



"We're going to be meeting with our engineers to go over their study," said Woods Mayor sewer lines are standard 10year capacity lines. That means they can handle storm water from what the weather bureau calls a 10-year storm."

A 10-year storm is of such intensity, said Novitke, that it happens, on average, once every 10 years. Most sewer systems in the country are built to handle 10-year storms.

But more development on Vernier means less land to soak up storm water. Novitke said. Also, more water enters a system during a storm. So a system that is at capacity would have more flooding with more development.

When a system such as the one the Woods has is overwhelmed, the water has to go somewhere. In many cases, that means into basements hooked up to the system.

We have a number of lots that will probably be split and developed over the next few years," Novitke said. "Before we can allow that, we need to know what the system can handle. That's why we commissioned our engineers to do a study of the sewer system



"Leprosy is a form of tuber-culosis," Rubaie explains. "It attacks the nerve system. which causes the deformity. With proper medical treatment it can be arrested. But the stigma is so strong, often when it is known that someone has the disease, everyone shunshim or her, including family."

As a result, Rubaie said, many people who realize that they have the disease don't seek the treatment because they are afraid of the social consequences.

### Programs help low-income consumers help with phone bills By the Federal

Communications Commission

There are two special programs aimed at assisting eligible low-income consumers with their telephone bills.

One helps consumers with telephone connection fees and the other with monthly bills.

The programs are called "Lifeline" and "Link-Up" and information about them can be obtained from your local phone company and state utilities commission.

The Lifeline program provides between \$3.50 and \$7 per month to assist with monthly charges.

The amount will vary depending on decisions made by the state commission, such as whether to provide state support.

But eligible low-income consumers will receive at least a \$3.50 reduction on their telephone bill from the lederal universal service support pro-

The reduction applies only to

ifying consumers' principal place of residence.

To qualify for Lifeline in states that provide state support, a consumer must meet the certain criteria established by the state commission.

Security Income, federal public housing assistance or the Low-Home Income Energy Assistance Program.

the road is powerful when you've mounted the high driver's seat of Lincoln's answer to the Hummer — in elegant civilian clothes, of course.

It shouldn't be that way. The Navigator is a most civilized vehicle, with boulevard ride, precise steering, enough performance for any situation. It is also tall and broad-shouldered, enough so that when a bad guy cuts you off getting on the freeway, the temptation is strong not to be mild-mannered and take it, but to head for the nearest phone booth and change into "Navigator Man."

We had a recent beauty-andthe-beast experience with Lincolns — a Continental followed by a Navigator. But in fact, the Navigator is beauty and beast all by itself.

There has been a lot of talk in the press recently about the soaring popularity of trucks and the entry of such luxurycar makers as Lincoln, Lexus, Mercedes-Benz and Cadillac into the sports-utility market.

They're a safety peril to drivers of smaller vehicles, critics say. They are environmentally incorrect, they guzzle gas and they are unnecessarily overweight. They are too expensive because the profit margin is much greater than on passen-

So, critics, what's your point? The fact is that Lincoln can't make these monsters fast enough to keep up with demand. The same is true of

holds true when it gets its big off-road truck on the road. What did I think? I was struck by the contrast between the Lincoln Continental, one of the more elegant luxury cars available, which was

and Cadillac hopes it still

truly a pleasurable machine to live with, and the Navigator, which has many virtues, but not the ones I value. Both Lincolns share certain

features. They are both immediately identifiable by their bright toothy grilles which can outgrin Joe E. Brown (remember him). Some like these grilles, some don't. As a child of the chrome age, I do.

They also share a hefty price tag. Base price of the Continental is \$38,500, but with its optional equipment, which included a "RESCU package" worth \$2,225, personal security package for \$750 and power moonroof for \$1,515, the total list price of our test car came to \$44.820.

Base price of the Navigator, which is based on the Ford Expedition — no problem there --- is \$43,300. As

squipped, our test vehicle stickered out at \$47,375.

