GROSSE POINTE PARK — A middle-aged charitable organization serving area senior citizens is feeling its clients' aches and pains.

The Helm, established in 1978 as Services for Older Citizens, has for 46 years relied on donations to operate myriad programs — from delivering 20,000 hot meals to shutins annually, transporting seniors to doctor appointments, making Medicaid, changing ceiling light bulbs and committing more impromptu member body agreed. acts of respect and kindness that can be cata- the city's narrowest poslogued.

Helm nears its second half-century of operations, the financial benevolence by which it lives has hit a wall.

"This community is

tapped out," said Prudence Cole, president emeritus of the organization, based in Grosse Pointe Farms but serving residents of all five Pointes and Harper Woods.

The Helm's existence, let alone plans for expansion, require a new funding modus operandi.

Cole called it the elephant in the room taxes. She said The Helm needs millage support from at least four of the six communities it serves.

Former employee suing **GPPSS**



 A former employee who used to be part of the district's communications team has sued the Grosse Pointe Public School System and four board of education members, saying her termination was a violation of her constitutional rights.

Mary Anne Brush, a reporter for the Grosse Pointe News from June 2015 to December 2020, filed the suit Friday, June 7, in U.S. District Court. It also names board President Sean Cotton. Vice President Ahmed Ismail, Secretary Lisa Papas and Trustee Ginny Jeup. Cotton owns the Grosse Pointe News.

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Farms approves Helm's senior millage for Nov. ballot

GROSSE POINTE FARMS — After going back and forth for months, Farms residents officially will see a 0.35 mill ballot initiative for senior services through The Helm at the Boll Life Center on the November

The amount is a reduction from an originally proposed 0.5-mill levy, following feedback from officials in The Helm's member communities.

Farms city council unanimously approved the following ballot language Monday night, with various members citing an interest in allowing residents to choose for themselves.

"Do you approve of the addition of a new .35-mill levy to collect approximately \$362,110 in revenue in the first year, to be disbursed to the Grosse Pointe Active Adult Commission, for the purpose of supporting services to older citizens, including transportation, activities and facilities directed toward improvement of the overall health and welfare of older persons?"



Code officers scour alleys

creeping through an alley prompts a call to public safety.

Recently, though, residents with property abutting an alley may notice increased patrols by code enforcement offi-

and anything that isn't up to par.

"We have code enforcement targeting alleys at least one day a week," said Nick Sizeland, city manager. "Residents in alleys will probably see more notices than they ever have."

He said alley vegetation is on the list of code enforcement officers: 'Most branches overgrowing fences are the responsibility of residents."

Alley resurfacing this year consist of:

♦ between the 1100 blocks of Beaconsfield and Nottingham, plus

♦ between the 1300 blocks of Wayburn and Maryland.

The city public works department has been separating alley sewers as part of an overall upgrade of the sewer system," Sizeland said.

In many cases, dips and holes in alleys are caused by collapsed sew-

"We're doing about two alleys per year," Sizeland said. "In the meantime, if residents They're checking for have questions or conovergrown vegetation, cerns about a pothole or road surface problems big divot, contact the public works department and we'll put down some temporary asphalt."

Roadwork

Roadwork remains on schedule this summer. Work consists of:

- replacing the top layer of road surface on Charlevoix from Cadieux to Whittier and
- ♦ doing the same on Middlesex between Windmill Pointe Drive and Korte.

"The city hosted a preconstruction meeting with Hutch Paving for resurfacing," Sizeland said. "That will take place in the next several weeks. You'll start seeing mobilization of cones and barricades on about June 17 on Charlevoix, as well as sections of alleys and Middlesex."

Construction is supposed to start just before July 4, he said.

Do resolutions mean anything?

here has been plenty of chatter the past several weeks about the Grosse Pointe Public School System Board of Education and its handling of a proposed resolution regarding National Gun Violence Awareness Day.

Also known as "Wear Orange" weekend, the annual event began in 2015, when friends of a young girl who was shot and killed on a Chicago playground decided to wear orange clothing. Not only was orange the girl's favorite color, but it is most commonly associated with hunters, who wear orange clothes in the woods to identify themselves to other hunters.

