Register For Bond Vote

The school authorities are somewhat concerned over the large number of citizens in the village who have failed to register to vote on the school bond issue on Tuesday the 30th of the month. In the Woods Village where there has been a large recent growth in population and where many of the newcomers were not even previous residents of Michigan, this neglect is especially pronounced.

Most of these previous outstate residents are not even familiar with Michigan voting procedure. It is necessary to specially register to vote on the school bond issue. The ordinary registration as a prerequisite to vote on the ordinary election of municipal officers is not sufficient.

The citizen desiring to vote on this important question can qualify to do so by presenting himself at any of the elementary schools or the district administrative headquarters building on any weekday day from now to and including Saturday the 27th from 8 o'clock A. M. to 4 o'clock P. M. On Saturday the hours will be from 8 to 12 noon and from 3 to 9 P. M.

This matter is urgently brought to the attention of the voters. The matter is of utmost importance to the educational facilities of the Pointes and the sum involved, a \$150,000 bond issue, is of no small concern to the taxpayers.

Not only is it often the instant means of saving life but it has been a small factor in the increasing stature and weight of the latest generation of Americans, which have been frequently noted. We of the Grosse Pointe communities are especially favored in having conveniently at hand such unusual facilities for the indulgence of this protective and health building art.

In the Grosse Pointe News of September 11, 1941, you were quoted as stating during the course of a discussion about sewer problems in your village that "The Village of Lochnore (Grosse Pointe Woods) is not able to get F.H.A. aid in building because of poor construction."

I do not know where you obtained such information but when I was told that this was misleading and giving you the lie for F.H.A. has not withdrawn its aid to building in Grosse Pointe Woods.

Because untreated sewage from several subdivisions is still being made daily on properties all over the village, I am not so poorly constructed but am adequate to handle all of our sewage.

Your source of information properly states that a disposal by F.H.A. August 1, 1941, regarding disposal fees for six tanks carrying off of commitments.

Because untreated sewage from several subdivisions is still being emptied directly into Milk Creek causing some pollution at that stream the F.H.A. has ruled that where this occurs that the builders must install a disposal field for the discharge from the septic tanks. But in no case has any bearing on the issuance of a commitment for mortgage insurance.

This whole situation is being taken care of in cooperation with the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods and the Wayne County Road Commission who intend in the very near future to install an interceptor sewer in Milk River to carry off the sewage.

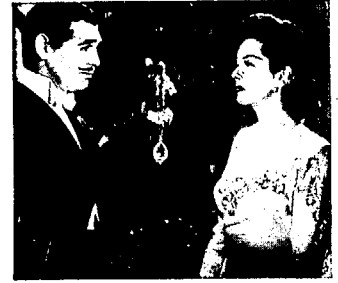
