**THE GROSSE POINTES** — Public safety officers from the City of Grosse Pointe, Farms and Shores helped Harper Woods police last week stop brawling Harper Woods High School students, for whom self control isn't part of the curriculum.

Pointe officers provided reinforcement at 11:04 a.m. Thursday, June 12, as classes let out on the last day of the academic year.

Fights spread from campus into neighborhoods near the school, located off Beaconsfield behind Eastland Shopping Center.

"Several students were fighting at multiple locations," said a Farms officer.

Forces also came from St. Clair Shores and Eastpointe.

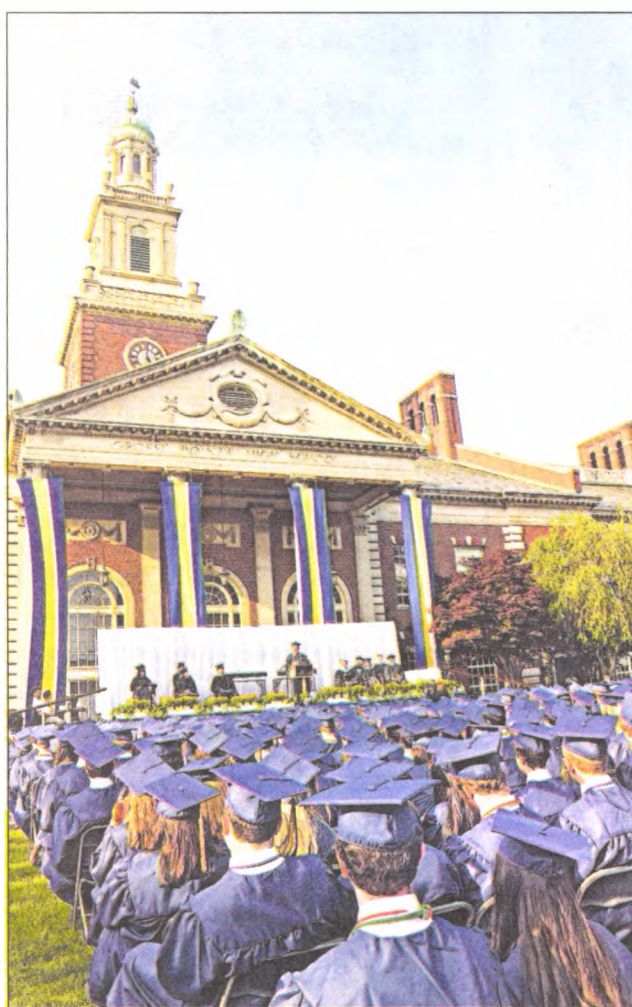

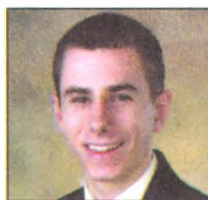


Above, the ceremonies on South's front lawn. At right, the tassels are turned to signify their graduation from North.

Family sues cities, officers for \$100M in suicide ruling

**GROSSE POINTE WOODS** — The family of a Grosse Pointe Woods woman who disappeared in January 2010 has filed a \$100 million lawsuit against public safety departments and officers in Grosse Pointe Farms and Grosse Pointe Woods.

The lawsuit, filed on behalf of the estate of JoAnn Matouk Romain by attorneys Ari Kresch and Solomon M. Radnor, was announced at a press conference in Southfield Wednesday, June 11.

The suit, filed in U.S. District Court Eastern Division, names the city of Grosse Pointe Farms, the City of Grosse Pointe Woods and 20 public safety officers from both cities as defendants.

Romain, whose death was ruled a suicide by drowning after her body was found in the Detroit River in March 2010, was murdered according to her family, and the perpetrator is still free, protected by what the family claims is a cover up by both police agencies and several individual officers.

"Both departments treated the investigation as a suicide by drowning from the moment JoAnn went missing," the law-

suit alleges. "JoAnn did not commit suicide; none of the facts or evidence support the absurd conclusion that she committed suicide; and the named police departments ignored witness statements, falsified their police reports and their investigation to make her murder appear to be a suicide."

Referring to the alleged perpetrator only as "Suspect One," and an unnamed Grosse Pointe Woods police officer as "John Doe," the suit alleges that the departments and officers "acting in concert with each other, acted purposely with the intent of creating a danger to JoAnn by making it known to John Doe that they would immediately cover up the murder and rule it a suicide." It also alleges that "there are several points that prove the police knew about the murder beforehand and had agreed with the killer that they would immediately get on it and rule it as a suicide."

Romain disappeared the night of Jan. 12, from St. Paul on the Lake Catholic Church in Grosse Pointe Farms, where witnesses said she had attended evening Mass. Her car, with her purse on the front seat, was found parked in the driveway of the church.

Grosse Pointe Farms police said they found footprints in the snow that allegedly matched Romain's that led to the lake. Her body was found two months later in the Detroit River near Amherstburg, Ontario, Canada. Based on that information and the results of an autopsy conducted by the Ontario medical examiner, they ruled her death a suicide by drowning.

Romain's daughter, Michelle, has continually challenged the determination that her mother committed suicide.

"The weeks preceding her disappearance she had told us that she felt as if she was being followed and if anything happened to her to make sure that we followed through," Michelle Romain said at the press conference. "I made a vow to my siblings and to God that I would follow through."

