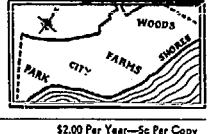

## Vernier School History Shows Growth of Pointe

Edmund G. West, of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education staff, who as a boy picked cherries on what is now the Vernier School site, addressed the Vernier parents at an organization meeting for a new Parent-Teacher association last week. Mr. West has seen the Grosse Pointe communities develop from sparsely settled farm and summer home areas to the five communities of today.

The original Vernier school, which he attended as a boy, was a few hundred feet west of the present building, which is on Vernier road near Lake Shore drive, he said. The original Vernier school was a frame one-room building, painted, Mr. West said, "red red but cream with brown trimmings." It stood on a lot 80 feet wide by 155 feet deep. There were three other buildings on the lot, Mr. West added, "one a wood shed and two other—one labeled 'girls' and one for everything around the building was farm land, and baseball games could be played in the cow pasture, he added. He continued:

Shores Is Incorporated  
"About 1908, the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores was incorporated and six acres at the corner of Vernier and Lake Shore road were purchased. Jefferson avenue was a one-way street, after the building of a municipal building, it was decided to build a playground including a baseball diamond and tennis courts. About 1915, a group of school officers and village officials met and it was decided that, rather than add to the old school site, the village set to the three-story school district 100 feet of property adjoining the village property. A bond issue of \$25,000 was voted favorably and the building was constructed in 1916.

"The combination of school and village playground proved ideal. Most of the men responsible for the combination have since passed away but their work deserves commendation.

"This present Vernier school was in those days the last word in school buildings. While the parents were not organized as a Parent-Teachers association, they gathered at many interesting meetings here. My mother attended weekly afternoon meetings at this school.

Consolidation Is Sought  
"In 1921 a movement was started to organize a consolidation of all the school districts in the Grosse Pointe Villages and in the parts of Grosse Pointe that are now Grosse Pointe Woods and in Detroit Township. Practical School District No. 9, which was a part of Grosse Pointe School District No. 9. This district was served by the old Cook School, still standing on Mack avenue near Lechmere Boulevard. In December, 1921, a vote was taken and the people voted almost unanimously to consolidate. Final plans were completed in 1922. That also marked the beginning of the most rapid growth of this area.

Mr. West sketched how the Detroit school had been erected in 1921 and 1922, the new Robert Trembly school in 1926, the Grosse Pointe Park school in 1927 and 1928, the Mason school and the Deter addition in 1928-29 and the Richard school in 1931. He told of the many acres for a new Farm school (Kerry road and Beaupre) and one on Holm road between E and W streets.

He described the subsequent depression and the collapse of tax collections, the "optimum" in 1928

# Draftees Misunderstand Deferments For Marriage

(This is another of a series of articles being written expressly for the Grosse Pointe News by Judge Joseph Delanger of the Law Selective Service Board.)

There has been a great deal of misunderstanding in general with reference to the deferment of married registrants, and although this subject has been treated at length heretofore the writer feels that further information might help the average person to clarify the situation in his mind insofar as deferment based on a wife's dependency is concerned. Some reasonably definite statements:

(a) Marriage of itself does not provide a basis for deferment. (b) If it did all regulations pertaining to Class II-A deferments could be set forth in one general short sentence. (c) It follows from Item (a) that your Local Board cannot assume that a married registrant, whether or not his wife is dependent upon him, may be deferred until all unmarried men have been called.

# Seek Reclassification

In reference to a single man who, after being placed in Class I-A, married, also proof to that effect, by the registrant, your Local Board refer to Paragraph 4 of the Selective Service Regulations, which states that "every registrant who is classified in Class I-A and who is not a member of the armed forces of the United States, shall be reclassified as soon as he is notified by the Local Board that he is not a member of the armed forces of the United States."

It is noted that the claim for dependency, particularly of aged parents or of a relative other than a wife, is based upon the needs of a business or a farm which is owned by the dependent but operated by the registrant.

