Debunking the Finnish Legend

The tears shed so abundantly by the press over Russia's rape of Finland are due to large extent to foreign propaganda. Here's why and how:—
For some time Finland has been presented to the people of this country as an honest democracy. She may have been honest, but her system of government had nothing in common with the liberal ideas a republic should be based upon. Finland was not a democracy. For, in a democracy, those who happen to disagree with the party in power are not shot down in cold blood as has often been the case in Finland. Here was a stern form of government, a dictatorship.

Ever since the close of the World War, when she recovered her independence from Russia, Finland has been run by a clique of arrogant reactionaries, great landowners and noblemen, who employed against the more liberal social-democrat party and the bulk of the people very much the same methods of oppression in favor under Czarist Russia.

Little known is the fact that Finland has been the first European country to fall under fascist rule. Italian fascism itself is considered to have been patterned after the initial terrorist regime set up at Helsinki by stern General Baron Carl von Mannerheim and his men, after the people had chased the Reds out of the country.

Of course, this illustration does not justify the Russian aggression which remains that of a big bully against a weakling, nor does it diminish in any way the Finnish people, but at least it serves to preserve us from being too deeply moved over a cause which is not ours. We should not boil with indignation just because a boa is gobbling up a smaller serpent. Dictatorships are made that way.

Besides, those in power at Helsinki had a chance to compromise like the other Baltic states and thus save the Finnish people from useless strife, death and destruction. But the Candler Cabinet scorned and waived it aside. Its members silenced reason and listened only to their hatred and arrogance; they deliberately hurled a tiny nation of 3,500,000 against a giant power 108,000,000 strong.

Some may call this bravery; to me it sounds more like wholesale murder. So much the more so, if we recall that it is never those important, insignificant gentlemen who show such disregard for the lives of their fellow-citizens that bear the brunt of war. It is the people, those who cannot or will not flee to safety.

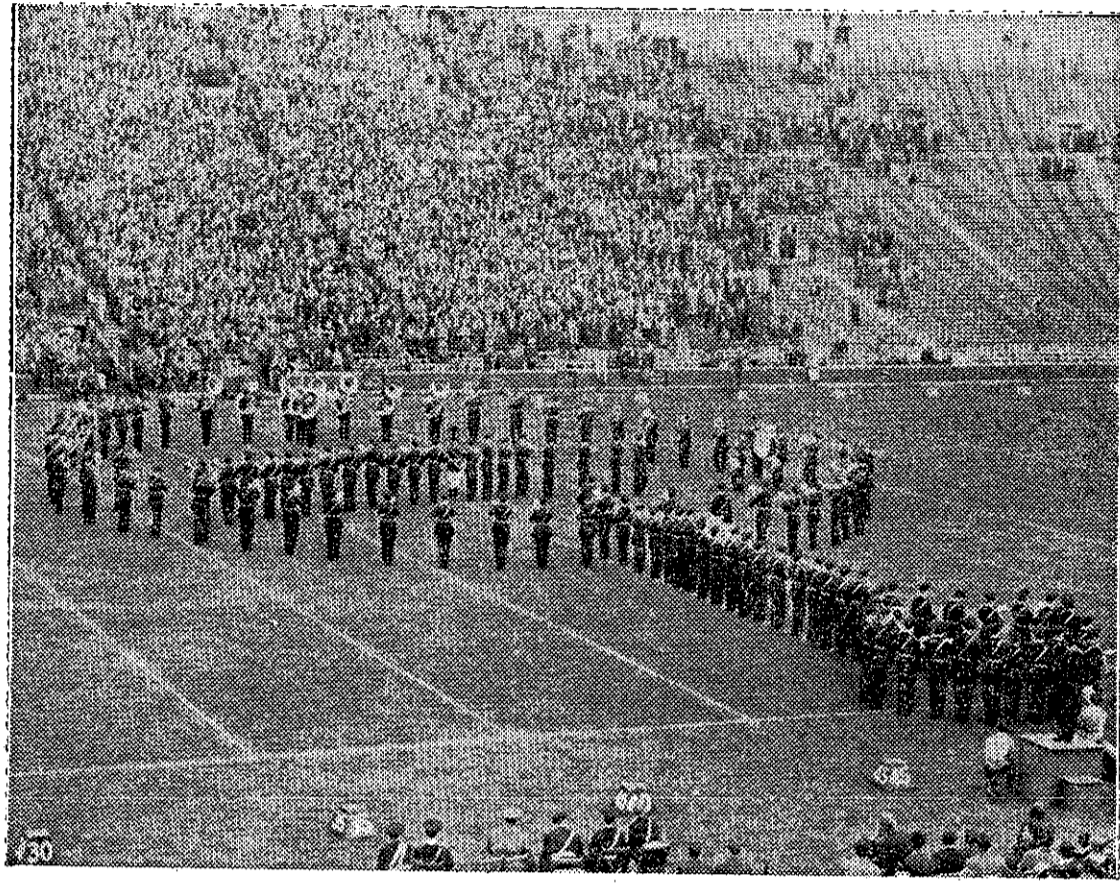
Today, the Finnish nation is prostrate and bleeding. It cannot yet grasp why its leaders called for so much heroism and sacrifice when all that was needed to avoid the fatal issue, was a little common sense.