According to Woods city administrator Skip Fincham, the city has not yet been served with the lawsuit.

"I am only aware of the lawsuit from media reports and inquiries," Fincham said. "Having not received an official complaint, I have no comment. If I was in receipt of a complaint, I would not comment on issues under litigation."

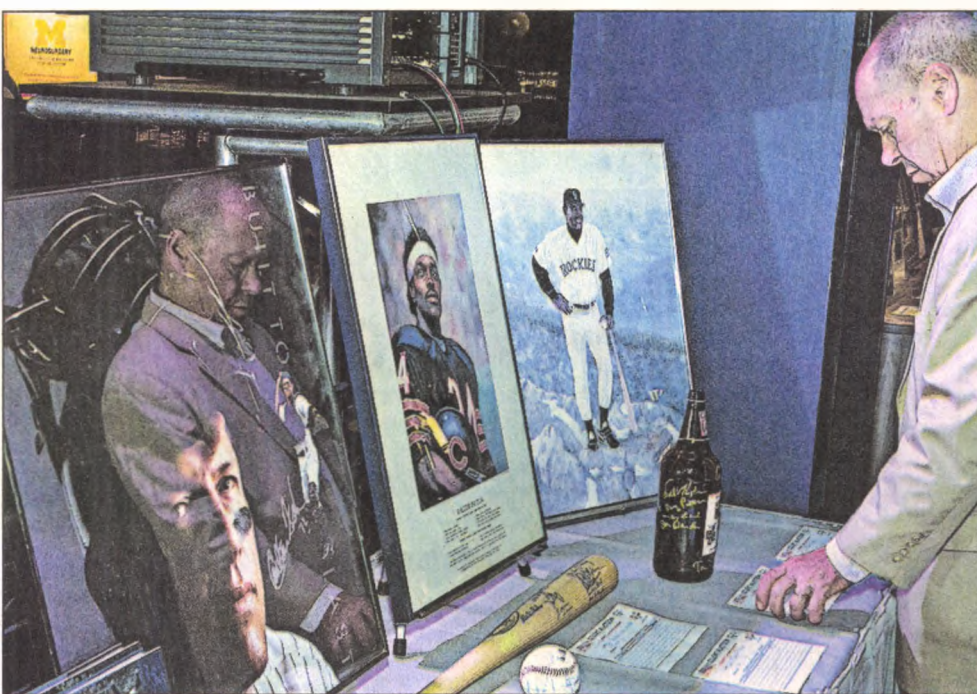

## Work delayed on sewer project

**GROSSE POINTE SHORES** — Major sewer improvements on Oxford near the intersection of Lakeshore are delayed until outside funding comes through, except for emergency repairs.

"The cost might be as much as \$750,000," said Ted Kedzierski, mayor of Grosse Pointe Shores.

City officials want to fund improvements with a state grant.

"We applied for a grant," said Councilman Bruce Bisballe, chairman of the finance committee. "We did not receive it. It was a random drawing."

He hopes to come up a winner next time.

"Until we get grant money from the state, we are not going to go ahead with any major sewer projects," Bisballe said.

Pipes under Oxford are 70 years old, Kedzierski said.

"We know where our problems and potential problems are, principally on Oxford," said Bisballe, adding that repairs will cost at least \$600,000.

"We need to save (money) for that for the next couple of years," he said.

Emergency repairs will be made until a grant comes through.

"Brett (Smith, director of public works), assures me we can repair it on an interim basis," Bisballe said.

## Know the laws for fireworks

**CITY OF GROSSE POINTE** — The rocket's red glare and bombs bursting in air can get old. And not just for the British.

City of Grosse Pointe officials this week adopted an ordinance regulating the discharge of fireworks.

Regulations mirror the Michigan Fireworks Safety Act, amended in 2013 to end a preemption of tougher local standards.

Igniting fireworks now is limited to the day before, of and the day after federal holidays, except between midnight and 8 a.m., according to

Section 46-182 of the city code.

Fireworks on New Year's Day are prohibited between 1 and 8 a.m.

Other limitations are: "A person shall not ignite, discharge or use consumer fireworks on public property, school property, church property or the property of another person without that organization's or person's express permission to use those fireworks on those premises."

Exceptions may be granted if submitted to the city council in writing.

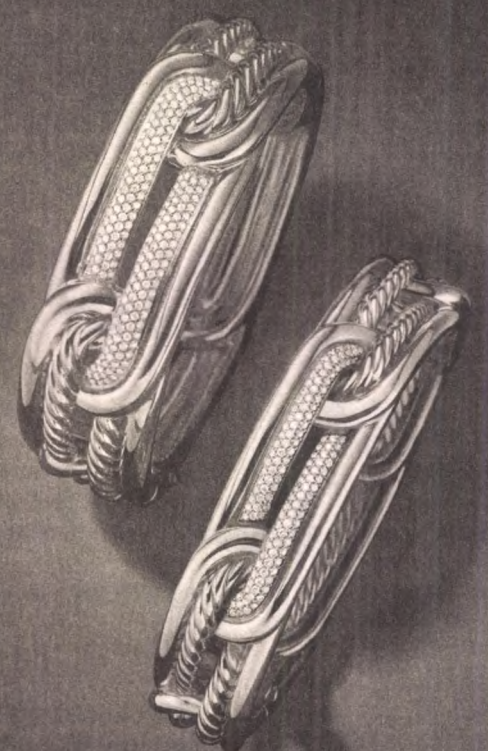

South grad will return to his roots

Grosse Pointe South High School graduate Mark Adamaszek is one of 50 University of Michigan students to receive the Foreign Language and Area Studies Fellowship scholarship and will be studying at John Paul II Catholic University of Lublin Poland for seven weeks this summer.

