City plans changes

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — An expanded hospital and parking deck occupies an entire city block in a new master plan being drafted for the City of Grosse Pointe's future.

The plan is a work in progress subject to review by city residents and stakeholders. Also allowed a say are representatives of adjacent communities and overarching jurisdictions, including Wayne County.

"Everything can shift or change to some degree," said John Jackson, the city's planning consultant and a resident.

The draft reflects comments from recent city council meetings, ac-

Third-term councilman Leonard dies

GROSSE POINTE FARMS — Mayor James Farquhar sensed something was wrong last week when he left a telephone message for Councilman Joseph Leonard and Leonard didn't call right back.

"Joe always calls back," Farquhar said. "He will never, ever leave you hanging."

A few days later, Leonard explained he'd been at the Karmanos Cancer Institute.

"The next thing I knew, I get a call from (City Manager) Shane Reeside this morning (Monday, Aug. 20) saying Joe passed away yesterday," Farquhar said. "I'm very saddened by it. It really hit me hard."

Leonard died Sunday, Aug. 19. He was 76 and a three-term councilman dating to 2003. In 2011, the council voted him mayor pro tem.

"Our primary focus will be on stroke patients," explained Carrie Stover, a St. John administrator. "We know that during a stroke, 32,000 brain cells per second are lost. Treatment options are time sensitive, so obviously time is of the essence for those patients."

Plans call for a permanent landing site to be built on the Moross Road side of the complex, near the Emergency Room entrance. Until then, the hospital hopes to have a temporary site estab-





Seeking retiree savings

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Money in excess of what the City of Grosse Pointe needs for a 20 percent operating surplus is being shifted to cover retiree healthcare costs.

Such costs are described as the major fiscal challenge as the city grapples with years of reduced revenue.

Peter Dame, city manager, called the shift a 'stopgap."

He said, "Our total retiree healthcare expenses currently exceed \$500,000.

"We anticipate the primary financial struggle over the next five years will be to continue finding ways to pay for retiree healthcare.'

The city has \$300,000 more than needed to maintain a 20 percent operating surplus, according to Dame.

"Our suggestion is we use the end-of-year surplus to partially fund one year of retiree healthcare," he said.

The city council this week approved rolling excess surplus into accounts payable for retiree healthcare expenses.

"We have to fund this expense," said Mayor Dale Scrace.

Dame had been putting away excess money in the capital projects fund, which he said has a \$3.8 million balance.

"Retiree healthcare expenses will be more of a challenge than the capital projects fund because we've been building up the capital fund for five years," Dame said.

The council also wants to reduce retiree health-

care expenses by putting the benefits of roughly 50 retirees in line with those still working.

"It would reduce the cost of retiree health plans for those who have already retired from the city," Dame said.

A healthcare advisor briefed the council this week on a range of op-

The review was conducted under a general collective bargaining agreement, stating, "In no event shall the city be obligated to pay a premium for benefits provided for a retiree or spouse which exceed that paid for an active employee or spouse under the city's' group plan," according to Mark Manquen, a principal at Cornerstone Municipal Advisory Group.

Proposed changes are to deductibles, prescription drug fees and the establishment of health savings accounts.

"We're talking about saving about 20 percent of active employee healthcare costs," Dame said. "Our active employee retiree healthcare costs are about 20 percent, on average, less than retirees."

A 20 percent savings on retiree healthcare costs equals \$100,000. That means the city still will spend \$400,000 per year on retiree healthcare.

"We're going to need to be finding all kinds of ways to meet our promises long into the future," Dame said.

He hasn't yet presented options to retirees.

"Our active employees are on very similar plans," Dame said. "It's been a change, but accepted because people understand the financial situation the

Master plans are a state requirement. They must be reviewed periodically, but change isn't mandat-

The city's current plan was last updated in 2004.

"The changing regional environment, evolution of housing and shopping preferences require that the city evaluate its existing conditions and policies to preserve the relatively high quality of life enjoyed by residents of the community," according to Jackson's draft.

and Fisher. 'Since the last master plan, the biggest change is we actually have some vacant land, the old Sunrise site (in the Village)," Jackson said.

The location, owned and for sale by Sunrise senior living, is below Kercheval off St. Clair within a transition district between the commercial core and surrounding residential neighborhoods.

Preferred uses in the Sunrise site are senior housing, condominiums or a hotel, Jackson said.

The hospital is in a newly designated healthcare district between Jefferson, Cadieux, Maumee and Notre Dame occupied by Beaumont Hospital, Grosse Pointe.

"Uses in the healthcare district should be limited to non-residential, in-patient and out-patient facilities under the control of a single management entity," according to the draft.

addressees development the city's largest land owners and doesn't pay property tax.

"It is critical for the city to ensure that the agreement between the hospital and city to provide payment in lieu of taxes is updated to reflect the actual cost of providing city services to the hospital in light of potential expansion," according to the

The plan reflects "feedback from the hospital and their future plans for development, as well as from adjacent residents. We tried to balance the needs and preference of both of those."

Hospital expansion is, for the most part, within the building's existing envelope. Included is a new wing no taller than the existing building extending down the center of the lot superseding part of the current parking lot.

Building setbacks in the healthcare district are a minimum 100 feet from adjacent roads.

A parking structure is limited to one story with a minimum 50-foot setback from Jefferson and 25 feet from Cadieux.

This evolution comprises an exhibition of more than 30 paintings representing five major periods of Olitski's life as a proponent and progeny of post-World War II abstraction.

"Revelation: Major Paintings by Jules Olitski" ends its three-month run at the Toledo Museum of Art on Sunday, Aug. 26. Admission is free.

Olitski (1922-2007), a Russian immigrant and U.S. Army veteran, attended college on the G.I.

He attained renown during the hepcat and hippie years of the 1950s and 60s, beginning with works categorized as stain paintings. These paintings are characterized by the dreamy solubility of acrylic paint bleeding into raw canvas and leaving a bit of halo.


"He was painting abstractly, relying on largescale swaths of color and flat surfaces," said Kate Nesin, Mellon Fellow at the Toledo museum.

She helped develop the exhibition.

"These aren't gestural, drippy surfaces of a Pollock," Nesin said. "Olitski was playing with the surface of the canvas."

Undaunted by sales and success, Olitski spent later decades manipulating paint in ever-increasing thickness by ever-innovative means.

"This is a show about the material of paint and what Olitski could do with paint," Nesin said.



test things," Nesin said. As artistic leaps go, Olitski's next ones were bigger than most. They date from the 80s and 90s, and are categorized as Baroque and High Baroque.

"The stain and spray paintings made him famous." Nesin said. "People struggled with

the big shift in his work." The Baroque references are curatorial designations inspired by Olitski's rich colors and textured

surfaces.

"Olitski's family tends open to refer to these as the 'squeegee paintings," Nesin said. "He lays down one color, then a layer of transparent gel, then another color. He uses a squeegee to mix these materials together across

"It was the first time having high degrees of refraction, contribute to the paintings' iridescent feel.

"There was speculation that during this period, Olitski was struggling with alcohol," Nesin said.

In Olitski's final period before his death at age 84 from cancer, he journeyed outward with more abstraction. Many involve orbs.

"The language used around these late paintings is really cosmic," Nesin said. "These are galactic scenes, yet there's also something geologic about them."

lished in the North parking lot area, but to do that, it needs the approval of Grosse Pointe Woods.

