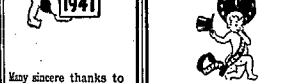

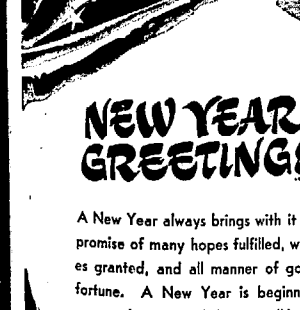

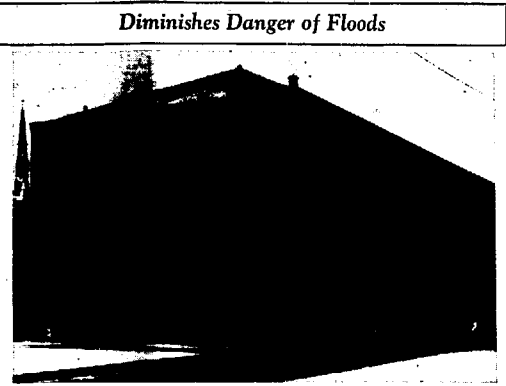
The purpose of the Institute is as follows:

IGNORES STOP SIGN; CRASHES

Porter suffered a bruised neck and leg. Cross was given a ticket for reckless driving. Porter was released after questioning.

The vague feeling of despair and pity one feels for the under-dog countries in the European struggle is brought to a sudden sharp sense of importance when some letter of message comes from an acquaintance in one of those countries.

Some such significance came to Jeanne Heid, Grosse Pointe High School student, in a letter recently received from Kirk Van Loon, a boy who lives in the Northern part of Holland. Jeanne has been corresponding with Kirk for more than two years.

Tone of Sadness

In a general tone of sadness, the letter said: "After weeks and weeks, months and months a letter . . . from my American friend, that was a very lucky moment for me. The communications had been interrupted everywhere, and especially those which came out of America. So your letter had much surprised me."

"I can tell you, my family and I, we are all very well. The cruel war days of Holland are over. They were very black ones for our country and I shall never forget them. On May 10, 1940, early in the morning the great battle of Europe had begun. I was awoken by the first several explosions for the bridges were blown up. We saw the first German soldiers about noon. Motor cars after motor car passed, filled with soldiers, munitions and guns. We could not see the end of the row. We stayed at a friend at Bergen op Zoom for a week and so I could see that destroyed town of Rotterdam. I cannot give a description because it begins all descriptions. Many citizens were found dead under the ruins.

"Our Country Occupied"

"And now, Jeanne, we are living in an occupied country without a government (fied to England) and without our Queen Wilhelmina (taken fled to England). I do not want to talk much about our government. These gentlemen do not interest me, but what about our Queen? Had she to flee? Had she to leave her country and people? I do not know. We shall hope that if everything is right again—also this affair will come right."

"Our soldiers fought very brave, but we stood alone against a superior power. Don't forget we stood. We stood quite alone. Life in Holland is almost normal again, but if everything will be the same in the future as now, we can endure the distribution measures."

"The German troops are very correct and we Dutchmen lie down to the circumstances. I hope this letter will reach you and that the next letter that you will receive from me, comes out of a Europe in peace."

Jeanne's friendship with Kirk Van Loon started two years ago when they began a correspondence through their school agencies.

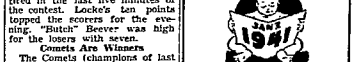

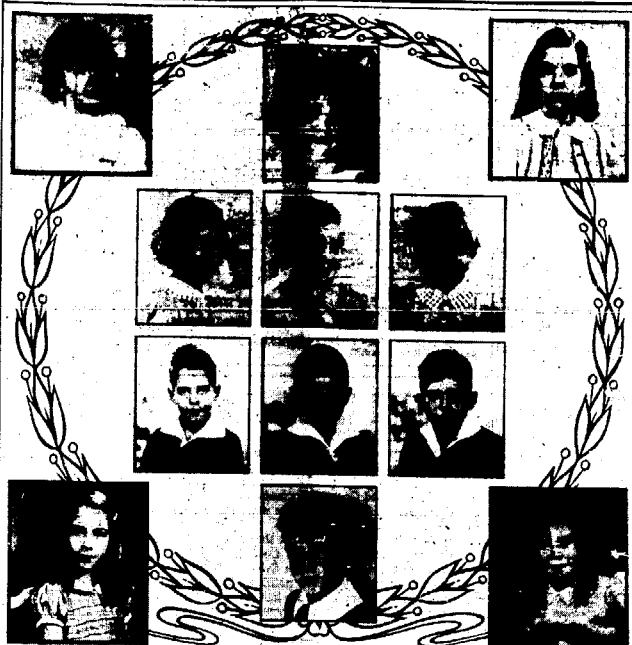

Now is The Time

It is largely a matter of our own individual determination what manner of year 1941 and the years after shall be. There is every present indication that the immediate future will be a period of tremendous business activity. Preparation for national defense is already turning the wheels of industry with a constantly accelerated speed. Opportunities for employment will exist for persons who have not had a real job for years. This subtraction of many hundred thousand young men from the ranks of production and their conversion to military service places the responsibility for production upon both younger and older shoulders. Mills, mines, forests and fields will be forced to higher levels of production.

