



Beer bash on Bedford

'A tipsy truckload of beer intended for delivery in Mount Clemens wound up keeled over at the corner of Bedford and Mack shortly before noon on June 28. The truck driver said he was confused by the signals of a woman driver ahead of him. She signaled for a left turn, he said, then turned right as he started around her car. He slammed on the brakes. His trailer went wild and wrapped itself around a tree. Bottles, cans and kegs of beer bounded into the street. The foaming amber fluid gushed into the gutters before the wanton eyes of many thirsty onlookers. No one was injured. (From the July 6, 1950 Grosse Pointe News.)

dropped off at the apartment building on Mack. There was a man there who helped unload the clothes and a car seat that the suspect said was given to her by a church.

On Wednesday, the victim said she told the story to her friends at work and they all agreed that she had a good story. On Thursday, the victim loaned her car to a friend, who went shopping at a Village store. The suspect approached the woman and asked if she knew where the local pregnan-

cy aid facility was.
"My friend said the woman almost seemed to start to say my name," said the victim. "I think she might have recognized my car. When I received the telephone call that said the baby died, I knew I was being taken advantage of. I said something like these things happen in life. That was the last I heard from her.'

The victim admitted that all during her interactions with the suspect she thought that something might be up, but she was in Grosse Pointe and the suspect didn't have a purse and wasn't wearing the kind of clothes that would easily conceal a weapon.

"She had a good story," said the victim. "She had an answer for every question. You can get sucked in. I thought she might be someone who needed help. I



The anticipated action will place a set of audible traffic signals at Mack and Vernier, the city's business intersection.

City officials hope to pay for the \$37,000 equipment with credits from the SMART transit system. If SMART officials don't go along with the project at a meeting next month, the signals will be installed any-

way.
"We have the funding," said Woods city administrator Ted

Penny Swanson, a Woods resident who lives near the intersection, has been advocating audible signals for about two years. She and a few supporters obtained more than 300 signatures from backers of audible signals during a recent petition drive.

The signals, which chirp when the crossing light is green, will serve as a pilot pro-

If they pass the test, units could be set up at Mack and Cook, Vernier at the entrance to Grosse Pointe North High School, and on Lakeshore at the Woods Lakefront Park

Woods council member Patty Chylinski has been a long-time advocate of the signals.

"It's taken two years to get this done," she said.

"We were all for it," said council member Vicki Granger. "But it was a matter of determining the location and making sure it was appropriate."

Slomski grew up on Detroit's west side and went to college at Wayne State University. He originally intended to be an English teacher, but after a couple of years of study realized that wasn't what he wanted to do.

MEAP scores above par

Tudos to Grosse Pointe older elementary and junior high students, parents and teachers for another job well done as evidenced by the latest results of the Education Assessment Michigan Program test results.

Fourth-, fifth-, seventh-, and eighthgraders in the Grosse Pointe Public School System continued to score well above the state norms in math, reading, science, writing and social studies, keeping the Pointes about 17.5 percent above state average scores, according a frontpage story by Grosse Pointe News reporter Bonnie Caprara in last week's

But even more exciting are dramatic improvements by students at Poupard Elementary School, whose students had a history of scores running below state averages. Poupard scores rose 33.7 per-



cent in science, 24.8 percent in writing, 14.4 percent in reading, 12.89 percent in math and 1.7 percent in social studies.

Poupard principal Glenn Croydon, his staff and the parents and students of the elementary school in the Harper Woods portion of the Grosse Pointe school district deserve special recognition for pulling up their MEAP scores to above state averages and on par with other elementary schools in the Pointes.

Further, the test-score improvements at Poupard were not achieved easily. Croydon and his staff took a multi-angled approach, such as calling other schools and districts to find out what they were doing, reviewing tests and developing individual plans for certain students, holding parent conferences for lowachieving students and encouraging them to get tutorial help, recommending ways parents could help kids at home, putting students in smaller groups to take the tests and calling on the help of the school's reading and math specialists.

Clearly Poupard's success in this latest round of MEAP tests was a team effort and deserves to be commended.

However, one area that has room for improvement district-wide is social studies (or "social crudies" as it is derisively called by some students, indicating their disdain for the subject).

Although Pointe scores in social studies

are above the state average, 12.6 percent of eighth-graders scored non-proficient in the subject. Fifth-graders showed little improvement, with 27.8 percent scoring non-proficient in social studies knowledge.

Clearly, not all students are grasping the subject.

But the district is taking steps to meet the problem head on. Grosse Pointe administrators and teachers recently revised its K-12 social studies curriculum. Economics and geography, for example, are now being taught as early as the second grade, according to Marjorie Parsons, assistant superintendent for administrative service.

"The MEAP has had a big influence on that inclusion," she said.

Economics in the second grade? Times certainly have changed since we were youngsters. But they've changed for the better, we think.

Congratulations to the teachers and students for a job well done, and even more so to the parents, whose tireless support is necessary for any educational program to succeed.

CSOs and torn up streets

n the night of June 24-25, heavy rains caused 15,000 cubic feet of combined sewage to overflow into Lake St. Clair. And though we did not have specific data as of press time Monday morning, we suspect the heavy downpour Sunday night caused even more combined sewage to be released into the lake.

(It was also unknown whether the Farms beach, the only lake swimming area in the Pointes, would be open July 4 or closed due to high bacteria counts.)

We bring this up at this time to remind Farms residents and taxpayers why their streets are torn up, causing trying conditions for motorists, joggers and walkers and housekeepers trying to keep up with

As first reported in the Grosse Pointe News some 10 years ago, the Farms has some seven outfalls into Lake St. Clair where excess storm and sanitary sewage is diverted into the lake rather than backing up in residents' basements.

The Farms, like the Shores and Park, was built with a combined sanitary and storm sewer system. This meant that all storm water and household sanitary sewage were collected in the same system

and piped to the Detroit sewage treatment plant for processing.

However, the treatment plant can only accept so many cubic feet per minute from each community it serves for processing. Any excess fluids, such as during heavy rains, have to be either held in a retention basin, as is the case in the Woods, or diverted into the lake, as is the case in the Farms and was formerly the case in the Park and Shores before they separated their sewer system.

The Farms is currently in the process of a \$15 million sewer separation. Once completed, the separate storm sewer will dump rainwater runoff into the lake and only sanitary sewage will be pumped to Detroit for processing. Theoretically then, the amount of sewage needing processing will not increase during heavy rain peri-

(We say "theoretically" because there is always the possibility of storm water inadvertently getting into the sanitary sewage system until it is discovered and rectified.)

But this a long reminder as to why our city is torn up. Please be patient. It's not only for a good reason, it's mandated by the state.

Oh, my aching back

In the United States, backache is the most common source of pain, second only to headache. Four out of five adults will have back pain at some point in their lives. However, by using exercise and common sense, you may be able to beat the

aching back.

Exercise is your best defense against back pain and injury and it also will increase your overall fitness, aerobic capacity, and reduce extra weight.

Before beginning any kind of exercise, be sure to stretch thoroughly. Even if you are not planning vigorous activity, stretch your muscles every day, particularly

those in your back. If you don't have back problems and are in good health, try these stretches:

Knee-to-chest stretch

Lie on your back and pull both knees in to your chest until you feel a comfortable stretch in the lower back. Hold for 45 to 60 seconds.

Lower-trunk rotation stretch

Lie on your back with your knees bent. Keeping your back and shoulders flat and your feet together,

rotate your knees to one side, getting them as close to the floor as you comfortably can, and hold for 45 to 60 seconds.

Trunk flexion stretch, or "cat stretch"

On hands and knees, tuck in your chin and arch your back. Slowly sit back on your heels, letting your shoulders drop toward the floor and stretching your arms forward. Hold for 45 to 60 seconds.

Swimming and water aerobics are generally safe for your back because they are non weight-bearing. Therefore, you will be less likely to strain your muscles if you overdo it.

If your swimming skills are rusty, talk to a lifeguard who is a certified Water Safety Instructor and arrange for a lesson. Just one private lesson may be all you need to get back in the pool.