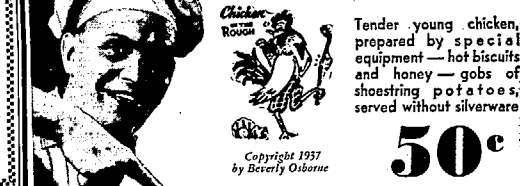

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## Editorials

### Alert Citizenry

A very substantial part of the great increase in the cost of living that has occurred in this country within the last generation is traceable to the abnormal increase in taxation. This in turn stems back directly to the increase in the cost of government administration, national and state but largely local. With the exception of income taxes and a few excise and license taxes we pay indirectly to the national and state governments as ultimate consumers. These are more or less unconsciously absorbed in the general cost of living costs and do not cause the instant concern which comes with increases in the local tax statement.

The non-political minded citizen is partly responsible for this through his failure to keep himself informed on the acts of his local government and his chronic habit of registering his highest notes of protest after the act rather than expressing a timely note of caution in advance. This same citizen is often directly responsible for the increase in the cost of his local government by urging upon it for adoption some pet hobby of his own whose cost to himself and his fellow taxpayers far outweighs its value to the general community. The hobby minded, single track citizen is often an expensive luxury for the municipality.

The lively discussion now under way in the Farms community over the relative advantages of township or townships assessments is a wholesome sign. The best guaranty of efficiency and economy in local government is an alert citizenry who have the wisdom and force to insist on concrete sense in municipal administration whose qualities are of the very essence of good local government.

### After France

No great nation in modern times has been subjected to the tragic humiliation through which the French people are living in these days. Not merely conquered in war, but in life they are being relentlessly forced to cooperate with her conqueror and may yet find her military and naval forces fighting against their late ally and saviour of twenty odd years ago. Marshal Petain's appointment as premier of France's colonial empire, and her position as a European power, is merely the pathetic gesture of a broken old man. It deceived no one, least of all the French people themselves.

The low estate to which the French have fallen should convey a lesson and a warning to the American people. While Germany was intensely building up a great war machine, with all of her people employed at such wages and hours and under such conditions that the material workman, normally putting in eight hours work, were striking for six hours. Small wonder that Germany was pursuing her way with such bountiful confidence. She knew that, as she has been manifestly demonstrated to the world, that the real strength of a nation lies in the spirit and sacrifice of its people. We stored up two thirds of the world's gold and Germany with a gold coverage of less than six miles in the air built up a mass of material costs would exceed fifty billion dollars. If Americans cannot see the significance of this record for themselves, then, in the language of Harry Hopkins when he was Director of Federal Relief, they "are just too dumb dumb."

Granting, for the sake of argument, that the assurances of the "peace at any price" statements that we are safe from military assault by Germany against our continental domain, is true, a premise which informed men of the world do not accept. The high-walled isolationism of the land is not the hardihood to assure us against an economic tyranny whose ultimate results might be more terrible than war itself. The American plane of living which is the highest in the world would quickly vary in a world economy dictated solely from the standpoint of Germany's preferred interest. This is the lure which has moved the German people to unparalleled effort and sacrifice for the past eight years.

They have been promised that with victory they will skin the profits from the toil of conquered peoples. They are to be in truth the "master race".

How would the American people relish having their trade with foreign countries, even with South America, expressed in terms of German marks rather than American dollars? Let one in this country beguile himself with the hope that such an identical situation is not easily within the range of appreciable developments in the near future.

The collapse of France and her imminent joining with her conqueror against the country with which we have the closest sympathy and to whom we are extending practical aid, presents a situation which calls for immediate action by the United States. We should move at once for the taking over of the French colonies. The French possessions in the western hemisphere which from their location are necessary for our own defense or for the fulfillment of our responsibilities in the Western world.

In addition to this step it should be attended to that Dakar on the coast of French West Africa be taken under the joint control of the United States and the United Kingdom. These countries have an equal vital interest in this port, now one of the most strategically important spots on the globe. It directly bisects Britain's lifeline to India and her eastern empire in the Cape Good Hope and for us it is more than 2,000 miles nearer Rio de Janeiro and the Buenos Aires-Montevideo area than is New York. Germany envisioned at that point would have the advantage over the United States in the control of the world's oil supply and the great metropolis of South America. We need give little heed to the international niceties. The shrieks of protest against the violation of international law from a country which has violated for conquest every principle and tenet of international relations since Grotius would, need give small concern to a country which puts a mere nick in the compass for the maintenance and specifically not for conquest, America and Britain are dealing with a country which speaks first and explains, if at all, afterwards. Suitable assurances should be given to France that such territories as she temporarily has under her control will be returned to her when she composes her again come into the world.