Lublin is the ninth largest city in Poland, located south of Warsaw and west of Ukraine.

"I chose (Lublin) because my professor told me a lot of students make the mistake of going to Warsaw," said Adamaszek, who resides in Grosse Pointe Farms with his parents, Charlotte and Phil.

to learning Polish because his family is of Polish descent and he fondly recalls stories and historical facts his father told him about the country.

"My dad told me about this story in World War II," he said, "how basically Polish immigrants and people of Polish ancestry were coming from all over to fight for the Allies against the Axis forces."

These stories really stuck with him, Adamaszek said, and he was determined to learn the language, studying seven to 10 hours a day during school breaks. He used tools such as Pimsleur Polish books to learn the language, but when he finished those,

Adamaszek resorted to watching "Curious George" in Polish.

"There were a lot more monkey noises than I thought," he joked.

During their winter vacation, if Adamaszek wasn't snowboarding, his mother said, he was studying Polish and falling asleep to sounds of another language. This was all in preparation for an interview in Polish for the chance at the FLAS scholarship.

This is not the first time, Adamaszek has taken on a special interest outside his academic schedule. He studied chemistry in the seventh grade.

He broke his wrist playing soccer and the doctors couldn't encase it in

a cast so the middle schooler stayed home from school to protect the tender wrist, Charlotte Adamaszek said. To fill the hours, Adamaszek studied for a chemistry challenge offered by Wayne County Regional Educational Service Area and came in second.

Even though Adamaszek experienced a severe injury due to soccer, the sport remained a big part of his life, playing offensive positions throughout high school and on the Premier travel team, the Wolves. His interest resulted in a \$1,000 scholarship from the Michigan Youth Soccer Association last year. He is a youth soccer referee and joined an intramural team at U of M. Adamaszek also is involved in several other extra-curricular activities there. He joined the Michigan Synthetic Biology Team and is the finance chair for the Northwood Community

Council that organizes events for the residential community.

Adamaszek also helped establish U of M's Food Industry Student Association that helps students understand how their degrees can be applied in the food industry. He also joined the Polish club after attending a Polish film festival on campus.

"It was the first time I had been in a room of more than five Polish people who weren't family," he said.

Adamaszek is studying chemical engineering and just finished his first year at U of M. He doesn't know exactly what he

wants to do yet, but he wouldn't mind moving to Poland.

"(Poland) has one of the fastest-growing economies, so I definitely wouldn't be opposed to a career there," he said.

Adamaszek leaves for Lublin July 4 and remains until Aug. 22.

Lot 6, you're up next

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Another municipal parking lot in the Village is due for reconstruction this year.

Work centers on Lot 6.

The lot is located off of Kercheval Place, a one-way (west) alley on the south side of Kercheval between Notre Dame and Cadieux in the City of Grosse Pointe.

City officials budgeted \$572,000 from the parking fund to pay for the work.

A construction contract is likely to be awarded during the 7 p.m. Monday, Aug. 18 council meeting, according to Gary Huvaere, director of public services.

"Construction will take place in late summer and early fall," Huvaere said.

Upon completion, there will be three rows containing 39 parking spaces combined and a trash

compactor at the rear. All but two spaces are diagonal.

"I've been here 32 years and this is a long time coming," said Mike Kramer, a Village merchant.

He called the enclosed compactor "a huge improvement."

New parking spaces are to be wider than in Lot 1, behind Kroger, often criticized as too cramped, according to Huvaere.

"The newly adopted

city standard for parking spaces was adopted after Kroger was put in place," said Peter Dame, city manager.

Spaces in Lot 2 will be the same size as in lots 2 and 3, north of Kercheval between Notre Dame and Neff, he added.

The trash compactor, for use by nearby businesses, is being screened by a decorative masonry wall.

"The design of the enclosure would be similar to the design in Lot 2," Huvaere said.

Parking meters are being replaced by a central pay station, with cash and credit card options.

Payment is made at the pay station after parking, but before leaving the lot to shop or dine in the district.

The lot won't be gated.

"City staff and engineers held a meeting June 9 with adjacent business and property owners to garner input on the layout," Huvaere said.

The approved layout had two to four more parking spaces than two alternatives, which also located the compactor at the front of the lot near Kercheval Place.

"(The approved) option had the most parking spaces and improved visibility and appearance issues by putting the trash enclosure in the back of the lot," Huvaere said.

# New PSO joins Shores

**GROSSE POINTE SHORES** — The public safety department becomes fully staffed with the hiring of an 18th officer. “Every officer in this department takes great pride in the protection of this community,” said John Schulte, department director. “With the right personnel and equipment, we can do a great job.”

The Shores’ newest officer, Adam Bremer, has a long Grosse Pointe lineage.

His mother, Christine Bremer, was assistant manager of the City of Grosse Pointe for 21 years.

His grandfather managed the Farms for 30 years.

