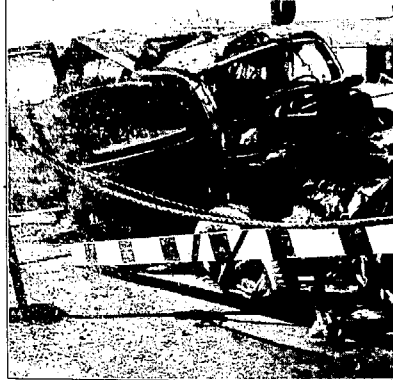




**Police Warn

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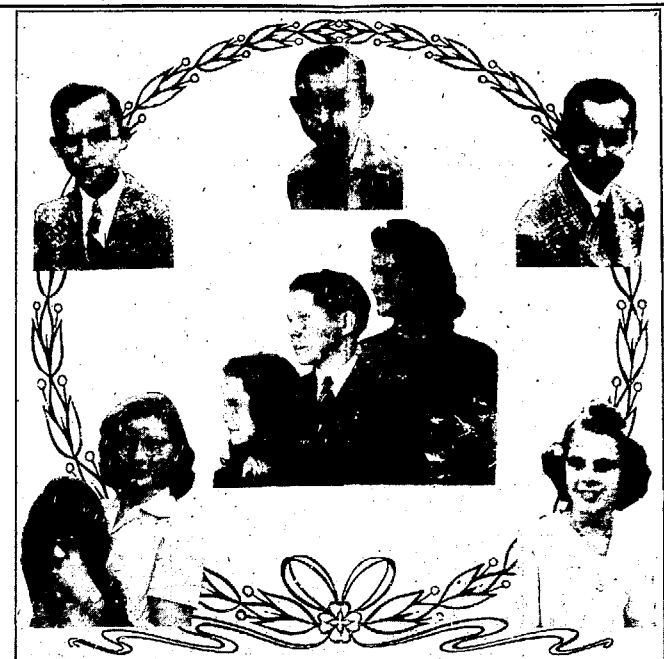

Local Grads Making Good At Colleges

Principal Clemmison Heads Committee Visiting Former High School Students

Grosse Pointe High School graduates who are now freshmen at the University of Michigan and Michigan State College are keeping up the good record in scholarship established by their predecessors.

That's the conclusion drawn by two committees of teachers who recently accompanied W. R. Clemmison, principal, to the University of Michigan and Michigan State College, concerning the work of the 27 freshmen from Grosse Pointe now at the U. of M. and the 12 at State.

Ask Fresh Questions
The freshmen were asked such questions as: Is your living place quiet and suitable for study? Are you having any trouble with any courses? Were your high school teachers too lenient? What suggestions could you offer us for preparing college students, and how can we improve our high school courses? What three things in your high school experience do you find of most value to you in your college work, this far?

In reply to the last question, many said that their English VII and VIII training was the most valuable, while others cited personal advice from homeroom teachers, term projects, and good study habits developed as helping them most.

Make Suggestions
In general, the freshmen think more lecture training should be given in high school classes, that teachers should require more details to be learned, and that there should be tests on reading without discussion in class. They believe that these suggestions should help future freshmen to overcome the difficulties that some are experiencing.

A summary of the marks of these new college students at approximately mid-semester indicates that they are doing quite well, Mr. Clemmison stated.