During the summer months, lap swimming is available in outdoor swimming pools at waterfront parks throughout the Grosse Pointes, and in the winter, in indoor pools at local schools. Water aerobics are a good option for the non-swimmer. Call your local swimming pool, community education department or YMCA for information about classes.

Other exercise options that will strengthen your back without straining it are bicycling, walking and working out on a cross-country ski machine.

Activities that involve a lot of twisting, quick stops and starts, and impact on hard surfaces pose the greatest risks for your back.

Pay attention to how you move in order to reduce back strain. Poor body mechanics can cause discomfort or contribute to problems in the future. To prevent injuries and use your back wisely, keep these tips in mind:

 Listen to your body. If your back hurts, don't continue what you're doing. Stop and rest, or

change your position. Pain isn't always caused by vigorous activity; sitting without proper support, leaning over hand work for long periods, or even taking out the trash can be the culprit.

- Posture counts. Good posture helps put your entire body in balance, makes you look good and will improve your back health.
- Sitting is stressful for your back. If you sit most of the day at work, be sure your chair supports your lower back. Place a rolled towel or pillow at the small of your back for support.
- If your mattress is old or worn out, replace it with good, firm bed-
- Lift with your legs, not your back. Push, don't pull, and avoid lifting heavy objects overhead.

Even if you're in good shape and try not to strain your back, it is still possible that you'll manage to have a bout of back pain at some time. If the pain is related to an accident, is intense and constant, spreads down one or both legs, causes weakness, numbness or tingling in the legs, or interferes with bowel or bladder control, see a physician immediately.

Otherwise, apply heat or ice to your back and take a pain reliever such as Tylenol, an NSAID, or aspirin. Rest at first, but don't baby your back. Move around, and return to normal, moderate activity as soon as you're more comfortable.

If you do something that brings on the pain again, stop immediately. You should start to feel better within a day or two, but if the pain does not improve or gets worse, see your physician.

Hamp said, "This exhibit will give visitors a first-hand look at life in a railroad repair shop in the early 20th century, while seeing actual repairs done to our daily operating locomotives.'

Roundhouses became a railroad staple because they let in natural light, used space efficiently and were easy to expand.

Greenfield visitors notice how sunlight shines through the roundhouse's huge double doors and many windows. Contrary to popular photographs that show locomotives backed-in to their stalls, most engines entered a roundhouse nose-first. They are parked with their front ends facing a string of windows on the back wall.

"This facility was not electrified until between 1905 and 1910," said Jones of the original DT&M structure. "The big doors and windows let in as much natural light as possible so the workers could see what they were doing."





When Ann Frank and her family first went into hiding from the Nazi occupation of Amsterdam in 1942, she wondered in her diary if the world would ever remember her. Today, thanks to that diary, she is a monument to the resilience of the human spirit.

That lively, exuberant, teenage girl lived in fear of being deported to utter degradation and certain death in a concentration camp. Yet she recorded for posterity the indestructibility of a vital human being's capacity for

Even that story has had a mixed history of being told, however. Early versions were edited to enhance commercial potential. A troubled father, the only member of the family to survive the holocaust, deleted what he considered embarrassing family matters. The experience was sweetened and sentimentalized.

A revised dramatization at Stratford this summer has sought to restore the complete original experience that Ann reported, even the stresses in her relationship with her mother.

. It is quite straightforward in describing two families and an extra man trying desperately to be normal while they were restricted to cramped quarters and under extreme

But it is always moving, poignant and ominous under the surface, and it is a story that demands to be kept alive in world memory. The restorations make the story more credibly forceful than ever.

The stage set, unhidden by a curtain before the performance, begins the story. It is a factory loft crammed with furniture, mostly improvised beds. It has one toilet and a view of the Amsterdam rooftops. It will be the exclusive world to eight Jews for 25 months.

They enter, somewhat disorganized and confused. They had to come hurriedly and were already at great risk. The effort to adjust to cramped quarters and the feeling of imprisonment is oppres-

The will to adjust and survive is strong.

Indeed, as the diary and recollections of her father indicate, Ann was an inspiring spirit to the entire group during their isolation. The strength of her spirit is exhibited repeatedly as she forgets the threats outside and lives the thrill of her own growing

She shows the growth that she experiences in those two years. We observe the blossoming of a young woman on the threshold of falling in love. We recognize a person of talent with the potential to become a perceptive observer and writer.

Much of the impact of the performance comes from the group's normal interaction with joys and frictions of family relationships intensified by their situation.

George Sperdakos, as Ann's ther, brings the strength and resolve to make their situation presented in repertory at the work. And the others need his strength to help them play

their part. As Mrs. Van Daan, Lally Cadeau creates a remarkable and sometimes upsetting character who reveals her difficulty adapting to the stress. Her attachment to an old fur coat, her little vanities and her self interests, eventually give way to loyalty to her husband and son in a way that is touchingly human. She is a doting mother, however, as she watches and comments on the romantic feelings between her son Peter and Ann.

As with Ann, Nicholas van Burek's performance of Peter shows resilience and growth. He matures from an awkward boy to an emerging but still shy young man in reaction and then response to Ann's



For two years I traveled from Palm Thursday Springs to Palm Beach looking at spas from a client's point of view.





Life in the gutters — there are 3 options

Q. Mr. Hardware, I need help in choosing a gutter guard for my home. The house dead-ends into a state park and is semi-encircled by woods. The gutters fill with leaves and debris that lead to water overflowing the gutters.

I would appreciate your help with the type of gutter guard I should use that will actually provide me some longtime relief. DennisT@earthlink.net

A. Dennis, selecting the best gutter guard is as important as installing it properly. Gutter guards are available in three basic styles. Screen or wire mesh, rigid plastic with holes or slots, or rigid plastic with one or two louvers that capture water but let debris slide on over.

Rolled mesh gutter guards are probably too weak for your situation. They come 20 to 25 feet in a roll and sell for less than \$5. The



problem with rolled mesh is that in the winter, snow and ice-dams crush the material down into the gutter. Not only will you have to clean the leaves out of the gutter; you'll have to drag the gutter guard out also. Rolled mesh runs about 15 cents a foot

Then there is a rigid mesh gutter guard. It is screen like the rolled material but it has a metal clip that lets it hinge up for cleaning. It's much better than the rolled guard but still lets small debris in to the gutter. Rigid mesh

is about 50 cents a foot.

There is rigid PVC gutter guard that is flat with holes. Some have ribs for greater strength. This style comes in 4- and 8-foot sections. It is not unlike the mesh guards in that it strains the water but still lets small debris through. This style is effective on steep roofs where debris won't pile on top of the guard. It costs about 35 cents a foot.

Last and best is the louvered gutter guard that is designed to allow water to roll in a vent but lets debris fall to the ground. This style comes in 4- and 8-foot sections. The best comes at a price. This product sells for about \$1 to

With all these products, proper

installation is as important as the product. The one situation that will hinder all these guards is when the gutter is as high as the last shingle on the house. This forms a shelf that traps debris no matter how good the gutter guard

To remedy this situation one will have to examine the entire gutter section before moving the gutter down. Remember the gutter must have pitch down to the downspout for proper drainage.

The buzz on bee stings

Now that summer is here we can expect to hear the humming of busy bees, which is why the Michigan State Medical Society wants to remind everyone what to do if stung.

When a person is stung, the venom from the bee may cause local swelling, pain, itching and/or redness. These symptoms should disappear within a few days if the wound is properly cared for. Sometimes, however, a bee sting can cause a fatal allergic or toxic reaction.

If the stinger is still in the wound, it should be removed as quickly as possible. If not removed, the stinger can continue to release venom into the body for as long as 20 minutes.

The Medical Society recommends these steps after a bee sung

- · Gently scrape or "flick" the stinger out using your fingernail, a credit card or the edge of a knife. Do not use tweezers or pinch the stinger because you may squeeze out more venom)
- · Wash the affected area with soap and water and then thoroughly dry.
- Apply an ice pack to relieve pain and swelling.
- · Apply Calamine lotion, a lotion containing Benadryl or a paste made of baking soda and water to relieve itching.

About 3 percent of people are especially sensitive to bee stings and can develop a life-threatening allergic reaction called anaphylaxis. When this occurs, painful hives and swelling may occur rapidly and block off airways. Allergic reactions are a serious matter and should be treated as a medical emergency.

