

Antonio's gets license upgrade

Patrons will be able to enjoy a bottle of beer or a glass of wine at two Grosse Pointe Woods restaurants after the city council unanimously voted to grant Bucci Ristorante and Ferlito's Restaurant a tavern license during Monday's council meeting.

In addition, the city council voted in favor of Antonio's upgrading its tavern license to a Class C liquor license on condition that the license stays in Grosse Pointe Woods and not be sold and moved to another city within Wayne County.

"We feel the three restaurants have been established in the community for a long I don't think being around time, and we understand how nice it is to drink a

glass of wine or a beer with a great meal," Grosse Pointe Woods mayor Robert Novitke said.

Bucci Ristorante and Ferlito's Restaurant originally applied for a Class C liquor license, which means there is consumption of served beer, wine and liquor on the premise, and Pizzeria Venti applied to receive a tavern license, which is the consumption of only beer and wine on the premises.

However, city council members denied Pizzeria's request, stating the business hasn't been operating in the community long enough (it opened in February of this year) to be granted the tavern license.

"We want to see Pizzeria Venti stay around for a while in the area," council member Patricia Chylinski said. "It has great food but







When the system was designed during the early 1900s, more than half the flow of lake water was pumped to a filtration plant in Highland Park to serve the city's many residents and industrial customers. The rest was processed at the Farms plant on Moross between Lakeshore and Grosse Pointe Boulevard.

"By the old contract, about 17 mg was allocated to Highland Park," Biehl said. "About 13 mg was allocated to Grosse Pointe Farms."

These days, as Highland Park's population declines and its factories close, the city doesn't need to filter as

much water as it used to. water superintendent. Officials from the Farms and two other Pointes smald like to take over that small capacity.

Leaders of Grosse Pointe Shores and Woods would like to join the City as customers of the Farms water department.

Last January, Shores officials initiated a \$24,000 study for it and Woods to buy water from the Farms. Doing so would eliminate the recent trend of price increases from their water supplier, the Detroit Water Department.

"To provide water for the Shores and Woods, we would have to upgrade the plant to get more capacity," said Scott Homminga, Farms Biehl said.

The study was expected to take 80 days

during which they will look at the situation and get back to us," Biehl said. "We can look at the cost of building a separate intake for our water. I'm going to put some numbers together for that while we're waiting for Highland Park to make a decision on where they're going."

Highland Park, which is in receivership and strapped for money, is rumored to be courting customers to buy excess water capacity.







Defective bullet-proof vests prompt change in wardrobe for local police

It's a matter close to every police officer's heart --- bullet-proof vests.

A Grosse Pointe officer doesn't go on patrol without a vest strapped to his or her

Imagine the tone at Farms headquarters when word came that vests on which officers stake their lives can't be guaranteed to stop a bullet.

"Concern for my officers on the road is paramount," said Dan Jensen, deputy director. "If my guys can't do the job because they're not properly equipped, that means residents aren't being properly represented, either."

The Farms' 25 bullet-proof vests are among nearly 100,000 that manufacturer Second Chance Body Armor recommends replacing immediately.

Matthew Tepper, Farms assistant city manager, is wringing the municipal budget for \$9,300 to replace the public safety department's entire inventory.

"It has priority concern," Tepper said. "It's a health and safety issue."

Body armor was already a standard part of the uniform when Jensen joined the force in 1978.

Studies in late 2003 showed vests containing Zylon, a material introduced in the late 1990s as a lighter armor, degrade faster than release in June. the presumed five to sevenyear lifespan.





'Papa's' river preserved in perpetuity

e, the media, are often criticized for never printing good news, but this week is an exception.

Those looking for something positive in the news should be sure to read this week's story by Editor John Minnis about local Grosse Pointers' work with The Nature Conservancy to preserve more than a quarter of a million acres of Upper Peninsula forest for sustainable lumbering, as well as public access and recreation.

The story concerns The Nature Conservancy of Michigan's Northern Great Lakes Forest Project.

The mission of The Nature Conservancy, a nonprofit organization, is to preserve the plants, animals and natural communities that represent the diversity of life on Earth by protecting the lands and waters they need to survive.

To accomplish this, The Nature Conservancy buys at market prices vast tracts of forest and other natural land, and through legal means limits commercial, recreational and residential use in order to preserve the prop-

erty in perpetuity. But unlike Teddy Roosevelt's National Parks, Nature Conservancy land is not purchased with taxpayer dollars — other than possible onetime grants — nor is it owned or man-

aged by the government.

The Upper Peninsula property, for example, will continue to be privately owned real estate and will remain on the tax rolls. Further, the forests will continue to be harvested, but at a sustainable level. Public access for hiking, fishing and other non-destructive activities will continue to be allowed. Residential development will be limited.