How much do I love thee Continental? Let me count the ways. First, the new Continental feels, looks and performs like a Lincoln should. Lincoln's front-wheel drive luxury sedan gets a bigger, bolder grille for 1998 and it is distinctive and attractive.

Its interior also has been redone and includes an elegant analog clock instead of the usual digital. Its powerful twin-cam 4.6-liter 32-valve V-8 engine requires premium unleaded fuel, but is also very responsive. It drives the front wheels through a four-speed electronic overdrive automatic transmission

As befits a luxury car, the Continental provides unparalleled comfort, solid handling and road feel, excellent engineering and attractive, conservative styling.

An interesting engineering feature of the '98 Continental is its multi-adjustable suspension, which offers a choice of firm, normal

and soft ride. You can actually feel the difference between the settings, not always true.

The instrument panel is very readable and attractive with electroluminescent gauges. Seats are comfortable and provide solid support and finish is first rate.

The exterior has clearly been influenced by the Mark VIII, with its sloping hood, front styling and bulging sides. I found the overall appearance stunning, a view not shared by everyone.

An optional Personal Security Package caters in a useful way to the current trend of paranoia in our societv. It includes run-flat Michelin tires on special chrome alloy wheels, a garage

door opener and a sophisticated global satellite rescue system. The tires are designed to travel up to 20 miles at 50 mph with no loss of steering if they go flat.

A new transmitter system can learn up to three garage and security system codes. The Remote Emergency Satellite Cellular Unit (RESCU) features two buttons in the overhead console. One links the driver to roadside assistance, the other to medical or law enforcement personnel

The system transmits the Vehicle Identification Number of the car, as well as its location via a Global Positioning Satellite. The driver, or passengers, can use a telephone in the console to talk with operators who respond to the RESCU signal.

The '98 Lincoln Continental is equipped with standard anti-lock brakes and traction control system.


A feature I really liked about the Continental is that

the driver can program certain functions, such as whether you want your door locks to automatically lock when you put the car in gear. Automatic door locking is billed as a safety feature, although how it keeps you safe eludes me. I think it is much more likely to lock you out of your ear when you are running errands.

The Navigator was not as user friendly and it locked the doors whether you wanted it to or not But trucks are not usually as friendly as luxury passenger cars and it is important to remember that the Navigator may be a Lincoln, but it is a truck — the first truck ever to carry the Lincoln marquee.

Based on the rightly popular Ford Expedition, this truck is powered by a 5.4-liter SOHC V-8 engine and features such upscale goodies as illuminated running boards, load-leveling air suspension and standard anti-lock brakes. It also has Lincoln's toothy grille.

Lincoln dealers lobbied hard to get the Navigator in order to penetrate the hottest segment of the new-vehicle market. Mercury got the Mountaineer last year based on the sales-leading Ford

# **Garden** part of the human experience

Gardening has a history as old as markind itself. All the ancient civilizations had gardens. Their remains are found in graves in excavations of Egyptian temples, in Ninevah on the Tigris River, in Pompeii and China.

First, they were for growing food, but finally they became popular for ornament, medicine and wine, and for the enjoyment of gardening in its own right. All through the centuries there have been gardens of many styles and many fashions and they have always provided a continuity from

century to century.

The 19th century was a very exciting period for gardeners. Clipper ships trading with China brought back to this country forsythia, kerria, wisteria and bleeding hearts, fuschias, dahlias, gloxinias, cannas, red salvia and petu-

from Africa. Orange trees came from Spain and marigolds from Mexico. It became the fashion to plant a single round bed of massed flowers in the center of the front lawn or the circular driveway, brightly planted with cannas or scarlet sage. Coleus, neatly alternating in color, might encircle it. This was a "show" garden, brightly colored, while the oldgeraniums came shioned roses and other plants ere for the garden behind the Lobelias and

