State Awarded One More Seat In Congress

Population Increase Since 1930 Earns Michigan a Nineteenth Representative in House

Because of an increase in its population since 1930, Michigan is entitled to an additional Congressman, the Bureau of the Census informed President Roosevelt Tuesday. The additional will bring the state's congressional representation to 18 from its present 17.

Michigan was one of eight states to gain an increase in its delegation while ten states suffered losses.

The new Congressman will not take office until the convening of Congress on January 3, 1941.

Increase Automatic

The reapportionment automatically increased Michigan's representation in Congress should effect a change in the present legal method of reapportionment.

Under the law, the census bureau must notify the president of any increase or decrease of population in any state in the United States between the present census and Congress during the year in which the census is taken.

The largest error among the states was California which added 200,000.

The change in Michigan will necessitate redistricting of congressional districts in order to provide a district from which the new representative will be elected in November, 1941.

GROWING SABOTAGE AROUSES CONGRESS

Congressman Rabaut Heads Committee Which Controls Funds of J. Edgar Hoover's G-Men

One of the vital issues soon to be brought into the open in Congress concerns the proper protection of plants engaged in the manufacture of war materials and armaments and the Michigan delegation will take a natural place in the forefront of discussion of the question.

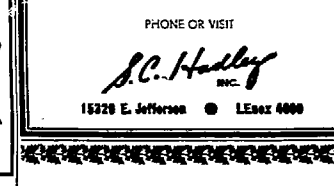

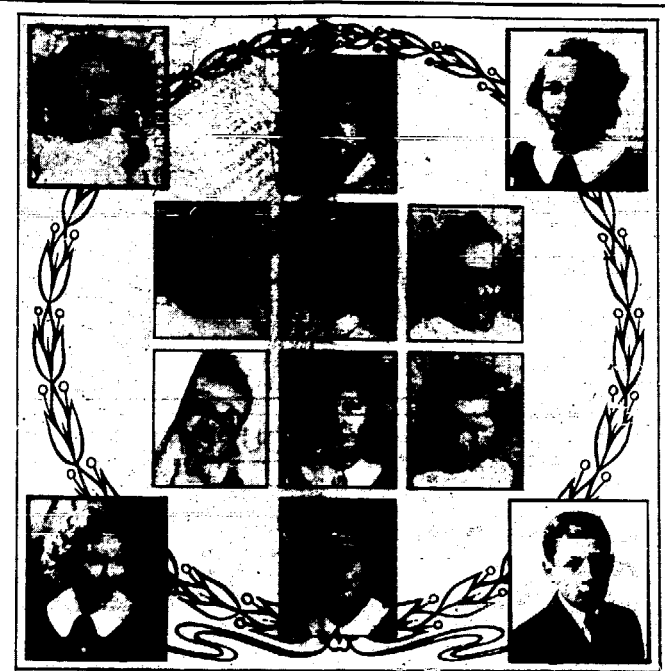

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The Monroe Doctrine

The time has come when in justice to both the American people and the Latin American states, there should be a new understanding of the operation of the Monroe Doctrine. This should be nothing less than a restatement setting forth in clear and unequivocal terms the conditions upon which it will hereafter be operative. The whole orientation of international relationships has changed since President Monroe first set forth as a principle in our foreign policy that position which bears his name and has since been dignified by the term of "doctrine."

When Monroe in his annual message to the Congress on December 2, 1823 declared our purposes to protect the newly created Latin American republics against molestation and enable them to take their first feeble steps in self-government in safety and security, freedom in all its implications was a mighty force in the American political conscience. Men who had played an important part in the Revolutionary War were still active in our government. We had watched with deepest sympathy the struggle inaugurated by Simon Bolivar in South Africa in 1810, and terminated in the Mexican war for liberty a decade later.

The President stated that "the American continents, by the free and independent condition which they have assumed and maintained are not to be considered as subjects for colonization by European powers," and further, "We should consider any attempt on their part to extend their system to any portion of this hemisphere as dangerous to our peace and safety," and finally, "While no objection is made to any further intrusion or interference, we should regard as the manifestation of an unfriendly spirit towards the United States."