If a person who is not allergic is stung by a swarm of 50 to 100 bees, a similar effect to anaphylactic shock may occur. About 50 people die each year from bee stings, so it is important to be alert for an allergic reaction.

Symptoms of an allergic reaction may include:

- rapid swelling around the eyes, lips, tongue, or throat;
- difficulty breathing, wheezing or hoarseness;
- itching, cramping, or numb-
- ness that is severe; stomach cramps;
- a reddish rash, or hives;
- · dizziness or even loss of consciousness.

Many people know they have an allergy to bee stings. They should wear a medical alert bracelet and carry a bee sting kit including epinephrine. The Michigan State Medical Society reminds you to avoid areas where bees have nests. If a bee is near you, do not upset it by swatting at it. Just calmly and quietly turn and walk away.





Can your home wiring handle the load?

Home theaters, home offices, whirlpool tubs, video games, rechargeable tools, appliances and personal computers — the landscape of our lives has changed dramatically in the past few years, reshaped by new and ever more sophisticated electrical products. But our need for increased power to operate these devices has, in many cases, outpaced our homes' ability to serve and protect us.


It's hard to believe that, not long ago, the standard electrical service installed in most homes was only 60 amps (for comparison, consider that many central air conditioning systems alone can draw up to 40 amps, and electric ranges often need 50 amps). But 60-amp service was once considered sufficient power for all of the plug-in appliances and permanently wired fixtures a typical home possessed. Of course, those were also the days before televisions in every bedroom, multiple computer households, and the proliferation of electric appliances

for teenagers to use on their hair.

Today the required minimum for new homes is 100-amp service, according to the current edition of the National Electrical Code. But even this modern "standard" may fall far short of adequate for many families now, and in the not-too-distant future.

"If you're a smart homeowner, you want to go well above the minimums. You want to add more circuits and more capacity," advises David Brender of the Copper Development Association. A member of one of the NEC's Code-making advisory panels, Brender, along with other industry experts, helps to review and propose changes that keep the electrical code up to date with improvements in technology and changing lifestyles.

Brender is quick to point out that, like all construction and safety codes, the NEC sets baseline standards only. Homeowners can, and often should, exceed the code recommendations when they build, repair or renovate.



The graph above shows the annual seles of electricity, in billions of kilowatt-hours, to U.S. homes over the past five decades. The trend illustrated shows why most homes built before 1989 are poorly equipped with electric service for today's demands.

Tips on canceling utilities

Have you moved to a new residence and months later received a telephone, electric or natural gas bill in your name at the old address? It could happen, if you do not take several precautionary steps.

What you should do when terminating utility service:

- Call the electric, natural gas, local and long distance telephone companies and request termination of your service at a specific location. Keep a record of the date, time and person(s) you talked to at the company. Call at least several weeks before you move.
- Request written verification of your termination request. If you do not receive a confirmation notice within 15 days of your request, contact the company again to confirm that the company will terminate service on the date requested.
- Call the electric and natural gas companies and request a final reading of your meter(s) to make sure your final bills are based on an actual, not estimated, meter reading.
- Schedule a time to allow the utility representative to come into your home to obtain the final or

actual usage reading from your electric and/or natural gas meter(s) if your meter(s) are inside your home.

 Do not rely on others to take any utility service out of your name when you move.

Remember, when terminating utility service, contact all companies that provide service to you.

Visit the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC) at cis.state.mi.us/mpsc/execsec/aler ts for more tips on utility service issues and information on other MPSC Consumer Alert topics.

The MPSC is an agency within the Department of Consumer and Industry Services.

For example, anyone expanding the electrical capacity on their home would be wise to consider installing a higher-capacity panel—150 or 200 amps—if they have a growing family, or expect fur-

ahead. Another smart move is to use 12-AWG copper wiring as a minimum size for all new electrical installations, even for those circuits protected by 15-amp breakers. Although thinner 14-AWG wire is allowed for most residential applications, the heavier 12-AWG wire runs cooler and is more energy efficient. You'll also benefit right away from the extra margin of safety it provides, and you won't have to run new wiring a second time if the circuit needs to carry more current in the future.


According to Brender, even professionals must be encouraged to think ahead when called in to perform routine electrical work. The code presently allows electricians to calculate a home's power needs (initotal watts) by multiplying the living space, or square-foot area, by a factor of three. In Brender's view, increasing that fact by at least 50 percent provides a more realistic margin for anticipated energy use in the years ahead. A recommendation to write this increase into the electrical code has been proposed, but is probably years away from adoption. Homeowners who want to upgrade now don't have to wait

How to select a telephone calling card

A telephone calling card provides a convenient way for people to place calls while away from home. Calling cards eliminate the need for using coins at a pay phone or having to bill the telephone account from where you place a call.

By using a calling card, you can use your long distance telephone company of choice — at its calling card rates — and avoid unexpected charges that might be assessed by a pay phone service provider.

What types of calling cards are available?

Standard calling cards are typically issued by a local or long distance telephone company and charges for calls appear on your monthly telephone bill. Calling cards are also available as a combination credit card/calling card, where the card serves as a standard credit card with which you can make purchases, and you can also use it to place telephone calls by using a personal identification

number. All charges to the credit card, including telephone calls, are billed to the credit card account.

Prepaid calling cards are issued for a specific amount of dollars, usually in denominations ranging from \$5 to \$100, and are usable for a certain number of calling minutes, ranging from 10 to more than 100 minutes. Prepaid calling cards are issued by local and long distance telephone companies and other companies whose businesses are not telephone related.

The cards are sold through retail and convenience stores, service stations, vending machines, the Internet, and other retail outlets. Because a prepaid calling card represents telephone time purchased in advance, you are not sent a bill for the calls you make.

With each use, the call's cost is deducted from the card's balance. Generally, periodic voice prompts tell you how much time you have left on the card.

How do you choose a calling card?

First determine your individual calling needs. Do you need to make a high number of calls to different numbers while traveling, or do you need to budget each call? The standard calling card may offer the most flexibility by allowing you to place a call from any telephone, make international calls, and talk as long as you like.

Whereas, prepaid calling cards are useful if you do not have long distance service and want to limit your talk time. Once you understand your telephone usage patterns, shop around to determine the calling card that is best for you. Read the fine print and obtain written information on conditions and directions for use of the card.

What questions are important to ask?

Rates and conditions of calling card service vary widely. Call the

company's customer service number and ask these questions:

Standard calling cards

• What is the per-minute rate? Are there different rates for different times of the day and can they change without notice?

• Are calls rounded up to the nearest minute, or 30 seconds, or other increment? Is the rate higher for the first minute or is there a minimum per-call charge?

• Can the card be used for local, within state, interstate, and international calls? What are the rates for each type?


• Is there a surcharge, tax, or any other additional charge for each call? If so, how much? Do the surcharges vary when calling from public telephones, hotels,

• Is there a monthly maintenance fee for the card? Is the fee assessed whether I use the card during the month or not? How much is the fee?



Pet Care

By Peter Edwards

"Fluffy" bedding, including socalled "natural fluffy" or "safe fluffy" products, can be dangerous to your gerbil, hamster or other pet rodent.

Veterinarians have been reporting hundreds of such deaths every year. They occur when the little critters swallow some of the fluffy bedding — which typically is made of a blend of cotton, polyester and polyfibers — creating an intestinal blockage that is almost always fatal to the animal.

There is no practicable way to prevent these pets from ingesting pieces of the bedding since it's natural for them to stuff material into their cheek pouches, and they usually swallow some of it. Unless the material is water soluble, it's likely to swell up and cause problems ranging from constipation to fatal intestinal damage.

Many pet owners suggest that a truly safe alternative is to use paper towels, facial tissue or toilet paper for bedding. The animals love it and if won't hurt them.

(Note: Be careful not to use

paper made with lotions, perfumes or dyes.)

Wood chips fall into the "natural" category. But even these may cause problems for pet rodents because of the so-called "fragrant oils" they contain. These oils are supposed to ward off mites and fleas, but they can cause health problems for your pets. If you do use wood chips, use those that contain the least amount of these chemicals.