But, again, the beauty of The Nature Conservancy project is that it accomplishes many laudable goals without relying primarily on taxes, and it preserves lumbering and tourism jobs.

For Grosse Pointers, there are many interesting angles to this story.

First, many Grosse Pointe founding families' fortunes were made in lum-

bering. So it seems appropriate that many Grosse Pointers, including Lloyd Semple, William Howenstein, Randolph Agley, Richard Manoogian and James Nicholson, are working voluntarily with The Nature Conservancy to preserve Michigan hardwood forests.

Another interesting sidebar is the fact that much of the Upper Peninsula — 390,000 acres — was owned by Hawaii, or, more precisely, by the Kamehameha Schools. The island schools were founded in 1878 by Princess Pauahi, great-granddaughter and the last royal descendant of Kamehameha the Great, the last king of Hawaii.

We recall as schoolchildren hearing that the U.P. was "owned" by Hawaii. Of course, we discounted the story as a myth. According to Helen Taylor of The Nature Conservancy, Hawaiian schoolchildren point to the U.P. and claim it as belonging to Hawaii. It appears they were right.

Apparently much of the U.P. was

part of a trust created by Princess Pauahi to support the Kamehameha Schools in perpetuity. Now that same land will be preserved in perpetuity for all Michigan schoolchildren and residents.

Another interesting aspect of the Northern Great Lakes Forest Project is that The Nature Conservancy was outbid for the land by The Forestland Group, which acquires and manages timberland investments for institutions, families and individuals.

But not to give up, The Nature Conservancy — in large part with the help of Mr. Semple at Dykema Gossett — negotiated a "working forest easement" with The Forestland Group, which allows The Nature Conservancy to control the land without owning it.

The Northern Great Lakes Forest Project, which will be dedicated in September, also preserves the Two Hearted River watershed and forest made famous by Ernest Hemingway's short story, "Big Two Hearted River." We think "Papa" would be pleased.

We have tried to refrain from resorting to the much-overused "win win" descriptor for this story, but we have to say it. It is a win-win for Michigan, the U.P. and conservation.

am in awe of our daughters. In fact, I am in awe of all young parents and how differently they approach their parental responsibilities from the way we did some 40 years ago.

I want to do it over again and make it more lighthearted. Did I have to become a grandmother to learn to lighten up? Probably. The view becomes much clearer from a distance of decades and experience.

Dad shared in the sporty stuff, coaching teams and stopping for treats after a game. Now dads change diapers, read bedtime stories and help with baths. Time spent with the children in the home is often equally shared, and all sides benefit.

This observer senses a healthy exchange of respect and humor in young families today. I salute the total commitment the parents have to their children as well as their skills in choreographing the schedules so demanding for each member. Parents and children are buddies sharing, haying mature dialogue and truly enjoying their relationships. Our phone rings daily with snippets of the latest clever sayings, responses and joyous anecdotes shared. They play spontaneous games like categories or props and can make any moment magic.

One of the most rewarding aspects of the open dialogue and humor shared with young families today is the absolute delight they take with each other. Laughter is a huge part of their lives, and it is indeed infectious.

Did this evolution take place gradually over the last 40 years, or is it just a matter of perspective? We had lots of silly times and more than our share of laughter with our children, but they were always the children, and our roles were those of protector and teacher.

Perhaps it was the simpler times we lived in. We understood the same music and television. There were no computers or iPods. We felt safe on our streets and in our big cities. We were innocent together. Now children seem to be born older, exposed to grownup things earlier, and the balance has changed.

Our kids are our pals early in their lives, and communication is more open and honest. Questions are direct and candid answers expected. These are miraculous times to be a grandparent and to witness the wondrous lives unfolding before us. Once again we count our blessings.

Although it is disturbing to see that members of this community have found themselves so frustrated that they felt it necessary to mount a recall effort against certain members of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, it is equally disturbing that the letters to the editor procured to oppose this recall so readily ignore some of the salient facts that may have prompted the recall in the first

The recall petition published in this paper last week stated the board members failed to "proactively respond" to concerns about nonresidents attending the

Yet one of the letter writers last week suggested that board action taken between May 2 and July 5 in response to a petition containing 3,000 signatures could hardly be deemed a "failure to respond."

The problem is the recall petition is based on a failure to proactively respond, and one of the definitions of proactive is: controlling a situation by causing something to happen rather than waiting to respond to it after it happens.

recall are ignoring is that last September a community resident wrote to the Grosse Pointe News expressing dismay about the number of nonresidents enrolled in our

In response to that letter, the Oct. 4 board of education meeting included a presentation from Mr. Fenton where, in response to leadquestions by Mr. Brennan, he "shot the messenger" by suggesting that "every statement (in the letter) is false" (Grosse Pointe News "District Refutes Student Residency Complaints" Oct. 21, 2004).