Will the newly-formed Ryti Cabinet show better statesmanship? It is doubtful, for its real purpose is to shift responsibility (an old trick in European politics), is merely a subterfuge to enable the dictatorship to hang on to power until the very last straw. In other words, the nominal power has changed, but the real power is the same. At this stage, only a combination of social-democrats and the peoples party could induce Moscow to stop hostilities and through negotiations, save what is left of Finnish independence.

The wide acclaim heaped on Finland for honesty in the payment of her so-called war debts also is due to a misrepresentation of facts. Finland had no war debts. She borrowed the money she repaid after the last war and not during the war. The loans granted Finland by the Allies were officially termed as "relief funds." These funds were supposed to relieve the starving population of Finland. In reality, the money financed the Finnish campaign against the newlyborn Bolshevik regime of Russia. All lesser powers willing to join the former Allies in their fight against the Red Terror were entitled to the use of these "relief funds." Finland volunteered and had her share. The only difference is that the Finns have repaid their loans, while the other nations more litigious-minded, claimed they had largely repaid their debts through the service they had rendered the Allies in their drive to crush Communism.

Since these post-war debts were of a very different nature as compared to the regular war debts, the former Allies, deemed it wise not to insist.

Group Discusses Baha'i Teachings

"The foundation of all religions is one" was the challenging statement made to a group studying the Baha'i teachings at 104 Moran road, Monday evening, December 4. The question was then raised, "Why, if the foundation of all religions is one, is there such dissension over religion in the

world today to the extent that there are hundreds of sects in almost every great religion?" As the discussion evolved, certain points were made: (1) that the difference in religion is due to difference in interpretation of the holy scriptures; (2) that the difference in religion is due to prejudice or a preconceived idea based more on hearsay than on fact; (3) that the differences in religion are also due to ritual, form or dogma. It was pointed out that today, more than ever, groups within the churches of Christianity as well as Mohammedanism and the other great religions were forming in an effort to "get back to the original teachings" of the Prophets and to eliminate the unnecessary and questionable forms which have sprung up around the teachings.

"The foundation of all religions is one, because religion has but one Source which from time to time sends His Prophets to the world. Since there is but one Source, there can be but one true religion, the religion of God." Several people indicated that the reason people did not seem to realize that the Prophets were all teaching the same Message was that they did not realize that all of the Prophets brought two teachings: the spiritual and the material. The spiritual teachings are Divine Truths such as the love of God and the golden rule, which, regardless of time and place, will remain as Spiritual Truths. And the material teachings relate to the people of the time. In Moses' time, it was necessary to cut off a man's hand when he stole, while in Christ's time the law was "If a man smite thee on one cheek, turn unto him the other also." Some people even refused to recognize Christ as a true Prophet of God because He broke two of the material laws of Moses' time: the law of the Sabbath and the law of divorce.

For comparison, we read the Ten Commandments of the outstanding religions of today: Christian, Mohammedan, Jewish, Hindu, Zoroastrian, Buddha, and Baha'i. With the ex-

ception of phraseology, they all expressed the same thought, that one should treat others as he himself would wish to be treated.