Monday morning city officials were invited to part of an air ambulance landing and takeoff in the North lot as a way to get a better idea of what residents whose houses border the hospital complex will have to deal with as far as noise and other disruptions.

St. John officials expect 25 to 40 flights per year. St John joins a growing number of Detroit-area hospitals offering landing facilities for air ambulance flights. The service between Thumb-area hospitals and St. John would be provided by Superior Air Ground Ambulance Services headquartered in Warren.

The helicopter that was for Monday's demonstration featured the signature logo of one of those hospitals, Henry Ford Hospital. According to the helicopter's pilot, in addition to Henry Ford Medical Center in Detroit, Superior also services the Detroit Medical Center, Wyandotte General and Covenant Medical Center in Saginaw.

Each flight is manned by a three-person crew, a pilot, a nurse and a paramedic. A flight from Port Huron would take 25 minutes, as opposed to a one hour drive via freeways.

According to Robert Dunne, M.D. of St. John's Medicine Emergency Department, these air ambulance services will become more common as hospitals follow the state mandate to regionalize trauma centers.

St. John is still seeking final approval from the City of Detroit for the landing site on Moross Road. According to Woods Building Official Gene Tutag, approval for a temporary site in the Woods will be based on a recommendation from the city's planning commission.

Tutag said the commission could discuss the site as early as its September meeting. If approved, a public hearing would need to be held before final approval by the city council.


The same overall rate applies to the parking structure, except in hourly increments of 50 cents rather than 25 cents per half hour.

"The goal of the rates for off-street surface parking is to create a parking rate for customers and part-time employees comparable to that which exists now in the metered lots," said Peter Dame, city manager.

Because motorists using non-metered lots pay upon exiting, the system virtually eliminates the risk of receiving parking tickets.

"You stay as long as you want and pay for as long as you stay," Dame said.



Inreachable energy know-it-alls

rowing up, I was taught wisdom begins with understanding no matter how much you may think you know, there's still an infinite amount of knowledge you don't.

That truth had two big effects on me. One, it ignited a curiosity to learn more. Two, humility became a habit. I realized all the knowledge I've gained especially about the future — is still no bigger than a blade of grass on a football field.

Yet, all around us are people who claim to know far more than I suspect they do. What's really disturbing is many of these know-it-alls are so unreachably cocksure that they want to use the force of government to impose their dreams and

schemes on the rest of us. Washington is full of people who are busy planning almost every aspect of our lives, no matter how well or how poorly they might be managing their own. Energy is a case in

point.

An entire religion has arisen against fossil fuels and in favor of various "green" options. Its high priests tell us we're running out of oil, things like wind or solar or algae power are the way to go, and — here's the rubsubsidies, taxes and mandates are needed to get us

In the early 19th century, Americans used whale oil as their primary fuel for lighting. Prices rose as the demand for whale oil grew and the supply of whales declined — they were "common" property,

not private, so everyone had an incentive to use them and no one had a particular reason to conserve them.

No bureaucrat predicted it in 1850, but within 25 years we switched from whale oil to kerosene, derived from crude oil produced by a brand new industry. Supply and demand, prices acting as signals in a free marketplace, entrepreneurs taking risks to make a buck all of that worked beautifully.

This is what happens when people are economically free. Computer chips, satellites and lasers replaced wires, transistors and vacuum tubes. Cars replaced mountains of horse manure in city streets

Would we have to run out of trees before somebody would think to plant more without a government edict? What makes anyone think regulators, control freaks and spendaholics know more about the future than do the real creators of wealth who actually have to solve problems or go out of business?

Maybe wind, solar, algae or something as yet undiscovered will prove superior to fossil fuels. I don't know. But how will anybody know unless we let all possibilities compete freely?

I can think of no good reason to substitute the judgment of election-focused and often powerhungry government officials over the judgment of markets.




contracted through EduStaff, a third-party administrator the board approved last July — through June 30, 2014 — for contracting substitute teachers and staff.

O'Neil, Kerby a perfect fit

Newly hired Kerby Elementary School principal Melanie O'Neil never expected to leave Oakland County.

Having spent the past 19 years with Lake Orion Community Schools and living with her family in Oakland County, O'Neil, in searching the K-12 Job Spot Michigan for an administrative opening, planned on taking a position closer to home.

"I had been looking around in the Oakland County area, never thinking about leaving Oakland County," O'Neil said. "This happened to pop up. I chose to go on the website for Grosse Pointe and read about it before I placed my application in. And after reading everything, I was really impressed with their rigorous program and curriculum and families. And so I thought this is something that I'm curious about."

Curiosity led O'Neil to become one of 107 applicants. She progressed through a series of four "thorough" interviews, each with a team of administrators, teachers, parents and students looking for a principal who, among other things, understood the district's new curriculum, engaged in the community and realized the heavy involvement of parents. O'Neil fit the criteria.

"I like that Mr. Jon Dean went to the community and had nights that asked, 'What is it you want in a principal?' because not only did this have to fit for

me, but I had to fit for them," she said. "Every time I left here I felt, this is where I want to be."

One thing about Kerby and the district that fit and especially resonated with O'Neil during the interview process was the attention to educating every child, high achievers and special education alike. It's a practice O'Neil has felt strongly about since becoming a special education parent herself.

"I want the (Kerby) families to know that every child, whether they're a high achiever or has challenges, every child is a child and deserves a fantastic education," said O'Neil, who's endorsed in Spectrum Autism Disorder K-12 from Oakland University and spent about five years in Lake Orion teaching children with autism.

During her 19 years in Lake Orion Community Schools, O'Neil also served as a fourth- and fifth-grade teacher and helped in creating and leading a multi-age school, before spending five years as Orion Oaks Elementary School princi-

"I didn't necessarily want to get started so young in my career in administration," she said. "However, the opportunity was there and I took it. And at that time, I thoroughly enjoyed it. I learned a lot, but needed to focus on my family for a little while.'

She sought a balance between family and profession. After having children she transferred from principal to early child-

hood director, working part time while focusing on family. Soon after she received her ASD endorsement, which resulted in her returning to the classroom, where she most recently taught ASD children at Blanche Sims Elementary the past five years, before achieving that balance between family and work and taking over as Kerby's principal.

"First of all, I have some very large shoes to fill," O'Neil said. "Mrs. Bur has been an amazing leader in this school. I need to get to know the children and families. What I want to bring is to continue their expectations of best practice and a solid curriculum. Definitely the personal feel, the family feel, to where we're a strong community and keep that rolling.

"I choose to move my family here to this community. It was definitely leaving a comfort zone. But in no other place I can think of do I want to leave a comfort zone but this."

O'Neil is hosting a Popsicle with Principal event from 3 to 4 p.m. today at Kerby Elementary

Three file for school board

Three Grosse Pointe Woods residents filed petitions of candidacies last week for November's Grosse Pointe Public School System Board of Education election.

Two seats are available.

Judy Gafa and Cindy Pangborn, whose terms expire Dec. 31, are both seeking re-election. The third candidate is William Broman, a 2010 graduate of Grosse Pointe North High School currently attending George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

He plans to graduate spring of 2014 with a degree in biomedical engineering.