"Not a week goes by that we're not investigating," said Mr. Fenton at the board of education meeting.

Other board members sat mute, never suggesting procedures could be reviewed and seemingly satisfied with the representation that a "small percentage" of students do attempt to attain admission illegally but in the past five years the number has remained the same.

Community were also told to contact the district with the identities of suspected violators

Is that proactive? Hardly. Apparently community members (who were later accused in the press of employing "witch hunt tactics") took this invitation seriously.

Again, who was proactive? This community would have been saved the metropolitan-wide embarrassment brought upon it if the board of education had given credence to the concerns of its constituents and been proactive nine months prior to May 2 by requiring the district administration to evaluate the processes and procedures employed in checking residency status. Sadly, community members took it upon themselves to survey how the issue was handled in other districts.

This paper also reported that the recall petition is based in part on the board's "failure to efficiently manage school budget."

What is striking about the board members initially targeted by the recall petition is that they are all members of the project oversight committee. This community will need to pay close attention to how the precedents estab-





36 high school students commended

To the Editor:

On June 18 through June 27, I had the pleasure of helping to lead 36 high school youths to Jamaica on a mission trip through Grosse Pointe Memorial Church.

The Grosse Pointe area is blessed with talented and giving youth. Our youth are more involved in extracurricular activities than any previous generation, while having to attend more days of school than any previous generation. They, according to the media, are overworked, self-centered, and very materialistic people.

All that makes what these 36 students did more amazing. The day after school ended in Grosse Pointe, these 36 students woke very early, 3 a.m., and flew to Jamaica to help others at the Caribbean Christian Center for the Deaf.

The students could have stayed home and relaxed at our municipal pools, gone sailing on our beautiful lake, or been earning money to buy things. Instead, they dug septic tank pits by hand - 12 feet deep and 11 feet wide - in above 90 degree temperatures.

The students built classrooms, cleaned up trash around the school, and mixed thousands of pounds of cement and mortar. Most importantly, the students learned sign language and made relationships with some deaf children in Jamaica.

The real Jamaica, the Jamaica tourists never see outside their first-world resorts, is so poor that families usually do not educate deaf children because they cannot waste resources on children "that won't amount to anything." These children rank in the scum-of-theearth category, according to worldstanderdsnaw entine

Our youth, however, loved them and helped them. They did not see the scum of the earth, but precious, lovable children, who could not speak for themselves, who had trouble helping themselves, who just needed love.

That week the children knew they were loved. In

return, our youth received more than they gave. They received firsthand knowledge of how blessed they were to be living in Grosse Pointe with great resources and wealth.

Our youth also received a sense that one could be happy without material goods as these deaf students

One of the most inspiring

youth on the trip was Charles "Chuck" Smith of the City of Grosse Pointe. Chuck recently graduated from Grosse Pointe South. He gave his first and last week of summer to help deaf children in Jamaica. Chuck went to boot camp for the U.S. Naval Academy the day after returning from Jamaica. When explaining why he chose to go into the military, he told the group that it was not because he particularly wanted to be a pilot, even though he does, but really it was because he loved all his friends so much that he wants them to have freedom.

The self-sacrifice embodied by Chuck and his 35 peers is outstanding and certain to change my paradigm. As a young adult, it gives me great pride to see these future leaders leading by doing, not by words. In this hectic and self-centered world, these youth give us all a priority check and a model of what it means to live for others. These youth did what must of us only ever think about, they got up, went out, and did something good for someone else.

Can Bush ever restart this tepid stock market?

New York Stock Exchange floor traders called the first half of 2005 a "yo-yo" a seesaw or a teeter-totter! Six months' volume on the NYSE totaled about 1.2 trillion shares purchased, and the same amount sold.

But for all that activity since year-end, the DJI came up minus 4.4 percent; the Nasdaq Composite fell 5.4 percent, and the S&P 500 Index was short 1.4 percent!

The excuses, frustrations and aggravations would fill a paperback novel — the deluge of money printed by the Fed, the gas pump prices, unpleasant air travel, stagflation, the neverending Iraq war, the twin deficits, Congressional gridlock, continual Fed tightening, etc.

Why so blue when the markets are up?

Even though the markets were down a whisker for the first half, investors were cheered by the second quarter's uptick, which almost recovered the first quarter's sizable loss.

Overall, Wall Street was happy that the first week of July posted a nice recovery, with the Dow up 146 points, or 1.4 percent; the Nasdaq Composite rose 56, or 2.7 percent, and the S&P 500 climbed 17, or 1.5 percent,



all in spite of the terrorist bombings in London.

