



George R. Grove, Jr., 21, who was born at Cottage Hospital and graduated from Grosse Pointe High School, had been in the Army 27 months. While visiting home last July, his furlough was canceled and he was ordered to return to his outfit in Korea.

doing so under the aegis of the Symphony Board's 501 status with the IRS.

This is the point of contention between the two organizations. Ed Godsalve, president of the Grosse Pointe Symphony Orchestra Society's 15-member board, said that they have a fiduciary responsibility to obtain all the money collected in the board's name.

"It is our belief that if the Symphony League members wish to dissolve its ties with us, that's their right," said Godsalve. "But we maintain that before they do so, they are obligated to turn over all the funds they collected in our name before the time they chose to change their charter, which obligated them to turn over all money raised in our name to the board."

First State Bank in St. Clair Shores doesn't want to be in the middle of this dispute and referred the matter to the Macomb County

Szulec believes the bank shouldn't have done so because the account was in the Symphony League's name. She said that the money in the account came primarily from dues paid by the Symphony League's 225 members.


"We told the board that in our 35-year association with them, we've never turned over the membership dues to them," said Szulec. "We needed it for our own operating expenses. The \$25 yearly dues goes toward things like publishing our quarterly newsletter."

A hearing was held in late August, said Szulec, before Judge Servitto. The judge told all parties that she needed more information and that they had 60 days to get all relevant documents to her. Godsalve and Szulec expect another hearing in late October.

"They aren't entitled to the money," said Szulec. "We're only talking about \$4,000. The people who paid those dues are the people who voted to secede. The legal fees will erode both our treasuries and the bitterness will preclude our future support of their orchestra.'

## College student killed in auto crash in Ontario

A Grosse Pointe Park resident was killed en route to her first visit home from the University of Rochester in New York on Thursday,

Angelica Moustardas, 18, was pronounced dead at the scene of the single-car accident about six miles east of Sarnia, Ontario, around 9:30 p.m

She was a passenger in a maroon 2000 GMC Sonoma pick-up truck found overturned in a ditch along the westbound lane of Highway

Two other passengers, Luke Arndt of Clio and Angela Ausen of Flint, were taken to Lambton Groups Hospital-Sarnia General Emergency, then transferred to McLaren Regional Medical Center in Flint. Arndt is in fair condition and Ausen in is good condition at McLaren.

The Ontario Provincial Police do not know who the driver was or what caused the accident. Their investigation continues.





### Newspapers mourn loss of champion

he death of Carl T. Rowan, who passed away in Washington recently, removed from the newspapers of America one of their foremost advocates of civil rights for minorities.

Rowan was born poor and black on Aug. 11, 1925, in Ravenscroft, Tenn., a dying southern coal mining town that was hit hard by the Depression.

After his graduation from high school, Rowan scrubbed porches in a tuberculosis hospital to earn money to attend Tennessee State College in Nashville, Tenn.

While in college, he passed a national competition that enabled him to become one of the first 15 African-Americans to be accepted as U.S. Naval officers during World War

He often told friends that his Naval commission made it possible for him to use the G.I. Bill of Rights to earn a mathematics degree from Oberlin College in Ohio and a graduate school of journalism degree at the

University of Minnesota.

His first job in journalism was as a copy editor at the Minneapolis Tribune, but he soon talked himself into a job as a reporter to cover the civil rights battles in the southern schools. That reporting assignment led him to follow it with his autobiog-

In that book, he wrote that at the time "no more than five blacks could claim to be general assignment

reporters and few of them were writing seriously about the U.S. social, political or economic scene."

Rowan's writing on civil rights prompted President Kennedy to appoint him deputy assistant secretary of state with an assignment to help integrate the State Department.

He was also a delegate to the United Nations missile crisis with Cuba, as well as ambassador to Finland by appointment of President

In the Johnson administration, Rowan was named director of the United States Information Agency, which made him the highest ranked black in the federal government.

Returning to journalism in 1965, he made race relations one of his major projects. When he went to Washington originally, he told his colleagues at the Minneapolis papers that he saw himself as a columnist and commentator who always sought to work against what he regarded as the mind-set of the media.