As a product of the Grosse Pointe school system and recent graduate of North, Broman's running in hopes of adding what he considers a missing element to the board - an "uncensored, unfiltered perspective of a student." If elected, he will serve a portion of each of the next two years via Skype and video teleconferencing.

In aiming to do so, Broman's capitalizing on the board's ruling last July to adopt a policy "Remote Participation by Board Board Members Meetings") that allows remote meeting partici-

ference or other electronic voice communications.

"It's my generation that's going to be filling the schools with our kids in the next 10 to 15 years," Broman said. "When you think about it, over the next 10 to 15 years, changes that will take place, that will have a positive impact on the district, or a negative impact on the district, will be basically reaching their maturity by the time that I'm ready to have a family, by the time everybody that I graduated with is ready to move back into the district.

"I think that that's why now is the time. It's a four-year term. So I have two years while I'm still in college and then two years when I'm out of college.

"And I'll be back in Grosse Pointe and, as I said, the decisions that are made now have impacts that mature in 10 to 15 years."

His two opponents each have contributed to recent decisions, both having served on the board the past few years. Gafa, elected to the board in 2008, presently serves as its president.

"I just feel like we've made so many strides in months of this year that I kind of want to keep that momentum," Gafa said. "I'm really pleased with

Ted Held Jr., 86, passed away Saturday, June 30, 2012, in Fort Myers, Fla., after suffering a stroke in spring 2011. Mr. Held was a resident of the Grosse Pointes for more than 65 years before retiring to Florida in 1993.

He was born March 24, 1926, in Detroit, to Ted Held Sr. and Hattie Held. His family built a house on Marter Road, on the corner of Anita, in 1926, in what was then the Village of Lochmoor. They lived there until they built a new house on Hawthorne in Grosse Pointe Shores in the 1930s.


Clara Marie DeWeese Quinn







Honda Fit a good mini family carrier

Our "blue raspberry" 2012 Fit Sport came with a window sticker of \$17,850. That total included a \$790 destination and handling charge.

We were using the front-wheel-drive Fit as a

mini family car. There were no complaints about lack of space.

The Fit had a five-speed manual transmission mated to the 117 horsepower direct-injection 1.5-liter four — the only engine available on the Fit. EPA numbers for this combination were 27 miles per gallon city, 33 mpg highway and 29 mpg combined.

When equipped with the available automatic transmission, Fit has an EPA city/highway/combined fuel economy rating of 28/35/31.

Honda has equipped Fit with a full line of safety features: antilock brakes, brake assist, electronic brake distribution and ve-

hicle stability assist.

Honda offers the Fit and Fit Sport. The Fit is its base model. Prices start at \$15,325. Standard comfort and convenience items comprise air conditioning, cruise control, remote entry, a 160-watt AM/FM/CD audio system with four speakers, MP3/WMA playback capability, Radio Data System, power windows, power mirrors, power door locks and a security system. Fifteen-inch wheels are standard on the base model. A compact spare tire is standard.

The test Fit Sport had active front headrests. Fit Sport also includes as

standard steering wheelmounted audio controls, 16-inch wheels and upgraded seat fabric. When equipped with the Honda Satellite-Linked Navigation System with Voice Recognition5, the Fit Sport now includes

Bluetooth1 HandsFreeLink. The system also includes a Bluetooth Audio capability with compatible

phones and devices. Honda says the fivepassenger Fit has the lowest, flattest cargo floor and more cargo volume -57.3 cubic feet when the rear seats are down than any other vehicle in the subcompact category. With the 60/40 split rear seat backs, its four seat configurations are designed to accommodate objects ranging from mountain bikes to surf-

boards to tall houseplants. Two new colors for 2012 are the blue raspberry metallic we enjoyed and an orangeburst metallic.

We noticed the engine revs very high, even in fifth gear, when it's above 3,000 rpm, giving one a sense of urgency plus extra engine noise in the cabin.

We also felt the Fit was swaying slightly at highway speeds - not hugging the road in a familiar way. Honda says the Fit suspension includes MacPherson struts up front and a torsion beam rear. There are stabilizer bars front and rear. Steering is electric powerassisted rack-and-pinion.

Honda celebrates, expands

American Honda Manufacturing executive Rick Schostek was in Detroit in mid-July to bring members of the **Automotive Press** Association up to speed on Honda's North American projects.

Schostek said the company is building a plant in Mexico where the Fit will be assembled beginning next year.

Honda launched production of the Accord at its Marysville, Ohio plant 30 years ago: in November 1982. Schostek told the APA there have been no layoffs in that three-decade period. The 2013 Accord goes into production there shortly.

He said Honda was the first Japanese automaker to produce automobiles in America as well as engines in 1985 and transmissions in 1989.

American Honda Motor in July delivered the first all-electric 2013 Honda Fit EV to customers in Southern California. The Fit EV will be available only as a lease vehicle. Initial markets include California and Oregon with other states to follow in 2012. Honda reported the Fit EV will have a lease price of \$389 per month for a three-year term. The Manufacturers suggested retail price figures to \$36,625.

Vacation Bible school children help meet other people's needs

It's never too early to teach children empathy, said Helen Santiz, a Habitat for Humanity house builder of more than 20 years.



love a wedge salad. Iceberg lettuce topped with goodies and a homemade dressing. I topped my wedges with crispy prosciutto, hard cooked egg and home-grown cucumbers. Fresh avocado led me to a creamy dressing making my wedge complete.

Iceberg Wedges with Prosciutto and Creamy Avocado Dressing

2 ripe avocados 1 cup buttermilk 1/2 cup mayonnaise juice of 1 lime (about 2 tablespoons) 2 tablespoons minced red onion 2 tablespoons chopped fresh herbs (parsley, chives, basil and thyme) 1 teaspoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt (or more to taste) black pepper (to taste)

1 head iceberg lettuce, cut into 6 wedges 4 hard boiled eggs, peeled and chopped 1 cucumber, peeled and chopped 1/4 lb. prosciutto, chopped cherry tomatoes for garnish

Prepare dressing by placing avocado along with buttermilk, mayonnaise, lime juice, onion, herbs, sugars, salt and pepper into bowl of food processor. Pulse until smooth. Store dressing in refrigerator until ready to serve.

Cook chopped prosciutto in a small sauté pan over medium heat until it becomes crispy.

Transfer to a small plate to cool.

To assemble wedges, top each wedge with a ladle of dressing, cooked prosciutto, chopped egg and cucumber.

Garnish wedges with heirloom cherry tomatoes and a bit of fresh herbs.

I served my wedges at a family get-together and everybody loved that dressing.

Parents, children struggle with death differently

Editor's note: This is the second part of a two-part series on how parents can help children process a death.

How should I talk with my children about losses in our community? I try to shield them, but over the past year they have heard a lot of discussion as people continue to struggle with deaths that have occurred in our community.

When talking with A. your children about a loss due to violence you may want to emphasize that senseless violence is hard for everyone to understand, even grownups.

Sometimes people do bad things that hurt others because they may be unable to handle their anger, may be suffering from untreated mental illness, or may be under the influence of drugs or alco-

Reiterate that violence is never a solution to personal problems and there are always viable alterna-

Children are not only impacted by the initial

loss of a death in the community, but also the secondary losses:

◆ The loss of security the uncertainly of knowing what to expect, what will come next and how to manage their emotional response.