The UBS Index of Investor Optimism in June remained substantially below its level of the first quarter. The New York Times (July 10) reported that Jonathan Golub, U.S. equity strategist at J.P. Morgan Funds, stated, "I'm shocked at the level of apathy --- perhaps even pessimism - about the market given the current environment for stocks. The public has this thing really really wrong."

Last Monday began the first week of the second quarter earnings reports by large corporations. Yearover-year gains are expected to average 7-plus per-

Back last May, many analysts said oil and energy stocks were fully priced; some said overpriced. That was before the big Chinese tuna — CNOOC, Limited threw up an all-cash, \$18 billion offer for Unocal Corp., topping Chevron's earlier bid of \$16.4 billion stock and cash that had already been accepted by Chevron's board subject to a stockholders' vote on Aug.

CNOOC's bid is 12.8 percent higher than Chevron's. Since Goldman Sachs and J.P. Morgan are CNOOC's

advisers, the higher bid indicates the price of poker has gone up in the oil patch.

Dreman further writes. "If oil prices hold near current levels (\$59.63, last Friday), significant room for (stock price) multiple expansion exists. For both the smaller integrateds and the exploration-only groups. there is a good chance that the increasing pace of turnovers will continue."

The more assets Vanguard gathers, the more it can lower its expenses. Last year. Vanguard's average fund expense ratio was 0.23 percent, versus the industry average of 1.4 percent, according to Vanguard and Morningstar, the Chicago firm that tracks mutual funds. In 1984, Vanguard's average expense ratio was 0.6 percent.

Why did Vanguard's expense ratio keep declining while the non-mutualized funds' expenses remain about the same? Who sucked off the economies of scale in the publicly managed companies? Answer: The management company, which provides the staff to operate the fund and selects the directors who "negotiate" the fees to be paid by the fund to the management company.

About two years ago (See LTS June 12, 2003) LTS reprinted portions of an earlier article (See LTS Nov. 22, 2001) in which LTS wrote about the IPOs of mutual fund management companies: "Wall Street said at the time, buy the managers' (stock), not their funds."

Last week, these mutual

fund management companies urged the U.S. Chamber of Commerce to

file a lawsuit against the SEC to void the latter's decision of June 30 upholding its prior order that 75 percent of all mutual fund directors and its chairman must be "independent" of the fund's management company.

This game of politics and poker with the courts and the SEC is very detrimental to the mutual fund Industry.

As a mutual corporation, Vanguard has no outside management company. Vanguard's stockholders elect its board, which hires its management personnel just like your (former) mutual S&L, mutual credit union or mutual insurance company.

That's why the Vanguard Group now manages close to \$1 trillion of assets and is No. 1 in the fund indus-

Grosse Pointe's contempobusiness moguls haven't become emotional tree-huggers. Rather, Nature through The Conservancy, these business leaders have helped protect more than a quarter of a million acres of Upper Kamehameha Peninsula forest.

More diesels,

hybrids expected

New vehicles powered by hybrid electric or clean diesel engines are expected to garner 11 percent of U.S. sales by 2012 -- up from 4.8 percent in 2005, according to a report by J.D. **Power-LMC** Automotive Forecasting Services in Westlake, Calif.

The report shows that hybrids, which accounted for 0.5 percent of the U.S. market in 2004, are expected to increase to 3.5 percent market share by 2012, while diesels are expected to grow from 3 percent market share in 2004 to 7.5 percent.

"Higher gas prices are acting as a catalyst for automakers and consumers to find alternatives to the traditional gasoline internal combustion engine," said Anthony Pratt, senior manager of global powertrain forecasting at J.D. Power-LMC. "We anticipate this will lead to dramatic growth, particularly with diesels, over the next several years."

While automakers contine to design hybrid vehicles, they also are turning to diesels to help them offer more fuel-efficient alternatives. However, new U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency regulations, which


go into effect in 2007-2008, require cars and light-duty trucks to meet Tier 2 emissions standards of 0.07 grams of NOx per mile. Diesel technology, coupled with low-sulfur fuel that will be available at gas stations next year, will have to meet these standards before these vehicles can be sold in the United States.

"Most consumers are already familiar with diesel technology, whereas automakers are still trying to educate consumers about hybrid technology," said Pratt. "Outside of meeting future emission standards, the biggest challenge for automakers concerning diesel technology will be convincing consumers that today's diesel engines have increased performance and run cleaner and quieter than previous-generation diesels."

The price premium associated with alternative powertrain vehicles continues to be a prohibiting factor that will limit the potential for both hybrid- and dieselpowered vehicles, J.D. Power said. Pratt noted that manufacturers will have to reduce this premium to attract buyers who are not currently motivated to purchase these vehicles as a means to improve the environment, or as a means to save money by consuming less fuel.