Rowan is survived by his wife, Vivian, who accompanied him to Detroit when he was awarded an honorary degree by Wayne State University. He was a long-time member of the elite Gridiron Club in Washington.

He also is survived by his daughter, Barbara, a former TV newswoman in Detroit, and by two sons, Carl Jr., a lawyer, and Jeffrey, a clinical psychologist, and four grandchildren.

Rowan's column was published three times a week by King Features, and appeared in about 60 newspapers. Rowan also published eight books, which included two on blacks, Thurgood Marshall, the late associate justice of the Supreme Court, and Jackie Robinson, the famed baseball

### Leningrad — a triad

There are not many people alive today who have heard of the siege of Leningrad.


They may have heard of the London Blitz, the Firebombing of Dresden and the destruction of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. We are reminded that World War II included the Holocaust, in which six million European Jews were systematically exterminated, along with millions of Gypsies, Slavs and those others who were considered to be impure and inferior.

Part of this mass destruction was the Siege of Leningrad. Leningrad was a particularly cosmopolitan city in which the arts flourished, despite Soviet rule. It had a long and glorious history that went back to the Czars, when it was called St. Petersburg, but after the October Revolution it was renamed Leningrad, after one of the founders of the communist movement.

Charles Greenwell, our great, local musicologist, recounts the events resulting in the eventual attack by the Nazi forces on this great city. In his article in Performance, the magazine of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, he writes:

"When the forces of Nazi Germany attacked Soviet Russia on June 22, 1941, most of the country's citizens were taken completely by surprise, although many government officials had been anticipating such an attack for some time. The next several months constituted a catastrophe of staggering proportions: the battlefield defeats were enormous and the casualties were without precedent. By the end of that year, Kiev had been captured and Nazi forces had surrounded Leningrad in preparation for an assault on Moscow.

"The situation in Leningrad was particularly grim. The city (whose population then totaled nearly three million people) was completely cut off from the rest of the country, and it was Hitler's intention to literally starve the city into submission. The blockade lasted from August 1941 to



February 1943 and, according to the official figures, over 630,000 people perished from starvation and other torments. Unofficial figures, however, put the death toll at close to one million people — one-third of the entire population.

"Harrison Salisbury, in his book "900 Days: The Siege of Leningrad," wrote, This was the greatest and longest siege ever endured by a modern city, a time of trial, suffering and heroism that reached peaks of tragedy and bravery almost beyond our power to comprehend...

"During the winter of 1941-42, official food rations were reduced to 500 calories a day, and people were dying everywhere: at home, at work in factories and offices, and on the street. Hitler's attempt to wipe Leningrad off the map resulted in an almost unequaled example of courage, strength and determination from the city's populace.

In the midst of this misery, Dmitri Shostakovich was composing the Leningrad Symphony, a work of music that bore the stamp of genius, from a man who himself had suffered Stalin's scorn. His answer to Stalin was his Seventh Symphony, which spoke volumes to the Russian people and restored his reputation. Shostakovich not only suffered with the people of Leningrad, but was known to feel deeply about the plight of his fellow country-

For an entire week this ragged group of tired, sick, emaciated but incredibly dedicated musicians rehearsed the symphony under the strong and knowing direction of Karl Eliasberg.

On the day of the performance, the commander-inchief of the city's armed forces ordered his heavy artillery to knock out as many German guns as possible so that there would be no interruptions in the performance. As the bombardment subsided the first note of the symphony sounded. The performance was not only the most emotionladen presentation of the work imaginable, but was surely one of the most electrifying concerts ever

The Shostakovich Seventh, the Leningrad Symphony, will be performed by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra in Detroit's Orchestra Hall, Friday, Nov. 3, at 10:45 a.m. and again at 8 p.m., and on Saturday, Nov. 4, at 8:30 p.m. I predict that each member of the orchestra and audience will have an opportunity to have an ennobling experience.



### Cold weather signals ear infection season

Sleepless nights and the sounds of a child sobbing punctuate the realization that winter, the prime season for ear and tonsil infections, is nearly upon

Children ages 1 to 5 are especially at risk for ear infections, the most frequently occurring childhood illness other than the common cold. Nearly one child in seven has multiple ear infections by age 5.