◆ The loss of feeling safe — the vulnerability of feeling exposed or unprotected, accepting the idea that bad things can happen to people they know or in their community.

What parents can do

♦ Keep to family routines as much as you can to provide security and predictability.

◆ Provide a safe environment where your child can express feelings in whatever way he can, ask questions and talk with a caring adult.

♦ Don't feel you have to have all the answers. Sometimes just listening, or being with someone in their grief is most critical.

◆ Find out what they already know about what happened and what they need to know about death and dying.

◆ Be honest. Tell chil-

dren what happened briefly and clearly. Children will press for more information if they need it.

◆ Be aware children grieve in "bursts" - allow them to talk about it and disengage when they need to. Follow their cues.

◆ Give them permission to not be grieving, even if others are sad or struggling with their grief.

 Maintain rules about what is expected. Changing how you parent will only make them feel more out of control.

◆ Share your own grief to normalize what they are feeling but reassure them you are in control and will help them feel

◆ Get support for yourself as a parent, model good self-care.

 Allow for extra time together for closeness and reassurance.

◆ Use spiritual supports, if this is a comfort

for your family. ♦ Help children identify their support network and

healthy coping skills.

◆ Instill hope that it won't always feel this badly - their grief will ease. Grief can have a recip-


rocal impact. When this happens, you need to address it. Talk with a supportive friend or a professional who understands the grieving process and give you and your children the time and space you need to begin the healing process.














In total, Moore earned 11 varsity letters and was a five-time captain twice in volleyball and basketball and one year in track.

A RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF REVENUE BONDS RELATING TO THE HARPER WOODS SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM AND TO PRESCRIBE THE FORM OF THE REVENUE BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF REVENUES FROM THE SYSTEM SUFFICIENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COSTS OF OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE SYSTEM AND TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE REVENUE BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE HOLDERS OF THE REVENUE BONDS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR OTHER MATTERS RELATING TO THE SYSTEM AND THE REVENUE BONDS.

WHEREAS, the City of Harper Woods operates a sanitary sewer system (the "System");

and

WHEREAS, the performance of the projects relating to the System described in the attached Appendix A ("Project") is necessary to protect and preserve the public health; and

WHEREAS, the City of Harper Woods, State of Michigan (the "City") desires to issue one or more series of Bonds (as defined herein) under the provisions of Public Act 94 of 1933, MCL 141.101 et seq. ("Act 94"); to finance the costs of the Project in anticipation of the collection of revenues from the System, and to pledge the full faith and credit of the City for the prompt payment of the principal thereof and the interest thereon; and

WHEREAS, Bonds will be sold to the Michigan Finance Authority (the "Authority")

under the State Revolving Fund Program ("SRF") to the extent the costs of the Project are eligible under the SRF.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HARPER WOODS, MICHIGAN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Definitions. Whenever used in this Resolution, except when otherwise indicated by the context, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

"Act 94" means Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended. The term "Authority" shall have the meaning set forth in the preamble.

"Bond Reserve Account" means the account established in the Redemption Fund pursuant to Section 14(d) of this Resolution. "Bonds" mean the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, and any additional Bonds of equal standing hereafter issued.

"City Manager" means the City Manager of the City or his or her designee. (e) "Construction Fund" means the City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System Construction Fund established pursuant to Section 16 of this Resolution. (f)

"Finance Director" means the Finance Director of the City or his or her designee. (g)

"Issuer" or "City" means the City of Harper Woods, County of Wayne, State of Michigan. (h)

"Mayor" means the Mayor of the City or his or her designee. "Mandatory Redemption Requirements" means the mandatory prior redemption requirements for Bonds that are term Bonds, if any, as specified in the

Purchase Contract or in any subsequent resolution or successful bid in connection with the issuance of additional Bonds. "Operation and Maintenance Fund" means the fund established pursuant to Section 14(b) of this Resolution. The term "Project" shall have the meaning set forth in the preamble.

The term "Purchase Contract" shall mean the Purchase Contract between the Authority and the Issuer for the sale of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds to the (m)Authority.

"Receiving Fund" means the City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System Receiving Fund established pursuant to Section 14(a) of this Resolution. (n) "Redemption Fund" means the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund established pursuant to Section 14(c) of this Resolution. (o)

"Replacement Fund" means the Replacement and Improvement Fund established pursuant to Section 14(f) of this Resolution. "Reserve Amount" has the meaning set forth in Section 14(d) of this Resolution. (q)

"Revenues" and "Net Revenues" mean the revenues and net revenues of the System and shall be construed as defined in Section 3 of Act 94, including with respect to "Revenues," the earnings derived from the investment of moneys in the various funds and accounts established by this Resolution, and including with respect to Net Revenues the net revenues of the System derived by reason of future improvements, enlargements, extensions, or repairs to the improvements, and payments made to the Issuer by any other governmental entity pursuant to another law of the State of Michigan or the United States for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, even though the payments are made from or include grants or other funds provided by the State of Michigan or the United States or the proceeds of taxes levied on taxable property as provided by law.

"Series 2012 Revenue Bonds" means the City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System Revenue Bonds, Series 2012 of the Issuer authorized by this Resolution.

The term "SRF" shall have the meaning set forth in the preamble

- "Sufficient Government Obligations" means direct obligations of the United States of America or obligations the principal and interest on which is fully guaranteed by the United States of America, not redeemable at the option of the issuer, the principal and interest payments upon which, without reinvestment of the interest, come due at such times and in such amounts as to be fully sufficient to pay the interest as it comes due on the Bonds and the principal and redemption premium, if any, on the Bonds as it comes due whether on the stated maturity date or upon earlier redemption. Securities representing such obligations shall be placed in trust with a bank or trust company, and if any of the Bonds are to be called for redemption prior to maturity, irrevocable instructions to call the Bonds for redemption shall be given to the paying agent.
- The term "System" means the City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System, including all sewers, instrumentalities, facilities and properties used or useful in connection with the collection and disposal of sewage, as the same now exists, and all enlargements, extensions, repairs and improvements thereto hereafter made. Section 2. Necessity; Public Purpose. It is hereby determined to be a necessary public purpose of the Issuer to issue the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds in order to provide funds to finance the costs of the Project. The Issuer estimates that the cost of the Project shall be \$4,200,000 and that the period of usefulness of the Project will be not less than 40 years.

Payment of Cost; Bonds Authorized. Section 3.

- To pay the costs associated with the Project, including all engineering, legal, financial and other expenses incident thereto and incident to the issuance and sale of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, the Issuer shall borrow the sum of not to exceed Four Million and Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,300,000), as finally determined in the Purchase Contract and issue the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 94. The remaining costs, if any, of the Project shall be paid from any other lawful source.
- The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall be sold through the SRF of the Authority and not at a competitive sale. The sale through the SRF of the Authority is hereby determined to be in the best interest of the City because of the nature of the financing and the cost savings and efficiencies expected to be achieved.

Bond Details, Registration and Execution. Section 4.