"Hammys" (hamster owners) also recommend the use of compressed paper bedding made from virgin wood pulp. They claim these products won't cause choking or intestinal obstructions, won't trigger any illnesses, and do not contain mites.

Must I subscribe to a carrier's local or long distance service in order to use its calling card? If no, will I pay higher rates if I am not subscribed to the telephone company's local or long distance service?

• Can I reach customer service personnel through a toll-free telephone number? What is that number? Is it available 24 hours a day?

Prepaid calling card

- Will the card expire and, if so, when?
- What is the per-minute or per-call charge?
- Is there a charge when a call is not completed?
- Is there a per-call connection fee or connection surcharge?
- Is there a higher rate for the first minute or for international calls?
- Will I be notified when one minute is remaining on my call?

How can you guard against theft, misuse?

Be careful when using your standard calling card in a public place. Place your call as privately and quietly as possible. Since some calling cards have the account and personal identification numbers printed on the card, report lost or stolen calling cards immediately to the issuing company. Avoid sharing your card or its numbers with other persons.

Who can help with a problem?

If you have problems or questions related to a standard calling card, contact the card issuer.

Complaints regarding prepaid telephone calling cards can be made to the International Telecard Association at (800) 333-3513.

Antiques and Collecting

Whale oil and other burning fluids were used for light at the beginning of the 19th century, long before electricity was available. But around 1835, a different lamp fuel gained popularity—lard.

Burning fluids were liquid, and they were dangerous because they were explosive if handled carelessly. Lard was almost solid, and therefore safe. It could be made at home on the farm and could be stored. But the thick lard had to be encouraged to flow up the wick to the flome. Many special, patented lard-oil lamps were invented in the 1840s to 1860s. Most lard-oil burners were made to bring heat to the fuel. The wick holders were often wide and flat.

Q: I remember reading the "Nancy" comic strip in the 1950s. I have a Nancy-Sluggo board game that was given to me by an older cousin. It is in very good condition, with all its game pieces. Can you give me some information about the game and comic strip?

A: Ernie Bushmiller introduced Nancy in his comic strip "Fritzi Ritz" in the 1920s. In 1940, she became the star of her own strip and remained popular through the early 1960s. Sluggo was her tough sidekick. Your board game was made by the Milton Bradley Co. about 1944. It is worth about

Tip: Want to clean a copper-colored miniature souvenir building or other small copper-coated piece? Soak it in a shallow bowl in the juice of one lemon or 2 table-spoons of vinegar and enough water to cover the souvenir. Leave it only about five minutes. Dry. Repeat, if necessary. The acid of the lemon or vinegar chemically removes the oxide that is darkening the piece. But too much soaking might harm the copper coloring.

Garden antiques have become one of the most popular areas of collecting. Fountains, fences, small sculptures and large urns to hold flowers are popular. But in the past 10 years there has been increasing interest in smaller garden antiques.

Tools used for gardening are also being used as decoration in gardens. Trowels made of a single

piece of painted metal in the 1950s; rakes that have handmade teeth and sapling trunks for handles; early 20th-century unpainted metal buckets and sprinklers; baskets made to hold cut flowers; and even sprinklers are now wanted.


The 1940s brass nozzles — still usable — sell at collectibles shows for about \$12 to \$20. The trowels and "weed scratchers" are \$15 to \$25, depending on their condition. Old lawn mowers are expensive. Iron push mowers made before 1920 (most are dated) sell for hundreds of dollars.


Unusual-looking hand mowers bring \$75 to \$200. Sprinklers are the most popular. The wooden 1940s cut-out figure of a boy holding a hose that turns to sprinkle a large section of the lawn sells for \$75 to \$150. Metal lawn sprinklers shaped like ducks, frogs or other animals can be worth up to

The ceramic figural sprinklers made in the 1930s and '40s bring even higher prices. A Weller Pottery coppertone frog sprinkler auctioned in April for \$5,500.

Q: I just bought an enamelware coffeepot that the dealer called a "biggin." What is the difference between a coffeepot and a biggin?

A: About 1800, a man whose last name was Biggin invented the first coffee percolator. It was named after him. A biggin consists of two cylindrical tin pots. One fits on top of the other. There are two strainers at the bottom of the top section. Finely ground coffee is put in this top section, and another strainer fits over the top. Boiling water is poured through the top section, and the brewed coffee fills the larger bottom pot.

Telephone wiring standard protects consumers

Here's really good news for everyone who has Internet service at home, more than one home computer, one or more home telephone lines and a fax machine and for anyone who expects to hook up any combination of these

devices someday soon:

The Federal Communications Commission recently issued a new rule requiring that all telephone wiring installed inside homes and other buildings must meet new standards. The rule, which applies to new and retrofit telephone-wire installations made after July 8, 2000, is aimed at assuring that all inside wiring can meet the demands of voice, video and data transmissions now and for the foreseeable future.


"Installers, builders, home remodelers and consumers should note that the new FCC rule specifies Category 3 wiring or better," says William T. Black, vice-president for wire and cable with the Copper Development Association Inc. "The emphasis should be on better." Black insists, recommending more powerful copper wiring instead of the minimum.

"Today Category 5 and Category 5E copper communications wiring are the recognized standard for

broadband services," explains Black, "with several times greater capacity and speed than needed for today's high-speed Internet services, such as DSL and cable modems. Categories 5 and 5E have six times the informationcarrying capacity of Category 3, providing a comfortable cushion for the future at little additional cost."

Category-type telephone cable consists of four twisted pairs of insulated copper wire and offers service benefits over old-style telephone cable, typically made up of two untwisted pairs, designed for analog voice service. The additional pairs of wires in category-type cable make it easier to hook up multiple phone lines and network home computers, and the precise twisting of the wires speeds communication while reducing static, signal degradation and cross-talk between separate lines bundled together

Impetus for the new telephone wiring standard came when a notfor-profit professional association of designers and installers of telecommunications systems called BICSI petitioned the FCC in 1995 after receiving many con-

sumer complaints about inferior phone wiring.

Ronald Provost, BlCSI's governmental relations representative and chairman of the FCC Ad Hoc Administrative Committee that wrote the new standard, recalls receiving reports of lamp cord and bell wire being used for home telephone hookups.

"Now that we've succeeded in setting the new minimum requirement," says Provost, "we've got to get the word out."

"This new standard will benefit consumers as carriers deploy broadband services that are more demanding than traditional voice telecommunications," comments CDA's Black. "People shouldn't hesitate to install phone jacks now wherever they think they might need them in the future, wherever they or the next family that owns their home might want to plug in a laptop or other communications device."

Advanced telephone cable is available at electrical supply outlets and electronics stores. The cable sheathing should be clearly marked with the category designation. Unlike old-style telephone wiring, with which individual jacks were typically wired in series, category-type cable requires a "home run" configuration - each outlet is wired separately to a central distribution device or hub.

Holiday partying

Q. My husband bought the barbecue grill of his dreams last week, just in time for the holiday. This is our first cookout — we just bought our first home. Any tips on making it a great party? — Rachel C., Cincinnati

A. Congratulations on your new home! Cooking out in the back yard is one of the nicest benefits of home ownership, but it's a whole different ballgame than the tiny hibachi cookouts many apartment dwellers must settle for.

Preparation is the key to having a great barbecue. You'll have to get a pen and paper and figure out just how much food and drink you'll require. Are you providing all the food? Or is it potluck, with everyone bringing a dish? What sort of drinks do your guests like? Stock enough beer, soft drinks and other beverages for everyone.

Start marinating meats and preparing hamburger patties at least a day ahead, along with any side dishes. Buy drinks and store them out of the way — cool them down on the day of the party.

Safety is another important factor. Providing rides for guests who've had too much to drink is certainly important, but what about keeping folks safe during the barbecue?

Take a walk around the back yard the day before and look for potential danger areas. Tool sheds should be closed and locked to keep curious kids out. Pick up toys and other debris from the yard. Check the ground for holes or uneven areas where a guest might trip or tip his or her chair

Place your new grill in an area where there won't be much traffic, especially from running children. If you have a pool, make certain that an adult stays near it at all times, even when no one is swimming.