At any one time, 17 percent of youngsters may have fluid in their middle ears that can predispose them to developing infection. This fluid also can cause hearing loss and result in speech delay, diminished attention span, poor school performance

and difficulty communicating with friends or family. Ear infections frequently are associated with the common cold. They are caused by bacteria and poor functioning of the eustachian tube, which allows air to pass from the back of the nose to the ear. You may have used your eustachian tubes to equalize ear pressure when riding in an elevator or airplane.

When a nasal infection causes irritation of a child's eustachian tube, the tube swells shut, trapping fluid and bacteria in the middle ear. Within a matter of hours, difficulty hearing, pain or fever begin. Because a parent cannot see into the child's ear to determine if infection is present, a visit to the pediatrician or family physician is warranted.

For a fortunate few children there may be no symptoms at all, but an infection that is located amid the bones and nerves of the middle ear still can be a problem. The primary treatment for ear infections is a prescription for antibiotics, sometimes in conjunction with a decongestant to dry up nasal secretions. In some situations, when antibiotics do clear up the infection, the physician may prescribe a daily dose of antibiotics to prevent fur-

Occasionally, the bacteria causing the infection are resistant to some of the prescribed antibiotics. If antibiotics fail to control the ear infections, or if a child has three ear infections in six months or four infections in a year, the physician may recommend surgical insertion of ventilatory tubes into the

Another case where tubes might improve the situation is when fluid from the infections persists 10 to 12 weeks or longer, even after the infections have been eradicated. In these situations, the insertion of tubes almost always solves the problem.

Placing these "ear tubes" requires brief use of anesthesia and is painless. Using a microscope and special micro-instruments, the physician makes a tiny incision in the eardrum and inserts a small plastic tube no bigger than a pen tip.

Early parental detection of ear infections, along with appropriate medication, can prevent the pain, fever, and hearing loss frequently associated with this common childhood illness.

Tonsillitis is another illness seen frequently in children. It is an infection of the lymph nodes or glands located in the back of the throat. The adenoid is a third tonsil located behind the nose, which usually becomes infected along with the tonsils.

Tonsillitis normally is accompanied by fever, discomfort, swollen glands and missed school days. It can be treated with antibiotics. Children with more than five episodes of tonsillitis a year, four episodes two years in a row or three episodes annually for several years should have their tonsils and ade-

Abscesses and chronic sore throats that persist for months also are indicators that tonsil and adenoid surgery may be necessary. Tonsils and adenoids are so large they can cause nighttime snoring. which can become very loud, as the child gasps and struggles for air - a potentially dangerous situa-

By paying careful attention to symptoms, especially during the cold winter months, parents can help protect their children from these common childhood problems and, when they do occur, recognize the symptoms and get medical help quickly.

Those who are desperately anxious to make the wrong play (and many did) will go down. You have 3S, 3H, 2D and 3C winners. Where's number 12? The diamond and club finesses are sure losers. Therefore you have to try something else. You must, if you wish to win this hand. No ifs, ands or buts. I must tell you many didn't.

Win the heart ace. Draw three rounds of trumps and ruff a heart. Now lay down the club ace. Then your six toward Dummy's queen. If West has the doubleton king, he's end-played. Either he must lead a heart, giving you a ruff, sluff or a diamond into your tenace. If you made that play, congratulations!





### Is it homemade soup season yet?

Autumn is such a great time of year. Colors are changing and the air is crisp and clear. The days may warm up but the evenings are sure to cool down.

The time is right for

While your cupboards are probably stocked with a variety of canned soups, a venture into homemade soup may prove to be a not-so-difficult task. I had never made homemade soup until a couple of years ago. I was pleasantly surprised at how easy soups are to prepare and I love the fact that the ingredients don't always have to be exact and can be interchangeable.