- The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds hereby authorized shall be designated SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 2012, and the principal of and interest thereon shall be payable in the first instance out of the Net Revenues, as set forth more fully herein.
- The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall be dated as of the date of delivery or such other date as the Authority shall require and principal shall be payable annually in the amounts and at the times as the City Manager shall determine or as required by the Authority and shall have such other terms and conditions as the City Manager shall determine or as required by the Authority, as evidenced by execution of the Purchase Contract. Except as otherwise determined by the City Manager or as provided in the Purchase Contract, the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall consist of one (1) single fully registered Bond in a single denomination.
- Subject to the provisions of this Resolution, the City Manager is hereby authorized to approve the principal and interest payment dates, discount (if any), premium (if any), interest rates for and principal amount of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, date of issuance, the place of delivery and payment, and all other matters and procedures necessary to complete the transactions authorized by this Resolution and the issuance of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, as evidenced by the Purchase Contract for the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds; provided that (i) the interest rate may not exceed six per cent per annum; (ii) the first principal installment date shall be not later than 5 years following the delivery of the Series 2012 Bonds, and some principal amount shall mature or be subject to mandatory redemption in each subsequent year of the term of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds; (iii) the last annual principal installment of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall not be longer than the estimated period of usefulness of the Project, or 40 years from the dated date of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, if less;
- and (iv) the first interest installment shall be payable not later than 10 months following the delivery of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds. The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds may be subject to redemption prior to maturity by the City only with the prior written consent of the Authority (or other registered owners of the Bonds) and on such terms as may be required by the Authority (or other registered owners of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds). The City Manager is authorized to approve the redemption provisions for the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds. In case less than the full amount of an outstanding Bond is called for redemption, the Issuer, upon presentation of the Bond called for redemption, shall register and deliver to the registered owner of record a new Bond in the principal amount of the portion of the original Bond not called for redemption of the same tenor.

The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall contain such provisions as are required by the Authority.

The Mayor or his designee is hereby authorized and directed to execute the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds by means of his or her manual or facsimile signature when issued and sold for and on behalf of the Issuer. No transfer agent shall be required with respect to the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds except as otherwise provided in this Resolution and the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall not be required to be authenticated. The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall be delivered to the Authority in accordance with the Purchase Contract.

Registration and Transfer. Section 5.

- The Issuer or its designee shall maintain and keep registration books for the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds on behalf of the Issuer.
- If the Authority transfers all or any portion of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, the Issuer shall, as directed by the Authority, take all steps necessary to effectuate such transfer, including, if requested by the Authority, converting the Series 2012 Bonds to registered bonds of any applicable denomination requested by the Authority. In connection with such transfer, the Finance Director is authorized to engage a bank or trust company, which the Finance Director may change from time to time, as registrar and transfer agent for such Series 2012 Revenue Bond(s) and otherwise take all actions necessary in connection with replacement of such 2012 Revenue Bond. If the Authority transfers a Bond, except as otherwise directed by the Authority, interest shall be paid by check or draft mailed by the transfer agent selected from time to time by the Finance Director to the person or entity who or which is, as of the 15th day of the month preceding the interest payment date, the registered owner of the Bond at the registered address as shown on the registration books maintained by the transfer agent. The date of determination of registered owner for purposes of payment of interest as provided in this Section may be changed by the Finance Director to conform to market practice in the future. If the Authority transfers a Bond, except as otherwise directed by the Authority, the principal of the Bond shall be upon presentation and surrender of the Bond at the bank or trust company designated by the Finance Director as registrar and transfer agent for the Bond. Any Bond not registered in the name of the Authority may be transferred upon the books required to be kept pursuant to this section by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by his duly authorized attorney, upon surrender of the Bond for cancellation, accompanied by delivery of a duly executed written instrument of transfer in a form approved by the transfer agent. Whenever any Bond or Bonds not registered in the name of the Authority shall be surrendered for transfer, the Issuer shall execute and the transfer agent shall authenticate and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Bond or Bonds, bearing the same interest rate and maturity date and for like aggregate principal amount as the surrendered Bond or Bonds. The transfer agent shall require the payment by the bondholder requesting the transfer of any tax
- or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to the transfer. If any Bond shall become mutilated, the Issuer, at the expense of the holder of the Bond, shall execute, and the transfer agent shall authenticate and deliver, a new Bond of like tenor in exchange and substitution for the mutilated Bond, upon surrender to the transfer agent of the mutilated Bond. If any Bond issued under this Resolution shall be lost, destroyed or stolen, evidence of the loss, destruction or theft may be submitted to the transfer agent and, if this evidence is satisfactory to both and indemnity satisfactory to the transfer agent shall be given, and if all requirements of any applicable law including Act 354, Public Acts of Michigan, 1972, as amended ("Act 354"), being Sections 129.131 to 129.135, inclusive, of the Michigan Compiled Laws have been met, the Issuer, at the expense of the owner, shall execute, and the transfer agent shall thereupon authenticate and deliver, a new Bond of like tenor and bearing the statement required by Act 354, or any applicable law hereafter enacted, in lieu of and in substitution for the Bond so lost, destroyed or stolen. If any such Bond shall have matured or shall be about to mature,

instead of issuing a substitute Bond the transfer agent may pay the same without surrender thereof. Primary Security for Bonds. The Series 2012 Revenue Bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable primarily from the Net Revenues, and to secure such payment, there is hereby created a statutory lien upon the whole of the Net Revenues which shall be a first lien to continue until payment in full of the principal of and interest on all Bonds payable from the Net Revenues, or, until sufficient cash or Sufficient Government Obligations have been deposited in trust for payment in full of all Bonds of a series then outstanding, principal and interest on such Bonds to maturity, or, if called for redemption, to the date fixed for redemption together with the amount of the redemption premium, if any. Upon deposit of cash or Sufficient Government Obligations, as provided in the previous sentence, the statutory lien shall be terminated with respect to that series of Bonds, the holders of that series, shall have no further rights under this Resolution except for payment from the deposited funds, and the Bonds of that

series shall no longer be considered to be outstanding under this Resolution. Section 7. Secondary Security for Bonds. Pursuant to Section 7 of Act 94, the Issuer hereby pledges its full faith and credit for payment of the principal of and interest on the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds and in the event of the insufficiency of the revenues therefor, the Issuer shall pay the amount of the insufficiency from its general fund or levy taxes therefor to the extent permitted by applicable law and in addition to any other taxes it may be authorized to levy, but not in an amount or rate in excess of that necessary to make up the insufficiency. If it becomes necessary for the Issuer to so advance such moneys, it shall have such right or rights of reimbursement and any and all remedies therefor as provided by Section 7 of Act 94 and other applicable law.

Section 8. Bondholders' Rights; Receiver. The holder or holders of the Bonds representing in the aggregate not less than twenty percent (20%) of the entire principal amount thereof then outstanding, may, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceedings, protect and enforce the statutory lien upon the Net Revenues of the System, and may, by suit, action, mandamus or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance of all duties of the officers of the Issuer, including the fixing of sufficient rates, the collection of Revenues, the proper segregation of the Revenues of the System and the proper application thereof. The statutory lien upon the Net Revenues, however, shall not be construed as to compel the sale of the System or any part thereof. If there is a default in the payment of the principal of or interest on the Bonds, any court having jurisdiction in any proper action may appoint a receiver to administer and operate the System on behalf of the Issuer and under the direction of the court, and by and with the approval of the court, to fix rates and charges and collect revenues sufficient to provide for the payment of

the Bonds, and to perform all of the duties of the officers of the Issuer, as more particularly set forth herein and in Section 10 of Act 94. The holder or holders of the Bonds shall

have all other rights and remedies given by Act 94 and law, for the payment and enforcement of the Bonds and the security therefor. Section 9. Management; Fiscal Year. The City shall have all of the powers and duties provided by applicable law with respect to the System. The fiscal year for the System shall be the same fiscal year as the City's, which ends on December 31. The City may employ such person or persons in such capacity or capacities as it deems advisable to carry on the efficient management and operation of the System. The City may make such rules and regulations as it deems advisable and necessary to assure the efficient management and operation of the System.