Finally, close the doors to any rooms in your house that you don't want guests to explore, keep some cash on hand for emergency runs to the store, and relax — enjoy the holiday!

The art of tiling: Cleanup

Q. I recently installed ceramic tile on the kitchen floor and countertops. The trouble is, by the time I finished the counter area around the sink, I was too tired to wipe the tiles clean (I had cleaned the floor earlier, however). I ran out of time, then, and it's been a week since I put the tiles in. Now, the grout won't come off. What can I do? — J.D.S., Syracuse, N.Y.

A. Don't lose heart. Your penance for waiting so long to clean up the tiles is a few extra hours of work and plenty of elbow grease, but you should be able to remove the dried grout streaks.

Try cleaning the area gently first, with a cloth soaked in warm water and wrung well. It may not remove the thin streaks, but repeated cleaning should loosen any large dollops of grout, allowing you to wipe them away.

If warm water doesn't do it, your alternatives depend upon the type of tile you have. Semi-glazed tiles, or tiles with a rough finish, can be cleaned with a fine-grade scrubber pad. However, if your tiles have a smooth or glossy finish, scrubber pads can leave scratch marks and dull the tiles—which would be far more difficult to remove than dried grout!

In either case, a trip to the hardware or tile store is necessary. Bring a leftover tile with you to show the salesperson. Tile stores have several types of cleanup solutions in stock, and can tell you which one to use. They'll also advise you as to whether or not a scrubber pad is safe for your tile.

Finally, if you use a cleanup solution, dilute it in a separate container according to the packaging instructions (or the tile house's recommendations). Increase the solution's strength if the first mix doesn't loosen the grout streaks. Proceed with caution, however! Don't replace elbow grease with undiluted cleaner, unless no other option works.



Burglars prey on vacationing residents

Piled up newspapers, an overflowing mailbox and an unkempt lawn do more than call attention to a family that's away on summer vacation. They alert the burglar who is scouting out the neighborhood for his next victim.

Most communities will experience a 10 to 18 percent increase in home burglaries during June, July and August. The greatest number, according to FBI statistics, tend to occur in July, with August a close second. The stage is set again this summer with an estimated 121.9 million U.S. adults planning to travel.

Statistics tell the story

In the United States today, burglars enter a house, apartment or condominium every 11 seconds. Two out of every three burglaries are residential in nature and 60 percent of residential burglaries occur during the daytime. In 1998, an estimated 2.3 million burglaries were reported with

losses totaling \$3.1 billion.

"A significant number of breakins could be prevented with simple precautions such as canceling a newspaper delivery, placing timers on lamps and having a neighbor take in the mail," says Tony DeMarco, spokesperson for the Burglary Prevention Council (BPC), a nationwide non-profit organization dedicated to educating the public on crime prevention measures.

DeMarco, a 30-year veteran of the Chicago Police Department, knows how criminals think. "The average burglar has only two options for entering a residence: doors and windows. Approximately 30 percent of all break-ins are by unlawful entry, which means no force. That statistic tells me homeowners continue to make a burglar's job too easy by leaving doors and windows unlocked." Especially during the summer, taking a quick walk around the block could end up

costing thousands of dollars. "Whether you leave your home for five minutes or five weeks, recognize that it's vulnerable whenever it's unoccupied," says DeMarco.

The Burglary Prevention Council recommends that doors and windows be fashionably secured with ornate, yet sturdy door handles and deadbolt locks. Avoid leaving gaps around doorframes, and position hinges on the inside of the door so a thief with a screwdriver will be unable to remove the entire door. Sliding doors can easily be lifted off their tracks. Place a metal or solid wood rod, such as a broomstick, on the sliding door inside track to prevent a burglar from forcing the door open.

Average dollar loss per burglary in 1998 was \$1,350, not including the cost of fixing broken doors and windows. That figure, according to DeMarco, doesn't even begin to account for the psychological damage experienced by a burglary victim.

Smart electrical upgrades for home remodelers

If your home needs a makeover, or you're simply planning to upgrade your decor, appliances or any other aspect of your living quarters, now is the best time to consider upgrading your home electrical system as well.

Home repair and remodeling projects often require some electrical work. As long as the electrician is on hand, you can usually save the cost of a service call by adding to the job as needed.

If you haven't planned electrical upgrades, a quick look around your house might convince you that you should. Do you have receptacle outlets overburdened by multi-plug strips? Are your lamps and fixtures connected to extension cords? Does every three-prong plug need a two-prong adapter? These and other wiring signs indicate a real need for electrical improvements.

Unfortunately, many homeowners wait until a problem occurs and only then do they think to call in an electrician. But there's a long list of reasons why you should inspect and improve your electrical system before an accident or service breakdown occurs. Here are a few points to consider,

according to the Copper Development Association:

• Is your service adequate? Many older homes still operate with seriously outdated 60-amp electrical service — and sometimes with just a few fuses or circuit breakers to protect the entire system. Newer homes often have 100-amp service panels, but even this minimum requirement set by many current codes may fall short of your present or future needs. Consider upgrading service to 200 amps.

• Size for extra demand. If you're installing a major electrical appliance, like an electric wall oven, a microwave oven, a double-wide refrigerator or central airconditioning, you'd better think about the additional power it may need. While a salesman or installer might tell you that your system can handle the load be smart and ask your electrician for a second opinion.

• What's the correct wire size? Electricians often install 14-AWG wiring during renovations, which is adequate for most home uses. But heavier 12-AWG copper wire is a better choice because it's more energy-efficient, and you won't

have to upgrade all over again if you install appliances or fixtures with greater electrical loads. The cost difference for upgrading to 12-AWG copper wire is minimal. If you're adding a room extension or building a new home, it's a good idea to install 12-AWG wire (or larger, depending on the needs of each circuit).

Consider special needs.
 Different rooms in a home serve different purposes — an important consideration when you're planning improvements, especially where electrical work is involved. Family rooms, home offices and home theaters generally need more circuits, more outlets, and built-in or plug-in power-

surge protection. Outlets in kitchens, baths, garages and outdoor areas require ground-fault circuit interrupters, or GFCIs. And you don't have to wait for a major renovation to add protection you can install many safety devices yourself, such as outlet caps, switch guards and wire shields in nurseries and children's play rooms.

• And, finally, don't forget your communications wiring needs — make sure telephone wiring is rated Category 5 or better to assure speedy data transmission, high-quality voice service and convenient installation as you add telephone-based services in the future.







Life in the gutters — there are 3 options

Q. Mr. Hardware, I need help in choosing a gutter guard for my home. The house dead-ends into a state park and is semi-encircled by woods. The gutters fill with leaves and debris that lead to water overflowing the gutters.

I would appreciate your help with the type of gutter guard I should use that will actually provide me some longtime relief. DennisT@earthlink.net

A. Dennis, selecting the best gutter guard is as important as installing it properly. Gutter guards are available in three basic styles. Screen or wire mesh, rigid plastic with holes or slots, or rigid plastic with one or two louvers that capture water but let debris slide on over.

Rolled mesh gutter guards are probably too weak for your situation. They come 20 to 25 feet in a roll and sell for less than \$5. The



problem with rolled mesh is that in the winter, snow and ice-dams crush the material down into the gutter. Not only will you have to clean the leaves out of the gutter; you'll have to drag the gutter guard out also. Rolled mesh runs about 15 cents a foot

Then there is a rigid mesh gutter guard. It is screen like the rolled material but it has a metal clip that lets it hinge up for cleaning. It's much better than the rolled guard but still lets small debris in to the gutter. Rigid mesh is about 50 cents a foot.

There is rigid PVC gutter guard that is flat with holes. Some have ribs for greater strength. This style comes in 4- and 8-foot sections. It is not unlike the mesh guards in that it strains the water but still lets small debris through. This style is effective on steep roofs where debris won't pile on top of the guard. It costs about 35 cents a foot.

Last and best is the louvered gutter guard that is designed to allow water to roll in a vent but lets debris fall to the ground. This style comes in 4- and 8-foot sections. The best comes at a price. This product sells for about \$1 to \$1.50 per foot.