Despite the price premium, the study shows the number of hybrid electric models on the market is expected to increase from 10 in 2005 to 44 by 2012, while the number of diesel models is expected to grow from 14 to 26.

"The bulk of the growth in hybrid models will be in SUVs and midsize cars," Pratt said. "The bloom of diesel vehicles will be in the pickup truck segment, as well as the luxury car and SUV segments."

Smooth sailing for 2005 Bayview Riverfest Regatta

"Mom! Mom! Bye, Mom!," yelled Julie Griffin, 13, of Grosse Pointe Park.

"Bye, Julie! Good luck!," yelled back her mother, Sue Griffin, who was standing outside Bayview Yacht Club as Julie steered her sailboat from the harbor out to the Detroit River.

Julie was one of nearly 200 junior sailors, ranging from 7 to 18 years old, who participated in the 2005 Riverfest Regatta hosted by Bayview from Wednesday, July 6 to Friday, July 8.

The Bayview Yacht Club Junior Sailors, a nonprofit organization supporting youth sailing, organized and hosted its first Riverfest Regatta last year as a way to give young sailors an opportunity to build their handling skills in the swift current of the Detroit River.

The yacht club is located along the river, a short distance from Lake St. Clair.

"This gives the kids a chance to race in the current," said Grosse Pointe resident Kent Colpaert, Sailing BYC Junior Riverfest Regatta chairperson. "The lake (Lake St. Clair) has no current, except in the channel. When the water from the lake funnels into the Detroit River, the volume of water creates a steady three or four knot current."

When sailing in the river, sailors must adjust their course to the strength of the current and the wind as opposed to sailing in a lake where sailors are mainly concerned about the strength and direction of the

The opportunity to sail in

a current attracted many young sailors from around the Midwest to participate in the regatta. Among the out-of-town entrants was Ryan Lashaway, 18, of Toledo, Ohio.

"I wanted to get out of my area to sail against other people - different competition," said Lashaway. "I think the level of competition is a lot stronger than where I'm from."

The competitors raced in three different classes of boats ranging in size from 8 to 15 feet. The first class is the single-handed — one person — Optimist (Opti) dinghies, in which mostly 7to 12-year-olds sail. The next class is the Flying Junior (FJ) which are double-handed — two people boats. They are the feeder boats for the third class, Laser 420's, which are boats

Walk to raise funds, honor breast cancer survivors

The Breast Cancer 3-Day is one of many three-day 60-mile walks to raise awareness and money to support breast cancer research, education, screening and treatment programs. It's a chance for walkers to rally for those who are fighting breast cancer and to honor those who have lost their battles against breast cancer.

It's also a chance for breast cancer survivors to celebrate their victories.

Michigan's Breast Cancer 3-Day is Friday through Sunday, July 15-17. Walkers will start out at Meadow Brook Music Festival in Rochester Hills and end at the State Fairgrounds. This year, their friend Claudia is walking with them as a breast cancer

10 members on their team this year. Calling themselves The Ol' Broads for Better Boobies, they've been training by walking at least 10 miles every other day.

"One of the more positive aspects of training is that with walking, you actually need carbs," Pickens said. "So, we have burned our South Beach and Dr. Atkins' books, at least for the summer."

Rachel Bruno, 19, will be a sophomore at Elmhurst College in Illinois in September. She will walk in the 3-Day for the first time this year. She is walking in memory of her grandmother, Joy Hibbard, who died of breast cancer when Rachel was 8 years old.

"I decided to participate because I truly honestly believe that every effort makes a difference. So many families are affected (by this disease).

Bruno has been training for the 3-Day since October. She works at Curves, she walks and jogs, she does yoga and pilates exercises. "Lately I've been walking 12 miles a day, three or four days a week. Sometimes I jog also, just for fun."

Alcohol and HIV

By Jeff and Debra Jay **Special Writers** Dear Jeff and Debra:

I am a single parent, and my 14-yearold daughter and I have always talked openly about everything, including alcohol, drugs and sex. Recently, she has admitted to drinking and says many of her friends are engaging in oral sex.

While she denies being sexually active, l am not so naive as to think that a girl drinking alcohol and

hanging out with friends who are

sexually active won't do something sooner or later. I am worried that boys will take advantage of her, but she tells me she can handle these situations. She is mature for her age, so maybe I shouldn't be concerned. Or should I?

- Trying to Be a Good Mom

Dear Trying:

We've written several columns about why a zero tolerance for alcohol is necessary for teenagers. Drinking at your daughter's age will physically change her brain, stunt her emotional and social development, hinder her ability to make good decisions, affect her memory and ability to learn, and increase her risk for accidents, having unprotected sex and date rape. These are all reasons for con-

The journal "Pediatrics" published a study about teens and oral sex, which found that one in five ninth-graders admits to having oral sex and almost one-third say they plan on trying oral sex within the next six months.