Section 10. Rates and Charges. The rates and charges for service furnished by and the use of the System and the methods of collection and enforcement of the collection of the rates shall be those in effect on date even herewith, as the same may be increased from time to time.

Section 11. No Free Service or Use. No free service or use of the System, or service or use of the System at less than the reasonable cost and value thereof, shall be furnished by the System to any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality, including the Issuer.

Section 12. Fixing and Revising Rates. The rates presently in effect with respect to the System are estimated to be sufficient to provide for the payment of the expenses of administration and operation and such expenses for maintenance of the System as are necessary to preserve the System in good repair and working order, to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same become due and payable, and the maintenance of any reserve therefor and to provide for all other obligations, expenditures and funds for the System required by law, and this Resolution. The rates shall be reviewed not less than once a year and shall be fixed and revised from time to time as may be necessary to produce these amounts, and it is hereby covenanted and agreed to fix and maintain rates for services furnished by the System at all times sufficient to provide for the foregoing.

Section 13. Additional Covenants. The Issuer covenants and agrees with the holders of the Bonds that so long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding and unpaid as to either principal or interest:

The Issuer will maintain the facilities and improvements of the System in good repair and working order and will faithfully and punctually perform all duties with reference to the System required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan, the Issuer's Charter and this Resolution.

(b) The Issuer shall install, maintain, and keep proper books of record and account, separate from other records and accounts of the Issuer, in which full and correct entries shall be made of all dealings or transactions of or in relation to the properties, business, and affairs of the System.

(c) The Issuer will not sell, lease or dispose of the System, or any substantial part, until all of the Bonds have been paid in full, both as to principal and interest, or provision made thereof as herein provided. The Issuer will not do or suffer to be done any act which would affect the System in such a way as to have a material adverse effect on the security for the Bonds.

(d) The Issuer will cause the Project to be acquired and accomplished promptly and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor.

Section 14. Funds and Accounts relating to Revenues; Flow of Funds.

(a) Receiving Fund: Commencing no later than September 1, 2012, funds belonging to the System shall be transferred as herein indicated and all Revenues of the System shall be set aside as collected and credited to a fund to be designated City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System Receiving Fund (the "Receiving Fund"). In addition, by such date, all Revenues in any accounts of the System shall be transferred to the Receiving Fund and credited to the funds and accounts as provided in this section. The Revenues credited to the Receiving Fund are pledged for the purpose of the following funds and shall be transferred or debited from the Receiving Fund periodically in the manner and at the times and in the order of priority hereinafter specified.

(b) Operation and Maintenance Fund: Out of the Revenues credited to the Receiving Fund there shall be first set aside in, or credited to, a fund designated Operation and Maintenance Fund (the "Operation and Maintenance Fund"), monthly a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of the next month's expenses of administration and operation of the System and such current expenses for the maintenance thereof as may be necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order. A budget, showing in detail the estimated costs of administration, operation and maintenance of the System for the next ensuing operating year, shall be prepared by the City at least 30 days prior to the commencement of each ensuing operating year. No payments shall be made to the Issuer from moneys credited to the Operation and Maintenance Fund except for services directly rendered to the System by the Issuer or its personnel.

(c) Bond and Interest Redemption Fund: There shall be established and maintained a separate depositary fund designated Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (the "Redemption Fund"), the moneys on deposit therein from time to time to be used solely for the purpose of paying the principal of, redemption premiums (if any) and interest on the Bonds. The moneys in the Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account) shall be kept on deposit with the bank or trust company, if any, where the principal of and interest on the Bonds, or any series thereof, are payable. Out of the Revenues remaining in the Receiving Fund, after provision for the Operation and Maintenance Fund, there shall be set aside each month commencing September 1, 2012 in the Redemption Fund an amount equal to 1/6 of the interest coming due on the Bonds on April 1, 2013, less any amount on deposit in the Redemption Fund. Commencing April 1, 2013, the amount set aside each month for interest on the Bonds shall be 1/6 of the total amount of interest on the Bonds next coming due. The amount set aside each month for principal, commencing April 1, 2013, shall be 1/12 of the amount of principal next coming due by maturity. If there is any deficiency in the amount previously set aside, that deficiency shall be added to the next succeeding monthly requirements. The amount to be set aside for the payment of principal and interest on any date shall not exceed the amount which, when added to the money on deposit in the Redemption Fund, including investment income thereon, is necessary to pay principal and interest due on the Bonds on the next succeeding principal payment date.

(d) Bond Reserve Account in the Redemption Fund: There is established a separate account in the Redemption Fund to be known as the Bond Reserve Account (the "Bond Reserve Account"). No reserve requirement is established for the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds and no moneys shall be deposited in the Bond Reserve Account with respect to such Bonds. If additional Bonds are issued, each resolution authorizing the additional Bonds shall, as applicable, provide for deposits to the Bond Reserve Account to be made from the proceeds of the additional Bonds or funds on hand and legally available for such use in an amount that will result in the Bond Reserve Account being funded in accordance with the resolutions authorizing the additional Bonds (the "Reserve Amount"). Except as otherwise provided in this Section, the moneys credited to the Bond Reserve Account shall be used solely for the payment of the principal of, redemption premiums (if any) and interest on the Bonds subject to a reserve requirement as to which there would otherwise be a default. If at any time it shall he necessary to use moneys credited to the Bond Reserve Account for such payment, then the moneys so used shall be replaced from the Net Revenues first received thereafter which are not required for current principal and interest requirements until the amount on deposit equals the Reserve Amount. If as of the last day of any fiscal year the amount in the Bond Reserve Account exceeds the amount required by such resolutions to be in such Account, the excess may be transferred to the Redemption Fund for payment of principal and

interest on the Bonds due on or after that date.

