 14-0 on a seven-yard run by tailback Lyle Smith, who had 73 yards in 15 carries.

A fumble on the play following a 14-yard pass from Scott Spada to Paul Reaser gave the Ramblers the ball on the North 44. Nine plays later Fishburn hit Jason Denkin with a 10-yard scoring strike.

Fraser made it four touchdowns on four possessions with 3:21 left in the first half on a five-yard pass from Fishburn to Terry Moreton.

"Our game plan was gone in the first eight to 10 minutes," Sumbera said. "We had to throw the ball and Fraser knew it."

Sumbera had hoped to have tailback Mike Haskell carry the ball 25-30 times a game, but Haskell only had 10 rushes for 30 yards against the Ramblers. On the other hand, Spada, who was making his first varsity start at quarterback, threw 16 passes.

Fraser increased its lead to 35-0 on its first possession of the second half, scoring on a 35-yard pass from Fishburn to Denkin.

Barr pulled most of his starters after the fifth touchdown and neither team moved the ball the rest of the game.

"We had some penalties when we got a couple first downs early in the game, but we just didn't play very well offensively or defensively," Sumbera said. "I was concerned about the defense after our scrimmage and I still am, but I'm confident we can play better."

It was the first time the Norsemen dropped their season opener since 1984 when they bowed to Brother Rice 34-0 at the Silverdome.

"We lost our next game 14-13, but won the last seven and started a 26-game winning streak," Sumbera recalled, hoping that history might repeat.



straight NCAA championships. It had only been done once before — by 1948 Olympic champion Wally Ris — until Scholes accomplished the feat.

Scholes has lived in the Pointes since 1960. He worked as a manufacturer's agent for the automobile industry after graduation from Michigan State, but is retired from that job.

He is active in the Grosse Pointe Theatre and has had parts in television commercials, including one as a doctor in an Arbor Drugs spot. He also appeared as an extra in the movie "Hoffa."

There's a special honor in being in the charter class of a hall of fame. When baseball's

Hall of Fame opened in Cooperstown, N.Y., in 1939, the first group of inductees included all-time greats Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Walter Johnson and Cy Young.

"I was very honored just to learn I had been nominated for the Hall of Fame," said Scholes, who was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame in Florida in 1980.