Kids also believe that oral sex is less risky and more acceptable for their age group than sexual intercourse, and boys and girls voiced similar opinions about oral sex. In other studies, one out of four teens say that oral sex is "almost always" or "most of the time" part of a casual relationship.

One out of five believes that oral sex is

One risky behavior leads to other risky behaviors. For example, children who drink alcohol are more likely to become sexually active and less likely to practice safe sex. According to a government Web site oral sex is replacing the

"spin-the-bottle" games of yesteryear among children as young as 11 and 12 years old. Oral sex is reported to occur on school buses, during class, on play-

grounds and at parties.

Research conducted at UCLA shows a correlation between drinking and increased risk of HIV infection through oral sex. The study found that cells from the lining of the mouth, after being exposed to concentrations of alcohol similar to beer for 10 minutes were three to six times more susceptible to HIV infection than cells that were not exposed.

It is apparent that our children need further education about the dangers of HIV infection, since half of all new cases are among people under 25 years old, and infection among teenagers is on the rise.

Children are at a higher risk of becoming sexually active if parents believe teenage sex is appropriate or inevitable and drinking is a normal teenage activity. When there is little parental monitoring, alcohol use and sexual behavior is more likely to occur.

Other risk factors include having only one parent in the household, poor grades, dating someone two or more years older and working a paid job for more than 20 hours a week.

We suggest you make it very clear to your daughter that you disapprove of teenage sex and alcohol use. Discuss the emotional and physical dangers of both and the realities of HIV infection.

Since you are a single parent, create daily family rituals to strengthen a sense of connection.

One of the best ways to do this is by eating dinner together every night and talking about your day in a meaningful

Take walks together or engage in a hobby you both enjoy. Ask your daughter for a commitment to abstain from alcohol, other drugs and sexual activity. It is advisable to restrict dating activities until age 16. In addition, encourage her to get involved with group and extracurricular activities and to find new friends who are not engaging in risky behaviors.

Kid-friendly barbecue ideas

It's always fun to go gourmet at backvard gettogethers, but you have to remember the little ones. Hot dogs are a safe summer choice for kids, but even hot dogs get boring by the Fourth of July. The following recipe for sloppy joes will rejuvenate the kids' menu at your next barbecue.

3/4 cup barbecue sauce (your choice) 1/2 cup ketchup 2 tablespoons brown sugar

2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce 8 medium hamburger buns

In a medium nonstick

skillet, combine the oil, onion, beef, garlic, salt and pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat for 5 to 7 minutes, until the meat is brown and crumbled. Drain any visible fat.

Add the barbecue sauce, ketchup, brown sugar, and Worcestershire sauce. Bring the mixture to a boil, then reduce to a simmer and cook and stir for about 15 minutes uncovered.

Cover the skillet and cook on low for another 10 minutes (or so) to allow the flavor of the meat to marry with the sauce. Ladle the meat onto toasted hamburger buns.

My barbecue sauce choice ended up being a combination of Sweet baby Ray's and KC. Masterpiece, which left my sloppy joes with a nice balance of sweetness and hickory. Choose a barbecue sauce that your children enjoy. Double the recipe for large groups. My joes tasted even better

creamy sauce boasts a kidfriendly flavor. For every 1 pound bag of fresh slaw mix, combine in a small bowl, 3/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, 3 tablespoons sweet pickle juice, 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon celery seed and a pinch or two of ground white pepper.

Whisk together and pour over the slaw mix. Toss until well combined. Chill at least one hour before serving. This can also be prepared the night before.



Edsel & Eleanor Ford House

Edsel & Eleanor Ford House was designed by Albert Kahn and built to look like a cluster of English Cotswold village cottages, complete with stone roofs, vine-covered walls and leaded glass windows. The Ford's progressive thought is also reflected in the modern rooms in this historic home. The home

offers 30,000 square feet of art and

design for each visitor to absorb.

The Ford home is situated on 86 acres of lakefront property including 3,000 feet of Lake St. Clair shoreline, which makes for a beautiful view. Jens Jensen, one of America's foremost landscape architects and conservationists, designed the Ford House garden landscape between 1926 and 1932.

Jensen's unique design style leads many to believe that the landscape is natural, but it was in fact meticulously designed including woodlands, meadows, wetlands and rockwork. Jensen was known for his use of native plants, the sense of vast open space,

Cranbrook has evolved from a private community to an educational and cultural icon in Michigan. Founders George Booth and Ellen Scripps Booth purchased the land and commissioned Albert Kahn to design their Arts and Crafts-style home in 1904, with the 30,000 square-foot masterpiece completed in 1908. 