Mandatory Redemption Requirements: For purposes of making deposits to the Redemption Fund and the Bond Reserve Account, the principal amount of Bonds becoming due by reason of a Mandatory Redemption Requirement shall be deemed to become due in the principal amount and on the due date of the Mandatory Redemption Requirements. Each resolution authorizing the sale of additional Bonds shall state the amount of Bonds authorized which are term Bonds, if any, or the method by which the Bonds which are term Bonds, if any, shall be determined. A Mandatory Redemption Requirement for the Bonds of a term maturity may be satisfied by the call of term Bonds of the same issue and maturity in the principal amount of the Mandatory Redemption Requirement at par and accrued interest or by the purchase and surrender to the transfer agent of the Bonds of the same issue and maturity from money allocated therefor as provided herein, or purchased with other funds legally available therefor. The Issuer shall elect the manner in which it intends to satisfy a Mandatory Redemption Requirement not less than forty-five days prior to the due date of each Mandatory Redemption Requirement. The money set aside to satisfy the next Mandatory Redemption Requirement for the Bonds shall be used by redeeming said Bonds on the required due date relating to such Mandatory Redemption Requirement or by purchasing Bonds of the same issue and maturity with respect to which the Mandatory Redemption Requirement applies and surrendering the same to the paying agent for cancellation or on prior to the required due date of the Mandatory Redemption Requirement. In the event that after any Mandatory Redemption Requirement date moneys remain in the Redemption Fund, as a result of the purchase of Bonds at less than par, the amount of such excess may be transferred to the Receiving Fund. If no Bonds of an issue are issued as term Bonds then there shall be no Mandatory Redemption Requirement with respect to those Bond

(f) Replacement and Improvement Fund: There shall next be established and maintained a separate depositary account, designated Replacement and Improvement Fund (the "Replacement Fund"), the money credited thereto to be used solely for the purpose of making repairs, replacements, improvements, enlargements or extensions to the System, including any buildings or structures related to said System. Out of the Revenues and moneys of the System remaining in the Receiving Fund at the end of each month after provision has been made for the deposit of moneys in the Operation and Maintenance Fund and the Redemption Fund including the Bond Reserve Account, there may be deposited in the Replacement Fund such additional funds as the City may deem advisable. If at any time it shall be necessary to use moneys in the Replacement Fund for the purpose for which the Replacement Fund was established, the moneys so used shall be replaced from any moneys in the Receiving Fund which are not required by this Resolution to be used for the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Redemption Fund including the Bond Reserve Account.

(g) The Issuer is authorized to create or continue such funds and accounts and subaccounts as are necessary or appropriate to distinguish one series of Bonds from another and one priority of Bonds from another priority of Bonds.

(h) Surplus Moneys: All moneys remaining in the Receiving Fund at the end of any fiscal year after satisfying all the foregoing requirements of this Section 14 and which are considered surplus, may, at the option of the City Council, be used for any of the following purposes:

(1) Transferred to the Replacement Fund; or

(2) Transferred to the Redemption Fund and used for the purchase of Bonds on the open market at not more than the fair market value thereof or for the redemption of Bonds prior to maturity; or

(3) Any other use permitted by law; provided, however, that in the event the money of the System is insufficient to provide for the current expenses of the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Redemption Fund, any money or securities in other accounts of the System shall be transferred first to the Operation and Maintenance Fund and second to the Redemption Fund to the extent of any deficits in those funds.

Section 15. Priority of Funds. In the event the moneys in the Receiving Fund are insufficient to provide for the current requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Fund or the Redemption Fund, any moneys or securities in other funds of the System, except the proceeds of sale of the Bonds, shall be credited or transferred, first, to the Operation and Maintenance Fund, and second to the Redemption Fund.

Section 16. Investments. Moneys in the funds and accounts established herein and moneys derived from the proceeds of sale of the Bonds, may be invested by the Issuer in United States of America obligations or in obligations the principal of and interest on which is fully guaranteed by the United States of America and any other investments permitted by law. Investment of moneys in the Redemption Fund being accumulated for payment of the next maturing principal or interest payment of the Bonds shall be limited to obligations bearing maturity dates prior to the date of the next maturing principal or interest payment on the Bonds. In the event investments are made, any securities representing the same shall be kept on deposit with the financial institution having on deposit the fund or funds or account from which the purchase was made. Profit realized or interest income earned on investment of funds in the Receiving Fund, Operation and Maintenance Fund, Replacement Fund and Redemption Fund, including income derived from the Bond Reserve Account, shall be deposited in or credited to the Receiving Fund at the end of each fiscal year.

Section 17. Bond Proceeds. Except as otherwise provided in a resolution authorizing the issuance of additional Bonds, from the proceeds of the sale of each series of the Bonds there shall be immediately deposited in the Redemption Fund an amount equal to the capitalized interest, accrued interest and premium, if any, received on the delivery of the Bonds. In addition, there shall be deposited in the Bond Reserve Account, if any, from the proceeds of the series of the Bonds in the amounts required to be so deposited by the resolutions for any additional Bonds. The remainder of the proceeds of the sale of the series of the Bonds representing the costs of the applicable project for which such series of Bonds was issued shall be deposited in a bank or banks, designated by Finance Director, qualified to act as depository of the proceeds of sale under the provisions of Section 15 of Act 94, in a separate depository account designated City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System Construction Fund (the "Construction Fund"). Moneys in the Construction Fund relating to a series of Bonds shall be applied solely in payment of the cost the acquisition and construction of the applicable project, including any engineering, legal and other expenses incident thereto and to the financing thereof. Any unexpended balance of the proceeds of sale of a series of Bonds remaining after completion of the applicable project in the Construction Fund shall be used for further improvements, enlargements and extension to the System, if the use (i) is approved by the Michigan Department of Treasury, if such approval is then required by law, and (ii) based upon an opinion of bond counsel, will not adversely affect the exclusion from gross income for federal income tax purposes of Bonds which were issued as tax-exempt Bonds, the proceeds of which were deposited in such account. Any remaining balance shall be paid immediately into the Redemption Fund and the money shall be used only for meeting Bond reserve requirements, if any, or for the redempt

Section 18. Funds and Depositary. Moneys in the several funds and the accounts established pursuant to this Resolution, except moneys in the Redemption Fund (including the Bond Reserve Account) and moneys derived from the proceeds of sale of the Bonds, which shall be maintained in separate accounts, may be kept in one or more combined accounts at Chase Bank or any other qualified depository designated pursuant to a resolution of this City Council, and if kept in one account the moneys shall be allocated on the books and records of the Issuer in the manner and at the times provided in this Resolution. All accounts and funds shall be maintained at qualified depositories, which are one or more banks, savings and loan associations, or credit unions, each having unimpaired capital and surplus amounting to at least \$2,000,000 or that are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund; provided that the funds and accounts may be invested as permitted by applicable law.

This Bond may be subject to redemption prior to maturity by the Issuer only with the prior written consent of the Authority and on such terms as may be required by the Authority.

This Bond is issued pursuant to a resolution duly adopted by the City Council of the Issuer on ___ 2012 (the "Resolution"), and under and in full compliance with the Constitution and statutes of the State of Michigan, and particularly Public Act 94 of 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), for the purpose of paying the costs of certain improvements to the facilities of the City of Harper Woods Sanitary Sewer System (the "System"), including payment of engineering, architectural, legal and financing expenses in connection therewith.

For prompt payment of principal and interest on this bond, the Issuer has irrevocably pledged the revenues of the System, including all appurtenances, extensions and improvements thereto, after provision has been made for reasonable and necessary expenses of operation, maintenance and administration (the "Net Revenues"), and a statutory first lien thereon is hereby recognized and created. Pursuant to the authorization provided in Section 7 of Act 94, the Issuer by resolution of its City Council has pledged its full faith and credit for payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds in the event that the Net Revenues are not sufficient to pay principal and interest on the Bonds as they become due. The full faith and credit pledge of the City is a limited tax general obligation.

The Issuer has covenanted and agreed, and does hereby covenant and agree, to fix and maintain at all times while any bonds payable from the Net Revenues of the System shall be outstanding, such rates for service furnished by the System as shall be sufficient to provide for payment of the interest on and the principal of the Bonds of this issue and any additional bonds of equal standing as and when the same shall become due and payable, and to create and maintain a bond and interest redemption fund (including a bond reserve account) therefor, to provide for the payment of expenses of administration and operation and such expenses for maintenance of the System as are necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order, and to provide for such other expenditures and funds for the System as are required by the Resolution.

