"According to Dr. Paul L. Esert, Superintendent of local schools,"

"Whenever Grosse Pointe representatives appeared in Lansing before the State Board of Education, there would be an immediate stirring of voices and a demand for action regarding the intention of the so-called weather district. Ridiculous stories were circulated among the legislators that Grosse Pointe sought an increase of \$200,000 on the fact of the matter is that we were trying to keep from losing more than we had already lost, having consistently taken losses in state aid over the past two years. All that we were trying to do was to keep from losing further during a time when costs of living had increased and costs of running schools have increased." The net result is, however, that along with the loss of the weather district, Grosse Pointe will have some losses in the amount of state aid received.

Losses Not Determined

"Just what those losses will amount to cannot yet be determined, but it is estimated that of the local schools, it may run anywhere from five to fifteen thousand dollars in losses, depending upon the amount of decrease in enrollment and membership of pupils throughout the state. If it had not been for the increase in membership in Grosse Pointe, we would have lost all that we are now receiving in supplementary state aid."

"In other districts where there have been any increases in membership," Dr. Esert pointed out, "the cost of education has gone up and state aid has been increased proportionately. In Grosse Pointe, however, a glaring example is made. In the past two years our membership has increased over 500 pupils and yet during those years we have lost forty thousand dollars annually."

Taking From Few

"It is apparent from such glaring exceptions, with the Legislature largely packed and controlled by the representatives of the smaller rural communities, that the aim is to take from those who can from the few and distribute it to the many. It seems therefore that the idea of equalization of educational opportunity in the state of Michigan is to build up those communities in educational qualities which are low by tearing down the quality of education in districts where the standard is high."

"Frankly," the Superintendent concluded, "I do not see what hope there is for looking forward to in Grosse Pointe to meeting the demands for increased cost of education or of maintaining our personnel in the face of inflation and higher salaries in other areas and in other industries, in any way except by resorting to increases in local taxation. The only other answer is for the community to tighten its belt and expect to take its losses in quality of its fine educational program."

Here they are a professional rooming house-keeper who comes into one of the most highly restricted areas in the City, takes over a large family mansion at the ridiculously low figure of \$32 per month and starts a full scale big room-

It is an open secret that the opinion held by both the public and the police of the most prominent residents of the area is that the question of the utilization of the available living space in the residential area in war work is of comparatively minor importance when compared with the problem of restoring the restricted and controlled residential character of the City.

It is quite possible, it is stated on the authority of certain public officials who prefer to remain unquoted, that if a plan could be devised, strictly legal and certain of success, which would allow a little objection raised by the residents of the Pointe to a liberalization of zoning restrictions in the community during the duration of the war by those of them who are agreeable to the use of their homes in such manner.

These Must Enforce Laws. Many same public officials, however, insist that their only possible relation to the problem, as the issue is now rated, must be limited to the enforcement of the law as it now stands.

It is scandalous that such things be the case in a community where, in making living quarters available to the people producing materials of war, is aiding our war effort.

The United Automobile Workers, CIO, calls upon you as a member of the Truman Council investigating war production, to turn the spotlight on Grosse Pointe and other sections of this area so that zoning restrictions will be relaxed, in the interest of winning the war.

His letter to the Grosse Pointe authorities: "Detroit, Mich., March 27, 1943. To the Honorable Mayor and Council of the City of Grosse Pointe, City Hall, Grosse Pointe, Michigan.

"I am writing in behalf of thousands of greater Detroit's members of the UAW-CIO to urge the relaxation of certain provisions of the zoning ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe to permit those who so desire to open their homes to war workers. As you know, the housing situation in Detroit has reached a critical stage and the government has for some time now appealed to the public, urging them to open their homes to war workers. By July 1, it is estimated by the government, there will be a shortage of some 12,000 dwelling units and that it will be impossible to build a sufficient number of dwellings by that time to meet the need, unless the fullest possible utilization is made of all existing facilities.

"Thousands upon thousands of vitally needed war workers will

either be forced to seek shelter in the hotels and docks, which will impair their health and productivity or find it impossible to stay in their homes and work in war production plants. In either case the production of essential war tools will be seriously hampered. "We cannot help but feel that the majority of the good citizens of Grosse Pointe would welcome such a change in the zoning ordinance in the light of the present emergency. We are confident that Grosse Pointe citizens having loved ones in the armed services, who are looking to our war workers to provide them with the necessary tools to defeat our common enemy are desirous of removing any and all obstacles that might hinder the uninterrupted flow of these essential war tools.

"We understand that since Pearl Harbor, the Common Council of Grosse Pointe has on two occasions taken steps to reject proposals similar to the one we are now suggesting. We now urge you, in the light of the present-time housing crisis and war emergency, to reconsider your decision.

"It is our understanding that present zoning restrictions are resulting in gross misusage of the City's living space. Many have opened their homes to war workers are being rewarded not by the honor and commendation such action deserves, but instead by a possible sentence of ninety dollars or both for each day they violate this ordinance.

"Allow me to cite one case in point: Mrs. Pearl Adams, 314 University place, Grosse Pointe, Michigan, has shared her 22-room house with a number of war workers who otherwise would find it impossible to live near their place of employment. Mrs. Adams has two sons in the armed forces. She was not satisfied, however, in making for herself and her equipment which is being used to supply her sons and the sons of thousands of other Grosse Pointe residents at the front. In the present zoning ordinance is enforced, these war workers will be evicted and Mrs. Adams will be paid for her patriotism by a imprisonment.

"The ordinance is forcing Grosse Pointe citizens against their will to board empty rooms. In these days of housing shortage, it is as harmful to the national safety to hoard rooms as it is to hoard tires or food. In peacetime the ordinance operated to the benefit of the residents of this area, in war-time the ordinance has become a dangerous anachronism.

"The United States Government has appealed to home owners in war centers to share their homes with war workers. The Common Council of Detroit, Michigan, last September to amend the zoning ordinance of Detroit in order to permit Detroit citizens to open their homes to war workers. We are appealing to you to follow this fine example. It would be unfortunate if the public were to get the impression that Grosse Pointe citizens were any less concerned with the welfare of men and women war workers. It would surely not reflect the real feelings of Grosse Pointe residents if the public thought of your city as isolating themselves and as refusing to cope with community problems arising out of war-time exigencies.