cranes, or topped with cupids, urns for red geraniums, vine-like grillwork or settees, tables or chairs were all inexpensive enough for the average family to afford and so they were more often seen in gardens than the more expensive statues, urns and fountains. Many a home-owner had a cast-iron stag on the front In keeping with the Victorian taste for excessive ornamentation, mass-produced cast-iron ornaments were strewn about the garden in the late 19th century. Basin-like fountains supported by cranes, or topped with cupids,

there was a compromise between the over-sentimental landscape and the over-embellished flower garden. The informal gardens, and particularly the English-style herbaceous border, became popu-lar on both sides of the Atlantic. Few yards were without a mixed flower border, few lawns without At the end of the Victoriun era

By the mid-20th century gardening entered a new phase. Social conditions had so changed that the labor needed for the upkeep of even moderate gardens was hard to find or to pay for Today very few people can afford to maintain the old order of a staff of gardeners and gardening has become a largely "do-it-yourself" project

handyman is employed to mow the lawn and do some clipping and weeding, or the general upkeep of the garden, especially of the lawn, is provided by a garden service under contract.

As a result, ease of maintenance is the aim of all garden design and home owners. The whole garden design of the latter helf of the 20th century may be said to be one of economy and great personal ingenuity, where the utmost is made of a small area, even if it is only a patio, a pool-side or a terrace with a view.

Q. I recently had my hardwood floors professionally sanded and refinished. In some areas the grain of the wood shows through the finish as if the finish soaked in and didn't cover. What prepartion is recommended, and should I consider any particular floor finish products? Dave S. of Mount Clemens

A. Dave, the main problem you could incur is using a product that isn't compatible with your existing finish. There is nothing worse than applying paint or varnish, including urethane, to an area only to find the new finish is melting the old. Something like using a paint stripper, only without the intentions of stripping.

The first and easiest thing to do is attempt to purchase the finish from the professional who did the job. They should provide some insight as to the tricks of using their product. I wouldn't blame the product for not completely filling in the wood grain; usually a floor finisher tries to get in and out in one day. This prevents them from getting more than two coats of finish on the floor. (I prefer

Prepare the floor by first cleaning it by using a mild solution of Simple Green or Dirtex and water, or mild household cleaner. Make sure the cleaner is rinsed well; a soap residue can be disastrous to the new finish. Careful not to flood the area, we won't be able to apply a finish to the area until it is completely dry.

There are solvent-based floor cleaners that do not require water and do a fantastic job. The advantage here is little or no waiting for the floor to dry as with waterbased products.

grit sandpaper to remove the shine from the old finish. Three or four passes over an area should leave the area whitish looking. Work with the grain of the wood and simply dust the floor with sandpaper. This opens the surface of the old finish, allowing the new coat to "bite in" and bond proper-Sand the floor lightly with 220 it sandpaper to remove the ly. It is also a good idea to cover the heat vents during this step. This will help prevent the dust from coating the ductwork and from coating the ductwork and blowing onto the wet finish during

Ask Mr. Hardware

uming up the dust, wipe the floor with a clean rag with a small amount of solvent in it. (Use paint thinner, if you are using an oilbased finish. If using a latex, water-based finish, use a rag dampened with water.)

As you are wiping the floor it will appear wet looking as though it's just been finished. This is a good time to check for imperfections in your prep work. Anything you can see now will look as bad or worse when you apply the finish. Think you are ready to apply the finish? I don't think so! Go change out of those dusty clothes you have been cleaning in and put on some clean ones. Nothing worse than having dust fall off your clothes onto your carefully prepared job.

Think I've gone too far? How about using a tack rag (gummy cheesecloth) and wipe the floor down again. Don't forget the base-boards and anything else near the floor, because when the finish is applied any and all dust nearby will jump on to your perfect job.