The whole world would unquestionably accept such pledges from this country. Our record proves their worth. With Germany such a promise would be only another scrap of paper.

### Looking at the Movies

Although there has been opinion expressed pro and con by reviewers of Charles Chaplin's "Great Dictator," I believe, and attending views should suggest that the film has more current drawing power than any single film in the last decade, with the possible exception of "Gone With the Wind."

Comment and criticism has not affected "The Great Dictator" in the least. It has been said by many that Chaplin's film fails to measure up to pre-publicity; it shows more of the burlesque Hitler more; that the caricature of Hitler was lack of reality, which was true to the extent that Chaplin as Hitler always has been an exaggeration, that Oskar as Mussolini had all the pomp and ego of the Italian, and yet Billy Gilbert as Goering portrayed Billy Gilbert.

The fact remains that with the almost good reception given by the reviewers at the downtown showing, the picture, I understand, broke all attendance records during its stay, and probably for two reasons, first of which was that it was a Chaplin film, and second because probably we all like to whitish in the dark and laugh at Hitler. It is a comedy, but it is not a comedy showing at the Cindersella theatre.

There is only one criticism which I have, and that is the too large ending in which Chaplin sheds his cloak of comedy and tells his plea for mankind. It seems as though Chaplin felt his caricature of Hitler was so convincing and so impressive, and this old greater ending speech for mankind which he said with such conviction - "I do not believe it was needed."

I knew it would happen. The date of the press article in the town theatre was advertising the current film "They Dare Not Love."

### We Look To The Church

There is a deep concern throughout the country whether or not the Christian Church is alive to its responsibilities and opportunities during these perilous times as it will be. Recently this thought is becoming more vocal. There is a too obvious tendency in the pulpits of today to limit their pastoral ministrations to the preaching of a personal spirituality comfort from a forthright and aggressive support of those great moral principles which are of the very foundations of the Christian faith would be more attuned to the needs of the period and in character with the historic position of the modern Christian church.

When the Church sees not only its basic precepts flouted but the very church itself attacked as the expression of organized religion it is high time that it became militantly aggressive rather than passively defensive. The Church has witnessed for the first time in history the establishment of a state on a basis of atheism as in Russia, and Nazi Germany sees neo-paganism which would substitute the gods of war and force for the gods of peace and love.

The conflict between the practices of the aggressor countries of Europe and Asia and the precepts of moral conduct which have been the basis of Christianity for nineteen centuries is so clearly visible to the eyes of the people that thought in the Christian world. They constitute a direct challenge to that faith under which the world in the last two thousand years attained its highest state of moral and physical wellbeing. The people today look to their church for courageous leadership. The temporizing and cautious attitude pursued today by sons of the Christian clergy offers a faltering contrast with the vigorous stand of the Church in the days of the Reformation and the great Revival of the Church under the inspired leadership of these two men moved successfully for the abolition of black slavery through the British Empire and the United States. It is a disappointment that the Church in our land has not taken a similar stand in the presence of the enslavement of white men in Poland and their threatened enslavement wherever the despotic hand of Germany rests.

The essence of the questions, not only political and economic but moral, which press upon the world do not permit the organized Church to discharge its obligations to humanity by the issuance of soul comforting assurances to the individual man or woman. The teaching of sweetness and light is inadequate in a world from which sweetness and light have largely vanished. There needs be direct address to the people in the mass with the Church in the role of leadership. The individual man or woman who needs the word of God should be boldly opposed. In every practical and effective way the hands of our government should be upheld to the ends that its power may be best applied for the protection of Christian civilization in our land, and support wherever it is beleaguered. The patriotic patriot and spirit of the people should be aroused by a fervent and fearless Church. The line of duty and sacrifice should be earnestly pointed. There is great need for such work in our country and not any agency is so well placed for this service as the Church.

Unless our championship of the cause of freedom and the good way of life which Christianity teaches is backed by a force adequate both materially and spiritually, it will be as futile as the gestures of the feeble deity. Germany day by day, force. This is the language she understands and in which she must be addressed if our championship of all that which she would destroy is to be effective. Preparatory to this effort a great mission unfolds before the Christian Church.
