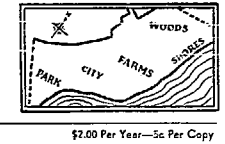

## DETROIT TRAGEDY ROARS INTO POINTE AS KILLER RUSHES VICTIM TO HOSPITAL

A sordid romance came to a tragic end at 4:03 p.m. Wednesday in the Grosse Pointe Cottage hospital with the death of a 20-year-old married woman, shot twice by an enraged lover.

Mrs. Mary Devereaux was shot twice in the chest in her home at 895 Navarre as she attempted to resist the advances of a 19-year-old youth, Harold Gustafson, of 2525 Lykaste.

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## Petzold Resigns From Park Post As Commissioner

Resignation Prompted by His Association with National Defense Program Is Accepted at Regular Meeting

Thomas T. Petzold, police and fire commissioner of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, tendered his resignation from the park commission this week in a letter addressed to Karl B. Goddard, president. Mr. Goddard referred the resignation to the commissioners at their regular meeting Monday night.

A resolution calling for the resignation of Mr. Petzold was adopted at the next regular meeting, at which time a new commissioner would also be named. The resignation was unanimously accepted.

In Defense Work  
Mr. Petzold's letter to Mr. Goddard stated that he had become associated with the national defense program and had found it necessary to spend most of his time in Washington for an indefinite period.

Mr. Petzold was elected to the commission in March 4, 1936, one of the candidates supported by the newly formed Citizens' association. He was appointed commissioner of the fire and police departments by President B. H. Wood on April, 1940. Under his regime the personnel of the police department was reduced by four men and the fire department by two men, in the interests of economy.

Under the village charter a new commissioner will be named by the present commission. President Goddard has asked the entire group of commissioners to meet in one day to discuss candidates for the post. It was disclosed that Harvey C. Fisher has been named as a candidate if he would take the position if it were offered to him according to reports, he stated he is too busy to consider it.

Mr. Goddard has expressed the hope that someone will be found who will be unanimously approved by the present commission members.

## Police Work Exciting Stuff, Reporter Learns

Through special permission of the City of Grosse Pointe Police Department

The other night riding with the patrolmen of a scout car in an effort to get a first hand account of their average day's work.

At 1:55 p. m. I joined Patrolmen Andrew Teetser and Albert Wysocki on their 21st for the last half of their eight-hour shift. We left the Maunne station and headed for the city center, taking a house to house census, which was being conducted by the City of Grosse Pointe Park. A yearly census for their "life" of the houses in the city has never been taken before.

We got a prower call at 8:32 p. m. We sped about eight blocks to the scene and both Teetser and Wysocki jumped out. They were at the scene in about five minutes. When called, there were no signs of any prowler, and after a quick search, the prowler was taken to headquarters that everything was all right.

The police radio for the City of Grosse Pointe Park is W.Q.M.T. The calls are turned in from the police station, and this, of course, saves time in the case of an emergency. When called, the car is in the station, the desk sergeant turns on the siren, and the car is on the air in the next few minutes.

Check Vacant House  
The patrolmen in the four hours previous to my joining them, had checked about 150 vacant houses in the vacant homes in the city. When a resident goes away he phones the police and the information is put on a board next to the name of the house. Get Accident Report  
The house calls contain valuable information. The owner of the house, but long the owner will be away; who to call if necessary; who might be sometimes in the house, and sundry other information.

We were cruising at 8:40 p. m. when an accident report at the intersection of the road and Challenge came over the radio.

We made this distance of a half mile in about 15 minutes. Patrolman Teetser was driving, and Wysocki was my driver. The accident was a minor one and the involved car was away under their own power. The police car was the job, turned on, and prepared.

The cars are the only ones in the Pointe which are equipped with stretchers. The stretcher is in the back of the car, and the door next to the rear right hand door.

Stores Are Inspected  
At about 10:15 we began checking every store door in the city of Grosse Pointe. I understand that there are 150 stores located in the Pointe.

Proceeding along the back door of the store, we checked the shelves, the counter, and the floor. No definite schedule is maintained by the scout cars because the police feel that if this was done, it would limit the time they are on the street on the inspections of the police.

## LARGE TURNOUT IS URGED FOR CITY ELECTIONS

Residents Must Vote on Charter Amendment as Well as on Judgeships

Only 606 out of a total of 3,442 qualified and registered voters of the City of Grosse Pointe exercised the right of franchise at the Primary election held on February 17, 1941, at which candidates for various important offices, including that of Circuit Judge, were nominated. In a community in which there exists an extremely high percentage of population and registered voters in proportion to the population, this "certainly not a very good example of interest on the part of the populace."

Get Out and Vote

# High School's Grads Do Well In College

Grosse Pointe Alumni Make Fine Record at University of Michigan and Michigan State College, Reports Reveal

Forty-four per cent of the first-semester marks earned by the 24 Grosse Pointe High School graduates who attended the University of Michigan were A's and B's according to a recent report received by W. R. Clemenson, principal.

The honor point average of the 24 students is 1.84, while the average for the entire freshman class of 1,535 is 1.25.

Of the 19 Grosse Pointe freshmen at Michigan State College, 40 per cent were A's, B's, and the honor point average was 1.98. The high average honor point average of the University of Michigan students was approximately 4.0 of a hundred point basis. That is, the average of the Michigan State freshmen.

"There is quite a high correlation between college and high school grades," stated Mr. Clemenson. "Those students who carry difficult loads and receive above-average marks in their junior and senior years of high school are doing the best work in college." At the University of Michigan 67 per cent of the Grosse Pointe graduates made A's, 21 per cent B's, and 12 per cent C's.

The following freshmen received scholarship honors: Phyllis Eversby, Virginia Taylor and Dorothy Thompson of Michigan State and Norma Grunwald, Edna Kaplan, Margareta Kaufman, and Arnie Travers of the University of Michigan.

"Naturally, we feel proud of the first semester academic achievement of our graduates at the University of Michigan and Michigan State College," said Mr. Clemenson. "Both of the total records and the average marks are better than those who made the honor list."

This is being done through re-allocation of the frequencies of stations, within and outside the United States. Where interference has been noted, due to stations broadcasting on the same or approximate wave lengths, frequencies are being changed. Therefore, effective March 29, 1941, WWJ will broadcast on a frequency of 850 kilocycles instead of 920 as heretofore.