The question was asked, "What is the reason for the wars today even with Christianity?" And one of the answers was that, people of the Christian era were not adhering to the principles laid down by the Prophet or there never would have been this war. And another was that in the light of the Baha'i teachings that although this may seem a terrible thing, it is really a necessity; for through it people are learning that the material life is insecure in every way and that they are even now beginning to realize that the only true basis for civilization is spiritual.

The great message which the Baha'i teachings have to offer to the world today is this: that in this darkest hour, God's Covenant with man has again been renewed. That even as Christ appeared before Rome fell, and Moses before the great Egyptian civilization crumbled, there came to this earth, before this upheaval we are now experiencing, a new Prophet, Baha'u'llah, who has fulfilled all that former Prophets have prophesied as to His coming, and laid the foundation for the new civilization.

While this old world is collapsing, throughout 42 countries of the world, the basis for the new culture is being laid through the teachings of Baha'u'llah. And this new culture, with its spiritual and material basis will form the new international world.

8,000 Divorce Cases Started Every Year
A total of more than 8000 divorce cases are started each year in Wayne County, due largely to the economic disturbances cramped living quarters, industrial problems, and a total lack of financial stability. Carroll P. Adams, of the staff of the Wayne County Friend of the Court, told members and guests of the Louisa St. Clair Chapter of the D. A. R. at their meeting Thursday, November 16, in the Newberry House. Jurisprudence over each family, especially the minor children, begins as soon as a bill for divorce or separate maintenance is filed, and that supervision continues until the youngest child reaches the age of 18, the speaker said. Figures were quoted showing that more than 80,000 families have passed through the hands of Edward Pokorny the head of the office, in the past 21 years, such a volume presenting one of the major problems of the Circuit Court in its effort to keep the docket up to date. Among the largest communities in the country Wayne County has a record of collecting the highest percentage of ordered alimony for children of divorced parents and the lowest percent of neglect complaints against custodians of the children. Fifty-one men and women, attorneys, investigators, accountants and clerical assistants comprise the staff of the Wayne County Friend of the Court office, whose structure has been studied and copied all over the United States, Adams said.

Trend of Events
By PAUL M. DEAC
The war of nerves continues unabated. So does the incessant floating of peace hopes—only to be blasted the moment they are launched. Chances are that battles this winter, will be fought not by real soldiers with guns out in the field, but by shrewd diplomats in brilliant European chancelleries. The reluctance of each side to start the real fighting holds a strange resemblance with certain prize fights in which the opponents are equally gifted and renowned for their deadlines in combat. They will take round after round to "eye" one another and sometimes keep on maneuvering throughout the scrap without really "mixing", just because the opening each fighter was after, failed to occur. In fact, there is little probability of a big offensive before springtime. By then, highly reliable sources from Paris predict simultaneous action on both the Western Front and in the Balkans (?)—commonly related to by the French High Command as "our Eastern Front." From southeastern Europe, the report assumes the Allies will launch a flank attack on the uncovered German rear. It is perhaps too soon to say what role is being allotted Italy in such an enterprise, but certain indications already show what may be expected. The evincing by Premier Mussolini of pro-Nazi members of his Cabinet has killed what was left of the Rome-Berlin axis. A so-called trade agreement already has been signed by Italy and the Allies. "Although its exact terms are, as yet unknown it may be merely a preface to negotiations of an undisclosed nature which are now under way in Rome. Preliminaries to these secret pourparlers have so far hatched recognition by Britain of Italy's conquest of Albania. Other developments under way: The Italians are hurriedly fortifying their frontier with the German Reich. The French have "consented" to furnish the special cement and steel needed for this purpose. Italian airplane and munitions factories are being geared to meet "certain Allied needs"—presumably for the Balkans. All this tends to strengthen a hypothesis already voiced in this column, namely: that the Italians may come in handy to support the Allies Balkan associates against any possible German or even Russian thrust in those parts. This may be done by either a formal declaration of war or through benevolent neutrality. Europe is seething with diplomatic activity, while Russia's attitude appears more and more ambiguous. Her thrusts among the Baltic nations are not to be considered of a friendly nature toward the Reich. The way Nazi Germany feels about it can be seen in Berlin's discreet encouragement to Finland and the Scandinavian countries to resist Russian penetration in those parts. In the views of trained observers, Soviet Russia will do anything for a Nazi victory over the Allies. Today she is furnishing Germany with foodstuffs only. Tomorrow she will send arms and munitions. The day after, Stalin will throw the entire might of the Red Army into the balance—if that is necessary. Why? Because an Allied defeat would most likely be followed by upheavals neither the French nor the English present forms of governments could reasonably hope to survive. According to this same source, Stalin believes the defeated peoples of Britain and France would then much rather turn to Moscow than accept the Nazi yoke. At this point Soviet Russia posing as a vengeur will fall upon Nazi Germany whose resistance will be nil. Britain and France will then rise from defeat, join in and help Communism crush the common foe. From that day on it is assumed, Stalin shall "guide and protect" humanity, while Communism rules the world. This, at least, is the fantastic dream that has led Dictator Joseph Stalin to betray the western democracies and side for some time with his reactionary arch-enemy, Adolph Hitler. It is also this same mad dream that still keeps certain shortsighted idealists here and in other countries tied to Moscow's apronstrings.