The family heritage of public services continues with his father, manager of Port St. Lucie, Fla.; and great-grandfather, a Michigan mayor and past president of the Michigan Municipal League.

“I’ve wanted to be a public safety officer my whole life,” said Officer Bremer. “I thought it was cool that they did police, fire and, also, EMS.”

His mother pinned his badge to his uniform during a swearing-in ceremony Tuesday, May 20.

“We feel proud and honored for him,” she said.

The cost of another officer is offset by reducing overtime, according to Bruce Bisballe, chairman of the finance committee.

Officer Bremer applied to the Shores with all three certifications required for employment. The city didn’t have to pay for his police, fire or emergency medical technician training.

“Adam has shown great initiative by completing (certification) on his own without support from a police agency,” Schulte said.

The cost of another officer is offset by reducing overtime, according to Bruce Bisballe, chairman of the finance committee.

“When you staff at the absolute minimum, you’re always going to have some absences and illnesses,” Bisballe said. “We felt it was better to have another officer to fill those things.”

Bremer came to the Shores from the New Baltimore police department.

He was a cadet and reserve marine officer.

# Municipalities look at joint dispatch

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Council members added the city to a grant application to build a joint public safety dispatch center.

The state grant reimburses Grosse Pointe Farms, Shores and Woods up to \$500,000 in capital costs to consolidate dispatch and prisoner lock-ups at Woods headquarters.

“(The) Farms has particular interest in the new lock-up facility being proposed that meets current standards and provides a net increase in the number of jail cells,” said Shane Reeside, Farms manager. “The grant would also fund video equipment that could facilitate video arraignments.” Grant money covers

costs of constructing and equipping a combined facility.

Lock-ups and dispatching already are partially consolidated to save expenses.

The Shores contracts both services to the Farms, as does the City to the Park.

The proposed next step reduces the number of lock-ups in the Pointes from three — in the Farms, Park and Woods — to two, in the Park and Woods.

Farms action this month follows the state telling Woods officials in April the grant was awarded conditionally through the treasury department’s Competitive Grant Assistance Program.

To complete the deal, the Farms, Woods and Shores must provide the state additional information by June 2, according to an April 1 letter that Evah Cole, of the treasury’s office of revenues and tax analysis, wrote to Woods Administrator Skip Fincham.

“Submission of (the information) will be considered an agreement to all provisions specified in the grant application and will signify acceptance of the grant award,” Cole wrote.

Farms and Shores councils also must pass resolutions accepting the state’s terms. “By passing the resolution, the Farms will not be committed to expend any funds, but will continue dialogue with (the) Woods regarding the costs and benefits of further consolidation of dispatch and lockup,” Reeside said.

prompted Harper Woods police to seek backup, according to Jim Burke, Harper Woods public safety director.

“We had several officers at the school prior to dismissal and our responding officers were on scene within 60 seconds,” Burke posted that evening on nixle.com.

“Officers were able to quickly restore order after receiving assistance from several departments.”

A Farms officer arrested a 17-year-old Detroit male for disorderly conduct.

“Harper Woods officers took five adults and four juveniles into custody,” Burke said.

Charges include disorderly conduct, assault and battery and resisting arrest, he said.

“The juveniles were released to their parents,” Burke said. “The adults posted bond and will appear in court within two weeks.”

There were no significant injuries nor gun-play, he added.

“We are working with the school administration to ensure this type of event does not occur again in our community,” Burke said.

The general deployment didn’t strip the Pointes of police and fire protection.

“When we have an active mutual aid event, we would not send every officer from every community,” said City Chief Stephen Poloni.

“As people from Grosse Pointe Woods would move men, the Shore fills in for some of them, and everybody moves down the line.”

Select few benefit from film subsidies while sinking roads affect everyone

A story on the website MLive, “Batman vs. Superman” to employ everybody they can get their hands on,” about the movie being filmed in metro Detroit, demonstrates why it is so hard to get rid of programs that are almost universally seen as economically destructive.

*A select number of carpenters and caterers might see a temporary gain from the production if they are hired to build sets or provide food, but what good does that do all the other carpenters and caterers statewide who are forced to chip in to subsidize metro Detroiters?*

In the story, Susan Dorris, Oakland County film commissioner, provided little concrete evidence of any real economic impact the project will have, despite Warner Bros., which made \$1.2 billion last year, receiving \$35 million in corporate welfare courtesy of Michigan taxpayers.

“I have heard the term ‘cast of thousands,’ and I don’t know if that means it’s digitally created or its actual people employed,” she said. “But I do know they will be using a lot of extras.”

Reading the article, people get the idea the film subsidies are a great deal. They are not.

There is a lot of economic literature on film subsidy programs, and it is nearly unanimous that they are a poor way to spend taxpayer dollars. Conservatives, liberals and everyone in between find the cost to be much greater than the benefit.

It is only by focusing on the benefits — an alleged “hundreds of (temporary) jobs for crew members” and “6,000 (low-paying, temporary) jobs for extras” — and ignoring the costs that make the program look good. Bear in mind Michiganders have spent \$450 million on film subsidies so far with no real gain in the number of actual film jobs.

MLive also reported part of the production could take place at the Michigan Motion Pictures Studio in Pontiac. The studio missed three payments on \$18 million in bond obligations, and so under a deal made in 2010 by then Gov. Jennifer Granholm, the payments were covered by the underfunded state and public school employee pension funds.