With all these products, proper

installation is as important as the product. The one situation that will hinder all these guards is when the gutter is as high as the last shingle on the house. This forms a shelf that traps debris no matter how good the gutter guard

To remedy this situation one will have to examine the entire gutter section before moving the gutter down. Remember the gutter must have pitch down to the downspout for proper drainage.

The buzz on bee stings

Now that summer is here we can expect to hear the humming of busy bees, which is why the Michigan State Medical Society wants to remind everyone what to do if stung.

When a person is stung, the venom from the bee may cause local swelling, pain, itching and/or redness. These symptoms should disappear within a few days if the wound is properly cared for. Sometimes, however, a bee sting can cause a fatal allergic or toxic reaction.

If the stinger is still in the wound, it should be removed as quickly as possible. If not removed, the stinger can continue to release venom into the body for as long as 20 minutes.

The Medical Society recommends these steps after a bee sting:

- · Gently scrape or "flick" the stinger out using your fingernail, a credit card or the edge of a knife. Do not use tweezers or pinch the stinger because you may squeeze out more venom)
- · Wash the affected area with soap and water and then thoroughly dry.
- Apply an ice pack to relieve pain and swelling.
- · Apply Calamine lotion, a lotion containing Benadryl or a paste made of baking soda and water to relieve itching.

About 3 percent of people are especially sensitive to bee stings and can develop a life-threatening allergic reaction called anaphylaxis. When this occurs, painful hives and swelling may occur rapidly and block off airways. Allergic reactions are a serious matter and should be treated as a medical emergency.

If a person who is not allergic is stung by a swarm of 50 to 100 bees, a similar effect to anaphylactic shock may occur. About 50 people die each year from bee stings, so it is important to be alert for an allergic reaction.

Symptoms of an allergic reaction may include:

- rapid swelling around the eyes, lips, tongue, or throat;
- difficulty breathing, wheezing or hoarseness;
- itching, cramping, or numbness that is severe;
- stomach cramps;
- a reddish rash, or hives;
- · dizziness or even loss of consciousness.

Many people know they have an allergy to bee stings. They should wear a medical alert bracelet and carry a bee sting kit including epinephrine. The Michigan State Medical Society reminds you to avoid areas where bees have nests. If a bee is near you, do not upset it by swatting at it. Just calmly and quietly turn and walk

Can your home wiring handle the load?

Home theaters, home offices, whirlpool tubs, video games, rechargeable tools, appliances and personal computers — the landscape of our lives has changed dramatically in the past few years, reshaped by new and ever more sophisticated electrical products. But our need for increased power to operate these devices has, in many cases, outpaced our homes' ability to serve and protect us.


It's hard to believe that, not long ago, the standard electrical service installed in most homes was only 60 amps (for comparison, consider that many central air conditioning systems alone can draw up to 40 amps, and electric ranges often need 50 amps). But 60-amp service was once considered sufficient power for all of the plug-in appliances and permanently wired fixtures a typical home possessed. Of course, those were also the days before televisions in every bedroom, multiple computer households, and the proliferation of electric appliances

for teenagers to use on their hair. Today the required minimum for new homes is 100-amp service, according to the current edition of the National Electrical Code. But even this modern "standard" may fall far short of adequate for many families now, and in the not-too-

distant future.

"If you're a smart homeowner, you want to go well above the minimums. You want to add more circuits and more capacity," advises David Brender of the Copper Development Association. A member of one of the NEC's Code-making advisory panels, Brender, along with other industry experts, helps to review and propose changes that keep the electrical code up to date with improvements in technology and changing lifestyles.

Brender is quick to point out that, like all construction and safety codes, the NEC sets baseline standards only. Homeowners can, and often should, exceed the code recommendations when they build, repair or renovate.



The graph above shows the annual sales of electricity, in billions of kilowatt-hours, to U.S. homes over the past five decades. The trend illustrated shows why most homes built before 1989 are poorly equipped with electric service for today's demands.

Tips on canceling utilities

Have you moved to a new residence and months later received a telephone, electric or natural gas bill in your name at the old address? It could happen, if you do not take several precautionary steps.

What you should do when terminating utility service:

- Call the electric, natural gas, local and long distance telephone companies and request termination of your service at a specific location. Keep a record of the date, time and person(s) you talked to at the company. Call at least several weeks before you
- Request written verification of your termination request. If you do not receive a confirmation notice within 15 days of your request, contact the company again to confirm that the company will terminate service on the date requested.
- · Call the electric and natural gas companies and request a final reading of your meter(s) to make sure your final bills are based on an actual, not estimated, meter reading.
- · Schedule a time to allow the utility representative to come into your home to obtain the final or

actual usage reading from your electric and/or natural gas meter(s) if your meter(s) are inside your home.

 Do not rely on others to take any utility service out of your name when you move.

Remember, when terminating utility service, contact all companies that provide service to you.


For example, anyone expanding the electrical capacity on their home would be wise to consider installing a higher-capacity panel — 150 or 200 amps — if they have a growing family, or expect further home expansions in the years ahead.

Another smart move is to use 12-AWG copper wiring as a minimum size for all new electrical installations, even for those circuits protected by 15-amp breakers. Although thinner 14-AWG wire is allowed for most residential applications, the heavier 12-AWG wire runs cooler and is more energy efficient. You'll also benefit right away from the extra margin of safety it provides, and you won't have to run new wiring a second time if the circuit needs to carry more current in the future.

(You can simply change-out the breaker from 15 amps to 20 amios.)

According to Brender, even professionals must be encouraged to think ahead when called in to perform routine electrical work. The code presently allows electricians to calculate a home's power needs (in total watts) by multiplying the living space, or square-foot area, by a factor of three. In Brender's view, increasing that fact by at least 50 percent provides a more realistic margin for anticipated energy use in the years ahead. A recommendation to write this increase into the electrical code has been proposed, but is probably years away from adoption. Homeowners who want to upgrade now don't have to wait that long.



Dickinson — traditional, economical for family

The Dickinson's symmetrical exterior, gabled dormer and full front porch are reminiscent of the Craftsman-style homes, popular in the first quarter of this century. The windows too, multipaned on top and single paned at bottom, are typical of this period. Measuring in at just a little more than 1,400 square feet of living space, this plan is economical to build as well as to heat, making it ideal for a young family.

Following tradition, family living spaces are on the lower level, bedrooms above. Fully half of the main floor is devoted to the wide open country kitchen, sure to be the most popular area in the house. There's space here for an eating bar, a large kitchen table, and maybe even a couch and a desk for the family computer. Utilities and a small powder room are conveniently close to everything.

How to select a telephone calling card

A telephone calling card provides a convenient way for people to place calls while away from home. Calling cards eliminate the need for using coins at a pay phone or having to bill the telephone account from where you place a call.

By using a calling card, you can use your long distance telephone company of choice — at its calling card rates — and avoid unexpected charges that might be assessed by a pay phone service provider.

What types of calling cards are available?

Standard calling cards are typically issued by a local or long distance telephone company and charges for calls appear on your monthly telephone bill. Calling cards are also available as a combination credit card/calling card, where the card serves as a standard credit card with which you can make purchases, and you can also use it to place telephone calls by using a personal identification

number. All charges to the credit card, including telephone calls, are billed to the credit card account.

Prepaid calling cards are issued for a specific amount of dollars, usually in denominations ranging from \$5 to \$100, and are usable for a certain number of calling minutes, ranging from 10 to more than 100 minutes. Prepaid calling cards are issued by local and long distance telephone companies and other companies whose businesses are not telephone related.

The cards are sold through retail and convenience stores, service stations, vending machines, the Internet, and other retail outlets. Because a prepaid calling card represents telephone time purchased in advance, you are not sent a bill for the calls you make.

With each use, the call's cost is deducted from the card's balance. Generally, periodic voice prompts tell you how much time you have left on the card.

How do you choose a calling card?

First determine your individual calling needs. Do you need to make a high number of calls to different numbers while traveling, or do you need to budget each call? The standard calling card may offer the most flexibility by allowing you to place a call from any telephone, make international calls, and talk as long as you like.

Whereas, prepaid calling cards are useful if you do not have long distance service and want to limit your talk time. Once you understand your telephone usage patterns, shop around to determine the calling card that is best for you. Read the fine print and obtain written information on conditions and directions for use of the card.