This week's feature is a delicious take on tomato soup that gives you something to do with that last bunch of tomatoes from your backyard garden. This simple (Cooking Light) recipe took only an hour to prepare. I made a few changes from the printed recipe

#### Puree of Carrot and Roasted Tomato Soup

2 1/2 lb. large ripe tomatoes, cored and cut in half 2 tablespoons olive

oil, divided 1 cup chopped carrot

3/4 cup chopped shallots (3 to 5, depending on size) 1 can (14-16 oz.)

chicken broth I cup heavy cream. half and half, whole

Salt and pepper to

milk OR 2 percent

milk

Preheat of 11 to 425 degrees Liace tomato halves on a non-stick bakng sheet, skin ian up. Drizzle with 1 tablespoon of the olive oil or pray the tomato halves with olive oil cooking spray. Bake at 425 degrees for 35 minutes or until the tomatoes become tender and the skins are slightly charred. Remove tomatoes from oven, cool and remove the skins.

Meanwhile (while tomatoes are roasting in the oven), heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil in a Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add the carrots and shallots and saute for about 10 minutes. Add the chicken broth, lower the heat and simmer (partially covered) for about 20 minutes or until the car-


Remove from heat and add the tomato halves. Place about half of the tomato/carrot mixture in a blender or food processor and process until smooth. Pour into a bowl and repeat, using the remaining tomato/carrot mixture. Put the processed tomatoes back into the Dutch oven and add the heavy cream or milk of your choice. Reheat over a low flame and season with salt and pepper.

To serve, ladle hot soup into bowls and top with chopped fresh basil. If time allows, place slices of French baguette bread on a baking sheet. Spray the slices with olive oil cooking spray and sprinkle with freshly grated Parmesan cheese. Toast in

It does turn the soup into a healthy alternative for people who otherwise are not supposed to eat cream soups. You can also compromise with a combination of half and half or whole milk. I doubled the recipe to yield about 10 servings.

Stir up a pot of homemade soup for your family. The aroma of the oven roasting tomatoes will fill the cool air and warm your hearts.

# Lighting Fixtures: Add New Dimension

When redecorating a room, colors are taken into account, space, furniture, carpeting and even wall sockets. One thing that's sometimes forgotten is the feature that allows you to see all your improvements—the lighting.

With all the different options available to today's decorator, there is enough variety to satisfy even the most demanding homeowner. The important thing to remember is to ensure you pick lighting that meets your needs as well as looking good. It won't do you any good to have great looking light fixtures if you can't see them because the light's too dim.

Before you decide the style of lighting you need, consider the kind of light that can be produced:

- Direct light is harsh and produces sharp shadows and contrasts.
- Indirect light is reflected either from the ceiling or the walls and produces a softer light.
- Semi-indirect light combines both direct and indirect light with the major

portion of light reflected off the ceiling.

- General illumination refers to overall illumination where shadows are at a minimum.
- Localized lighting refers to lighting for a specific area.
- •Decorative light is used to identify to a fixture important in the lighting plans because of its appearance.

•Accent

lighting refers to dramatic or unusual lighting effects without drawing attention to the light fixture itself.

Once you determine the kind of light you want to use, you can choose from a variety of fixtures to meet your needs:

• Recessed lights are incandescent or fluorescent fixtures set into the ceiling or wall so that the fixture is flush with the surface. This type of light is used for accent lighting or general illumination.

 Ceiling mounted fixtures are installed close to the ceiling and are attached directly to the outlet box. These types of fixtures with glass shades

provide both indirect and semi-indirect light. This fixture is used primarily for general illumination.

or chain fixtures are suspended from the outlet box.

Depending upon

the fixture, they provide direct, indirect

lighting or a combination. These lights are used for general illumination, and when hung low can be used for downlight local lighting.

• Reel fixtures are similar to stem fixtures, but are suspended from the ceiling on an enclosed reel that permits the light to be raised or lowered.

• Cove lighting is indirect light produced by lamps concealed in a molding of wood, metal, plaster or glass, fastened to the upper wall or an actual part of the wall itself. The light is directed to an reflected from the ceiling. Strip light fixtures are generally used for this type of lighting.

• Wall lights are equipped with fluorescent lamps and are primarily used for general illumination, but they are also used as window valances, bed lamps, over-the-sink lamps and desk lights.