Apply the finish following the manufacturer's instructions. Try not to spread the product too thin as this usually shows the brush marks. Some finishes may be applied with a short-nap roller, some with a jancy wax applicator, and of course, most all can be brushed. My aching back!

Michigan 1997 housing project starts were down 6.6 percent from 1996 year-to-date totals through the month of December as compared to 7.7 percent through the month of November. December housing project starts were down by only 1.1 percent from November.

"December ended 1997 with a bang; due in part to favorable weather, interest rates and lumber prices," says Michael Tobin, president of the Michigan Association of Home Builders (MAHB) "The economy's strength in general is allowing the housing market to remain sound. We expect this to continue into 1998. We may not see the numbers we saw in 1996 and 1997, but if the

Federal Reserve remains steady and if home mortgage rates remain close to current levels, as expected, then 1998 should be another solid year."

Fixed-rate mortgages dropped to 7.17 percent in December compared to 7.23 percent in November and 7.34 percent in October. Rates were at 7.57 percent a year ago. Lumber prices for 1,000 board feet of framing dropped in December to \$370 compared to \$374 in November, and a significant decrease from the year's high of \$455 in April.



# Three CDs showcase African-American singers

In recognition of Black History Math, three of Americas foremost African-America singers demonstrate mat great art knows no ra al bounds.

### Marian Anderson: Spirituals (RCA)

Rating: ★★★★ (out of 4)

The American contralto Marian Anderson (1897-1993) is still remembered by some primarily because of the ruckus caused by the Daughters of the American Revolution, who, in 1939, refused her permission to sing in Washington, D.C.'s Constitution Hall, which they owned, because of her race. (First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt resigned from the DAR and arranged for Anderson to perform on the steps of the Lincoln Memoriai, where she sang for 75,000 people.)

But this CD, containing 32 spirituals recorded between 1961 and 1964, provides a much stronger reason for remembering the Philadelphia-born Anderson: her magnificent voice.

She is a true contralto, and, for some reason, God doesn't create many of them. Proof? Italian conductor Arturo Toscanini's response to Anderson after hearing her sing: "A voice like yours is heard once in a hundred years.'

How fortunate to have that voice preserved through recordings like this one! The velvety low notes, the fearless high notes, the clear diction, and above all the exceptional musical intelligence with which the voice is used — all mark Anderson as one of our country's most valuable musical treasures. The spirituals on this generous 72-minute CD range from favorites like "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands'

### Leontyne Price: Spirituals, Hymns & Sacred Songs (RCA)

Rating: \*\*\*

When Leontyne Price made her debut as Aida at Milan's La Scala in 1960 one of the leading Milanese critics wrote: "This is the voice Verdi was thinking of when he composed the opera." Throughout her career which continues today, in her 71st year, in rare recital appearances - this priceless Price has triumphed in a variety of roles from Verdi to Samuel Barber, from Richard Strauss to the spirituals, hymns and sacred songs that make up this two-CD set, part of RCA's "The Essential Leontyne Price" series. Included among the 42 tracks, which were recorded between 1961 and 1982, are spirituals like "Ride On, King Jesus" and "Sit Down, Servant," hymns like "Amazing Grace" and "The Church's One Foundation" and patriotic numbers like "America the Beautiful" and "Battle Hymn

of the Republic." Price is joined by a variety of singing ensembles, conductors and orchestras. The one drawback can be found in some of the arrangements, like Charles Gerhardt's for "America the Beautiful" and Battle Hymn of the Republic " both of which are so stentorian and overblown they'll make you laugh out loud. Better are the simpler arrangements, like an unaccompanied "Were You There," through which Price's immense artistry shines like the sun.

### Paul Robeson: "Songs of Free Men" (Sony Classical)

Rating: ★★★

The American bass-baritone Paul Robeson (1898-1976) was a controversial figure, chiefly because he embraced Communism in the 1940s, following a tour of the Soviet Union. Such controversy fades in the presence of his stunning artistry, just as it does in the case of German composer Richard Wagner, the avowed anti-Semite who was Adolf Hitler's favorite composer. The 25 selections on this 71minute CD, part of Sony's 'Masterworks Heritage' series, show that Robeson used his voice with consistent taste and elegant musicianship.