This adorable curly-topped, naturally-acting sensation received a special Oscar from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences in 1934, "in grateful recognition to her outstanding contribution to screen entertainment." Her fame coincided with the stock market crash on Black Tuesday, Oct. 29, 1929, that started the Great Depression of the 1930s. It was a time that seemed to stand still in U.S. history.

Temple outgrew her popularity in the 1940s.

Air conditioning is available to all heating systems

Air conditioning is available to all, regardless of your current heating system. By having a boiler type (hot water and/or steam) heating system, you can still have air conditioning.

There are three main types of air conditioning systems that can be used: unico, ductless cooling, and conventional ducting.

Before deciding which of these systems to choose, first select a contractor. Be sure to review his years in business; get referrals, and talk with other satisfied customers. Get copies of his licenses and certificates of insurance to make sure you feel totally comfortable with your selection. Make sure of your decision because his company will be in your home for over one week and will be cutting holes in your walls and ceilings.

After you've selected a contractor, get his opinion and cost estimate on each of the three types of systems. The Unico is a "high pressure" system typically setting a blower coil in the attic and running fiberglass board trunk lines throughout the attic. Then off each trunk line are 4-inch diame-



ter supply lines to the individual rooms. The outlet termination of the supply lines looks similar to a mini port hole that is virtually invisible. These are usually located in the ceiling.

At the same time, one central cold air return will be installed in the ceiling. This is normally located in a main hallway.

With a conventional duct system, all of the ductwork will be sheet metal with insulation placed on the inside or outside of the duct. This system has conventional supply registers located in the ceiling. These registers will be of a size larger than the "port holes" of

the high-pressure systems, more typical with a forced air system. This means that with the conventional duct system you have the potential in the future to add humidification, air purification and even forced air heating.

A ductless system consists of a wall-mounted blower unit designed to cool a certain space or room. It also has a remote outside unit similar to conventional air conditioning. These are very useful when there are no spaces to run the high pressure tubing. They are very practical for a one or two room application.

Make sure to discuss all of these with your contractor, and get his recommendation as to which would be best for you.





Getting the best deal on a house

Q. Is it unwise to "low ball?" How do you negotiate your best deal?

—Greg of Grosse Pointe Shores.

A. The great thing about medical, legal, real estate, and most other opinions is that if you search for more than a few moments you can find several of them. That, of course, is a good thing. As a patient or client, you want advocates to freely express their professional opinions even if those opinions run contrary to others or the establishment.

Between conflicts comes a resolution. Real estate practitioners have different opinions on the very question you ask regarding how to negotiate the lowest and best price.

Let me speak generally about some of the philosophies regarding coming in with an aggressive offer to purchase.

Dale Carnegie, in his seminal work, offered many strategies and insights into the art of negotiating, and I highly recommend his book, "How to Win Friends and Influence People," to anyone who wishes to develop interpersonal communication skills that translate well to business negotiating.

Donald Trump has written several books on negotiating business transactions including "The Art of the Deal," and Trump's humorous bravado makes for compelling reading. Since Plato and the sophists, the art of rhetoric and the skill of negotiation have been philosophized everywhere from the Senate floor to smoke-filled coffee houses.

The concept of low-balling has

its place at times in negotiating on a home, but it also has its perils. You need to take several factors into consideration when developing a strategy on how to get your best price on a home.

The first question is, how is the housing market performing? In a buyer's market one can reasonably be more aggressive in attempting to secure a lower-than-average price. Conversely, coming in really low in a seller's market can be a virtual waste of time unless the home is relatively undesirable to most buvers.

A seller's motivation level is critical in determining how likely a buyer can secure a lower price. Walking into a vacant home can sometimes lift a red flag that a seller has bought another home and is carrying two mortgages; therefore, consider that piece of information when determining your first offer.

It is important to know the listing history of a home when formulating your approach. Has the home been listed with more than one broker/agency? Has the house been on the market longer than it should? Was it overpriced to begin with? Have the price reductions been aggressive suggesting increased seller motivation?

Looking at these factors is extremely critical when you consider coming in with an aggressive/lower offer to purchase.

Consider this: "Whoever wants it more, gives up more." That simple statement reflects the beginning point (and sometimes the end point) of negotiating philosophy 101. At the end of the day,

whichever side has a higher motivation level usually gets more from the other side. Here is where the "art" of the deal comes into play. It is important to know your personality as a consumer. Are you aggressive, active, a risktaker, or are you uncomfortable in the fray, and the type who doesn't like to "haggle" back and forth. More aggressive homebuyers with strong personalities have no fear coming in with what might be considered more aggressive offers. If you're that type, you need to find a real estate professional who mirrors your personality, or you may not get the results you want. Remember your wishes/demands are being filtered through the words, tone-of-voice, and physical gifts they embody.