 Wall brackets are fixtures that mount on the wall. Wall bracket lighting can provide any of the three types of lighting or a combination of the three. They are used for localized lighting, decorative lighting or background illumination.

 Accent lights are adjustable lights that can be mounted on the walls or ceiling. They direct light on to a specific location. These lights are used to create dramatic and interesting effects.

Long lengths of one-inch air hose with 360-degree nozzles are snaked into the duct system through access ports drilled by the technicians. The AIRE-SWEEP compressor shoots air through the hose, which dislodges debris in a "reverse air sweep." The debris is then sucked through the system into the HEPA-AIRE vacuum connected near the furnace.

If there is more than one furnace in the house, Breath of Life hooks up to each system. "In these cases, prices range higher." In every case, the process can be adjusted to meet the needs of the homeowner.

## System allows air conditioning in older homes

When iced tea and cool showers just aren't doing the trick, residents sweating through the hot, sticky summer may be longing for central air. But those with older homes may think it is impossible to do.

Not so, says Mitchell Rosen of Liberty Total Comfort Systems. His company deals in Space-Pak System, which provides central air for houses with hot water or steam heat.

# Prepping the humidifier for winter's worst

Q. Mr. Hardware, what do I need to do to prepare my humidifier for the coming winter? Chukk of Harsens Island.

A. Chukk, a clean humidifier is a happy humidifier. This article is for those of us who failed to clean the humidifier unit this past spring. So get comfy and let's see what is needed to ready the humidifier for winter.

A happy humidifier provides lots of moisture all winter to keep the noses soft, the elbows from getting white and the plants smiling. Not to mention keeping the furniture tighter and the rooms warmer. It also prevents static electricity, which keeps my computer from getting a little jumpy.

First, we need to get the drum out. Take a sharp razor knife and trim the foam pad on the side opposite the motor (a round thing with wires feeding out of it). Lift up on the side you just trimmed and pull away from the motor. The shaft should pull out of the motor. Now just wiggle the thing up and out of the case. This is easier than it seems if your parts are buried in calcium deposits. Humidifier descaler or vinegar may help in loosening things up.

The preferred method of cleaning the pad or belt is with a liquid called Humidifier Descaler. Remove most of the water in the pan and use a cheap brush to coat all scaled surfaces. Soak the pads and/or belts for 15 minutes in equal parts descaler and water. Then clean and rinse all surfaces. Note: if this is done in the spring instead of in the fall, it is much easier.

If you don't want to run to the hardware store to purchase the



Humidifier Descaler, (what am I saying!) household vinegar, which is acetic acid, does a suitable job. Either will sweeten the humidifier that sometimes gets a little ripe.

Another note: to make this job much easier, next time use Humidifier Water Treatment. It comes in a liquid or tablet form. Though these products don't necessarily remove the buildup, they do help prevent it from hardening. By the way, you can coat the tray with a thin layer of Vaseline to prevent calcium from sticking in the first place.

Once the drum is out, the fill valve is exposed. Look for the cotter pin and straighten out the ends. Remove the pin with a pair of needle nose pliers. Pull the float assembly off and remove the washer. Take it or the whole assembly to a hardware, plumbing, or a heating cooling shop and get the washer replaced. If something gets broken, damaged or destroyed, you can replace the whole float valve. Look to spend around \$12 to \$15. A complete overhaul isn't that expensive. Don't forget to take the drum assembly with you and replace the foam pad at the same time.

Reinstall the drum and turn on the water. You may have to adjust

the float so the water is below the overflow, but still high enough to fully wet the rotating drum. Some float valves have adjustment screws while others require bending the float arm.

Be aware, dear readers, that some models use a stationary flowthrough pad rather than a drum. This style of humidifier uses a solenoid valve that literally dumps water over the pad. Some professionals prefer these models due to the amount of water they can get

into the air. However, one must keep the drain clear, due to the constant flow of excess water. The pads, solenoids, and almost all parts are reparable or replaceable so never throw them out, simply rebuild.