This also is a case of concentrated benefits with diffuse costs and it is hard to justify state taxpayers propping up a film that admits to only having an impact in Wayne and Oakland counties. A select number of carpenters and caterers might see a temporary gain from the production if they are hired to build sets or provide food, but what good does that do all the other carpenters and caterers statewide who are forced to chip in to subsidize metro Detroiters?

Estimates show it costs about \$15 to fill a pothole. The \$35 million subsidy “Batman vs. Superman” is receiving could fill about 2.3 million potholes. Wouldn’t that be a better use of that money?

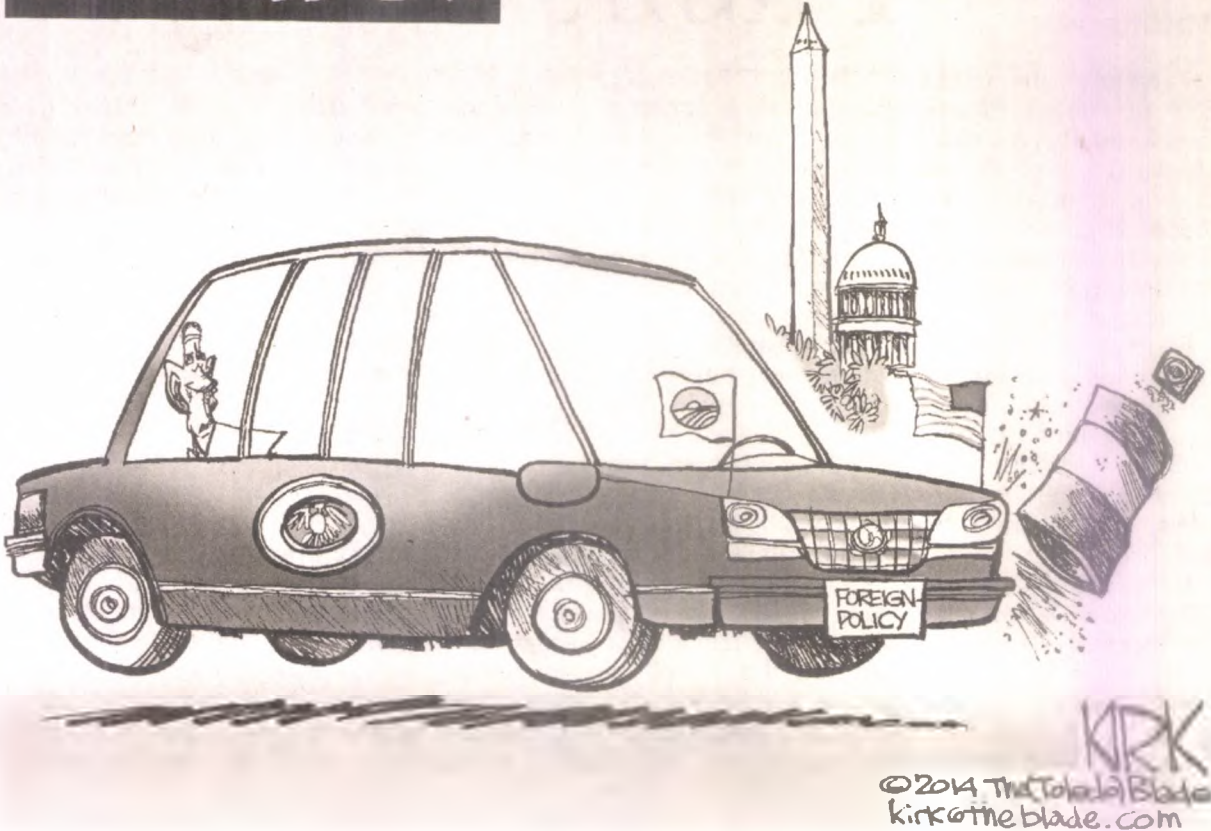

To the Editor:

The Grosse Pointe Public School System stands by the best practices utilized in our search for the next principal of Grosse Pointe South High School.

It is the same process used for successful administrator searches at North, Pierce, Parcels, Brownell and Kerby, with positive feedback.

Not only does the process capitalize on the professional skill set of our human resources department, but it invites input and participation from teachers, support staff, administrators, parents and community members.

More than 50 South stakeholders participated in paper screening, screener interviews, or the full committee interviews in a process that was not rushed.

Here is a quick synopsis:

The online survey for input on the next South principal was taken by 529 unique IP addresses, and results were shared at the televised Grosse Pointe Public School System Board of Education meeting on May 12 — archived at new.livestream.com/accounts/3685210 — and a written summary was posted online since then at gpschools.org — under the school board dropdown, click “Reports.”

The posting went up April 29 and closed May 19, with full committee interviews taking place during the week of June 3.

An extensive background check was conducted following the final interviews.

A site visit was conducted and a meet and greet was scheduled for additional community input June 17.

While not the ideal time for a principal search, our timing was shared by several other high-caliber districts also searching for a high school principal.

The district has repeatedly stated we would only hire someone who could meet the high standards and expectations we have in the Grosse Pointe Public School System. We will not make a wrong hire to have someone in place.

The district does not recommend posting every applicant’s resume as that will likely deter potential

applicants from entering future search processes. There is a difference between transparency, which this process demonstrated, and what some community members seek.