Although the board voted last year in favor of a similar resolution, it was defeated at the board's meeting May 6, with President Sean Cotton, Vice President Ahmed Ismail, Secretary Lisa Papas, Treasurer Terry Collins and Trustee Ginny Jeup voting no. Trustees Valarie St. John and Colleen Worden voted yes. Cotton, who owns the Grosse Pointe News, chose not to put a revised version of the resolution on the agenda for the board's meeting May 28.

St. John and Worden, who both sponsored the resolution, made passionate pleas in its defense. St. John said students, who requested the resolution, are traumatized by active shooter and lockdown drills and worry about their safety in school on a daily basis. Worden, an assistant prosecutor in Macomb County, said she has dealt with issues regarding unsecured firearms in homes with children.

Those voting against the resolution, however, said it was both political and unnecessary. We agree. Jeup said passing it would not bring about any meaningful change.

The Everytown Support Fund, which organizes the "Wear Orange" campaign, said more than 450 events marking the occasion took place last year nationwide, with a plethora of celebrity support and orange light illuminating the White House. Yet gun violence persists.

Chicago, where the movement started, has seen more than 600 gun-related homicides six of the last eight ears, despite having among the most restrictive gun laws in the country.

On the political front, Cotton noted Everytown for Gun Safety in 2022 — the last reporting year available - raised more than \$120 million between its 501(c)3 and 501(c)4 funds, while making just \$6 million in charitable donations. The bulk of the money was spent on staff salaries, lobbying and lawsuits.

Admittedly, gun violence is a serious issue and we don't claim to know how to solve it. It's also, obviously, very emotional. Just 16 months ago the Grosse Pointe community was rocked when GPPSS alumni Brian Fraser and Arielle Anderson were two of three Michigan State University students killed by gunfire.

It was very emotional when Mary Fraser, Brian Fraser's mother, addressed the board on the issue at its meeting May 28. She noted how the Students Demand Action chapter at Grosse Pointe North High School is trying to make a difference and said the board should recognize their efforts. She also said passing the resolution would let the community know ending gun violence is an important issue.

We believe the community already is well aware of that. In the last two weeks there have been no fewer than four events marking "Wear Orange" weekend:

- ◆ Thursday, May 30, neighbors gathered at a local business for free arcade games, snacks and drinks with orange flowers, ribbons and lights for sale.
- ◆ Thursday, June 6, students from Grosse Pointe North's Students Demand Action held a panel discussion on gun violence at the Grosse Pointe Public Library Woods Branch that included Sen. Kevin Hertel, D-St. Clair Shores.

We noted in May that according to financial forecasters, Americans planned to spend less this year on Mother's Day than they did last year — \$33.5 billion down from \$37.5 billion, with an average of \$274 per person, some \$20 less than 2023.

We agree with Treasurer Collins, who said National Gun Violence Awareness Day already is recognized by the state and federal governments and no one was stopped from wearing orange or making their feelings known on the issue.

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

GROSSE POINTE PARK - The public works director has a forthright reason for wanting to sell several old pieces of department

equipment. "Several old pieces of equipment are no longer used by the Department of Public Works," said Tom Jenny, hired a few years ago. "The equipment is currently sitting in the overflow (parking) lot of Windmill Pointe Park, losing value."

The equipment, consisting of four large vehicles, a trailer and two riding lawn mowers, also are taking up storage space.

"Auctioning off this equipment will free up space in the overflow lot for parking and cleaning of the site." Jenny said.







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Mighty mayfly

Just three days into June and the mighty mayfly has made its first appearance in the Pointes with a giant hatch taking place June 3 and 4. The wind has been minimal and the surface has been bubbling with fish gorging themselves on the millions of Rhithrogena morrisoni, which is said to be the American species of mayfly, according to Wikipedia.

You don't need to be a skilled fly fisherman this time of year to catch a fish and it's no secret what hatch you need to match. There were millions of them on the building at 1 Kercheval as I walked my son, Ben, to school. Kids were playing with them on the steps at drop-off and one even landed on my dashboard headed to the boat.

I've experienced this special day of fishing in recent years and had some great beginner's luck catching smallmouth on the fly rod. I decided I would head to the exact spot where I experienced it a few years earlier and made my way close to the Delphine Channel. There is a sandy, rocky flat there and I had a feeling the mayflies were there. As soon as I killed the motor I could hear the fish slurping, splashing and swirling along the surface.