There are spirituals ("Balm in Gilead"), worksongs ("Joe Hill"), folk songs ("John Henry"), classical songs (Mendelssohn's "The Lord God of Abraham") operatic selections (Gershwin's "It Ain't Necessarily So") and tunes from classic musicals (Kern's "Old Man River"). One might challenge Robeson's political decisions. but any careful listener would have to respect his musical gifts.







# Annual exams recommended for women

An annual gynecologic examination allows your physician to screen for a variety of conditions including breast, cervical, ovarian and uterine cancers. Any additional screenings are based on your age, family and medical history, physical findings and any abnormal test results.

breast cancer accounts for 32 percent of all cancers in women and 18 percent of deaths from cancer. If one lives long enough, the risk becomes one in nine for developing the disease

The "gold standard" for screening for breast cancer is mammography. Most organizations recommend the first exam at age 35 to 40. After age 40, annual mammograms are recommended. Previously, recommendations called for a mammogram every two years between ages 40 and 50, but more recent data suggests that annual exams are preferable.

If you have a family history of breast cancer, your doctor may insist on more frequent exams.

While mammography is our best tool for detecting breast cancer, it is not perfect. Up to 10 percent of breast cancers may not be

detected by mammography. Monthly self-examination also is important in identifying lumps and other changes. If you do detect a lump and the mass persists, see your doctor. Remember that early detection is important to a successful result when treating cancer.

Cervical cancer is screened via the PAP smear. The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists generally recommends an annual PAP smear for sexually active women. The test can help detect precancerous changes of the cervix.

If a PAP smear is abnormal, your doctor may recommend a procedure called a colposcopy. The biopsy that results from this test will determine which treatment regimen is

Patients with a previous hysterectomy may not require a PAP exam every year, but should have one every three years. However, an annual pelvic exam is recommended for these women. Patients frequently equate a PAP smear and pelvic exam, and feel "cheated" if the PAP smear is not per-

There is no good screening test for ovarian cancer. This is typically the most aggressive cancer of the reproductive tract. Approximately one in 70 women will develop this type of malignancy, with women over age 40 being at

The best screening tool is still an annual pelvic exam. In some cases, an ultrasound and use of a tumor marker (blood test) may be indicated.

Ovarian cancer's symptoms may be vague, including nausea, a feeling of indigestion or nonspecific abdominal

Routine widespread screening for uterine cancer is not indicated. However, women over age 35 to 40 with a history of abnormal bleeding (short menstrual cycles, prolonged

bleeding, intermenstrual bleeding) should see a doctor. Uterine cancer screening most often involves a uterine biopsy performed in the physician's office. Ultrasound also may be used as a screening technique when certain risk factors are present, with a biopsy then performed if results

Some risk factors of uterine cancer include:

- obesity · diabetes
- hypertension
- a long-standing history of infrequent menses

• inappropriate use of estrogen or estrogenic compounds.

Another type of gynecologic cancer that may be present with minor symptoms is vulvar cancer. The cancer is most common after menopause. Precancerous changes may also be diagnosed. Vulvar skin biopsy, usually done under local anesthesia, leads to a diagnosis. Symptoms include itching and discoloration of the skin.

Women should not assume that all genital itching is caused by a yeast infection. Frequently, pruritis indicates something else. If vulvar itching persists, visit your physi-

As mentioned earlier, an annual gynecologic exam is recommended for women of reproductive age to screen for a number of cancers and precancerous conditions.

An annual exam also provides your doctor with an opportunity to detect other conditions such as hypertension, elevated cholesterol, weight problems, eating disorders, colon cancer, urinary tract abnormalities (incontinence), osteoporosis and diabetes.