# Putting your pond to bed for the winter

Q. This year I installed a garden pond in my yard. How do I take care of my fish and plants during the winter?

A. The great thing about garden ponds is the fact that they do not require a lot of maintenance when properly installed. As the temperature gets colder the fish will not eat as much. Only feed the fish as much as they eat in 10 minutes. You should keep running your pump until ice forms on the water surface. It is not necessary to run the pump 24 hours a day, just enough to keep the water clear.

Try to keep most of the falling leaves out of the pond. Decaying leaves will reduce the oxygen in the water. Pond netting is available to cover the pond. This works great for the majority of the leaves. Even with the netting you will probably need to scoop out some leaves and debris that have fallen

into the pond.

The floating tropical water plants are tropical plants and will die after the first frost. If you have or know someone with a greenhouse these plants can be moved before the first frost and kept till next year. Most of us treat the floating plants as annuals and discard them. After the first frost cut most of the foliage off the marginal bog plants. These are the plants that are in the pond near the water surface. Then lower the plants to the bottom of the pond. As long as your pond is at least 18 inches or deeper, the roots of the plants should not freeze. Another option is to store them in a cool dark place. A basement, cellar or attached garage will do fine if it does not get below freezing. Keep the plants moist and they will be dormant until spring.

The fish are tougher than most people think. As the weather gets cooler you can stop feeding them. The cold weather does not bother



the fish. As long as the water is deep enough to prevent it from freezing solid, you only need to keep an open spot in the ice so the carbon dioxide gases can escape. The simple way to do this is by putting a floating pond heater in the water. These pond heaters will keep an area open even in the coldest weather. They turn off automatically when the temperature is above freezing. Another way of keeping the water from freezing is to leave the pump recirculating near the surface. The moving water will help reduce the ice from

Remove your pump and filter during the winter and store them in the basement. You don't want any water that may be in there to freeze and damage the pump. The water should not be removed from a poly preformed pond or liner pond even if there are no fish or plants. Without the weight of the water the soil around your pond may collapse or shift into the hole. Both liners and preformed ponds have enough elasticity to expand with the freezing water.







# Little things help make painting a success

Are you tired of devoting precious spare time and money to redecorating, and then never being completely satisfied with the results? You can end a lot of that frustration, at least with the painting end of it, by simply paying attention to a few small, easily mastered details.

We all know that a fresh coat of paint is the fastest and usually most economical way to give a room a bright new look, but getting that "professional finish" makes all the difference in the appearance and in your satisfaction with a job well done.

One of the simplest tricks involves making a seamless transition between the painted wall surface and base moldings, casings, or other trim. Those gaps where trim doesn't perfectly meet the wall turn into black holes in the finished job. Before you paint, run some caulking (acrylic or latex works best) along those edges, to fill the gaps, then smooth it with your finger. Any excess can be cleaned up with a dampened cloth.

Don't stop at the base molding. Check where the door or window casing meets the wall. If your room has crown molding, fill any gaps you find there, too.

Now you can paint a neat, accurate edge at the trim line. The difference this small effort makes in the finished job is stunning.

Tricks like this one will increase your satisfaction at the end of the project, but so will using the right tools. Choose a professional quality angle sash brush for cutting in the edges, and use a brand name shedresistant roller cover, too.

A small extension pole can be quite handy. It makes roller painting easier because you may not need a ladder for hard-to-reach areas. Also, you can use two hands to hold the pole and paint with long, sweeping strokes, which reduces fatigue. Choose a pole that's strong and locks into different lengths. The Wooster Sherlock adjustable pole is a good example. Its fiberglass outer shell in combination with a hexagonal aluminum

inner pole prevents twisting. It's available in various lengths, including a one-to-two-foot version that's ideal for interior painting.

Finally, choose a good-quality roller frame. You will be using it more than the other tools, so make sure it spins smoothly and has a comfortable, "adult-sized" handle. Many economy frames don't hold the roller

"adult-sized" handle. Many economy frames don't hold the roller securely and it tends to slip off the open end. It's a nuisance to continually push the roller back on the cage. Paint can also collect in the open end when the roller starts to slip. This excess paint tends to drip and splash across walls at the worst possible time.

Conversely, it can be very difficult and messy to remove the paint-soaked roller once the job is complete. When you're done with your painting project, the last thing you want to do is struggle with a stuck roller cover.