As a buyer, you cannot worry if a seller is going to be offended by your offer. Money is money, and buying a house is not about making friends. That said, the goal in negotiating is not to make an enemy out of a seller.

It's not always what you're saying; it is how you're saying it. The best negotiators can usually get what they need and all the while come off charming, engaging and compelling.

I've heard it said, "Don't come in too low, or you might make the sellers mad, and they won't work with you." This is absolute bunk. The only time this is remotely accurate is in the middle of a blazingly hot seller's market.

Conversely, in this market, sellers are in no position to alienate, discourage, or take lightly any offers, and, further, any



agents/sellers who encourage rejecting an offer are likely living in a bubble of "the way things used to be." Buyers determine value, and we have already seen overinflated homes/areas start to get more in line with reality as the economy continues to impact younger consumers' ability to buy expensive homes in expensive communities.

So what do you do? First, consider these issues as to your motivation:

How much do you like the home/need to buy it?

Do you have a house to sell; has your home sold?

Is it a cash transaction?

Are you willing to risk disappointing the seller with a low offer?

Now consider the seller's motivation:

How long has the house been on the market?

Have there been recent (aggressive) price reductions?

Has the seller bought another home?

How many options do you have to buy another equally nice home?

What is the market like where the home sits?

Again, these are suggested starting points and there are several other factors to consider when

Berries, melons grace summer menus

Mint and Blackberry Summertime Lime 'Cocktail'

1/2 cup loosely packed fresh mint leaves, pulled off stem 1/4 cup fresh blackberries 3/4 cup Odwalla Summertime Lime Quencher

Splash of club soda (about 1/4 cup)

Fresh slices of lime Super-fine sugar Ice (preferably crushed)

Rub the rim of a tall glass with some lime. Place the sugar onto a plate and dip the rim of the glass lightly into the sugar to coat. Place mint into the bottom of the glass. With a pestle or a stainless steel whisk or a wooden spoon, smash the mint to release its oils into the glass. Add the crushed ice and blackberries. Add the Summertime Lime. Stir to incorporate. 1 seedless watermelon (or 3 cups already chopped and peeled watermelon)

1/2 cup freshly chopped mint leaves


1 teaspoon fresh grated ginger (do not substitute ginger powder)

1 stalk of fresh lemon grass (available at Asian produce stands or at gourmet grocery stores like Whole Foods and Wild Oats)

2 tablespoons sugar Juice of 1/2 a fresh lime Pinch of salt

If using a whole seedless watermelon, cut it in half. The thick skin will peel off easily once you stand it on its end and, using a small paring knife, slip the knife in where the white flesh meets the red

way, think it through. Your socalled improvement might destroy its value.

Tip: When you make a major purchase from an antiques dealer, always ask for a letter of authenticity. Any dealer worth his salt will gladly comply, and such a letter will protect you if there is ever

a question or problem.

Tip: When contacting appraiser, it is always a good idea to restrict your dealings with that person to just an appraisal. Never allow an appraiser to determine the value of an item and then offer to purchase it for that amount. This is considered unethical, especially by members of the American Society of Appraisers.

Q. I have several early beer steins and am wondering if they have any value.

- Jack, Pueblo West, Colo.

A. Beer steins, often called mugs, jugs and tankards, are generally drinking vessels for beer with both a handle and lid. The word "stein" is derived from the German word "steinzeugkrug," which, roughly translated, means stoneware jug or container. Many different types of steins are collected, including etched, pewter, character, regimental, porcelain and commercial examples.

Prices vary, of course, on rarity, condition and desirability.

George F. Adams is an appraiser who specializes in vintage steins.

Tip: It is always a good idea to document and carefully inventory antiques and collectibles in your home. If a collection is extensive or particularly valuable, hire an appraiser to help document values. This information is absolutely vital should you suffer a loss. For a nominal fee, most insurance companies will also provide additional coverage for both antiques and collectibles if you have the proper documentation.

melon flesh. Take the skin off and then place the watermelon on its flat side. Using the piring knife, slice the melon into 1/2 inch slices lengthwise. Then slice it crosswise into one inch slices. Next make cubes of about 1-inch in size and place into a large bowl.


Using a micro plane grater, grate a 1-inch piece of fresh ginger. Measure out 1 teaspoon and place it in the bowl with the watermelon. Grate the stalk of lemon grass, measure out 1 tablespoon, and add it to the watermelon. Next add the sugar, lime juice and chopped fresh mint and pinch of salt. Mix well and gently. Place in the refrigerator for 20 minutes to cool fully.