What questions are important to ask?

Rates and conditions of calling card service vary widely. Call the company's customer service number and ask these questions:


Standard calling cards

- What is the per-minute rate? Are there different rates for different times of the day and can they change without notice?
- Are calls rounded up to the nearest minute, or 30 seconds, or other increment? Is the rate higher for the first minute or is there a minimum per-call charge?
- Can the card be used for local, within state, interstate, and international calls? What are the rates for each type?
- Is there a surcharge, tax, or any other additional charge for each call? If so, how much? Do the surcharges vary when calling from public telephones, hotels, etc.?
- Is there a monthly maintenance fee for the card? Is the fee assessed whether I use the card during the month or not? How much is the fee?



Pet Care

"Fluffy" bedding, including socalled "natural fluffy" or "safe fluffy" products, can be dangerous to your gerbil, hamster or other pet rodent.

Veterinarians have been reporting hundreds of such deaths every year. They occur when the little critters swallow some of the fluffy bedding — which typically is made of a blend of cotton, polyester and polyfibers — creating an intestinal blockage that is almost always fatal to the animal.

There is no practicable way to prevent these pets from ingesting pieces of the bedding since it's natural for them to stuff material into their cheek pouches, and they usually swallow some of it. Unless the material is water soluble, it's likely to swell up and cause problems ranging from constipation to fatal intestinal damage.

Many pet owners suggest that a truly safe alternative is to use paper towels, facial tissue or toilet paper for bedding. The animals love it and if won't hurt them.

(Note: Be careful not to use

paper made with lotions, perfumes or dyes.)

Wood chips fall into the "natural" category. But even these may cause problems for pet rodents because of the so-called "fragrant oils" they contain. These oils are supposed to ward off mites and fleas, but they can cause health problems for your pets. If you do use wood chips, use those that contain the least amount of these chemicals.

"Hammys" (hamster owners) also recommend the use of compressed paper bedding made from virgin wood pulp. They claim these products won't cause choking or intestinal obstructions, won't trigger any illnesses, and do not contain mites.

Must I subscribe to a carrier's local or long distance service in order to use its calling card? If no, will I pay higher rates if I am not subscribed to the telephone company's local or long distance service?

• Can I reach customer service personnel through a toll-free telephone number? What is that number? Is it available 24 hours a day?

Prepaid calling card

- Will the card expire and, if so, when?
- What is the per-minute or per-call charge?
- Is there a charge when a call is not completed?
- Is there a per-call connection fee or connection surcharge?
- Is there a higher rate for the first minute or for international calls?
- Will I be notified when one minute is remaining on my call?

How can you guard against theft, misuse?

Be careful when using your standard calling card in a public place. Place your call as privately and quietly as possible. Since some calling cards have the account and personal identification numbers printed on the card, report lost or stolen calling cards immediately to the issuing company. Avoid sharing your card or its numbers with other persons.

Who can help with a problem?

If you have problems or questions related to a standard calling card, contact the card issuer.

Antiques and Collecting

Whale oil and other burning fluids were used for light at the beginning of the 19th century, long before electricity was available. But around 1835, a different lamp fuel gained popularity — lard.

Burning fluids were liquid, and they were dangerous because they were explosive if handled carelessly. Lard was almost solid, and therefore safe. It could be made at home on the farm and could be stored. But the thick lard had to be encouraged to flow up the wick to the flame. Many special, patented lard-oil lamps were invented in the 1840s to 1860s. Most lard-oil burners were made to bring heat to the fuel. The wick holders were often wide and flat.

Q: I remember reading the "Nancy" comic strip in the 1950s. I have a Nancy-Sluggo board game that was given to me by an older cousin. It is in very good condition, with all its game pieces. Can you give me some information about the game and comic strip?

A: Ernie Bushmiller introduced Nancy in his comic strip "Fritzi Ritz" in the 1920s. In 1940, she became the star of her own strip and remained popular through the early 1960s. Sluggo was her tough sidekick. Your board game was made by the Milton Bradley Co. about 1944. It is worth about \$50.

Tip: Want to clean a copper-colored miniature souvenir building or other small copper-coated piece? Soak it in a shallow bowl in the juice of one lemon or 2 table-spoons of vinegar and enough water to cover the souvenir. Leave it only about five minutes. Dry. Repeat, if necessary. The acid of the lemon or vinegar chemically removes the oxide that is darkening the piece. But too much soaking might harm the copper coloring

Garden antiques have become one of the most popular areas of collecting. Fountains, fences, small sculptures and large urns to hold flowers are popular. But in the past 10 years there has been increasing interest in smaller garden antiques.

Tools used for gardening are also being used as decoration in gardens. Trowels made of a single piece of painted metal in the 1950s; rakes that have handmade teeth and sapling trunks for handles; early 20th-century unpainted metal buckets and sprinklers; baskets made to hold cut flowers; and even sprinklers are now wanted.


The 1940s brass nozzles — still usable — sell at collectibles shows for about \$12 to \$20. The trowels and "weed scratchers" are \$15 to \$25, depending on their condition. Old lawn mowers are expensive. Iron push mowers made before 1920 (most are dated) sell for hundreds of dollars.


Unusual-looking hand mowers bring \$75 to \$200. Sprinklers are the most popular. The wooden 1940s cut-out figure of a boy holding a hose that turns to sprinkle a large section of the lawn sells for \$75 to \$150. Metal lawn sprinklers shaped like ducks, frogs or other animals can be worth up to \$200.

The ceramic figural sprinklers made in the 1930s and '40s bring even higher prices. A Weller Pottery coppertone frog sprinkler auctioned in April for \$5,500.

Q: I just bought an enamelware coffeepot that the dealer called a "biggin." What is the difference between a coffeepot and a biggin?


A: About 1800, a man whose last name was Biggin invented the first coffee percolator. It was named after him. A biggin consists of two cylindrical tin pots. One fits on top of the other. There are two strainers at the bottom of the top section. Finely ground coffee is put in this top section, and another strainer fits over the top. Boiling water is poured through the top section, and the brewed coffee fills the larger bottom pot.

Telephone wiring standard protects consumers

Here's really good news for everyone who has Internet service at home, more than one home computer, one or more home telephone lines and a fax machine and for anyone who expects to hook up any combination of these devices someday soon:


The Federal Communications Commission recently issued a new rule requiring that all telephone wiring installed inside homes and other buildings must meet new standards. The rule, which applies to new and retrofit telephone-wire installations made after July 8, 2000, is aimed at assuring that all inside wiring can meet the demands of voice, video and data transmissions now and for the foreseeable future.

"Installers, builders, home remodelers and consumers should note that the new FCC rule specifies Category 3 wiring or better," says William T. Black, vice-president for wire and cable with the Copper Development Association Inc. "The emphasis should be on better," Black insists, recommending more powerful copper wiring instead of the minimum.

"Today Category 5 and Category 5E copper communications wiring are the recognized standard for broadband services," explains Black, "with several times greater capacity and speed than needed for today's high-speed Internet services, such as DSL and cable modems. Categories 5 and 5E have six times the information-carrying capacity of Category 3, providing a comfortable cushion for the future at little additional cost."

Category-type telephone cable consists of four twisted pairs of insulated copper wire and offers service benefits over old-style telephone cable, typically made up of two untwisted pairs, designed for analog voice service. The additional pairs of wires in category-type cable make it easier to hook up multiple phone lines and network home computers. and the precise twisting of the wires speeds communication while reducing static, signal degradation and cross-talk between separate lines bundled together

Impetus for the new telephone wiring standard came when a notfor-profit professional association of designers and installers of telecommunications systems called BICSI petitioned the FCC in 1995 after receiving many con-

sumer complaints about inferior phone wiring.

Ronald Provost, BlCSI's governmental relations representative and chairman of the FCC Ad Hoc Administrative Committee that wrote the new standard, recalls receiving reports of lamp cord and bell wire being used for home telephone hookups.

"Now that we've succeeded in setting the new minimum requirement," says Provost, "we've got to get the word out."