Let our administrators and board members do their job. They are committed to our schools, students and community.

Instead, let’s focus our energy on the image our district is presenting to potential candidates so we can continue to attract the very best instructional leaders and families to our area.

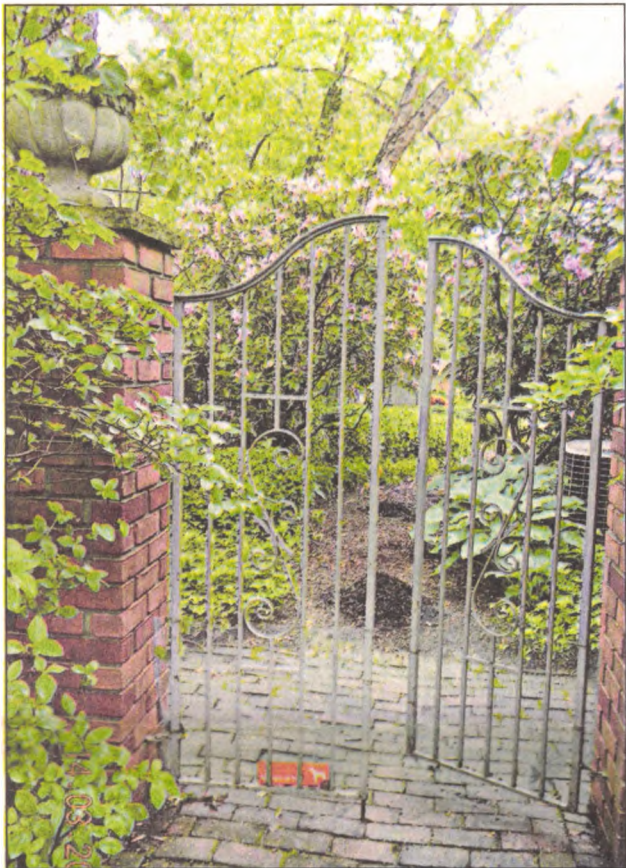



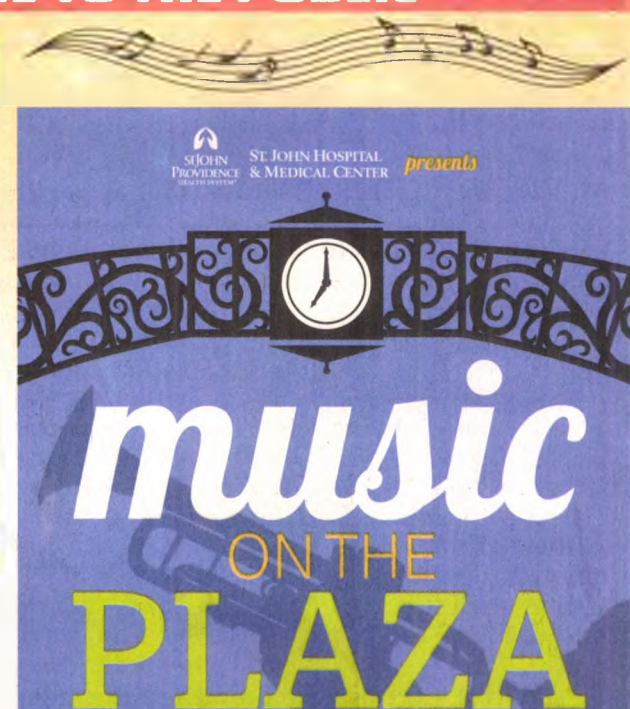

Grosse Pointe Farms, a rose tree is in bloom and a fairy village is nestled in a back corner.

The homeowner said one of her favorite plants is Jack Frost brunnera because it can be divided and offers light blue flowers in the spring. But it is the leaves that provide the color in three seasons. The weeping pine tree guards the dwarf weeping redbud tree.

Winding paths take the visitor past perennials of heuchera, daisies, peonies, sweet woodruff, bleeding hearts, anemones, lavender, delphinium, cranesbill and foxglove. Ivy covers the ground and surrounds a clay warrior the family brought back from a 2002 trip to China.

Striving for a natural look, the backyard has a water fall bordered by lush green plants. And the eye follows the water to the pots filled with colors from pansies, petunias, windflowers, sedum, begonia and asters.

The family built a pergola to enjoy the natural look of the backyard with a waterfall.

## Grosse Pointe Woods

Visitors will walk through a wrought iron gate to see nearly an acre of relandscaped and updated backyard expanse. Walking on a natural path with rhododendrons on either side, the guest sees trimmed evergreens, the 100 flats of begonias, spiderwort, a pool house, a children's playhouse surrounded by color created by annuals. Hanging on the fence are boxes of rosemary and thyme. The eye catches the tall fence separating the yard from the pool with its frog statues spitting water and the massive turtles stationed at the back. The nymphs are playing in the hosta and ivy at the far end of the pool area. Douglas fir and flowering crab trees surround the pool.

Don't miss the two outdoor kitchens, complete with sinks and refrigerators. One has a two-burner top range.

A string quartet will be playing between noon and 2 p.m. both days of the garden tour.