A new roller frame called the Snapshot, just introduced by The Wooster Brush Co., can solve all these frustrations. It has a fullsized, cushioned handle that promises more comfort and less fatigue than roller frames with hard plastic handles. Another unique feature is a mechanism that literally locks the roller cover on the frame then releases it on command for easy disposal.

Once you "snap" the roller cover in place, it's held tightly and won't slip or walk-off. To release, simply rap the frame over the edge of a large bucket or trash can. The roller will release with a "shot" and slide off.

# An unhealthy tree may show early color

In many parts of North America, people will soon enjoy one of nature's finest shows: fall foliage. Color-changing leaves make for a beautiful display, but early changes in leaf color can be a sign that your tree is stressed and susceptible to insect and disease attack.

If the leaves on your trees seem to have gotten a jump-start on fall compared with those on similar trees in the area, then you might want to consult a professional arborist, who can identify any problems and offer possible solu-

"Premature colors can be an indication that a tree isn't vigorous enough to withstand insects and disease organisms that may attack it, not to mention the usual changes that occur when the weather turns cold," says Peter Gerstenberger, director of safety and education with the National Arborist Association (NAA).


Occasionally only one or two limbs of the tree will show premature fall color. This could be a sign of a disease at work, weakening only the infected limbs. The more common situation is for the entire tree to exhibit premature fall coloration, a phenomenon usually linked to root-related stress. "Trees respond to these stresses by trying to curtail their above-ground growth," explains Gerstenberger.

Leaves can be thought of as small factories containing raw materials, products and byproducts, all in chemical form and some with color. As the leaf is "abandoned" by the tree, the green chlorophyll — the dominant chemical found in most leaves — is broken down and "recycled" by the tree, leaving behind other-colored chemicals. Supply lines to the leaves also become clogged. If the major chemical remaining in the abandoned leaf is red, then the leaf turns red. It it's yellow, then the leaf turns yellow, and so on.

"The yearly variation in color intensity is due to varying weather conditions, which can affect the balance of chemicals and their composition in the leaves," says Gerstenberger. Differing amounts of rainfall, sunlight, temperature, humidity and other factors may have an affect on how bright, how quickly and how long the "leafpeeping" season will be in any given year.

If you are unsure about your tree's health, consult a professional arborist who will identify and remove hazards, as well as treat the causes of tree health problems.

She set those bowls on opposite ends of her long, narrow, lace covered Hepplewhite table.

It was fun to place that replica grater on a long, narrow, antique, lace and oil cloth, "harvest" table and tell my family it was just like the one my children's great grandmother used with this, her original recipe. I enjoyed the familiar sound of the wood and metal turning, grating the cheese. But because it wasn't dried quickly and efficiently after washing, it rusted.

I purchased a new plastic and metal cheese grater at one of those kitchen cooking parties usually hosted at someone's home. The gadget grates efficiently and is easy to clean and turns out the same consistency of grated cheese my grandmother's grater did. Though I miss the wooden handle and the sound of the old grater, this high-tech grater works great, and the fresh grated cheese still smells as tantalizing.

I also enjoy using the old painted wooden handled implements like the ones I saw my grandmothers use. Those old wood-handled flippers are lightweight and have a "depression era" look and feel


about them. Because I found the old, perhaps lead, paint chipping off them, I've had to set them aside with the intention of displaying them one day.

Recently at another cooking party, the demonstrator introduced a cookie dough scoop that makes homemade cookies look store bought. She demonstrated how to make a thumb-print cookie using another utensil. Wait a minute, I thought to myself, I like the imperfect look of home baked goods, and there is no other cookie I would enjoy more than one with my mother's thumb print in it — I felt sad.

The demonstrator also showed a new petite rolling pin used to roll pie dough right in the pie plate — no fuss, no mess. Still saddened, I thought of my grandmother's large, thick, wooden rolling pin I inherited, and how I don't ever want to stop using it. I left the party very happy nonetheless because I was able to buy a stone to cook on — how primitive.

All in all, we're fortunate to use the old with the new — lest we forget the sound, feel and use of it.