The top water bite would surely be on. I grabbed my baitcasting rod with a small top water popper and began to cast. Wham! A strike, but nothing on. My adrenaline spikes when the smallmouth are hitting on top. It is my favorite time to fish. There is nothing like an aggressive fish exploding on the surface to attack your lure. With the adrenaline flowing I tend to lose my rhythm and shorten the time the lure is in the strike zone or get tangled or even worse, a bird's nest.

I was recording on Instagram Live and decided to continue the live session until I caught a fish, so there was even more pressure on. After all, the two people watching were expecting a show. I also needed to put some fish on the board for the Grosse Pointe News fishing contest.

I took a deep breath and told myself to be calm and slow down. I cast again as I took another deep breath and released a very clean and very long cast. Wham! The fish swatted at it but didn't take the hook. A few casts later, wham! Another strike but this time the line was heavy. It was on!

I could see its profile zip across mighty mayfly.

the top layer of the lake as the sun reflected off its green and black scales revealing the striped pattern of a darker smallmouth. After a few moments of fighting I reached for the net and boated a lovely smallmouth bass.

Now it was time to try the fly rod, which is not my strength, but when the fish are this active, it's the best time to try something more challenging. I started with a white popper and some short casts, letting out more and more line as I got a rhythm. It was so calm and clear I could see the fish come up underneath the popper and look at it. Within a few casts a nice-sized smallmouth slurped the popper off the surface, splashed and took off. My line tightened but I wasn't quite ready to set the hook in time. She was gone.

A few more casts later, splash! Another bite. The white popper flew up in the air and landed back on the surface unattached. Zero for two! I had some practice to do if I was going to be successful with the fly rod. I gave it a rest for a bit and went back to the baitcaster and alternated between spinner baits and surface baits, successfully landing fish with both. The day before, I stuck with the drop shot and had great success landing mostly 18- to 19-inch smallmouth. Today's were smaller in the 16- to 17-inch range but still aggressive and fun to catch.

It was time to try the fly rod again and I was determined to use the steps I have learned and practiced before to be successful. I even tied on a dry fly that looked exactly like the hatch.


I cast a few times, letting out more line each time then remembered to start stripping line back toward me and wham! A nice smallie splashed the surface and snatched my artificial mayfly. I set the hook and the fight began. Then wham! My reel fell off the fly rod onto the front seat of the boat. I must not have screwed on the reel properly and it was now out of the equation. It was just me, the line, the rod and the fish. I pinched the line firmly with my fingertips and felt the tension of the fish. I lifted the rod and slowly pulled in line, being careful not to create slack and gentle enough to not til the hook out of her mouth.

She came to the surface and splashed as I caught up with her, shortening the line. I reached for the net, pulled her toward the boat and scooped her cleanly out of the water. Yes! Success! A 17-inch smallie on the faulty fly rod and a





It is not unusual for declarer to find himself playing in a contract he has little or no chance to make. Nevertheless, declarer still has a natural advantage because he knows his situation is hopeless and the defenders don't.

Consider this deal, where South is in three notrump and West leads a low diamond, on which East plays the queen. Declarer sees that if he wins the diamond and cashes dummy's A-K of clubs, he will have no way of getting back to his hand to cash his remaining clubs if the defenders are smart enough not to lead diamonds again.

So, in an effort to make the contract, South ducks the queen of diamonds, hoping East will continue the suit. And when East does — and it's certainly hard to blame him for returning the suit his partner led — South discards dummy's A-K of clubs on the A-K of diamonds, then cashes six club tricks and the ace of spades to get home with nine tricks.


It is true that with sharper defense, the opponents can do much better after declarer ducks the first diamond. If East shifts to a spade instead of returning a diamond at trick two — a play he would make if he saw all four hands declarer would find himself fighting a losing battle. With perfect defense, South would go down two, losing two spades, three hearts and a diamond.

But the fact is that in actual combat, declarer is likely to make the contract if he ducks the queen of diamonds at trick one. He knows something that East doesn't know — that the contract cannot be made without enlisting the opponents' help — and he trades upon this advantage by giving East a chance to go wrong.



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Norsemen headed back to East Lansing for Division 1 final four

In 2022, Grosse Pointe North varsity baseball came just shy of being named Division 1 state champions, losing 1-0 to Orchard Lake St. Mary's in a classic state final game. 