It is during this looming hurly burly of industry that there is the greatest need for the individual men and women of America to keep their feet firmly planted on the ground and their heads in the clouds. Now is the time for people to arrange their individual affairs for the subsidies to normal levels of activity which must follow the hectic motions of war as inevitably as night follows day. Now we must furnish our memories on the duties and effects which have played such a determining role in the economic life of America within a period of easy adult recollection by persons yet scarcely in middle life. Now is the time to remember that those who spent all they took in as fast as they got it had nothing left with which to face the storms of readjustment. Now is the time to remember the difference between investment and speculative values. Now is the time for the individual citizen to treat his country as decently as he would his neighbor and to remember it is an antioch to profitez against the country as against the widow or orphan.

If the people still have a sufficient meed of common sense and common honesty to live sanely through this coming period of abnormal activity it can be made the basis of a sure and safe rebuilding of our national economic life, so violently disrupted by the lack of these qualities a few short years ago. If in the receipt of big wages they can yet tone down their demands for luxuries they will increase the country's capacity for war production and they will have saved their money against the return to normal conditions when they can again legitimately indulge their desire for those things which minister to the high plane of living which has characterized the people of America. It is the supplying of this trade which constitutes one of the great bases of our whole industrial life. The simple life alone cannot make a country great or rich nor is it to a high level of general wellbeing. A national economy which is restricted to supplying food, raiment and shelter is primitive. The Russian muzik and the Cantonese coolie have these, such as they, and their status is fairly typical of the ratings of the civilization of which they are a part.

It is because the American people possess and enjoy automobiles, radios, electric refrigerators and all the myriad gadgets of our luxurious and bewildering life that they have access to a physical and cultural life which represents the highest plane of living the world has yet known. It is the problem of thinking men and women to strive to make secure a fair way of life which has been our peculiar possession, when war or its threats have passed.

Keeping Taxes Down

The Grosse Pointe School authorities are to be commended for the effort they are making to provide for the educational needs of the community and at once have due regard for the burdens which the taxpayer must assume if new building operations are started.

The School Board has had in mind for sometime that in the near future the growth of the community would require the setting up of three fully equipped junior high schools in addition to the senior school now operating on Fisher road.

The provision inserted in the State Constitution in 1932 which placed a limit of five years on the run of school bonds has created a situation in school financing which makes it practically impossible for poor rural school districts to undertake any new building operations. Even for a relatively rich school district like Grosse Pointe it places such a burden on the taxpayers that the authorities are moved to make every effort to avoid new bond issues. The interest and sinking fund charges entered in an issue of bonds under a five year limitation is bound to result in either a complete cessation of new construction or necessitate recourse to fishy and wholly inadequate housing facilities.

If the framers of the debt retirement provisions in the State Constitution had deliberately planned to retard the extension of "reduced educational facilities it could not have been more effectively devised.

It was with careful eye upon the heavy burden which a new school bond issue would impose upon the Grosse Pointe taxpayers that the best arrangement possible was worked out by employment of the facilities at hand. The continuing use of the Grosse Pointe High School for the accommodation of 400 junior students and the utilization of the maximum remaining capacity of the Pierce School, which has a rated quota of 900, with present attendance slightly under 800, will be sincerely approved by the citizens. Further amelioration of the problem is possible in accommodating an overflow into Cedoux school and the building of a small industrial arts or manual training building to be a high school campus of a relatively cheap type construction.

The people of the Pointes are willing to make almost any sacrifice to assure the best of school facilities for their children. The school tax is probably the one most cheerfully paid by the American people throughout the entire country, but they none the less appreciate efforts made by their school authorities to reduce their money tax as far as possible commensurate to the maintenance of the highest standards.



WALTER WINCHELL IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—It seems probable that the new Congress will meet in the stormiest seasons since the days of the first World War.

Taxation, labor, industry will all be deluged with the flood of bills, both House and the Senate, confronting the Congress as it will meet. The question of aid to Britain and the form that it will take is the principal question.

The President stated that he was considering a plan which would give Britain armaments and munitions on a loan basis—these arms would be returned when the war is still serviceable, or to be replaced in kind. He suggested that the United States give the production of arms for Britain when necessary.

The basic argument that will be put forward by proponents of the loan is that the United States is definitely committed to a policy of aiding Britain; that the defeat of Germany is essential to the safety and well-being of the United States; that the United States should not be a bystander in the world.

Opposition developed almost immediately. Representative Everett M. Dirksen, Republican of Illinois, denounced the proposal as an ingenious and treatment method of circumventing the Johnson Act.

There seem to be no doubts that the President's proposal with a few minor changes, and the deciding of execution from the Senate will be put into effect—unless there is a change in administration.

There may be some discussion, too, about the new set up of the Executive Council, but at least in principle, all parties are agreed. The President met with the Defense Board with a proposal of four new members.

Secretary Stimson and Knox, William S. Knudsen, industrial leader, and Sidney Hillman, labor leader, are the members.

The new Executive Council will be charged with getting the war program into full swing and with seeing that the program is carried out. Mr. Knudsen will be in charge of the industrial part.

Representative Bloom, Democrat of New York and chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee is proposing that the frozen assets of countries occupied by Germany be released to Britain.

There is a proposal to turn over the public buildings in the United States to the British merchant marine and some are suggesting that all the ships in the merchant marine countries be turned over.

Some of the members of Congress are still talking about the release of the British ships to the United States.

Through it all, Mr. Roosevelt seems to keep silent his election pledge to "keep the country out of war." At a recent press conference he was asked about the possibility of declaring a full national emergency.

Washington is taking its cue from reports in the English press. The 'Yorkshire Post' is one of the newspapers which stated: "It is an appalling order we want in Washington, but a man of absolute integrity who means to carry out his duty."