Lettuce, spinach, carrots and peppers thrive in a raised garden at this Grosse Pointe Park



The front lawn of the second Grosse Pointe Woods house is manicured and bordered with pink and black. Pink as in begonias, geraniums and roses and black as in large stones and mulch. The side and back yards are artificial grass. A three-hole putting course is next to the conversation area in which guests can relax while smoking a cigar.

The paved patio has a fire pit. An outdoor kitchen has been built to serve those gathered at a table and chairs. Boxwood provide the green back to the sand-colored wall with seven waterfalls. With more than 50 flower pots spaced throughout the yard, there is always a pop of color.

The third Grosse Pointe Woods house features a smaller garden loaded with hosta, impatiens, yellow day lilies, hanging baskets, green arborvitae, junipers, hydrangea, annual grasses, iris, a red maple and a rose of Sharon in the shade of raspberry smoothie. Guarding the backyard is an iron bird made of scrap metal and its head bobs on a spring as visitors pass by. An old cottonwood anchors the backyard and a hawthorn holds a spot on the south side. A lime green Japanese maple, a purple leaf birch and a large hemlock add to the backyard's scenery.

A Master Gardener will be at each private garden to answer questions. Local artists will be recreating the gardens' on their canvasses. Two sites will have refreshments. No strollers or pets are allowed on the tour that is held rain or shine. Additionally, an original water color painting by artist Robert Fionda and six prizes will be raffled as part of the tour. Raffle tickets can be purchased for \$5 each or three for \$10. All proceeds benefit the education, beautification, horticulture and conservation of the Grosse Pointes.

The War Memorial Trial Gardens' 2014 theme is "A Garden of Earthly Delights - Cultivating the Senses." Each plot is designed, planted and maintained by local garden clubs' members who vie to win the right to select the next year's theme.

Veterans Garden is a tiered garden and maintained by volunteers. Service men and women are honored in the garden.

I was speaking recently with Virginia Harris, who gives inspirational talks around the United States on the topic of spirituality and healing, and is originally from Detroit. She issued this challenge to those of us who desire to support Detroit and its rebirth.

"Rather than declare failure, metro Detroiters should declare freedom, the spiritual freedom that guarantees ongoing creativity, harmony, productivity, vitality and life," Harris said. "Every prayer that affirms this spiritual fact has immediate access to the source of unlimited creative ideas. Imagine whole communities praying from this starting point!"

# Road work continues in the Farms

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Repaving lower Moross continues this week.

Yet, work on Mack from Grosse Pointe Park, through the City and into the Farms is better late than never. A breakdown of the project includes:

## Lower Moross

On Moross, which rainy weather delayed, construction barrels line portions of the road in preparation for lane closings during resurfacing from Lakeshore past Ridge.

Detour signs direct motorists to Ridge and Kerby during construction.

"The project should go fairly quickly," said Shane Reeside, Farms manager. "It should be finished within a couple of weeks."

On Mack, a multi-jurisdictional road, water main repairs on the Detroit side of the street kicked repaving to the curb.

The delay stands at

three months.

"Road work won't start until Aug. 1," Reeside said. "We thought it would be done in early summer."

Traffic on Mack will be maintained during lane-by-lane resurfacing on both sides of the street from Harvard in Grosse Pointe Park, through the City past Moross in the

Farms.

According to an inter-governmental agreement with Detroit and Wayne County, the Pointes' share of the \$2.8 million project is:

- ◆ City, \$61,451,
- ◆ Farms, \$45,419 and
- ◆ Park, \$4,672.

## Upper Moross

Construction beside

the southbound curb of Moross at and around Chalfonte is unrelated to road resurfacing.

DTE Energy crews are tending a host of old, buried natural gas lines.

"It's a pretty major project," Reeside said. "They patched them during winter, but are now replacing a lot of ancient infrastructure."

## Back-to-back state champs

University Liggett boys' baseball team won its second straight state championship last weekend, beating Decatur 9-0 in the Division 3 title game at Michigan State University's McLane Stadium.

Last year, the Knights beat Beal City to win the Division 4 title. The Knights also became the first team in state history to play in four consecutive state championship games, winning three of them. They lost the 2012 game to Decatur.

"Our guys came out focused and ready to play," head coach Dan Cimini said. "They played a great game and beat a good Decatur team. It's a tribute to the players who are in our program. They give it their best shot each and every day and this is the end result."

"It's an awesome feeling." The Knights put two runs on the board in the third inning, but put the game away after tallying seven runs in the fifth to build the 9-0 advantage.

They only had three hits, but walked seven times and Decatur committed four errors, allowing the nine runs to score.

Adam Fiema, Nick Azar and Anthony Simon each had a hit, while Fiema, Simon, Gehrig Anglin, Matt Gushee and Ian Clark, on a squeeze bunt, drove in runs.

Anglin, a freshman, earned the win on the mound, going the distance. He gave up only two hits, walked three and struck out four. He faced only 28 hitters.

Liggett finished its season 25-8 overall.

Liggett did something that is unheard of in high school athletics — make it to four consecutive state championship games — after ripping Reese 7-1 in the semifinals.

The Knights used an aggressive offensive attack and benefited from nine walks to power their way to a 7-1 lead after four innings.

Fiema was 2-for-3 with a run scored, two RBIs

and two walks, while Clark was 2-for-4 with two runs scored.