For a complete statement of the revenues from which and the conditions under which this Bond is payable, a statement of the conditions under which additional bonds of equal standing as to the Net Revenues may hereafter be issued and the general covenants and provisions pursuant to which this Bond is issued, reference is made to the Resolution. Capitalized terms not otherwise defined herein have the meaning ascribed to them in the Resolution.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law precedent to and in the issuance of this Bond have been done and performed in regular and due time and form as required by law, and that the full faith and credit of the Issuer is hereby pledged for the prompt payment of this bond and the interest hereon, when due.

SCHEDULE I

Based on the schedule provided below unless revised as provided in this paragraph, repayment of principal of the Bond shall be made until the full amount advanced to the Issuer is repaid. In the event the Order of Approval issued by the Department of Environmental Quality (the "Order") approves a principal amount of assistance less than the amount of the Bond delivered to the Authority, the Authority shall only disburse principal up to the amount stated in the Order. In the event (1) that the payment schedule approved by the Issuer and described below provides for payment of a total principal amount greater than the amount of assistance approved by the Order or (2) that less than the principal amount of assistance approved by the Order is disbursed to the Issuer by the Authority, the Authority shall prepare a new payment schedule which shall be effective upon receipt by the Issuer.

Due Date Amount of Principal Installment Due

Interest on the Bond shall accrue on principal disbursed by the Authority to the Issuer from the date principal is disbursed, until paid, at the rate of __% per annum, payable_, 201_, and semi-annually thereafter.

The Issuer agrees that it will deposit with The Bank of New York Mellon Trust Company, N.A., or at such other place as shall be designated in writing to the Issuer by the Authority (the "Authority's Depository") payments of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on this Bond in immediately available funds by 12:00 noon at least five business days prior to the date on which any such payment is due whether by maturity, redemption or otherwise. In the event that the Authority's Depository has not received the Issuer's deposit by 12:00 noon on the scheduled day, the Issuer shall immediately pay to the Authority as invoiced by the Authority an amount to recover the Authority's administrative costs and lost investment earnings attributable to that late payment.

Section 20. Additional Bonds.

(a) Except as hereinafter provided, the Issuer shall not issue additional Bonds of equal standing with the Bonds. The right is reserved pursuant to Section 19 of Act 94 for the Issuer to issue additional Bonds of equal standing for the completion of the Project in the event that the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds shall prove to be insufficient therefor, or for the subsequent enlargement, extension, improvement, or repair of the facilities or improvements of the System, or to refund part or all of one or more outstanding issues, or for any of these purposes, which additional Bonds may be issued and be negotiated from time to time as the proceeds therefrom may be necessary for that purpose. Such Bonds, when sold, shall have equal standing with those issued in the first instance. The additional Bonds may be issued in separate series from the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, with different dates of issuance, and with changes in the form thereof which are consistent with that equality of standing. The provisions of Section 7 of Act 94 providing for annual installments, the amounts of the installments, and the due date of the first installment shall not be controlling as to each additional series whether the additional series is of equal or subordinate standing. Instead, Section 7 of Act 94 shall be applied to the combined annual principal installments and interest at actual rates on outstanding bonds and at the maximum authorized rate on the additional series.

Nothing in this Section 20 shall be construed to prohibit the issuance of additional bonds, by further action of this City Council, secured by a lien on the Net Revenues which is subordinate to the first statutory lien on Net Revenues which secures the Bonds.

Section 21. Sale of Series 2012 Revenue Bonds.

The Finance Director or his or her designee is hereby designated, for and on behalf of the Issuer, to file a qualifying statement, request for reconsideration, or application for prior written approval, as applicable, with the Michigan Department of Treasury pursuant to Act 34, Public Acts of Michigan, 2001, as amended ("Act 34"), and pay any related fees in connection with any of the foregoing, and taking any other actions necessary or desirable under Act 34.

The Mayor or his designee is authorized and directed to execute and deliver (i) the Purchase Contract, (ii) a Supplemental Agreement by and among the Issuer, the Authority and the State of Michigan acting through the Department of Environmental Quality, (iii) an Issuer's Certificate, (iv) a Revenue Sharing Pledge Agreement, if required by the Authority, and any other documents which may be required by the Authority or by applicable law or regulation, in such form as the Authority may require, which form is hereby approved.

The Mayor, the Finance Director, the City Manager, and all other officials, employees and agents of the City and their respective designees are authorized and directed to (i) cooperate with the Authority, the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, the Department of Treasury, and other parties to issue the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds in a timely fashion; and (ii) do all other acts and take all other actions and other necessary or desirable procedures required to effectuate a sale, issuance and delivery of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds or as may be necessary or desirable to carry out and comply with the terms and provisions of this Resolution, and all such actions, whether heretofore or hereafter taken, shall be ratified, confirmed and approved, including, if appropriate, and without limitation, reducing the amount of Series 2012 Revenue Bonds sold and/or delivered if the City Manager determines that the full amount thereof is not necessary. The City Manager shall not be required to secure an amendment to this Resolution or other approval from the Issuer if any reduction produces a bond issue whose terms remain within the terms authorized by this Resolution as outside parameters, or if such reduction or alteration is insignificant or insubstantial.

Information concerning the Issuer may be provided by officers, agents and employees of the Issuer for inclusion in a preliminary official statement and a final official statement with respect to the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds if required by the Authority, the circulation and dissemination of which are hereby approved, and, if required by the Authority, the Finance Director shall execute and deliver a continuing disclosure undertaking meeting the requirements of Rule 15c2-12

promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended. Section 22. Resolution Shall Constitute Contract. The provisions of this Resolution shall constitute a contract between the Issuer and the holders of the Bonds. After the issuer ance of the Series 2012 Revenue Bonds, this Resolution shall not be repealed or amended in any respect which will adversely affect the rights and interests of the holders of the Bonds nor shall the Issuer adopt any law, ordinance or resolution in any way adversely affecting the rights of the Bonds so long as the Bonds or interest thereon remains unpaid, or until the Bonds are defeased.

Section 23. Tax Matters. The Issuer shall, to the extent permitted by law, take all actions within its control necessary to maintain the exclusion of the interest on the Bonds issued as tax-exempt Bonds from gross income for federal income tax purposes under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), including, but not limited to, actions and abstentions from actions relating to any required rebate of arbitrage earnings and the expenditures and investment of Bond proceeds and moneys deemed to be Bond proceeds.

Section 24. Severability Paragraph Headings and Conflict. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Resolution. The paragraph headings in this Resolution are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be part of this Resolution.

Section 25. Publication and Recordation. This Resolution shall be published in full in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, qualified under State law to publish legal notices, promptly after its adoption, and shall be recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the City Council and such recording shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and the City Clerk. Section 26. Consultants. Bendzinski & Co. Municipal Finance Advisors and Bodman PLC are hereby retained as municipal advisor and bond counsel respectively for the

Section 27. Conflicting Provisions Repealed. All resolutions or orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

Section 28. Effective Date. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 6 of Act 94, this Resolution shall immediately be effective upon its adoption.