Happiness Perennial
WHO has not noticed the hardness of certain plants which withstand the coldest winters and in the spring put forth buds and flowers? The cold does not injure them. And under the warm sunshine they respond to the call of spring!
True happiness is like that. It endures under unfavorable conditions, and springs up continually anew. Its extraordinary vitality is explained by the fact that it reflects the nature of God. "Happiness is spiritual, born of Truth and Love," writes Mary Baker Eddy on page 87 of the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures." Even human happiness, in its highest sense, hints at the qualities of the divine. . . .
Happiness is as natural as sunlight. It needs no forcing. To possess it, we have only to look for it where it is—in the sunshine of Truth and Love. . . . The Psalmist sang (Psalm 103:20, 21): "Bless the Lord, ye his angels, that excel in strength, that do his commandments, hearkening unto the voice of his word. Bless ye the Lord, all ye his hosts; ye ministers of his, that do his pleasure." The greatest happiness is to know and do God's will, and everyone can have a share in this.
Mrs. Eddy writes (Science and Health, p. 298): "When the reward is attained, which is announced by Science, joy is no longer a trembler. It is hope a cheat." One who has found happiness in Truth and Love does not fear that he will lose it. The darkest clouds of seeming sorrow pass, and joy appears when thought has in a measure discerned the limitless bliss of living "in Soul, God." "To contemplate the clouds of error or affirm their presence makes them seem darker and more real. The writer had her first glimpse of a happiness that is "no longer a trembler," that is independent of human relationships and circumstances, after an instantaneous healing of a serious disease. She was lifted in a few moments from agony to perfect comfort, and a sense of happiness new in her experience. She found herself repeating over and over, for days, these words: "The knowledge of God is happiness enough for me." And so it has proved during the succeeding years. Enduring satisfaction always follows the perception of spiritual bliss. . . .
Even though discordant voices of sense seem to be real and strong, may silence it for a time, harmony remains, for it alone is real, and discord is unreal. Those who have discerned the fact of immutable harmony have had a great burden lifted from their hearts. No longer do they have to try to be cheerful and assume an appearance of optimism. If hard experiences come and prospects are discouraging, or if sad memories persist, they patiently endure until the clouds lift, refusing to be cast down. To mourn for that which is unreal would be like groping one's way in the bright sunshine while keeping one's eyes closed. Divine Love, compassionate and tender, is ever ready to lead one safely through the seeming night of sorrow until he sees the light of reality.
A sense of sadness sometimes becomes habitual, so that the sufferer almost fears to be a normal, happy individual. Such a one will find that the moment he glimpses his unity with God, sorrow is seen to be abnormal, and happiness within his reach. "God's being is infinity, freedom, harmony, and boundless bliss" (ibid., p. 481). Self-pity dissolves as one meditates upon this great vision of reality. . . . —The Christian Science Monitor.

Richard School P. T. A. Meeting
The Richard School had a most successful P. T. A. meeting last Tuesday, when 300 parents packed the auditorium, visited the classrooms, and had a social hour together in the lunchroom.