Patrick Broder was 1-for-3 with a run scored, one RBI and one walk, and Simon was 1-for-4 with two runs scored and one RBI. Cole Zingas was 0-for-2, but walked three times, scored a run and drove in a run. On the mound was Gushee, who was in total command. He went all seven innings, giving up only four hits,

one earned run, one walk and two strikeouts.

In the quarterfinals at Chelsea High School, Liggett clinched its fourth consecutive trip to the Final Four by defeating Clinton 7-3.

In the process of beating Clinton, Cimini earned his 300th career win, putting him at 300-63 in his 11 seasons at the helm of the Knights.

The Knights trailed 3-0, but came back to make it

3-3 after Zingas singled home Connor McCarron, Azar tripled home Zingas and Simon drove home Azar with a sacrifice fly.

In the bottom of the sixth inning, Clinton had runners in scoring position off starter Anglin.

Cimini pulled Anglin and put in Fiema, who got out of the inning with the score tied 3-3.

Clinton's T.J. Baker had not given up an earned run all season, but the Knights changed that as they tacked on four runs to win the game.

Fiema walked, Zingas doubled and Azar was intentionally walked to load the bases. Simon's fielder's choice scored Fiema and Anglin hit a sacrifice fly to score Zingas to make it 5-3.

Gushee and Broder also had run-scoring hits to finish off the offensive output.

Fiema slammed the door and earned the win with his two innings of relief.

### All-state

Nick Azar made the Division 3 All-State First Team as an infielder, while Fiema made All-State First Team as an outfielder.

Anthony Simon made All-State Second Team as a first baseman.

BUF youth rowers learn the fundamentals of rowing and develop athletic skills, with a special

focus on teamwork, leadership and discipline through healthy competition.

John Bancheri is head coach for both men's and women's rowing at Grand Valley State University Rowing in Allendale, a few miles west of Grand Rapids.

Since taking over in 2005, he has grown the program in size, support, equipment, facilities, notoriety, and — not least of all — accomplishments. The Club is currently six-time consecutive American Collegiate Rowing Association's Team Points National Champion. Under Bancheri's direction, the women have twice won gold, and men the bronze, at the Head of the Charles Regatta. Last year, the women's team was the

Dad Vail Team Points Champion, and the men were Lubbers' Cup Points Champions over the University of Michigan.

Coach Bancheri is U.S. Rowing level III certified and power boating certified. He lives in Allendale and has twin sons, John Patrick and Salvatore Vincenzo.

The DWRA boathouse is located on the grounds of the Lawrence Fisher Mansion at 383 Lenox in Detroit.

The club consists of nearly 50 members with various experiences and backgrounds, from recreational indoor-only senior rowers, to competitive collegiate and Masters rowers who train for national and international regattas.

**Section 1. Amendment to Vehicle Code**  
The City of Grosse Pointe Farms previously has adopted by reference the Michigan Vehicle Code (Ordinance No. 370). As authorized by Act 7 of the Michigan Public Acts of 2012, MCL 117.4i(k), the City of Grosse Pointe Farms also specifically adopts by reference the provisions set forth in Section 625(1) (c) of the Michigan Vehicle Code, MCL 257.625(1) (c), concerning the operation of a vehicle while intoxicated.

St. Clare fifth-grader Robert Williams was able to ask her a question about perseverance.

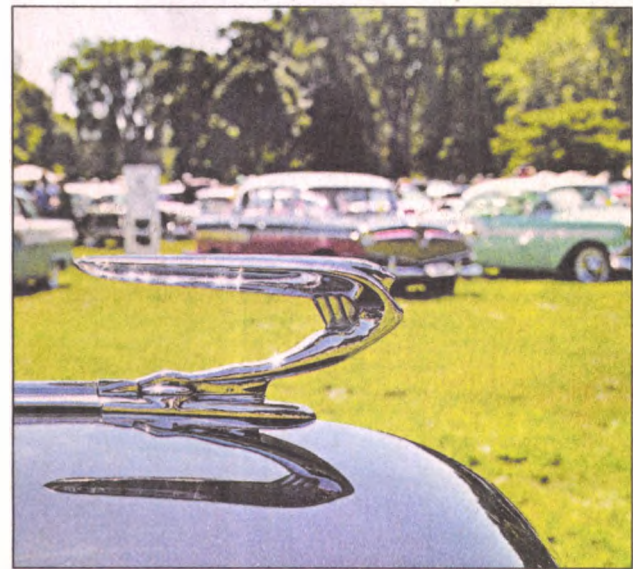

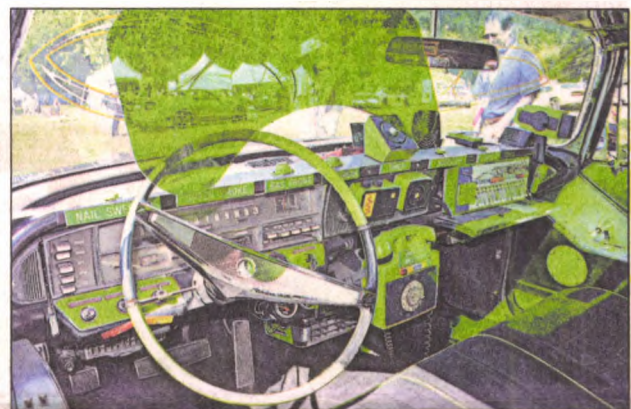