This latter expression is as strong as could be employed in the language of statecraft or diplomacy. It was a warning simple and blunt to Spain, aided and abetted by Austria, to attempt no reconquest of Spain's lost colonies in the New World. The exact authorship of this pronouncement has been variously ascribed to Adams, our minister to Great Britain at the time, to Canning, the British Foreign minister, and to President Monroe himself, but that is immaterial. President Monroe was merely giving expression to a purpose which had been growing in the American mind with increasing seriousness since the beginning of the South American war for independence. Since then it has developed into the most fixed principle in all our foreign contacts, and has been tacitly recognized by every great nation. In recent months, with her growing lust for world dominion, Germany has called it a "piece of insouciance."

The significant thing is that since its promulgation one hundred and seventeen years ago, not an acre of land in the Western Hemisphere from pole to pole has passed into foreign domination. Of still greater significance is the fact that in all this century, no one who has had the physical power at any moment we might select to take what we choose, have not despoiled the feeblest of these nations of a square foot of its territory or a dollar's worth of its national resources. The extent of our interference in their internal affairs has been a few occasions of temporary policing when their own civil administrations had broken down, and always at considerable expense to ourselves and with ultimate advantage to them. Our record in Latin America is clean and shines like the noonday sun by comparison with that of any other great power in the world in its conduct towards its weaker neighbors.

America now faces new and greater responsibilities in its relations with South America. The original Monroe Doctrine in the universal acceptance which has obtained from the beginning, was a one way contact which implied the obligation of America to protect the weaker Latin American countries against foreign domination. There has never been stressed the reciprocal obligation of these countries to cooperate with us or with each other in their own defense. The time has now come for clearer understanding. There have been numerous incidents of recent years which evinced not only unwilling cooperation, but an outright repugnance to the doctrine itself. A short time ago Mexico boasted that it stood in no need of our protection and was amply able to take care of itself. The other day Argentine objected to Uruguay granting flying field facilities to the American Air force for no better reason than that it would lie across the water route of her trade. Such examples could be multiplied.

The American people are in no mood to undertake responsibilities fraught with incalculable peril for the protection of unwilling beneficiaries. Our Latin neighbors south of the equator should be addressed in the language of the Monroe Doctrine in this matter. They may be assured of our supreme confidence in our own ability to protect ourselves against any conceivable combination of hostile powers. It is for them to decide whether they can do as much for themselves. We are still willing to pledge ourselves to hemisphere defense, but only with whole-hearted and instant cooperation on their part. To make adequate preparation in advance of the need, this country should have air and naval bases definitely allotted to it at such strategic points on the South American continent as our military and naval authorities shall decide. The refusal of these countries to cooperate should be immediately accepted as proof of their indifference to the whole scheme of hemisphere defense, despite the assurances emanating from the Havana conference. The time to test this fact is now. The way to prove it is by signing on the dotted line, and now. So may this country determine at once the quality of its prospective allies for Western world defense.

There is reason to believe that as an alternative to this immediate cooperation, the rest of public opinion in this country would support the abrogation of the Monroe Doctrine in so far as it applies to all of the South American continent immediately south of the southern littoral of the Caribbean sea. Within this area America can and will take care of its own defense as the emergency impends, with or

The President of the United States, John Tyler, who succeeded General William Henry Harrison after the latter died in office, was the only President of the United States and a member of the Congress of the Confederacy.

As a Virginian, he had to make the difficult choice which so many other Presidents of the Confederacy had to make. He was elected to the Confederate Congress in 1862, but died before that body assembled.

Attention Focused That constant attention upon Vice-Presidents generally and Mr. Wallace particularly, Mr. Wallace, so far, has done nothing to make him as famous as one of his Democratic predecessors. The Vice-President is a man whose name is familiar to every school boy and every boy who reads the newspaper.

Without the cooperation of peoples bordering upon it. If the South American politicians prefer to stave in their own jobs that is their privilege. We will be spared a tremendous responsibility and will have vastly lightened our own problems of defense.

Persons living in the Detroit area, of which the Grosse Pointes are an important part, probably have an inadequate conception of the extent to which the eyes of the Nation are focused on this region at this time.

Associated as it has been from the beginning with the great automotive industry, the problem of defense as it resolves itself into terms of trucks, tanks, warplanes and every expression of power as represented by the internal combustion engine turns the national mind towards us.

However our sympathies may be divided, if they are, toward war blasted Europe, there is no division among the American people in their composite opinion on the question of national defense. On this everyone agrees.