# Cruising may be best way to visit exotic ports

chested - both men and women. Big deal. We tried to be nonchalant about that. After all, we were in a Bora Indian village, deep in the Amazon rain forest.

But we couldn't help but wonder - are they attired this way because tourists are here? The answer soon became obvious: It was for the visitors. Now that was an exotic trip.

Despite the fact that there is a general acceptance of the adage that the world gets smaller all the time, there still are many parts of this earth which are genuinely remote. What they have in common is that the easiest way to visit them is on a ship, usually a small one.

Another reason for cruising to exotic places is that cruises remove a lot of the aggravation involved in visiting underdeveloped countries. They provide English-speaking guides. Living aboard a ship removes the problem of coping with strange foods, questionable water, and lack of air conditioning. The medical staff aboard most ships (doctor, nurse, or both) is also a comfort in strange climes.

Other pluses are that these ships usually provide excellent port information through onboard lecturers and plan shore excursions which will expose you to the highlights of a region, so it's a good way to sample a destination if you are considering investing the time and most probably a hefty amount of money in a longer trip to a particular area.

Several larger cruise lines sail to remote places at certain times of the year . . . notably Princess, Crystal and Orient

smaller ships that sail to the most unusual spots. Small deluxe lines like Silversea. Seabourn and Seven Seas Cruises also specialize in exotic itineraries.

Cruises to such far-away places often cost more than the over-the-counter Caribbean air sea package. but early booking specials and good airfare deals can make them more affordable than you might think, especially if you are somewhat flexible as to when you can go. Latebooking specials to fill unsold space can cut costs consider-

This season more ships than ever are available to cruisers from North America as many American companies have begun representing foreign ships. Also, many tour operators are offering interesting cruise options to their clients. Here is a sample:

 Asia Transpacific Journeys has introduced a sailing adventure through the wild waters of Burma's Mergui (pronounced Mer-guay) archipelago. The ship will travel through some 600 jungleshrouded islands that are largely uninhabited wilder-

The trip is aboard a 55-foot trimaran that carries only eight passengers. Sea kavaks and inflatable dinghies provide transport up island rivers. Scuba-diving (for certified divers) and snorkeling is

The trip is five nights and departs from Phuket, Thailand. The cost is \$849. with weekly departures year around. This company also offers sea canoe trips in Thailand and sailing trips in

 Seven-day cruises through the glacier-studded waters around Patagonia's Tierra del Fuego, the island at the southern tip of South America, depart every Saturday, October through April from Punta Arenas on the 100-passenger Terra Australis.

For example, while the Lower Amazon River between Belem and Manaus has become quite familiar to cruisers, the Upper Amazon which extends into Peru is quite another matter. Only small ships can penetrate beyond Manaus where the remote Indian villages see visitors only once or twice a year. One such vessel is the expeditionary ship Explorer which carries 100 passengers and is outfitted with a fleet of inflatable boats. My favorite place in Little Italy is called Puglia. (The "g" is silent.) The restaurant serves draft beer and homemade wine (red or white). Its dining rooms are filled with rows of banquet-style tables and parties are seated next to one another until the tables are full, a practice that often led to interesting conversations with those who shared our table.

tomatoes I pint heavy cream

I cup vodka (the cheaper, the better) 1 teaspoon crushed red

Begin by cooking the pasta according to package directions. Decrease boiling time in order to make the pasta al dente (slightly firm). Drain

and set aside. Cut the thinly sliced pro-



sciutto into julienne strips. er, heat a large deep nonstick skillet or pan. When the skillet is hot, pour in the vodka. As the vodka starts to sizzle, add the prosciutto and stir. After a few minutes, add the tomato and lower the heat to medium.

Add the heavy cream, the Parmesan cheese and the crushed red pepper.

As the sauce begins to thicken, gently fold in the rigatoni and toss until all of the pasta is well drenched in the vodka sauce.