"This new standard will benefit consumers as carriers deploy broadband services that are more demanding than traditional voice telecommunications," comments CDA's Black. "People shouldn't hesitate to install phone jacks now wherever they think they might need them in the future, wherever they or the next family that owns their home might want to plug in a laptop or other communications device."

Advanced telephone cable is available at electrical supply outlets and electronics stores. The cable sheathing should be clearly marked with the category designation. Unlike old-style telephone wiring, with which individual jacks were typically wired in series, category-type cable requires a "home run" configuration — each outlet is wired separately to a central distribution device or hub.

Holiday partying

Q. My husband bought the barbecue grill of his dreams last week, just in time for the holiday. This is our first cookout — we just bought our first home. Any tips on making it a great party? - Rachel C., Cincinnati

A. Congratulations on your new home! Cooking out in the back yard is one of the nicest benefits of home ownership, but it's a whole different ballgame than the tiny hibachi cookouts many apartment dwellers must settle for.

Preparation is the key to having a great barbecue. You'll have to get a pen and paper and figure out just how much food and drink you'll require. Are you providing all the food? Or is it potluck, with everyone bringing a dish? What sort of drinks do your guests like? Stock enough beer, soft drinks and other beverages for everyone.

Start marinating meats and preparing hamburger patties at least a day ahead, along with any side dishes. Buy drinks and store them out of the way - cool them down on the day of the party.

Safety is another important factor. Providing rides for guests who've had too much to drink is certainly important, but what about keeping folks safe during the barbecue?

Take a walk around the back yard the day before and look for potential danger areas. Tool sheds should be closed and locked to keep curious kids out. Pick up toys and other debris from the yard. Check the ground for holes or uneven areas where a guest might trip or tip his or her chair over.

Place your new grill in an area where there won't be much traffic, especially from running children. If you have a pool, make certain that an adult stays near it at all times, even when no one is swimming.

Finally, close the doors to any rooms in your house that you don't want guests to explore, keep some cash on hand for emergency runs to the store, and relax enjoy the holiday!

The art of tiling: Cleanup

Q. I recently installed ceramic tile on the kitchen floor and countertops. The trouble is, by the time I finished the counter area around the sink, I was too tired to wipe the tiles clean (I had cleaned the floor earlier, however). I ran out of time, then, and it's been a week since I put the tiles in. Now, the grout won't come off. What can I do? - J.D.S., Syracuse, N.Y.

A. Don't lose heart. Your penance for waiting so long to clean up the tiles is a few extra hours of work and plenty of elbow grease, but you should be able to remove the dried grout streaks.

Try cleaning the area gently first, with a cloth soaked in warm water and wrung well. It may not remove the thin streaks, but repeated cleaning should loosen any large dollops of grout, allowing you to wipe them away.

If warm water doesn't do it, your alternatives depend upon the type of tile you have. Semi-glazed tiles, or tiles with a rough finish, can be cleaned with a fine-grade scrubber pad. However, if your tiles have a smooth or glossy finish, scrubber pads can leave scratch marks and dull the tiles -which would be far more difficult to remove than dried grout!

In either case, a trip to the hardware or tile store is necessary. Bring a leftover tile with you to show the salesperson. Tile stores have several types of cleanup solutions in stock, and can tell you which one to use. They'll also advise you as to whether or not a scrubber pad is safe for your tile.

Finally, if you use a cleanup solution, dilute it in a separate container according to the packaging instructions (or the tile recommendations). house's Increase the solution's strength if the first mix doesn't loosen the grout streaks. Proceed with caution, however! Don't replace elbow grease with undiluted cleaner. unless no other option works.

Burglars prey on vacationing residents

Piled up newspapers, an overflowing mailbox and an unkempt lawn do more than call attention to a family that's away on summer vacation. They alert the burglar who is scouting out the neighbor-hood for his next victim.

Most communities will experience a 10 to 18 percent increase in home burglaries during June, July and August. The greatest number, according to FBI statistics, tend to occur in July, with August a close second. The stage is set again this summer with an estimated 121.9 million U.S. adults planning to travel.

Statistics tell the story

In the United States today, burglars enter a house, apartment or condominium every 11 seconds. Two out of every three burglaries are residential in nature and 60 percent of residential burglaries occur during the daytime. In 1998, an estimated 2.3 million burglaries were reported with

losses totaling \$3.1 billion.

"A significant number of breakins could be prevented with simple precautions such as canceling a newspaper delivery, placing timers on lamps and having a neighbor take in the mail," says Tony DeMarco, spokesperson for the Burglary Prevention Council (BPC), a nationwide non-profit organization dedicated to educating the public on crime prevention measures.

DeMarco, a 30-year veteran of the Chicago Police Department, knows how criminals think. "The average burglar has only two options for entering a residence: and windows. Approximately 30 percent of all break-ins are by unlawful entry, which means no force. That statistic tells me homeowners continue to make a burglar's job too easy by leaving doors and windows unlocked." Especially during the summer, taking a quick walk around the block could end up

costing thousands of dollars. "Whether you leave your home for five minutes or five weeks, recognize that it's vulnerable whenever it's unoccupied," says DeMarco.

The Burglary Prevention Council recommends that doors and windows be fashionably secured with ornate, yet sturdy door handles and deadbolt locks. Avoid leaving gaps around doorframes, and position hinges on the inside of the door so a thief with a screwdriver will be unable to remove the entire door. Sliding doors can easily be lifted off their tracks. Place a metal or solid wood rod, such as a broomstick, on the sliding door inside track to prevent a burglar from forcing the door open.

Average dollar loss per burglary in 1998 was \$1,350, not including the cost of fixing broken doors and windows. That figure, according to DeMarco, doesn't even begin to account for the psychological damage experienced by a burglary victim.

Smart electrical upgrades for home remodelers

If your home needs a makeover, or you're simply planning to upgrade your decor, appliances or any other aspect of your living quarters, now is the best time to consider upgrading your home electrical system as well.

Home repair and remodeling projects often require some electrical work. As long as the electrician is on hand, you can usually save the cost of a service call by adding to the job as needed.

If you haven't planned electrical upgrades, a quick look around your house might convince you that you should. Do you have receptacle outlets overburdened by multi-plug strips? Are your lamps and fixtures connected to extension cords? Does every three-prong plug need a twoprong adapter? These and other wiring signs indicate a real need for electrical improvements.

Unfortunately, many homeowners wait until a problem occurs and only then do they think to call in an electrician. But there's a long list of reasons why you should inspect and improve your electrical system before an accident or service breakdown occurs. Here are a few points to consider,

Is your service adequate? Many older homes still operate with seriously outdated 60-amp electrical service — and sometimes with just a few fuses or circuit breakers to protect the entire system. Newer homes often have 100-amp service panels, but even this minimum requirement set by many current codes may fall short of your present or future needs. Consider upgrading service to 200

 Size for extra demand. If you're installing a major electrical appliance, like an electric wall oven, a microwave oven, a doublewide refrigerator or central airconditioning, you'd better think about the additional power it may need. While a salesman or installer might tell you that your system can handle the load be smart and ask your electrician for a second opinion.

 What's the correct wire size? Electricians often install 14-AWG wiring during renovations, which is adequate for most home uses. But heavier 12-AWG copper wire is a better choice because it's more energy-efficient, and you won't

have to upgrade all over again if you install appliances or fixtures with greater electrical loads. The cost difference for upgrading to 12-AWG copper wire is minimal. If you're adding a room extension or building a new home, it's a good idea to install 12-AWG wire (or larger, depending on the needs of each circuit).

 Consider special needs. Different rooms in a home serve different purposes — an important consideration when you're planning improvements, especially where electrical work is involved. Family rooms, home offices and home theaters generally need more circuits, more outlets, and built-in or plug-in power-

surge protection. Outlets in kitchens, baths, garages and outdoor areas require ground-fault circuit interrupters, or GFCIs. And you don't have to wait for a major renovation to add protection you can install many safety devices yourself, such as outlet caps, switch guards and wire shields in nurseries and children's

 And, finally, don't forget your communications wiring needs make sure telephone wiring is rated Category 5 or better to assure speedy data transmission, high-quality voice service and convenient installation as you add telephone-based services in the future.




